JOURNAL OF DAILY PROCEEDINGS

Fairmount, Indiana, Aug. 11, 1941.

During the canvass of the various ballots the following named ministers were called and their characters passed: Ruth Drake, W. H. Drake, Milo Bowsman, C. R. Pearson, Flora Addington, and Anna Gerberich.

The time for the Special Order having arrived, Doctor F. R. Eddy, Connectional Representative, addressed us concerning our Connectional interests, emphasizing more particularly our Educational, Missionary and Publishing interests. The Address was very informative, giving many good things to inspire and encourage us in the work of the Church and of our Lord.

Adjourned by limitation of time. Benediction, Rev. H. T. Hawkins.

Thursday, 2:00 p. m.

Opening devotions were led by Rev. Truman Miller who read for a Scripture Lesson 1 Peter 1:9 and offered prayer.

The roll was called and the minutes read and corrected and approved as corrected.

The following persons presented proper credentials and their names were added to the roll of Delegates: Grace Dewey, Esther Irvine, Wayland Smith, Maxine Rupel, Daisy Lorenz.

The Conference then took up Unfinished Business which is the matter of Widows' Pensions as proposed in the following Resolution offered by Melvin H. Kohn.

"As we observe the ministers of the gospel, we notice that often the wives of such are forgotten. The minister having a call from the Heavenly Father finds it easy to make the sacrifice of a lifetime to keep his life in divine harmony. His wife oftentimes makes even greater sacrifices, not because of a heavenly call but with a sincere heart, desiring to be a faithful and loyal companion. And very often is left as a widow to be forgotten while the husband would have been pensioned if living.

"Let it be a Standing Rule of this Conference until revoked, That all widows whose husbands have faithfully labored in the Indiana Conference, be pensioned equally with the Superannuated Ministers and the pension be paid from the Superannuate Fund."

A motion was made and carried that the above Resolution be referred to the Committee on Finance and Appropriations. See Report No. 3.

The following Resolution was offered by John Schofield:

"Because of the press of Conference business and the never ending demands made upon him by various individuals and churches, our Conference President has not felt free to take the two weeks vacation which the Annual Conference has voted him the last few years. For the last three years he has remained on a job which has demanded more of the human than most of us are aware of and has had no rest from the cares of his work. Therefore, I

move that the President of the Conference be granted one full month of vacation with pay this year. Said vacation to be taken at such a time as he chooses and that the Conference instruct him to leave the cares and problems of his work at home and go for the purpose of relaxation and rest."

The above Resolution upon vote was adopted.

Communications were read from George E. Cole and Jesse White-cotton.

Rev. Clifford Hoover offered the following Resolution:

"Inasmuch as many of our parsonages are now equipped with furnaces, and since some heaters suitable for one house are not suitable for another we recommend that all churches be responsible for the heating facilities of the parsonages."

Due to the nature of the afore mentioned Resolution, a divided vote of the Conference was called for, the laymen voting first. By a majority vote of the laymen the Resolution was lost.

Recommendations to be received to study preparatory to travel were received for Floyd Miller, Blanche Miller and Roy Wheeler.

The Committee on Ministerial Character gave a partial report. Upon vote the partial report was adopted.

The Committee on Statistics then gave its report. Upon motion the

report was adopted. See Report No. 8.

A motion prevailed that the latter part of Resolution No. 9 appearing in the Conference Minutes on page 33 which reads as follows: "The roll of all the classes upon the charges shall be put in the hands of the pastors and they shall have charge of the same and make all entries therein" be stricken out.

The second reading of the report of the Committee on Finance and Appropriations was then given. See Report No. 3.

Adjourned upon motion.

Special Order-Report on Education, 7:30 p. m.

The Educational Program for the evening was directed by Rev. Howard Noggle, Conference Educational Secretary of the Indiana Conference.

