MEMORIAL SKETCHES

This copy of the Annual Conference Minutes is lovingly dedicated to the memory of the five faithful ministers and three diligent laymen whose Memorial Sketch appears here. In so dedicating this Journal, all laymen throughout the Conference who died this year are included.

Dr. Ira Ford McLeister

The senior minister of Allegheny has passed to his eternal reward. Ira Ford McLeister began his earthly pilgrimage in a farm home near Taylorsville, Pennsylvania, April 22, 1879. The journey ended at Alliance, Ohio in the home of his niece, the Rev. Mrs. Evangeline (Dunkerly) De Hass, May 7, 1963. Cultured by rugged, godly parents, he early felt the call to Christian service. He came to the Allegheny Conference in 1903, maintaining a fifty-year membership. Service to 1919 included pastorates at Mechanicsburg, Akron First and Pine Grove, with a short diversion to the west where he taught school and pastored a small church. The General Conference of 1919 elected him to the office of Connectional Sunday School Secretary and Editor of Sunday School literature. After eight years here he was chosen Editor of the Wesleyan Methodist where he served until 1943. Upon retiring from the Editorial work Dr. McLeister continued to reside in Syracuse, N. Y., until 1959, engaging in whatever ministerial activity came his way. Moving to New Castle, Pennsylvania, in 1953 he resided with his sister, Mrs. Elsie Dunkerly, later going to Alliance for his declining years. Besides his editorial work, Dr. Mc-Leister authored a History of the Wesleyan Methodist Church which is still standard, after revision by Dr. Roy S. Nicholson. He will live on in the hearts of those who labored with him and knew him best.

Charles Edgar Zike

Born in Peru, Indiana, September 27, 1886, Charles Edgar Zike went to his heavenly reward from Brookville, Florida, August 18, 1962. Brother Zike entered the ministry at an early age, laboring as pastor and evangelist in the North Michigan Conference. He traveled extensively with the Zike-Meyers Evangelistic Party. Coming to the Allegheny Conference in 1932, he was appointed to the Barberton pastorate and later served at Canton First Church. After another period of evangelistic service, he accepted the Akron First Church pastorate from 1942 to 1945, and again took up evangelism. Superannuated in 1954, he took up residence in Pontiac, Michigan, later moving to Hobe Sound, Florida. A short time before his death he moved to Brookville, Florida where he spent his last days.

Dwight L. Robertson

Salisbury, Pennsylvania was the place of birth for Dwight L. Robertson, January 13, 1906. He died January 24, 1963 while serving as pastor of the Massillon Wesleyan Church. He entered upon pastoral labors at Pittsfield, Pa., in 1930. He served also at Penn Run, Ashville, Tarentum, Allida Smith Memorial, Erie, Barberton, and Brownsville, covering a span of thirty-three years. Brother Robertson was suddenly stricken in the fall of 1962 and after months of illness and hospitalization said good-bye to this old world. His pleasing personality and godly life made a deep impression wherever he served.

Lorman James Elliott

Lorman James Elliott was born September 27, 1922 in Arequipa, Peru, South America, of Missionary parents, serving under the Evangelical Union. Returning to America at the age of six he persued educational activities in Indiana. He graduated from Marion College in 1940, served Noblesville, Indiana Wesleyan Church pastorate for two years and was ordained in 1948. Removing to Pennsylvania that year, he accepted the Stewart Run pastorate. Following pastorates were Gipsy, Luciusboro, Middlefield and Ellwood City. Hospitalized for major surgery at sixteen, Lorman's days of suffering and hospital confinement were many and severe. But despite this, he lived a most cheerful and full life. He will not soon be forgotten in the Conference and by those churches which were honored by his faithful and godly service. He went to his reward from the Titusville hospital April 27, 1963.

John Irvin Rambo

John Irvin Rambo began life at Wellsville, Ohio, February 5, 1885 and passed away from St. Mary's hospital, West Palm Beach, Florida, January 14, 1963, following an auto accident in which his wife was seriously injured. Converted at the age of sixteen, he maintained a vital contact with God until the end. He took his first pastorate at Keepville in 1911 and served variously in Al-Later, he Conference. leghenv transferred to the North Carolina Conference where he served appointments in North Carolina, Tennessee and Virginia. During this service, he built two parsonages and one church. He returned to Allegheny in 1938, moving to Rochester where he transformed an old farm into what is now Big Knob Camp. He served the Riverview Church for a brief period. Going to Florida in 1950 he became the first president of the newly-organized Florida Conference, organized by the late Rev. J. Robert Swauger, Home Missionary Secretary. Returning to Allegheny in 1952, he was superannuated, but retained residence in Florida. Having moved to Hobe Sound, Florida, he was on his way to Key West for a Mission Meeting with the Shreves when the accident occurred which was to end his earthly pilgrimage.

Prominent Laity called Home Pearl W. Fero

Pearl W. (Strong) Fero, wife of the late Rev. Albert D. Fero, was called home on January 2, 1963 from Marion, Indiana, where she resided with her daughter, Missionary Magazine Editor, the Rev. Mrs. Gracia L. (Fero) Banker. Converted at an early age, she set out to faithfully serve the Lord. This purpose she fulfilled. Schooling at Houghton, she met and later married the Rev. A. D. Fero, sharing with him a long list of pastorates in Lockport and Allegheny Conference until 1942 when she laid away her beloved husband at Akron, Ohio. She had a lively interest in Missions and served both as president and as vice president of the Conference W. M. S. Though never ordained, she was indeed an helpmeet to her husband and as occasion demanded, filled the pulpit with grace and credit. Truly, it can be said of her, "She hath done what she could."

Mont L. Moore

Birth June 14, 1887. Death January 27, 1963. Brother Moore slipped off to glory by a heart attack while on his way to the evening service in his home Church. A long-time member of Cleveland First Church, he had served loyally in any capacity called for. With the exception of four years, he was Delegate to the annual Conference from organization of the Church in 1934 to 1962. He was four times a General Conference Delegate and had been elected to serve at the June 1963 session. Before coming to the Cleveland First Church, he was affiliated with the Barberton Wesleyan Church.

Miss Clara Campbell

Clara was one of those ladies who guard their age very carefully, but the death date is apparent. She passed from this earth from the Sarah Reed Home, Erie, Pennsylvania, April 9, 1963. She was one of the early Missionaries of Wesleyan Methodism, entering the field at Sierra Leone, West Africa in 1913. Here she served until 1922 with adequate furloughs. She was chosen a General Conference delegate for the W. M. S. on one occasion and also served in official capacity in various offices of the local W. M. S. Conference. She served one year as pastor of a Wesleyan Mission Church in Barnesboro, leaving there for two years at the East Clarksburg, W. Va., Weslevan Church. Retiring from public service, she moved to Grove City, Pennsylvania and attended the old Zion Church. For her declining years, she applied for and obtained residence in the Sarah Reed home in Erie where she remained until her home going.

It can be said of all these, both ministers and laity, "These all died according to the faith." They have "ceased from their labors," and have entered into their eternal reward. Wesleyan Methodist Church

The Allegheny Conference

Standing Resolutions

1. A Committee on Auditing and Finance, consisting of three ministerial members, the Chairman being an Elder, shall be elected each year, the duties of which shall be to examine and report on the Treasurer's books and all the financial reports, except the W.M.S. and Y.M.W.B., and to be a Standing Committee to advise on Financial plans.

2. All persons received into membership in the churches of our Conference excepting those whose life of Christian fidelity has been of sufficient long standing, shall be received at first as associate members only.

3. When it becomes necessary for a church to call a pastor, it shall be the duty of the calling church to make provision for the expense incurred by the pastor in removing to a new field of labor. Money raised for this purpose shall NOT be applied on the pastor's salary. When an Elder is elected to the Conference Presidency, expenses incurred in moving to the Conference Parsonage, shall be paid from the Conference Treasury.

4. The Conference Sunday shall be the closing Sunday of Conference year, and the out-going pastor shall be paid his salary for that Sunday by the charge he is leaving.

5. At the beginning of the Conference session the president shall appoint a Nominating Committee of not less than three members, two Elders and one Layman to bring to the Conference a slate of Nominations for Committees, etc., for the Conference Temporary Organizations. Delegates Credentials shall be mailed to the Secretary not later than ten days before the convening of Conference. The Secretary shall be Chairman of the Credentials Committee and shall compile the Roll of Delegates from the regularly filled Credentials received.

6. No person shall be received into membership in Allegheny Conference until he shall have properly filled out an application blank, which application together with recommendations of his references must pass the approval of the President and his Advisory Board. Exceptions to this rule may be made by the President and his Advisory Board when they deem best.

7. The pastor of any church in the Conference shall be free to hold at least one revival meeting during the year, wherever he sees fit, and it is recommended that his salary be paid to him while he is absent.

8. Each pastor shall send a monthly report on the blank provided, to the Conference President showing the progress and the state of the work under his care.

9. Each church may elect a Nominating Committee whose duty it shall be to nominate candidates for church officers for presentation to the church at the time of the annual election of officers. Such nominations shall not exclude other nominations at the time of the business meeting.

10. Churches having business with the Conference Board of Trustees requiring a visit of that body to their church, shall be responsible for the expense attached to such calls, unless released by the Board.

11. Inasmuch as trial sermons are hardly fair to the church or candi-

date and since the practice of having trial sermons is contrary to the usual manner of locating preachers, we recommend that no preacher shall accept any such invitations, if given. Exceptions to this rule may be granted by the Conference President upon request of any church.

12. Since considerable expense of transferring automobile title and license attends the moving of a pastor from one state to another, we recommend that where possible the calling church bear this expense.

13. We recommend that all districts emphasize Sunday School activity, and that Conventions be arranged for in conjunction with the visitation of the Conference Sunday School Secretary, who shall visit one Convention of each District during the year, at Convention expense.

14. We recommend that no one be elected to Elders Orders who does not have an abiding sense of divine call to give himself wholly to the function and ministry of an Elder in the **WESLEYAN METHOD-IST CHURCH**, and that no one shall be ordained to this office and work who is not applying himself wholly to this one thing in cares and studies, and clearly determining by God's grace to give himself wholly to this holy ministry, if possible, long before the appointed day of ordination, and manifesting such a determination of faithful Christian service to the church or congregation whom he was called to serve during his years of preparation, so that as much as lieth in him, he has and will apply himself wholly to the work of the ministry, except in all cases of absolute necessity of such diversions to a legitimate avocation for livelihood which neither jeopardizes the Lord's work nor blames the ministry.

15. We recommend that each church equip its parsonage with the necessary heating and cooking equipment, because of the variation of requirements in this equipment for the individual parsonage.

16. We recommend that in election of local church Advisory Committee each church permit the pastor to nominate the members of this committee.

17. The Conference Secretary, as Chairman, with the Conference President shall be a Standing Committee on Publications, whose duty it shall be to examine all matters pertaining to Conference printing and publications, and let all contracts for same.

18. All churches shall have a systematic means of keeping records, as required by Discipline, Paragraph No. 74, The "Ideal Church Record" published by the Bethel Publishing Company, Elkhart, Indiana, is a suggested form.

19. Local church treasurer's books shall close April 30, thus making the Conference fiscal year from May 1, to April 30. All funds received after this date shall be counted in the following year. Funds will be credited on Sub-Treasurer's books if received by May 5.

To meet the requirements of Paragraph 164 of the Discipline regarding revision of the Roll of membership, April 30, may be considered the close of the Conference year for Statistical purpose.

20. Minister's Pocket Credentials shall be issued to Elders and annually to Conference Preachers who are eligible.

21. Since the use of the wedding ring is not in accord with the standards of our church, we therefore, as a Conference, disapprove of

our ministers performing or taking part in the ring ceremony.

