JOURNAL OF DAILY PROCEEDINGS

Wesleyan Methodist Campground, Buechel, Kentucky, August 4, 1947

The Kentucky Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America convened for the twenty-fifth annual session on the campground at 8:00 p. m. August 4, 1947. The service was opened with Kenneth L. McGuyer leading the congregational singing. Brother Koshewa prayed, after which the Toler Trio sang a special song. An offering was taken for incidental expenses.

The Rev. D. W. Fossit preached the Conference Sermon, using Heb. 11:6 and Jude 3 as texts for the subject of "Contending for the Faith Once Delivered unto the Saints." A profound address that aroused our faith and convictions was impressed on our minds, stirring our souls.

The Rev. F. R. Birch, Foreign Missionary Secretary, was elected to preside over the Conference, who called the Conference to order. The Secretary called the Conference roll of Elders and Conference Preachers.

Roll call: 22 Elders; 16 Conference Preachers; 25 Delegates.

Brother Hunter, the Conference President appointed the Rev. James Hodges and the Rev. C. M. Hewitt as a Committee on Credentials who collected the Delegates credentials from the following who were duly enrolled by vote; John Basham, Gwendolyn J. Blanchard, Rose Bolton, John Brown, C. M. Clark, Zella Gastinger, May Mackay, Madeline Mackay, Ethel New, Grace Newman, Daily Renfro, Kenneth Reynolds, Winnie Rothrock, Verdess Toler, Hattie Wilson, Mable Wolfe, Edith Van Cise.

The bar of Conference was fixed as the first five seats and the platform.

Brother Hunter, according to Standing Resolution, appointed the chairmen of the following committees:

Religious Services: J. E. Hunter; Louis Baumgartel and Mrs. Winnie Rothrock were elected as other members of committee.

Statistics: Stanley Kendall, Chairman who was given the privilege of choosing his own help.

Resolutions: John Van Cise, choosing his own help.

Finance: G. W. Stockton, who nominated Earl Pommerehn and John Basham to assist.

Conference Reporter: Harrison Davidson, Sr., choosing own help.

Courtesies: John Woodward, who chose A. T. Reynolds as second member.

Pastoral Relations: J. E. Hunter, who chose as other members D. W. Fossit, W. B. Dunkum, Joseph Myers, B. L. Clark and John Brown.

Character: J. E. Hunter, ex-officio; Henry Taylor, James Hodges were chosen other members of said committee.

Auditing: Louis Baumgartel, choosing Kenneth L. McGuyer as second member.

Solicitor for Wesleyan: Ernest Shermer.

Memorial Services: R. E. Bolton.

By motion the time of the Conference session was set for 8:30 to 12:00 noon and 2:00 p. m. to adjourn on motion. This motion was amended to have the afternoon session to meet at 2:00 p. m. for one half hour, then recess for 2 hours for the women's meeting.

Further amendment was made to amend the amendment to meet at 1:30 for one half hour and recess for 2 hours to meet again at 4:00 o'clock. Adjourned by motion. Dismissed by C. M. Hewitt.

Second Meeting, Tuesday 8:30 a. m.

K. L. McGuyer conducted the devotions.

The roll was called with quorum present.

Roll call: 21 Elders, 15 Conference Preachers, 27 Delegates. Minutes of the last session were read and corrected.

Partial report of Committee on Credentials was given with the following names being enrolled as Delegates: B. L. Clark, Hazel King, Eunice Hook, Alberta Murphy, Curtis Parson, Martha Pierce, Alter Traynor, Rae Hardisty, Essie Henry.

Maude Helm from Jamestown was seated by vote as a Delegate.

Motion was supported that those Delegates present Monday evening whose names were not called as Delegates, be enrolled as present since they were here.

Mrs. Landers Johnson was seated by motion as Alternate Delegate from Madison, as of Monday evening.

Chairman of Committee on Resolutions chose John Woodward and A. T. Reynolds as members of committee, who were duly elected.

Carmen Toler was nominated by Stanley Kendall as the other member of the Statistical Committee and was accepted by vote.