The congregational singing was led by Clifford Hoover. Opening song, "Tis So Sweet To Trust In Jesus." Prayer was offered by Rev. Vivian Stanley. The Gospel Messenger Quartette of Marion College then rendered a beautiful selection of song, entitled "Guide Me O Thou Great Jehovah."

Mr. Ray Echols, a student of Marion College made a brief but inter-

esting address dealing with the Spiritual and Educational Standards of Marion College.

Professor L. A. Harvey of Central College favored us with a song entitled "Love of God." Short talks were given by J. D. Williams, Treasurer of Marion College and Professor C. D. Meredith, Dean of Theology.

Doctor William F. McConn, President of Marion College gave the concluding address. The addresses of the faculty members were interspersed with special selections of song by the Gospel Messengers Quartette.

As per former custom Honor Roll Banners were presented to each church that raised its Educational Budget in full.

The following Resolution was offered by Melvin H. Kohn.

"According to paragraph 116, page 65, of the Discipline, all widows of ministers are eligible for the Superannuate list unless the minister is a Conference Preacher or an Elder that is killed or dies suddenly.

Therefore, let it be a Standing Rule of this Conference until revoked: 1. That the Fund known as the Disabled Ministers' Fund be discontinued. 2. The Superannuated Fund be set at 15 cents per member. 3. A fund established known as the Conference Preacher Benefit Fund, to be set at 10 cents per member. (A) From this fund disabled Conference Preachers, their widows and orphans will receive an amount on the same basis as the

Superannuate Ministers' support. (B) Also widows of our ministers to be supported from this fund where they cannot qualify to receive support from the Superannuate Fund. (C) The disbursements to be made monthly by the Conference Treasurer under the direction of the Conference President and the Conference Board of Trustees. (D) Widows financially independent need not feel obligated to draw from this fund. 4. It shall be invalid to make loans from this fund."

It was moved and carried that the above Resolution be referred to the Committee on Finance and Appropriations.

The Committee on Itineracy and Elders Orders gave a partial reading of its report recommending Herbert Logsdon and Floyd Titus to Elders Orders. Upon vote the partial report was adopted. See Report No. 7.

The Special Committee elected by this Conference to bring in a nomination for Conference Educational Secretary submitted the following report: We, your committee which was elected to present a nomination for Conference Educational Secretary, present the name of Howard Noggle. The report upon motion was adopted.

By vote of the Conference, Rev. Howard Noggle was elected Conference Educational Secretary.

The Treasurer of the Conference Board of Trustees then gave his report.

A motion prevailed that the part of the Treasurer's Report that refers to the Shambaugh farm be accepted and recorded in the Conference Minutes. See Report No. 13.

It was moved and carried that the remainder of the report be accepted.

A report of the amount of live stock, corn, hay, etc. now on the Sham-baugh farm was given by Loren Van Matre, farm manager.

The report of the Treasurer of the Conference Sunday-school Board was given. The report was upon vote adopted. See Report No. 9.

The General Order was then called for. The following ministers were called and their characters passed: Noel Winterholter, Everett Mart, W. L. Roose, C. C. Fields, Floyd Titus, Robert Kendall, E. E. Barrett, Leo Welch.

The Committee on Elders Orders through Rev. H. T. Hawkins informed the Conference of the eligibility of Marie Phinney for Elders Orders.

The Committee was instructed to use their own descretion in presenting Sister Phinney for Ordination.

The President ordered a recess of a few minutes in which to prepare for the Ordination Service.

Special Order-Ordination Service, 10:45 a. m.

The Ordination Service opened with song followed with prayer by Rev. James Pickett. The Ordination Sermon was delivered by Rev. H. T. Hawkins who stressed the importance of the man of God being thoroughly furnished unto every good work. The Sermon was filled with good advice, not only for the candidates for ordination but for us all.

After the sermon the Conference ordained as Elders in the Wesleyan Methodist Church according to our usages, Herbert Logsdon, Floyd Titus and Marie Phinney.

