Daily Proceedings

Minutes of the Seventy-First Annual Conference of the Dakota Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, held at Aberdeen, South Dakota, June 3rd through June 11th, 1952.

Conference Sermon—The opening service of the Conference was held Tuesday evening, June 3rd, with a goodly number of ministers and delegats and friends in attendance. The Rev. S. J. McIntyre, pastor of the Billings, Montana Church, delivered the Conference Sermon, stressing the need of "a supernatural visitation of the Holy Spirit in Pentecostal power."

Wednesday Morning, June 4th, 1952

Devotionals—The Rev. S. J. Sausoman, pastor of the Mitchell Church, was in charge of the devotional period.

Called to Order—Conference was called to order by the President, the Rev. J. F. Simpson. Forty-two ministers and thirty-two delegates responded to the Roll Call.

Motion: to Seat Delegate—Motion prevailed that Mrs. Chris Johnson be acknowledged as the delegate from the Buffalo, Wyoming Church. The Pastor had left the field before Conference, so Mrs. Johnson had received no credentials.

Report of Program Ccmmittee—The Report of the Conference Program Committee was read and by motion accepted as read.

Motion: Bar of Conference—Motion prevailed that the first ten rows from the front of Tabernacle, in center section, constitute the Bar of Conference.

Motion: Regarding Bells—Motion prevailed that a Rising Bell be rung at 5:45 a. m., and that a bell be rung ten minutes before each Conference meeting, and then a bell rung on the hour of such meeting.

Election-The Rev. H. Vreugdenhill was elected official bell-ringer.

Greetings—A statement was made by the President to the effect that he had received greetings to the Conference from the following persons: J. E. Spry, Harry Shreve, George Robbins, Warren Pamp, L. L. Knapp, Ruth Bixler, Alma Aldinger, Romeo Baronia, Mrs. Grace Hoien.

Motion—Motion prevailed that the Conference Secretary be instructed to acknowledge these, and other greetings that might come during the Conference.

Election—The following persons were nominated and elected to the Nominating Committee: John J. Hunter, Marvin E. Jones, H. W. Cretsinger, H. H. Franklin, F. L. Boyington.

RECESS FOR NOMINATING COMMITTEE TO ACT

Conference was again called to order.

Report: Nominating Committee— The report of the Nominating Committee was read, amended, and accepted by motion as amended. (See Report No. 1.)

Courtesies—The Committee on Courtesies introduced the following brethren and they spoke briefly: R. M. Kelly, Hot Springs, S. D.; Neal Phipps, Gordon, Nebraska; James Blaine, Avon, S. D.; Ralph Frazier, Northville, S. D.! Andrew Wilson, Deadwood, S. D.; Lee Goodell and Dean Watson, Watertown, S. D.

Laymen on Committee on Itineracy and Orders—The President nominated William Greenberg and Francis Fey as Lay members of the Committee on Itineracy and Orders, and they were elected.

Motion—Motion prevailed that pastors and elders be required to answer the next Roll call by giving their telephone numbers, so that said numbers might be included in the Conference Roll in the Minutes.

Courtesies—The Rev. Schutz, Fraternal Delegate of the Dakota Conference of the Free Methodist Church, was introduced and spoke briefly. Rev. Gerald Overholt, National Chairman of the National Prohibition Committee of Winona Lake, Indiana, was also introduced and spoke briefly concerning his work.

The following brethren were introduced and testified briefly: Joe Thompson, Tuthill, S. D.; Harold Griffin, Belle Fourche, S. D.; B. I. Griffin, Flandreau, S. D.; Mr. and Mrs. Wilbert Becker, Huron, S. D.

Adjourned by motion.

Wednesday afternoon, June 4, 1952

Devotionals—The devotional period was conducted by the Rev. Lester Bennett, pastor of the Tolstoy, South Dakota Church.

Courtesies—The Committee on courtesies introduced Darrel Wagner and he spoke briefly in testimony.

Partial Report Missionary Board—The Conference Missionary Board brought in a recommendation regarding the appointment of a Quarterly Conference Evangelist. By motion the recommendation was accepted. (See complete report of Missionary Board, report No. 2).

Courtesies—The committee on Courtesies introduced Dr. O. G. Wilson, Church Editor and denominational representative, and he brought greetings from our Syracuse headquarters.

Paul Davidson, of the Brainerd Indian School was then introduced and testified.

Mction: Number of Minutes-Motion prevailed that we have 450 copies

of the Minutes printed at our own Publishing House. Amended by motion to add the words, "Provided they can be printed and in the mails within 45 days of the submitting of copy."

Adjourned subject to call of chair.

