# Journal Of Daily Proceedings.

Fairmount, Ind., August 14, 1923.

The seventy-fifth annual session of the Indiana Conference convened on the Camp Ground at Fairmount, Indiana, August 13, 1923. The opening sermon was delivered by R. D. Wise at 7:30 P. M. This was full of encouraging and timely admonition.

The Conference convened at 8:00 A. M. Tuesday for business, with W. L. Thompson presiding.

Devotions were conducted by C. S. Smith and C. A. Billheimer. The roll was called and 33 elders and 19 licentiates answered to the call of their names.

The following named persons presented proper credentials and were enrolled as delegates:

Castor, Dona Broneller, Merle Bakehorn, Jennie Anderson, Mary Spitler, William Christoph, Thomas Dyson, Bertha Merideth, Daisy Bears, Maude Bowman, Laura Smith, Ella Baldwin, Clara Kierstead and Carrie Hufty.

The Conference was then declared open for business, and the President read his annual address, which was a brief summary of the year's work, with encouraging remarks and suggestions relative to the future activity of the Church.

The address contained the following resolutions:

First, That the College Building Fund deficit and also the "No Retreat Campaign" be referred to the Committee on Finance and Appropriations, to formulate ways and means by which the Conference will be able to take care of them.

Second, That all those who have signified their desire to be organized into a Church Extension Society by signing the cards presented in the Itineracy of the Church Extension Secretary, with all others who may desire to be associated with them, be called together in a special meeting appointed early in the Conference, to effect said organization. This, it is understood, is not to supersede any prerogative of the Conference, or duplicate the work of the Church Extension Secretary, but be an auxiliary to the Conference and an aid to the Secretary in conserving the fruits of his labor.

A motion prevailed that the address of the President be adopted.

The President then read his annual report which contained a calendar of business and special orders, which upon motion was adopted.

A special report of the president relative to the action of the last General Conference in organizing the Kentucky Conference was made and a motion prevailed to adopt the same.

The Conference bar was fixed as the first four seats on either side, in front and including the rostrum.

A motion prevailed that the Conference convene at 8:30 A. M. and 2:00 P. M., and adjourn at 11:45 A. M. and upon motion in the evening.

The Committee on Courtesies was constituted as follows: C. S. Smith and H. T. Hawkins.

The Committee on Resolutions was filled by the election of J. Hester, C. A. Billheimer and T. M. Bodenhorn.

E. L. Glover, W. D. Baker, S. C. Kinnison, Jesse Hacker and Frank Foulke were constituted a Committee on Finance and Appropriations.

On motion the following persons were elected to the Committee on Ministerial Character: W. L. Thompson, F. O. Spitler, H. C. Brown and Thomas Dyson.

# Resolutions and Laws of Indiana Conference.

- 1. It is contrary to the spirit of the Discipline and our principles for our preachers to assist in any service with oath-bound societies.
- 2. That any candidate for Elder's Orders or to travel under the direction of the Conference, who fails to attend the Institutes and the examinations of the Committee, without sufficient cause, shall be deemed unworthy of the trust and care of souls, and refused a place among us as a minister of the Gospel, and when they shall fail to attend the Institute for two successive years they shall be dropped from the roll.
- 3. That it is the sense of this Conference that our houses of worship should not be open to any evangelist or minister of any other church to hold a series of meetings or to maintain a regular appointment for another congregation; provided, however, that usual denominational courtesies be extended to other ministers in occasional appointments.
- 4. Any waiving of the above resolution by a contract or lease of building must be obtained through the Board of Trustees of the Indiana Conference.
- 5. Whereas, The Discipline requires that the Stewards must meet the Pastors and agree with them as to the amount necessary for their support, be it resolved: That the circuits may at the same time enter into an agreement in writing with the Pastor as to the service he is to render to the church. In case the pastor shall fail to render said service, unless providentially hindered or released by the circuit, said failure shall be considered a sufficient cause to make an adjustment of the amount originally agreed upon. Otherwise, the contract shall be binding upon both parties the same as any other financial obligation entered into by contracting parties
- 6. Each pastor shall file a duplicate statistical report with the Committee before the close of the second day of Conference, said report to be kept on file one year, and hereafter these reports shall not be read in open Conference.
- 7. The membership, so far as possible, shall pay all their contributions for the Conference and Connectional interests to the pastors, who shall receipt them for the same and see that it is paid to the proper authorities. Where money is paid direct to the Conference Treasurer by the membership, h shall send a duplicate receipt to the pastor of the charge where such persons are members.