Kenneth Reynolds was nominated by R. E. Bolton and duly elected as other member of Committee on Memorials.

The President, J. E. Hunter, read his report which was accepted by vote. (See Report No. 1.)

Committee on Courtesy reported, presenting Rev. B. I. Seaton, who was absent last year. The following were also introduced, Dallas Caplinger, Rev. Feazel of Indiana Conference.

Motion to adjourn for committee work carried. James Hodges dismissed with prayer.

Third Meeting, Tuesday 1:30 p. m.

Conference assembled when Blanche Burres led the singing and Ethel Olds conducted the devotions with the idea of "Going Forward."

Two Delegates—Harlan Mays and Mrs. Harlan Mays, both of Winchester were seated as Delegates. The Alternate Delegate—H. E. Cantrell from Bloomfield was seated.

A partial report of the Finance Committee was given.

Committee on Religious Services gave their report which was adopted.

The Committee on Courtesies introduced the following: Carl Walker, Mr. and Mrs. James Bishop, Mr. and Mrs. Peder Davidson, and Harold Noggle of Marion College.

Recessed until 4 o'clock.

Conference assembled at 4:00 p. m. The following pastors' characters were passed and statistics read: A. T. Reynolds, James Hodges, H. E. Wilson, C. M. Hewitt, Blanche Burris, Susie Britton, Florence Burris.

Adjourned by motion. Dismissed by H. E. Wilson.

Fourth Meeting Wednesday 8:30 a. m.

K. L. McGuyer led the singing and Carmen Toler conducted the devotions. Cordelia Robinson and Norma Bladen sang a special song.

Roll call: 22 Elders, 20 Conference Preachers, 30 Delegates.

Conference minutes read, corrected and approved.

Committee on Credentials presented Garvin Shaffer, Clyde Crawford who were seated by vote.

Order of the Day arrived for Rev. F. R. Birch to give Connectional address in which he told us of the plan of coordination adopted at the General Conference, and showed its need and efficiency. Much valuable advice was given concerning going into new territory to establish a church. The Superannuate Pension Plan was also presented.

Special Orders of the Day arrived for election of officers.

Tellers: A. T. Reynolds, W. G. Stockton, Henry Taylor, Louis Baumgartel.

The election resulted as follows: President, C. L. Blanchard; Vice-President, D. W. Fossit; Secretary, Earl G. Pommerehn; Treasurer, George Basham; Ministerial Trustee, Ralph Golding; Lay Trustee, K. K. Rothrock.

Motion prevailed that the rest of the officers be elected by acclamation.

Sunday School Secretary, Harrison Davidson, Sr.; Education Secretary, Earl G. Pommerehn; Tithing Secretary, W. B. Dunkum, Members of Sunday School Board, John Van Cise, W. B. Dunkum; Local Board of Managers of Marion College, C. L. Blanchard, alternate, J. E. Hunter; Librarian, John Woodward; Judiciary Committee, C. L. Blanchard, ex-officio; D. W. Fossit, W. B. Dunkum, and K. L. McGuyer.

Committee on Vacancies, C. L. Blanchard ex-officio; D. W. Fossit, B. L. Clark, J. E. Hunter, K. K. Rothrock. Itineracy and Elders Orders for term of 4 years, Earl G. Pommerehn; President's Advisory Board, D. W. Fossit, ministerial member; and B. L. Clark, lay member.

Adjourned by motion. Brother Birch dismissed the Conference with prayer.

Fifth Meeting, Wednesday 1:30 p. m.

Sister Woodward conducted the devotions.

Roll call: 25 Elders, 17 Conference Preachers, 28 Delegates.

Conference minutes read and approved.

Recessed until 4 p. m.

Met at 4 p. m. Moved and supported that the Conference discuss the Pension Plan, which was discussed until the Orders of the Day arrived.

Rev. R. E. Bolton took charge of the Memorial Services as a Special Orders of the Day. (See Report No. 10.)

Rev. B. L. Seaton spoke of two laymen who passed away to be with Jesus.