Thursday Morning, June 5, 1952

Devotionals—The devotional period was led by the Rev. R. M. Kelly, pastor of Hot Springs, South Dakota Church.

Roll Call was made with 37 ministers and 35 delegates responding.

Partial Report: Auditing Committee—The Committee on Auditing read a partial report and it was accepted by motion. (See Reeport No. 3.)

Report: Ministerial Benefit Fund—The treasurer of the Ministerial Benefit Fund read his report and it was accepted by motion. (See Report No. 4.)

Report: Conference Treasurer—The Conference Treasurer read his report and it was accepted by motion. (See Report No. 5.)

Motion: Deficit in Pension Fund—Motion was made that in the event there is a deficit in receipts for the Superannuate Pension Fund that such deficit be paid out of the old Conference Superannuated Minister's Fund.

Motion then was made to lay the above matter on the table.

Motion to lay on the table prevailed.

Report: Camp Meeting Treasurer—The Treasurer of the Camp Meeting Fund read his report and it was accepted by motion. (See Report No. 6.)

Report: Treasurer of President's Advisory Board—The report of the Treasurer of the President's Advisory Board was read by the Conference Secretary in the absence of the treasurer. The report was accepted by motion. (See Report No. 7.)

Report: Conference Superannuate Fund Treasurer—The treasurer of the Superannuate Pension Fund read his report and it was accepted by motion. (See Report No. 8.)

Motion: Where to Send Budget Payments on Superannuate Pension FUND—Motion carried that the budget item for the Superannuate Pension Fund, i.e., \$1.50 per church member, be sent direct to the treasurer of that Fund, Mr. Henry Dufloth of Mitchell, South Dakota.

Motion: To take matter of Deficit from Table—Motion prevailed that we take from the table the matter of a deficit in the Superannuate Pension Fund and consider it now. After considerable discussion a motion was made to refer the whole matter of the deficit in this fund to the Missionary Board, and that said Board bring in a recommendation regarding the deficit before Conference closes. Partial Report: Conference President—The Conference President read a partial report and his report was accepted by motion. (See complete Report No. 9.)

Partial Report: Committee on Itineracy and Orders—The Committee on Itineracy and Orders read a partial report and it was accepted by motion. (See complete Report No. 10.)

Motion: Change in Orders of Day—Motion prevailed that the Orders of the Day be changed to have the Denominational Address by Dr. O. G. Wilson at 1:00 p. m. today, instead of 11:00 a. m.

Motion—Motion carried that information regarding the above changes of hour be carried to the Woman's Missionary Conference. The President appointed A. L. Mudgett to carry the word to the Women's group.

Courtesies—The Committee on Courtesies introduced Godfrey Broken Rope, Rapid City, South Dakota. He testified briefly.

Adjourned subject to call of Chair.

Thursday Afternoon, June 5, 1952

Denominational Address—The Denominational Address was delivered by Dr. O. G. Wilson, denomination Editor, and representative to our Conference. His subject was, "Standing with God in the Crises."

Report—The Committee on Railroad Expense read its report, stating that each charge is to send to the Conference Treasurer the amount of \$11.67. Motion prevailed that this report be accepted. (See Report No. 11.)

Motion: Change Standing Rules—Motion prevailed that the following change be made in the Standing Rules: That rule number two, paragraph two, line 4 have word "co-operating" stricken out and that word "total" be inserted in its place, and that a period be placed after the word "church."

Motion: Addition to Standing Rules—Motion prevailed that the action taken in the morning session regarding "Where to send Budget item on Superannuate Pension Fund" be placed in the Standing Rules.

Courtesies—The Committee on Courtesies introduced Sister B. Barker who has been supply pastor of the Tuthill, South Dakota church for the past several months. She testified briefly.

Recommendation of Conference President—The President read a recommendation asking for a committee to make a study of the churches' activities during the past five year period. Motion prevailed that recommendation be adopted.

Election: Committee to Study—A committee to make a study as suggested in President's recommendation was elected as follows: Conference President, chairman; Conference Secretary; Conference Treasurer; H. H. Franklin; F. L. Boyington.

Motion—Motion prevailed that the results of the above study be printed, or mimeographed in pamphlet form.

Courtesies-The Committee on Courtesies introduced Clinton Farrell, an evangelist, and he spoke briefly.

Adjourned by motion.

Friday Morning, June 6, 1952

Devotionals—The devotional period was conducted by the Rev. James Blaine, pastor of the Avon, South Dakota church.

Called to Order—Conference was called to order by the President. Fifty-one ministers and thirty-two delegates responded to the roll call. The Minutes of previous meetings were read and approved as read.

