

CHURCH DIRECTORY

- Apalachicola—On U. S. 98, turn north on 17th St. at church sign. Go one block, then left to church.
- Brooksville—On the Florida Wesleyan Methodist Campground, southeast city limits of Brooksville, just off U. S. 98 North.
- Clearwater—Corner Hillcrest Ave. and Franklin St. two blocks south of U. S. 60 (Gulf-to-Bay Blvd.) on Hillcrest.
- Deland—250 No. Hill Ave. on eastern city limits boundary. Two blocks north of Highway 44.
- Hosford-South of U. S. 20, in Hosford.
- Intercession City-One block north of Post Office.
- Lakeland-3501 North Florida Ave.
- Largo-1301 Eighth Ave. Northwest.
- Merritt Island—Cross causeway from Cocoa, turn left at stoplight on Merritt Island, continue one block north.
- Miami—South on U. S. 1 (Dixie Highway) to Quail Roost Drive in Perrine, right on Quail Roost to 114th Ave., south two blocks to church.
- Orlando-1665 N. Chicksaw Trail, 1 block south of U. S. 50, east of 15-A in Union Park.
- Paola-State Road 46, 6 miles west of Sanford, near Wilson's Corner.
- Perry-State Road 30 east to 356 south, turn left ½ mile.
- Pinellas Park-4400 70th Ave. North, four blocks south of Park Blvd. on 44th Street.
- St. Petersburg-4327 15th Ave. South.
- Salem—State Road 69, north 3 miles toward Dellwood. Turn right on dirt road, approximately 31/4 miles to church.
- Sarasota—301 to Route 72, east to Beneva Road (2 miles), three-quarters of a mile south to church.
- Seffner-Corner of Highlander and Grovelander.
- Tampa, College Park—North off Fowler on 15th Ave. go to second road. Property 2½ Acres on West side.
- Tampa, Ida Avenue-2107 East Ida Ave.
- Tampa, Manhattan-Corner of Manhattan and Pearl Ave.
- Vero Beach-Ramona Park, Vero Beach, 11/2 miles south of State Road 60 on 27th Ave.

STANDING RULES

1. STATISTICS—Your special attention is called to Paragraph 176 (1) in the Wesleyan Methodist Discipline: "Each Annual Conference shall require the pastor in charge to report complete, accurate statistics according to the blank form provided in the Discipline, and no Annual Conference shall have authority to pass the character of any pastor who neglects to perform this service, except by a two-thirds vote and said vote shall be made a part of the permanent records of the Conference."

Each pastor shall pay special attention to notes on the statistical blanks and to the first paragraph in particular.

- 2. NOMINATING COMMITTEE—A nominating committee shall be elected including five elders and five laymen, the chairman of which shall be the Conference President. Members of this committee shall not be from the same church. The five laymen shall not be elected by name but be specified as the delegate from a specific church, selection of the churches be made alphabetically as they appear in the Church Directory. Any vacancies in this committee shall be filled by the Committee on Vacancies. Any member of this committee who knows he will not be able to serve shall notify the Conference President at least two weeks in advance of Annual Conference session.
- 3. VACATIONS—Each pastor shall have a two weeks' vacation with pay, or if he desires to hold a two weeks' meeting, this will be considered in lieu of his vacation. The Conference President shall have a three weeks' vacation with pay.
- 4. WESLEYAN METHODIST NAME—Any work or worker using the name "Wesleyan Methodist" and desiring to continue affiliation and fellowship with the Florida Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, must have the approval of the Annual Conference or the President and his Advisory Board before proceeding to work within the boundaries of said conference.
- 5. BOARD OF CHURCH AND PARSONAGE BUILDING—The Trustees of the Florida Coference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, together with the President of said Conference, shall be known as the Board on Church and Parsonage Building and Location, and as the Deed Examining Committee, and they are hereby empowered to execute all necessary papers, mortgage deeds, and papers of like character, when necessary to secure loans for the Florida Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America or to any church within the Conference needing funds to liquidate Conference, church or parsonage indebtedness, provided that the party or parties requesting such action shall set in writing the true nature and purpose for which the loan is requested (this writing is to become a part of permanent records of the Trustees) and that this Board is satisfied that the object for which said loan or loans is both necessary and desirable.

It shall be the duty of each person charged with the responsibility of negotiating for or handling any deed for the local church or conference properties to submit such deed to this Board for inspection and approval before offering it for registration.

6. DEEDS AND PLANS—No new work shall be organized until all involved property is fully deeded to the local Conference Trustees, or such steps are being taken which have the approval of the Conference President and Trustees.

Any church which engages in a building or remodeling project, or with the purchase of parsonage, church building or lot on which a church or parsonage is to be built, is required to have the plan approved by the Conference Board on Church and Parsonage Building and Location, regardless whether said church shall ask the Annual Conference for financial aid or not.