Adjourned by limitation of time.

A motion to substitute in the Finance Report \$1500.00 for \$1400.00 for Vice-President's salary was made by J. W. Shatford and upon motion adopted.

Adjourned upon motion.

A motion was made and carried that the Secretary of the Conference receive \$75.00 and that the Assistant Secretary's salary be \$35.00 per year.

The minutes were read and corrected and approved as corrected. Adjournment upon motion. Benediction by Rev. C. S. Smith.

RESOLUTIONS AND LAWS OF THE INDIANA CONFERENCE

- 1. Our houses of worship should not be open to any evangelist or minister of any other church to hold a series of meetings or to maintain a regular appointment for another congregation; provided, however, that usual denominational courtesies be extended to other ministers in occasional appointments. A waiving of the above by a contract or lease of building must be obtained through the Board of Trustees of the Indiana Conference.
- 2. That the Committee on Itineracy and Elder's Orders shall require all those desiring to unite with us from any other denomination or Annual Conference to present credits equivalent to our Conference Course of Study, regardless of their standing in the body of which they have been a member, and if they cannot do this they shall be required to meet the same conditions as our local preachers before ordination.
- 3. Any candidate for Elder's Orders or traveling under the direction of the Conference, who fails to attend the Institutes and the examinations of the Committee, without sufficient cause, shall be deemed unworthy of the trust and care of souls, and refused a place among us as a minister of the Gospel, and when they shall fail to attend the Institute for two successive years they shall be dropped from the roll.
- 4. The Committee on Elder's Orders is to transfer all persons to the study list who may have been recommended to travel and may not have been given work.
- 5. All charges with a membership of twenty-five or more shall in addition to the regular stipulated salary, assume the responsibility of providing a suitable home in which the Pastor may live.
- 6. It is the duty of the Pastors to look after the insurance of our church and parsonage properties. All insurance shall provide for losses caused by fire and lightning, hail and tornado. A failure on the part of the Pastor shall be a censurable offense. If the church fails to insure their property upon reasonable effort of the pastor to secure the same, then said failure shall be reported to the President of the Conference who shall then have the property insured. In such case all insurance monies received from losses by fire, lightning, hail, and tornado shall be used in Church Extension work as the Conference Board of Trustees considers best.
- 7. All charges and stations to which a Pastor shall move shall pay the moving and transportation expenses of said Pastor, the same to be done in

addition to his salary. When the Conference demands the services of any one, that it shall bear the moving expenses, if any expense shall thus be incurred.

- 8. Each Pastor shall file a duplicate statistical report with the Committee before the close of the fifth day of August with the exception of Pastor's salary and Membership. These items to be reported the first day of Conference, said report to be kept on file one year. The Pastor shall report in open Conference the amount of Pastor's salary received, the amount of Budget assigned and raised, loss or gain in membership, the number of Wesleyan Methodist papers, Missionary magazines and Young People's Journals taken. The official character of any pastor shall not be passed until he shall have submitted a satisfactory report, including statistics.
- 9. All unaccounted for members appearing in the statistics in the membership list shall be referred to the discontinued list. All members in excess of the number reported shall be reported received.
- 10. The President shall receive \$35.00, the Secretary \$75.00, the Treasurer \$100.00, the Assistant Secretary \$35.00, each member of the Auditing Committee \$10.00, each member of the Statistical Committee \$25.00, Assistant to the Treasurer \$10.00, the same to be apportioned prorata among the various funds of the Conference. The Conference Sunday-school Secretary shall receive \$75.00 and each member of the Conference Sunday-school Board \$25.00, the same to be paid out of the Sunday-school Treasury.
- 11. In the examination of characters the Conference officials shall be called first.
- 12. The Conference shall elect three members of the Camp Meeting Committee, one to be elected each year for a term of three years.
- 13. The Pastor shall bring a report to each Quarterly Meeting and send a duplicate to the Conference President quarterly on blanks furnished by the Conference.
- 14. We believe that the healing of the body is among the gifts of the Spirit according to 1 Corinthians 12:7-11, hence not for all Christians at all times as it is not always the will of God to heal the body.
- 15. No charge shall call any one as pastor, or to supply the work by ministers coming from other denominations as long as there are ministers in our Conference qualified and available to take work. The President after he has exercised his prerogative in the reception of ministers coming from other denominations, is to immediately refer them to the Committee on Itineracy and Elder's Orders, who shall make a thorough investigation as to the ministry and life of such applicants, who shall report their findings to the President, after which, appointments may be made.