Tellers Appointed—The President appointed the following persons as tellers for the election: James Blaine, Earl Fessenden, A. L. Mudgett, R. J. Sausoman.

Election: Conference Officers—Election of officers resulted as follows: President—I. F. Simpson

Partial Report: Nominating Committee on Conference Standing Committees—The Committee on Nominations read a partial report nominating Standing Committees. By motion the report was changed to add the Sunday School Secretary for the Conference to the Committee on Evangelism.

Motion was then made to refer back to the Committee the matter of the Conference Committee on Superannuate Pension Fund. Motion carried.

Motion then prevailed to accept the report as amended. (See Report No. 11.)

President's Advisory Board—The President nominated J. E. Spry and Harold Dufloth to his Advisory Board. They were elected.

Adjourned by limitation of time.

Friday Afternoon, June 6, 1952

Partial Report: Auditing Committee—The Auditing Committee read a partial report and it was accepted by motion. (See complete report of the Auditing Committee.)

Report: Treasurer Beckman Board—The Treasurer of the Beckman Board read his report and it was accepted by motion. (See Report No. 13.) Motion prevailed that we have a Standing Vote of thanks for the above report, and for the splendid cooperation shown by the treasurer, O. Theo. Beckman for taking valuable time for such work.

Report: Conference President—The President read a partial report, i.e., financial report, and this report was accepted by motion. (See Complete Report of Conference President.

Report: "Forward Movement"—The President gave a financial report of the "Forward Movement," Conference paper. This report was accepted by motion. (See Report No. 14.)

Motion-Motion prevailed that the deficit incurred on the printing of the "Forward Movement" be paid out of the Conference General Fund.

Recommendation: Change of Articles of Incorporation—The President presented a recommendation to change the Articles of Incorporation of the Conference, to facilitate the doing of business transactions. (See Report No. 15 for details.)

Motion—Motion prevailed that the various recommendations regarding the above be considered item by item.

Motion-Motion carried unanimously that we amend the Articles of Incorporation.

Motion: Vote on Items of Recommendation to Change Articles of Incorporation—Motion prevailed unanimously that item number one of the recommendations above mentioned be adopted.

Motion prevailed unanimously that item number two of the abovementioned recommendations be adopted.

Item number three was amended by motion, and then advice was sought from an attorney. Item number three was then adopted unani-. mously by proper parliamentary procedure. (See complete reading of recommendations in final draft under Report No. 15.)

Motion: Other Beckman Property—The motion carried that the property received by the Conference in an agreement between Conference and Willie E. Beckman, in the event said property should be sold the Conference President and the Conference Secretary—or the Conference Trustees —shall sign all legal papers.

Motion—Motion prevailed that we accept all recommendations brought in by the President on the above items, as amended.

Motion: Denominational Budget—The motion carried that the New Budget set up by the late General Conference be included under "Budget Apportionments" in the Minutes.

Motion: Change in Articles of Religion—Motion prevailed unanimously, i: e., fifty-seven votes in favor of changing the Articles of religion as stated in report number sixteen. Motion: Local Churches to Vote on Change in Articles of Religion— Motion prevailed that the President send a letter to each Church stating what to vote on regarding the Change in Articles of Religion, when the vote is to be taken, and that the results of the vote are to be sent to the Conference Secretary.

Greetings—The President stated that he had received greetings to the Conference from the Rev. John Winterberg, General Evangelist.

Election: Fraternal Delegate—Rev. Wilbur Drown was elected Fraternal Delegate from our Conference to the Dakota Conference of the Free Methodist Church.

Adjourned by motion.

Saturday Morning, June 7, 1952

Devotionals-The devotional period was conducted by Rev. Walter Simpson, pastor of the Brookings, South Dakota Church.

Report: Statistical Committee—The Conference Statistical Committee read its report, and after some suggestions for corrections, it was accepted by motion. (See Statistical tables herein.) Ministers and delegates joined in singing the doxology for the splendid report, and for the gains listed.

Report: Joint Board—The joint Board of Pastoral Relations Committee and Missionary Board brought in their report regarding Quarterly Conference Evangelist. (See report No. 17.)

Report: Committee on Group Insurance—The special Committee on Group Insurance brought in a report of their findings, and recommendations. (See Report No. 18.)

Motion: Standing Vote—Motion prevailed that a Standing Vote of appreciation be given the Conference President for supplying the Pastors with copies of "What Makes a Leader Click," and "What Makes a Pastor Click."

Adjourned by motion.

Saturday Afternoon, June 7, 1952

Report: Church Building and Location Committee—The Committee on Church and Parsonage Building and Location gave a report and it was accepted by motion. (See Report No. 19.)

Partial Report: Missionary Board—A partial report was read by the Missionary Board and accepted by motion. See complete report.