- 8. All charges with a membership of twenty-five or more shall in addition to the regular stipulated salary, assume the responsibility of providing a suitable home in which the pastor may live.
- 9. We recommend that all charges and stations to which the pastor moves pay the moving and transportation expenses of said pastor, the same to be done in addition to his salary; provided this shall not interfere with the previous arrangements between pastors and charges.
- 10. All unaccounted for members appearing in the statistics in the membership list shall be transferred to the discontinued list. The roll of all the classes upon the charges shall be put in the hands of the Pastors and they have charge of the same and make all entries therein.
- 11. The Committee on Elder's Orders is hereby empowered to transfer all persons to the study list who may have been recommended to travel and may not have been given work.
- 12. It shall be a standing rule of this Conference until revoked by vote that the President shall receive \$35.00, the Secretary \$50.00, the Assistant Secretary, \$15.00, and each member of the Statistical Committee, \$15.00, the same to be apportioned pro rata among the various funds of the Conference.
- 13. The official character of no Pastor shall be passed until he shall have submitted a satisfactory report, including statistics.
- 14. The ordination service shall be held in connection with the memorial services of the Conference.
- 15. The Board of Trustees shall formulate plans to govern the Educational Secretary and Church Extension Secretary in their work, this to be a standing rule of this Conference until revoked by this body.
- 16. It shall be a standing rule until revoked by this body that the President shall nominate his Advisory Board and the Conference shall elect his nominations.
- 17. It shall be a standing rule of this Conference that in the examination of character the Conference officials and General Evangelists shall be called first.
- 18. In the membership report all members who are found on the circuits in excess of the number reported shall be reported received.
- 19. No letter of standing shall be granted in the interim of Conference or during the session of Conference, until satisfactory evidence is given by the minister making the request that no outstanding debts are unprovided for and that he has honorably withdrawn from the contract for service made with a charge or Conference.

- 20. Be it resolved, That where the Conference demands the services of any one, that it shall bear the moving expenses, if any expense shall thus be incurred.
- 21. Whereas, the Indiana Annual Conference Camp Meeting has reached a place in its history where it requires the best evangelistic assistance; and, whereas, the leading evangelists much of the time are slated for at least one year in advance; and, whereas, the Camp Meeting Committee has been handicapped in the selection of such evangelists who are suitable for our Camp, due to the fact that the Committee is elected to serve for one year only, therefore be it resolved, that the Committee be elected as follows: one for three years, one for two yars and one for one year, and that the person elected for three years be chairman of the Committee, and that thereafter each member be elected for a term of three years.
- 22. Be it resolved that, It shall be the duty of the pastor to look after the insurance of our church and parsonage properties. All insurance shall provide for losses caused by fire and lightning, hail and tornado. A failure on the part of the pastor shall be a censurable offense. If the church fails to insure their property, upon reasonable effort of the pastor to secure the same, then said failure shall be reported to the President of the Conference, who shall then have the property insured. In such case, all insurance monies received from losses by fire, lightning, hail and tornado shall be used in Church Extension work as the Conference Board of Trustees deems best.
- Whereas, there is an inexcusable tendency on the part of some of the charges to be forgetful and neglectful of the much needed donations for our Pastors; and, whereas, the salaries now received are comparatively and in some instances extremely small; and, whereas, failure on the part of the various charges to remember the Pastor with liberal donations greatly increases the financial burden and makes the matter of the family support a question of serious concern to the minister; Therefore, be it resolved, that it shall be the duty of the Conference Evangelists holding quarterly meetings to faithfully inquire, first, as to whether a competent and energetic donation steward has been elected at each church on the charge; and, second, as to whether donations are regularly and systematically given to the pastor; and, third, it shall be his duty to call for a careful report from the donation steward at the business session of the quarterly meeting and to make it clear to the church or charge that the annual conference expects whole-hearted response to this need. Be it furthermore resolved that this resolution shall have record in the standing rules of the Conference and shall be binding until the action is revoked by this body.