22. The pastoral vote shall be taken on each charge on the third Sunday in April. When it is the desire of the church to vote on a week night, it will be done sometime during the week previous to the designated Sunday. Permission to vote on another Sunday may be obtained from the President and the Advisory Board.

23. Each church shall allow their pastor a reasonable vacation with pay to be taken at his convenience. Two weeks is suggested.

24. In the judgment of the Allegheny Conference, viewing television programs of the type commonly offered in response to the public clamor for entertainment is an impediment to the development of holy character. We deplore the current television programs' evil effect upon the moral and spiritual life of the Nation. The principles of Wesleyan Methodism—being an epitome of the Christian religion—obligate Wesleyan Methodists to an unblameable life which constantly rebukes every form of evil and zealously advocates holiness of heart and life. Therefore, we most earnestly request our ministers and members, as those who must give account unto God in the Day of Judgment for anything which tends to influence toward evil, to refrain from the purchase of television sets and from viewing such programs for Jesus' sake.

Inasmuch as ministers are examples and patterns to the flock of Christ, the Allegheny Conference expects each of its ministers to set a wholesome example and to be a godly pattern in this respect, so that those to whom he ministers will follow his example and avoid exposure to this which menaces vital godliness.

25. The third Sunday of September shall be designated, each year, as Pioneer Sunday to present the work of the Pioneer department to our congregations and pastors be urged to exchange pulpits on this Sunday as much as possible.

26. Any Elder or Conference Preacher desiring a transfer from the Allegheny Conference to another Annual Conference, or to receive a letter of Standing, must have all notes paid to the Minister's Aid Fund, or have made satisfactory arrangements with the Chairman of the Auditing and Finance Committee for their repayment.

REPORT NO. 1

THE CONFERENCE PRESIDENT REPORTS

Dear Brothers and Sisters of the Allegheny Annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America here assembled for its One Hundred and Twentieth Annual Session, we greet you in the Name of Him Who "loved us and loosed us from our sins" and in the words of the Apostle Paul who said: "In all this, remember how critical the moment is. It is nearer to us now than it was when first we believed. It is far on in the night; day is near. Let us therefore throw off the deeds of darkness and put on our armour as soldiers of light. Let us behave with decency as befits the day; no revelling or drunkenness, no debauchery or vice, no quarrels or jealousies! Let Christ Jesus Himself be the armour that you wear, give no more thought to satisfying bodily appetites." (Romans 13:11-14, N.E.B.)

It would be well for us to pause and give thanks to God that it is still our privilege to meet unmolested and unchallenged upon this Old Hilltop once more to preach the Gospel and to do business for our God. No doubt, we are meeting in the most momentous times in all history. We live in the day when there is a tremendous attempt to "eliminate any concept of God" from the people. We are living in an age of worldwide darkness and unbelief. As never before in our lives unbelief deepens throughout the dark world. Professor Hocking of Harvard University said: "There is more lostness, more widespread and deliberate lostness, in the world than ever before. Modern men have simply found new ways of being lost. Material progress does not carry with it religious progress." Recently, a Congressman stated: "Unless our nation rediscovers its need of absolute trust in the Lord, it is on its way out."

The Apostle warned us what to expect in these last days when he said: "But understand this, that in the last days there will set in perilous times of great stress and trouble-hard to deal with and hard to bear" (II Timothy 3:1, Amplified). "But wicked men and imposters will go on from bad to worse, deceiving and leading astray others and being deceived and led astray themselves" (II Tim. 3:13, Amplified). "But the Holy Spirit distinctly and expressly declares that in latter times some will turn away from the faith, giving attention to deluding and seducing spirits and doctrines that demons teach" (I Tim. 4:1, Amplified). "For the time is coming when (people) will not tolerate (endure) sound and wholesome instruction, but having itching ears (for something pleasing and gratifying) they will gather to themselves one teacher after another to a considerable number, chosen to satisfy their own liking and to foster errors they hold, and will turn aside from hearing the truth and wander off into myths and man-made fictions" (II Tim. 4:3, 4, Amplified). Jesus, Himself, said: "When the Son of man comes will He find (persistence in) the faith on the earth?" (Luke 18:8b, Amplified).

As we face these Scriptures and honestly place them alongside of what is happening in the world and in the church, we have to admit that it looks as if the dark midnight hour of this dispensation is fast closing in upon us and that the Gentile age is fast goose-stepping to its end. We believe that "It is far on in the night." If this is the case, then our duty is crystal clear. It is time:

(1) TO PREPARE—"Knowing the time, that now it is high time to awake out of sleep." "But you are not in (given up to the power of) darkness, brethren, for that day to overtake you by surprise like a thief. For you are all sons of light and sons of the day; we do not belong either to the night or to the darkness. Accordingly then, let us not sleep, as the rest do, but let us keep wide awake (alert, watchful, cautious and on our guard) and let us be sober (calm, collected and circumspect)" (I Thess. 5:4-6, Amplified). "Keep awake then and watch at all times (that is, be discreet, attentive and ready): praying that you may have the full strength and ability and be accounted worthy to escape all these things (taken together) that will take place, and to stand in the presence of the Son of Man" (Luke 21:36, Amplified). It is our duty to be wide awake and alert in this hour.

(2) TO DO RIGHT—"Cast off the works of darkness." "But take heed to yourselves and be on your guard lest your hearts be overburdened and depressed—weighed down—with the giddiness and headache and worries and cares pertaining to (the business of) this life, and that day come upon you suddenly like a trap or noose" (Luke 21:3, 4, Amplified). The late Dr. O. G. Wilson stated: "If evangelical Christianity is to stay alive she must repudiate place-seekers and time-servers who dare not speak out against wrong. She must produce aggressive leaders who fear only sin, and obey only God; who expose every form of error, and courageously stand for truth under all circumstances."

In his report to his own Conference last year, Rev. Donald Fisher said: "We are ministering in a pagan society that is morally and spiritually corrupt. May God save us from aping them either in their attitudes or actions. May God save us from Monkish isolation that merely withdraws to our creeds and cloisters. May God save us from hopeless faith-crippling despair that just assumes—we can do nothing about it. May God save us from wasting our time and energy in loveless criticism and cannibalism."

In Titus 2:11-13, the Apostle tells us: "For the loving kindness of God has been revealed, bringing salvation for all; leading us to renounce irreligious ways and worldly ambitions, and to live discreet, upright, and religious lives here in this present world, while we are awaiting our Blessed Hope—the appearing in glory of our great God and Saviour, Christ Jesus. For He gave Himself on our behalf, to deliver us from all wickedness, and to purify for Himself a people who should be peculiarly His own and eager to do good" (The Twentieth Century N. T.).

(3) TO GIRD FOR THE BATTLE—"Put on the Lord Jesus Christ." The Apostle tells us: "But as for you, continue to hold to the things that you have learned and of which you are convinced, knowing from whom you learned (them) . . . Herald and preach the Word! Keep your sense of urgency . . be calm and cool and steady, accept and suffer unflinchingly every hardship, do the work of an evangelist . . . refuse—shut your mind against have nothing to do with trifling (ill-informed, unedifying, stupid controversies over ignorant questionings, for you know that they foster strife and breed quarrels . . . keeping fast hold on faith . . . stir up—rekindle the embers, fan the flame and keep burning the gracious gift of God, (the inner fire) that is in you Guard and keep (with the greatest care) the precious and excellently adapted (truth) which has been entrusted (to you), by the (help of the) Holy Spirit, Who makes His home in us." (II Tim. 3:14; 4:2a, 5; 2:23; I Tim. 1:19a; II Tim. 1:6a; II Tim. 1:13a, 14, Amplified). These are good days to prove to a lost world that God's marvellous grace is really sufficient.

We need to get back to the Church's charter of supernatural operation. The time has come for the Holy Spirit to be given His rightful place in our churches for "The hope of the world is not to be found in political leaders and scientific developments, not in any social uplift, but solely through a spiritual awakening which shall bring the entire world into a right relationship with God." We must present Christ more consistently, more powerfully, more persistently than we have ever done before if we are going to reach the lost for Christ. We cannot reason them into an experience. We must present Christ.

As Rev. Leonard Ravenhill said, "The answer to our dilemma is not a new revelation from heaven. The answer is seeking the old paths and digging out the old wells which superior knowledge, human pride, and flat disobedience have stopped up. There is a balm in Gilead. The question is not, Can we afford to pay the price of Pentecost? The question is rather, Can we afford not to pay the price of Pentecost? There is no hope of immediate revival until the lostness of men grips us believers like a fever and moves us to personal and church housecleaning. If ever there were an emergency hour in the history of man, then, this is it. If our natural birth rate were as low as the spiritual birth rate, the nation would be panicking. If the nation teetered on the brink of financial ruin as the church wavers on the ruin of spiritual negation, statesmen would be sleepless and sweating for a remedy."

Arthur Wallis says, "The ways of Apostolic Christianity must be recovered, or the Church of the latter days will never ride the storms that already threaten to engulf her."

Do we want another Reformation in the Biblical style? Do we really want a Pentecostal visitation of the Spirit that will shatter our status quo spiritually, socially and economically? Are we willing to pay the price of reproach? Are we willing to pay the price of waiting upon God until the Holy Spirit moves in our midst? God lays down the challenge before us in II Chronicles 7:14: "If my people who are called by My name, will bow themselves down low, and intensely intercede for themselves, and seek My face to touch it, and will cease from their missing of the mark; then will I give attention to them from heaven, and will lift up their missing of the mark; and will sew together the old festering sore of their land." God gives four clear directions here for an outpouring of His Spirit and a revival: (1) "Humble yourselves;" (2) "Prayintensely intercede;" (3) "Seek His face so that we touch it;" (4) "Cease from our sin-missing the mark."

We appreciate the privilege of serving God, preaching the Gospel and serving the Allegheny Conference. We have done our best to be faithful to the task which you assigned to us the last Annual Session. We deeply regret that we are so faulty and inefficient in so many ways but we have been waiting upon God even in the night hours for His guidance and wisdom for the many problems. With His help we will strive to revive our established churches; with devotion to Him we will enter new fields; with faithfulness to Him we will preserve our heritage and standards; with zeal for God we will proclaim the Wesleyan message of Holiness and do our best to stem the advance of apostasy.

ITEM XVIII. SOME SUGGESTIONS. We suggest:

- That each district do its best to continue to keep the preachers' prayer meetings alive and active;
- That each pastor do all he can to interest his people in supporting and attending Stoneboro Campmeeting;
- 3. That more of our older people attend the Conference Youth Convention to encourage our youth and give them our moral support;
- 4. That everyone join the Conference Brigade of Intercessory Commandos:
- 5. And that every pastor do his utmost to promote a revival in his church.

ITEM XIX. SOME RECOMMENDATIONS: We recommend:

- 1. That the Auditing and Finance Cmmittee be enlarged by adding two laymembers. This Committee is now more than just an Auditing Committee because it has become a standing committee on Conference finance throughout the year and there should be lay representation on it;
- 2. That the present Committee on Relocation of Conference Headquarters be continued as a Conference Parsonage Committee and that this Committee shall work in cooperation with the Conference Trustees;
- 3. That a committee be elected at the Annual Conference Session whose duties shall be to make a study to find a more adequate plan for Conference visitation and supervision of the churches and for the pioneer supervision by the Conference President and First Vice President;
- 4. That at this Conference Session a Second Vice President be elected who shall labor without salary. His duties: (1) In an advisory capacity to the President and his Board; (2) As an assistant to the Pioneeer Supervisor and may be used to help in the visitation of the pioneer churches, and (3) Shall act as chairman of the Committee on Study of a more adequate plan for Conference supervision and visitation.