Final Vote on Amending Articles of Incorporation—A motion to accept the final reading of the change in Articles of Incorporation, after consultation with an attorney, was made and passed unanimously with 47 in favor and none opposed. See report on recommendations for detail.

Partial Report: Committee on Itineracy and Orders—The Committee on Itineracy and Orders read a partial report to complete their work, and the report was accepted by motion. See complete report of said committee.

Partial Report: Nominating Committee—The Nominating Committee read a report completing the list of Standing Committees, and their report was accepted by motion. See complete report on Standing Committees.

Report: Committee on Resolutions—The report of the Committee on Resolutions was read and by motion adopted as read. (See Report No. 20.)

Motion: Building Cottage—Motion prevailed that Conference recommend to the Camp Meeting Board that steps be taken to build a worker's Cottage on the grounds.

MISSIONARY BOARD

We, your Missionary Board submit the following report: A meeting of the Missionary Board was called by the Conference President, June 4, 1952. Because of the growth and size of the Dakota Conference, it is difficult for the Conference President to make more than one visit to the churches each year, therefore we recommend that the Conference take steps to elect a Quarterly Conference Evangelist to assist in Conference visitations and short revival meetings, his slate to be arranged by the Conference President and his Advisory Board. We further recommend that

this office be filled by the joint action of the Pastoral Relations Committee and the Missionary Board.

A joint meeting of the Missionary Board and the Pastoral Relations Committee was held June 5, 1952, to elect a Quarterly Conference Evangelist in compliance with the action taken by the Conference body. Rev. S. J. McIntyre was elected to this office.

June 6, 1952. The following recommendations were made:

1. That we continue to pay \$25.00 per month on the Rapid City note.

2. That we continue to pay \$15.00 on the Flandreau note, per month.

3. That we pay \$70.00 per week to the Conference President and that his travelling expenses be paid.

4. That at the time of his vistation, the churches endeavor to raise a liberal offering for either the Conference President or the Quarterly Conference Evangelist, to apply on his salary, thus reducing the amount to be paid from the Conference treasury.

5. That \$20.00 per month be paid toward parsonage rent at Garden City.

That \$50.00 per month be paid Romeo Baronia for salary unless information from the field warrants reduction of same.

6. That \$50.00 per month be paid Romeo Baronia for salary unless information from the field warrants reduction of same.

7. That \$75.00 per month be paid toward the salary of John Mickley, as Pastor of the Sioux Community Chapel.

8. That we pay \$30.00 per month for rent to the Belle Fourche pastor, and that \$100.00 per month for three months salary be paid, and that their problem be again considered at the September meeting.

9. That \$40.00 monthly for house rent be paid to the Missoula pastor.

10. That we pay the Quarterly Conference Evangelist \$60.00 per week.

11. That we pay the Quarterly Conference Evangelist \$40.00 per month for house rent.

12. That the travelling expenses of the Quarterly Conference Evangelist be allowed.

13. That we delegate to the Quarterly Conference Evangelist the authority to hold quarterly business meetings in our churches.

14. That we cancel the \$500.00 loan to the Rawlins, Wyoming church.

15. That we pay the balance of the note to the Free Methodist Conference in the amount of \$900.00.

16. That we apply the Pioneer Pastor's Fund to the Pierre work.

17. That we list the property of the former Deadwood church and

parsonage for sale at \$4,000.00, and upon sale of same immediate payment of mortgage be made.

18. That we give \$75.00 per month for pastor's salary at Missoula, Montana.

19. That we pay \$30.00 per month house rent for Sundance parsonage.

20. That we authorize the Conference President and Conference Secretary to sign the note and legal papers necessary to secure a loan of \$3,000.00 for the Redfield Church, the papers to be countersigned by the local trustees, this note to be paid by the local church.

21. That all unfinished business be considered at the September meeting.

Report No. 13

TREASURER OF BECKMAN BOARD

The following report constitutes the ranch business transactions of the Beckman Board from June 1, 1951 to May 1, 1952. The last day of May was found to be too late for the yearly cut-off so April 30 was adopted this year.

Only the proceeds from the former Estate holdings are handled by the treasurer. Consequently the proceeds from the farm land at Strool is not included; these grain checks are forwarded to the Conference President, who, after recording and classifying, sends them to the Conference Treasurer, Rev. S. J. McIntyre.

Of these 2800 acres at Strool the cultivated land amounts to about 2500 acres. The crop last year yielded from 4 to 17 bushels per acre. The crop monies as reported by the Conference Treasurer comes from this Strool land, and is in no way a duplication of reporting proceeds with that handled by this Board.