- 16. The Treasurers shall submit their reports to the Auditing Committee who shall audit the same and in their report to this body they shall show they have audited the same.
- 17. The Board of Trustees shall authorize all disbursements not otherwise provided for.
- 18. Each Pastor whose total pastor's receipts exceed \$1000.00 a year shall seek to organize a new class or give his services in a revival meeting to one of the weaker churches—whose total pastor's receipts are \$\$500.00 or less—to help establish it. And that the church which he pastors grant him such privileges without censure and with full remuneration of salary while in such a meeting.
- 19. The Storehouse Tithing Plan is the Conference plan for financing the Church work and the following percentage basis is the rule for distributing the same: Local Church Work, 70%; Budget, 30%. A Tithing Secretary be elected and that one evening service in the Conference Session be given for a Tithing Service and all Tithing Bands or churches of the Conference be called to give their yearly report, and some minister be chosen to preach on the Storehouse Tithing Plan. The expenses of Tithing Literature and Postage is to be paid from the Conference Claims Fund and churches desiring literature may secure the same from the Tithing Secretary. This service is a Special Order of the Conference.
- 20. The Assistant Secretary is to act as reporter of the Conference and Camp Meeting to the Marion daily papers.
- 21. Ten per cent of the "Conference Missions" Budget shall be applied on the arms liabilities as the nature of the liabilities demand, and, that the Conference Treasurer is to disburse the unrestricted receipts in the "Conference College Building Debt" item as the nature of the liabilities demand, with the approval of the Conference Board of Trustees.
- 22. The first Sunday of the Annual gathering belongs to the old year, and the second Sunday of the Annual gathering belongs to the new year.
- 23 The Camp Meeting Committee shall nominate and the Conference elect the one to preach the opening sermon of the next Conference Year with his alternate.
- 24. The President of the Conference shall be given each year a two weeks' vacation with pay, said vacation to be at a time of his own choosing.
- 25. When churches which have been placed in the hands of the President, if they can and do decide as to who shall be their pastor before the Minutes are sent to the press, the same shall be entered in the minutes the same as if ordered by this Conference.
 - 26. In case of an emergency the President and the Board of Trustees

are empowered to make a special assessment to meet the need, and the funds are to be sent to the Conference Treasurer and credited to the Sick Preachers Benefit fund.

- 27. Each charge shall grant to its pastor each year a two weeks' vacation with pay.
- 28. No pastor whose total receipts are \$1,200.00 shall hold more than two revivals yearly away from his charge, unless by consent of the President and his Advisory Committee.
- 29. All building and repair on Conference property which the local church is unable to provide for satisfactorily shall pass the approval of the Conference Building Committee before obligations are assumed.

Report No. 3

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FINANCE AND APPROPRIATIONS

We, the Committee on Finance and Appropriations, wish to submit the following recommendations:

Item I. President and Vice-President:

- A. That the President shall have supervision of the work of the Conference and shall be assisted by the Vice-President, who shall devote full time to Conference work in holding quarterly meetings and conducting evangelistic campaigns in the most needy fields. The President and Vice-President shall work together, jointly, and coöperatively in planning the program of quarterly meetings and evangelistic campaigns for the Conference year.
- B. That the President or Vice-President shall hold at least one quarterly meeting on each charge during the year, and shall assist the pastors in the raising of their budgets, and shall urge that each church provide adequate support for its pastor.
- C. That the salary of the President shall be \$1600.00 per year and expenses incidental to his work, and the salary of the Vice-President shall be \$1500.00 per year and expenses incidental to his work.

