## Daily Proceedings

#### Tuesday Evening, June 26, 1962

The 120th annual session of the Champlain Conference of The Wesleyan Methodist Church of America convened at the West Chazy Campground, West Chazy, N. Y. on June 26, 1962 at 7:00 p.m. The Conference was called to order by the President, Rev. Charles A. Dayton.

The roll was called and thirty-four (34) elders with twenty-six (26 laymen responded.

The vice president of the Conference, Rev. Edwin Seaman, presided over the devotional period. Rev. John Lamos led us in singing "Great Is Thy Faithfulness." Rev. Clifton Chapman read to us from God's Word, II Corinthians, Chapter Four. Before we went to prayer, Brother Scaman exhorted us "To ask the Lord to shut us in with Himself — that we might have His leadership in these meetings." After a few moments of silent prayer, Rev. Reginald Hewitt led us to the throne of grace.

The motion carried that Brother John Lamos and Brother Everett Elliott should be excused from serving on the Nominating Committee in order to fulfill their responsibilities on the committee of Itineracy and Elders Orders. In their stead, Rev. Martin Ayer of the Central District, and Rev. Robert Finley of the Northern District were elected to serve on the Nominating Committee.

The Committee on Courtesy introduced to the Conference Body, Dr. B. H. Phaup, General Superintendent of The Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, and our denominational representative to this conference session. He brought us words of greeting.

Conference President's Address: After an informal recess, the various societies of the conference gathered to hear the conference president's address. Rev. Seaman led us in congregational singing. Prayer was offered by Rev. Everett Elliott. Various important announcements were made. The Conference President, in compliance with conference rules, read to the congregation, the campground rules. Dr. Hollis Stevenson

brought us special music in song entitled "I Know Who Holds The Future." The Vice President introduced the President, Rev. Dayton. He read to us from Philippians 1:1-11. Selecting verses 9-11 as a basis for his remarks, Brother Dayton noted that we as professing Christians and members of this conference needed: I. Abounding Love, II. Sensible Living, and III. Productive lives. In conclusion he invited the congregation to gather about the altar and Rev. B. H. Phaup closed the service with prayer.

#### Wednesday Morning, June 27, 1962

Roll Call: The roll was called at 8:50 a.m.

**Devotions:** Rev. C. L. Hill led us in singing. Rev. Jesse Russell offered prayer. Rev. Stanley Taber read to us from Matt. 6:5 - 7 commenting upon hindrances to prayer.

**Delegate Seated:** By vote Mr. David Durling was seated as delegate from the Fort Miller church.

**Courtesy:** Rev. B. H. Phaup and Rev. George Osgood were invited to sit within the bar of conference.

The Minutes of the Tuesday Evening meeting were read and approved.

Order of the Day: The report of the Statistical Committee.

The auditing committee reported that they were not able to complete the audit of the Conference Statistical Report.

It was moved that the auditing committee be elected for one year in advance of their term of service in order that they may have ample time to properly audit the reports of the conference treasurer and statistician before they are presented on Wednesday morning of annual conference. After discussion this motion was referred to a committee for further study. The committee was elected as follows: Rev. Everett Elliott and Rev. Charles McCallum.

It was voted that the incompletely audited report of the Statistical Committee be presented to the conference body. This report was adopted with thanks subject to corrections and balancing by the auditing committee. (See report)

Order of the Day: Report of the Conference Treasurer.

The Conference Treasurer, Rev. O. M. Finch, gave his financial report. It was adopted with thanks. (See report)

**Prepared Ballot:** It was voted that we have a prepared ballott submitted to us by the Nominating committee for the election of Conference Officers.

Order of the Day: Chairman of The Wesleyan Men's Fellowship.

Rev. C. C. Murray reported that there was only one existing Wesleyan Men's Fellowship within the bounds of our Conference. He expressed concern over the apparent lack of interest in such a fellowship. He presented to us Dr. Hollis Stevenson, denominational secretary of the Wesleyan Men's Fellowship. Dr. Stevenson outlined reasons why the Wesleyan Men's Fellowship lacked denominational and conference impetus, and briefed us on the steps our denomination is taking to promote the Wesleyan Men's Fellowship. He stressed the advantages of Wesleyan men getting together and witnessing as laymen.

Order of the Day: Report of the W.M.S. President.

Mrs. Josephine Dayton gave her report. It was adopted. (See report in W.M.S. minutes.)

Order of the Day: Report of the Tithing Secretary.

Rev. Fred Shippee gave us a resume of services held, miles traveled and remuneration received; all in the promotion of tithing. He defined for us the meaning of tithing, and in his own inimitable way, related the benefits of tithing, described the effects of failing to tithe, and pointed out where our tithe should or should not go. The Minutes of the Wednesday forenoon meeting were read and approved.

Report of the Nominating Committee: The Nominating Committee read its list of recommendations for information.

Order of the Day: Camp Meeting Treasurer's report.

Mrs. Betty LaPlante, West Chazy Campmeeting Treasurer, read her report and it was adopted by vote. (See report.)

The conference president and camp meeting treasurer gave us a resume of building costs to date in the construction of our new dining hall, and answered freely our questions concerning it.

Tabernacle Committee: It was moved and seconded that we have a tabernacle committee composed of one layman from each of the churches in the Northern District. The motion was carried. Dr. Stevenson was elected as chairman of this committee.

Report of the Conference Missions Treasurer: Rev. Aldis Lamos gave his report as Conference Missions Treasurer. It was adopted by vote. (See report)

It was voted that we have a monthly report from our Conference Missions Treasurer and that it be published in the Challenger.

Annual Conference, 1963. It was voted that the 121st session of the Champlain Annual Conference of The Wesleyan Methodist Church of America convene on Tuesday, July 9th, 1963, at 7:00 p. m.

Recessed by vote for committee work. Prayer by Brother Chester Dayton.

#### Thursday Forenoon, June 28, 1962

Roll Call: The roll was called at 8:45 a.m.

**Devotions:** Rev. Charles McCallum led us in singing "Constantly Abiding." Prayer was offered by Rev. Wilbur Matson. Rev. Leland Boring, our devotional leader, exhorted us to praise God. This was followed by singing and testimonies the spirit of which gave evidence that God surely was here.

The Minutes of the Wednesday p. m. meeting were read and approved.

Order of the Day: Election of Conference Officers.

The President appointed Rev. Hervey Taber and Rev. William Knecht as tellers, and asked that our General Superintendent of the denomination, Dr. B. H. Phaup assume the chair.

The Nominating Committee was requested to read its report, and after instruction from the chair, the delegates proceeded to vote. The results of the election will be reported later.

**Devotions:** Rev. Edwin Scaman led us in singing "Trying to Walk in the Steps of the Saviour." Prayer was offered by Rev. Harry Johnson. Our devotional leader, Rev. Otto Finch, read to us the 46th Psalm and commented upon the passage.

Order of the Day: The Memorial Service.

An organ prelude began the service. Rev. Howard Chapman read to us from our book of Discipline. Rev. A. O. Northrup led in prayer. Mrs. Zelda Russell sang a beautiful solo appropriate to the occasion. Brother C. L. Hill read to us from the 9th chaper of the book of Revelation using the Amplified Version of the Scriptures. Our Conference President led us in paying respect to the memory of Rev. Duane Chadwick. The W.M.S. President spoke of Mrs. Doris Mac Knecht, our Stony Creek pastor's wife, who went to be with the Lord. Mrs. Marian Banker read a list of the departed dead from among the churches of the Conference. Reading from Ephesians 4:11-16, he stated that he purposed to give us some truth relative to the Church and a report on the work of the Denomination. As to the Church and its place and position in the world in promoting the work of Christ, he said that we must remain intact, concentrating our efforts on the supreme and primary task of getting the Gospel of transforming grace to men. In order to accomplish this, we must have contact with God, with other parts of the Church, with men of our day, and with the heritage and principles upon which we were founded. 2. Rev. Charles Dayton made the motion that it be a Standing Rule that the

Treasurer of The Superannuated Ministers Relief Association also be Treasurer of The Denominational Pension Plan of our Conference. (No. 34)

This motion was ratified by vote.