The Treasurer's report should contain an inventory. To have done this would have necessitated counting the cattle, and appraising the machinery and other property. The ranches where this property is held are widely separated and some fifty miles from Strool. You will find an inventory in the Annual Journal of 1951. One taken April this year would be very similar except about 4 cattle have died, but there is an addition of 19 yearling steers. Some \$800.00 in haying machinery was added. No land was sold, but a quarter section was purchased for \$1600.00. Action was taken to cancel \$5,000.00 advanced to the Strool church, hence those quick assets are reduced by that amount.

There is considerable amount of interest in oil development in the area where the ranches under the jurisdiction of the Beckman Board are located. The latest well, "Herb Veal No. 1," is at present going down in a cornering township from one of these ranches. Oil men have shown an ever-increasing interest and have made the Conference offers for both leasing and the buying royalties. Possibly preachers, like farmers, are at a disadvantage when dealing with experienced lawyers of the oil interests. We ought, therefore, to hold our Conference officials up in prayer, lest an unfortunate contract be entered into.

RECOMMENDATION TO CHANGE ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION

We recommend that we amend the Articles of Incorporation of the Dakota Conference as follows:

1. That the Conference Missionary Board be the Board of Managers for said Dakota Conference, it has the power of attorney to transact legal business for said Conference, in keeping with the Discipline of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, in the interim of the Annual Conference.

2. The signers for the legal documents for said Dakota Conference shall be, the President and Secretary of said Conference Corporation, or its Trustees.

3. That the Beckman Board of the Dakota Conference be known as the DIRECTORS of the Beckman Estate, with power to transact all legal business in the Estate in keeping with the provisions of the will of Willie E. Beckman.

(1) When stid Board of Directors shall sell a part, or all of the land in the Beckman Estate, or when the leasing of land for oil, or the sale of mineral or gas rights or royalties be made, that the President and Secretary of said Conference, or its Trustees, be empowered to sign any legal papers, leases, deeds and contracts of all kinds.

That the said Beckman Board, as above described, shall have power to sell any, or all, of the land hereinafter described, and that the President and Secretary shall have power to execute such conveyances. Said land being described as follows: to-wit: S.W. 1/4 North half of 28, all of section 21 and the S.W. 1/4 of 9, all in Township 18, Range 11, in Perkins County, South Dakota.

(2) That said Beckman Board is self-perpetuating and the remaining members shall fill any vacancies which shall occur through death or other causes.

CHANGE IN ARTICLES OF RELIGION

We, your Committee on Group Insurance, submit the following report:

We have examined two respective Hospital Insurance Plans and both seem to be priced too high for the average Wesleyan minister.

Cost ranges for such a type of insurance are from \$85.00 to \$100.00 annually.

Due to the fact that premium costs could not be met on the basis of the average minister's salary, we therefore recommend: that every pastor join the Conference Ministerial Benefit Fund.

We recommend that the quarterly assessment of \$1.50 be raised to \$2.50 per pastor and per church. That the mortuary assessment of \$1.00 be raised to \$1.50 per church and per pastor, and that all other Conference not serving charges be assessed \$3.00.

We recommend that the payment for expenses incurred be increased to 50% rather than 40%, and that the maximum payment be \$60.00 instead of \$50.00.

We recommend that the mortuary benefits be raised from \$100.00 to \$125.00.

We recommend that if this report is accepted that the proper changes be made in the By-Laws in the Standing Rules of the Conference Minutes to comply.

RECOMMENDATIINS OF CONFERENCE PRESIDENT

We recommend that we ask each church to strive to reach the goal as set by our General Conference of a ten per cent gain in each department next year.

We recommend th t each pastor call a meeting of his officers and teachers of church and Sunday School and Youth Department, as soon after Conference as possible and prayerfully plan for enlargement and advance in 1952-1953.

We recommend that each of our pastors seek to lead his people to a fuller understanding and yieldedness to the Holy Spirit, that we may be able to see in our day, some of the fruitage given to the Early Church.

We recommend that each church and Pastor that reachs the goal as set by the General Conference, that SPECIAL mention be made of same at Conference time, and that a record be made in the Conference of those who have made gains.

We recommend that the Missionary Board study each Pioneer field, which receives assistance from the Conference and present to the Conference a Statement of Policy when grants will be reduced.

We recommend that any church that receives Conference aid for two consecutive years and does not show a gain, in at least some department that the case be studied by the Missionary Board.

We recommend that a Special Board be set up to study each church over a Five Year period.

1. The amount invested in the church, in pastor's salary, evangelists, and General Expense.

2. The amount paid to the Conference on Budget items.

3. The loss and gain over a five year period in Sunday School, Youth, and :nembership.

4. Suggestions as to ways and means of future progress.

We recommend that each Pastor take steps to set up such a Board in his church that greater efficiency may come to our Church.

