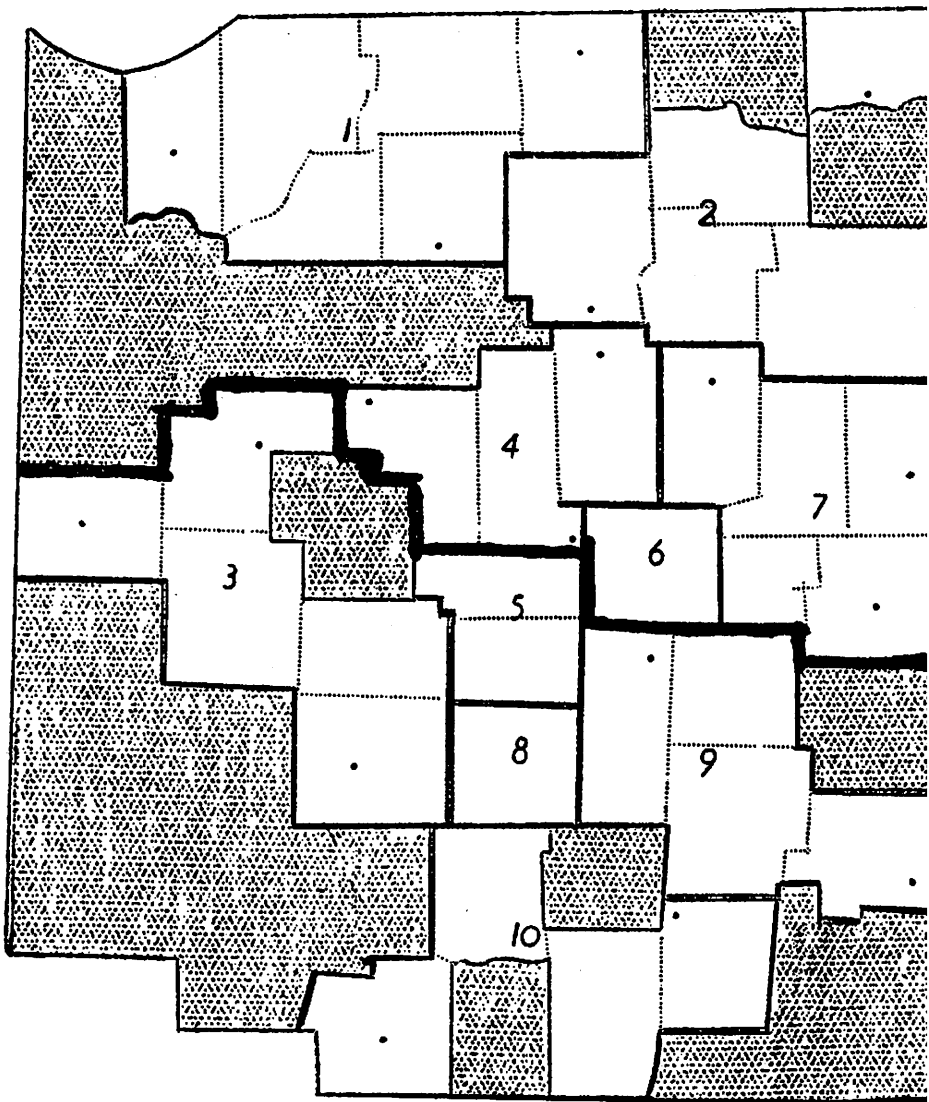

II. BUDGET APPORTIONMENTS

A. UNITED STEWARDSHIP FUND.

I. USF GENERAL FUND is assigned to the District on a basis of 4.5% of total income for the previous year. Total income is defined as the total receipts of the local church for the fiscal year, with the exception of borrowed funds, money received from the sale of property and building funds. This percentage is to be apportioned to the local churches by the district in dollar amounts.

2. USF EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS FUND is assigned to the District on a basis of 2.2% of total income for the previous year (defined above) and is apportioned to the local churches in dollar amounts.

PENSION PLAN. \$4.00 per member is to be paid by the local church to the District Treasurer by December 31, 1968. Beginning January 1, 1969, each church is expected to forward the amount equal to 12% of the pastor's cash salary to the Pension Office monthly. Evangelists' (who are in the pension plan) pensions are to be paid by the churches employing them.

MISSIONS. World Mission Funds shall be raised by special offerings, missionary conventions, and other benevolent offerings.

- B. DISTRICT PERCENTAGE.** At the end of each month add all regular Sunday School offerings and the regular Church tithes and offerings. Divide by the number of Sundays in the month which gives your weekly average. If this average is less than \$50, remit 7% of the total; if \$50 to \$99.99, remit 8%; if \$100 to \$149.99, remit 9%; if \$150 to \$199.99, remit 10%; if \$200 or more, remit 11%.

These receipts shall be apportioned as follows:

- 61% for District Operating Fund
- 22% for District Church Extension
- 10% for Camp Meeting
- 4% for District Youth Work
- 3% for District Sunday School Work

C. ADJUSTING OF FUNDS:

All adjusting of funds and renaming of funds shall be under the direction of the Board of Administration, and if between the sessions of the Annual District Conference there shall occur a deficit, the Board of Administration shall be authorized to raise the District percentage 1% for the balance of the year.

The One Hundred Twentieth Session of the Indiana Annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, convened for its final Session on the Fairmount Campground, Fairmount, Indiana, Monday July 15th, 1968, at 7:30 p.m.

This is also the beginning of the New Indiana District Organization of The Wesleyan Church.

SPECIAL ORDER

Sunday School Service 7:30 p.m.

The Conference Sunday School Rally was planned and arranged by the Sunday School Board. In the absence of the Sunday School Secretary, the Rev. C. A. Hoover, Vice President of the Conference, acted as chairman.

Opening—Mr. Dean Greeno was introduced to lead the singing of the Sunday School Rally, and as the Director of the College Church Wesleyan Youth Singers. The College Church Wesleyan Youth Singers provided the special music for the evening.

Invocation—The President of the Conference, The Rev. Kenneth Dunn.

Report—It was reported by the chairman that good gains had been made in the Conference Sunday Schools this year.

Offering—An offering of \$141.52 was received for the purchase of Sunday School equipment for the new Wesleyan Church, Tillman Rd. Fort Wayne.

Speaker—The Rev. Charles Williams, pastor of the Church of Christ in Christian Union, Washington Court House, Ohio, was introduced as the speaker for the Sunday School Rally. The Conference was certainly challenged with the dynamic Sunday School Address.

He brought us devotional thoughts from the Gospel of St. John 6:15, showing us that Jesus is King of Kings and Lord of Lords, able and willing only as King to meet every human need. Brother Metz then closed with prayer.

Call To Order—The Conference was called to order by the President, the Rev. Kenneth Dunn.

Roll Call—88 elders, 13 conference preachers, 130 delegates answered the roll call.

Conference Bar—A motion was made and carried by vote that the Conference Bar be fixed as the first twelve tiers of seats in front and including the rostrum.

Agenda—It was moved and carried by vote that the Agenda of the Conference as a guide be accepted.

Time Of Conference—It was moved and carried by vote that the time of Conference to convene be fixed at 8:30 a.m., and 2:00 p.m.; to recess at 11:30 a.m., to adjourn upon motion in the afternoon; to have a ten-minute recess in the mid-morning and the mid-afternoon at the discretion of the chair.

President's Message—The President of the Conference read his Annual Message, which upon vote was accepted, with thanks.

President's Report—The President read the report of Official Acts; Appointment of Chairmen; Special Orders; and Calendar of Business, which upon motions were adopted by vote. See Report No. 1.