Item 2. Conference Claims:

That the Conference Claims Budget be forwarded quarterly to the Conference Treasurer, excepting that the Quarterly Meeting apportionment shall be paid to the President or Vice-President when he holds the quarterly meeting on the respective charges, such apportionment to be forwarded to the Conference Treasurer monthly; and the Conference Treasurer shall pay the salary and expenses of the President from this fund monthly.

Item 3. Conference Missions Fund:

The Conference Treasurer shall pay the Vice-President's salary and his expenses from the Conference Missions Fund monthly. The Vice-President shall receive offerings during his evangelistic campaigns and shall forward these offerings to the Conference Treasurer at least monthly in order that they may be added to the Conference Missions Fund.

These offerings shall not be credited on the budget of any church.

Item 4. Sunday-school Offerings:

That the Sunday-school offerings of the first Sunday of each month shall be divided by the local Treasurer equally between Home Missions and Conference Missions and shall be forwarded to the Conference Treasurer at least quarterly; and the Conference and Connectional Sunday-school Apportionment shall be ten cents per member of all enrolled in the main school.

Item 5. Storehouse Plan:

- A. That, since the Storehouse Tithing Plan has been adopted by this Conference as the financial plan of the Conference, we urge our churches to conform to this plan as soon as possible.
- B. That each church that is not using the Storehouse Tithing Plan shall elect a Board of Stewards of at least three members whose duty shall be to cooperate with the pastor in raising the budget, and that the pastor shall forward the same to the proper Treasurer at least quarterly.

Item 6. Budget:

- A. That the budget apportionment per member shall be as follows: Foreign Missions, \$2.00; Orphanage, 25 cents; Connectional Education, \$1.50; Conference Claims, 75 cents, Conference Missions, \$1.00; Home Missions, 50 cents; Conference College Building Debt, 25 cents; Superannuated Ministers' Fund, 25 cents; and Camp Meeting Expense Fund, 75 cents.
- B. That the Camp Meeting Committee shall have the privilege of putting out pledge cards in the congregations, receiving these pledges from friends, taking cash offerings throughout the camp, and designating one or two nights during the camp as dollar nights when the people may be asked to bring in a dollar offering on such nights.

These pledges and offerings are not to be credited on the budget of any church.

- C. That the Camp Meeting pledges and Camp Meeting budget fund be sent to the Treasurer of the Camp Meeting Association, and that the Orphanage budget be sent to the Treasurer of the Conference.
- D. That the price of the Conference Minutes shall be 25 cents per copy with an allotment of one copy of the minutes for every six members, and should any deficit occur in this fund that it be met pro rata by the various Conference arms.

All money which is listed for minutes in the pastor's statistical report shall be paid to the Conference Treasurer before the report is submitted to the Statistical Committee of the Conference.

Report No. 4

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD

In the good providence of God we are able to report another year of Sunday-school work which shows some gain.

The records reveal a gain in enrollment of 247 and the average attendance is up slightly.

In evangelistic effort, 707 scholars were converted which is some above last year and 252 joined the church. We would like our people to see the need and opportunity of evangelism in our Sunday schools and the need of effort to tie our scholars to the church.

In benevolences the reports reveal a gain of \$1010.08 over last year. We appreciate the response of our schools to our letter of appeal for Hephzibah Orphanage. We did not get a 100% response, but 68 Schools sent a Thanksgiving offering to help lift the burden. In the Teacher Training Department we had 13 to graduate in the College school under the leadership of Rev. H. T. Hawkins. In the new Course, Indiana has the honor of having the first graduate in the Connection in the person of Mrs. Olive Gingrich of LaFayette, Indiana who graduated from both Courses during the year. We have 30 students enrolled in the Hulburt Course and 9 in the Certificate Course of the new study book. Here is a good field for the pastor who wants to improve his teaching corps.

