STANDING RESOLUTIONS

1. CONFERENCE

- 1. The Conference shall convene on Wednesday following the first Monday of August.
- 2. The Conference and Church fiscal year shall close June 30, and the Conference Treasurer shall close his books July 15.
- 3. There shall be a Standing Committee of Ways and Means, composed of four Ministers and three laymen, of which the Conference President and the Conference Treasurer shall be members ex-officio.
- 4. The Conference shall elect a standing Nominating Committee of eight, of which in addition to the eight, the Conference President shall be a member ex-officio, no two of the elected members being from the same church, and not more than two of the elected members from the same district. This Committee shall nominate the Standing Committees and the Committees of the temporary organization, provided that nominations may be made from the floor.
- 5. The Board of Church Extension and Evangelism shall be composed of seven members, of which the Conference President, the Vice President, and the Treasurer shall be members ex-officio and part of the seven; not more than two of the elected members shall be from the same district, nor more than one from the same church. This board shall be the Board of Managers of the Conference between the annual sessions and also the committee on church and parsonage location and building.

- 6. Priority on dormitory rooms shall be given to minister and delegates attending conference.
- 7. No divorced person who has remarried shall be ordained.
- 8. Officials shall assume office in the next meeting after election.
- 9. There shall be a Publications Committee of three, of which the President and the Secretary shall be members ex-officio.
- 10. The Conference President, after having exercised his prerogative in the reception of ministers coming from other denominations shall immediately refer them to the Committee on Itineracy and Elder's Orders, which shall make a thorough investigation as to the ministry and life of such applicants and shall report their findings to the President after which appointments may be made.
- 11. For the purpose of operating the Camp Meeting, there shall be a committee of seven Wesleyans, four of whom shall be elected by the Conference, the President of the Conference being ex-officio one of the four and chairman of the committee, two others being elders, and one a layman; and three of whom shall be elected by the Board of Directors of the Camp Ground Association, the President of which Association shall be a member ex-officio, and one elder and the other layman. Each elected member shall serve for three years, provided that the Conference shall elect one the first year for one year and another for two years, thereby assuring the election of one member annually.
- 12. The Standing Resolutions shall be printed in the September Messenger.
- 13. The Conference Treasurers of the Missionary Society, of the Wesleyan Youth, and the Y.M.W.B. shall send a report of the itemized receipts from each church to the Conference Treasurer immediately after their books close.
- 14. The Conference Treasurer and the Statistical Committee shall check the pastor's report before he reads it on the floor.
- 15. The Conference shall urge each church to carry adequate insurance on its property.
- 16. Since television in its present state is so radically demoralizing in its range, be it resolved the Kentucky Conference register its disapproval of any one within the conference endorsing or owning a television set. Furthermore, be it resolved that the Kentucky Conference will not license preachers or workers, ordain elders, or station ministers who own or have a television set in their possession.
- 17. It is hereby resolved and ordered by the Kentucky Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, in session assembled this 11th day of August, 1967: That a majority of the Trustees of said Conference are hereby fully empowered to buy, sell, convey, mortgage or lease property for, or on behalf of said Conference, provided, however, that between the sessions of the Kentucky Conference, a majority of the Conference Board of Church Extension and Evangelism, as the designated Board of Managers of said Conference, shall signify their agreement therewith by a special resolution and order authorizing each and every transaction.
- 18. The Book of Discipline of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America shall constitute the polity under which the Kentucky Conference of

the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America shall operate as a corporation..

II. CHURCH

- 19. No charge shall call a pastor or supply from other conferences or denominations as long as there are available ministers in the conference qualified for the work.
- 20. The vote on the pastor should be taken the first week of June, unless special permission is granted by the President and his Advisory Board. Ballot for the vote should be prepared by the clerk. The results of the vote shall be reported at once to the President.
- 21. Church elections shall be held so that elected officials fill their offices on July 1, provided that the treasurer shall fill his office July 15.

