STANDING RULES

- Conference President. Resolved,
- 1) That the Conference President be required, authorized and appointed to travel the Conference as President, having general supervision of the spiritual interests and benevolences thereof, holding at least one service at each church during the year under such date as he may announce in advance;

2) That he shall raise funds to meet the demands of the Conference work, assisted by the pastors, and he shall receive contributions for Missions, Education and Superannuated Ministers, where there are no pastors;

3) That he shall have general supervision of the church property, and shall inquire into the titles of the same to see that no property is loosely held, and shall look after the rental of Conference property, and see that the rent is turned into the treasury, and he shall investigate the possibility and feasibility of the sale of property not in use, and report his findings to the Board of Trustees and to the next Annual Conference;

4) That he shall be authorized to grant letters to disbanded classes;

5) That he shall be required to write non-resident members of Conference asking them, in case they cannot attend, to write the Conference a letter of greeting and state the condition of their religious experience;

6) That he shall devote as much time as possible and as occasion may afford in evangelistic and other meetings in the Conference;

- 7) That he may engage such help from time to time, as may be available, and as he may consider properly qualified to assist in holding Evangelistic and Quarterly Meetings, such help to be remunerated from the Conference Missions Fund.
- II. Trustees. 1) Authorization. Resolved, that the duly-elected and qualified Trustees of the Annual Conference are hereby authorized and directed to sign for the purchase, sale, mortgaging and conveyance of real estate recommended by the Conference Missionary Board during the interim between the meetings of Annual Conference, and that all such action or actions shall be deemed to be legal and binding upon the Annual Conference, and of as full force and effect as they would have been if such actions on the part of the Trustees had been specially authorized by the Annual Conference.
- 2) Annual Report. Resolved, that the Trustees present an annual report of official acts and of assets and liabilities of the corporation to conference.
- III. Missionary Board. 1) Membership. Resolved, that the Illinois Conference Missionary Board be composed of nine members, five of which shall be ministers and four laymen; that in said number the Conference Trustees shall be included as members exofficio, as well as the ex-officio members declared in the Discipline.
- 2) Duties. Resolved, (a) That the Missionary Board is hereby authorized to pay out all monies from the Conference Missions Fund, and during the interim between Conference sessions to act as a Committee on Finance; (b) That the Missionary Board act as the Conference Committee on Church and Parsonage Location.
- IV. Annual Conference. 1) Date. Resolved, that (starting with Camp of 1954) the Camp Meeting begin on the first Monday after the 27th of July; that Conference open on Friday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock for committee organization; that the Camp Meeting close on Sunday night: that Conference close on Tuesday.
- close on Sunday night; that Conference close on Tuesday.

 2) Fiscal Year. Resolved, that the Conference Fiscal Year close July 15th; that each local church fiscal year close June 30th; that all monies shall be in the hands of the proper Treasurers on or before July 7th; that immediately thereafter each pastor shall submit to the Conference Treasurer his budget check sheet with receipts covering same, and his statistical blank completed except for the budget section.

3) Audit. Resolved, that a competent auditor shall be appointed each year by the Committee on Finance to audit the books of the Conference.

- 4) Budget Items. Resolved, that all Treasurers shall mark receipts "Budget" or "Not Budget".
- 5) Statistics. Resolved, that the Conference Treasurer fill in the budget items on the statistical blanks that are correct, and check those that are incorrect with the paster when he registers; that these statistical blanks be turned over to the Statistical Secretary by the Conference Treasurer not later than Wednesday noon of Camp Meeting.

6) Committee on Statistics. Resolved, that a standing Committee on Statistics be elected, consisting of a Conference Statistical Secretary and one other ministerial mamber: that two lay members he elected at the opening of Conference.

member: that two lay members be elected at the opening of Conference.

7) Sunday Schools. Resolved, that each additional Sunday School under the pastoral oversight of a Wesleyan Mothodist pastor shall be reported on a separate annual Statistical Report blank, provided each Sunday School has been recognized by the Conference Missionary Board.

8) Superannuate Ministers' Aid Committee. Resolved, that a Superannuate Ministers'

Aid Committee of three members be elected by Conference, and that one of said members shall be designated by Conference as the Treasurer of all pension funds.

9) Orders of the Day Committee. Resolved, that the President, Vice President and Secretary of Conference shall constitute the Orders of the Day Committee.

10) Leave. Resolved, that no member shall leave Conference session without permission of the President.