Recommendation—The President of the Conference read the following recommendations which upon motion were adopted item by item as follows:

1. WHEREAS, the General Merging Conference passed a resolution that the provisions of the Wesleyan Discipline relating to the district and the district conference may be recognized as immediately effective by any district provided that in no case shall they become effective later than the 1969 district conference; and

WHEREAS, they also adopted a resolution which provides that the United Stewardship Fund becomes effective at the time of the 1968 conferences or as soon as directions concerning the basis of finance in the merged church can be properly communicated to the districts; therefore be it

RESOLVED that we at this first session of the Indiana District Conference of the Wesleyan Church organize as much as possible on the basis of the new discipline and that plans for the finance, committees, and officials be made to conform to the new discipline. This is done with the understanding that where terms of office are affected, prior elections will give way to the new organization and such terms of service will expire with the rise of this conference. Where there is no change, previous elections will be honored.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the following be a standing rule of the district: The District Board of Administration shall be a board of thirteen members. It shall include the four conference officials and nine members at large. Five of the thirteen shall be laymen.

2. We recommend that the evening of Tuesday, August 27, at 7:00 p.m. be a time for a districtwide District Church Extension Rally at the Sveden House in Marion, Indiana. It is understood that every pastor and wife are expected to be present. The cost of the meal to be borne by the District.

And we further recommend that Sunday, September 15, be District Church Extension Day and each pastor is expected to present the Calendar Plan to his congregation on or near that day.

3. We recommend that October and November be designated as a period to emphasize the Sunday evening service, and that special efforts be put forth to

- (1) increase attendance
- (2) win converts
- (3) receive new members.

Special promotional materials are to be mailed from the district office.

4. **RESOLVED**—that the District Board of Administration be authorized to secure a historian to write a history of the conference and that this writing be done, if possible, within the next year.

1. The legal name of the new denomination will be The Wesleyan Church; therefore, all legal papers, such as deeds, bequests, bills of sale, et cetera should state that the local church, whatever the local name, is a part of and subject to The Wesleyan Church.
2. Since the new name, The Wesleyan Church, will become for the first time the legal name of all former Wesleyan Methodist and Pilgrim Holiness churches, there is a sense in which all existing churches of both denominations will become "First" Wesleyan Churches; therefore, the Polity Committee, in the interest of amicable relations, particularly where there are several churches within the same city or community, recommends that the designation "First", "Second", et cetera be discontinued as a part of a local church name.
3. It is recommended that local churches simply bear the name of the denomination plus the name of the city or community in which they are located.
4. In the case of plurality of churches within a city and/or a community, we recommend that designations such as the name of the street, name of the community, or a memorial name be used.

Whereas since, during the year it may be desirable to sell or exchange properties belonging to the District Corporation or local churches, and it may be needful to sell or exchange such properties; therefore be it resolved that the Board of Trustees be and are hereby authorized to execute all such deeds, and when ordered the President and Secretary of the District Corporation are empowered to sign and transfer such deeds. The Secretary of the District Corporation shall record the sale of such properties in the Journal after the words: "Indiana Yearly Conference of The Wesleyan Methodist Church of America has ordered the sale of the following."

II. Whereas, since during the year it may be desirable and necessary to borrow money or mortgage District Corporation property; therefore be it resolved that the Board of Trustees be and are hereby authorized to execute such loans, and the President and Secretary of the District Corporation are hereby empowered to sign all papers necessary to execute such loans. The Secretary of the District Corporation shall record in the Journal the transaction of said loan after the words: "Indiana Yearly Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America has ordered the execution of the following loan."

Ways and Means—The Ways and Means Committee reported the following Resolutions I and II which were adopted separately:

Resolution: I

Whereas the merger of The Pilgrim Holiness Church and The Wesleyan Methodist Church into The Wesleyan Church is now an accomplished fact, and

Whereas we believe that alignment of district boundaries at the earliest possible date will help us to realize fully the objectives of merger, and Whereas the Northern Indiana District Conference of The Wesleyan Church has requested that concrete proposals for the realignment of district boundaries within the state of Indiana be presented by the joint comity committees to the 1969 district conferences, therefore be it resolved:

1. That we, the ministers and delegates assembled at the first session of the Indiana District Conference of The Wesleyan Church, authorize the comity committee which was selected by the 1967 session of the Indiana Annual Conference of The Wesleyan Methodist Church to continue in office and to represent us in joint meetings with comity committees appointed by the other districts; and be it further resolved:

2. That we request the joint comity committees to proceed immediately to their assignment and to prepare concrete proposals for presentation to the 1969 district conferences for their consideration and action; and be it further resolved,

3. That upon the approval of these resolutions, a copy of said resolutions shall be sent by the district secretary to General Superintendents J. D. Abbott and B. H. Phaup, to the district superintendents of the Northern and Southern Indiana Districts, and to the district superintendent of the Kentucky District (formerly Wesleyan Methodist).

Resolution: II

We recommend the following as one of the session committees, to become a Standing Rule:

There shall be a daily journal committee of five persons, nominated by the nominating committee and elected by the District Conference, whose responsibility shall be to hear and certify the minutes of each session and report to the Conference.

Resolutions and Laws

I. CHURCHES

A. Houses of Worship:

Our houses of worship should not be open to any evangelist or minister of any other church to hold a series of meetings or to maintain regular appointments for another congregation; provided, however, that usual denominational courtesies be extended to other ministers in occasional appointments. A waiver of the above by a contract or lease of building must be obtained through the District Board of Administration of the Indiana District.

B. Pastoral Support:

1. All charges should in addition to the regular stipulated salary, assume the responsibility of providing a suitable home in which the pastor may live, a heating plant for that home, and also, payment of utilities, including fuel, electricity, water, water-conditioning and sewage, also the pastor's medical, surgical and hospitalization insurance premium and Social Security. The parsonage telephone, except for personal long distance calls, shall be considered a church incidental expense and paid for by the church.

2. All charges to which a pastor shall move shall pay the moving and transportation expenses of said pastor, the same to be done in addition to his salary. When the District demands the service of anyone, it shall bear the moving expense, if any expense shall be incurred.

3. Each charge should grant their pastor two weeks vacation with pay each year.

4. Beginning January 1, 1969, each charge is expected to pay an amount equal to twelve (12%) percent of the pastor's cash salary to the Wesleyan Pension Fund monthly.

C. Pulpit Supply:

1. No charge shall call a minister coming from another denomination as pastor or to supply the work as long as there are ministers in our District qualified and available to take work. This does not apply to other Wesleyan Districts. The District Superintendent, after he has exercised his prerogative in the temporary recognition of ministers coming from other denominations, is to refer them immediately to the District Board of Ministerial Standing who shall make a thorough investigation as to the ministry and life of such applicants and shall report their findings to the District Conference.

2. It is recommended that churches giving a vote for the recall of their pastor vote on or between the third and fourth Sundays of April.

D. Local Church Conference:

1. The annual session of the local church conference which is referred to in Paragraph 263:1 of the Discipline, shall be held during the month of May.

2. It shall be the duty of the local church board (or pastor and board of stewards) of every local church before the beginning of a new District year, to prepare an annual budget taking into consideration the income and expenses of the previous year and the expected income and expense of the year to come. After agreeing on such a budget, it shall be pre-

sented in writing to the local church conference at its annual session for its approval. After approval, any expenditures not included in the adopted budget shall not be made without approval of the local church conference.

3. Delegates to the annual district conference shall be elected by May 31 and it is suggested they be nominated by a committee (Wes. Disc. 332). Delegate credentials secured from the district secretary shall be mailed to the assistant district secretary by the pastor not later than June 1.

E. Insurance:

It is the duty of the local church board to direct the local board of trustees in providing property and liability insurance for all buildings and vehicles owned and operated by the local church (Wes. Disc. 316:28; 350:8).