CONFERENCE STANDING RULES, RESOLUTIONS AND

1. Financial Plan for Conference Work—Money for Conference work shall be obtained by each local Church paying an amount equal to $7\frac{1}{2}\%$ of all monies raised for all purposes, this to include local treasury, Sunday School, W.M.S., W.Y.P.S., and Y.M.W.B., with the exception of finance for building and repair. One-third of this fund shall be used for Church

extension within the bounds of the Dakota Conference, and the balance, two-thirds, shall constitute the regular Conference Fund. This amount is to be sent to the Conference Treasurer once a month.

2. Railroad Expense—The amount of the Railroad Expense Assessment this year is \$11.76, and it is recommended that this amount be sent to the Conference Treasurer as soon as possible. The Committee shall reimburse the pastors for railroad expenses on the basis of four cents a mile, one way for distance travelled.

The Committee in securing the amount of assessment for each Church shall take the cost of carfare of the pastors present, and eligible for such expense, added to any deficit from the preceding year; the result divided by the total number of churches, shall determine the assessment each year for this item. Only those pastors whose churches have paid the assessment for the previous year shall be eligible to receive carfare.

3. Camp Meeting Board—The Conference W.M.S. President, Conference W.Y.P.S. President and the Pastor of the Aberdeen Church are members of the Camp Meeting Board by virtue of office.

4. The local Church file is to be left with the Church by the outgoing pastor, so that the incoming pastor will have immediate access to the data contained therein on his arrival on the field. This file is to be open for inspection of members of local church.

5. Budgets—All churches will be instructed at the beginning and again at the close of the Conference year regarding their obligations to the Conference, relative to Budget askings, and the amount due on the Budget.

6. Officer's Terms—All officers shall hold office until the close of the Conference session in which they are retired.

7. Honorarium, Secretary—The Conference Secretary shall be paid an honor rium of fifty dollars each year.

8. Honorarium, Treasurer—The Conference Treasurer shall be paid an honorarium of one hundred fifty dollars each year.

9. Regarding Ordination—No person shall receive ordination in the future in the Dakota Conference who does not intend to engage in definite Christian work.

10. The Auditing Committee-Shall be one of the Conference Standing Committees.

11. Instructions to Treasurers—The treasurers of the various Conference Funds shall hold such funds in some bank that is a member of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation in the name of the Dakota Conference, and checks drawn on such account shall be signed by the treasurer as treasurer of said fund.

(a) Each treasurer shall have in hand bank statements at the begin-

ning and at the close of the Conference year involved, and said bank statement shall be submitted with the treasurer's account book to the Auditing Committee of the Conference at the Annual Conference session, on the first day of the session.

(b) Duplicate receipts, or records, other than the treasurer's account book, source, date and donor of all receipts shall be submitted to the Auditing Committee with said treasurer's books.

(c) All disbursements from said funds shall be paid by check, and all cancelled checks shall be submitted with the treasurer's books to the Auditing Committee.

12. Pioneer Pastor's Fund—An assessment of one dollar per year shall be raised from each member of each charge and sent to the Conference Treasurer, the monies thus raised to constitute a Pioneer Pastor's Fund. This money shall be disbursed to no more charges than can be adequately cared for by the money which shall come in.

The pastor receiving aid from this fund shall send a monthly statement of salary received on the charge to the Conference Treasurer, who upon receipt of same, shall by check, make up from the Fund any deficit in salary, as agreed previously by the Missionary Board and the pastor.

At any time the Missionary Board feels that the local church receiving help from the fund, feils in its obligations the contract shall be terminated by the Missionary Board.

13. Closing Date of Conference Year-Shall be April 30th.

14. Financing of Printing of Minutes—The Secretary shall send a statement to each charge as to the amount they are to pay for printing of the Minutes, the amount to be based on the number of members on each charge.

15. Each Pastor shall Receive His Salary from the Church he has served the past year, for the two Sundays of Conference and Camp Meeting.

16. Change of Pastors—We recommend that when a church makes a change of pastors that said church enter into an agreement with the incoming pastor establishing an equitable way of financing the pastor's moving expenses.

17. We recommend that the Conference President be granted a twoweeks vacation with pay, inclusive of two Sundays.

18. We recommend that each Church allow the pastor a two weeks vacation with pay, inclusive of two Sundays.

19. Ministerial Benefit Fund—Purpose: To provide financial assistance for Conference Elders and preachers in times of serious illness, or death, in their families.