- 11) Conference Officers. Resolved, that the Officers be installed during Conference at a public service announced in advance; office to take effect at the rise of Conference.
- 12) Minutes. Resolved, (a) That the cost of printing the Annual Conference Minutes be pro-rated among the churches on the basis of membership reported at Conference; (b) That the total number of minutes to be printed be ascertained on the basis of family units among the membership and active constituency.
- V. Camp Meeting. 1) Authorization. Resolved, that there be held an annual Camp Meeting and that it be under the direction of a Camp Meeting Committee elected by the Annual Conference, and that the Conference President, the Conference W.Y.P.S. President and the Conference W.M. S. President be members ex officio of said Camp Meeting Committee.
- 2) Committee Duties. Resolved, (a) That Camp grounds and buildings be under the care of the Camp Neeting Committee; (b) That the Camp Neeting Committee have charge of the Camp Neeting Fund and appoint a treasurer to receive all monies and make all authorized disbursements from the same; (c) That the Camp Neeting Committee shall have power to engage workers beyond the present year.

3) Camp Meeting Fund. Resolved, (a) That all pledges and cash received during the sessions of Conference and Camp Meeting be placed in the Camp Meeting Fund unless otherwise designated; (b) That the incidental expenses of the Annual Conference while

in session be paid from the Camp Meeting Fund.

VI. Ministers. 1) Pastor's Report. Resolved, that each ministerial member of our Conference shall report to his Quarterly and Annual Conferences the number of sermons preached, prayer meetings attended, homes visited and calls made, and that the annual report be written on the last page of the Conference Statistical Blank.

2) Pastor's Support During Conference. Resolved, that it be our plan that all pastors remain on their charges for one Sunday after Conference and that the Church's financial obligation to the pastor, whether he be leaving the field or not, be extended

through that Sunday.

3) Moving Pastors. Resolved, that each charge make provisions for the moving expense of the incoming pastor immediately after the Annual Conference adjourns.

4) Illness or Death. Resolved, that the Conference Secretary be notified by the local church secretary in case of critical illness or death in a minister's home, and that he shall send cards at once to each pastor.

5) Minister's Vacation. Resolved, that the Conference President and all pasters be given a two-weeks' vacation with pay, with one Sunday's absence from their pulpits.

VII. Miscellaneous. 1) Conference Paper. Resolved, that the Conference publish a monthly paper called "The Illinois Tidings"; that the Conference President shall be designated Editor-in-chief, and that the heads of the Conference auxiliary organizations be designated contributing editors.

2) Conference Prayer Secretary. Resolved, that a Prayer Secretary be elected annually to promote the special prayer interests of the Conference; and that it be his duty to inform the churches of coming revival meetings and other special prayer needs.

3) Expense of Conference Officers. Resolved, that all incidental expenses of all Conference Officers, Committees, Official Boards and helpers shall be paid by the Conference Treasurer when approved by the President.

JOURNAL OF DAILY PROCEEDINGS

First Meeting -- 1:30 p.m. Friday, July 25, 1952.

Opening -- The third annual session of the Illinois Conference of the Wesleym Methodist Church of America was convened at the Manville Holiness Camp Grounds, Manville, Illinois, at 1:30 p.m., CDT, July 25, 1952. Rev. A. L. Bray, Conference President, led in an opening song. Rev. Wm. H. Dyer offered prayer.

Communion Service -- The Rev. H. K. Sheets, camp meeting evangelist and denominational representative to the conference, read the scripture for the communion service, and was assisted by Rev. Bray and Rev. Dyer as the ministers and laity present celebrated this gracious sacrament commemorative of our Saviour's death. A time of melting and testimony was closed by singing "The Cleaneing Wave".

Conference Sermon -- Rev. D. C. Dursy, pastor of the Princeton church, brought to the assembly a stirring message based on Paul's question, "Lord, what wilt Thou have metodo?" He spoke of the call to a greater discipleship for Christ, of the cost of such a call, and of the comfort which those who wholeheartedly obey receive from the promises and presence of the Saviour. The service was dismissed with a prayer by Rev. R. E. Mullen. A short recess followed.

Opening of Business Session -- Rev. Bray called the meeting to order and offered prayer

Roll Call -- Twelve ministerial members of conference answered the first roll call. (See Record of Attendance.)

Bar of Conference -- The first six pews in the center sections of the tabernacle were declared bar of conference, and the ministerial members were seated therein.

Report of Itineracy and Orders Committee -- A partial report on members eligible to vote was adopted by proper action of conference. (See Report No. 1.)

Credentials Committee -- Rev. R. E. Mullen and Rev. W. D. Craker were elected a committee to report on delegates' credentials.