Dayton as President of The Champlain Annual Conference, delivering to him a formal charge of responsibilities as recorded in the Discipline, and pledging in the behalf of Denominational and Conference officials their support in carrying out the work of the Conference closing with prayer.

Recess: We were recessed by vote. Prayer by Rev. Elwyn Putney.

#### Friday Morning, June 29, 1962

Roll Call: The roll was called at 8:45 a.m.

**Devotions:** Rev. A. O. Northrup, Sr. was our devotional leader. We sang together "Faith of Our Fathers." He led us in pledging allegiance to the flag. He then read to us from the "Faith" chapter, the 11th of Hebrews, illustrating from his own experiences the application of faith. He closed with prayer.

The Minutes of the Thursday afternoon session were read and approved with corrections.

Order of the Day: The report of the Protector Plan Leader was given and was approved by vote. (See Report)

Characters Passed: During the forenoon session the names of the following persons were called and characters passed: John Putney and Harris Earl, (their testimony was heard via tape recording from Medellin, Colombia) Gerald Matson, L. C. Mattoon, Florence Shippee, Fred Shippee, Elsie Taylor, Hazel Perry, Russell Bissell, Howard Chapman, George D. Jock, Herbert Scaman and Wilbur Matson.

Church Union: The President of the conference read a letter from the Board of Administration presenting a resolution leading toward Christian union and asking that each conference take a ballot vote. The resolution is as follows:

"Be it resolved that our Church continue to pursue the possibility of union, on mutually acceptable terms, with the Pilgrim Holiness Church and other sister holiness groups of like precious faith as doors may providentially open."

The result of the balloting upon this resolution is as follows:

No. of votes cast -75

No. of votes favoring -71

No. of votes opposing -4

Reporter: It was voted that we have a reporter elected from our conference to report our meetings to the local newspapers.

It was moved and seconded that Dr. Hollis Stevenson be special committeeman on reporting events of the conference. After much discussion and a voice vote, the motion was lost.

It was voted that our regular conference reporter give to the local reporters pertinent information of our conference resolutions, etc., and that he carefully screen the same before publication.

The Committee on Courtesy introduced Dr. and Mrs. Stephen W. Paine of Houghton College. Each brought words of greeting.

Dr. Clarence Wirt of Eastern Pilgrim College and the Eastern Pilgrim Male Quartet were introduced. Dr. Wirt brought words of greeting and the quartet sang for us. "There's A New Name Written Down In Glory."

Dr. J. Walden Tysinger of Houghton Academy and Mr. Clinton Tasker of the Evangelical Child and Family Welfare Service were introduced and each brought words of testimony.

Committee on Itineracy and Elders Orders: Part One of the report of the Committee on Itineracy and Elders Orders listing the names, was adopted by vote. Part Two, the Recommendations numbering 10 through 15 were considered one by one.

It was voted to refer Recommendation No. 10 back to the Committee.

Recommendations No. 11, No. 12, No. 13, No. 14 and No. 15 were carried by vote.

**Budget:** It was unanimously voted that items of Education and Pension Plan of the budget be considered as paid by special action of this conference, these items not to be entered in this year's statistical report.

Extension of Time: It was voted that the time of conference recess be extended until noon.

Board of Trustees: Rev. Robert Finley, Treasurer of the Conference Board of Trustees, gave his financial report and it was adopted by vote. (See Report)

Pension Plan: The report of the Conference Pension Plan Treasurer was given and the report was received by vote. (See Report)

Recess: It was voted to recess. Sister Banker dismissed with prayer.

#### Friday Afternoon, June 29, 1962

Roll was called at 1:35 p.m.

Devotions: Rev. Russell Bissell led the devotions. We sang "I Will Praise Him" with apparent joy. He read from Psalm 62 and remarked concerning God's goodness and mercy in restoring his daughter who had been seriously ill. Rev. Bissell led in prayer.

The Minutes of the forenoon session were read and approved.

The motion of the morning in relation to recommendation No. 10 of the report of the Committee on Itineracy and Elder's Orders that this be referred back to the Committee was considered and the substitute recommendation was given by the Committee and adopted by vote. (See Report)

Characters Passed in the afternoon session were: Harold Stewart, James Keysor, Fenton Harvey, Robert Finley, John Lamos, Everett Elliott, Florence Northrup, A. O. Northrup, Sr. and Hervey Taber.

Order of the Day: The representative of the Evangelical Family and Child Welfare, Rev. Clinton Tasker was introduced by President Dayton and presented the work of the organization. He spoke of the need in the field of Christian education for our youth and the opportunities of serving in the field of rescue mission in our Nation; the problems in our nation, namely Socialism (the government doing everything for everybody) the crime bill of 22 billion, and immorality and our obligation as Christians to reach the youth with the Gospel so that God's love may be shed abroad in their hearts. Unwed mothers and homeless children need our assistance and Evangelical Family and Child Welfare can give help if we all join hands. Mr. Tasker made a plea for the formation of more chapters of district or county areas to assist in this worthy work.

Order of the Day: Educational Representatives of Houghton College and Houghton Academy, Dr. Stephen Paine and Dr. J. Walden Tysinger respectively, to address the Conference Body. Rev. Ralph Lamos, Conference Education Secretary, was in charge and led us in singing "A Charge to Keep I Have" after which Dr. Paine was presented. He requisted that Rev. Kenneth Ross lead in prayer.

Dr. Paine read from 1st Corinthians Chapter 1 beginning with verse 26 and commented on how God chooses humble and small people to build His Kingdom but, even though small and insignificant, we are "in Christ" able to do work for His glory and might to the pulling down of strongholds. He said that to be "in Christ" is

greater than to be even a Wesleyan Methodist. To be "in Christ" gives us a world outlook through our studies in the Christian college. He gave the study of history to illustrate how study can give us a picture of the acts of God — specificially, Creation and Dunkirk in World War II. In college interest must go farther than mere facts — we must see the acts of God.

Dr. Paine said, "Wisdom is being converted by faith in Jesus Christ." Houghton College is a place where students are finding Christ as Saviour and Sanctifier. Association with those who love the Lord is a help to a holy life.

He reported that the new library has not been started due to insufficient funds. He said that the new wing to the women's dorm is expected to be built soon. Dr. Paine said that our New Frontier at Houghton is to raise the percentage of Wesleyans in the student body to 50% or more. He requested prayer for the work of the college.

Dr. Tysinger was presented and he asked that we stand and sing the Doxology after which he brought greetings from Houghton Academy and briefed us on the progress made at the school. He reported 93 in the student body and said that the new gymnasium was begun on Monday, June 25th and that it will seat about 800 when completed. He spoke appreciatively concerning the prayer and financial support of our Conference and said that we need Christian Prep schools in each school area of our church. He indicated that this should be a minimum.

Dr. Tysinger has served Houghton Academy for 7 years as President and will be leaving in September to assume duties as Public Relations Director at Central College, Central, S. C.

Rev. C. L. Hill led in prayer.

The Committee on Resolutions submitted resolutions which were adopted by votc. (See Report)

A motion was made, seconded and approved that these resolutions be printed and that copies be distributed to all who desire them.

Dr. Tysinger was called to the front and presented with a Bible properly inscribed as a gift of appreciation from our Conference. Dr. Tysinger offered words of appreciation after the spontaneous singing of "Bless Be The Tie That Binds."

