#### DAILY PROCEEDINGS

The forty-sixth annual session of the Alabama Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America convened in the tabernacle of the campgrounds at Camp Eden, in St. Clair County, Alabama at 11:00 a. m. August 9, 1955. The meeting was called to order by the President, Rev. J. A. Treese. The Conference Sermon was preached by Rev. V. O. Agan, followed by communion service.

#### SECOND MEETING TUESDAY 1:30 P. M. AUGUST 9, 1955

The meeting was called to order by the President for the transaction of business. Following devotional services conducted by the President the conference began the transaction of business.

#### REPORT NO. 1 CONFERENCE PRESIDENT'S REPORT

To the members of the forty-sixth annual session of the Alabama Conference. Greetings in the name of our Blessed Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ; to whom be glory both now and forever.

It is with a spirit of gratefulness we stand before you today. First, for this great privilege of laboring in God's vineyard. Second for the graciousness in which you have shown patience in placing confidence in your unworthy servant, granting him the responsibilities of traveling this great conference. We deeply appreciate your cooperation and friendship and the kind consideration always shown towards our limitations in leadership. This has added up to make these the greatest years of our life. We humbly beg forgiveness for our failures and where there may be any praise it belongs to God and not to us. Thirdly, we wish to express thanks to our Heavenly Father that has granted us safe travel over the 96,000 miles we have ridden during the past four years.

Since school days the Wesleyan Methodist Church has been our church. We have endeavored to rear our family Wesleyan. It has been to this church we have channeled everything to give loyal support with full intentions of spending our life for it. However, we feel under Divine Providence our labors will now be amongst another group of God's good number. It is with a sense of real heart felt call to respond to God that we break our ties of labor amongst you, (I trust not our fellowship) and move to Jackson, Miss. to labor with the Sanctified Church of Christ. Again we thank you for the privilege of laboring and giving ourselves to the Wesleyan Methodist Church and to the Alabama Conference for the last twelve years. My request is that you remember us in your prayers and with your sympathy extended unto us an open door as we will always do to you whom we are our people.

The Lord has blessed this year in many ways. First, there has been some good revivals in which some of our youth have been established in God. We have experienced last Fall the greatest Missionary Conventions which resulted in an enlarged vision for Missions. Then we have made a great many improvements, reduced our indebtedness over \$3,000.00 while improving our property. However, there are several discouraging things where improvement is a must. One, the item of membership is anything but encouraging. This year we again report a loss, our Sunday School average is down and the total for all purposes has dropped nearly \$1,200.00. Perhaps the drop in finances could be explained, while the other two items can hardly be accepted in the light of our potential strength. Pastor's salaries have shown a splendid increase. Brethren, I say it with all love, but one point observed would help stop the leaks, and that is a more diligent to winning souls to Christ.

Financially there is a much brighter picture. Properties are in the best condition ever and our indebtedness reduced. A few of the things done this year. The Jamestown church has improved their buildings with a new hardwood floor and gas furnaces, new doors and foundation. Mt. Carmel has put in new windows and new decorations. Fort Payne has added two new Sunday School rooms in the basement. Harpersville has built two Sunday School rooms to their building. Pell City has remodeled their parsonage. Talladega North Street church has exchanged parsonages, thus removing the Foundry building from the side of the church. Anniston First has enlarged the basement providing much needed room for their Sunday School. Anniston Norwood has purchased a parsonage. Cordova has built a parsonage in the best section of the city. Jasper has repaired their parsonage. Bessemer has refinished the interior of their church making it very attractive. Brent has built a new garage and refinished the interior of the church building. Ensley has placed new seats in their building. Fairview has installed new lights in the auditorium. Prattmont is building a two-story addition to the rear of the building for the Sunday School department. Stanton has installed gas heat and hot water system for church and parsonage. Friendship has pulled down their old building and erected a new building with asbestos siding valued at several thousand dollars with a very small unpaid balance. This is one of the charter churches of the conference and the seat of the conference organization in July 1910. I trust we have not missed any church or item of interest, for you can see there has been much done in improvements this year. Here is the brightest of all spots. The ministry of the conference is the most spiritual it has been for some time. During Camp Meeting it was evident that this group of fine men could get beneath the load and move things for God. The Lord has given us a most splendid group of young men, with their spiritual vision and zeal the possibilities look bright. If you will permit I will recommend that each district set a day of prayer for each quarter and observe it faithfully, for as we learn to pray together, believe together we can labor together with a potent spiritual force that will pay more than any thing we might program up. Our power is from above and the only source of tapping is going down before God. Brethren, when this is done devils nor demons can stop God's army, when one can put a thousand to flight and two, ten thousand. God is more interested in his workmen than He is in His Work. Therefore, I believe greater things lie ahead for this great conference. Our prayer and heart-felt desire for this conference is that in the midst of the most trying days of time there might come triumphant days through Jesus Christ and under your new leadership the Holy Spirit might make the most glorious days ever known by the conference.