F. Newly Organized Churches:

District percentage shall not be assigned a newly organized church until one year from the end of the fiscal year in which they are organized.

II. PASTORAL DUTIES

A. Reports:

1. Each pastor and evangelist shall file a complete statistical and financial report with the statistical committee without fail by June 15 on forms provided by the General Secretary-Treasurer. All unaccounted for members appearing in the membership list shall be referred to the discontinued list. All members in excess of the number reported shall be reported as received.

2. When a pastor or evangelist shall not have submitted satisfactory reports, including statistics, he shall appear before the District Board of Ministerial Standing. In the case of a pastor, when his church's general and district percentages are not paid in full, he, with the elected delegate, shall appear before this Board.

3. The pastor shall report quarterly to the District Superintendent and Assistant Dist. Supt. on blanks formulated by the District Superintendent. This report shall be sent in immediately following the closing of the quarter.

B. Calling List:

Each pastor should prepare a calling list of all the homes connected with the church and Sunday School, listing the relationship they hold to the church, listing their names and addresses by city, street, and number, the same to be kept for his own work while on the pastorate and to be given to his successors on the field (Wes. Dis. 294:30).

C. Church Extension and Evangelism:

When it is possible and deemed advisable by the District Board of Administration, pastors are urged to cooperate with the Board by offering their services in assisting weaker churches who are unable to assume the total cost of special evangelistic help. All pastors should seek the counsel of the local church board (or advisory committee) when a revival meeting away from the church is anticipated. The church which he pastors should grant him such privilege without censure with full remuneration of salary while in such meetings. No pastor should hold more than two revival meetings away from his charge unless by the consent of the District Superintendent.

D. Summer Camping Program:

All full time pastors and pastor's wives shall offer their services and be granted time by their churches to help in the youth and/or junior Bible camps unless excused by the District Superintendent. This would not deduct from vacation, revival time, or salary.

III. DISTRICT CONFERENCE**A. Time Designations:**

1. Each annual district conference shall be held at Fairmount, Indiana, beginning on the Tuesday nearest July 11 unless changed by the District Board of Administration in counsel with the Board of General Superintendents (Wes. Disc. 486:5).

2. The sitting(s) of the district conference for each day is considered as one meeting.

3. The district fiscal year begins June 1 and ends May 31.

4. The first Sunday following the district conference shall belong to the old pastoral year, and the second Sunday following the conference shall belong to the new pastoral year. This applies to pastoral appointments.

B. Finances:

1. The District Secretary shall be given an honorarium of \$200; the Assistant District Secretary \$100; the District Treasurer \$600; and the Assistant District Treasurer \$100. Expenses incurred by any officer, board, or committee member in district work shall be reimbursed by the proper treasury.

2. The District Superintendent and the Assistant District Superintendent shall be consulted before any love offerings are taken during any annual encampment.

3. The District shall pay the hospitalization supplement premium for the superannuated ministers and their wives who are listed with Medicare and who have received a District appointment for ten years previous to their retirement. (District appointment shall be understood to consist of pastors, general evangelists, district evangelists only in full time work, district officials, general officials, or those employed by the General Board of Administration.) In case of the death of the minister his wife shall continue to receive these benefits as long as she remains a widow and a member of The Wesleyan Church. The District shall also pay the hospitalization insurance premium for those superannuated due to ill health as interpreted by the Social Security administration. The District shall pay the hospitalization supplement premium for widows who have served with their husbands ten years prior to their retirement.

C. Ministerial Appointments:

1. When churches which have been placed in the hands of the District Board of Administration decide as to who shall be their pastor before the Minutes are sent to press, the same shall be entered in the Minutes as if ordered by the District Conference.

2. A citation in the form of a certificate shall be presented to all those who have been appointed by the District and have given 25 years of service to The Wesleyan Church or one of its predecessor bodies.

3. In the event of the decease of a minister of the District, a citation

shall be presented posthumously to the family, properly inscribed with the number of years of service to the Wesleyan Church or one of its predecessor bodies.

D. Zones:

A zone chairman nominated by the District Board of Administration shall be elected by the District Conference from each of the District zones. Their responsibilities shall be to work with the District Superintendents in the coordination and promotion of the total church program on the zone level, and especially in District church extension, Sunday school, and Wesleyan Youth. They shall be responsible to plan rallies and gatherings as directed by the District. The ministers in each zone, under the direction of the zone chairman, shall meet regularly for a time of prayer and planning. Each pastor will be expected to attend these meetings. The desk and travel expense of the zone chairmen shall be paid from the District Operating Fund.

E. Minutes:

The District Conference Minutes are to be distributed with a minimum of one copy for every four members of the church or fraction thereof, and the cost of the same shall be paid out of the District Operating Fund. Additional copies may be purchased at \$1.00 per copy.

IV. DISTRICT OFFICIALS

A. District Superintendency:

1. Both the District Superintendent and the Assistant District Superintendent shall devote their time to the superintendency of the District, and shall be remunerated on a basis recommended annually by the district conference action committee and adopted by the District Conference.

2. The District Superintendent shall supervise the work of the District, being responsible for all matters of general nature, and devoting as much of his time as possible to visitation of the local churches.

3. The Assistant District Superintendent shall assist in the administration and visitation, and shall be responsible for the supervision and promotion of the church extension work of the District under the counsel and direction of the District Superintendent.

4. These Superintendents shall arrange an official visit with each pastor for the purpose of counseling, studying the local work and discussing as well as giving ideas for promotion in the interest of the local work; and meet with the local church board or other committees when advisable.

5. There shall be a District newspaper called THE WESLEYAN MESSENGER, financed by subscription, by the various departments which use its space, and by the district operating fund if needed. The District Superintendent and the Assistant District Superintendent shall constitute the executive committee of THE WESLEYAN MESSENGER. They shall be responsible for editing, printing, and circulating it monthly except July.

6. The District Superintendent and the Assistant District Super-

intendent shall be given, at times of their own choosing, two weeks vacation each year with pay, and the privilege of holding one revival meeting yearly in or out of the District for which they are to receive the remuneration personally.

B. District Secretary:

1. There shall be an Assistant District Secretary, who shall be nominated by the District Secretary and elected by the District Conference, and who shall serve under the direction of the District Secretary.

2. The District Secretary and the Assistant District Secretary shall constitute a committee on communications.

3. The Assistant District Secretary is to act as reporter of the District Conference to the Marion daily papers and the church periodicals.

4. In accordance with **The Discipline**, 785:3bc and 787:3bc, exact general and district assessments will be made for each church and mailed to the respective pastors by the District Secretary within two weeks of the rise of each District Conference session.

5. The District Secretary is authorized to purchase a floral offering for the family in the event of the death of any of our ministers. The same shall apply to elders or licensed ministers in the event of the death of the minister's husband, wife, son, or daughter. The father and mother of the district officials who are not pastors shall be included. When requested, the price of the flowers shall be given to a designated memorial. The cost of the flowers or the memorial shall be paid from the District Operating Fund.

C. District Treasurer:

There shall be an Assistant District Treasurer, who shall be nominated by the District Treasurer and elected by the District Conference, and who shall serve under the direction of the District Treasurer.

V. DISTRICT BOARDS AND COMMITTEES

A. Session Committees:

1. There shall be a courtesy committee of two members, with the chairman appointed by the District Superintendent, and the other member nominated by the nominating committee and elected by the District Conference.

2. There shall be a committee of tellers, with the number determined and the chairman appointed by the District Superintendent, and the balance of the members being nominated by the nominating committee and elected by the District Conference.