Adjourned by limitation. Brother Hunter dismissed with prayer.

Sixth Meeting, Thursday 8:00 a. m.

Special Orders of the Day (See Report No. 10.)

9:00 a. m. Conference convened.

Brother and Sister Hunter were given a rising vote of thanks for their splendid leadership and help through the years.

Motion prevailed that the Pension Plan be considered.

Moved and supported that the Pension Plan be accepted.

By motion, and discussion the previous question was closed by vote of 53 to 4 against.

By standing vote of 54 the Pension Plan was adopted with only 3 voting to the contrary.

The Committee on Finance gave the final reading, moved and supported for acceptance. The motion was made and supported that the report be considered as a whole, and so accepted. (See Report No. 9.)

Moved and supported that the Resolutions Report be accepted. (See Report No. 2.)

Motion was supported that Superintendent of Pioneer Evangelism be elected.

W. G. Stockton was nominated and elected as Superintendent of Pioneer Evangelism.

A. T. Reynolds was nominated and elected as member of Committee of Pioneer Evangelism to act with Superintendent and C. L. Blanchard exofficio.

Motion made and supported that duly active ministers be on the Nominating Committee.

The following were elected to serve on the Nominating Committee: C. L. Blanchard, chairman; D. W. Fossit, K. L. McGuyer, Earl G. Pommerehn, John Woodward.

Auditing Report was read and adopted. (See Report No. 6.)

Moved and supported that the matter of time, place, and arrangement of program for the Ministerial Institute be left in the hands of the Itineracy and Elders Orders Committee and the Conference President.

The names of the following were called, characters passed, and statistics reported: Graham Bright, Ralph Golding, D. W. Fossit, R. E. Bolton, H. L. Barger, Lee R. Meredith, B. L. Seaton. Adjourned by motion. Brother Birch dismissed with prayer.

Seventh Meeting, Thursday, 1:30 p. m.

Devotions were conducted by John Van Cise. Prayer by Harrison Davidson, Sr.

Roll called: 18 Elders; 13 Conference Preachers, 12 Delegates.

Minutes of last meeting read and approved.

Committee on Itineracy and Elders Orders reported. Motion moved, supported and adopted. (See Report No. 4.)

Question raised as to the appearing of Audrey Hublard's name on the Conference Preachers' list.

Motion made and supported to amend report on Itineracy and Elders Orders by adding Audrey Hublard's name.

Moved and supported that report be referred back to committee.

The name of the following was called, character passed, and statistics reported: W. G. Stockton.

Report of Conference Treasurer read, motion made and supported for its adoption, and so adopted. (See Report No. 8.)

Recessed at two p. m.

Eighth Meeting, Friday, 8:30 a. m.

Conference convened at call of Chair.

Roll call: 16 Elders, 13 Conference Preachers, 12 Delegates.

Minutes read and approved.

An additional Standing Resolution was passed suggesting that newly elected Conference officers take office at the rise of Conference except Secretary who should take office at once. Moved, supported and adopted that it be placed in Standing Resolutions.

Committee on Itineracy and Elders Orders reported.

Motion made, supported and passed to add J. K. Cole's name, pending the receiving his transfer from Iowa Conference.

Itineracy and Elders Orders report adopted. (See Report No. 4.)

Pastoral Relations Committee gave a partial report.

L. McGuyer, Earl Monday, Joseph Myers, Earl G. Pommerehn, Henry Taylor, John Woodward, Gilbert Denton, communication read from Hazel Dunkum, Christine Fowler, Kate Hewitt, Russel Mart, Esther Sniffin.

Young People's Report given and adopted.

Moved and adopted that John Arnold's and Thomas Laughderbough's names be dropped from ministerial list and be recorded by the Itineracy and Elders Orders.

Discussion in regards to the printing of minutes.

Moved and adopted that we purchase a new record book for the Secretary.

Moved that we have our Minutes printed at Wesleyan Publishing House and so adopted.

Moved and adopted that Minutes be paid for from the Conference Work Fund.

Adjourned to meet at call of Chair.