7. CONFERENCE DATE—The date for beginning the Annual Conference shall be the fourth Monday in June, subject to change by the President and his Advisory Board.

- 8. FISCAL YEAR—The closing date of the fiscal year shall be May 31. The Conference Treasurer's book shall close June 10, and no money or receipts shall be honored after that date. The statistical blanks are to be sent directly to the Conference Treasurer, who in turn shall forward them to the Statistical Chairman.
- 9. NEW BUSINESS—The introduction of all new business of such a nature as to require an election must be presented not later than noon of the second day of Conference.
- 10. PASTOR AND DELEGATE EXPENSE—Inasmuch as the pastor and delegate are actually representatives of the local church at the Annual Conference, we recommend that the local church pay in advance to the pastor and delegate, expense of transportation and meals, with the minimum of \$2.50 per day and the lodging free of utilities furnished by the Conference.
- 11. EVANGELISM—Each of our churches shall release its pastor, if on call and under the direction of the Board of Church Extension and Evangelism, to hold one evangelistic meeting on a new field or in one of the weaker charges, and that the local church continue to pay his salary during his absence.
- 12. CONFERENCE ELECTION—The election of Conference officials shall be on the third day of Conference.
- 13. PRESIDENT'S TRAVEL EXPENSE—Each pastor is to take an offering quarterly for the Conference President and Vice President's travel expense. This is not to apply on budget credit but is to be sent to the Conference Treasurer and receipted to the Conference Work Fund.

They shall be reimbursed for their travel expense at the rate of \$.07 per mile.

- 14. PRESIDENT'S VISITATION—The Conference President is to visit the local churches as requested by the local church, by request of his Advisory Board or at his own discretion.
- 15. QUARTERLY BUSINESS MEETINGS—Quarterly Business meetings shall be held as follows:

First Quarter	Immediately after August 31
Second Quarter	Immediately after November 30
Third Quarter	Immediately after February 28
Fourth Quarter	Immediately after May 31

- 16. READING OF STANDING RULES—All pastors are to read these standing rules to their local churches at the fourth quarterly Conference Business Meeting.
- 17. LOCAL CHURCH ELECTION—The election of the local church shall be held at least fifteen (15) days before the close of the fiscal year. The term of office of these church officers shall begin and expire at dates corresponding to dates of the Annual Conference fiscal year, in accordance with Paragraph 270 (4) of the Wesleyan Methodist Discipline.

18. PASTOR'S TERM OF SERVICE AND CONFERENCE ATTENDANCE—All pastors are expected to attend all the Sessions of Conference and Camp Meeting Services including the Sunday Services and shall make beforehand provision for supplying of pulpit in his absence.

Pastors who are changing charges shall begin service on their new charge on the 2nd Sunday following the close of the Conference and Camp Meeting.

- 19. READING OF STATISTICAL REPORT—The pastor may read only numbers 1, 2 and 3 under Item II; Number 12 under Item III; Number 8 under Item IV; and Item XI of the Pastor's Statistical Report. And answer the following questions.
- 1. Have you promoted and seen to it that one Sunday School offering a month has been sent in to the Conference Church Extension Treasurer for Conference Church Extension?
- 2. Did your church take an offering quarterly for the Conference President's travel expense?
- 20. CAMPGROUND COMMITTEE—The Conference Trustees shall be the Campground Committee.
- 21. CAMP MEETING COMMITTEE—The Conference President, Conference Secretary, W.M.S. President and W.Y. President shall be authorized to select and call the speakers and workers and set the time of services for all religious services for Conference and Camp.
- 22. CONFERENCE BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION AND EVANGELISM—The Board of Church Extension and Evangelism is to be a permanent committee and is to be composed of the Conference President (Chairman ex-officio), Woman's Missionary Society President and the Board of Conference Trustees.

During the interim of Annual Conference, the Board of Church Extension and Evangelism shall be duly authorized to draw on the funds for Conference Work and Conference Church Extension as it deems best for the interest of the Conference, and the Treasurer shall be authorized to make payments from these funds, as directed by the Board or the President in behalf of the Board.

23. WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE—The Ways and Means Committee is to be a standing committee composed of five members, three of which shall be elected from the floor for a three-year term, one term expiring each year; one member of the Board of Trustees elected by the body, plus the Conference Treasurer.

The duties of this committee are to investigate financial needs of the Conference which are presented to them, and work out methods of raising and repaying finances for same.