The second reading of the Pastoral Relations Committee was heard. It was decided by common consent to consider the recommendations at this time. Recommendations No. 1 through No. 11 were unanimously adopted.

The Auditing Proceedures Committee reported. The following recommendations were offered: We recommend that Standing Rule No. 14 be changed by inserting the following sentences following the words, "after the Wednesday before Conference Convenes."

"The auditor of statistical reports shall audit the statisticians compiled statistical report before its adoption by he annual conference. A qualified professional auditor hired by the Conference President shall audit all treasurer's books before their reports are given to the annual conference. These books shall be available at the conference President's office one week before the first day of conference. The elected auditors of financial records will audit all annual financial reports before their presentation to the conference body."

We also recommend that the word, "otherwise" at the beginning of the sentence dealing with the closing Sunday of the conference year for pastoral service and salaries shall be omitted.

The motion was made and seconded and unanimously accepted that the auditing Procedures Committee recommendations be considered at this time in compliance with Standing Rule No. 24.

After some discussion in regard to the advisability and cost of securing the services of a professional auditor, it was voted to accept the Committee recommendations.

It was voted to recess at 5:20 p.m. Betty Robinson led in prayer.

#### Saturday Morning, June 30, 1962

Roll Call: The roll was called at 8:45 a.m.

**Devotions:** We were led in devotions by Rev. Stanley Klob. After singing the hymn "Close to Thee" Rev. Klob led in prayer. He then read from Psalms 91:1; 121:1, 2; and 1:1,2 and, commenting upon these pointed out that we must remain identified and separate and that we need to keep humble, remembering that we are but clay.

Characters passed: The characters of the following persons were passed: Elwyn Putney, Stanley Klob, Martin Ayer, Donald Klob, Sumner Brainard, Reginald Hewitt, Otto Finch, Ralph Seaman, Aldis Lamos Clifton Chapman, Kenneth Ross, Harry S. Miller, Diana Miller, Ralph Lamos and E. T. Mein.

The Minutes of the Friday afternoon session were read and approved.

Apportionment: It was voted to hear the reading of the Apportionment Comp mittee report and after considerable discussion pro and con it was unanimously voted to approve the report of this Committee.

Certificates Presented: Dr. Paine of Houghton College presented Certificates of Merit and Worthy Service placques to the churches of the conference which had rendered valuable service toward the erection of a library for the College.

Prayer was offered by Rev. C. L. Hill for Brother Charles Dayton's in-laws as word was received of the loss of a loved one in the family.

Order of the Day: The Wesleyan Youth Business Meeting was held. Rev. Donald Klob presided. (See WY Report)

Pastoral Relations: The Pastoral Relations Committee gave the third reading of its report with the exception of the Recommendations which were approved previously. The report was adopted by vote. (See Report)

Extension of Time: It was voted that the time for the conference session be extended until  $11:45\,$  a.m.

CHALLENGER: Rev. Kenneth Ross, Challenger Reporter, gave his report. It was voted to approve this report. (See Report)

Ministerial Institute: It was voted that the Ministerial Institute be held this fall on October 16, 17 and 18. It was further voted that the invitation to hold the Institute at Mooers be accepted.

Recess: We were recessed by limitation of time and dismissal was by Rev. William Knecht.

#### Saturday Afternoon, June 30, 1962

The Roll was called at 1:40 p.m.

availability of church property in Cambridge, Mass. which is being vacated and put up for sale. The description of the property indicates that it is a large plant and that the size and probable cost would be prohibitive for the conference to consider purchasing.

Conference Minutes: It was voted that the price of conference minutes remain the same as last year - \$1.25 each.

Auditing Committee: The Auditing Committee reported that their work has been completed and that the books have been checked. The report was accepted by vote.

Appreciation: The Vice President assumed the chair. It was voted that we give the Conference President a standing vote of thanks as an expression of our appreciation for his work this past year.

Telephone System: A standing vote of thanks was given ot Rev. Hervey Taber and Mr. John Sears of the Springfield Church for securing and installing on the conference camp grounds an inter-campus telephone system. This system provides the grounds with a much needed communication network and is so designed that additions to it can be added from year to year as necessary.

The Minutes of the meeting were read and approved.

Adjournment: It was voted to adjourn to meet at the call of the chair.

Rev. Edwin Seaman led in the prayerful singing of the Doxology as the benediction.

#### **RESUME OF EVENING & SUNDAY SERVICES**

#### Sunday School Night, Wednesday, June 27, 1962

This service was presided over by the Sunday School Secretary, Rev. Floyd Tyler. Rev. John Lamos led the song service, and a number of choruses. Rev. Leland Boring read from II Tim. 2:1-16. The Paine children of the Mooers Sunday School sang a special number in song. Prayer was offered by Rev. Lorraine Randall Mr. Ray Smith. Smith.

Rev. Tyler introduced to us our Conference Director of the Christian Youth Crusaders, Mrs. Pauline Streeter. Mrs. Streeter made us aware of the importance and values of CYC, and encouraged us to begin a CYC in our churches and Conference this year.

A Male Youth quartet sang "Kneel At The Cross."

The Sunday School Secretary called our attention to a number of the Sunday School displays. Ellenburg Depot and Gouverneur presented animated displays.

The Ticonderoga Sunday school received the Conference Plaque for the highest percentage of gain in average Sunday School attendance for the year. Percent of gain was 51%.

Delegations from the various Sunday Schools of the conference were asked to stand and were recognized with applause.

A vocal solo, "Give Me A Heart Like Thine" was sung by Brother James Morgan of the Plattsburgh Sunday School.

Dismissal was by Rev. John Lamos, a member of the Conference Sunday School Board.

#### Conference Missions Night, Thursday, June 28, 1962

The conference president presided over the service. Rev. Charles McCallum led in the song service after an opening orchestral number. Dr. B. H. Phaup read the Scripture lesson taken from Acts 4:23-33. Dr. J. W. Tysinger led in prayer.

The pastors representing the five pioneer churches each spoke briefly in regard to their respective churches — Rev. Harold Stewart from the Hopewell Jct. charge; Rev. Lyle Harvery from the Catskill charge; Rev. Gerald Matson from the Plattsburgh charge; Rev. Cliston Randall from the Gouverneur charge and Rev. Richard Bennett from the Crescent charge.

A male quartet made up of Rev. Aldis Lamos, Rev. John Lamos, Rev. Ralph Lamos and Mr. Leon Lamos sang "Lead Me to Calvary."

Rev. B. H. Phaup delivered a message on a text found in Acts 4:23 using these words, "And being let go, they went." He emphasized that as these New Testament Christians went in the strength and power of God, there was the Church Contact in that they were sent; there was the God Contact in that God's blessing was sought ;and there was the Man Contact in that they boldly witnessed as they went. He stressed the need of a vision for future Conference Mission work.

Rev. Aldis Lamos, Conference Missions Treasurer, was introduced and gave a few words of exhortation in regard to Conference Missions giving. #### Conference Sunday, July 1, 1962

The Sunday School hour was at 8:30 a.m. Rev. Floyd Tyler presided. Rev. Bernard Fortune was the song leader. Prayer was offered by Rev. O. M. Finch and Rev. J. Russell. Special vocal and instrumental music were enjoyed. Rev. Lorraine Randall was our adult teacher, the Sunday School having been departmentalized with the WY and CYC having their own school. Rev. Florence Northrup, Rev. Bernard Fortune and Rev. Gerald Matson assisted as panelists in discussing the lesson.

Each year many look forward to the Love Feast, at which time heartwarming testimonies are the Order of the Day. Rev. Maurice Jesmer presided over this fellowship hour at 9:30 a.m.