All ministers and licentiates shall become members upon payment of

first assessment, but no one shall be eligible to receive benefits until four consecutive assessments have been paid.

The Secretary-Treasurer shall make four assessments a year or more if emergencies arise, in the following manner: Each minister on the Conference roll shall be assessed \$1.50 on due notice from the Secretary, except when both husbands and wives are preachers. In such case, only one is assessed. Each pastor shall collect \$1.50 from his church, or charge, each time an assessment is made, except ministers not serving in the Conference as pastors. These are to pay \$2.00 for each assessment.

Disbursements: The Secretary shall upon the receipt of the worthiness of the case, pay out of the treasury 40% of the amount of the actual expense incurred, provided that the expense is more than twenty dollors, and further provided that no payment shall exceed fifty dollars to any one family during one Conference year, possible exceptions being made in extreme cases with the approval of the Conference President and his Advisory Board, and the Secretary-Treasurer of the Ministerial Benefit Fund. (Normal Maternity cases excepted.)

Members who are delinquent in the last two payments prior to claim for help, shall be ineligible. In case one is delinquent in two, or more, payments, no benefits will be paid in emergencies by paying of delinquent payments. If assessment is paid by check, include a service charge to the amount of the check.

In case of death a maximum of 100.00 shall be paid the beneficiaries. The assessment in each case shall be 1.00 for pastor, and 1.00 for church, and 1.50 for all others.

In case the Secretary-Treasurer is in doubt as to the worthiness of a case, he shall advise with the Conference President.

Postage and necessary expenses shall be deducted from the fund.

20. Opening Date of Conference shall be the first Tuesday after the first Monday in June of each year.

21. Conference Work—All monies sent in under the $7\frac{1}{2}$ % fund shall be counted as Conference Work on the Statistical blanks, and monies sent in for the Pioneer Pastor's Fund shall be counted as Conference Missions on the blanks.

22. Each Conference Standing Committee shall have a book of records, and shall be prepared to report to Conference all work done by their Committee.

23. The Conference Treasurer shall be a member of the Missionary Board by virtue of office.

24. All members of all committees doing Conference work shall have their travel expenses paid by the Conference Treasury.

25. All trasurers of the separate Funds of the Conference are instructed to close their books on the 15th of May each year.

26. The Chairmen of the Committee on Resolutions, the Committee on Railroad Expense, and the Statistical Committee shall be nominated by the Nominating Committee and elected by the Conference a year in advance, and their names are to appear with the list of Standing Committees.

27. Each Church shall be responsible to the Pastor, and each pastor shall be responsible to the Church to which he was appointed at the last session of Conference, and which church he has served for the preceding Conference year, this responsibility to be inclusive of the first Sunday after the close of Conference and Camp Meeting.

28. Superannuate Pension Fund Item—Monies sent in by the churches on the budget item of Superannuate Pension Fund, (\$1.50) per member, is to be paid to the Superannuate Pension Fund Treasurer of the Conference.

29. Agreement Between Conference and Willie Beckman Estate— The following land is deeded to the Dakota Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church on the agreement mentioned below: S. W. 1/4; North half of 28, all of section 21, S. W. 1/4 of 9, all in township 18, Range 11, in Perkins County, South Dakota.

1. That O. Theo. Beckman be appointed supervisor to rent and subrent such land.

2. That the land be not sold without the approval of O. Theo. Beckman.

3. That Rev. J. F. Simpson and his Advisory Board be a Committee to receive and disburse 50% of the crop, for Church Extension.

4. That when Rev. J. F. Simpson ceases to be President of the Conference that the Committee to receive and disburse the amount for Church Extension as mentioned in paragraph 3, be Rev. J. F. Simpson, Rev. William Ward, Rev. L. D. Harris, Rev. R. J. Sausoman.

5. When the land is sold, it is requested that Miltonvale Wesleyan College, the Indian work and the Philippine work sponsored by the Conference, be given proper consideration.

6. It is requested that the following persons be a Committee to disburse the money from the sale of the land, namely, Rev. J. F. Simpson, Rev. L. D. Harris, Rev. William Ward, Mrs. W. J. Leyh, Rev. Arthur Reisdorph, Rev. John Kearns, Rev. R. J. Sausoman, Mr. O. Theo. Beckman, Rev. Kenneth Shelley.

7. That the Committee mentioned in paragraph 6 be empowered to fill vacancies made by death. or other causes, of any of the Committee.

8. It is requested that this agreement become a part of the Standing

Rules of the Conference, and printed accordingly in the Conference Minutes.

9. In case O. Theodore Beckman, the land supervisor, is deceased before the land is sold, that the Committee mentioned in paragraph 6 and 7 be empowered to transact all business relative to the land mentioned in this agreement.