- 24. LOCAL CHURCH OFFERINGS—As a protective measure, all local church offerings received shall be counted by the Treasurer and at least one steward together. In the absence of a treasurer or a steward, two members shall act,
- 25. SECRETARY AND TREASURER SERVICE—The Conference Treasurer shall be paid \$25.00 and the Conference Secretary \$15.00 per year for their services.
- 26. REPORT REQUIREMENTS—All reports handed to the Conference Secretary must be typewritten, double-spaced and on standard typing paper.

The Florida Annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America assembled for the Seventeenth annual session in the Youth Building at Brooksville, Florida.

Devotions—The first meeting was opened by President Piatt. Rev. A. H. Fletcher led the opening song. Rev. Foster E. Piatt led devotions using St. John I, suggesting we revise our methods with Love and the Holy Spirit.

A time of prayer was called at the altar and Dr. McConn led in prayer.

- Roll Call—The roll was called with 17 Elders, 1 Conference Preacher and 21 Delegates answering.
- Conference Bar—The first five rows of seats and the platform were declared the Conference Bar.
- Nominating Committee—The report of the Nominating Committee was read and adopted. See Report No. 1.
- Orders Of The Day—A motion and support carried to set as orders of the day, the Annual Conference vote on union with the Pilgrim Holiness Church, for 10:00 A.M. Tuesday.
- Vacancies—A motion and support carried to elect Charles T. Jester to the vacancy on the Statistical Committee caused by the absence of John Paulk.

A motion and support carried to elect Clifford Rathel to the Statistical Committee.

- Time Extended—A motion and support carried to extend the time of the Elders who have Reserve Status.
- Adjournment—A motion and support carried to adjourn to organize and begin committee work. The time of the next conference meeting to be 8:30 A.M. Tuesday.

Second Meeting, Tuesday, June 28, 8:30 A.M.

- Devotions—The meeting was called to order by President Piatt and a song was led by Rev. A. H. Fletcher, Rev. and Mrs. Homer Brown sang a special number in song. Devotions were brought by Rev. W. W. Coates, Vice President from Acts 2:2 using as his subject "The Lack of Fruitfulness,"
- Chairman—By common consent, Dr. Phaup, our denominational representative was asked to be chairman for the session.
- Roll Call—The roll was called with 17 Elders, 1 Conference Preacher and 18 Delegates answering.
- President's Report—President Piatt expressed appreciation for the cooperation of people in the churches and for the privilege of being a servant of God and laboring with the membership.

Part I, II, III, and IV of the Conference President's report were read and approved by a rising vote of thanks. Part IV was referred to the Auditing Committee. See Report No. 2.

Treasurer's Report—A letter from Bruce A. Wilson accountant certifying an audit of the Conference Treasurer's books was read. A motion and support carried to accept the auditor's report.

- Courtesy Committee—The Courtesy Committee presented Rev. Charles Groves, supply pastor of a Pilgrim Holiness Church in the Virgin Islands. He gave greetings and was seated within the Conference Bar.
- Historian—Rev. W. W. Coates presented the necessity of electing a Conference Historian. A motion and support carried to elect same at the general election.
- Identification Cards—A suggestion was made that identification cards be prepared for the next annual session; and that delegates' credentials be mailed to the Conference Secretary prior to conference. PRESIDENT'S REPORT

We have just closed another conference year and it is time for us to see what has been accomplished. I am sure we all have a lot of things to thank the Lord for. In some ways it looks like very little has been done and yet on the other hand we can count some real good gains. The Miami Church has been completed and they are holding services in it with good interest shown. The Brooksville Church was completed this year and free of debt. The Orlando Church now has a nice parsonage for their pastor. The Perry Church has the parsonage completed enough so the pastor can live in it. A new addition has been built to the Pinellas Park Church and other improvements have been made at different churches. For all of these we give God the glory.

We thank the Lord for the souls that have been won to the Lord, however I am real concerned that more souls have not been added to our churches. The only true way to build new churches is by winning souls. I would like to share with the Conference two great burdens of my heart. One is the lack of real revival throughout the conference. I know some have had a good revival but I feel we must see a greater awakening and an ingathering of souls in our churches. Many souls will never be reached only through revival. We must have spirit anointed revivals in order to build good solid churches.

The other thing that burdens my heart is the shortage of pastors. This has come about because of a lack of calls to the ministry and the unwillingness of some to obey after they have been called. There seems to be a lack of a vision of Hell and Heaven and this brings about no burden for lost souls. When we lose the vision this brings on discouragement and many times the preacher has turned to secular work. He makes more money to get more things he feels he needs and soon things have robed him of the soul burden, prayer life and this cheats him from the glory and anointing that a Holiness preacher must have. I am praying that each pastor and minister will go down before God and do some real heart searching this Conference Year like we never have before. I am sure on the authority of God's Word that if we will keep true, trust God, and keep on the job that God will see us through and supply all our needs.