3. There shall be a committee on moral and social reform to prepare an annual declaration by the District Conference bearing pointed Christian witness concerning current needs, with the chairman appointed by the District Superintendent, and three ministers and two laymen nominated by the nominating committee and elected by the District Conference.

4. There shall be a committee on memorial services to lead the District Conference in honoring its deceased ministers and members, with

the chairman appointed by the District Superintendent, and two other members nominated by the nominating committee and elected by the District Conference.

5. There shall be a District Conference registrar to assist the District Secretary in updating the District directory, nominated by the nominating committee and elected by the District Conference.

6. There shall be a District Conference mail carrier, nominated by the nominating committee and elected by the District Conference.

B. Nominating Committee:

1. The District Conference shall elect a nominating committee to serve its next session, consisting of the District Superintendent as chairman, the Assistant District Superintendent, and two ministers and three laymen. Members other than the ex-officio members shall not succeed themselves.

2. The nominating committee shall present to the District Conference nominations for all district officers (except District Superintendent, Assistant District Superintendent, Assistant Secretary, and Assistant Treasurer), for all board and committee members (except chairmen appointed by the District Superintendent and members at large of the District Board of Administration), for delegates to General Conference, for the selection of nominees for the boards of trustees of the area educational institutions. Two names shall be presented in the case of the District Secretary, the District Treasurer, and each delegate to the General Conference.

C. Conference Action Committee:

The conference action committee shall consist of the District Superintendent, the District Treasurer, and four ministers and four laymen nominated by the nominating committee and elected by the District Conference. The District Superintendent shall serve as chairman or shall appoint one of the other members as chairman.

D. District Board of Administration shall consist of the District Superintendent as chairman, the Assistant District Superintendent, the District Secretary, the District Treasurer, and nine members at large elected by the District Conference on open ballot. Five of the thirteen members shall be laymen.

E. District Board of Ministerial Standing:

1. The district board of ministerial standing shall consist of the Assistant District Superintendent as chairman, and four elders and two laymen nominated by the nominating committee and elected by the District Conference.

2. The district board of ministerial standing shall serve as the council on ordination.

3. Recommendations from a local church conference concerning ministers, deaconesses, or special workers shall be sent to the district board of ministerial standing by June 15.

F. District Board of Missions and Evangelism:

The district board of missions and evangelism shall consist of a chair-

man appointed by the district board of administration from among its own members, the district secretary of extension and evangelism, the district secretary of world missions, the district president of Wesleyan Men, the district president of Wesleyan Women's Missionary Society, the district president of Wesleyan Youth (unless the district WY executive committee shall name another of its members), and one minister and one layman nominated by the nominating committee and elected by the District Conference.

G. District Board of Christian Education:

The district board of Christian education shall consist of a chairman appointed by the district board of administration from among its own members, the district Sunday school secretary, the district director of leadership training, the district president of Wesleyan Youth, the district CYC director, the district YMWB director, the district educational secretary, and one minister and one layman nominated by the nominating committee and elected by the District Conference.

H. District Building Committee:

1. The district building committee shall consist of the District Superintendent, the Assistant District Superintendent, and one minister and two laymen nominated by the nominating committee and elected by the District Conference.

2. No building or major repair involving structural changes on church property shall be undertaken without study by the District Building Committee and approval by the District Board of Administration; nor without adequate compensation, liability, and accident insurance.

I. Camp Meeting Committee:

1. An annual camp meeting shall be held beginning on Friday night nearest the 11th of August and run through two Sundays, until 1970, at which time an annual camp meeting shall be held beginning on Friday night following the District Conference and run through two Sundays.

2. The District Conference shall elect five members of the camp meeting committee, with nominations to be submitted by the nominating committee. Three shall be ministers, one to be elected each year for a term of three years; and two shall be laymen, one to be elected each year for a term of two years.

3. The District Superintendent shall be a member ex officio of the camp meeting committee.

J. District Auditing Committee:

1. The district auditing committee shall consist of two persons nominated by the nominating committee and elected by the District Conference.

2. All treasurers serving the District, including those of the various boards, committees, and auxiliaries, shall submit their records and their annual reports to the auditing committee by June 25, for their examination and subsequent report to the District Conference and the auxiliary conventions.

K. District Statistical Committee:

The district statistical committee shall consist of two persons nominated by the nominating committee and elected by the District Conference.

VI. DISTRICT STANDARDS

- A. The Indiana District heartily supports all standards of The Wesleyan Church against prevailing worldliness as defined in The Discipline, and interpreted by the decisions of our General Church, and disapproves of any tendency to deviate from Bible standards.

VII. BURIAL ASSOCIATION

- A. Each local church should elect a Local Secretary for the Burial Association, whose duty it would be to promote the interests of the Association and seek to obtain new members for the same. And if the church so elects, collects the dues of members and forward them to the General Secretary.
- B. The pastor should present, or have presented, the work of the Burial Association at least once during the District fiscal year, and seek to obtain new members for the same.

VIII. AMENDMENTS

- A. Additions or amendments to the Resolutions and Laws of the Indiana District may be made in any meeting by majority vote providing the proposed addition or amendment has been read before the body at least one day previous, or if not previously read, by two-thirds vote of those present and voting.

Reports

Report No. 1

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

1967 and the first part of 1968 has been a time of marchings, assassinations, uprisings, unrest, and Viet Nam. Although the future promises little change in world conditions, let us call to mind it was a troubled day when Jesus said to His disciples, "Let not your heart be troubled." It was a troubled day when Esther was told she had come to the kingdom for such an hour. So the Wesleyan Church, having come into being as a result of merger, faces a day of unparalleled challenges. However, be assured as God has supplied materials, strength, and miracles in the past He will do the same in this decade.

For 120 years the Indiana Conference has sought to turn men from sin to God and establish them in righteousness. This shall remain our task until Jesus comes. Let us evaluate the past year and present standing to understand our equipment for the future.

It has been a year of revival and gain with more than 3300 seekers and a gain of 102 in total membership. Every statistical item has increased this year except full membership which suffered a small loss due to some churches making sweeping revisions of the membership roll. Many more have had substantial gains:

- Sunday school average attendance is up
- Morning worship has increased
- Sunday evening attendance shows a gain
- Prayer meetings are better attended

The Wesleyan Youth organizations and membership show growth.

Finances reached an all-time high of more than \$1,712,000 and this is reflected in each arm of the work. We were concerned to note that only ten of our 111 churches paid a pastoral salary of \$100 or more per week last year. Others are doing so this year. Let us increase this number to 25 soon.

Financially and numerically we are well equipped for 1968 and 1969. We have never had more material resources.

During the past year merger with the Pilgrim Holiness Church has taken much time and concern and it will occupy some of our attention in the days ahead. But while we are merging with our brothers, let us also draw closer to God.

Let us grow—

- (1) richer in our devotional life
- (2) sweeter and more understanding in our attitudes
- (3) more concerned about lost souls
- (4) more liberal in our giving
- (5) broader in our scope of influence
- (6) deeper in our living.

Yes, the Indiana District of the Wesleyan Church faces the future conscious of the perils, aware of the needs, but confident that He who is the same yesterday, today, and forever will

send manna
heal the sick
walk on water
multiply loaves

rebuke devourers
 forgive sinners
 cleanse believers
 intercede for us at the throne
 and come again

that He might present a spotless church unto the Father.

May God grant that we of the Wesleyan Church will be part of THAT CHURCH.

Report No. 4

REPORT OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

ITEM I Re: FINANCE

A. United Stewardship Fund:

1. The USF General Fund is assigned to the District on a basis of 4.5% of total income for the previous year. Total income is defined as the total receipts of the local church and all its departments for the fiscal year, with the exception of borrowed money, money received from the sale of property and building funds. This is to be apportioned to the local churches by the District in dollar amounts.