III. MINISTRY

- 22. Let all pastors transfer their membership to their new appointment. Budget assessments by the Ways and Means Committee shall include such membership.
- 23. Any preacher borrowing a book from the Conference Library may hold it for only one month. There will be a flat rate of twenty-five cents for the month and five cents for each day over the month.
- 24. Pastors shall read to their congregations the General Rules, Discipline, Article III, paragraphs 34-40; Special Directions, Discipline, Section IV, paragraphs 82-88, 100; The Standing Resolutions; the report of the Committee on Moral Reform; and shall urge them to familiarize themselves with the Weslevan Methodist Discipline.
- 25. In this age when immodesty and worldliness are subtly creeping into the Holiness Movement, let every minister earnestly contend for and faithfully preach the Word of God without fear or favor. Let us refuse to compromise with the ungodly element which is robbing the church of her glory and preachers of the divine anointing.
- 26. All ministers not attending both conference and camp without a written excuse from the Conference President and His Advisory Board shall be placed under discipline and be required to appear before the Character Committee of the next annual conference for clearing. Further, no pastor shall be permitted to accept revival meetings or camp meetings if they conflict with conference or camp meeting.
- 27. Our own evangelists shall not conduct revivals or camp meetings in our Wesleyan Methodist churches within the bounds of our conference at the time of our Youth Camp, Annual Conference, Camp Meeting, or Ministerial Institute.
- 28. In order to assist the Statistical Committee in its work, be it resolved that we comply with Section VI, Paragraph 228 of the Discipline. All reports shall be in no later than July 15 to the Conference Treasurer and then the Conference Treasurer shall notify the President of all such delinquent reports not in by July 20. We hereby instruct the Statistical Committee to indicate with an asterisk at the proper place in the minutes showing that such reports do not appear because they were too late. The Statistical Committee shall set a date for the beginning of its work before conference.

Report No. 1 PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Members of the Forty-fifth Annual Session of the Kentucky Conference:

We gather in the name of our Saviour and Risen Lord.

Our day is cloudy as foretold by the prophets and Christ. The world is in the throes of turmoil and tribulation socially, morally, ecclesiasteally, politically, and economically. Moral, spiritual, and economic bankruptcy confronts us. Part of the race and some nations desire independency and freedom without the proper equipment to handle responsibility. The spirit of error would prevail against the spirit of truth. Godless communism continues as the antichrist spirit to divide, and destroy. Since 1917 this religious, political ideology has spread through 40 per cent of the world's population and 25 per cent of the earth's surface. We mildly oppose it in Vietnam, but allowed it to take Cuba. Slyly but militantly the Fabian form of communism infiltrates American schools, churches and government circles. Apostate Christendom and paganism would affiliate with communism in the United Nations and other organizations for one world, one mixed race, one government, one currency, and one superchurch. Rugged individualism humble piety, and the principles of integrity fast fade from the horizon.

The last remaining vestiges of spirituality are largely centered in the struggling holiness churches. These churches are fighting for breath in this day of confusion and frustration. Needless division, criticism, and fears beset our Zion. Complacency, the horn of plenty, and pleasure act as a mild anesthetic to bring ease in Zion. But the early church bled for the faith. Their Savior bled for a lost world But they conquered by death and the blood of the martyrs became the seed of the church. The known world heard the good news. What has happened? The church is now an institution, less a crusading army with banners. Cooling embers have little heat to drive the wheels of conquest. The church needs pentecost re-enacted, love on fire. First, there must be pentecostal purity, then power, then follows persecution, but progress results. Personality prominence, programs without the Spirit, imposing architecture and full budgets cannot conquer the world for Christ. Through penitence, confession, and prevailing prayer let us have revival, then evangelization of the community, the schools, the nation, and the world. This means sleepless nights in prayer and days of fasting and self denial. Kentucky Conference needs this. A baptism of love, a spirit of sacrifice, forgetting the hardships, over-looking faults, and an unselfish devotion ought to drive us to prayer, definite witnessing, soul winning, and obedience to the whole will of God. We can have joy, faith, love, victory, progress, and growth with the approval of heaven.

Many churches in the Conference have made progress as statistics will show. Each church with building indebtedness has consistently reduced that debt this year. Some new members have been added and it is hoped few lost. This summer the Hope, Indiana Church has built a new \$20,000 parsonage, but at a greatly reduced figure by local church labor and other help. The Sale Avenue Church has enlarged the church sanctuary by 50 per cent and built a Sunday School annex. All this was accomplished at less than half contract price. A spirit of tenderness and seeking of the Lord prevails in some churches.