This year we are reporting on a new Department—the D. V. B. C. We have eight schools reporting with a total enrollment of 619, an average attendance of 486 and 28 scholars converted. Here is a rich field for service during the summer months and we urge our pastors to give attention to this department wherever it can be worked.

We recommend that the 10 cents per member assessment of the main school be continued for the financing of the Connectional and Conference work.

We recommend that a Convention be held in each district during the first two weeks of October. The dates and places for these Conventions have been arranged and the program is already outlined. We recommend that the districts remain the same as last year and that the District Superintendents be as follows:

Report No. 10

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

The Committee desires to submit the following resolutions:

- I. Evangelism. From the very beginning, the life and growth of the Church have been made possible by the fire of evangelism. The marvellous growth of the early Church can be attributed to whole-hearted, aggressive, Spirit-inspired evangelism on the part of both ministry and laity. They went everywhere preaching the Word, and the Lord added to the Church daily such as should be saved. As we look on the fields already white unto harvest, surely we must realize that this is no time for any one to be at ease in Zion. Furthermore, the financial increase with which God is now blessing the Church makes the necessary material means available. This is the time to enter new fields and to build a stronger Wesleyan Methodist Church.
- II. Education. The modern trend in many institutions of learning tends to destroy faith in the Bible and devotion to the standards of our Church. We therefore urge our people to support Marion College whole-heartedly with finance, with prayer, and with patronage, and we disapprove of such teaching in the schools of our land as would impair faith in the inspired Word and would undermine our doctrines and standards.
- III. Tithing. This Conference has adopted the storehouse tithing plan, and we believe it to be God's plan, designed to solve the financial problems of the Church. Yet, our statistics reveal that less than 40% of the church membership in the Conference are tithers. We therefore recommend that our pastors and evangelists enlighten and awaken our people by preaching clearly and consistently on this subject, and that every pastor urge his church to adopt this plan.
- IV. Church Standards. (A) We should guard against any tendency toward irreverence in our churches and Sunday schools. We especially warn our pastors, Sunday-school officials, and teachers to use extreme care

in their regulation and supervision of all spiritual and social activities of the church and Sunday-school. We consider the use of the term "class party" in designating the social gatherings of Sunday-school classes as illadvised and improper, since the term carries with it the atmosphere of the world. Equal care should be exercised in the preparation and in the supervision of the program in order to avoid an atmosphere of worldliness.

- (B) The wearing of rings of all types by people of the world has become increasingly popular, and hence the use of the wedding ring has more and more come to have the appearance of worldliness. It is our conviction that we, as God's people, should be willing for Jesus' sake to abstain from every practice that savors of conformity to the world. Let it be a standing rule until revoked that the use of the wedding ring is not in accord with our standards as a Church, and that we as a Conference disapprove of our ministers' performing or taking part in the ring ceremony.
- V. Morals and Reform. (A) "Remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy." (Ex. 20:8.) We deplore the increasing prevalence of the spirit of indifference toward the sanctity of the Christian Sabbath. Since the world has so largely forsaken the outward observance of the Sabbath day, there is ever-increasing danger that we as the people of God may drift in the same direction. Therefore we earnestly exhort our people to refrain carefully from any and every activity that would hinder their duties in worship on the Lord's Day. While we realize that there are certain forms of labor that may be a necessity on the Sabbath, we warn our people against the encroaching claims of modern life which would urge the discarding of our time-honored convictions with regard to the Sabbath day.
- (B) Recognizing the increasing drift toward the practices of the world in the conduct of business, forms of amusement, and habits of dress, we urge that the people of God carefully refrain from questionable amusements, mixed bathing in public places, the wearing of scanty or improper clothing, and the ever-increasing use of masculine attire by girls and women. One has said: "Opinions are ideas which men hold, but convictions are ideas which hold men." May the Holy Ghost crystallize our convictions until there shall be such unanimity of sentiment and practice among us that the world shall recognize that the people who call themselves Wesleyans are a folk truly separate from the world.
- (C) The last few years have witnessed an alarming growth of radicalism in the labor movement, especially in the Congress for Industrial Organization. It is increasingly apparent that many C. I. O. unions are dominated by leaders of Communist sympathies. While we do not condemn membership in labor unions as such, yet we do desire to warn our people against participation in union activities of a violent or riotous nature, and against any union affiliations that would obligate one to engage in such lawless activities.
 - (D) The war spirit is growing in the United States in a way that is

