#### CHURCH DIRECTORY

APALACHICOLA - At Chapman's School on U.S. 98, turn north and go one block, then left.

BROOKSVILLE - On the Florida Wesleyan Methodist Campground, southeast city limits of Brooksville, just off U.S. 98 North.

CLEARWATER - Corner Hillcrest Ave. and Franklin St. two blocks south of U.S. 60 (Gulf-to-Bay Blvd.) on Hillcrest.

DELAND -

GRAND RIDGE - State Road 69, north 3 miles toward Dellwood. Turn right on dirt road, approximately 3 1/4 miles to church.

HOSFORD - Just south of U.S. 20, in Hosford.

INTERCESSION CITY - One block north of Post Office.

LAKELAND - 3501 North Florida Ave.

LARGO - 1301 Eighth Ave. Northwest.

MERRITT ISLAND - Cross causeway from Cocoa, turn left at stoplight on Merritt Island, continue one block north.

MIAMI -

ORLANDO - 300 Chicksaw Trail, one block south off U.S. 50, east of Orlando.

PAOLA - State Road 46, 6 miles west of Sanford, near Wilson's Corner.

PERRY -

PINELLAS PARK - 4400 70th Ave. North, four blocks south of Park Blvd. on 44th St.

ST. PETERSBURG - 4327 15th Ave. South.

SARASOTA – South Tamiami Trail to Route 72, east to Beneva Road (2 miles), three quarters of a mile south to church.

SEFFNER - Corner of Highlander and Grovelander.

TAMPA - IDA AVE. - 2107 East Ida Ave.

TAMPA - MANHATTAN - Corner of Manhattan and Pearl Ave.

TAMPA – NORTHGATE – Property located between Florida and Nebraska Ave. on 150th St.

VERO BEACH - Ramona Park, Vero Beach, 1 1/2 miles south of State Road 60 on 27th Ave.

#### STANDING RULES

1. **STATISTICS** - Your special attention is called to Paragraph 176 (1) in the Wesleyan Methodist Discipline; "Each Annual Conference shall require the pastor in charge to report complete accurate statistics according to the blank form provided in the Discipline, and no Annual Conference shall have authority to pass the character of any pastor who neglects to perform this service, except by a two-thirds vote, and said vote shall be made a part of the permanent records of the Conference."

Each pastor shall pay special attention to notes on the statistical blanks and to the first paragraph in particular.

- 2. NOMINATING COMMITTEE A nominating committee shall be elected including five elders and five laymen, the chairman of which shall be the Conference President. Members of this committee shall not be from the same church. Any vacancies in this committee shall be filled by the Committee on Vacancies. Any member of this committee who knows he will not be able to serve shall notify the Conference President at least two weeks in advance of Annual Conference session.
- 3. VACATIONS Each pastor shall have a two weeks' vacation with pay, or if he desires to hold a two weeks' meeting, this will be considered in lieu of his vacation. The Conference President shall have a three weeks' vacation with pay.
- 4. WESLEYAN METHODIST NAME Any work or worker using the name "Wesleyan Methodist" and desiring to continue affiliation and fellowship with the Florida Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, must have the approval of the Annual Conference or the President and his Advisory Board before proceeding to work within the boundaries of said conference.
- 5. BOARD OF CHURCH AND PARSONAGE BUILDING -The Trustees of the Florida Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, together with the President of said Conference, shall be known as the Board on Church and Parsonage Building and Location, and as the Deed Examining Committee, and they are hereby empowered to execute all necessary papers, mortgage deeds, and papers of like character, when necessary to secure loans for the Florida Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America or to any church within the Conference needing funds to liquidate Conference, church or parsonage indebtedness, provided that the party or parties requesting such action shall set in writing the true nature and purpose for which the loan is requested (this writing is to become a part of permanent records of the Trustees) and that this Board is satisfied that the object for which said loan or loans is both necessary and desirable.

It shall be the duty of each person charged with the responsibility of negotiating for or handling any deed for the local church or conference properties to

submit such deed to this Board for inspection and approval before offering it for registration.

6. **DEEDS AND PLANS** - No new work shall be organized until all involved property is fully deeded to the local Conference Trustees, or such steps are being taken which have the approval of the Conference President and Trustees.

Any church which engages in a building or remodeling project, or with the purchase of parsonage, church building or lot on which a church or parsonage is to be built, is required to have the plan approved by the Conference Board on Church and Parsonage Building and Location, irregardless whether said church shall ask the Annual Conference for financial aid or not.