REPORT NO. 1-B

THE VICE PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Dear Brothers and Sisters of the Allegheny Conference:

Grace, mercy and peace be unto thee and thine forever and ever Amen. How good God has been to every one of us, in that we can be present for this another Conference gathering.

We are living in the Saturday Evening of the age. As it was in the days of Noah so it is today. The "perilous times" have come. Iniquity abounds, the love of many has been waxing cold. The night of apostasy deepens. Total desertion of principles of faith has taken place in the lives of many. For others, the principles of faith, and settled rules and actions governing the church are gradually being set aside. But beloved, while these things are taking place about us, let us follow the admonition of the Apostle Paul, and I quote from the Amplified New Testament, (Phil. 2:3-16):

"Do nothing from factional motives—through contentiousness, strife, selfishness or for unworthy ends—or prompted by conceit and empty arrogance. Instead, in the true spirit of humility of lowliness of mind let each regard the others as better than and superior to himself—thinking more highly of one another than you do of yourselves.

Let each of you esteem and look upon and be concerned for not merely his own interests, but also for the interest of others.

Let this same attitude and purpose and humble mind be in you which was in Christ Jesus—Let Him be your example in humility, who although being essentially one with God and in the form of God, did not think this equality with God was to be eagerly clung to or retained. But on the contrary emptied Himself of it, stripped Himself of the powers that would not be consistent with His humanity—so as to assume the guise and form of a servant or slave, in that He became like men and was born a human being.

- ITEM VI. We recommend that credit for no book in the Course of Study be allowed for more than one quadrennium after that book has been officially dropped from the course.
- ITEM VII. We will not recommend to the Pastoral Relations Committee any person who has not complied with Paragraph 170, Sub-paragraph 1 of the Discipline. We further insist that recommendations to Study and Travel with Transcripts of grade for which credit is desired will be in the hands of the Committee on the first day of the Annual Conference, also that with each transcript the Committee shall be furnished a copy of the School catalogue from which the transcript came.
- ITEM VIII. We require that students who are ready to take an examination in any book shall designate an acceptable member of the Wesleyan Methodist Church outside their immediate family, to whom Authorized Examiner shall mail the selected list of questions, and in whose presence the examination shall be taken in accordance with the rules and general instructions, for examinations. Such person shall certify that the examination was taken in his presence in an honorable manner, and shall return the examination paper to the examiner with self-addressed, stamped envelope to return to the student.
- ITEM IX. We place in nomination the name of Rev. F. B. Miller for election to the office of Custodian of Conference Books. We recommend that no books be mailed from the library unless sufficient postage accompanies application for the same and that this library be reserved for the use of those who are pursuing the Course of Study as Conference Preachers and Song Evangelists. We also insist that no study book or reading book be kept by one individual longer than forty-five days. In case of necessity, upon application to the Custodian, an extension of thirty days be granted.
- ITEM X. We urge that in writing examinations special attention be given to neatness, spelling, and composition. The Committee cannot give the same credit to papers that lack neatness and are poorly composed as to those that have received proper attention in this respect. We require papers to be typewritten or written in ink.
- ITEM XI. In taking examinations, when a specified number of answers are asked for and more are answered, the grade will be based on the number asked for. As an example, if 10 answers were asked for and 12 were given, the grade will be based on the first 10. If less

answers are given than the number requested, the grade will be based on the full number requested.

- ITEM XII. We wish to call to your attention that those wishing to take examinations on Wiley's Theology are to contact the member of the Committee for that particular year, sending postage, in order to receive the select list of questions for study.
- ITEM XIII. When anyone has completed a course of study in school and is to appear before this Committee, he shall bring a transcript from that school in which the work was taken.
- ITEM XIV. We recommend that those coming from another denomination must have a letter of recommendation from their superior.
- ITEM XV. All Conference Preachers must remember that Paragraphs 91 and 92 of the Discipline require that the holder of an Annual Conferference license must continue to hold an effective Quarterly Conference license and that license must be renewed each year and this requires the passing at least one book in the Course of Study.
- ITEM XVI. All Conference Preachers must remember that Paragraph 170, sub-item (2) of the Discipline states that continued authorization to marry and to administer the sacraments depends on passing at least two books of the Course of Study.

REPORT NO. 4

COMMITTEE ON AUDITING AND FINANCE

Your Committee on Auditing and Finance submits the following report and recommendations:

(This item is revised to conform to the latest General Conference Budget set up after this item was presented to the annual conference.)

ITEM I. WHAT SHALL THE CHURCHES PAY?

1. The following Denominational Budget items: World Missions, \$2.00; Education, \$4.00, (20 per cent to Houghton Academy); Pension, \$2.00; Brainerd, \$.25; Church Extension and Evangelism, \$1.50; Hephzibah Home, \$.35; Administrative Budget, \$1.70; General Conference Travel and Entertainment, \$.50; Australia, \$.25; Board Meeting Expense, \$.15; Wesleyan Seminary Foundation, \$.30; (these assessments are per church member per year.)

2. Undivided Conference Budget (Conference work) shall be equal

to ten percent of the sum obtained by adding the three following items: Pastor's salary, parsonage rent, and church incidental expense (to be remitted monthly). Included in church incidental expenses are: Parsonage tax, all kinds of insurance on church and parsonage; janitor services and supplies, church utilities and fuel, parsonage utilities, and fuel when paid by the church, pastor's car expense when provided by the church, all other items which are similar to or comparable with the above. Not included are repairs, replacements, improvements, evangelistic help and special projects, church and parsonage furnishings, Sunday School and Church literature and similar items.

3. Conference Group Life Insurance, \$.35 per member.

4. Conference Entertainment, \$.45 per member.

5. Pioneer Self-denial envelopes for monthly remittances (above tithe) shall be given our continued support.

6. The above financial items shall be sent to the District Sub-treasurers. Church Treasurers are to make remittances by the 5th of each month to the credit of Conference Budget, Conference Missions, and Pioneer Fund.

7. The pastor or persons responsible for the sale of the Conference Minutes in the local church shall remit \$1.00 per copy to the chairman of the Committee on the Sale of Conference Minutes, by March 31st. The Chairman of said committee shall mail statements to all those who have not paid for their Minutes by March 31st, thus enabling the report of the Committee to be prepared by April 30th.

8. Church Treasurers' reports to Quarterly Conference shall be made as of the close of the month preceding the Quarterly Conference. All church treasurers' records for the Conference year shall close April 30th. The Conference fiscal year is from May 1 to April 30.

ITEM II. WHAT SHALL THE SUNDAY SCHOOL PAY?

1. The first Sunday School offerings of the month to the Conference Missions Fund for the use of churches not self-supporting, etc., according to the recommendations of the Conference Mission Board.

2. Sunday School birthday offerings to the Conference Mission Fund.

3. Denominational Sunday School Budget of \$.20 per Sunday School member.

4. All three items above mentioned are to be paid to the local church treasurer for remittance to sub-treasurer.

ITEM III. WHAT SHALL THE CONFERENCE TREASURER PAY?

1. To the Conference President an annual salary of \$4,680.00.

2. To the Conference First Vice-President an annual salary of \$4,420.-00.

3. The two above named Conference officials shall also be paid or have paid for them the following items:

a. All utilities which include heat, light, gas, water and telephone.

b. The premium for Liability Insurance for their cars in the amount \$100,000.00 which coverage they shall be required to maintain.

c. The cost of their Annual Social Security Assessment.

d. The cost of Blue Cross Premiums.

- e. \$100.00 vacation bonus.
- f. \$1,100.00 Travel expense with the provision that all traveling costs in excess of this amount be paid them up to the amount of 5¢ per mile for the mileage reported in their current reports to the Conference. This includes all traveling costs exclusive of car depreciation.

4. \$1.00 per hour for Secretarial Aid for Conference President's Secretary, plus \$33.00 per month travel allowance.

5. All expense incurred by Conference officials, Board and Committee members in the pursuit of the duties of their respective offices upon the presentation of itemized expense accounts. Mileage will be paid at 5¢ per mile.

6. The following sums from the Conference Budget, in appreciation for their services; Conference Secretary, \$125.00; Conference Treasurer, \$150.00; each sub-treasurer, except West Virginia, \$60.00; West Virginia sub-treasurer, \$30.00; Conference Pension Plan Financial Secretary, \$25.00; Superintendent of Rooms, \$25.00; Statistical Chairman, \$25.00.

7. \$25.00 to each Sub-treasurer for an expense account.

REPORT NO. 9.

COMMITTEE ON MERGER

Your Committee on Merger has continued throughout the year ear-

nestly seeking to do the task assigned them. During the year the full Committee has met on four occasions and the Executive Committee on three occasions. At these times we have prayerfully sought to do what we have felt was best for our Conference. On January 22, 1963, the full Merger Committee along with the Conference Advisory Board met with the Executive Committee of the General Board of Administration to consider the Allegheny Conference Resolution passed at the annual session last year.

At this time the matter at hand was frankly discussed. From all appearances the meeting proved to be profitable. It surely was conducted in a most cordial atmosphere and ended with a time of unusual blessing.

STATEMENT OF CLARIFICATION

The General Board at their last session requested a statement of clarification on the resolution of last Conference. We therefore desire to set forth the following evidences that the resolution is not a declaration of severance but a declaration of intent.

1. The cover letter over the signatures of the Chairman and Secretary of the Committee on Merger emphatically conveyed the information that the Conference did not intend the resolution to be a declaration of severance but that it was a declaration of intent.

2. The Merger Committee met with Bro. Kierstead personally (he was our denominational representative to the Conference) and instructed him to convey to the Board that the resolution was a motion of intent. 3. The Chairman of the Merger Committee wrote a statement for the Conference President which he in turn conveyed to Dr. Reisdorph.

4. At the Barberton meeting on January 22, 1963, the Committee made it clear that the relationships with the denomination had not been severed at this time, but that it did declare the intention of the Conference, not to continue relationships if the General Conference at its forthcoming sessions would further centralize the denominational government or consummate merger with some other denomination.

5. The Conference Minutes of the 1962 Annual Session reveal that the Annual Conference assigned General Conference Budgets which shows that the resolution adopted was not an act of severance. Had it been an act of severance, such budget items would not have been assigned to the churches.

6. The present statistics relative to finances of our churches reveal that the churches of the Conference have paid budget assessments to the General Conference which is conclusive proof that neither the Conference nor the local churches considered the resolution an act of severance.

7. The Annual Conference elected a full slate of delegates, both lay and ministerial, for the 1963 General Conference.

GENERAL CONFERENCE MEMORIALS

Recently all General Conference delegates received from the Board of Administration a list of certain memorials or proposed changes to the

discipline to be considered at the coming General Conference Session. A careful examination of this list made clear the fact that a number of the memorials would bring about certain definite changes in the basic structure of our Church government, especially in the area of Conference supervision. The Committee felt that the Conference body as a whole should be fully appraised of these proposed changes—after which a ballot vote should be taken by this Conference body instructing your delegates as to the course you desire them to pursue at the coming General Conference Session.

MOTION TO BE PRESENTED TO THE CONFERENCE BODY

We therefore move that the Allegheny Conference delegation to the General Conference be instructed by this Conference body to oppose these memorials, and memorials of like nature, as coming under the provisions of the Conference declaration of intent passed at the 1962 Annual Session.

REPORT NO. 10

SUNDAY SCHOOL SECRETARY'S REPORT

It is imminently closer the midnight hour than it was a year ago as we are gathered for the conference session. The hour Jesus spoke of when He said, "The night cometh when no man can work," is upon us. In many of our churches the fire has already gone out and in many others only a few smoldering embers remain. The times call for us to examine our vision and our passion for the lost. If we could only see each man and woman, boy or girl as Jesus sees them, it would change our entire outlook on the Sunday School. Jesus said, one soul is worth more than all the world. Just think of the value we have at our finger tips regardless how large or how small your Sunday School may be.