#### COMMITTEE ON FINANCE AND APPROPRIATIONS.

# Report No. 2.

We, your Committee on Finances, beg permission to make the following report: Inasmuch as the ministry is a high and holy call-

ing and deserving of the loyal support of the Church, and in view of the fact that financial support for the ministry cannot be held without belittling the office, and considering the serious handicap, embarrassment and humiliation under which the pastor is placed in case of insufficient remuneration for his service, we therefore recommend that no backward step be taken on any charge in the conference with respect to ministerial support and that the minimum salary be \$1,000.

We also recommend that inasmuch as it works a hardship on the pastor to receive his salary in quarterly payments, that all charges make arrangements to pay their pastor either weekly or semi-monthly.

Believing that a contract entered into by a church and pastor is solemn and sacred and therefore binding until that contract is fulfilled, we recommend that all charges and churches who are delinquent on pastors' salary be requested to make arrangement for the immediate payment of their obligation.

#### Evangelists.

- 1. We recommend that the Conference President's salary be \$1,400 with an additional \$100 as a compensation for his official duties as President and that his expenses incidental to his official duties as President be paid by the Conference, the same to be paid out of the arm of the work he represents.
- 2. We recommend that the two Conference Evangelists receive \$1,400 each. We also recommend that the Missionary Evangelist receive \$1,400. Should the offerings taken in his work fail to reach this amount, the balance shall be taken from the Conference mission funds.

#### College.

Inasmuch as the Marion College Administration has proven to the Church that she stands for the fundamentals of Christian doctrine as taught by the Word of God, we recommend that the Conference pledge President Leedy and his splendid faculty its hearty co-operation and support.

We, your Committee, take pleasure in announcing to the membership of the Indiana Conference that if all the endowment interest and pledges, including the L. S. U., Educational budget and Standardization fund, be paid promptly and faithfully the financial success of Marion College is assured.

We, therefore, recommend that the pastors raise the Educational budget of \$1.25 per member and send same in quarterly payments to the Treasurer of Marion College.

Believing that God gave us Marion College and desires us to hold the ground He has led us to possess, we would urge our people to co-operate as God leads in the "No-Retreat" campaign. We recommend that each pastor be requested to raise 25 cents per member to liquidate this indebtedness.

We recognize the vital importance of Church Extension work and recommend the following plan as a method of raising funds with which to assist in the erection of new church buildings throughout the Conference. We recommend that the Church Extension Secretary shall cause to be made subscription cards on which shall be suitably arranged the following classification: Class A—\$5 per year. Class B—\$3 per year. Class C—\$2 per year. Class D—\$1 per year. Class E—special contributions of any amount. The Secretary shall keep a record of all subscriptions and in his visitation of the charges shall seek to secure as large a support to the work as possible. All subscriptions are due annually until the death of the donor or until canceled.

#### Conference Missions.

Whereas, the burdens of the Conference President are so numerous, and whereas the need and demand for Conference Missionary extension is imperative, therefore we recommend that each charge in the Conference shall be apportioned in an equitable manner as hereinafter set forth. Their pro rata amount for Conference Missions, and the pastor of said charge shall be expected to diligently seek to raise the same. When possible the President of the Conference shall assist the pastor in this work. We earnestly recommend that an effort be made on every charge during the first quarter to raise the amount apportioned which should be paid in quarterly payments.

We recommend that the General Conference expense fund be raised annually at the rate of 10 cents per member.

We recommend that the Sunday Schools devote the first Sunday's offering of each month to Home Missions.

We recommend that the Minute fund be raised on the basis of 25 cents per copy and that the quota, if possible, be kept up to the present level.

## MINISTERS' PENSION PLAN.

For the Wesleyan Methodist Ministers of the Indiana Conference.

Report No. 8.

For a number of years there has been some discussion of the need of a Church-wide pension plan for the ministers of the Church. The low salaries usually paid ministers and the many urgent appeals which prompt them in most cases to give away much more than a tenth of their income make it impossible for the average minister to save enough out of his salary to enable him to live in even the most ordinary comfort in old age. It is this situation that is causing many of the leading religious denominations in America to establish a pension plan for their ministers.

One of the first and most warmly debated questions that arises in the establishment of a pension system for preachers is whether the Church shall pay all the cost of the benefits or whether the preacher shall pay part of the cost and the Church the remainder. If the Church pays all the cost, the system is technically referred to as "non-contributory" and become a "free" pension plan. If the preachers pay something towards the cost the system is referred to as "contributory."