Ninth Meeting, Friday, 1:30 p. m.

Conference convened at call of Chair. Names of the following were called, characters passed, and statistical reports given: John Van Cise, Kenneth Reynolds, Florence Hayes.

Pastoral Relations Committee gave final report and it was adopted. (See Report No. 3.)

W. B. Dunkum resigned as Tithing Secretary. Motion made and supported that resignation of Tithing Secretary be accepted and so adopted.

Rev. Louis Baumgartel was nominated Tithing Secretary and he was elected.

C. L. Blanchard and John Woodward were nominated to preach the Conference Address at the 1948 Conference.

C. L. Blanchard was elected.

Motion made and supported to adjourn to meet at call of the Chair.

Tenth Meeting, Saturday, 8:30 a. m.

Conference opened with prayer by Lee R. Meredith.

Roll call: 11 Elders, 5 Conference Preachers, 5 Delegates.

Minutes of last meeting read and approved.

Moved that Conference Treasurer also be custodian of all legal documents and records, supported and adopted.

Report of Statistical Committee read. Moved the adoption of Statistical Report, supported and adopted.

A rising vote of thanks was given the Statistical Committee for outstanding work.

Committee on Courtesy introduced F. T. Howard and wife from Covington, Ky.

The following name was called, character passed and report given:
Hallie Giltner.

Elders approved the ordination of Hallie Giltner, A. T. Reynolds, and
Christine Fowler.

Adjourned by motion to call of Chair.

STANDING RESOLUTIONS

1. The Conference President shall in his quarterly meetings see that adequate insurance is carried by each church on its property.

2. To eliminate loss of time the Committee on Character Examination, after having signed statistical blanks shall deliver same to Conference Secretary, who in turn shall deliver them to pastor at time of reading on Conference floor.

3. The Conference shall elect a Standing Committee consisting of five members, the Conference President exofficio, to nominate each chairman and committee of the Conference; temporary organization for the next annual Conference, the Conference President shall serve on this Committee.

4. The Conference fiscal year shall close July 22, when each pastor shall mail his statistical report, with receipts, to the Treasurer.

5. The Conference Trustees shall serve as the Committee on Church and Parsonage Location.

6. The Conference shall convene the first Monday night of August each year.

7. All Ministers and Delegates to annual Conference are to be given rooms in preference to those not active in Conference business.

8. No divorced person shall be ordained in the Kentucky Conference.

9. Conference officials shall take office at the rise of the Conference with the exception of the Secretary, who shall assume office in the next meeting following the election.

REPORTS

Report No. 1

KENTUCKY CONFERENCE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE AND REPORT

In the providence of God we are completing the fourteenth year of service in the Kentucky Conference. We are thankful for another good year among pastors, evangelists, mission workers and laity. This year of 1947 also marks the end of another quadrennium of our Church's activities. Our people will be glad to know that the Lord has blessed with gains numerically, financially, and we believe spiritually. Our total membership now exceeding 600 has resulted in our becoming from this General Conference which has recently convened, an established Conference, and no longer a "Mission Conference." In the field of Church Extension, Kentucky Conference led in the four year period, in opening fourteen new churches. We are thankful for the different efforts on the part of groups and individuals who have labored to make this possible. The growth and development of the Campground project, during the period of nine years, the efforts of all who made its beginning, and development possible, is a testimony of a people who have faith in God, and a "Mind to Work." All departments of our Church in general are advancing which is evidenced, by their activities, and the presence of the Lord.

For these and many other things we are thankful, but there is no time for letting up, slackness, or indifference. We need to beware of the indifference of the Laodicean Church (Rev. 6:6) the spirit of the age is "We are INCREASED IN GOODS AND HAVE NEED OF NOTHING." The cause and cure is to be found in the hearts of men and women, and we are responsible, that the need be met in a fire-baptized Ministry, and Laity. We, in the Kentucky Conference, are facing problems that demand the best, and we should heed the warning of Paul, "Make Full Proof of Thy Ministry." "I know thy works, but because thou art neither hot nor cold I will spue thee out of my mouth."