10. It is prayerfully requested that the Dakota Conference keep the spirit of unity, a missionary spirit, and the confidence in your leaders.

(Note. See report No. 15, herein, for action taken at this session in regard to part of the above agreement.)

Items of Vital Importance

Information Regarding the Beckman Board-A Board was created in June, 1949 to be known as the Beckman Board, this board to manage and operate the Beckman properties. This Board is composed of the following persons: J. F. Simpson, L. D. Harris, William Ward, Mrs. W. J. Leyh, Arthur Reisdorph, John Kearns, R. J. Sausoman, O. Theo. Beckman, Kenneth Shelley. This Board is self-perpetuating and shall appoint any vacancies that shall occur through death or other causes. This Board shall have complete control over the properties received through transfer of Willie E. Beckman, or O. Theo. Beckman, as Executor of the last will and testament of Willie E. Beckman, deceased. This Board shall retain such portion of income as necessary to meet its expenses in operating and keeping the property in good repair, including a separate reserve to insure sufficient operating funds. That the funds shall be disbursed in accordance with the agreement heretofore entered into between Willie E. Beckman and the Dakota Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church. That in accordance with the wishes of Willie E. Beckman that O. Theo. Beckman continue as supervisor of the Beckman properties."

PLAN OF WORK

We, the Committee of Plan of Work, submit the following as outlined by the General and Annual Conference:

1. Arrange with pastor for one missionary prayer service each month.

2. A minimum of 10 meetings to be held during the year, in which prayer is given a prominent place, and business is transacted; and at least one public meeting.

3. Recognizing the power of prayer, let us diligently observe the following:

- a. The formation of Prayer Partner Circles in each society with a Prayer Partner Secretary, who shall send a report to Conference Prayer Partner Secretary within 60 days after adjournment of the Annual Conference.
- b. The observance of a Prayer and Fast Day by each Society once a month according to the plan of the District Chairman.
- c. Cooperation in the World Day of Prayer services under the direction of the District Chairman.
- 4. a. The President, Secretary, Treasurer and 75% of the active membership to be subscribers to THE WESLEYAN MIS-SIONARY.
 - b. A Magazine Solicitor to be elected, who will faithfully endeavor to obtain all renewals and will gain not less than two new subscriptions a year.
- 5. a. Each society to be represented in Annual Conference by the new President and Delegate.
 - b. Delegate to be instructed by local society regarding the amount to be pledged by that society at the Annual Conference Session.
 - c. Statistical Report blanks filled out on time. Send one copy to Mrs. Anne Bateman, Ipswich, S. D. by May 15th.

- 6. a. All monies received as dues to be sent to Conference Treasurer, designating where 50% of same be applied on missions.
 - b. All monies and vouchers to be sent to Conference Treasurer quarterly and final quarterly remittances not later than May 1st, using blanks sent out by Conference Treasurer.

7. Every woman in the church a member of the society or a 10% gain in total membership.

- 8. Standing rules to be observed are as follows:
 - a. An amount equal to $7\frac{1}{2}\%$ of all monies raised, except funds for building and repairs and dues, be paid for Conference Work.
 - b. \$10.00 per society be paid for Home Missions. This may apply on budget.
 - c. \$5.00 per society be paid Hephzibah Orphanage. This may apply on budget.
 - d. 10¢ per member be paid for Conference expense fund.
 - e. That honorary members as well as active members be included in all our assessments, unless otherwise specified.
 - f. 25¢ per active member be paid for a General Administrative Fund, not to apply on budget.
 - g. \$3.00 or more per society be paid to the Medical Student Fund, not to apply on budget.
- 9. a. \$1.25 per member be paid towards the support of our Conference Missionary. This may apply on budget.
 - b. Stress the use of Card Call Plan. Not to apply on budget.
 - c. Use of "Penny-a-Meal" jar and/or Thank Offering envelopes, the same to be turned in to local Treasurer monthly.
 - d. Use of Pre-Easter Self Denial Folders, said money to be used as directed at that time.

10. The Efficiency Standard to be read in the society at least once a year.

We recommend the following:

1. That there be continued reference to the Plan of Work as guide for the year's work.

2. That a missionary offering be taken at the monthly prayer meeting.

9. That our Prayer Partners be remembered by letters.

10. That our local societies make bandages and that these be forwarded promptly to the Missionary Home, 32 Bergen Ave., Jersey City, New Jersey, to await outgoing missionaries, the number of pounds to be reported with no value attached.

11. That we promote the Mission Study and Reading Course; the use of the study book designated each year; also Program Calendars and other helps.

12. That the Resolutions report be read before the Society upon receipt of the new minutes.