The history of the pension movement in America discloses a universal trend away from the free pension plan. The plan for the pensioning of college professors which was started in 1906 was begun as a non-contributory plan. This plan had the Carnegie Foundation with its resources of millions of dollars back of it, but it was found desirable recently to change to the contributory plan. Even the United States government in 1918 adopted the War Risk Insurance Act which provides for the protection of members of our military and naval forces, on a contributory basis.

#### Section I.

## Membership.

- 1. Membership in the Pension Plan shall be limited to regularly ordained ministers of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of the Indiana Conference.
- 2. There shall be two classes of members, contributory and non-contributory. Contributory members shall consist of those who make application for membership and who have not reached their sixty-sixth birthday prior to August 17, 1923. Non-contributory members shall consist of those who pass their sixty-sixth birthday prior to August 17, 1923.
- 3. No one who is eligible to join as a contributory member and who neglects to do so can receive the benefits of a Pension; provided, that anyone eligible for membership as a contributory member, who will have passed his sixtieth birthday prior to August 17, 1923, and who has rendered at least thirty-five years of service to the Wesleyan Methodist Church, may have the option of joining the Pension contributory or non-contributory plan.

- 4. Applications for membership shall be filed with the managers of the Pension and Annuity Plan, and must give the date of birth of applicant, complete record of service in the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America and such other information as may be required and pays in to the treasury the entrance fee of five dollars. A certificate of membership will be issued to each applicant who meets the requirements of membership either as a contributory or a non-contributory member.
- 5. No elder who is not in good standing shall be eligible to a pension.
  - 6. No elder on the unstationed list shall be entitled to benefits.
- 7. No elder shall be entitled to a pension until he is sixty-five years old, and has served the Church for the period of twenty years, and whose name appears on the superannuated list.

#### Section II.

## Management.

1. The management of this Pension Plan shall be vested in the Board of Trustees of the Indiana Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church. This board shall have charge of the investment of the superannuated funds. This board may from time to time adopt such rules and regulations as may be necessary for the administration of the Pension Plan, and it shall have full authority to interpret the provisions of the plan and to settle questions of doubt as to the eligibility of an individual for membership in the Pension Plan.

#### Section III.

#### Funds.

- 1. The Treasurer of the Conference shall be treasurer of the Pension Plan.
- 2. The funds of the Pension shall consist of the contributory members' fund and the Conference Superannuated Ministers' Fund.
- 3. The contributory members' fund shall consist of the contributions of contributory members. The amount which each contributory member will be required to pay, annually shall be one per cent of his cash salary. Payments to the contributory members' fund shall cease when the contributor reaches sixty-six years of age, unless said contributor has been granted a' disability annuity before that age, in which case the contributor shall cease his payments from the date his disability annuity begins.
- 4. Each evangelist be required to pay \$10.00 to this fund annually.

5. The Conference Superannuated fund shall consist of the amount raised by contributions of the Church and such other money, gifts and bequests as shall be given in the future for the support of the Pension Plan of the Wesleyan Methodist Church.

#### Section IV.

## Superannuation Annuities.

1. The minister who has served the Church 40 years shall receive \$30.00 per month; 30 years, \$25.00 per month; 20 years, \$20.00 per month, until the Church Superannuated funds earn an income large enough to provide the maximum annuity of \$360.00 to be paid from this fund. Each beneficiary of the Church annuity fund shall receive his pro rata share.

#### Section V.

## Disability Annuities.

- 1. In order to be eligible to receive a disability annuity a member must present satisfactory evidence to the board that he is mentally or physically incapacitated for the performance of the duties of his position. Such incapacitation must be serious enough to be regarded as permanent. Should his disability later prove to be temporary and not permanent, the member may, upon the restoration of his health, resume his payments to pension fund and the benefits which he received during his temporary disability shall not reduce or in any way impair the benefits which will come to him in the future.
- 2. Any member who is receiving a disability annuity shall not be eligible to receive the increased amount prescribed for the superannuation annuity upon reaching the age of sixty-eight years, but such member shall continue to receive the disability annuity only with such increase as shall come to the disability annuitants with the growth of the income from the Conference Superannuate Fund.

#### Section VI.

## Death Provisions.

- 1. Upon the death of a superannuation or disability annuitant there shall be paid to his widow, so long as she lives and remains unmarried, provided she did not marry him when a pensioner, an annuity equal to one-half the amount her husband received.
- 2. Upon the death of a member who has not yet become either a superannuate or disability annuitant, there shall be paid to his

widow as long as she lives and remains unmarried, an annuity equal to one-half of the disability annuity to which the member would have been entitled for disability.