We have and still urge the need of God-sent workers, in Divinely appointed places, then no place is too hard. Though sent by a Conference we should have a consciousness of being sent of a greater One from above, knowing we are serving Him by serving our fellow beings. "In His Kingdom he that will be greatest shall be the servant of all." Not working for a crowd, a sensation, or a place in the sun, but bearing the reproach of the cross in all places." OUR CHALLENGE IS NOT TO PREACH THE WORD ALONE, BUT TO BECOME BROKEN BREAD AND POURED OUT WITHIN THE HANDS OF GOD FOR OTHERS.

In planning of the work for another year, may we have full cooperation among all. Let us not "Limit the Holy One of Israel" by saying in the face of any task "It Can't Be Done." "We have no Bread," or "The Well is too Deep." We see the need of local evangelizing and pioneer efforts on the part of workers in some places. Planning in view of the strong helping the weaker churches in evangelism and indoctrinating the people with standards of Wesleyan Methodism, with a greater knowledge of our Literature with greater stress put on subscriptions to our periodicals. For the strengthening of the Ministry, the grouping of churches for Zone Meetings other than those planned by the organizations of the churches. Most of all we would ask for the help of the Holy Spirit, and let our prayer be for a Pentecostal Revival.

During the past year I have made the two assigned rounds of quarterly business meetings, preached on many other occasions, prayed in homes and done some personal evangelism. Special business trips have been made, and contacts made as the work has demanded. The Pioneer works opened the previous year have been financed and supported this year through that fund, and with the present program in that field it has not been providential to open new ones during the past year. The establishing of a work takes much time and sacrifice on the part of the pioneer worker, and we believe they should have some support from the Conference while doing so. I have seen three new church buildings in the Conference completed or in the making. They are Paoli, Ind. dedicated in May, Shiloh, near Corydon, Ind., dedicated in December, and Rock Springs, near English, Ind., soon to be finished. The rapid growth and progress of these and other new works, is because faithful and sacrificing men are in charge of these places.

I made a business trip to Marion College as a member of the Board of Managers. I attended one inter-fellowship meeting, with officials of the Free Methodist Church, with the Conference Presidents of the Wesleyan Methodist Church. I planned and arranged for Ministerial Institute in April. I attended General Conference as Delegate in June.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

4. Every pastor and evangelist shall attend Annual Conference and Camp Meeting if they expect to retain their relationship with us, unless providentially hindered.
5. Every preacher borrowing a book from the Conference Library may hold it for only one month. There will be a flat rate of twenty-five cents for the month and five cents for every day over the month.
6. Let us vigorously protest against liquor by every means possible to the Christian, including a refusal to patronize merchants who handle the same. We shall likewise oppose the wholesale prostitution existing in Army and National life by exalting a virtuous life and instructing young people and parents.
7. In this age where immodesty and worldliness are so subtly creeping into the Holiness Movement, let every minister of ours earnestly contend for, and faithfully preach the entire Word of God without fear or favor of man, let us refuse to compromise with the ungodly element which is robbing the Church of her glory, and preachers of the divine anointing.
8. Let no minister return to visit members of his previous charge, or correspond regularly with them after leaving that field to begin labors elsewhere unless necessity demands.

1. We insist that each Annual Conference Preacher taking the first and second year in the Course of Study, be examined on, and pass, three books, as well as read three required books, in the Course of Study as designated by the Discipline, Paragraph 170. Failure to meet these requirements and to complete the first and second year's Course of Study in two years each shall make one ineligible for work in the Conference until these requirements are met.

2. We insist that any Annual Conference Preacher taking the third or fourth year in the Course of Study who fails to pass on at least two books in the Course of Study and to read at least two books in the reading course shall be considered delinquent and subject to disciplinary proceedings as given in paragraph 170, sub-paragraph 3.

3. All Conference Preachers employed as pastors may vote in the Annual Conference, not including Conference Evangelists or assistant pastors.