We need dedicated pastors, teachers, superintendents, etc. for one of the greatest tasks in any church, the work of the Sunday School. The life blood of a Sunday School is its Teachers. The need is for teachers who are prepared both spiritually and mentally. Someone has said, "The Bible is to be the heart of the pupil's life, the pupil is the heart of the teacher's goal, the teacher is always the heart of the Sunday School and the Sunday School is the heart of the Church. We must not assume the salvation of anyone. We must be sure they know where they stand, therefore, we must constantly probe and pray, asking God to convict the unsaved of sin. Many of the unsaved can and will be reached through the Sunday School. Let us not miss a single opportunity. May God give us a real Sunday School revival in our churches. No Sunday School has ever succeeded unless the pastor was wholeheartedly interested in its success. Pastor, you are the key man; accept the challenge to win your Sunday School to Jesus.

This past conference year I spoke at Sunday School conventions in two of the districts of the conference and was also privileged to attend the National Sunday School Convention held in October 1962.

REPORT NO. 11

SECRETARY OF EVANGELISM

The missing link in modern evangelism is the neglect of, the ignoring of, or the lack of spiritual insight into God's revelation of man's total depravity, and of Christ's demands and provisions for his restoration to the image of God, if he, a son of Adam, would escape eternal ruin.

During periods of revival this basic truth is clearly seen. Blind eyes are opened, men are turned from darkness to light, and turned from the power of Satan unto God.

In order to evaluate the modern evangelism that has already made an alarming invasion into the contemporary holiness church—even our own denomination—it will be well to quote from John Fletcher, the bright exponent and defender of the Wesleyan revival of over 200 years ago. I quote from Fletcher's introduction to "An Appeal to Matter of Fact."

"In every religion there is a principle of truth or error, which, like the first link of a chain, necessarily draws after it all the parts with which it is essentially connected. This leading principle in Christianity, distinguished from Deism, (Modernism and Evolutionary Hypothesis) is the doctrine of our corrupt and lost estate. This doctrine is of such importance that genuine Christianity stands or falls with it.

"If man is thus corrupt and guilty, he must be liable to condign punishment. Therefore as the prophets and the apostles agree with our Lord in their dismal descriptions of the depravity, so they harmonize with Him in alarming accounts of his danger. Till he flees to the Redeemer as a condemned melefactor, and secures an interest in the salvation provided for the lost, they represent him as on the brink of ruin."

At this point I wish to quote John Wesley, the instrument in the hands of God in precipitating the holiness revival in England, to whom has been credited a more accurate recovery of scriptural New Testament religion than to anyone else since the Apostle Paul. I quote in brief a few inferences he draws from the doctrine of original sin.

"First, we learn one grand fundamental difference between Christianity, considered as a system of doctrines, and the most refined heathenism. They were wholly ignorant of the entire depravation of the whole human nature, of every man born into the world, in every faculty of his soul, not so much by those particular vices reigning in particular persons, as by the general flood of atheism and idolatry, of pride, selfwill, and the love of the world. This, therefore, is the first, grand distinguishing point between heathenism and Christianity.

"Second, Is man by nature filled with all manner of evil? Is he void of all good? Is he wholly fallen? Is his soul totally corrupted? Or to come back to the text, is every imagination of the thought of his heart evil continually? Allow this, and you are so far a Christian. Deny it, and you are but a heathen still.

"Third, We may learn from hence, in the third place, what is the proper nature of religion, of the religion of Jesus Christ. It is God's method of healing a soul which is thus diseased. Hereby the great Physician of souls applies medicines to heal this sickness; to restore human nature, totally corrupted in all its faculties. God heals all our atheism by the knowledge of Himself, and of Jesus Christ, Whom He hath sent, by giving us faith, a divine evidence and conviction of God and of the things of God; in particular, of this important truth, 'Christ loved 'me and gave Himself for me.' By repentance and lowliness of heart, the deadly disease of pride is healed: that self-will by resignation a meek and thankful submission to the will of God; and for the love of the world and all its branches the love of God is sovereign remedy. Now this is properly religion, a 'faith working by love;' working the genuine, meek humility, entire deadness to the world, and conformity to the whole will and word of God.

"Fourth, If man is not thus fallen, there will be no occasion for the work in the heart, this renewal in the spirit of our mind. An outside religion, without any godliness at all would suffice all rational intents and purposes. It does accordingly suffice in the judgment of those who deny this corruption of our nature. As a certain one reasoned, religion is only a well-ordered train of words and actions. Outward reformation, if their supposition is just, is indeed the one thing needful.

"Fifth, But ye have not so learned the oracles of God. Ye know, that He Who seeth what is in man gives a far different account, both of nature and of grace, of our fall, of our recovery. Ye know that the great end of religion is to renew our hearts in the image of God, to repair that total loss of righteousness and true holiness, which we sustained by the sin of our first parents. Ye know that all religion which does not answer this end—is no other than a poor farce and a mere mockery of God, to the destruction of our own soul. O beware of all those teachers of lies, who would palm this upon you for Christianity! Regard them not, although they would come unto you with all undeceivableness of unrighteousness; with all smoothness of language, all decency, yea, beauty and elegance of expression, all professions of earnest good-will to you, and reverence for the holy scriptures. Keep to the plain, old faith, 'once delivered to the saints,' and delivered by the Spirit to your hearts. Know your disease! Know your cure! Now, 'Go on from faith to faith' until your whole sickness be healed, and all that 'mind be in you, which was also in Christ Jesus.'"

Is modern evangelism from heaven or of men? It is our deep conviction that this presumptuous imposter is a child of apostasy. Though from time to time through the centuries it has appeared under new labels, it is basically the same fig-leaf religious cover-over for membership drive. The basic idea is to take them into the church upon mental assent to certain beliefs, then hope to get them saved afterwards.

One of the first marks of this substitute evangelism is its enmity toward, and sidestepping of, this offensive revelation from Heaven preached by anointed pastors and evangelists whom the Lord uses to open the eyes of the blind. This attitude is finding a large place in the contemporary holiness church and I fear it is too much so in too many local situations of our own Zion. Say what we will, to lose our courage here will bring us to a total blindness.

The second mark of false evangelism is its inability to bring the backsliders, sinners within and without the church to deep sorrow of heart that worketh repentance. Unless the heart is exposed, Zion cannot be saved nor sinners brought to a living faith. It has resulted in a mere believism that produces no inward renewal of the heart in holiness.

The third mark: Its blindness to the remains of depravity in the true believer's heart has caused the disuse of the practice of repentance of believers to the end that sin may be destroyed and holiness perfected.

The fourth characteristic of modern evangelism is the absence of regular periods of afflicting the heart in fasting and prayer. There is not as much of this practiced among us as there used to be. Real sainthood becomes more in absence as a result of this neglect. Holiness loses its lustre and the manifest glory soon disappears. Pastors who follow this scriptural practice so effect in their people holy results.

New converts added to the apostate church void of a holiness revival, will not solve the problem. With rare exceptions, they soon fall back to the level of the already backslidden strata of the church.

The holiness movement of nearly one hundred years ago was born out of a return to these doctrines, experiences and practices of original Methodism. Scenes of powerful conviction for sin, scriptural repentance, mighty transformation and recovery of Bible holiness resulted across the nation. The movement was raised up of God against the inroads of apostasy invading Methodism, hastened by the strife of the Civil War.

Leaders of the Holiness Movement were greatly alarmed about the popular evangelism in their day which was swamping the Mother Church with unregenerate members. M. L. Haney, some seventy years ago, expressed his distress that 1,000,000 souls had been received into the Methodist Church who were strangers to the new birth.

Nearly a score of years ago, while attending the Methodist Conference which first granted me evangelistic relations, gathered in the large Hughes Auditorium of my Alma Mater, I noticed on the chapel wall pictures of some original warriors of the Holiness Movement. There were John S. Inskip, J. A. Wood, Wm. McDonald, S. A. Keen, and the founders of the College, John Wesley Hughes and H. C. Morrison. All these men were insistent upon the necessity of the new birth for church membership. It was but three years after Morrison died that the Bishop of the Kentucky Conference introduced a tall, black-haired man from the Garrett Biblical Institute, a professional, who introduced streamlined personal evangelism to the Conference. What a total and bold repudiation of true evangelism on a Holiness College campus where oldfashioned Bible evangelism had been advocated for nearly fifty-five years! What a penalty visited for apostasy and spiritual decay!

I am both shocked and grieved to observe that less than a score of years later the same promotional evangelism is being embraced and encouraged on our own denominational level, and schools of evangelism are being introduced by a salaried graduate of Perdue University. No one doubts the sincerity of the young advocate, but those who seek to push this modern endeavor cannot be ignorant of its error and deviation from true Holiness evangelism. They cannot be ignorant that error and all substitutes for Holy Ghost evangelism become the instruments by which souls are deceived and perish eternally.

No one objects to personal endeavor in seeking to reach souls. The Lord knows there is not enough personal calling and true witnessing by either pastors or laymen. It is true that "We have nothing to do but to save souls." The first fallacy, however, is the assumption that the average layman is ready to do this work of personal evangelism. The opposite is true in this day of apostasy. It is a wonderful enterprise to carry water to the dying, but if the vessel is dirty, one only spreads the disease rather than curing it. Only the pastor and layman who experiences a Holy Ghost revival in his own soul is able to do effective evangelism. The acceptance of this modern evangelism by pastors, local churches and conferences will hasten the destruction of the soul and the apostasy of Zion.

May God help us by His Spirit and by obedience to His Word to dare to withstand this deceitful error.

REPORT OF SECRETARY OF EDUCATION

When we are confronted with the subject of Christian education it is necessary for us to look into the Scriptures for its basis. In the Old Testament book of Deuteronomy 6:6, 7 the Lord God instructed Israel in matters pertaining to the education of children in these words: "And these words, which I command thee this day, shall be in thine heart: And thou shalt teach them diligently unto thy children, and shalt talk of them when thou sittest in thine house, and when thou walkest by the way, and when thou liest down, and when thou risest up." These words plainly speak that the responsibility of the education of children rests in the hands of the parents. According to the Scriptures, the education of a child in any area of life is the responsibility of his parents. The Scriptures do not exclude education which prepares the child for his vocational life. If the Scriptures are properly interpreted, it is the responsibility of parents to so guard their children's education that Christ and His Word are central.

For the education of children there are three institutions of our society which must cooperate: the home, the church and the school. It is essential that these three institutions maintain the same emphasis, discipline, doctrine and educational objectives. It is the responsibility of the parent to maintain this relationship between these institutions since they are basic in the influence of the life of a child.

In our Twentieth Century society, however, one of the vital elements has become state-controlled and may soon be under the authority of the Federal Government. With the present trends in Supreme Court decisions and the influences of anti-Christian and anti-religious movements, the school has lost its emphasis in the realm of the spiritual and moral. At its very best, it is forced to be neutral in these specific fields. However, it is to be noted that in the realm of education there is no neutrality. It is either truth or falsehood and if a child is taught truth, there must be a proper orientation of such facts taught to Christ and the Word of God. According to the Scriptures, the Lord Jesus Christ said of Himself, "I am the Truth." To properly understand knowledge and its relationship to the Truth, we would suggest an illustration which would appear like this. The fields of knowledge are represented as a huge wheel of which Christ is the hub. The rim of the wheel would be the perimeter of knowledge and each spoke the respective fields of knowledge. Any specific field of knowledge, if properly taught, should bring the student back to the source of all truth which is Jesus Christ. Present-day educational philosophies are geared to purely educate a child to a sense of responsibility to a materialistic society with God quite left out. Truth in modern education has become relative, thus, what may have been truth a century ago can be altered to adjust to presentday trends in thinking. If the present trends continue, our society will become completely brainwashed of the idea of God.