The Ordination Service began with an organ prelude and a processional of the Conference Officers, Elders and Candidate for ordination, Rev. Robert A. Pepper. Rev. William Phillippe, our song evangelist for the camp, led the song service. Rev. A. O. Northrup, Sr. read I Cor. 13, Rev. Clifton Chapman offered prayer. Following special music rendered by a double male quartet of ministers, Rev. Edwin Seaman, Vice President of the Conference, delivered the ordination message. Citing texts in Isa. 51:1, and Jn. 7:37, Brother Seaman led us backward in the history of the Jews, pointing to the materialistic mind of the people in those days, noting that the prophet endeavored to call the people back to God. He led us forward to Jesus' day, to the last great day of the Feast, when Christ endeavored to arrest the attention of the materialists of his day, calling them to Himself, the water of life. His application to our day and our concern over things, was to call us to our primary work, the giving out of the message of the Gospel. He described the nature of that Message, cautioning us that "we are apt to lose sight of the fact that our first business is soul-saving business.

At the cloe of the message, Rev. Robert Arthur Pepper was ordained to the work of an Elder in the Champlain Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America. Benediction by the Conference President.

The Ring Service was held at 1:30 p.m. amid beautiful sunshine. Rev. Sumner Brainard was in charge. A goodly number gathered in for testimony and praise after the singing of "Heavenly Sunlight" and prayer by Rev. Charles Dayton. As the service progressed, several musicians brought their instruments and played as the people sang hymns.

The afternoon evangelistic service began at 2:30. Rev. W. M. Phillippe, Jr., Director of Music for the camp meeting led in the opening song service. Rev. James R.

The Sunday evening service was well atended. Rev. Phillippe led the singing. Rev. Wallace led in prayer. Special music was rendered by Mrs. Phillippe and daughter, singing a duet, and Brother Phillippe sang a solo. Rev. J. R. Chrispell preached from Acts 3:19. He stated that "We are living in a day and age when we have kind of lost the thought of the necessity of repenting." Brother Chrispell likened the 'Holiness Movement' of today with Israel in the days of the Apostles. Each were, or are, right next to a Pentecost and didn't know it. He gave several reasons why Israel should have repented; likewise several why we should repent and turn to God. Service closed with an altar call.

#### REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL SECRETARY

To the Members of the Champlain Conference assembled in its 120th Annual Session, Greetings!

It was with anticipation that I approached this report and its presentation to you, having had the privilege of serving the Conference in the capacity of Sunday School Secretary now for five years. We have had a good basis on which to work, established by our predecessors in this office and with your cooperation have proceeded to build thereon. In 1957 the average attendance in our Conference Sunday Schools was 2288 and this year it is 2481 a gain of 193. It is also interesting to note that 20 years ago the average attendance in our Conference was 983 and as before noted, this year 2481, a gain of 1498 or 152%.

A number of our schools showed marked increases, with Ticonderoga heading the list with a 51% gain, raising the average attendance from 27 last year to 41 this year. Gouverneur came in second with 40% increase. The Sunday School Board met and decided to award a placque to the Sunday School with the highest percentage gain in average attendance and to make this an annual presentation.

Due to the conflict with Ministerial Institute your secretary was unable to attend the Church-wide and National Sunday School Association Conventions in Detroit last October. However, the plans are to send a delegation to this year's convention. Our Crusader program is a growing concern and our need for expanded facilities is pressing. The financial report for last year's Crusader Camp follows this report.

Your Conference Sunday School Board makes the following recommendations:

If possible, each District start a pioneer Sunday School within the District.

That we send a delegation to the National Conventions in October and hold District conventions with workshops during the latter part of October.

That we increase the teacher training classes in our Conference and to better promote this program that we hold these on a district or group basis.

That each Sunday School distribute the Pocket Credentials cards among their pupils.

My prayer for the coming year is that I may report at least 12 CYC Clubs in our conference. 90 every minute are dying without Christ. Some of these are children. May God give you a vision. Pray that He will!!

#### REPORT OF BOARD ON CHURCH & PARSONAGE BUILDING & LOCATION

The Conference Board on Church and Parsonage Building and Location met with all members, except Bernard McClure, present in the President's office at West Chazy Campground on July 1, 1962. Aldis Lamos, the new Conference Missions Treasurer, also met with the Committee.

The minutes regarding Wynantskill's expansion program were read for the information of the new members. The motion was made and passed that we approve the action taken by the previous committee.

Floyd Tyler was appointed secretary of the committee for the present year.

The motion was made and passed that \$100.00 from Conference Missions and \$100.00 from the Conference Wesleyan Youth be allocated to Hopewell Junction to move the Harold Stewarts, who are to be supplying the work there.

The Wesleyan Youth recommended that the \$500.00 which they have pledged this year for the three churches, Hopewell Junction, Plattsburgh and Catskill, except in emergency, be put on the indebtedness of these churches. This was appproved.

John Lamos sought the advice of the committee as to the advisability of either remodeling (installing a heating system, leveling the floors, etc.) the present Turnpike parsonage or building a new parsonage. The Committee thought it best to remodel the present parsonage for now.

Aldis Lamos was authorized to have Conference Missions stationery printed for his use.

The meeting was then adjourned.

The Conference Board on Church and Parsonage Building and Location met at Waterford with the pastor there and some of his people, namely Martin Bozak, Sr., Martin Bozak, Jr. and Harold Matson, on Thursday, August 17, 1961. All members were present excepting the Conference President who was away; Rev. Edwin Seaman, vice-president, officiated in his stead.

The purpose of the meeting was to advise the Waterford Church in the matter of securing a parsonage. For some time it had been the intention of the local church to erect a parsonage on the uphill side of the church, which would involve considerable excavating. However, the opportunity had arisen to purchase directly across from the church, in a good state of repair, on a lot 50'x50', which with some alterations, would be adequate for a parsonage. This house could be bought for approximately \$3000.00. It was the opinion of those present that the needed alterations including adding two bedrooms, remodeling the bathroom, kitchen and other plumbing, and the installation of a central heating plant would entail approximately \$5000.00, making a total investment of about \$8000.00.

Due to the fact that the owner had requested a decision from the church by Tuesday, August 22nd, the Conference Board met and passed the motion that we

sanction the church's purchaing this property at a price not to exceed \$3000.00, to be deeded to the Conference Trustees and that a complete set of plans for remodeling be submitted to this Board for approval, prior to any remodeling. This action met with the approval of the Pastor and the afore-mentioned people.

It was also the mind of the Board that if the church as a whole were in favor of the procedure, a construction loan could be incorporated into the mortgage, if possible, in order that the necessary alterations might be completed as soon as possible.

The meeting was then adjourned.

(Upon his return, the Conference President gave his sanction to this action of the Board.)

The Committee secretary received a communication from Brother Lamos, dated September 7th, stating that the Bank in Waterford had agreed to grant a loan at  $4\frac{1}{2}\%$  interest for seven years with payments at \$41.78 per month.

On October 11, 1961 the Ministerial members of the Conference Board on Church and Parsonage Building and Location, namely, Charles A. Dayton, Edwin Seaman and Floyd Tyler met during the Ministerial Institute with Dr. Harold K. Sheets in regards to the loan which the Wesleyan Investment Foundation has made to the Gouverneur Church.

It was moved, supported and passed that the Conference, on behalf of the Gouverneur Church, arrange with the Wesleyan Investment Foundation for a long-term note of approximately ten years duration to replace the present one-year note in the amount of \$5000.00 which matures in November. Said note to be amortised on a monthly payment basis at approximately \$40.00 per month. The payment on this note to be met by the Conference Missions Department until such time as the local church can assume the responsibility of said payments; and that the Conference pay the interest for the local church which has accrued on the current note.

It was also moved, supported and passed that the Conference assume the payment of \$200.00 plus interest, for one more year to the Superannuated Minister's Relief Association, in addition to the \$200.00 plus interest already paid note, for the Gouverneur Church.