4. We recommend the following persons for Annual Conference licenses and to pursue the Course of Study, provided they have not passed it: Mildred Barr, Norma Bladen, Graham Bright, Harry Cantrell, Dallas Caplinger, J. K. Cole, Dorothy Comingore, Lurene Coy, Milton Coy, Mary Davidson, Gilbert Denton, Clesten Douglas, C. C. Hayes, Florence Hayes, Kate Hewitt, Audrey Hublard, Ruby Irwin, E. L. Jackson, Stanley Kendall, Russel Mart, Lee R. Meredith, Ethel M. Olds, Don Polson, Daily Renfro, Kenneth Reynolds, Cordelia Robinson, B. L. Seaton, Carmen Toler, John Van Cise, Ethel M. Van Cise, Bernice Woodward.

5. We recommend that A. T. Reynolds, Hallie Giltner, and Christine Fowler be elected to Elders' Orders.

6. The Committee set the time for the next Preachers' Institute to begin April 5, 1948, Monday evening and to close Thursday evening the eighth.

Report No. 9

REPORT OF FINANCE COMMITTEE

1. We recommend that all churches paying less than \$900.00 salary, endeavor to raise the salary to that amount.

2. We recommend that this Conference pay Connectional Budget Assessments. (See budget apportionment.)

3. We recommend that each member pay \$1.50 to the Conference Work Fund. This money shall be disbursed by the Conference Treasurer with the approval of the Conference President and his Advisory Board.

4. We strongly recommend the Storehouse Plan of Tithing as the general financial plan of the Church. Each pastor shall encourage the adoption of this plan by his church. (See Malachi 3:8-10.)

5. We recommend that the Conference Treasurer and the Conference Secretary each be paid \$50.00 a year.

6. We recommend and endorse the Church Extension Card Plan. Let all pastors present the same to their churches as soon as possible after returning from Conference.

7. All churches shall pay the current or outgoing pastor his salary in advance, or send it when due, for the Conference and Camp Meeting weeks.

8. We recommend that the Conference President be paid a salary of \$2000.00 per year, plus traveling expenses to be figured at 4c per mile in connection with Conference work. This shall be raised by the \$1.00 a year per member, and by the tithe of the preacher's cash salary. These funds are to be sent by the church treasurer to the Conference monthly. All accruing funds above the foregoing designation shall revert to the following funds: one half to Conference Work Fund and one half to Pioneer Evangelism Fund. It is understood that weaker churches be allowed to appeal to this fund for aid.

9. We recommend that any church not having a parsonage for the use of the pastor, either pay the rent for, or buy, or build, a parsonage.

10. We recommend that each active member of the local W. Y. P. Society pay 50c annually on the Connectional W. Y. P. S. Budget. (It is understood that this amount be raised by the local society.) We further recommend that no church budget be considered paid in full until this item is paid.

11. Each pastor's moving bill shall be paid by the contracting church.

12. Let all churches feel their obligation to give monthly donations to their pastor.

13. We recommend, in accordance with the action of the Book Committee that all newly-organized churches and organized missions be exempt from Connectional Budget the first two years; furthermore that they

be exempt from the Conference Budget the first year and take free will offerings for Conference Budget the second year.

14. We recommend that all General Evangelists, Conference Evangelists, and local preachers pay tithe from cash salary into the church where they hold membership, and that they report the amount of tithe paid to the local church in their annual report.

15. We recommend that \$1.00 per member be raised throughout the Conference for Conference entertainment for the preachers, their families, and Delegates. In addition, we recommend that all Elders, Conference Preachers, and Evangelists pay a registration fee of \$3.00. The same granting them and their family camp entertainment to go in effect immediately.

16. We recommend that each pastor raise the amount of \$1.00 for the purpose of erecting a new building at Marion College. This money shall be sent to the Conference Treasurer and specified, but shall not count on Educational Budget.