- 7. CONFERENCE DATE The date for beginning the Annual Conference shall be the fourth Tuesday in June, subject to change by the President and his Advisory Board. The Nominating Committee shall meet at 10:00 A.M. that Monday, and the first session of Conference shall begin promptly at 2:00 P.M.
- 8. FISCAL YEAR The closing date of the fiscal year shall be May 31. The Conference Treasurer's book shall close June 15, and no money or receipts shall be honored after that date. The statistical blanks are to be sent directly to the Conference Treasurer, who in turn shall forward them to the Statistical Chairman.
- 9. **NEW BUSINESS** The introduction of all new business of such a nature as to require an election must be presented not later than noon of the second day of Conference.
- 10. CONFERENCE AND CAMP PROGRAM The Conference and Camp Program shall be planned a reasonable time in advance of the opening of Conference. It is recommended that the program be as follows:

Monday - Conference Sermon 7:30	P.M.
Tuesday - Sunday School and Education Service7:30	P.M.
Wednesday - Denominational Address 4:00	P.M.
Missionary Service7:30	P.M.
Thursday - First Camp Meeting Service	P.M.
Friday, Saturday and Sunday to hold Camp Meeting Service at 10:00 A	M.,
2:30 P.M., and 7:30 P.M.; with Youth Rally Saturday, 7:30 P.M.	

11. PASTOR AND DELEGATE EXPENSE — Inasmuch as the pastor and delegate are actually representatives of the local church at the Annual Conference, we recommend that the local church pay in advance to the pastor and delegate, expense of transportation and meals, with the minimum of \$2.50 per day and the lodging free or utilities furnished by the Conference.

- 12. EVANGELISM Each of our churches shall release its pastor, if on call and under the direction of the Board of Church Extension and Evangelism, to hold one evangelistic meeting on a new field or in one of the weaker charges, and that the local church continue to pay his salary during his absence.
- 13. CONFERENCE ELECTION The election of Conference officials shall be on the third day of Conference.
- 14. PRESIDENT'S TRAVEL EXPENSE Each pastor is to take an offering quarterly for the Conference President's travel expense. This is not to apply on budget credit but is to be sent to the Conference Treasurer and receipted to the Conference Work Fund.

He shall be reimbursed for his travel expense at the rate of \$.05 per mile.

- 15. PRESIDENT'S VISITATION The Conference President is to visit the local churches as requested by the local church, by request of his Advisory Board or at his own discretion.
- 16. QUARTERLY BUSINESS MEETINGS Quarterly Business meetings shall be held as follows:

First Quarter	Immediately after August 31
Second Quarter	Immediately after November 30
Third Quarter	Immediately after February 28
Fourth Quarter	Immediately after May 31

- 17. READING OF STANDING RULES All pastors are to read these standing rules to their local churches at the fourth quarterly Conference Business Meeting.
- 18. LOCAL CHURCH ELECTION The election of the local church shall be held at least fifteen (15) days before the close of the fiscal year. The term of office of these church officers shall begin and expire at dates corresponding to dates of the Annual Conference fiscal year, in accordance with Paragraph 165 (4) of the Wesleyan Methodist Discipline.
- 19. PASTOR'S TERM OF SERVICE AND CONFERENCE ATTENDANCE Ail pastors are expected to attend all the Sessions of Conference and Camp Meeting Services including the Sunday Services and shall make beforehand provision for supplying of pulpit in his absence.

Pastors who are changing charges shall begin service on their new charge on the 2nd Sunday following the close of the Conference and Camp Meeting.

20. READING OF STATISTICAL REPORT — The pastor may read only numbers 1, 2 and 3 under Item II., Number 12 under Item III., Number 8 under Item IV., and Item XI. of the Pastor's Statistical Report.

The Conference Secretary shall furnish the pastors special report blanks designating what is to be read.

- 2].CAMPGROUND COMMITTEE The Conference Trustees shall be the Campground Committee.
- 22. CAMPMEETING COMMITTEE The Conference President, Conference Secretary, W.M.S. President and W.Y. President shall be authorized to select and call the speakers and workers and set the time of services for all religious services for Conference and Camp.
- 23. CONFERENCE BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION AND EVANGELISM The Board of Church Extension and Evangelism is to be a permanent committee and is to be composed of the Conference President (Chairman ex-officio), Woman's Missionary Society President and the Board of Conference Trustees.

During the interim of Annual Conference, the Board of Church Extension and Fvangelism shall be duly authorized to draw on the funds for Conference Work, Conference Church Extension and Church Extension Revolving Fund as it deems best for the interest of the Conference, and the Treasurer shall be authorized to make payments from these funds upon written order signed by the President and at least one-half the other members of the Board of Church Extension and Evangelism, or signed by the President in behalf of the said Board.

- 24. LOCAL CHURCH OFFERINGS As a protective measure, all local church offerings received shall be counted by the Treasurer and at least one steward together. In the absence of a treasurer or a steward, two members shall act.
- 25. SECRETARY AND TREASURER SERVICES The Conference Treasurer shall be paid \$25.00 and the Conference Secretary \$15.00 per year for their services.

- First Meeting, Monday, June 22, 2:00 P. M.
  The Florida Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America assembled for its Fifteenth annual session in the Youth Building at Brooksville, Florida, at 2:00 P.M. June 22, 1964.
- DEVOTIONS The first meeting was called to order by President Piatt. Rev. W. W. Coates led the opening song. Dr. F. R. Birch brought devotions using Heb. II:1.
- CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE The Credentials Committee was named and instructed to receive the Delegates Credentials.
- ROLL CALL The roll was called with 12 Elders, 2 Conference Preachers, and 19 Delegates answering.