Courtesy Committee -- Rev. C. E. Olander and Rev. Harry Moeller were appointed a courtesy committee.

Report of Credentials Committee -- A partial report was presented, and the credentials of nine lay delegates were passed by action of conference. The delegates were seated within the bar of conference. (See Record of Attendance.)

Report of Orders of the Day Committee -- The report was read before the body, and was adopted as amended. (See Report No. 2.)

Conference Reporter -- Rev. W. D. Craker was elected conference reporter.

Conference Postmaster -- Rev. Harry Moeller was elected.

Nominating Committee -- A committee comprised of Rev. A. L. Bray, Chairman; Rev. Wm. H. Dyer, Rev. C. E. Olander, S. Hugh Paine, Jr., and Vera F. Brainerd was elected by vote.

Report of Conference President -- The vice president, Rev. W. H. Dyer, occupied the chair as the president read a report of his labors. Report, as amended, was adopted by vote of conference. (See Report No. 3.)

Report of Conference Trustees -- The secretary read a summary of the official acts of the trustees during the fiscal year, which was approved by proper action. (See Report No. 4.)

Report of Camp Meeting Committee Treasurer -- The treasurer of the committee, Rev. D. C. Durey, presented a financial report, which was received by conference and referred to the auditing committee. (See Report No. 5.)

Report of Courtesy Committee -- Rev. J. A. Hubbell, for many years pastor of an independent holiness work in Bloomington, Illinois, and Mr. Russell Baldwin, business manager of Marion College, were presented to the conference and each spoke a word of greeting. The committee also introduced to conference its newest members, Miss Harriet Reed, Mrs. David Crail, and Mr. Robert Zuhl of Oak Park Church; and Miss Emily Kricson and Mr. John Kodl of Hoyne Avenue Church. These members gave their testimonies.

Report of Pension Fund Treasurer -- Rev. Durey read the pension fund treasurer's report in her absence, and it was received by conference and referred to the auditing committee. (See Report No. 6.)

Adjournment -- Conference was adjourned for committee work, subject to the call of the Chair. Rev. Bray closed the meeting with prayer.

Adjourned Neeting -- 6:45 p.m. Friday, July 25, 1952.

Opening -- The adjourned meeting was called to order in the dining hall at 6:45 p.m. by the president.

Credentials -- It was moved that Mrs. R. L. Zuhl be seated as an alternate delegate from Chicagoland Church. Carried.

Report of Nominating Committee -- Report was adopted by vote of Conference. (See Report No. 7.)

Adjournment -- Motion to adjourn was passed.

Second Meeting -- 1:30 p.m. Saturday, July 26, 1952.

Sunday School and Educational Service -- Rev. C. E. Olander, Conference Educational Secretary, presided over the devotional opening of the combined Sunday School and Educational service. Special music was brought by the Marion College quartet. The local reports of the various Sunday Schools were given.

Report of Sunday School Board, and -- Mr. J. J. Blaine was unable to attend. In his Conference Sunday School Secretary absence, Rev. McCarty read these reports. They were adopted by action of conference, financial portion being referred to the auditing committee. (See Reports No. 8 and No. 9.)

Report of Conference Educational Secretary, -- These reports were presented by Rev.
Reports of Conference Educational Committee,
and Nember Local Board of Marion College
and No. 12.)

Educational Address -- Wr. Russell Baldwin, Business Manager of Marion College, led in devotions, bringing an exposition from Matthew 5:1-16. He then presented a very interest, ingand informative picture of the present condition of our college at Marion, and also told us how the Lord called him from a business career in a large manufacturing concern

to Serve the school in his present capacity. A rising vote was given to Brother Baldwin in appreciation for his ministry. The meeting was adjourned with prayer by Rov. Bray.

Third Meeting -- 7:30 p.m. Saturday, July 26, 1952.

Denominational Service -- The Rev. Charles Foster, pastor of the Detroit, Michigan, Wesleyan Methodist Church, who served the Illinois camp meeting as song evangelist, led the congregational singing as the meeting opened. The invocation was given by the conference secretary. Special music was brought by the Warion College male quartet. Rev. and Mrs. Ralph J. Coleson, returned missionaries from the Hesleyan Methodist mission in India were recognized, and brought greetings from the field. Visitors in the audience representing a number of other denominations were also recognized.