17. We recommend that 15c per member per month be raised for Pioneer Evangelism. This shall be brought into the church the first Sunday of each month. Then additionally, the Sunday School offering of the first Sunday of each month shall accrue to Pioneer Evangelism. These funds shall be sent to the Conference Treasurer monthly. As there is no full-time man in the field of Pioneer Evangelism, we recommend that this Conference body elect a Superintendent of Pioneer Evangelism, and a committee of two with the Conference President a member of said committee. All reimbursements from Pioneer Evangelism fund be approved by a majority of said committee. We further recommend that all commitments be left to the judgment of the Superintendent and his elected committee.

18. We recommend that each member be assessed one dollar a year, this money to be placed in a fund which shall be known as the Camp Meeting Fund; the money to be used to help pay the expense of the Camp Meeting.

COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

We, the Committee on Resolutions, submit the following report:

We thank our Heavenly Father for every blessing!

Resolved:

1. That, since intercessory prayer is the greatest need of our missionary work, we urge our members to pray much for a revival in the foreign and home fields while the harvest is ripe.

2. Recognizing the fact that juvenile delinquency, more properly called parental delinquency, is sweeping over our land and also recognizing the power of example as shown by Paul's words to Timothy, "Be thou an example of the believers in word, in conversation, in charity, in spirit, in faith, in purity," be it resolved that all our women set before our youth the godly example of a consistent Christian life evidenced by deep spirituality, a passion for the lost, prevailing prayer and modesty in dress and action.

3. Realizing the need among our people of real heart purity and sound holiness teaching, especially for our young people, be it resolved that special emphasis be placed on the doctrine and experience of perfect love during the ten days between the anniversaries of the Ascension and Pentecost.

4. Whereas "the Prince of the power of the air" is waging an aggressive warfare against family life and whereas his major attack has been against the Word of God, be it resolved that we, as "mothers in Israel" shall challenge his attack by restoring the family altar both by precept and example.

5. Because of the prevailing need of personal evangelism and famine of the Word of God, be it resolved that we urge our members to set apart two hours of each week, preferably Thursday from two to four in the afternoon, for house to house visitation, distribution of tracts and Scripture portions and personal evangelism.

COMMITTEE ON PLAN OF WORK

I. Home Work

1. We recommend that each local society contribute liberally to the General Home Fund for the support of Special Missions (see back cover of Wesleyan Missionary) and Church Extension Work through the Home Mission Department.

2. We recommend that each local society contribute five dollars or more annually for the support of Hephzibah Orphanage, the same to be applied on budget.

3. Thank-offering boxes are designated especially for Home Missions. Therefore, we recommend their use in raising Home Missionary funds.

4. We recommend that the local societies continue to make contributions of clothing and supplies to those mission stations listed in the "Wesleyan Missionary."

5. We recommend and urge each local society to respond to the Card Call Plan and thus assist in the extension program of the Church.

6. We recommend the observance of Educational Harvest Day with program, and contributions of cash and supplies to apply on education budget.

II. Foreign Work

We recommend:

1. That we continue to cooperate with the Foreign Missionary Secretary in the support of missionaries to the fields of Africa, India, South America, China, Japan, and our entire foreign missionary program.

2. That we forward promptly all Sunday School charts and cards to our foreign mission fields, remembering to enclose the charts in their original pasteboard rolls.

3. That we contribute as the needs are presented toward the furnishing of the Missionary Home in Jersey City.

III. Medical Missions

We recommend:

1. That we continue medical work as heretofore for the foreign fields.
2. That our local societies make bandages and that these be forwarded promptly to the Missionary Home, 32 Bergen Avenue, Jersey City, New Jersey, to await outgoing missionaries, the number of pounds to be reported with no value attached.
3. That each local society render an annual program at which time an offering shall be taken for the support of medical missions.
4. That each local society contribute three dollars or more annually to the Medical Student Fund, not to apply on budget.

IV. Literature

We recommend:

1. Since it is essential in order to sustain active interest in missionary work, that every member read "The Wesleyan Missionary," that a concerted effort be put forth to increase the subscription list to 14,000 by the close of this quadrennium. To accomplish this, let each Conference and Local Society elect an efficient magazine solicitor.
2. That we familiarize ourselves with the supply of leaflets and urge the general use of them. New leaflets will be prepared from time to time as may be necessary to increase interest and information regarding our work. The same may be obtained from our Corresponding Secretary.
3. That we use the study book designated each year with Program Calendars and helps.
4. Signs, posters emphasize truth and tend to create missionary knowledge, zeal and activity, that such be prepared frequently for use in missionary meetings, conventions, and Annual Conferences.