A great need for pastors exists. We are still looking and praying for a strong pioneer man for Lebanon. Urgent prayer must prevail at the throne of grace for ministerial recruits. The fires must burn brightly around our altars so that youth may feel the call to the ministry. May God stir anew our interest in pioneering, prayer for a pioneer pastor, and larger faith promises.

President's Activities

This year the President has gone to each church at least once, and to most of them twice, or more, to preach and to hold business meetings. Due to hospitalization in June he did not reach a few churches the second time, but by correspondence he cared for the business and sent the vice-president to two churches for necessary business meetings. He has preached 124 times; conducted 39 church business meetings; taught Sunday School class 17 times; had 17 conference board meetings; attended three Marion College Board Meetings, and the Marion Area Ministerial Convention; was present for the Leaders Conference at Marion last December; attended the Kentucky Pilgrim-Wesleyan Ministerial Institute in April; and attended several revival services in various churches; edited the Messenger, and cared for the secretarial work of the office.

REPORT OF CHURCH EXTENSION BOARD

August 9, 1966

Board met at the Camp Grounds and organized. H. Blaine West was elected secretary for the conference year 1966-67.

Motion carried to authorize Conference President and Treasurer to pay all bills as they come due.

Motion carried that \$1000 from legacy be used to pay on Pioneer indebtedness.

Motion carried that \$1000 be taken from Brazil card call fund and paid on Pioneer indebtedness. This is to be reimbursed from Pioneer funds.

August 11, 1966

Motion carried that since pastor at Holton is purchasing a property of his own, we recommend that the parsonage be rented, and that part of the rent be used to keep up the parsonage, and the rest to go into the church treasury, with recommendation that it be used for pastoral rent.

March 11, 1967

Motion carried to sell Princeton Church to the Church of Christ in Christian Union for the sum of \$3500, with down payment of \$1500, and \$3500 per month payments, with 6% interest to be paid every six months, with provision that they sign the contract guaranteeing that the pay stipulations and the \$2000 note be signed by the denomination and the local group. The Conference President to sign contract for the conference

Motion carried that we put income from sale of Princeton property into Pioneer Calander Fund.

Motion carried that we sell Leavenworth Property for not less than \$1000.

Motion carried to pay \$1500 on notes.

Motion carried that we authorize refinancing of \$1000 note plus \$300. interest to Wesleyan Investment Foundation, in Marion, Indiana for Roselawn Church.

Motion carried that we grant permission for Sale Avenue Church to borrow \$2500 from local persons, and that local men sign the note.

Motion carried that we request Card Call for Sale Avenue Church.

Motion carried that we grant permission for Wesleyan Methodist Church in Hope, Indiana to build the parsonage according to plans submitted. Location to be on Washington St. and the loan of \$12,000 with Irwin Union Bank and Trust Company.

Recommendations By The Church Extension Board

I. Calendar System

- 1. A Pioneer Calendar shall be provided by the Church Extension Board for a Sunday in September, chosen as Pioneer Sunday, at which time pledges shall be taken in each church to be paid in 10 monthly payments.
- 2. A Pioneer Secretary appointed by each local church shall announce or have announced on the second Sunday of each month the pledge collection on the third Sunday, and shall collect and tabulate opposite each pledge the monthly contributions, then have the church treasurer remit total collected each month to the Conference Treasurer.
- 3. Pioneer works, and, or, new works, may be granted permission by the Church Extension Board to use their money locally as may be needed.
- 4. Previous to Pioneer Sunday there shall be a rally of the pastors in each district, presided over by the Conference President or another designated by the Church Extension Board, when goals for each church may be suggested.
- 5. Fields and goals: (1) Money shall be saved for centers of population to be invested in property or to employ men of pioneer ability. (2) We urge a goal of \$10,000 this year toward reducing indebtedness.

II. Sunday School

The first Sunday of each month the Sunday School Offering shall be remitted by each Sunday School Treasurer for much needed pioneer work.

III. Revolving Fund

This fund shall be increased by gifts, and at the discretion of the Church Extension Board from regular pioneer funds not to exceed \$500 per year.

IV. United Effort

We suggest and urge co-operation of the Conference W.M.S. and the Youth Executive Council with the Church Extension Board, to help our pioneer works as may be needed.