The secretary, at a later date was informed that the arrangement which was consummated with the Wesleyan Investment Foundation for the Gouverneur Church was to make monthly payments of \$58.00 each for a period of eleven years.

The Conference president, Charles A. Dayton, met on March 26th, in the Glens Falls Church, with Edwin Seaman and Floyd Tyler, Ministerial Members of the Conference Board on Church and Parsonage Building and Location, relative to reopening negotiations for the procurement of the Crescent Methodist Church property.

It was reported that a representative of the Committee for Opening Closed Churches in New York State had taken a religious census of the community to ascertain what interest there was in reopening this church. Also, Brother Dayton stated that the Methodist group is willing to sell the property for \$7800.00, and that one of our Conference Preachers, Richard Bennett is willing to canvas the community on our behalf and attempt to open a Champlain Conference Wesleyan Methodist work there.

The proposition of the president is to pay up to \$300.00 for a ninety day option and begin holding services as soon as possible. This proposal was sanctioned by the members of the committee present, and information later came to the secretary that the lay members of the committee, Elmer Streeter and Bernard McClure, upon being contacted, also sanctioned the proposal. However, the Real Estate agent refused to give an option and would accept nothing but an outright purchase. The President then sent letters to the various members of the committee requesting the decision of each as to whether or not we should purchase said property immediately. Subsequently the secretary was informed that the proposal was approved.

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

The Committee on Resolutions prayerfully submits the following resolutions for the consideration and action of the Champlain Conference in session this 29th day of June, 1962.

#### RE IT RESOLVED THAT:

- 1. We recognize our greatest need as a conference is for spiritual revival. Finance, buildings and organization represent secondary needs. Let us humbly resolve to earnestly call upon God until revival comes that will stir our communities and make our witness effective for Jesus Christ. Let our hearts cry out: "Wilt thou not revive us again that thy people may rejoice in thee?"
- 2. We inform the Governor of New York State, Nelson D. Rockefeller, the President of the U. S., John F. Kennedy, the governors of the States of Vermont and Massachusetts, members of the U. S. Congress of our area and State Legislators of our area that the Champlain Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church firmly believes that prayer and the reading of the Bible in the public schools is not contrary to the Constitution of the United States but rather perpetuates the freedom of religion for which our country was founded.
- 3. We inform the Governor of New York State that we as a Champlain Conference continue to be alarmed at the inroads of the liquor traffic on the homes of our state and nation. Clear evidence has been gathered to prove that present lax drinking laws imperil the morals and the physical safety of our youth as well as the safety of all. We hereby officially request that action be taken by our legislature with the approval of our governor that present drinking age limits be changed to conform to the laws of the states that border our Empire State.
- 4. We declare our right as citizens of a free Republic to demand due respect and recognition for freedom of the press by our Chief Executive.

And further that the present practice of the White House in withholding news from and denying access to the regular sources of news to reporters representing papers and periodicals that seem to oppose and fail to glamorize the social, family and official activities of the President be discontinued at once.

And further we stand opposed to the practice of discrimination against districts or segments of our population in the matter of the awarding of government contracts on the basis of non-compliance on the part of our elected representatives in Congress to regimenting demands of the Executive branch of government.

#### REPORT OF THE PROTECTOR PLAN

Once again we reflect that many of the pastors and families have had cause to thank the Lord for the benefits of our Protector Plan.

While the premium rates have risen for some, particularly the senior members of the group, and the benefits have not increased proportionately, the only insurance that many of us carry is the 'Protector Plan,' and it has helped to ease our financial burdens during periods of hospitalization and recovery.

As a conference, we want to thank the churches who have helped their pastors defray a part of the premium cost of such insurance.

Due to a review of our conference eligibility list, our conference now receives from The Ministers Life & Casualty Union a rebate or discount of 4% on our total quarterly premium. This discount is reflected in a somewhat larger balance on hand in our financial report.

Your group leader would suggest that frequently each member read his policy. The leader has no information as to benefits that are not written in the policy. To the best of his knowledge there has been only one change in benefits since the Conference joined the Ministers Life & Casualty group. This change increased the pastor's disability benefit from Twenty Five (\$25) dollars per week to \$37.50 per week. There has been no increase in hospital or surgical benefits.

It is extremely important that each member pay his quarterly premium promptly. While it is true that we have a grace period, this seems to be altogether too short for some. Try to get your premium in on time so that the leader can pay the group premium promptly.

# **Standing Rules**

- 1. The Resolutions of this Conference shall be printed in the Minutes of the Conference each year.
- 2. All visiting members of our own, or other Churches in harmony with our principles, shall be invited to honorary seats in the Conference.
- 3. The Conference Secretary shall receive fifty dollars (\$50) per year for his labor, and any incidental expenses shall be in addition to this amount.
- 4. The Conference Treasurer shall receive fifty dollars (\$50) per year for his services in caring for the funds.
- 5. The Treasurer of the Superannuate Ministers' Relief Association also shall close his books one week before the Conference Session.
- 6. All monics disbursed by the Conference Treasurer during the interim of Conference shall be upon order of the President, except in case of payment to the President, when such order shall be issued by the Vice President. It is understood that any payment ordered by the Conference direct may be paid by the Treasurer without an order as directed above.
- 7. No monies shall be loaned by the Conference Treasurer except by order of the Conference, or by the consent of the President and his Advisory Board.
- 8. Each Elder shall make his engagements as Pastor with the understanding that if he be elected Conference President he shall be released from his engagement as Pastor within the period of three months following his election.
- 9. The first Sunday of each month shall be known as missions Sunday; the Sunday School offering to go alternately to (new) Church Extension & Evangelism and Conference Missions in that order, and that the conference missions offering be sent to the Conference Missions Treasurer. The Committee on Finance defines "Conference Missions" as the establishing new (or) subsidizing of the needy fields of the Conference.
- 10. In securing Evangelists for the Camp Meeting the Camp Meeting Committee is privileged to secure not more than one worker outside the Denomination.
- 11. The Camp Meeting Committee shall be composed of the Conference President, as Chairman, and three ministers and three laymen, all to be elected by ballot, the term of each office to be three years, the time of one minister and one layman expiring each year; also, the Conference Vice President, the President of the Missionary Society and the President of the W.Y. shall be members of this Committee.
- 12. Pastors shall state financial items in their statistical reports in even dollars, except in items affecting the Budget, and as far as possible are requested to report all Budget items in even dollars. When such rule is not followed, the statistical secretaries are authorized to drop decimals, except as provided above.
- 13. The Committee on Credentials shall secure from each delegate the necessary credentials as provided by our Discipline, with Post Office address of the same.
- 14. May 26th to the following May 25th shall be the term of all local Church officers, except the Committee on Pulpit Supply. May 25th shall be the close of the Conference year for Statistics. By June 2nd the pastor shall send to the Conference Treasurer all monies and receipts, with both copies of his statistical report made out, except budget items raised. These items the Conference Treasurer shall fill in and sign. In the event that the Conference Treasurer discovers a deficit in any of the Budget items, he shall notify the Pastor. By June 9th the Conference Treasurer shall in turn pass the reports to the Auditor of Statistical Reports. The Auditor shall correct the reports (if mistakes are found), and by June 16th shall pass one copy to the Statistician, and one back to the Pastor. He shall also send to the Apportionment Committee the membership of the churches, Sunday Schools, and W.Y. The Statistician and Auditor shall give Pastors opportunity to explain apparent errors but (new) no changes shall be accepted after the Wednesday before Conference convenes. The auditor of statistical reports shall audit the staticians compiled statistical report before its adoption by the annual conference. A qualified professional auditor hired by the Conference President shall audit all treasurers books before their reports are given to

the annual conference. These books shall be available at the conference president's office one week before the first day of conference. The elected auditors of financial records will audit all annual financial reports before their presentation to the conference body. The closing Sunday of the Conference year shall be the Sunday following the beginning of the annual conference. The Pastor's salary for this closing Sunday shall be paid by the church of which he is pastor; and for the Sunday of the new Conference Year by the charge to which he is going.