Local Society

We recommend:

1. That arrangements be made with the pastor for one missionary prayer meeting each month.
2. That a minimum of ten meetings be held during the year in which prayer is given a prominent place and business is transacted.
3. We recommend the formation of prayer partner groups in each society with a Prayer Partner Secretary to keep record of the same and report to the Conference Corresponding Secretary.
4. The observance of the following Red Letter Days:
 - a. Harvest Day for Education work (12 points).

- b. Easter—programs, gifts, and offering for Home Mission work (2 points).
- c. May Day—to be known as gift day; bandages and such gifts as are advisable to be sent with outgoing missionaries or used on the home field (2 points).
- d. World Day of Prayer (2 points).
- e. "Wesleyan Missionary" Day—with program to secure subscriptions for our official organ (2 points).
- 5. One public meeting.
- 6. Correspondence with home and foreign missionaries.
- 7. That the President, Secretary, Treasurer, and fifty per cent of the active membership be subscribers to "The Wesleyan Missionary."
- 8. That a Solicitor be elected for "The Wesleyan Missionary," gaining not less than two subscriptions a year.
- 9. That a Delegate be elected to the Annual Conference Woman's Missionary Society.
- 10. That Report Blanks be properly filled out on time.
- 11. That Delegate be instructed by local society regarding the amount to be pledged by that society at the Annual Conference Session.
- 12. That officers be elected at last meeting of Conference Year.
- 13. That all money received as dues be sent to the Conference Treasurer, designating where fifty per cent of same shall be applied on missions. (See Par. 293 of Discipline.)
- 14. That each society promote a Y. M. W. B. with duly elected Superintendent.
- 15. That we secure every woman in the church as a member of the society, or bring about a ten per cent gain in total membership.
- 16. That money be sent to the Conference Treasurer on time.
- 17. The continued use of "Parliamentary Law at a Glance" by Utter, as a textbook in parliamentary usage, or "A Compendium and Question Book of Parliamentary Law" by Bethel, with at least one drill during the year.
- 18. That the Efficiency Standard be read in the society at least once a year.

(Ten points credit shall be given for each of the above items, and all societies making a grade of one hundred twenty-five points shall be placed on the Honor Roll.)

VI. Y. M. W. B.

Let us emphasize the work of the Y. M. W. B. and take great care in training our children and encouraging our youth by interesting them in mission study and by Conference conventions. We urge that each band adopt the Standard of Efficiency.

1. Held twelve or more band services. The value of prayer, God's Word and personal service were stressed. 10%
2. Held one public service during the year. 10%
3. Sent in Band funds quarterly or oftener. 10%
4. Used mite boxes, envelopes, membership cards or some other systematic method for gathering in of dues and offerings. 10%
5. The Superintendent of the Band a reader of "The Wesleyan Missionary." 10%

II. That a new pioneer project be launched, the same shall be under the direction of the W. Y. P. S. Executive Council in cooperation with the Conference Committee on Pioneer Evangelism.

III. That a week-end Conference Convention be held on the campground, the third week-end of June and that the plans for the same be left in the hands of the W. Y. P. S. Executive Council.

IV. That each district have at least three rallies during the year and that one be a week-end rally.

V. Finances

A. That each society raise fifty (50c) cents per active member for the General W. Y. P. S. Program, and that those churches not having an organized society take an offering for general youth work.

B. That each society raise the amount of fifty (50c) cents per active member for the Conference Executive Fund.

C. That the Area Assessment be paid out of Conference Expense Fund.

G. That all desk expense be paid from the general fund.

H. That all money be forwarded quarterly to the Conference W. Y. P. S. Treasurer and that the Treasurer's books close July 22.