## Section VII.

## Withdrawals.

- 1. Should a member leave the ministry of the Wesleyan Methodist Church or engage in an occupation that would disqualify him for membership in the Pension and Annuity Plan, his membership shall automatically cease, and upon the surrender of his certificate of membership his payments to the contributory members' annuity fund, less the amount of any disability annuity which he may have received, shall be returned to him, unless he chooses to leave it.
- 2. Should a member withdraw from the Pension and Annuity Plan for any reason other than ineligibility to continue as a member and surrender his certificate of membership, his payments to the contributory members' annuity fund, less the amount of any disability annuity which he may have received, shall be returned to him, unless he chooses to leave it.
- 3. A member who has withdrawn from the Pension and Annuity Plan may again become a member on condition that the board approves his application for the renewal of his membership and he returns to the contributory members' annuity fund the amount of the payments refunded to him with interest compounded annually at six per cent from the date of refund. The rate of payment of one who thus renews his membership shall be one per cent of his cash salary for the time of his delinquincy when he renews his membership.
- 4. In case a member becomes delinquent in the payment of his dues he may be reinstated on condition that the board approves his application for reinstatement and he pays all arrearages of dues with interest at six per cent compounded annually.

## REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD

## Report No. 11.

The Sunday School is a department of the Church of Jesus Christ at work studying the Bible with the intent that souls might be saved. It ought therefore to be carefully organized so that its work may be effective and its results conserved.

The classes and departments ought to be carefully enrolled and the attendance and welfare of all who are enrolled should be a serious concern for those who are given responsibility. Let us not consider our work too lightly.

The Wesleyan Methodist Sunday School literature is the cleanest and best material for the use of our schools. Our doctrines are fundamental and are clearly taught in our own literature, and by

its use we may assure ourselves that people who attend our schools will become indoctrinated in the great truths that the Holy Spirit uses to lead men to salvation.

The new arrangement of our "Efficiency Standards for Wesleyan Methodist Sunday Schools" have been very successful in inspiring effort and zeal among our schools and this we cannot too highly commend.

## Reorganization, Statistics and Information.

1. We recommend that all schools in the Indiana Conference reorganize between the first and fifteenth of July.

2. Each Sunday School Superintendent shall report the work of the Sunday School quarterly to the Church or Quarterly Conference and furnish a duplicate to the pastor.

3. The pastor shall report the work of the Sunday School to the Conference Sunday School Secretary by the first of August on the information blank furnished him for each school under his care.

4. Each Departmental Superintendent shall report the work of their department to the District Departmental Superintendent, who shall make a report of the progress of the work to the District Convention.

## Conventions.

The Circuit and District Conventions are a great help and inspiration to our people and should be continued.

1. We recommend that there be no Fall Conventions held, but that special effort be made to make the Spring Conventions very interesting and helpful.

2. The District Conventions shall be held by the District Superintendents under the direction of the Conference Sunday School Secretary.

3. We recommend that the Conference apportionment be ten

cents per member, total enrollment, including Cradle Roll and Home Department. One-half shall be for the Connectional Sunday School Secretary to be used in improving our literature and the other half for use in the Conference work.

We recommend that the third or fourth Sunday in February be designated to raise this amount and that it be forwarded at once to the Conference Sunday School Treasurer.

We further recommend that each school comply with the Discipline in giving the first Sunday's offering of each month for Home Missions.

In the course of her address she spoke of the advantages of having a Bible woman to accompany the missionaries. Upon the information that eight dollars a month would secure the services of a very efficient woman twenty-four ladies or societies pledged themselves eight dollars for the securing of one such woman to accompany Miss Greene for two years upon her return to India. The offering in cash and pledges for foreign missions amounted to \$1,000. Benediction by Miriam Jennings.

#### PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS.

Dear Presidents and Members of the Woman's Home and Foreign Missionary Society of the Indiana Conference:—With a feeling of thanksgiving and praise, I greet you today, in the name of our risen Lord and King. Ever since the fall of man, God in His infinite love and wisdom has been bringing about a plan for His redemption from sin, and so two thousand years ago, He sent His only Son into the world, who lived, who gave His life, and who arose from the tomb, that this great plan of redemption might be completed, so far as God's part goes, and it now remains for man to accept the salvation so freely offered to whosoever will partake of this water of life, and live.