2. The USF Educational Institutions Fund is assigned to the District on a basis of 2.2% of total income for the previous year (defined above) and is to be apportioned to the local churches by the District in dollar amounts.

B. Pensions:

\$4.00 per member is to be paid by the local church to the District Treasurer by December 31, 1968. Beginning January 1, 1969, each church is expected to forward an amount equal to 12% of the pastor's cash salary to the Pension Office monthly. The pension assessments of evangelists who are in the Wesleyan Pension Fund are to be paid by the churches employing them.

C. Missions:

World Mission Funds shall be raised by special offerings, missionary conventions, and other benevolent offerings.

D. District Percentage:

The District percentage shall be sent to the District Treasurer as undivided percentage at the end of each month, and shall be figured on the following percentages: (All churches whose regular Sunday School offerings and regular Church tithes and offerings average the following per week for the month shall remit as indicated).

Less than \$50.00 per week shall remit 7%
\$50.00 to \$99.99 per week shall remit 8%
\$100.00 to \$149.99 per week shall remit 9%

\$150.00 to \$199.99 per week shall remit 10%
\$200.00 and above per week shall remit 11%

These receipts shall be apportioned as follows:

61% for District Operating Fund
22% for District Church Extension
10% for Camp Meeting
4% for District Youth Work
3% for District Sunday School Work

E. Adjusting of Funds:

All adjusting of funds and renaming of funds shall be under the direction of the Board of Administration, and if between the sessions of the Annual District Conference there shall occur a deficit, the Board of Administration shall be authorized to raise the District percentage 1% for the balance of the year.

ITEM II Re: REMUNERATION OF OFFICIALS

The salary of the District Superintendent shall be \$7,650 per year, plus a suitable home in which to live, plus hospitalization insurance, social security, pension, and utilities (including fuel, electricity, water, water conditioning and sewage); and that of the Assistant District Superintendent shall be \$6,650 per year plus suitable home in which to live, plus hospitalization, social security, pension, and utilities (including fuel, electricity, water, water conditioning, and sewage); the same to be paid by the District Treasurer monthly, with expenses incidental to their work. Travel expense shall be paid at the rate of 7¢ per mile. The administration shall employ secretarial help as needed. These items shall be paid from the District Operating Fund, and are in keeping with the cost of living index.

ITEM III Re: RECOMMENDATION:

The Ways and Means Committee strongly recommends that two committees made up of qualified laymen only, one for the Northern Section of the District and one for the Southern Section of the District, be appointed by the District Superintendent and that may be used by the churches of the District as advisors in making up yearly budgets. The itinerary of these committees may be arranged by the District Superintendent or by agreement between the local church and the committee, taking into consideration the available time of the committee members.

We the Committee on Itineracy and Elder's Orders, (hereafter called the District Board of Ministerial Standing) submit the following recommendations and procedures:

Item I. ORDINATION OF ELDERS

We recommend that the following be elected to Elders Orders by this Conference and ordained on August 11: John L. Hall, James Hughes, James Judd, Robert McDuffee, David L. Thompson, Ralph Westafer.

Item II. ELDER IN PROGRESS OF TRANSFER

We recommend that Ronald Neeley be received as an Elder in Process of Transfer.

Item III. LICENSED MINISTERS

3. We recommend that the following be returned to their local churches because of failure to study or report: Jerry Adams, Allen P. Duvall, Edward D. Harlan, William Roe.

4. We recommend that the following be transferred to another District: Daniel Wheeler, Larry Womelsdorf.

5. We recommend that the following be transferred to another denomination: Richard Elliott, Norman Glassburn, James Shearouse.

Item V. SUPPLY PASTORS

We recommend that the following be continued only as supply pastors without Ministerial License: Richard Baldwin, Roy Bates, Phillip Harris, Eddie King, Walter L. Rogers, Jr.

Item VI. SPECIAL WORKERS

We recommend that the following be licensed as Song Evangelists: Robert S. Conley, Franklin Lusk, W. T. McMahan, Sally Joan O'Blenis.

Item VII. BOARD PROCEDURE

1. Authorization to perform marriages and administer the sacraments is granted only to licensed ministers who are appointed as pastors in a Wesleyan church (all Elders have this right) (1114).

2. To be continued a licensed minister one must complete two units (books) of study each year by June 15, and complete the course in seven years (1113).

3. In order to be continued as a ministerial student under Board direction a student must complete two units (books) each year and have them on record by June 15 before District Conference (1170).

4. Beginning as soon as possible the exams on all books will be handled by the Ministerial Study Course Agency (1148) of the General Church. Until then, exams will be handled by the District Board.

5. A recommendation for ministerial license by the local church is valid through the District Conference. If no appointment is made, the recommendation must be renewed before the next District Conference.

6. The Board asks that all recommendations be sent to the Secretary of the Board by June 15 each year, and notification of this requirement be sent with the forms to the pastors (534).

7. Ministers who have not completed the Course for Local Preachers (1152) cannot be granted a minister's license (112:3) and can only be appointed as supply pastors (1108:4). Supply pastors cannot vote in the District Conference or perform marriages or administer the sacraments and may be replaced at any time (1159).

8. It is requested that the title "Reverend" be used only by ordained persons. It is suggested that the title "Pastor" be used for licensed ministers appointed as pastors.

9. Steps to Ordination

(1) Member of a local Wesleyan Church (1112:1)

(2) Local preacher's license for at least one year (1112:2)

(3) Complete one year of the Course of Study (1112:3, 1152:1)

(4) Recommendation to the District Conference for District Minister's License when ready for appointment by the District Conference, or, if not ready, for listing as an unlicensed Ministerial Student (1112:4, 1170:4)

(5) Examination and recommendation by District Board of Ministerial Standing (1112:6)

(6) Appointment to regular service by the District Conference (1112:7)

(7) Complete at least two units of study each year, but complete Course of Study in seven years (1113:2, 1152:2)

(8) At least two years of successful appointment in regular service
(1119:2)

(9) Examination and recommendation by the District Board of
Ministerial Standing for Ordination as Elder (1119:4)

(10) Approval of ordination by District Conference (1119:5)

MINUTES OF INDIANA CONFERENCE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The Minutes of the Board of Trustees of the Indiana Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America will only include loans, mortgages, notes, and the purchase and sale of church property, as authorized by the Board of Trustees.

July 13, 1967—Authorized the LaOtto Church to borrow up to \$19,000 from the Farmers and Merchants Bank of LaOtto, at six and one fourth percent (6¼%) interest. (See Resolution)

August 29, 1967—Authorized a loan up to \$6,000 for the Green Chapel Church from the Farmers State Bank of LaGrange, Indiana, at six and one-half percent (6½%) interest. The money to be used for the construction of a new parsonage. (See Resolution)

August 29, 1967—Granted the request of the Elwood South Church to combine their two loans held with the First National Bank of Elwood. (See Resolution)

May 8, 1968—Authorized a loan of \$50,000 for the Westfield Church from the Union State Bank of Westfield at 7 percent (7%) interest, to finance the construction of the new church building.

May 8, 1968—Authorized loan up to \$40,000 for the Noblesville Cherry Street Church, from the American National Bank of Noblesville at seven percent (7%) interest, pending sale of the old church and parsonage and adjustment of the building plans as suggested by the Building Committee. (See Resolution)

May 8, 1968—Authorized \$1,000 from the Conference Operating Fund to the Dublin Church to be used for re-siding the church building and other general repair. This amount to be given to the church when they have raised the stipulated amount of \$1,773 for the same purpose.

Tuesday, July 16, 8:30 a.m.