V. Deeds and Legal Documents

- 1. The Conference President be custodian of deeds and conference records to be kept in a safe.
- 2. The Conference President shall collect all deeds and records of deeds for filing, at the time of his visitation in Quarterly Conference.
- 3. The Board will recommend no authorization or the signatures of the Conference Trustees on notes or mortgages for churches until there is a joint deed made to local and conference trustees.
- 4. All Pioneer churches involved in indebtedness shall secure approval of the Church Extension Board.

COMMITTEE ON WAYS AND MEANS

Item I. Budget

- 1. We recommend that the Conference pay General Budget Assessments as follows: General Wesleyan Youth \$2.00 per active member of W. Y., and \$1.00 per associate member (to be paid by W. Y.); World Missions \$2.00 per full member; Australia \$.25; Church Extension and Evangelism \$1.50; Superannuate Pension Plan \$7.00; Church Administrative Fund \$2.15; General Conference Expense and Entertainment \$1.00; Hephzibah \$.50; Sunday School \$.25 per member based on the number in main school; Educational Budget \$4.00; Wesleyan Seminary \$.50; Brainerd Indian School \$.25.
- 2. We recommend that our churches pay Conference Budget as follows: Conference Work Fund \$1.00; Conference Entertainment \$1.00; Camp Meeting Fund \$1.00; Conference Wesleyan Youth \$50 per full church

member; Conference Parsonage Funds \$.50; Conference Sunday School \$.05 per member in main school; Conference President's salary \$1.00 and an amount equal to 10% of the Pastor's cash salary; Minister's Group Insurance \$.50 per member; Ministerial Institute \$.10 per full member; and that the Sunday School offering for the first Sunday of each month be sent to the Conference Treasurer for pioneer evangelism.

Item II. Pastor

1. Each pastor shall encourage the storehouse plan of tithing. 2. All pastors shall encourage membership in the Card Call Plan. 3. The Pastoral Year shall end with the last Sunday of Camp and the Church he is serving will pay his salary until that time. 4. All Churches shall provide their pastors suitable living quarters, all their utilities, fill their obligations by monthly donations and definitely arrange with the pastor the number of revivals he is allowed to conduct. The pastor shall receive two weeks vacation with pay exclusive of Conference and Camp Sunday. 5. Each Pastor's moving bill shall be paid by the contracting church.

Item III, Conference President

1. The Conference President shall be paid \$90.00 per week, one-half of his Social Security, also Hospitalization Insurance, house rent, utilities, desk expense, secretarial help, and traveling expense at 8c per mile in connection with the Conference work, also 2 weeks vacation with pay. 2. The Conserence President shall meet with the Board of Stewards and encourage the church to provide adequate support for their pastor. 3. Each church shall hold 4 quarterly meetings annually, one to be held by the Conference President, the other three arranged by the pastor. 4. The Conference President shall give as much time as possible to supervising the pioneer work and the smaller churches. 5. The Conference President's tithe is to be deducted for the parsonage fund. 6. Upon incapacity of the President, he and his Advisory Board may authorize the vice president to assume certain duties, who, when so authorized shall be recognized and received by the churches and ministry of the conference in the same capacity as the president of the conference. Any legitimate expense thus incurred by the vice president shall be cared for out of the president's fund.

Item IV. Miscellaneous

1. The Conference Treasurer and the Conference Secretary shall each receive an honorarium of \$100.00 annually. 2. All superannuated Ministers and their wives of our Conference shall be entertained free during camp meeting. 3. We recommend that the Board of Church Extension be empowered between sessions of the conference to make available for present use any surplus in any funds. 4 We recommend that the Kentucky Conference Ministerial Student Aid Fund at Marion College be placed under the Conference Church Extension Board with recommendations from the donors. 5. We recommend that the minutes be sold for \$1.00 per copy. 6. We recommend to the Annual Conference and the Wesleyan Camp Meeting Association the crecting of a Headquarters Building on the Campground for office and classroom use. 7. We recommend for use by treasurers in the local churches mimeographed envelopes for reporting funds sent to the Conference Treasurer prepared by the Conference Treasurer at Work Funds Expense. 8. The Assistant Secretary shall work with the Secretary during the session of the Conference and receive an honorarium of \$10.00.