- 15. Newly elected Conference Officers take office after the close of Conference Sunday.
- 16. The Conference shall include in the Orders of The Day a special period to consider Camp Meeting business.
- 17. A Nominating Committee shall be elected to consider and nominate all elective Officers of the Conference. The Committee shall consist of four Elders and four laymen. No one shall repeat service on this Committee until an interim of one (1) year has elapsed. The report of the Nominating Committee shall be read to the Conference the day preceding the election.
- 18. The delegates' credentials shall be sent to the Committee on Credentials BEFORE THE OPENING DAY OF CONFERENCE, and the Conference Secretary shall send printed blanks with the Statistical, Character, etc.
- 19. The Conference recommends that each Charge grant its Pastor two weeks vacation, and also grant him permission to hold a two weeks meeting (over two Sundays) away from his local Charge both vacation and meeting to be without loss of pay; and exclusive of Annual Conference and Camp meeting.
  - 20. The first Sunday in May shall be PASTORAL VOTE SUNDAY.
- 21. CONFERENCE MISSIONS: (1) Conference President shall act as Pioneer Secretary. (This does not create the office of Pioneer Secretary.) The Conference Board on Church and Parsonage Building and Location shall be the Conference Missions Committee.
- (2) There shall be at least one Conference Missions service on each Charge in the Conference this year, at which time all of the Conference Mission activities within the Conference shall be presented. This service shall be under the supervision of the Conference President, or one whom he may appoint.

Any person traveling the Conference in the interest of Conference Missions must be appointed and under the direction of the Conference President. Those thus appointed to travel the Conference in the interest of Conference Missions shall receive not to exceed five cents per mile.

- (3) All offerings taken for Conference Missions shall be forwarded to the Conference Missions Treasurer, and credited to Conference Missions. The Conference Missions Treasurer, upon the recommendation of the Conference President and the Committee on Conference Missions, shall disburse these funds. Any designated funds can be disbursed by notice received in writing from the Conference President, and that all monies raised to subsidize, build or repair new or old churches and parsonages be listed under Conference Missions by all treasurers and societies of the Conference.
- (4) Whereas the W.Y. is an organization that is agressively supporting the Conference Pioneer projects, we recommend that as far as possible all monies for pioneer work be passed through the Local Wesleyan Youth Treasurer, to the Conference Missions Treasurer of the Champlain Conference. We further recommend that the local Conference Missions program be sponsored by the W.Y. as far as possible.
- 22. During the year each Sunday School shall take an offering for the maintenance of the Conference President's home.
- 23. The Conference President shall be ex-officio member of the Board on Church and Parsonage Building and Location; the term of the other members shall be two years each, the term of two members expiring each year.
- 24. No new business shall be introduced to the Conference Body after Friday noon, without a two-thirds vote of the Body.
- 25. Our Conference shall meet for its Annual Session the first Tuesday after the last Monday in June, except the years of the General Conference. On such years

our Conference shall begin the second Tuesday following the General Conference.

- 26. Each Church member over 14 years of age shall be apportioned \$2.50 per year for CONFERENCE MISSIONS.
- 27. The Pastors shall not be required to read their statistical reports (before the Conference Body).
- 28. The Bar of Conference shall be the first seven center rows of seats; Conference shall open at 7:00 p.m., the first day (Tuesday); The 7:00-8:00 p.m. period shall be an organizational business session led by the President. At 8:00 the Conference Body shall hear the Conference President's Message; the hours of Conference following the first day shall be 8:45 to 11:30 a.m. and 1:30 p.m. to closing by vote; the roll call shall be before the devotional service; and Work Week shall be the first full week in June.
- 29. The Superannuated Ministers' Relief Association shall supplement payment of Insurance Plan assessments to the extent of \$400. (four hundred dollars) annually.
- 30. In the event of the death of a minister or his wife, churches desiring to send flowers, shall send money instead.
- 31. The Missionary Board of the Conference shall be composed of the Conference President, W.M.S. President, Wesleyan Youth President, and Y.M.W.B. Superintendent.
- 32. Each church shall take an offering to help defray expenses of the Ministerial Institute and send it to the proper person.
- 33. The treasurer of the Superannuated Minister's Relief Association, shall give as a part of his annual report, a report on the Denominational Pension Plan.
- 34. The Treasurer of the Superannuated Ministers Relief Association shall also be Treasurer of the Denominational Pension Plan.

# Camp Ground Rules

### General Rules

Ever bear in mind that these grounds and buildings are church property, and respect them as such.

The religious services are for your benefit - take advantage of them.

Only young people who come at the recommendation of their pastor will be permitted the benefits of the Young People's Financial Plan.

- 2. Wearing apparel must be modest at all times. The wearing of slacks, shorts, gym clothes or bathing suits is prohibited on the grounds. Men are requested to wear shirts, and ladies to wear hose.

### III. Dormitory and Cottage Rules

- 1. Campers are requested to be in their rooms for the night at 10:30 unless engaged in the tabernacle.
- 2. The rights of your neighbors must be respected: therefore, quiet must prevail in all rooms and dormitories.
- 3. Remember that there are others who will occupy these rooms after you, therefore, keep them clean, and leave them in good condition.
  - 4. Because of fire hazard, there must be no cooking of food in the dormitories.

No. 7 to be added as follows: Since the Y.M.W.B. is an arm of the W.M.S., they make provision for financing this junior organization with funds, if not satisfactorily provided for by some other branch of the church.

The problem of the tot's tabernacle repairing and care was brought up. It was voted to refer the problem to the executive committee.

Doris Lamos volunteered that Plattsburgh, turnpike and Cadyville societies would take charge of fixing up and cleaning the tot's tabernacle.

Lorraine Randall volunteered to have her husband make a new toy chest with a lock on it for the tot's tabernacle.

No. 10 of last year's Plan of Work accepted with b-4 changed to read: Report of work sent to conference vice president by June 1st and c-1 to read Executive Committee instead of Board.

No. 9a to read — That each local society send two reports to the W.W.F. Sec.: one is the regular prayer partner report and one is the Women's World Fellowship report. This should be done twice a year.

It was moved for the Plan of Work Committee to work with the President and Secretary in revising 9-b.

9-c was changed to delete the word recent and the last directive placed on a line by itself beginning with Send to.

10. Accepted with the additional sentence of - "This service can be obtained from headquarters.

Item IV was accepted to read by the local, annual conference and general conference treasurers.

Standing Rules — Accepted No. 3 to include with receipts from the conference treasurer following, — a statistical blank — in the first sentence.

Item 10-c to be revised as previously voted.

10-f was accepted with the changing of the work established - to continued.

Moved that the Hill-Seaman Memorial fund be added as Item K listed under non-budget items in the Plan of Work.

Memorial — It was voted that if the committee think of any changes in procedure that they feel advisable to present to the General Conference as a memorial, the executive committee be authorized to so do.

It was voted to authorize the executive committee to take care of any unfinished business that may come up.

Lorraine Randall asked for the floor that she might express her appreciation for what has been done by the missionary society for the Gouverneur work.

A rising vote of thanks and apppreciation was given to Mrs. Dayton for her leadership in these days of conference business.

Today's minutes were read and approved with two corrections. Moved to adjourn. In closing three volunteered in prayer, then we all sang "God Be With You, Till We Meet Again."

### Interim Meetings

The executive council met following the morning session on June 28, 1961 at 11:30 a.m.

Mrs. Dayton called the meeting to order. Helen Tyler, Vina Hewitt, Helen K. Seaman and Jewel Finley were present. Jewel Finley led in an opening prayer.