In addition, a student is not only influenced by what he is taught, but also by the teacher who instructs him. Perhaps the greatest part of education is not the facts taught but rather the impact of the character and personality of the instructor upon the child. When we realize that during any given school year, our children spend nearly half of their waking hours in the atmosphere of an educational institution and in the case of high school students probably more than that, it thrusts us, as Christian parents, into a new realm of evaluating our children's education. Never would we think of sending our children outside of the home and putting them in a hostile or neutral institution or in the hands of some neutral or hostile party to provide their necessary physical care, food, and clothing. But it appears that when it comes to the moral and spiritual development in the realm of education, we think nothing of the procedure of placing our children in the care of individuals who, at their best, will be neutral to their spiritual development and perhaps might be hostile to it. At the very best the schools to whom we entrust the education of our children are almost, if not entirely, out from under our personal control. We have little to say concerning their everyday

classroom instruction, the teachers who instruct them or the textbooks from which they are taught. Since it is public in nature, the present day school system can be nothing else but an average of the total society which makes up the school. When we realize that America at her best is rapidly developing a material concept of essentials, is legislating God out of His own universe, and is demanding neutrality in the realm of religion, our public system has produced and is producing all that she is capable of producing. Now we must remember this, that as parents, that God holds us responsible for what happens to our children while they are in school. He has given us the children and in His sight their souls are precious. Under God you cannot do what you please with your children. You are obligated to do what pleases God. I must remind you that every parent will give account some day and he will be judged particularly by what he has done for his children in the sphere of education. On that day you won't be able to blame the schools or the teachers or the states which provide the education. God will hold you accountable and I believe that this is more particularly true as it concerns Christian parents. For God has made a covenant of grace with His people in which He has promised to be their God and the God of their children. That covenant places upon parents the solemn duty of training their children in the fear of the Lord. We dedicate or baptize our children in the name of the triune God because we accept God's promise to include our children in His covenant and thus we commit ourselves to train our children in the total of his life in the Christian faith. Now that is what God expects of all of us. Christian parents are commanded to provide for their children an all around, all day atmosphere which is thoroughly saturated with the presence of the Word of God. Notice the instructions of Deuteronomy 6:6, 7: ". . . . thou shalt talk of them when thou sittest in thine house and when thou walkest by the way, and when thou liest down, and when thou risest up." In the total of a 24-hour period, as is suggested in this Scripture, the child is to be under the direct influence of the Christian faith as sponsored by his parents. When we attempt to apply the principle that God has laid down in His Word to the education of our children in this modern day, we are confronted with some extremely real problems.

It means that not only the church and the home but also the school which our children attend must be thoroughly Christian in every respect. It must not only teach them Gospel songs and introduce a chapter from the Bible each day and perhaps add a bit of religious instruction to a worthwhile secular curriculum but it must have God in the very center of the whole educational program. Every subject must be taught from the point of view of His Holy Word. Every lesson must not only be consistent with the standards of the highest scholarship but must be permeated with the wisdom of God. The school must be designed to produce well-educated Christians whose faith is a part of every sphere of life. The only program which can accomplish these ends in the realm of education according to the Scriptures is a Christian school. It is important then that every congregation or group of Christian parents, in any given community, endeavor to provide for their children a Christian school. Most denominations have followed such a program in the realm of higher education and as a consequence, a large percentage of the colleges and universities of this land were brought into existence by the church. In recent years some Christian groups have found it necessary to establish institutions of secondary education and now it has been found necessary to establish elementary Christian day schools. In an article written by T. Robert Ingram appearing in "Christianity Today" entitled, "A Plea for Christian Day Schools," this statement is made: "Any congregation can have its own school. There is no magic in numbers in schools. Strangely enough in an age when it is only the big school that is supposed to be any good, both parents and school people are talking about smaller classes. The fact is that many of the greatest Americans have been taught almost entirely by private tutors and millions have known nothing but the little red schoolhouse." For years we have tried to build our house from the top down and, thus, we provided Christian education on the collegiate level. But by failing to have an elementary school, we neglected the all-important foundation. We have protested that it costs too much to operate a school and that we do not have the proper buildings and necessary equipment. Some have even protested that we do not have sufficient numbers of children in our congregations. I would like to remind you, however, that a small congregation with only 10 or 20 children of school age can have a first-rate school of its own quite as well as the city congregation with several hundred children. After all, any school large or small is only as good as its teachers and its students. These are not modulated by numbers.

In the field of Christian education the Allegheny Conference has always taken an active interest. We have supported schools of the college level and have recently assisted in the support of an interdenominational school which comprises all levels of instruction. In the last year within the Indiana District of the Conference, the Indiana District churches formed a school association to establish a Christian day school. This has been in operation for one term with an enrollment of 32 children. It is becoming absolutely essential that if parents are to obey the commandments of God relative to their children that they provide such education. I would like to make this a plea that every district interest itself in establishing at least one school in the elementary field as a beginning, with possibilities of launching into a secondary field at a later date, to provide education for the children of Christian parents of the area. If the church, school, and home are to cooperate in a God-centered, Christorientated educational program, it is necessary that Christian parents have a school of such nature, within reasonable distance, to which they can safely send their children for instruction which will not be in contradiction to the aims of the church and the home.

As Secretary of Education in the past year, we made one mailing of literature relative to Christian education to all pastors of the Conference and also sent a mimeographed copy of the article, "A Plea for Christian Day Schools," to the chairmen of the Holiness Districts of the Conference.

We trust that every church in the Conference will feel its responsi-

BURIAL ASSOCIATION SECRETARY

In 1929, in response to the widespread need for a plan by which the Church could give financial aid to Wesleyan Methodist homes stricken by the death of a loved one, the Wesleyan Burial Association was organized. Its worth was quickly recognized and applications for member-

ship were received from all parts of the denomination. The Association's membership is approximately 2000 persons, representing every conference. It operates as a recognized and approved part of the general program of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America.

Its membership is open to all members of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, their husbands, wives, and minor children.

Since June of 1952, 127 churches have reported of which 13 have shown a gain, 5 have held their own, 48 have shown a loss and 61 have never reported membership.

This burial association has proven a blessing to many in the time of sorrow and need and we are confident this can be a real help to many in our conference. All depends upon the faithfulness of the pastor and Burial Association Secretary. Where this has been presented to the people we have found a good response. In all fairness to the people who are supporting our churches we should afford the opportunity of membership in the association.

REPORT NO. 15

TITHING SECRETARY'S REPORT

A restaurant owner once posted the following sign: "Meals Cash. We trusted a friend. He failed to pay. We lost both the price of the meal and the friend." There is more truth in this statement than meets the casual eye; at least four things, which appear to parallel tithing truths, are clear to the careful examiner.

First, a debt is assumed. When the "friend" partook of the meal he understood that a payment would be required for the food did not belong to him. If there is a basic truth that underlies the entire Bible, it is God's right of ownership—Psalm 24:1, "The earth is the Lord's and the fullness thereof; the world, and they that dwell therein"; Haggai 2:8, "The silver is mine, and the gold is mine, saith the Lord of Hosts"; I Cor. 6:19-20, "What? know ye not that your body is the temple of the Holy Ghost which is in you, which ye have of God, and ye are not your own? For ye are bought with a price:"

When one fully realizes the debt he owes, he is not far from the kingdom. How good God is; although He gives all He only requires us to return one-tenth for the furtherance of His work. But, this is just the minimum, if one would receive a blessing he must find a love in his soul which reaches beyond the necessary. Take note: realization of debt generates love; love regulates giving; giving brings the blessing. (". . . prove me now herewith, saith the Lord of hosts," Mal. 3:10) May I suggest that the first step to scriptural giving is a vision of Him Who is altogether lovely; a vision which is found only by a broken and contrite heart humbly bowed at the foot of the cross.

Next, our friend points out that an unpaid debt brings broken fellowship. The man who failed to pay his bill could no longer face his benefactor on the same basis as he once had. How sad but how true. Who can worship the Lord in the beauty of holiness with a pure and unfettered conscience, when he knows his stinginess is helping to defeat God's holy plan of sending the gospel to all men?

Herein is the cause of the rich young ruler's sorrowful departure. (Matt. 19:22) He fell at the feet of Jesus to worship, but discovered his first love (money) hindered fellowship. He did not realize how great a debt he owed, and did not pay the price. This decision cost him peace with God, happiness for eternity, and his never dying soul. We may not be required to sell all and give to the poor, but willingness to do so is certainly demanded, and failure here can result in the same price for us as it did for this young man.

Separation from God, in this area, must also be considered on a church wide as well as an individual basis, because whole churches have abandoned God's plan of financing His work. A social program has taken its place. Why does this sad condition prevail? The answer is simple: the members of such a church have broken fellowship with the Lover of their souls. If every church member loved Jesus as he should, there would be no need for fund drives, church suppers and bazaars, or other man-made efforts to raise needed money. Where Jesus is no need exists for alternate plans; He supplies the need. A church ablaze with divine love has no need for anemic substitutes.

In the third place the blame for broken fellowship is placed on the debtor—"We lost . . . the friend." It is well to remember that the break was brought about by something within the debtor and not by the desire of the creditor. When one fails God he builds within his heart a barrier that shuts the Holy Spirit out. God never leaves us, we leave Him.

How is your fellowship? Have you been finding a strange leanness in your soul? Better check up on your first love and your giving. If this is the cause, you must initiate the reconciliation. The wrong must be corrected. God will bless when the erring one repents and returns. ("Return unto me, and I will return unto you, saith the Lord of hosts," Mal. 3:7) It is possible for the fellowship to be restored but not without paying the price set forth by God.

Finally a solution is at least suggested. Mainly, do not allow such a situation to come about and you will not have to face the consequences,

or if it now exists, correct it immediately. Beloved, He loved us so much that we cannot allow our love to become cold and indifferent. We owe Him so much that no sacrifice, on our part, can ever repay the debt. Do not become careless in the Grace of Giving, but be a faithful steward unto the end—then you shall hear those wonderful words, "Well done, thou good and faithful servant . . . enter thou into the joy of thy Lord." (Matt. 25:21)

REPORT NO. 25

RESOLUTIONS

RESOLUTIONS: Your Committee on Resolutions submits the following report: BE IT RESOLVED: 1. That since the tendency of our times is towards indistinct lines as pertains to doctrine and compromise as pertains to practice, we as a Conference, by adopting this report, re-affirm our position to adhere to the general and special rules of our Discipline as interpreted by Allegheny Conference.

2. That we re-affirm our love and our loyalty to our beloved denomination by praying for its leaders; and that we resolve to express our appreciation for the officials of our Conference and the standards which they maintain by faithfully praying for them and earnestly following their example.

3. That since our conference sustains tremendous losses among our youth from our Sunday Schools and Churches, we therefore urge our pastors to encourage the Youth of our Churches to attend the Annual Youth Conference, District Youth Rallies and Stoneboro Camp Meeting, and that every effort be put forth to lead them into a definite experience of salvation and when deemed advisable to unite with the Church. Be it further resolved that we refrain from any compromise of our standards or introduction of social programs into our churches, which only lead to superficial loyalties, spiritual decline, and discouragement of the spiritual laity.