Report No. 9

COMMITTEE ON MORAL REFORM

We, your committee on moral reform, submit to this conference and the churches of this conference the following resolutions:

- 1. Since our homes are the tribituaries which feed the stream of our national and religious life, we call upon our ministers to challenge our entire church congregations to make our homes Christian.
- 2. Inasmuch as we are living in a world of unrest, of contention, and of strife, which is the result of the spirit of the anti-Christ, we ask our people to seek the peace of unity of faith once delivered to the saints, to seek understanding in the midst of misunderstanding, to cover our brothers faults with the grace of charity and by fellowship with those who may be weaker in the faith.
- 3. We call our people to return to a reverence for the Lord's Day and stress the necessity of a faithfulness to all services conducted on that day. We urge our families to worship as a family unit and adopt the family pew and sit together. We intreat our people to abstain from social and secular interest and indulgences that take away the sacredness of the Lord's Day.
- 4. Believing in the integrity and devotion of our God appointed church leaders in all levels of administration, we urge our people to support them by their prayers and cooperation in furthering the work of the Lord through the channels of the Wesleyan Methodist Church. We feel that the leaders should, in return, be sympathetic and have a common understanding toward the conference's beliefs and standards Hebrews 13:17.
- 5. We further urge that our people exercise their disapproval of obscene literature, immodest attire, encouraging women to wear three-quarter length sleeves, their dress below the knee, to wear their hair according to I Cor. 11:15. And that we exercise our disapproval of tobacco, intoxicating beverages, degrading radio and television programs, also the discouraging of television as a whole because of the general tendency to unwholesome influence.
- 6. Be it resolved that the pastor exhort our people to fulfill their responsibility as citizens in registering their vote in all areas including local, state, and national levels, and also encourage praying for our public officials. I Tim. 2:1-3.
- 7. In the midst of the racial tension we discourage our people from participating in or encouraging any pressure groups that produce unchristian attitudes. We exhort our people to treat all races (Negro-Indian-Asiatic) with respect and dignity since God has made of one blood all people. Acts 17:26
- 8. We wish to reaffirm our historical beliefs and standards against the putting on of gold and costly apparel, which includes the engagement and wedding ring. I Tim. 2:9-10
- 9. We also disapprove immodest attire, this pertaining to the wearing of shorts, slacks, etc. And parents to exercise their parental authority over their household to this end. Titus 2:1-8

10. We strongly oppose any fad which leads to effeminate behavior, which obliterates the line between the sexes, and which stimulates a tendency toward homosexuality in either sex.

INSURANCE COMMITTEE

We Recommend:

- 1. That the Conference increase the room rate on the Blue Cross Blue Shield Hospitalization Plan from \$15.00 to \$20.00 per day, and that each thurch pay at least one half of their pastor's premium of \$18.00 per month.
- 2. That the Conference continue life insurance with the Presbyterian Minister's Fund for all active ministers and also when they become inactive, with the same coverage as heretofore (age 45, \$3,000; age 46-55, \$2,000; over 56, \$1,000) and that each participant pay a flat rate of \$14.00 per year, and that the Conference budget assessment of 50 cents per member provide the balance of the premium, provided that no one 65 years of age or over be admitted.
- 3. We recommend Camper Insurance on a voluntary basis for ministers and delegates for conference and camp.
- 4. We recommend that premiums on Blue Cross-Blue Shield be paid on or before the 20th of each month. The premium to be sent to the Conference Insurance Treasurer.
- 5. We recommend that the premium on the Presbyterian Minister's Fund Life Insurance be paid on or before November 1 of each year. The premiums to be paid to the Conference Insurance Treasurer.

Report No. 12

SUNDAY SCHOOL

This report is based on the thirty-one reporting Sunday Schools. Two churches reported no change in average attendance. Sixteen churches gained a total of one hundred and seventy-four, while thirteen others were losing ninety-six. This means that among the thirty-one Sunday Schools submitting reports, the conference had a gain of seventy-eight. Last year forty-one churches reported, and it is hoped that the trend upward is conference wide. More diligence in reporting on time is urged.