Opening—Mrs. Kathryn Beaver, Conference WMS president called the meeting to order. Conference song leader, Mrs. Ruth Landis with Mrs. Kathleen Morris at the piano, led in singing the quadrennial theme song, "Hark, the Voice of Jesus Calling," and the "Missionary Doxology."

Worship in Word—Mrs. Olive Coleson conducted the morning devotions and read from Psalm 2 and Romans 12:1-2. Report of District Chairmen—The District Chairmen gave the financial reports of their respective districts. An expression of thanks was given to the chairmen for their fine year's work. (See Report No. 10)

Courtesy Committee—The Courtesy Committee presented Mrs. Paul Thomas, former Pilgrim Holiness missionary to the Philippines and now to the Wesleyan Church. Introduced also was Juanita Hoover, General Treasurer of the WMS.

Partial Report of Plan of Work—The Committee on Plan of Work gave a partial report.

YMWB Report—Mrs. Rachel Herring, YMWB Superintendent reported that finances hit an all-time high this year in credit funds. Two new bands were organized and 4 were re-organized. (See Report No. 11)

Magazine Solicitors Honored—Mrs. Myrtle Kenworthy, conference solicitor, honored the Hartford City solicitor, Hazel Moon, because of the greatest gain in subscriptions with 14 increases. In Mrs. Moon's absence Mrs. Evelyn Lake represented the church's winning solicitor.

World Missions Secretary Reports—Reverend Kenneth Mitchener, World Missions Secretary, reported on the S & H Green Stamp Project. He has suggested a reorganization in the promotional attack.

Women's World Fellowship Report—Mrs. Olive L. Coleson, Conference Women's World Fellowship Secretary, reported and upon motion the report was adopted.

Marion College Representation—Dr. Woodrow I. Goodman, President of Marion College, representatives of the Varsity Quartet, and Mrs. Allen Bowman were presented to the conference. The men sang "So Send I You" and "Let Me Lose Myself and Find it Lord in Thee." Mrs. Bowman was introduced and expressed appreciation for the wonderful support which the Indiana WMS had given for so long and in such abundance to Marion College. She also gave thanks for the proposed plans to furnish the kitchenette in the Bowman Hall. This honors Dr. Bowman for his many years of sacrificial service in the cause of Higher Education.

Dr. Goodman spoke upon the words in the Psalm "Stir up thy strength" and challenged the conference to continue their support and to further promote the development of the physical growth of the institution. An offering was received for the furnishing of the kitchenette in Bowman Hall amounting to a total of \$1,616. 85. (This includes the amount which was raised through the Dial-A-Quarter plan.)

Memorial Service

President, Kathryn Beaver, opened the Memorial Service with prayer. The conference sang "In the Sweet by and by" and "When we all get to Heaven." Mr. Lyle Williams from Marion College sang a solo, "Lead Me to Calvary." Edna Wildey read the scripture lesson from Proverbs 10:7 and Rev. 21:1-7 emphasizing the verse, "The memory of the just is blessed."

Mrs. Ruth Appleman read the poem "Through Shadows." 27 active members and 4 honorary members were memorialized. As the names were read a golden bell was placed on the rope in the displayed picture of heaven. Mr. Williams sang, "When They Ring Those Golden Bells."

Roll Call—4 conference officials, 65 presidents and 81 delegates answered to the roll call.

Minutes—The minutes were read and approved.

Report on Reading Course—Mrs. Alberta R. Metz stated that there were 69 societies which had reported with a total number participating of 988. 438 of the readers had completed the 5 assigned books in the course.

Poster Committee Report—Essie Sharp, chairman of the Poster Committee, reported that there were 31 societies which had prepared posters in the conference sponsored poster project. Assignments had been made to the 97 societies with 8 divisions of emphasis.

Community Missions Report—The report on Community Missions was given by the secretary, Mrs. Thelma Jones. She reported 58 societies had responded with a total of 31,483 contacts by personal visit, by phone, and by mail. Total time spent by the participants amounted to 10,248 hours with \$3,019.47 having been spent in charitable work by such members. There were 2391 homes in which prayer was offered, and 37 who received Christ as personal Saviour. 74 persons gave at least 50 hours of personal service to the cause of Community Missions during the year.

Dormitory Report—Vice President, Margaret Vardaman, who is in charge

of the dormitories, gave a report on the Dormitory Project for the year. A rising vote of thanks was given to her for the splendid work in directing the cleaning this year.

"Impressions"—Mrs. Myrtle Kenworthy gave impressions of her 17-day visit to the Caribbean Island churches. This occasion provided to the Kenworthys by the Plymouth Wesleyan Church and under the direction of the World Missions Department furnished to the conference a refreshing and renewing interest in the missionary cause in that area of need. She mentioned that every moment of the missionaries' lives they must have the wisdom, guidance and protection of God to fulfill His bidding." These peoples with different culture and different codes of morals are realizing transformed lives because God is working through the missionaries which are supported by finances and prayers of missionary societies in the States.

Courtesy Committee—Reverend and Mrs. William Morgan, missionaries to the Republic of South Africa, were introduced and spoke briefly.

Plan of Work—The report of the Plan of Work Committee was read by Edna Wildey. By motion the time of conference was extended to finish the report. Report was adopted. (See Report No. 4)

District Convention Membership Committee Report—Chairman, Alma Crow, read the committee's recommendation as follows:

"We recommend that the Standing Rules of the Society shall be enlarged to accept No. 8. It shall read:

'It shall be a standing rule of this body, until revoked, that there shall shall be a representative delegation to the Annual District Convention. Each local president shall be a voting member of the convention. The elected delegates shall be based on the active membership reported to the last District Convention. Societies with membership of 1-20 shall elect one delegate; societies with a membership of 21-40 shall elect two delegates, and societies with a membership of 41 or more shall elect three delegates.'

By unanimous vote of the conference the committee's recommendation was adopted and shall become No. 8 of the Standing Rules of the Society.

Public YMWB Service

Mrs. Rachel Herring, Conference YMWB Director, presented the Newtones Choir from the Lakeview church which gave several musical numbers. Mrs. Alberta Metz offered the prayer. The special offering for the chosen project of providing Melodicas for the Haitian work amounted to \$82.91. Young musician, Mary Clark from the Muncie (Bethel Heights) church beautifully played the piano offertory, "He Holds the Whole Wide World in His Hands."

Mrs. Lucile Day, a former missionary, spoke to the members of the Young Missionary Workers' Band.

Mrs. Herring made special recognition of the outstanding honor societies by presenting certificates.

Installation Service—The Installation Service was conducted by Daisy Cockrell. The theme of the service was "Colors in Your Installation."

President, Kathryn Beaver, was pinned with a gold pennant which stands for quality and purity. The sustaining scripture verse given to her is "He knoweth the way that I take; when he hath tried me, I shall come forth as gold." Job 23:10.

Vice President, Margaret Vardaman, received a silver pennant which is representative of redemption.

Secretary, Madelene Smith, was given a green pennant indicating freshness and new life.

Treasurer, Lucile Ireland, received a purple pennant which is indicative of riches, honor, and royalty.

Public Missionary Rally

The Public Missionary Rally was held in Bethel Tabernacle with the President, Mrs. Kathryn Beaver in charge. Reverend George Cole led in the congregational singing of "Sound the Battle Cry" and "If Jesus Goes With Me." Under the direction of Mrs. Ruth Landis a 12-voice specially chosen choir presented two choral arrangements—"O, for a Thousand Tongues to Sing" and "A Story to Tell." Dr. Leo G. Cox, Director of Ministerial Training at Marion College, offered the prayer.