The needs of finance for the missionary representative were discussed.

It was voted to give \$35.00 traveling expense to Rev. Stark and Rev. Sedu Mans. \$35.00 traveling expense to Mrs. Bradley, our area chairman. \$150.00 for the vernacular school in Sierra Leone (or if Pastor Sedu Mans is dependent on gifts for his education) \$100.00 for Vernacular school and \$50.00 to Rev. Sedu Mans.

It was moved to adjourn.

The executive council met July 4, 1961 at 1:30 p.m. at the conference president's home. Jewel Finley opened the session with prayer.

Discussion was made on a missionary to travel the conference. It was decided to write the Department of World Misions and state Miss Ruth Curtis or Rev. and Mrs. Hanson from India, whichever would be better for the Department, giving March 9 until finished before Easter as a preferable date.

It was decided to have the district meetings sometime in September.

Those to be invited to fill the one car sent to the convention in New Jersey were to be as follows in order to be asked: Josephine Dayton, Helen Tyler, Jewel Finley, Helen K. Seaman, Vina Hewitt, Josephine Hewitt, Barbara Ayer, Betty Taber, Jesse Klob, Dortha Lamos, Pauline Streeter and Pearl Keysor.

It was voted to have the president put a notice in the Challenger, then later discuss in workshops that the 10 cents per member per month be directed to conference funds for pioneer work so we will know what to plan on.

It was voted to have our Conference Missions money go to Gouverneur this year. In the event the youth don't complete their \$500.00 to Plattsburgh, ours to be divided one-third — Plattsburgh and two-thirds — Gouverneur.

It was voted that the president receive 7 cents a mile travel expense when she travels alone, when with her husband 2 cents a mile. She is to accept the gift given from the society visited and turn it into the treasurer, then in turn, turn in her mileage bill to the treasurer to be paid by her.

It was voted that the mileage to be paid the driver to the convention be 7 cents a mile and that registration for six people be sent ahead.

### Report No. 2

### REPORT OF THE WMS PRESIDENT

"Wherefore Jcsus also that he might sanctify the people with his own blood suffered without the gate. Let us go forth therefore unto him without the camp, bearing his reproach. For here have we no continuing city, but we seek one to come. By him therefore let us offer the sacrifice of praise to God continually, that is, the fruit of our lips, giving thanks to his name. But to do good and to communicate forget not; for with such sacrifices God is well pleased." Hebrews 13:12-16

Wrapped up in these few verses is the story of the work of our missionary society—as a local unit, a Conference society, or as the sum-total of these groups, our General Society. Herein is explained our reason and purpose for existence, our task, and the ultimate rewards we may expect to obtain.

Briefly, (1st) our reason for existence is "because" Jesus suffered without the gate to sanctify the people with his blood (verse 12); (2ndly) our purpose as a society and individuals in that society, is to "go forth unto him without the camp, bearing his reproach (vs. 13) and to "offer the sacrifice of praise to God continually (vs. 15). (3rdly) our task is also two-fold (a) to "do good" and (b) "forgetting not to communicate (vs. 16). These embrace both our foreign and Community Mission work. (4thly) our reward is the present satisfaction of knowing our efforts are "well-pleasing to God" (vs. 16) and the wonderful hope of that "continuing city" promised to those who serve him. (vs. 14)

Each of us has labored in our own appointed niche during this past year, and the time has now come for the annual resume of our efforts. We are gathered together once more here on these dedicated grounds to report on our year's activities — yes, and even more, to encourage each other in the faith; and, most of all, to receive anew that spiritual annointing from above which furnishes renewed impetus and buoyancy to our missionary efforts.

As your president, we have sought to promote all the various phases of the work of the societies by the following means:

1. We attended the area Convention in New Jersey last August where we gave the response to welcome at the request of our Area Chairman.

- 2. We were privileged to visit and spend a night at our Brainerd Indian School in South Dakota and to give at least one formal report of this visit by request on our return home.
- 3. We were able, through the splendid efforts and foundation work of the local pastor's wives, to organize a new society at Gouverneur, and to help reactivate the society at Cooks Corners which had been active for a year.
  - 4. It was our pleasure to visit and speak to 14 local societies at their invitation.
- 5. We were able to cooperate with the district chairmen in promoting the District Workshops and toured with the team who directed them in Lisbon, Catskill, Glens Falls and Malone respectively.
- 6. It was our duty to sponsor the four district conventions planned by the district chairmen and held at Schenectady, Corinth, West Chazy and Heuvelton respectively.
- 7. It was also our task to coordinate the missionary work of the Conference by means of monthly letters in our official organ The Challenger.
- 8. Our responsibilities also involved at least 85 pieces of correspondence a number of phone calls, and between 1500-2000 miles of Conference travel, as well as 5 camp meeting board sessions, 2 Executive Committee meetings, and one planning meeting for compiling statistical report data.

THE PUBLIC MISSIONARY SERVICE

The officers for the coming year were installed by a very impressive service, following which Mrs. Josephine Dayton, missionary president, took charge of the service.

A quartet consisting of Revs. Edwin Seaman, John Lamos, Ralph Lamos and Charles McCallum sang "In the Cross of Christ I Glory."

Several of our Missionary Parents were introduced, and Mrs. Dayton spoke briefly concerning their children on their respective fields of service.

A missionary message was given by Rev. A. Gordon Wolfe, pastor of the Batavia Wesleyan Methodist church at present, but who has had several years of missionary service in Japan and has just completed a missionary tour of the mission stations in the East. Rev. Wolfe showed slides with pictures of our work in Japan, Australia, Philippines and New Guinea, which he had taken on his recent trip.

A missionary offering was taken with pledges being made.

In closing "Work for the Night is Coming" was sung after which Dr. Hollis Stevenson prayed the benedictory prayer.

### PLAN OF WORK

### I. General

board member.

We recommend:

- 1. The election in each local society of consecrated officers of vision to carry on a work is ever new and challenging.
- 2. That the mcn in churches who cannot form their own Men and Missions Fellowship be encouraged to join the local societies as honorary members, particularly emphasizing March and September as membership months. Also, that all efforts be made to foster public missionary meetings.
- 3. That at a meeting before conference when officers for the coming year are elected, a delegate (other than the church delegate, if possible) be elected, whose room and board for the conference shall be provided by the local society. She shall be instructed as to the amount of the pledge for missions and her report be given at the first meeting after conference.

- 4. That the financial obligations of the Society, per member be as follows:
- (a) \$1.00 membership dues to be sent to the conference treasurer and forwarded to the General Wesleyan Missionary Society treasurer for the General Fund.
- (b) That each local society pay annually into the Conference Working Fund, the amount assessed by the Conference Executive Board which was 50 cents per member.
  - 5. That money dispersed receiving no budget credit be listed as follows:
    - (a) Card Call
    - (b) Conference Missions Fund (10 cents per member per month)

(c) Honorary College Enrollment

(d) Houghton Academy

- (e) Mile of dimes (Missionary Equipment Fund)
- (f) Medical Missions Fund
- (g) Self-Denial Offering
- (h) White Christmas Offering

(i) Membership Dues

- (j) Offering for American Bible Society
- (k) Hill-Seaman Memorial Fund
- 6. That in societies where it is deemed more expedient, one large offering per month be taken to help defray the obligations, rather than taking a number of separate offerings. This large offering to be divided by vote of the society or the Executive Committee of the local society.
- 7. Since the Y.M.W.B. is an arm of the W.M.S., they make provision of financing this junior organization with funds, if not satisfactorily provided for by some other branch of the church.
- 8. That local churches hold missionary rallies as can be arranged with the pastor, to stimulate missionary interest, utilizing the facilities of Wesley Film Service when advisable. This service can be obtained from Headquarters.