You remember one day as Jesus walked along the Sea of Galilee He called Peter and Andrew from their nets and said, "Come, follow Me, and I will make you fishers of men." Likewise He called others until He had the twelve apostles, all of whom (save Judas) He trained and taught, till when He left this world to go back to the Father, these men began the gigantic task of fishing for men, and all through the centuries, other men and women have taken up the work, and, thank God, they will continue the same till every creature shall have heard of the Gospel of Jesus. How honored we should feel, that the call to be "fishers of men," has been extended to you and to me, and thus we are assembled here today to discuss the work that lies so near to the heart of every follower of Christ, for, dear women, remember that the raising of money is not for our praise or glory, but to help do our part in the great work of evangelizing the world! If we lose sight of this, our efforts will be in vain, so far as our personal reward is concerned.

I am pleased with the good work you have done for the cause of missions, but I am not satisfield, for too many of us are not doing nearly our best, and so, as we meet from time to time, in this Conference gathering, let us humbly but diligently and fervently discuss the things that will help us, as we go back to our respective fields of labor, to be more earnest and efficient missionary women for God. I am aware that excuses many and varied pass from the lips of a large number of the women of the W. H. & F. M. S. work, and while I would not have you be careless mothers, untidy housewives, or uncultured citizens, but, O dear women, when our feet are on the chilly waters' edge, when we realize that in a few moments at the most, we shall stand in the presence of the Judge of all the earth, how much, think you, will it matter whether that carpet we so much desired, is dustless, whether every piece of furni-

ture is in its proper place or not, or whether our children have had their every wish gratified, if to do all this we have had to neglect the work of God, which should have first place in all our lives.

We come together today, with both joy and sorrow in our hearts; joy for the many, many blessings that are ours to enjoy; sorrow because one whom most of us knew and loved, has been called so early in life from labor to reward. Dear Edna Smeltzer gave her all that she might have a part in telling a lost world that Jesus came to save from sin. We can but humbly bow our heads in submission and say, "The Lord hath given, and the Lord hath taken away. Blessed be the name of the Lord." Let us not forget the lonely young husband, Rev. John Smeltzer, for he has lost a lovely companion and helpmeet and God alone can know the anguish of his heart and soul.

My Sisters, do you feel that you are doing too much, or, that you are asked to do too much in the missionary cause? If you do, just remember that Sister Smeltzer gave her life, and that Brother Jennings gave his health and perhaps his life for the cause. Think of all the dear young people of our beloved Conference, who have denied themselves the pleasure of a home of comfort as you have; they have bid adieu to loved ones and native land in answer to the call to be fishers of men; they labor amid perils and hardships of which we know nothing; they are depending on you and on me to help them in this great work, with our love, our prayers and our means. Are we going to disappoint them? Are we going to fail to do our part?

When a crisis is reached in the life of an individual or in the work of God, O how much depends on the faithfulness of those who are seemingly in the back ground, and yet—if they fail, all is lost.

In conclusion, please let me as your President with love and kindness of heart admonish you to be faithful to the task assigned you, however small it may seem to be, and you may aspire to be more useful, in the great work of soul-saving, as God sees fit to lengthen the cord of your life, that when your friends and loved ones gather over your bodies to pay the last tribute of respect to you, they may say of you, as Jesus did of Mary, "She hath done what she could."

"Those who go down in dark places,
At home and in foreign lands,
Must have something which they can hold by,
To guide and strengthen their hands.

Their task is of greatest labor,
Of sacrifice, mercy and pain,
And all for the love of the Master,
They are giving, nor thinking of gain.

If they through the love of the Master
Are giving their best out of life,
Surely those who cannot go with them
Can strengthen their hands for the strife.

Is it right for those left behind them,

The holders of this mighty rope,

To withhold aught of courage or helping,

Which may mean to them blessing or life?

This rope should be prayerfully woven
Of love, and good gifts, great and small,
Self-denial and allegiance unshaken,
And loyalty which, giving, gives all.

Every strand should be woven so strongly With the strength of the Master's grace, That no matter the strain put upon it, It will hold, having no weakest place.

Then those who go down in dark places,
Both at home and in foreign lands,
Will rejoice in the strength of the weavers,
And the rope that is held by such hands."