Mrs. Beaver introduced Reverend and Mrs. William Morgan and their son, Murray. The Morgans are missionaries to the Republic of South Africa. In Reverend Morgan's message he stated that "The mission of the church is missions!" He quoted from Matthew 6:18, "I will build my church." He mentioned that the religion of the 18 million Africans was largely demon-worship, however, he stated that the light is coming into this dark continent because of the incoming of the gospel." There are 1600 members and between 50-60 preachers in the Christian church there now. The young people's work is the most challenging and he emphasized that with the young people hungry for the gospel, the future is bright.

The missionary offering of \$912.49 received in cash and pledges along with the \$852.21 raised from the Dial-A-Quarter plan will furnish the missionary home in the Republic of South Africa.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

To the members of the 79th annual session of the Woman's Missionary Society of the Indiana Conference, Greetings!

We have come together today perhaps with mixed emotions. June 26 found us with 648 delegates which had gathered at the Warner Auditorium in Anderson, Indiana to inaugurate a merging general conference.

This union brought together two denominations with outstanding missionary programs. The Wesleyan Church now has membership and missionaries in 30 nations on every continent.

But with this merging also came some changes, not only for the church at large, but also for the WMS. Our name is "Wesleyan Women's Missionary Society."

The July-August Missionary Magazine edited by Miss Marie Lind will be our last issue of this paper. However, there will be a new paper entitled "Wesleyan World Missions" which will be edited by the World Missions Department. There will be two pages of this official missionary paper given for missionary society news each month.

It is with sentimental feelings that we bid farewell to the Missionary Magazine, which we have had for 49 years. At the same time we realize that the former Pilgrim Holiness Church is bidding farewell to the NEWS SHEET with like feeling.

Beginning January 1969 THE PLAN will take the place of THE GUIDE. This will be a 24-page publication including program materials, literature promotion, leadership aids and general officer's notes. Further plans must be developed before we can announce program topics.

The New Constitution was adopted at the merging conference. Each president of a local society will receive a copy during our conference. There is a panel planned to help "point the way" for the coming year, which will be presented Wednesday afternoon.

We are happy to report that there were 31 churches that made the Honor Roll, one of these rated 100%. We are sorry that more did not try quite hard enough.

This past year our membership has increased numerically by 34. Our

missionary magazine subscriptions have increased 3.75%. Financially, we have made a gain in cash receipts of \$6,294.48.

There were nine special projects this past year: piano for music department in Marion College, Ministerial training in Haiti, home for Haiti, Self-help in New Guinea, Betty Nell Freeborn support, Cap Haitian church building and tuition at Marion College for Darlinda Thomas, native of Sierra Leone, West Africa. The total amount raised for these special projects was \$13,838.20.

The amount raised for all purposes in cash receipts amounted to \$66,994.24 and in vouchers \$19,692.00 and a Grand Total of \$92,004.39.

Reverend and Mrs. William Morgan who were missionaries of the Reformed Baptist Alliance church before its joining with the Wesleyan denomination will be our speaker for the Wednesday evening Missionary Rally in the Bethel Tabernacle.

Let us face the challenge of the future with optimism and with prayer. There is a greater challenge before us and it is up to us how we accept this challenge. The commission is the same. There are untold millions, yet unreached. Let us face the unknown future with the promise of God, "Lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world."

Adjourned—We adjourned upon motion.

Standing Rules

We, the Committee on Ways and Means recommend the following:

I. AREA

- A. The Area President is to receive entertainment and traveling expenses while traveling our conference, the same to be paid by the group asking his services.

II. DISTRICT CONVENTION

- A. The first session of the Wesleyan Youth Convention shall meet at the site of the annual convention; the first session shall convene at the call of the chair and sessions shall continue daily until all business is transacted.
- B. The President shall appoint the chairman of each committee, and the Executive Council shall nominate the rest of the committee; their report to be read and voted upon in the first session of the annual convention.
- C. There may^o be a standing committee of four teenagers elected each year to meet with Executive Council at least three times during the year (with no power of vote) and meet at least three times alone. They also shall meet one time with Youth Committee in which the Youth Camp will be discussed. The first member elected shall be chairman of the committee, and shall be invited to sit in on all Executive Committee meetings; to improve relations between the youth and the Church leaders; and to train teens to be better leaders in the future church.
- D. There shall be elected an assistant secretary whose duty shall be to assist the secretary and to complete the statistics. The secretary shall be given the privilege of making the nomination.
- E. The Wesleyan Youth Treasurer shall pay from the District Expense Fund each year the sum of \$50.00 for the Indiana Wesleyan Messenger and \$25.00 toward the expense of printing the minutes. The Wesleyan Youth Secretary shall co-operate with the conference secretaries in determining the number of pages used in the minutes.
- F. The Ways and Means Committee for the coming year shall be nominated by the Executive Committee prior to the first session of the youth convention.
- G. Copies of the Report of Ways and Means Committee shall be mailed within 30 days after the close of the main convention, one copy to each zone chairman, pastor, and local president. These reports shall be carefully presented to each local by its president as soon after the convention as possible.
- H. There shall be a Wesleyan Youth Camp Committee of seven members who shall be at least 21 years of age when elected.^o The Executive Committee shall be members ex officio; the president of Wesleyan Youth shall be chairman of said committee; the other three members to be elected for a term of three years. One shall be elected annually or until his successor is elected so that the term of all will not expire at the same time. The Wesleyan Youth Camp Committee shall elect

one of its members as treasurer of the Youth Camp.

- I. The Wesleyan Youth Camp Committee shall be seated as members of the convention.
- J. There shall be a Youth Camp and the date of the camp shall be set by the Wesleyan Youth Camp Committee.
- K. The Youth Camp Committee shall be authorized to make available the recreational equipment during conference and camp.
- L. The Executive Committee shall provide for at least a biennial Youth Convention.
- M. All pastors shall be granted the privilege of sitting within the convention bar and speaking on any question. Pastors having an organized local will be voting members of the District Convention, and shall be authorized to vote on the zone level, and if a member of a local WY, they may hold office on the zone level.

III. ZONE

- A. That the Executive Committee call a meeting of all Zone Chairmen semi-annually.
- B. Each zone shall nominate an Adult Counselor to be elected by the convention to counsel and assist in the plans of the zone. This advisor may be beyond the age of membership in Wesleyan Youth.

IV. LOCAL

- A. All organized locals shall keep, through its secretary, permanent records of membership.
- B. All organized locals shall keep permanent records of finance in the WY Treasurer's Book (to be obtained from Wesleyan Headquarters).
- C. That all monies raised for budget and special projects be sent to the District Youth Treasurer within 5 (five) days after the close of the District fiscal year.
- D. All churches shall send their Delegates' credentials and statistical reports to the district secretary at least 30 days before the convention convenes.
- E. The President shall submit a written report of the spiritual and financial status of the local to each regular church board meeting and to the regular church business meeting.
- F. The local president shall consult with the pastor when making out his annual Wesleyan Youth report, to avoid inconsistencies in the same.
- G. The Executive Committee of each local Wesleyan Youth should consult with the pastor and the local church Board* before planning its financial program for the year.
- H. The General Wesleyan Youth efficiency standard is to be adopted and promoted and each local rating is to be reported in the annual statistical report.

REPORT OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

We, the Committee on Ways and Means recommend the following:

I. RALLIES

- A. That the zone chairman be a member of the Wesleyan Church.
- B. That the zone chairman and his executive committee be responsible for the rallies, and that written notices of said rallies be sent to every church pastor and youth president, and to the district youth president **AT LEAST TWO SUNDAYS IN ADVANCE** in order to promote closer cooperation between the zone chairman and the president and the pastors. Rallies should be held at least quarterly.
- C. That the rallies be Christ-centered, providing an occasion for the propagation of Christianity and for fellowship among the locals.
- D. It is suggested that the zone chairman call a meeting of the local presidents, pastors, zone officers, and the zone adult counselor within 60 days after the rise of the convention for the purpose of planning **zone youth rallies** for the year. A notice of this should be sent to the District Youth President. If the zone chairman and his executive committee fail to plan for zone rallies, this responsibility will then be assumed by the District Youth President.
- E. That a special youth rally be held in each zone during the months

of April or May for the purpose of promoting the Indiana Wesleyan Youth Camp.