A recent article in a Louisville newspaper discussed a possible "conflict" between Sunday School and public school. Differences in teachings are "confusing our children, it read, and then the article proceeded to advocate the closing of church schools. How alarming! May we as holiness people see the need for rooting our children in the fundamentals of faith in this day when they face such liberal and communistic ideas. The signs of Christ's coming are all about us — surely we cannot help seeing them. It will certainly be worth all it will cost to be holy and do our best to win precious souls to the Master.

Frequently we hear well-meaning people say, "If we can just hold our own in these days we are doing good." And this is true to a certain extent. However if we take this attitude as our policy, we will cease to have a burden and thus cease to work for new people. In this coming year let us buckle on the whole armour of God and go out to the battle as soldiers for the fight.

Report No. 14 WESLEYAN YOUTH PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Members of the Kentucky Conference, Greetings.

It has been a privilege to represent the Wesleyan Youth another year. This has been a year packed with many varied and interesting experiences. This is generally the way it is, working with young people, as they can make it very exciting. The Youth Leader's Retreat in September was an outstanding event with our Marion Area President, Rev. Haro'd Bardsley, as the speaker. The youth leaders felt that it was very helpful to the overall program of our conference and voted to continue the Retreat.

Wesleyan Youth Week has found its place in the schedule of many of our churches. We had some remarkable results this year. Yet, less than half of our churches observed Youth Week. This is sad and disappointing.

I was received royally in each district as I toured the conference in the interest of Wesleyan Youth. The pledges and offerings exceeded that of previous years. I am disturbed over the lack of concern and cooperation on the part of some pastors and young people, causes me to wonder about our interest in youth. In some districts only a few young people were present with mostly older people taking part; the service lacking a real vital spirit of enthusiasm to interest our youth. Some pastors not attending during the year caused our leaders to be discouraged over the lack of cooperation. May a revival of cooperation sweep our conference.

Again, we report an excellent Youth Camp. Although the attendance was not up to previous years, we did feel that it was a great spiritual uplift to our young people.

In looking over the Statistical Report, we have 22 locals, 229 active members, 37 associate members, 179 subscriptions to the WESLEYAN YOUTH and total receipts for the year was \$3,373.65. If the Statistical Report told the whole story of Wesleyan Youth in the Kentucky Conference, I would be greatly discouraged. Some of our established churches still do not have an organized Wesleyan Youth. We promoted the interest of the WESLEYAN YOUTH magazine each week for one month, and still we had only a small gain in subscriptions. Reporting is one of the most difficult tasks in our work. This is an area where we need to greatly improve.

As I close my 20th year as President of Wesleyan Youth, I do so with great concern. May God give us a renewed vision of scores of young people who are lost without the Savior. If won to the Lord, they could fill our pulpits, relieve tired and worn missionaries and replenish the vacancies in our churches. This is our only hope for your churches and the conference.

- 3. Those failing to comply with the above regulations shall be referred back to their Quarterly Conference.
- 4. All Conference Preachers employed as pastors of organized works may vote in Annual Conference, not including Evangelists or Assistant Pastors.
- 5. We recommend that those taking examinations in the Course of Study shall take said examinations in the presence of an elder, a conference preacher or a local preacher and the examinations be sealed and sent by him to the proper member of the committee.

Report No. 2

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

To the members of the forty-fifth annual session of the W.M.S. of the Kentucky Conference, greetings:

We are again met to take into account the successes and failures of this year, endeavoring with the help of the Lord to make them stepping stones to a better year in 1967-1968.

We had our first Pilgrim - Wesleyan Ministerial this year, at which time the ladies met for lunch and a discussion of the two missionary organizations.

We say thanks to each of you for your cooperation throughout the year. I Cor. 12:21b, "... the head (cannot say) to the feet I have no need of you," v26. "And whether one member suffers, all members suffer with it; or one member be honored, all members rejoice with it," v20, "But now are they many members yet, but one body."

Your considerate cooperation meant much to us and the missionaries while on tour. Last fall the Kalbs, missionaries elect to Sierra Leone, toured the Columbus and Bloomfield Districts. The Weavers, Superintendent of Hephzebah Children's Home, acquainted people from twenty churches with the Home, in thirteen services. Rev. Paul Dekker, missionary to Sierra Leone spoke at Milan, and Rev. K. M. Ridgway, missionary to New Guiena, spoke for New Albany District at Clear Fork.