#### **REPORT NO. 3**

#### LOCAL BOARD OF MANAGERS CENTRAL COLLEGE

The Local Board of Managers of Central College is composed of 14 men elected by the various conferences of the Scuthern District. The number from each conference being determined by the membership, one for each one thousand or major fraction thereof. Provided that each conference shall have at least (ne member. This at present gives North Carolina 5, South Carolina 3, Alabama, North Georgia, South Georgia, Tennessee and Florida one member. The College President is a member by virtue of his office making a total of fourteen.

The work of this board involves grave responsibilities. They meet regularly once a year in the month of January, at which time they nominate teachers and set up the program of the school for the following year. All matters of business, other than routine must be approved by this board; such as fixing tuition, board, fees. etc. Setting up entire budget for the year; determining what the position of the school is to be regarding social and influences, which often contact the institution. Planning and arranging for any building of improvements, etc. The Local Board of Managers is just what term implies. I have served as a member of the Executive Committee a Disciplinary provision not followed prior to 1947, with one member from the North Carolina, and one from the South Carolina Conference and the President. I have been asked by the board to serve on several special committes such as, "Building Committee, Future Planning Committee, Committee to appraise proposition of South Carolina Conference to sell. I also served as secretary of the Local Board for a number of years. The fellowship and congenial spirit of the members of the board has been most wholesome and enjoyable.

For seven years there has not been a single riffle that resembled any spirit of contention or strife. At times when facing grave problems, these men of the church have knelt together in earnest prayer for Divine help and guidance, and have arisen with new faith, vision and courage. The work has not always been easy. Often travel much of night, then work fourteen to sixteen hours a day. Not always convenient to attend meetings, but glad to serve the cause in any way we can for the glory of God, and the interest of our youth, who shall soon have to shoulder the responsibilities we now carry. I believe I have not missed a regular meeting of the board in the nineteen years of service, and only one or two call meetings, which were at times it was impossible to attend on short notice. #### REPORT NO. 8 MORAL REFORM

#### REPORT NO. 13 FINANCE

We, your Committee on Finance submit the following report:

Item I—Assessments.

We recommend that Conference Budget items, President's Salary, Conference Missions, Conference Work Fund, and Pastor's Sick Relief Fund be combined under one name, Conference Budget Fund, and that the assessment for this fund be \$6.00 per member for all the churches.

Item II-Distribution of Conference Budget Fund.

We recommend that the Conference President be paid a salary of \$2,500.00 with an additional \$750.00 for travel, plus all utilities from this Conference Budget.

We further recommend that 50 per cent of the balance of the receipts of the fund be allotted to Conference Missions and 50 per cent to the Conference Work Fund.

Item III-Sick Relief Fund.

Realizing the problem of properly administering the Sick Relief Fund to the ministerial members of the conference, we recommend that the conference adopt the plan of investing the Sick Relief Fund already on hand plus the needed amount from the Conference Work Fund receipts in a plan of group insurance that provides hospitalization, accident and death benefits to the ministers of the conference. This plan requires at least 25 participating members and its minimum rates are \$2.65 per month per member, of which the conference will pay approximately 50 per cent and the Elders, Pastors and Superannuated members will pay the remainder. All conference officials and committee members who are laymen shall be eligible, however they will be required to pay full premium. The Committee recommends that all funds from the Pastor's Sick Relief Fund be transferred to the Conference Work Fund to be used for Group Benefit Plan.

#### STANDING RULES

We, your Committee on Resolutions submit the following resolutions which shall remain the standing rules of the Conference until the same are repealed or otherwise changed:

1. Opening of Conference. All meetings open at 8:45 a.m. except the opening day of Conference and that at 2:30 p.m. 11:00 A.M.

2. Conference President. The Conference President be required, authorized and appointed to travel the conference as president, having general supervision of the spiritual interest and benevolence thereof, holding or providing for the holding of three quarterly meetings at each church during the conference year under such dates as he may announce thirty days in advance and according to the following schedule. The first quarter to close by November 30, the fourth quarter to begin not earlier than May 1. We further recommend that the first quarterly meeting consist of two services, if possible. That he assist the pastors in raising funds to meet the demands of the conference work. He may receive contributions for the budget in churches where there are no pastors. That he devote as much time to the promotional work of the conference as possible.

3. Committee Reports. All reports of committees shall be made in writing and handed to the secretary at the adoption by the conference.