- F. That the following point system for zone banner be adopted:
1. Local President present, 10 points; Local Vice President present, 5 points; possible 15 points.
 2. Local Secretary and Treasurer both present, 5 points.
 3. Pastor or Assistant Pastor present, 10 points; and adult counselor present, 5 points. (total possible, 15 points)
 4. Each 2% of members present, excluding those in the armed forces and college, unless present, 1 point (total possible, 50 points).

5. Each non-member teen present, 2 points.

6. Each non-member (excluding teens) present, 1 point.

7. Each mile traveled from the Local to the rally site, $\frac{1}{2}$ point.

- G. That a loving cup be passed to the Local and the award be based on the percentage of subscribers to the youth magazine, WIN, as to the number of members plus the number of subscriptions to the youth magazine, WIN. (Divide the number of subscriptions to WIN by the number of WY members, and add the number of subscriptions to WIN). A Local may hold the loving cup no more than three consecutive rallies. It will then be passed to the next highest in the standing.

- H. That the district print and distribute to the locals suitable blanks to implement the point system.
- I. That a District-Wide Youth Rally be held on the Fairmount Camp-ground on Friday night of youth camp week. The Executive Committee and the Youth Camp Committee shall share the responsibility of this rally.
- J. That a plaque be presented to the outstanding local in the District, reading: "First in Excellence, Indiana Wesleyan Youth, 1969." This plaque to be presented at the District Youth Rally, and upon presentation to the Local becomes permanent property of the Local. Choice of the Local will be made by the Executive Committee on the following point basis:
1. Budget for past 2 years be paid in full. 25
 2. The zone banner and/or loving cup must be obtained at least twice during the year. 25
 3. Participation on Local, Zone, and District projects. 20
 4. Diligence in reporting delegates' credentials and statistical reports within at least 30 days before the district convention convenes. 20

5. Locals holds Certificate of Organization and current validating seal. -----	10
6. One service per quarter held in the interest of missions with an offering for missions sent to the District WY Treasurer. -----	25

II. LOCALS

- A. The local secretary shall be responsible to enroll any youth between the ages of thirteen and thirty inclusive, who is a member of the local church or Sunday School, or is in any way touched by the local church or Sunday School, and who desires to participate in the meetings and activities of Wesleyan Youth.
- B. That the Local Vice President shall be sales manager for the youth magazine, WIN, unless the local WY shall provide otherwise.
- C. That the local president shall be responsible for promoting projects suggested in Section III, "Projects," paragraph B.
- D. That the local president shall report ideas gathered from his local for the strengthening of the District youth program and Youth Camp. These recommendations shall be mailed within 30 days following the rise of the annual Convention, to the District WY President.

III. PROJECTS

- A. For District projects we recommend the following:
 1. That the Executive Committee be responsible to promote the Bible Quiz program and to provide the information to the local presidents of such.
 2. That there be a contest designed to encourage Christian talent among Wesleyan Youth and that it be called "Operation YT." (Operation Youth Talent).
 - a. That the said project include:
 1. Vocal solo
 - 1) boys
 - 2) girls
 2. Vocal group
 - 1) duet, and up to and including a sextet ensemble

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- 2) Chorale
 3. Piano solo
 4. Brass solo
 5. Brass group
 6. Woodwind solo
 7. Woodwind group
 8. Other instruments solo
 9. Other instruments group
 10. Reading
- b. The following rules shall apply:
1. Teens (13 years old through 19) only shall be eligible.
 2. All contestants shall be a member of an Indiana Wesleyan Youth Local.
 3. No contestants shall enter more than two divisions and only once in each division. Exception—Persons in groups of six or more may enter three divisions (once in each division).
 4. All entries shall be Christian in nature.
 5. Personnel, entries, and instruments cannot be changed between zone and district competition.
 6. Each contestant shall be introduced by a master of ceremonies, but each contestant shall introduce his own entry publicly.
 7. All entries will be limited to ten minutes.
 8. Judging sheets will be studied by the committee on youth talent and top-teen selection. Final jurisdiction will be placed under the Executive Committee for the coming year 1968-1969.
 9. Zones may fill a vacancy in the YT play-offs for district level.
- c. Judges
1. There shall be 3 (three) judges.
 2. Judges shall use a standard score sheet provided by the District WY Executive Committee.
 3. Judges shall not compare choice until each division is completed.
 4. It is further recommended that judges be secured from music studios—(professional musicians, music teachers, band or orchestra directors, and other qualified judges).
 5. The score sheet shall be returned to the contestant after the contest.
- d. Contests
1. The Zone contest shall be conducted during the youth camp promotional rally.
 2. The district contest shall be conducted during the youth camp.
 3. The first place winner in each division at the zone level shall be eligible for district competition with the exception of chorales who will go directly to district competition.
- e. Awards
1. Zone awards shall be certificates provided by the zone.
 2. Appropriate district awards shall be selected by the Executive Committee.
- f. The Executive Committee shall be responsible to promote

"Operation YT" and to provide the information to the local president.

3. It is recommended each year leading youth talent who have competed on the Zone or District level in "Operation YT" be organized to conduct teen ministries among youth and be called "Top Teens." Personnel shall be selected from applications submitted to the Executive Committee.
 4. The District Wesleyan Youth sponsor a Youth Week in a pioneer church using the finalists in "Operation YT", Bible Quiz, and the Wesleyan Youth Officers. This is to be a district work under the approval of the District Board of Administration, the Board of Christian Education, and the pastor of the pioneer church.
- B. For locals we recommend the following:
1. That the local plan and promote the interests of the Bible Quiz and "Operation YT."
 2. That it sponsor Gospel team activities with special meetings using members of the local, such as jail services, house to house and shut-in visitations, distributing tracts, personal evangelism, street meetings, and radio programs.
 3. That it plan, with the pastor, for a project within the local church.

IV. FINANCE

- A. That the salary of the District Officers be as follows:
1. President—\$200.00
 2. Vice President—\$125.00
 3. Secretary—\$125.00
 4. Assistant Secretary—\$25.00
 5. Treasurer—\$125.00

*IV., A., 6.—Deleted by action of District Board of Administration.

- B. That the desk, traveling, and secretarial expenses of the President, Vice President, Secretary, and Treasurer be paid from the Youth District Budget; and traveling expenses of the Youth Camp Committee be paid from the Youth Camp Treasury, and that said expenses be paid quarterly. That traveling expenses be figured on the basis of 7¢ per mile.
- C. That the budget for the following year be as follows:
1. That there be a District Working Fund assessment of 50¢ per member.
 2. One-eighth of the district budget to be designated for the Youth Camp and the rest used at the discretion of the Executive Committee.
 3. On the basis of the above apportionment exact assessments for each item shall be made for each local and mailed to the pastors and local presidents by the District Secretary within 30 days of the rise of the main convention session.
 4. The above funds be sent in quarterly on remittance blanks furnished by the District.
- D. That the Executive Committee shall have power to appropriate money from the District budget and working fund for general promotion of the youth work.
- E. That all monies raised by the local for missions be forwarded to the

Wesleyan Youth Treasurer for departmental credit, and that said money be raised by quarterly missionary offerings and be sent in quarterly with the Wesleyan Youth Budget.