We are especially blessed of the Lord to have Dr. Marilyn Birch as our guest for Conference and Missionary Night.

The Department of World Missions has increased the salary of single missionaries and each couple, \$180 a year Indian Missions has increased the salary of their missionaries \$25 a month.

The Executive Committee, with your approval has agreed to increase the salary of the missionaries we support. A special pledge has been

made to cover the increase in the salaries of the Peltons. This following year if p'edges paid permit, we will be giving \$2580 to Blackburns, \$1900 to Peltons, \$1290 to Marcia Earl, and \$1380 to Ruth Houser. Sale Avenue expects to pay \$1290 on Mrs. Alice Calhoon's support. Ninth Street has pledged some for Wayne Edwards' support each month.

This year Miss Florence Glass, missionary to Haiti will be touring our Conference November 9 - December 17, 1967. Rev. Henry Ortlip, missionary to Haiti will tour from November 21st to the 29th.

The time and place of the W.M.S. General Conference is not yet determined, but General Conference delegates will be elected by this conference subject to the convening of the W.M.S. General Conference.

We welcome the newly organized Franklin Avenue W.M.S.

It was agreed that the W.M.S. Conference roll list: name, address, Key number, and times present at Conference, of presidents and delegates.

Mrs. Rebe Anderson, Secretary of the W.M.S., tendered her resignation July 13. The Executive Committee accepted her resignation and appointed Elaine West acting Secretary July 31.

- 2. Conducted a service at Highland Park explaining duties of officers.
- 3. Met with the pastors, W.M.S. officers, and chairman of the Louisville, New Albany Districts to elect a committee to arrange the annual missionary convention of the Combined District.
- 4. Spoke at Mt. Calvary promoting the W.M.S. Suggested that they care for a child at Hephzebah. This was done.
- 5 Attended meeting of the Pilgrim and Wesleyan officers to plan for a merged Ministerial. The women made plans for a time of fellowship and discussion of the missionary society of each church.
- 6. Arranged the schedule for the tour of the Kalbs and Weavers.
- Helped with the schedule for the Louisville New Albany Missionary Convention when Rev. Dekker, the Gails and the Weavers were the speakers.

WESLEYAN YOUTH PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Members of the Wesleyan Youth of the Kentucky Conference, Greetings.

It has been a privilege to represent the Wesleyan Youth another year. This has been a year packed with many varied and interesting experiences. This is generally the way it is, working with young people, as they can make it very exciting.

The Youth Leader's Retreat in September was an outstanding event with our Marion Area President, Rev. Harold Bardsley, as the speaker. The youth leaders felt that it was very helpful to the over all program of our conference and voted to continue the Retreat.

Wesleyan Youth Week has found its place in the schedule of many of our churches. We had some remarkable results this year. Yet, less than half of our churches observed Youth Week. This is sad and disappointing.

I was received royally in each district as I toured the conference in the interest of Wesleyan Youth. The pledges and offerings exceeded that of previous years. I am disturbed over the lack of concern and cooperation on the part of some pastors and young people, which causes me to wonder about our interest in youth. In some districts, only a few young people were present with mostly older people taking part; the service lacking real vital spirit of enthusiasm to interest our youth. Some pastors not attending during the year caused our leaders to be discouraged over the lack of cooperation. May a revival of cooperation sweep our conference.

Again, we report an excellent Youth Camp. Although the attendance was not up to previous years, we did feel that it was a great experience and spiritual uplift to our young people.

In looking over the Statistical Report, we have 22 locals, 229 active members, 37 associate members 179 subscriptions to the WESLEYAN YOUTH, and total receipts for the year was \$3,373.65. If the Statistical Report told the whole story of Wesleyan Youth in the Kentucky Conference, I would be greatly discouraged. Some of our established churches still do not have an organized Wesleyan Youth. We promoted

the interest of the WESLEYAN YOUTH magazine each week for one month, and still we had only a small gain in subscriptions. Reporting is one of the most difficult tasks in our work. This is an area where we need to greatly improve.