4. Sunday School. Sunday School shall be held at the camp on Sunday and those attending the camp ground groups will be counted as attending in their respective churches. That all Sunday Schools under the supervision of Wesleyan Methodist pastors be counted in their statistical reports.

5. Quarterly Conference Reports. All treasurer's books shall be audited quarterly and all treasurers shall give a written report of all receipts and disbursements at each quarterly conference. 6. Credentials. Each annual conference preacher shall present his credentials at each annual conference session for renewal and proper signature. Paragraph 170 subdivision 2 of the Discipline shall be adhered to in renewing authorizations of annual conference preachers.

7. Illness or Death. The secretary shall be notified by telephone in case of critical illness or death in a minister's home and he shall mail notices at once to each pastor.

8. Financial Year. The financial and statistical year of each church shall close with the last Sunday in July and all receipts and budget money be mailed to the Treasurer not later than the following Wednesday, with a completed pastor's report form.

9. Ministerial Labors. The pastor's labors shall terminate with the Sunday following the close of the annual conference session.

10. Moving Pastor. Each church shall make provision for the moving of the incoming pastor, either by paying moving expenses or providing way to move him.

11. Vacation. The Conference President and all Pastors shall be given a two weeks vacation with pay, with one Sunday absent from their pulpit.

12. Conference Entertainment. Each member and each visitor to the annual conference shall be required to pay \$2.50 for entertainment purposes, and children over 12 years of age shall pay \$1.25.

13. Trustees. (A) Buying church property.

All property purchased by a local congregation shall be taken in the name of the Alabama Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, a corporation doing business in the State of Alabama.

The following paragraph shall be inserted in every deed, "That this property is taken in the name of the Alabama Conference exclusively for the benefit of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, subject to the direction of the local Board of Trustees with the pastor and the Annual Conference with the Board of Trustees."

If the said local church shall cease to exist as an organized Wesleyan Methodist Church, the conference, at the direction of the President and his Advisory Board, with the approval of twothirds of the conference Board of Trustees, either separately or in session, shall have authority to do as it deems advisable in the local situation, and if any money is received from the sale of said property, it shall be used as Conference Mission Fund to establish another new church.

(B) Mortgaging Church Property.

1. Resolved that the Conference Trustees be empowered and requested to sign and execute a mortgage in behalf of any local church or church group. When the said church or church group shall request it at a business meeting, announced at each regular meeting for at least 8 days prior to the meeting and further providing that at least two-thirds of the eligible local church voters are favorable. A copy of the said minutes of the local meeting shall be presented to the conference trustees together with a suitable mortgage properly drawn up for their approval and signatures.

2. The local church property only shall be security for the mortgage in question.

(C) Selling Church Property.

Resolved that if at any time the local church, at a public business meeting which has been announced by the chairman of the local Board of Trustees at each public meeting for at least 8 days previously, shall if a two-thirds vote of the eligible voting membership, desire to sell, transfer, or trade the local church property, or any part thereof, that a copy of the minutes of this meeting be presented to the Chairman of the Annual Conference Trustees together with a warranty deed properly drawn, and that he be to take into consideration the request together with the deed and if there is no moral issue involved, they shall sign the deed and thus convey a clear title to the said property.

14. Marriage. No minister may perform a marriage involving a divorcee except in cases where thorough investigation reveals that the divorce has been on scriptural grounds. This does not prohibit the remarrying of persons who have been divorced from each other.

15. Resolved that the Alabama Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church go on record as deploring the present drift toward worldliness as evidenced by the mad rush for earthly possessions, by the immodesty in dress, such as the wearing of slacks, sleeveless dresses, shorts, and other apparel which does not conform to scriptural standards of decency, and the adorning of the body with jewelry and rings, including the wedding ring, and the practice of wearing short hair among the women, and that we further go on record as most earnestly discouraging such practices, admonishing the people called Wesleyans to conform to the Holy standards of modesty, simplicity and humility as becometh saints to the glory of God.

16. When the Conference President is elected Editor of the Alabama Wesleyan, the pastor of the Pell City church shall be elected Business Manager for the Alabama Wesleyan.

17. It shall be the duty of the Conference President and his Advisory Board to elect immediately prior to the meeting of each annual conference session of the Alabama Conference the lay members of the Nominating Committee for the immediate session, from the list of those lay members elected as delegates to the conference, next to follow.

#### REPORT NO. 1 PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Another Conference year is history. We have heard much about team work since Mr. Eisenhower became president of the United States. It takes women filled with devotion to God to successfully operate a missionary society. No one person can do the multiplicity of things required. It requires that each do his part.