4. That since divorce is one of the great curses of our land, a corruption of the morals of our youth, a destroyer of our homes, and a violation of God's law, we therefore urge our pastors to prayerfully and tenderly warn our people, young and old, of this popular evil and its consequences.

5. That we go on record as being unalterably opposed to any affiliation whatsoever with the National Council of Churches or any of its departments. That we maintain our guard against the modernistic bias reflected in the Revised Standard Version of the Bible and the "Interpreter's Bible" which have been produced under the auspices of the National Council of Churches.

6. That since we recognize the religious motion picture to be an evil and not consistent with the divine plan for the presentation and propagation of the Gospel of Jesus Christ, and since we recognize the use of plays and other entertaining diversions as substitutes for Holy Spirit anointed presentation of truth, we therefore urge our pastors and churches to refrain from using such in the Churches of the Conference.

7. That we urge our ministers and laymen to maintain the family altar as a spiritual institution in our homes, to practice the grace of systematic fasting and give themselves to intercessory prayer.

8. Since our Conference boundaries include areas of shifting population, we recommend that our pastors keep each other informed of those, who move from area to area who attend our Sunday Schools and Churches.

9. That since we recognize Communism to be a subtle, godless influence, and that the present trends to a welfare state are opening wedges to supplant our democratic way of life—be it resolved:

a. That our ministers and church leaders warn our people through.

the preached Word and the printed page of the subtle approach, satanic origin, and destructive results of this political philosophy.

b. That we recognize our solemn obligation to pray for the President of our Nation and committees of Congress who are engaged in exposing and opposing Communistic infiltration into our American system, that God will grant them wisdom and courage to fight this evil.

10. That since the continued advancement of the Roman Catholic system in numerical strength and political power in our nation, school systems and local governments constitutes a menace to free government, freedom of worship, and conscience, we therefore urge that the ministry of the Conference instruct the people in our Sunday Schools and churches concerning the prevalent practices and teachings of the Roman Church, relative to civil government and marriage.

11. That we recognize crime comic books and pulp magazines, which depict violence sadism, brutality, and blood lust unparalleled in the history of children's literature of any time or nation, to be a contributing factor to the present delinquency problem. We therefore urge our people to war against this evil wherever practicable by withholding patronage from those engaged in the distribution of these tools of Satan and by reproving and rebuking them with Christian love.

12. That we declare ourselves as supporting the reading of the Holy Scriptures in the public schools and that we urge our ministers and parents to seek by all ethical means to improve the moral character of our youth through the boards of education, offices of superintendent, principal, faculty, and Parent-Teacher Associations. And be it further resolved: that we endeavor to arouse our constituency to support, by prayer and other methods, Christian day schools which adhere to Bible principles.

13. That we continue to register our opposition to the trends toward socialism in our federal government, especially in such areas as Federal Aid to Education and Medical care for the aged under Social Security; and that we urge our people to make this opposition known to the Senators, Representatives and other officials who may have to do with the determination of such issues.

14. That we urge: a Special prayer by our people for our nation's racial problem that God's solution may be found before it shall be further exploited by Communists and Black Muslims. b. That our churches take advantage of the opportunities for ministering to people of other races in their neighborhoods by doing their best to carry to them the message of full salvation.

15. That these resolutions together with the standing resolutions be read on each charge at the first quarterly meeting following the distribution of the Conference Minutes.

REPORT OF THE ALLEGHENY CONFERENCE WMS PRESIDENT

To the members of the Fifty-seventh Annual Allegheny Conference Woman's Missionary Society we extend heartfelt greetings in Jesus' Precious Name!

As we come to make our report for another Conference year we are reminded of the Scripture given in the parable of Jesus about the nobleman and his servants. Luke 19:13, "And he called his ten servants and delivered them ten pounds and said unto them, Occupy till I come."

The second meaning given in the dictionary for "occupy" is "to carry on business." This is the meaning here. The ten servants were not simply to hold the talents in tact, but to carry on the master's business while he was absent so that he might receive an increase or profit at his return.

In this case, Jesus shows that the nobleman represents Himself and that the servants are His followers whom He has commissioned to carry on His work until His return for them. In other words, we, the children of God have been invested with talents not only of money but of Divine love and service that we are to employ for His glory in order to fulfill His desire for souls and His purpose for our lives. We cannot simply take it easy, sit down and pamper ourselves without losing the talent that Christ gave us and lose our souls as well. The servant who refused to use his talent had it taken from him while those who had used theirs were rewarded for increasing them.

What a lesson for us in these days of rush and bustle for the things of this life and self-gratification! As Christians and true followers of Jesus Christ we need to be diligent and faithful to use the talent He has given us for His glory or at His coming we will meet with His disapproval and His final rejection.

Thus, with renewed energy and determination let us be mindful of our Heavenly calling and sacred trust to spread Scriptural Holiness at home and abroad since the time is late and His return is at hand. I. Activities of the Year:

1. 1962 Stoneboro Camp—The first important event of the Conference year was Stoneboro Camp, at which time we were blessed with a number of missionary visitors. Rev. and Mrs. Franklin Heer, furloughed missionaries from Colombia, S. A., were the engaged speakers for missionary day. Unexpected Haitian speakers were used in the afternoon services and an evening service was called especially to hear from the Haiti Conference President Daniel Ferdinand. His wife sang several times in the native language. Bro. and Sr. Ortlip, Bro. and Sr. Hartman and Bro. Harris, who had also spent some time at Haiti, spoke at different times. Rev. Neal Phipps brought a stirring message on Brainerd Indian School at one afternoon service. Rev. Harry Shreves and his son, Raymond, spoke on their work in Key West with the Cuban refugees.

2. Missionary Tour—The fall missionary tour began Sept. 9-30, 1962, with Mrs. Elizabeth Savage, furloughed missionary from Jamaica. She was accompanied by Mrs. Irma Weaver, also a former missionary to Jamaica. They visited West Virginia Districts with good results as reported by them and the pastors with whom we had contact. Also, they spoke at a district convention held at Bethel, W. Va., toward the close of their itineracy.

Rev. and Mrs. Ferdinand Witthuhn, furloughed missionaries from Haiti, were not new to many but, we are sure were royally welcomed as they visited the churches of the other districts from October 7 to December 16, 1962. They likewise gave us a wonderful report of God's help to them and of the loyal response from the people.

3. Support of Missionaries and Native Workers—This year has shown a marked increase of interest in supporting our Conference and other missionaries. Since there has been a change made at Headquarters about the supporting of missionaries, it is hard to know just how fully each missionary has been supported. At Conference \$1,200.00 was known as the salary for a missionary. Now Headquarters estimates field support, travel expense, salary and all that accompanies the maintenance of one missionary on the field for one year to amount to \$3,600.00 for the support of one missionary.

To our knowledge the following missionaries were taken for partial (as above explained) support: Rev. Arthur Calhoon, Haiti—Massillon; Mrs. Lucille Day, Puerto Rico—Akron I; Mrs. Jean Ridgway, New Guinea— Canal; Rev. K. M. Ridgway, New Guinea—Titusville; Mrs. Betty Ortlip, Haiti—East Conneaut, Franklin, Oak Grove and Mr. and Mrs. Charles Ewing; Rev. Henry Ortlip, Haiti—Rock Run, North Canton, Pine Grove; Mrs. Ruth Saunders, Africa—Greenwood and North Salem; Rev. William Saunders, Africa—Barberton.

Also five societies are supporting native workers in New Guinea: Keepville, West Middlesex, Barberton, Franklin and Canal two of them.

The YMWB is supporting the three Ridgway children: Robert, Johnnie and Lael Marie.

We thank God for this renewed interest in supporting our missionaries and pray that each society will take a special missionary for the coming year to maintain not only by financial support but also by earnest prayer. 4. Conference Project—Encouraged by our kind-hearted caretaker, Mr. Ney Brickell, who promised to try to find a way to install bathrooms in the missionary cottage, we announced the project some time after camp. There was a good response for the two partial bathrooms which cost \$511.63 with money enough left over for blacktop sidewalks to the missionary cottage and WMS rest room. We sincerely appreciate your splendid cooperation and efforts. We know our weary missionaries will enjoy these conveniences.

5. New Societies—Though we greatly regret to tell you that Ellwood City and Tazewell societies have unavoidably been lost, we rejoice to announce that we have added two new societies. They are: (1) Blairsville, Pa., WMS was organized August 10, 1962, by Mrs. Dorothy Beers, duly authorized by the President, with three active and three honorary members. (2) Clymer, Pa., WMS was organized April 25, 1963, by Rev. Mrs. Beatrice Hicks, duly authorized by the President, with nine active members.

May the Lord richly bless and encourage these new societies. We welcome them into our midst and covet your prayers for them in the future.

II. Emergency Prayer Requests:

1. Deporting of Haiti Missionaries—Last Conference as we felt led to have special prayer for our outgoing missionaries, we had a premonition that they would need special help to meet the emergencies of this troublesome day. We trust all have been faithful to their promise to hold them up in prayer and that you will continue so to do.

May 10, 1963, and the week end following, the Haiti women missionaries and their children, 28 in all, were deported to the United States because of the dangerous uprising in the government of Haiti. The seven men were left to hold the fort, two at Petit Goave and five at Port Margot. By the time we meet at Conference there may be further developments but whatever the condition, they need continued, intensified prayer.

2. Rev. K. M. Ridgway's Illness—Rev. K. M. Ridgway who suffered a coronary occlusion May 17, 1963, needs urgent prayer. Only after a month's rest can they tell if he will be able to carry on his work in New Guinea but our God is able to raise him up for His glory in answer to earnest prayer.

III—Deaths:

1. Mrs. Pearl Fero—Three of our WMS sisters have gone to their Eternal Reward. The first was Mrs. Pearl Fero, former Allegheny Conference President and Vice- President, also mother of our Editor, Mrs. Gracia Fero Banker, went Home January 2, 1963. To her it was a coronation day, a great reunion, the end of a life well spent for her Lord.

2. Miss Clara Campbell--Miss Campbell, a former pioneer missionary to Sierra Leone, West Africa, found her eternal rest and reward April 9, 1963. She was an enthusiastic missionary worker and supporter to the very end, having attended both conference and camp last year and having faithfully finished her tasks for the year in the Erie WMS before her departure. 3. Mrs. Anna Finnicum—Sr. Finnicum, the only WMS President that Carrollton, Ohio, Society has ever had, was taken Home to be with her Lord May 30, 1963. She was a faithful loyal worker and supporter of the missionary cause both in the local society and in the Conference.

God bless the memory of these three dear sisters to each of us and may He raise up younger women to fill their places of service is our prayer.

IV—Conference 1963

Our engaged speakers for the public missionary service are Rev. and Mrs. Floyd Banker, missionaries to Jamaica. Rev. Banker spent many years as a missionary in India. Mrs. Gracia Fero Banker has been a pastor in our Conference and is now closing her work as the successful Editor of the WESLEYAN MISSIONARY. May God's blessings and your prayers attend them as they go to Jamaica.

Also, we expect a visit from the President of the African Conference, Rev. Bankura, Tuesday of this week. We trust all will pray for him and help him feel at home among us as he plans to stay until Saturday.

Besides, our area Chairman, Mrs. Ella Bradley, is to be with us Thursday, especially to give us information and direction in the WMS work. Pray that her visit, too, will be used of the Lord.

V-Correspondence:

To fulfill the above mentioned obligations and carry on the WMS work we have sent out six circular letters and single pieces of mail making a total of over 725.

VI-Standard of Efficiency:

Our Conference Standard of Efficiency Rating for 1962-63 is 84%. VII—Future Plans:

1. Stoneboro Camp—We are expecting, D. V., Rev. Robert Pelton, President of Brainerd Indian School, to be with us as missionary speaker for Stoneboro Camp. Though he is new to us, he comes with a high spiritual recommendation. Pray for his coming and the camp.