truly alarming to all lovers of peace, and is being fostered by certain public officials and by others who wield large influence in affairs of state. This growing sentiment has already involved us to a limited extent in the Second World War, and, if continued, will inevitably plunge our nation fully into war. We deplore this growing war hysteria, and condemn efforts to involve our country in war; and we encourage a spirit of genuine neutrality among our citizens, to the end that the United States may remain at peace with all nations.

(E) The sale and consumption of alcoholic beverages continue to increase, to the great detriment of the health, safety, and morals of the American people. Liquor advertisements are flaunted on every hand with the avowed intention of making every person a drinker. Accidents due to drunkenness are taking the lives of thousands annually. Ill-regulated taverns are debauching multitudes. The sale of liquor in the vicinity of army camps is a menace to the welfare of all enlisted men. The present State systems of liquor control are totally inadequate. It is our conviction that prohibition repeal has proved itself a miserable failure. We demand a return to national prohibition and the adoption of an intensive program of temperance eduncation as the only feasible procedure for dealing with this growing menace.

In conclusion, we would reaffirm our faith in the Bible as the infallible and inspired Word of God and in the great doctrines of salvation as interpreted and presented in the Articles of Religion in our book of Discipline.

Report No. 12

REPORT OF FINANCE COMMITTEE ON WIDOWS PENSION RESOLUTIONS

We, the Committee on Finance and Appropriations, have carefully considered the resolution which was submitted to the Indiana Conference by Rev. Melvin H. Kohn, and which provided that all widows whose husbands have faithfully labored in the Indiana Conference, be pensioned equally with the Superannuated Ministers and that the pension be paid from the Superannuated Ministers' Fund.

We are in hearty sympathy with the purpose and intent of this resolution, but inasmuch as it is contrary to the regulation included in paragraph 146 of the Wesleyan Methodist Discipline (p. 79), which provides that there shall be "a fund in each Annual Conference for the support of superannuated ministers, their widows and orphans, to be distributed equally, or according to necessity, by each Annual Conference at its annual sessions," we therefore recommend the rejection of the above-mentioned resolution on the ground that it is contrary to the disciplinary provision for the distribution of the Superannuated Ministers' Fund.

However, we recommend that the Indiana Conference at each annual session provide for such special offerings as the Board of Trustees may deem necessary to give suitable financial aid to all needy widows whose husbands have faithfully labored in the Indiana Conference.

Action of the Finance Committee on the second resolution of Rev. Melvin H. Kohn, which was referred to the Committee on Finance and Appropriations, is as follows:

We, the Committee on Finance and Appropriations, have carefully considered this resolution. In view of the fact that the present plan which provides for the support of the superannuated ministers, their widows and orphans, other widows and needy people who are incapacitated to take work, has functioned successfully for a number of years, and is functioning successfully at the present time; and in view of the additional financial burden of Conference evangelism which is being recommended to the Con-

ference for the coming year, we feel that it would be unwise at present, to change the present plan which provides for needy people within the Conference.

We further recommend that, if necessary, the Indiana Conference at each annual session provide for such special offerings as the Board of Trustees may deem necessary to give proper financial aid to all widows, or disabled ministers who deserve financial aid from the Conference.