II. Community Missions

That since our witness for Christ is to begin in Jerusalem, let us seek to win souls in our home communities by personal work: calling on new families, inviting others to our meetings, and in thoughtful service to all.

- 1. Methods of Operation:
  - (a) Visitation A systematic campaign of visitation by a volunteer staff. Each may choose the type of calls she will make.

(1) Supervision: to be directed by the local vice-president and committee of two others.

- (2) Areas of visitation: The ill, aged, unchurched, Sunday school absentees, new comers to the community, delinquent families, bereaved homes, friendless ones, needy people (spiritually or financially) or any others who might benefit by a call made in the spirit of Jesus. Institutional visitation if and when permitted: hospitals, nursing homes, sanatoriums, rescue homes, jails and other places of detention.
- (b) Nature of Reports:
  - (1) Number of contacts made for Christ by letter, phone or visit.

(2) Number of hours so employed.

(3) Total amount of cash and supplies disbursed for Community Missions.

(4) Report of work sent to Conference vice persident by June 1st.

(c) Evangelism — A campaign of individual witnessing and personal soulwinning.

(1) Supervision: To be directed by the local Executive Committee.

(2) General Aims: To stress the importance of the Christian's testimony whenever opportunity presents itself.

(3) To designate the month of March as "Focus Month" for conducting an aggressive soul-winning crusade by means of personal contacts, cottage prayer meetings, tract distribution, etc.

(4) To encourage an organized effort of personal evangelism by sponsoring some means of instruction for these interested in personal soul-winning.

### III. Women's World Fellowship

We recommend:

- 1. That a Women's World Fellowship Secretary be appointed who shall promote this program and that a Prayer Partner Circle be formed under her direction and a report be sent to the conference W.W.F. Secretary within 60 days after conference who in turn will send her report to the General W.W.F. secretary 90 days after conference. Then a second report be sent to the Conference W.W.F. Secretary by June 1st.
  - (a) That each local society send two reports to the W.W.F. Secretary: one is the regular Prayer Partner and one is the Women's World Fellowship. This should be done twice a year. (see above)
  - (b) Reports to include:
    - (1) Prayer Partner Report (Number of Missionaries prayed for, number of people participating.)

(2) Number of women participating in W.W.F. Program.

(c) That the following used postage stamps be salvaged:

All commemorative stamps including air mails. (Commemorative stamps are issued for some special person or subject as the boy scouts, water conservation, etc.)

All stamps above 5 cents value;

All stamps that have ½ cent on them;

All postage due and special delivery stamps;

All stamps that have the name of a town printed on them;

All foreign stamps.

Send to General W.W.F. Secretary to help build an operation fund.. Cut around the stamp leaving a good margin (1/2 inch) of paper.

### IV. Home Work

We recommend:

1. That each local society send in a minimum of five dollars for the Department of Church Extension and Evangelism, the same to be given budget credit.

2. Since our conference has no Home Missions projects for which we are responsible, we will aid Home Missions in other conferences by supporting their projects with gifts and offerings.

3. That each local society contribute, five dollars or more annually for the

support of Hephzibah Children's Home, the same to be applied on budget.

4. That local societies inquire into the needs of the Home Mission Stations and Children's Home before sending used clothing, and that no monetary value be placed on same; That boxes of new merchandise be reported as to monetary value and that the sending society evaluate the same. The voucher evaluation, signed by the missionary, be forwarded to Conference W.M.S. Treasurer for proper receipting.

5. That each local society support the work of the American Bible Society, by an annual offering, preferably taken during Universal Bible Reading Period. Channel

Funds through Conference W.M.S. treasurer.

### V. Foreign Work

We recommend:

1. That our local societies make bandages when called for by our missionaries, these to be forwarded to the Missionary Headquarters. (See current Efficiency Standard under Medical Missions for specific directions for making bandages.)

2. That the local society contribute \$3.00 or more annually to the Medical

Missions Fund.

### VI. Treasurer

We recommend:

1. That a concerted effort be made to increase the subscription list of the Wesleyan Missionary by faithfully securing renewals and new subscriptions to include every home in the church and Sunday school with January being observed as campaign month. That all societies faithfully use the Conference Church Key combination which

may be obtained from Conference Solicitor (see conference minutes). Local Solicitor should keep up to date records, correct addresses and expiration date of each Wesleyan Missionary subscriber.

2. Subscriptions be encouraged as gifts for weddings, anniversaries, new converts and new families contacted by the church, and that the magazine be placed in libraries, offices, hospitals, home for the aged and such other public places deemed advisable.

### VIII. Education

We recommend:

- 1. The use of "The Guide" and other prepared helps.
- 2. That the Reading Course be promoted, wherein the Mission Study Secretary will keep record of all reading done in the prescribed reading course reporting statistics to the Conference Mission Study Secretary by the 15th of January.
- 3. That the 1959-1963 new Efficiency Standard for the local society, the Plan of Work and the Standing Rules be read as soon as available after Conference and that this be a guide for the Local President for her check-up at the end of the year.

# Standing Rules

- 1. The Standing Rules of the Conference Missionary Society shall be printed in the Conference Minutes each year.
- 2. That all remittances should be in the hands of the Conference Treasurer by May 25th.
- 3. That the Local Treasurer send a statistical blank to the statistician on or before June 1st. All blanks arriving after the deadline will not be included in the statistical report. Send the delegates credentials to the Conference Missionary Secretary two weeks before Conference. Receipts and disbursements must be made to balance before being sent, also rating according to efficiency standard. Take one home after conference to read to the local society.
- 4. We recommend that the treasurer of the Conference Society be elected as a Committee of Remembrance with the authority to send flowers or some suitable tribute to those of our number who shall be called to their eternal reward. We further recommend that this shall include pastor's wives and officers of our Conference Missionary Society.
- 5. That each society respond to the Card Call plan by subscribing as a group in addition to those already receiving the Card Call, and send the money to the Conference Missionary Treasurer.
- 6. The continuation of supporting worthwhile projects, such as sending good usuable clothing, notions, pictures and medical supplies to our Home Missionaries, forwarding Sunday School charts, flannelgraph material and Sunday School quarterlies to fields where there are English Speaking Schools, and the preparation of exhibits to be displayed at conference. Societies displaying exhibits for World Missions send sufficient funds to cover postage to Marion, Indiana. (It is considerate to contact the missionaries as to urgent needs.)
- 7. That we send the necessary supplies to the camp ground, and the needs to be itemized in the Challenger.
- 8. That since there is an urgent need for refurnishing dormitory rooms, those societies interested in cooperation may contact the matron in charge, whose name will be published in the Challenger.
- 9. Along with the delegates credentials send into the conference secretary a list of the deceased within the year, and a brief statement of their activities within the society.
  - 10. Special Projects:
    - a. Conference Mission Project money amounting to the equivalent of 10 cents

per active member per month or \$1.20 annually to be sent to the conference W.M.S. Treasurer.

- b. May we encourage emphasis on the penny-a-meal fund which provides for the support of our missionary, Mrs. Witthunn. Due to the fact that missionary support has been substantially increased, this phase of our work should be brought to the attention of our ladies from time to time.
- c. That we discontinue the reading of statistical reports during conference, and the president appoint a committee to compile, bring a report, and display the data in a chart to be posted during conference.
- d. That each local president include the name of their delegate on the Conference President's Fourth Quarterly Report; and the Local Vice President include the name and address of the new Vice President on her last community Missions Report to the Conference Vice President.
- e. That we assume a responsibility for emphasizing special prayer in our societies for young men and women to answer the call of God to go as teachers in the Government schools in Sierra Leone.
- f. That a Hill-Scaman Memorial Fund be established by each society taking an offering for the aid of Foreign Students in Houghton Academy.