2. Fall Tour—This has been a very difficult time to find missionaries to tour our Conference. At present we have no one engaged though Bro. Lytle has worked faithfully to help us. Pray that the right one or ones may be directed to us in time for this much needed but strenuous task.

VIII-Prayer Request for General Conference-June 26-July 3, 1963:

1. Denominational Officers—Especially remember our WMS President, Mrs. Helen Stark and the other WMS officers that the Lord shall direct and lead in all that is done. Pray that it shall be a spiritual session in every way.

3. a. That each society endeavor to hold a public monthly meeting, praying for those requests found in the WESLEYAN MISSIONARY and that stress be placed upon personal evangelism. That each member feel a personal responsibility to bring at least one soul to Christ during the year.

b. That each district during the year observe one missionary serv-

4. a. That we urge our societies to promote the Women's World Fellowship by meeting in two's and three's as convenient each Tuesday morning to pray for women around the world. b. That a service early in the conference year be given to the local WWF Secretary for enlisting prayer partners and encouraging prayer. Reports to be sent by September 30 to Conference WWF Secretary, Mrs. Mary Huntsman, 1220 Second Street, Brownsville, Pa.

c. Since we are requested by the General WWF Secretary to have a monthly prayer and fast service, we urge that all societies refrain from having meals at any missionary service since it does not become the interest of missions to be feasting when we should be praying.

5. a. That each society have an aggressive solicitor for the WESLEY-AN MISSIONARY, whose duty it shall be to report all subscriptions to the district solicitor, send a quarterly report to the conference solicitor, Mrs. Erla Hoobler, R. D. 1, Hadley, Pa., and strive to place the magazine in each home of the church and Sunday School. If possible, each society send at least one gift subscription to some interested family.

b. When sending in subscriptions always be sure to identify your church by its number and conference letters, AL, as published in the Conference Minutes.

6. a. That all society officers and delegates to Annual Conference be members of the Wesleyan Methodist Church. We also recommend that Conference Society Members be members of the Wesleyan Church and their local Wesleyan Missionary Society.

b. That each local society have a nominating committee if possible.

c. That each society send the retiring president to conference and elect the incoming president or an officer as delegate, assuming the expense for transportation.

d. That each society instruct the delegate the amount to pledge at the public missionary service.

7. a. That each society use the designated study book, the WMS Handbook, and other helps and encourage members to follow the Mission Study Course as recommended by General Conference. All literature to be obtained from the Wesley Press, Box 2000, Marion, Indiana.

b. That each society have a program committee of which the president is chairman.

8. That each society be urged to respond to the Card Call Plan and thus assist in the Extension Program of the Church. NOTE: All money for Card Call, send to Church Extension and Evangelism Department, Rev. V. A. Mitchell, Secretary, Box 2000, Marion, Indiana. NOTE: Send all stubs with statistical report to Mrs. Elma Patterson, 17 6th Avenue, Greenville, Pa.

9. That inasmuch as the American Bible Society prints our Bible Transcripts without charge, we support it with prayer and finance. This can be sent through regular treasurers.

10. a. That, where possible, each society have a Mercy and Help Committee, whose duty it shall be to visit the sick and needy and give aid where necessary, and send flowers or greeting cards to shut-ins.

b. That we encourage the giving of special memorial gifts as recommended by General Conference for the promotion of definite missionary work as living tribute to the memory of deceased loved ones, instead of the usual extravagant floral tribute.

11. That we put forth a special effort to secure every woman in the church as a member of the society, or bring about a 10 per cent gain in membership.

12. That we follow the Denominational Monthly Emphasis: June—Installation of officers; September—Membership; October—Education; November—American Bible Society; December—White Christmas; January— Subscription; February—Women's World Fellowship; March—Personal Evangelism; April—Self-Denial.

13. That the delegate's credentials be sent at least two weeks before conference to the Conference Wesleyan Missionary Secretary, Mrs Eunice Comadoll, R. D. 1, Utica, Pa.

REPORT NO. 4 COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

Be it Resolved:

1. That, since the theme of our Annual Conference is "Revival an Inside Job" our Woman's Missionary Society adopt this theme for the coming year.

2. a. That we give ourselves to systematic Bible Study, fasting and intercessory prayer.

b. That we be faithful witnesses to those whom we contact, and when possible go out two by two in home visitation. "All things are possible to him that believeth."—Mark 9:23

3. a. That we be faithful in attending our missionary services, and not by indifference hinder our missionary work at home and abroad.

b. That we strive to obtain all of our men as honorary members.

4. That we give ourselves to prayerful study of the "Wesleyan Missionary" and other helpful material, and that we do our best to interest our people in getting the "Wesleyan Missionary" into other homes and institutions.

5. That we adhere strictly to Scriptural methods:

a. In raising funds for missions, by sacrificial giving, "Freely ye have received, freely give." Matthew 10:8

b. In our programs by abstaining from the use of movies, slides, skits and plays.

6. a. That we diligently strive to maintain firm, loving discipline in our homes: because we believe with Catherine Booth that "The secret of lawlessness both toward God and man is that children were never taught to submit to the authority of their parents" Proverbs 22:6; Ephesians 6:4

b. That we faithfully hold to the Biblical standards of our Discipline in creating a wholesome atmosphere in our homes.

c. That we stress the maintenance of a family altar in every home, with the children having a part. That we, as parents, faithfully instruct our children concerning the plan of salvation, urging them to obtain a

definite personal experience, knowing that this will create in them the desire to follow Bible standards. Deuteronomy 6:5-9

d. That we encourage our children to use their own Bible and have a regular system of reading and of memorizing Scripture in the home. Psalm 119:11

e. That we pray faithfully for our children in school, that they may reject all erroneous teachings presented, and be careful in choosing their friends and associates. That we urge parents to take a firm stand against the immodest dress and other evil practices of the modern athletic and music program.

7. a. That we abstain from all worldly amusements, including the theater, both private and public, the dance, cards, unwholesome radio programs, etc. That we abstain from reading or allowing our children to read comic books and other unwholesome magazines and books, and that we provide wholesome literature for our children.

b. That since modern mixed bathing is conducive to loose morals, we urge parents not to permit their children to visit such places of sinful amusement.

c. That we abstain from all Sabbath desecration such as buying Sunday newspapers, pleasure riding, visiting, reunions, buying, etc. Isaiah 58:13, 14. Also that we refrain from patronizing establishments open on the Sabbath Day.

d. That we urge our people to refrain where it is in their power, from having television sets in the home, and refrain from viewing it elsewhere, realizing that television has a degrading influence, a tendency to make the soil lean, and the potential danger of sending souls to hell, both young and old.

8. a. That we as parents tell our children the true story of life as soon as they begin to ask questions. Also be sure to instruct them in the care of their bodies before they start to school in order that they may hold these truths sacred, and be prepared to withstand the low moral standards of this day.

b. That we parents be companions to our children, and provide for them wholescme recreation frequently, and as far as possible know where they are and what they are doing at all times. Also, that mothers carefully select their "baby-sitters" since there is so much immorality prevalent today.

9. a. That we uphold by precept and example modesty of dress, as becometh holiness, by which we mean wearing dresses half-way between the knee and ankle, both standing and sitting, with long sleeves and modest neckline, which things accompany purity and deep spirituality. I Timothy 2:9, 10, also, that we adhere to Deuteronomy 22:5, "The woman shall not wear that which pertaineth unto a man—for all that do so are an abomination unto the Lord thy God."

b. That we refrain from wearing all jewelry, which includes brooches, showy watch bands, and all other ornaments such as sparkling buttons and sequins. Isaiah 2:1; I Peter 3:3, 4. Also, that we do not wear very sheer, seamless, or nude shades of hose, shoes with open toes and heels or spike heels (including all heights of pencil heels), or hats which display flowers, veiling, and other superfluous adornments. Furthermore, we urge our women to wear hose and dress modestly that we may be examples of modesty at all times, both in public and in the home.

c. That we also refrain from the worldly style of the "Long bob," and cutting, trimming and curling the hair. I Corinthians 11:15. We believe with John Wesley on the Scripture, I Timothy 2:9, that "Broidered hair" means curled hair.

d. That we also dress our boys and girls modestly, thus teaching them early the necessity of modesty in dress. Not permitting our boys to go without shirts, to wear shorts or sheer shirts, and that our girls wear long hose and not be allowed to wear sheer clothing or slacks.

10. That we urge the avoidance of unnecessary debts, and the neglecting of long standing bills. "Owe no man anything." Romans 13:8

11. a. That as far as possible, we refrain from patronizing establishments selling intoxicating beverages, and also that we oppose the use of tobacco in all its forms since we greatly detest the use and effect of both. II Corinthians 7:1

b. We urge that our children be given scientific instruction on the evils of tobacco, alcohol, and all narcotic drugs.

c. That we be patriotic by displaying the American Flag in observing national holidays, thereby honoring God Who gives us freedom and liberty.

12. That resolutions be read in each society semi-annually.

CONVENTION MINUTES

First Day July 12, 1963

The 32nd Annual Youth Convention of the Allegheny Conference convened on Stoneboro Camp Ground with the first service on July 11, 1963. At this service the appointments for temporary organization were read. The first business meeting was held on July 12, 1963, and was called to order by Rev. P. D. Stonebraker. Rev. Frank Miller led in singing "Deeper, Deeper," the Scripture was read by Rev. Jack Benninger, and prayer was led by Miss Pearl Troup. Roll was called with 75 delegates present, 23 pastors, and 25 youth presidents. The bar of Conference was set as

the first 12 rows of the center and right hand tier of seats, and the platform. The president's report was given and accepted as read, except Item 8. Recommendations, sub-item 5, which was voted on and adopted. The committee appointed by the president to study the possibility of setting terminal dates for the Conference Youth fiscal year is William Rosengreen, F. E. Mansell, and E. O. Hannold. The treasurer's report was read and referred to the Committee on Finance. The report of the Prayer League Secretary was read and accepted. The president presented a plan that we return to the Bible Quiz for our conference activity. This was voted upon and passed. There was discussion on the subject of which Book or Books were to be used in the quiz. It was voted to leave this decision in the hands of the Executive Committee. The president presented for discussion the new youth project of building a pioneer church. The motion was made and passed that the Executive Committee further look into this. A report was given by David Phelps on the 9th Quadrennial Convention of Wesleyan Youth. The revised report on temporary organization was read. The meeting was adjourned by vote.

Second Day July 13, 1963

The second business meeting was called to order by President Stonebraker. Rev. Clarence Mayhle led in singing "Redeemed." Prayer was led by Wm. Mydock. Roll was called with 88 delegates present, 31 pastors, and 22 youth presidents. Balloting ensued. The first team tellers were Burton Adiska, Larry Agnew, Wayne Stiffler, and Mark Mansell. The tellers on the second team were Clarence Mayhle, Jerry Diffenderfer, Kenneth McCune, and Forrest Wheeler. A partial report of the Nominating committee was read. The names of P. D. Stonebraker and F. E. Satterfield were submitted for president. Balloting for President ensued. The Efficiency Standard Committee report was read and accepted with the recommendation that the word poor under number one be dropped out and let it be read-Spiritual state of grace, Good None. The report of the Committee on Resolutions was read and adopted. The ballot for president resulted in the election of P. D. Stonebraker with 133 ballots out of 145. Partial report of the Nominating committee read. The names of Prewitt Duncan and David Price were submitted for vice president. Balloting for vice president ensued. Report of Statistical Committee read and adopted. There was discussion on Wesleyan Youth membership. The ballot for vice president resulted in the election of Prewitt Duncan with 117 ballots out of 144. Partial report of nominating committee read. Names of David Phelps and John Dye were submitted for secretary. Balloting for secretary ensued. The committee for setting the fiscal year for Allegheny Conference Wesleyan Youth Treasurer reported. The dates July 1 to June 30 were suggested. The motion was made and carried to adopt this report. The report of the Finance Committee was read and adopted. The report of the Committee on Goals and Methods was read and adopted. The ballot for secretary resulted in the election of David Phelps with 113 out of 140. Partial report of the Nominating committee was read. Names of William Rosengreen and William Cornell were submitted for treasurer. Balloting for treasurer ensued. The report of the nominations of the District and Zone Chairmen was read and adopted. James Beers was nominated and elected as Efficiency Standard Secretary. Lindy Boston was nominated and elected as Prayer League Secretary. Reports of Zone Chairmen were given and accepted. The ballot for treasurer resulted in the election of William Rosengreen with 113 ballots out of 135. A motion was made and carried that all unfinished business be left in the hands of the Executive Committee. The minutes for both days were read and accepted. The motion was made and carried to adjourn.