  The names of Conference Preachers Clifford Rathel and Curtis Lee were added to the roll.
- CONFERENCE BAR By motion and support the Conference Bar was set to include the first four rows of seats and the platform.
- DENOMINATIONAL REPRESENTATIVE By motion and support Dr. H. K. Sheets was granted the chair for the 1964 Conference Session.
- CAMP MEETING COMMITTEE The report of the Camp Meeting Committee was read and adopted.
- NOMINATING COMMITTEE The Nominating Committee report was read and adopted, with Rev. Ronald Brown substituted for W. H. Bouington on the Courtesy Committee.
- BUDGET APPORTIONMENT W. W. Coates asked permission to add Ronald Brown to the Budget Apportionment Committee.
- CORRESPONDENCE Correspondence was read from James Myers, Curtis Lee, Anna A. Shaffer and Charles N. Groves. The secretary was asked to return correspondence to Anna Shaffer and Charles N. Groves.
- VOTE By motion and support the time of 8:30 A. M. Tuesday, June 23, was set for hearing the proposed changes in Constitutional law and vote.
- ADJOURNMENT Motion and support carried to adjourn for called business meetings.

By motion and support the secretary was requested to inform churches of the proposals and the General and Annual Conference votes previous to that time.
- COURTESY COMMITTEE The Committee on Courtesy presented Rev. and Mrs. Homer Brown, who gave appropriate remarks.
- PRESIDENT'S REPORT Part I, II and III of the President's Report were read and adopted with a rising vote of thanks. See Report No. 2.
- ADJOURNMENT Motion and support to adjourn for committee work and to return at 4:00 P. M.

Third Meeting, Tuesday, June 23, 4:00 P. M.

- CONVENED The meeting was opened by a song led by Rev. Homer Brown, and was called to order by Dr. H. K. Sheets.
- PASTORAL RELATIONS The first reading of the Pastoral Relations report was made. See Report No. 3.
- COURTESY The Rev. E. Parker Buck was introduced to the Conference as an evangelist and world traveler. He gave greetings and spoke concerning church periodicals and the book store.

- AUDITING COMMITTEE A partial report of the Auditing Committee was read and adopted. See Report No. 5.
- TREASURER'S REPORT The report of the Conference Treasurer was read. A motion and its support was heard to approve this report with a sincere rising vote of thanks. See Report No. 6.
- MINISTERIAL CHARACTER A full report on Ministerial Characters was read and adopted. See Report No. 7.
- FINANCE COMMITTEE A partial report of the Finance Committee was read and adopted. See Report No. 8.
- TELLERS APPOINTED Ronald Brown and Leonard Catron were appointed as distributing tellers; Earl Rickey and Wilbur Coates as reading tellers.
- ELECTION OF OFFICERS By proper Parliamentary and Disciplinary procedure, the election of officers of the Florida Conference was held. See page No. 3.
- WORLD MISSION SECRETARY This office newly created at General Conference 1963 (See Par. 240 of Discipline) was added. See page No. 3.
- COURTESY COMMITTEE Rev. and Mrs. Charles Cecil, new pastor of the St. Petersburg church, were presented. They gave testimonies and greetings from the Publishing House. Pastors of the Paola church Rev. and Mrs. Earl Baker were introduced and gave good testimonies.

  Dr. and Mrs. Carmen Decker were introduced and gave greetings to the Conference and told of their plans to teach in the Wesleyan Academy in Puerto Rico in the fall.
- ADJOURNMENT Motion and support was heard to adjourn.

DENOMINATIONAL ADDRESS - Dr. H. K. Sheets: Matt. 16: 16-19.
"The Gates of Hell shall not prevail against it."

Theme: The Church in an age of Revolution.

- 2a. Conference President's Home: Whereas the growth of our Conference demands more of our Conference President each year, and the development of our Campgrounds has thrust upon him demands of every kind, robbing him of both time and energy that should be channelled into conference work and needed rest, and whereas his family is now deprived of rightful privacy and normal family living, we therefore recommend that the Conference Trustees be instructed to draw necessary plans and select a suitable location for a conference president's home. Further, that the construction begin as soon as a proper method of financing can be arranged.
- 2b. We further recommend that a Three Year Pledge Plan be launched with a goal of \$6,000 minimum, and suggest the nomination of Earl Rickey and Everett Putney as co-chairmen to organize and promote this plan.
- 3. Church Extension: We are appreciative of the pastors and churches that have faithfully contributed to Conference Church Extension, and would point out that no church has fulfilled its budget askings unless one Sunday School offering is taken each month for Conference Church Extension. Since the Denominational investment in the Miami work is large the entire church is looking to the Florida Conference for an aggressive continuance of this strategic project. This will necessitate sacrificial giving through the coming year.
- 4. Conference President's Travel Expense: We note that most churches have not followed Standing Rule No.15. We strongly urge that each pastor and church fulfill this responsibility.
- 5. Finance Committee: We recommend that the duties and manner of election of the Finance Committee be set forth in the Standing Rules.

### DAILY PROCEEDINGS