As I close my 20th year as President of Wesleyan Youth, I do so with great concern. May God give us a renewed vision of scores of young people who are lost without the Savior. If won to the Lord, they could fill our pulpits relieve tired and worn missionaries, and replenish the vacancies in our churches. This is our only hope for our churches and the conference.

Report No. 3

WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

We, the Committee on Ways and Means, wish to make the following recommendations:

I. Conference

- a. The W.Y. President shall attend, if possible, one rally in each District during the year and District shall bear the traveling expense at the rate of seven cents a mile. The W.Y. Secretary shall notify each District Chairman of this obligaion previous to the President's tour.
- b. We recommend that the pioneer project of this year be left in the liands of the Executive Committee.
- c. We recommend that our missionary project of this year be the support of David Blackburn.
- d. We recommend that a Conference-wide Youth Rally be held Friday Night following the Annual Conference and Saturday be known as Youth Day at which time the Youth Conference shall convene.
- e. We recommend that the Conference shall elect a Nominating Committee for the Conference year which is to be a standing committee of five members with the Youth Conference President and Secretary as members ex-officio. This committee shall nominate the chairman and members as standing committees of the (1) Ways and Means, (2) Resolutions. (3) Statistical, (4) Auditing.
- f. We recommend that a Conference-wide "Youth Leader's Retreat" be held as called by the W.Y. President for the purpose of promoting the conference youth work. We urge the Pastors, District Chairmen, and all local youth officers to attend.

II. District

- a. We recommend that the Districts be set up the same as the Conference Board of Extension and Evangelism.
- b. We recommend that each District have at least four rallies during the year and that we use our Young People in a variety of programs for the rallies rather than always securing an outside speaker.

III. Local

a. We recommend that the local treasurer's books shall closed June 30.

IV. Finances

- a. We recommend that the local raise the amount of two dollars (\$2.00) per active member and one dollar (\$1.00) per associate member for the General W.Y. Program, and that those churches not having an organized local take an offering for the General Youth Program.
- b. We recommend that each local raise the amount of one dollar (\$1.00) per active member for the Conference Expense Fund.
- c. We recommend that each local raise the amount of fifty cents (50¢) per active member for the Youth Camp Fund.
- d. We recommend that each local raise the amount of ten cents (10c) per active member to subsidize the expense of Youth Publications.
- e. We recommend that the Executive Committee shall have the power to appropriate the youth money for the promotion of the General and Conference work.
- f. We recommend that each District in their District Rallies raise the following amount for our missionary project:

- g. We recommend that an honorarium of seventy-five dollars (\$75.00) be given to our Conference Youth President.
- h. We recommend that fifteen dollars (\$15.00) voted by the Conference as Young People's assessment to help subsidize the Conference Messenger be paid from the Conference Expense Fund.
- i. We recommend that the Area Assessments and all desk funds be paid from the Conference Expense Fund.
- j. We recommend that all money be forwarded quarterly to the Conference W.Y. Treasurer. The Conference W.Y. Treasurer's books shall close July 7.

We the committee on resolutions, submit the following recommendations

- 1. That each church have an active Local "Wesleyan Youth" and endeavor to organize as soon as possible

- 7. That our young people dress modestly and well pleasing in the sight of God as becometh Holiness. (I Peter 3:3, 4; Deut. 22:5; I Tim. 2:9, 10; I Cor. 11:15).
- 8. That our young people strive to govern all areas of their lives by the teaching of the Word of God, in refraining from that which has a tendency to evil and in reaching for that which would strengthen and enrich their spiritual lives.
- 9. That our young people while maintaining their standards manifest a Christ-like spirit toward other young people who are not saved, or have not had sufficient light.
- 10. That each pastor and W. Y. president attend the District Youth Conventions and the Youth Camp, and encourage their people's attendance.
- 11. That the Efficiency Standard, Ways and Means, and Resolution Committee Reports be read in a local meeting as soon after conference as possible.
- 12. That the Efficiency Standard of the W.Y. be printed in the Annual Minutes and each Local plan its program according to the standard, organizing it in a workable monthly calendar.
- 13. That each Local send in a quarterly report by the designated time and that they strive to be on the honor roll.
- 14. That all monies received after July 7, 1968, be applied on the Local's next year's report.
- 15. That all Local officers be elected in June and begin their duties July 1. The newly elected Local president shall be member of the conference body.