THE ALLEGHENY W. Y. PRESIDENT'S REPORT

To the Thirty-second Annual Youth Convention now convening at Stoneboro, Pennsylvania, July 11-14, 1963

To every pastor, youth president and youth delegate in this representative assembly, we cordially greet you in the wonderful Name of Jesus.

Once again through God's good favor and evident mercy we're permitted to meet on this "hill top" where so often we've enjoyed God's presence and shared His blessing. With the Psalmist we could say; "The lines are fallen unto (us) in pleasant places; yea, (we) have a goodly heritage."—To many of us this is a hallowed spot where important decisions have been made which through life and into eternity will have their lasting effects. Our prayer today is that in this Convention, God's Spirit shall again grant a convicting, responsive spirit of heart obedience among our young people here assembled. May God help every young person on these grounds to think seriously, and act wisely in seeking God with all earnestness and purpose. May you choose the "old paths" of a separated life, and may you run the Christian race with valor and one day obtain the Victor's crown.

You and I, as mid-twentieth century young people, are living in an age of world-wide spiritual dearth and darkness. Yea, this is a godless generation. Resultant from the Supreme Court's action, you teen-age young people are now faced with prayerless teachers and Bibleless classrooms. Little by little carnal man has picked away at every moral basic of your generation. He now leaves you the bleached bone of "nothingness." Dr. Max Rafferty charged these adversaries of spiirtual truth by saying: "You have done your best to produce a race of barely literate savages. Your modern education has debunked the hero to make way for the jerk."

A poor, bewildered student at a Colorado university wrote these sad words, "My University is a pretty nice place. The social activities are swell, the kids super, and the professors about as fair as they can be. All in all, the University is tops. There's just one thing missing—a Person known as God. Try as you might you can't find Him anywhere!"— In other words, for the most part, young people can't find God in the average home; they're not finding Him in the school and eternal woes will be upon us if they can't find Him in your Church or mine. Young person, I would exhort you to mind God in this Youth Convention.

Unless we soon see revival, you young people are going to face a broadening influence of godlessness and lawlessness. The modernistic anti-christ powers are increasing and unless you become firmly settled to mind God in an atmosphere such as this Youth Convention provides, I fear you'll go down. Unless you mind God soon, young person, you'll be apt to accept anything and be prey to everything. When the pressure is on, you'll be found standing for nothing and falling for everything.

How thankful then, we should be for the spiritual purposes of Allegheny Conference youth. Our standards, by some, may be considered high and our moral guidelines straight, yet they do not excel the heights for holy living required in God's Word. Our purposes are clear; we want to live pure lives and make it through to Heaven. Our business is eternal; we strive to see young people saved, sanctified and living a holy life. Yea, guilt and the blood of others will be on our hands if we fail in directing our youth aright. May the Lord then help us to keep our lines scripturally distinct and our promotings holy.

First, I would express my heartfelt appreciation to each of you for you patience, prayers and cooperation this past year. Your frequent words of encouragement have been helpful as we've endeavored to lead you. The task of directing the lives of more than a thousand young people in Allegheny Wesleyan Youth is too big to be shouldered by one. It demands the cooperative interest and prayerful concern of all.

At the 1962 Youth Convention your nine Zone Youth Chairmen were prayerfully selected and commissioned to work among you. We believe each one has done an excellent job in his respective zone. We do thank these men, who out of a busy life have taken time to direct monthly rallies and shepherd the youth of their zones.

It has been rewarding to work with the fine men of your relatively new Executive Committee; Prewitt Duncan, David Phelps and William Rosengreen. Together, we have labored to know and do God's will in all our planning for the Conference youth work. I feel your executive council has cooperatively worked with and appreciated the advice of the new Senior Advisory Committee, Rev. H. C. Van Wormer, Rev. T. A. Robertson as well as other Conference officials.

- 3. That you read the books of the "Wesleyan Youth Reading Course" which will be selected and commended to you by your Conference Youth Executive Council.
- 4. That we strive for a gain in youth membership this year and a goal of at least three newly organized "locals."
- 5. That a 3 person committee be appointed to study and report tomorrow on the possibility of setting terminal dates for the Con-

ference Youth "fiscal year."

6. That all, including zone chairmen, pastors and youth presidents encourage participation in the "Bible Quiz" which will be announced at this Convention. If a conviction prohibits competitive interests in your local, then at least study the chosen book and prepared questions for personal knowledge and spiritual gain.

THE PRAYER LEAGUE SECRETARY

On a certain occasion as Jesus was praying, one of His disciples asked Him to "Teach us to pray." In the Scriptures we read that if we abide in Him and His Word abides in us we can ask what we will and it shall

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON GOALS AND METHODS

The Committee on Goals and Methods submits the following report: 1. That every church organize a Wesleyan Youth Society.

2. That each society send the name and address of the local W. Y. President and Secretary to the Conference W. Y. President not later than one week after election.

3. a. That each society pay annually:

(1) \$2.00 per full member for General Conference Dues

(2) .50 per full member for Conference Dues

(3) .50 per full member Annual Convention Entertainment

b. That each unorganized society pay:

(1) \$.50 per each attender for Conference Dues

All moneys to be sent through church treasurer not later than April 30. 4. a. That our pastors and local W. Y. Presidents carefully read and do their best to carry out the program of our Efficiency Standard.

b. That a committee composed of the Pastor, W. Y. President, and Secretary or the Efficiency Standard Chairman, shall grade the local society quarterly, according to the Efficiency Standard. This rating shall be submitted to the Conference Efficiency Standard Chairman quarterly and the annual report two weeks before the Annual Young People's Conference.

c. That the secretary keep such records as are necessary for this committee to make this rating.

5. That each W. Y. support the Pioneer Program of the conference,

6. That each W. Y. heartily support our missionary endeavor according to the requirements of the Discipline with one service a month for missions and we suggest that the offering of said meeting be given for missions. 7. That each local society strive to engage in as many of the following as possible:

a. Street and institutional meetings.

b. Cottage prayer meetings.

c. Tract distribution.

d. Door-knob evangelism.

e. Visitation of sick and shut-ins.

f. Cooperation with child evangelism, Daily Vacation Bible School, and Religious Education in public schools.

g. Become a member of Conference Brigade of Intercessory Commandos.

8. That each local W. Y. cooperate 100 percent to make Wesleyan Youth Week all God wants it to be, and strive to interest other young people outside the church in these services.

9. a. That a Local Prayer League Secretary to cooperate with the Conference Prayer League Secretary be elected to recruit volunteers for the W. Y. League.

b. That the name and address of this Secretary be sent at once to the Conference Prayer League Secretary.

10. That the W. Y. augment the church and Sunday School library, or where there is none, sponsor one with good church literature approved by the pastor and adult counselor.

11. That each society send the President, two delegates, chaperon, and pastor, with expenses paid, to the Annual W. Y. Convention.

12. a. That the Conference W. Y. President arrange to hold at least one service in each zone of each district during the year.

b. That his traveling expenses be paid by each zone visited.

13. That the District and Zones evaluate their activities according to the following point system and an appropriate award be given to one achieving the highest percentage.

10 points for having at least 6 Rallies a year.

10 points for the organization of each new society.

- 10 points for a Paid Conference Budget for every organized society. (50 cents per member)
- 10 points for District or Zone Youth revival.

10 points for meeting Zone pledge.

5 extra points for over subscribing the zone pledge 10%.

5 points for Conference dues for every unorganized society.

5 points for Chairman attending Annual Conference Convention.

5 points for Chairman reporting the year's activities to the Annual Conference Convention.

5 points for report of Zone Rallies sent into the Conference Messenger.

5 points for report of one Zone Rally sent into the Wesleyan Youth magazine.

Goals for 1963-64

- 1. That we seek to have a spiritual program that is God-honoring, Christcentered, and Spirit-directed.
- 2. That all Youth Societies report to the Annual Youth Convention.

- 3. That at least 3 new W. Y. Societies be organized.
- 4. That we heartily support the Conference W. Y. program and projects.
- 5. That these goals and methods be read in each local society within the first month after receiving the conference minutes. Also that they be read at the first youth rally.
- 6. That each W. Y. send by mail all statistical reports to the Conference Youth Secretary not later than July 1.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

We, the Committee on Resolutions of the Wesleyan Youth of the Allegheny Conference submit the following:

1. That we, as Wesleyan Youth, govern our lives by adhering to the Standards of the Bible and the principles set forth in the Discipline, as interpreted by the Allegheny Conference.

2. a. That we, as Christian youth, have a definite plan of Bible reading, Bible memorization, and prayer, and accept privileges of carrying a soul burden.

b. That we strive to have each active member of the Wesleyan Youth become a member of the Wesleyan Youth Prayer League.

c. That we suggest the election of a Local Prayer League secretary that shall administer the duties of the Prayer League within the local society.

d. That we prayerfully strive for a Youth Week Revival.

3. a. That we refrain from reading unwholesome literature such as comics, Detective and True Story or other literature detrimental to our spiritual life.

b. We strongly urge our youth to build Christian character through careful and extensive reading of edifying literature.

c. That we read the books of the "Wesleyan Youth Reading Course" which will be selected and commended by your Allegheny Conference Youth Executive Council.

4. That because of the physical, moral, and spiritual degeneration resulting from the use of tobacco, narcotics, and alcoholic beverages, especially among our youth, we take a vigorous stand against these evils.

5. That, in view of the fact that he that is a friend of the world is an enemy of God, we urge all our youth to take a positive stand against worldliness in that we refrain from the following:

a. Card playing, games of chance, theater attendance, public beaches, mixed bathing, dance halls (including participation in Senior Proms), skating rinks, bowling, circuses, carnivals, fairs, and viewing television.

b. Wearing of jewelry.

c. Wearing of the immodest and worldly style of dress. (Both boys and girls.)

d. Worldly amusements and organized sports.

6. That due to the problems of modern education, in as far as possible and advisable, we will support our own church schools with our prayers and finances. 7. That our societies be evangelistic in our plan of work, supporting the Sunday School and other church services, by distributing tracts, street meetings, personal work, and pioneer work.

8. That our regular meetings be restricted to a time of spiritual uplift instead of a time of eating, drinking and frivolity.

9. That each society shall appoint a proper chaperon for their group attending the annual convention, who shall be responsible for their conduct and attendance at all services of the convention; and we request the presence of pastors.

10. That each society have two adult counselors, one of which shall be the pastor.

11. That we as Wesleyan Youth of the Allegheny Conference resolve to be different. Let's resolve to make our lives epistles, read and known of all men.

12. That these resolutions be read in each local society semi-annually.