Denominational Address -- The denominational representative, Rev. H. K. Sheets, General W. Y. P. S. Secretary and head of the Wesleyan Service Mon's Commission, was presented to conference by the president, Rev. A. L. Bray, and brought the denominational address. His message called to our attention the diversity and unity of the members of the Body of Christ, as portrayed in the 12th chapter of 1 Corinthians. The work of the Church was presented in an instructive progress report of its different departments, mentioning in particular the Service Men's Work and its tremendous opportunities. The meeting was closed by singing "A Charge to Keep I Have", and Rev. D. C. Durey pronounced the benediction.

Fourth Meeting -- 8:30 a.m. Monday, July 28, 1952.

Opening -- The president called the meeting to order. A devotional message was brought by Rev. H. K. Sheets, General W. Y. P. S. Secretary, based on Phil. 2:5-11. Brother Sheets portrayed the mind of Christ, Who in humility washed His own disciples' feet and in love emptied Himself for those He came to save. Conference joined in prayer that His mind might be known in the business session.

Roll Call and Minutes -- Fifteen ministerial and fourteen lay members were present at the fourth meeting. (See Record of Attendance.) The minutes of the first and second meetings were read, and were approved as corrected.

Report of Credentials Committee -- Credentials of delegates from Creve Coeur, Peoria, and Wyanet were presented to conference by the committee. Report was adopted by vote. Motion to seat Mr. Fred Winterberg, alternate delegate from Rockford, in place of Mr. Mm. F. Tice, who is unable to attend, was carried.

David Crail presented the slate of officers resulting from the W. Y. P. S. election. The slate was approved by conference action. (See W. Y. P. S. Minutes.)

Report of Passage of Character Committee -- A partial report of the committee was received and adopted by conference. (See Report No. 14.)

Report of Tithing Secretary -- Rev. C. C. Mc Carty brought a report of his activities as tithing secretary during the past year. Report was received by prevailing motion. (See Report No. 15.)

Report of Child Evangelism Secretary -- The report of Mrs. Rebie Anderson was read by the conference secretary. Report was adopted by vote. (See Report No. 16.) Conference was dismissed for a short recess.

Recommendation to Local Churches and Ministers -- It was moved that conference recommend to the local churches and their ministers the goal of 100% participation in the pension plan during the coming year, and that the conference president be instructed to implement the attainment of this goal to the best of his ability. Carried.

Adjournment -- Nr. C. L. Enyeart led in a closing prayer as the meeting was adjourned for committee work.

Sixth Meeting -- 7:30 p.m. Monday, July 28, 1952.

Conference Service -- The meeting was opened by a song service, led by Rev. L. G. Anderson. Prayer was offered by Rev. O. E. Price.

Installation of Officers -- The newly-elected officers of the Illinois Conference and its auxiliary bodies, the Roman's Missionary Society and the Wesleyan Young People's Society were present on the rostrum. Rev. H. K. Sheets officiated in introducing the group and installing them in their respective offices. After reading the portion of scripture found in Acts 20:28-38, Rev. Sheets led in a prayer of consecration as the officiary bowed at the tabernacle altar.

Installation Sermon -- In the installation message which followed, Brother Sheets based his remarks on the scripture which had been read, Paul's farewell to the Ephesian church. Eighth Meeting -- 1:30 p.m. Tuesday, July 29, 1952.

Opening -- The courtesy committee presented Mrs. Rachel Bray, Conference W. M. S. President, who brought a brief report of the work of the society during the past year. Prayer was offered by Sister Vera Brainerd.

Report of Editor of the Conference Paper -- Rev. W. H. Dyer assumed the chair as the president brought a report of the publication of the "Illinois Tidings" during the past year. Motion to adopt was carried. (See Report No. 24.)

Report of Finance Committee -- The report was read on conference floor and was discussed thoroughly. The report was amanded to clarify the question of ministerial tithe, and the report was adopted as amended. (See Report No. 25)

1963 Conference Sermon -- It was moved that the conference secretary be appointed to give the Conference Sermon in 1953. Motion was referred to the Camp Meeting Committee by action of conference.

Report of W. Y. P. S. Plan of Work -- Rev. Ron Mullen, Conference W.Y.P.S. President, read to conference the youth plan of work for the coming year. Report was adopted by vote. (See W.Y.P.S. Minutes.)

Unfinished Business -- Motion prevailed that the Missionary Board be authorized to complete all business left unfinished at the rise of conference.

Place of Next Conference -- Motion prevailed that the place of the next conference be left in the hands of the Camp Meeting Committee.

Publication of Minutes -- Conference took action to include in its annual journal the minutes of the W.M.S. and the W.Y.P.S. (Number of Annual Journals to be published, and method of apportioning their cost are covered by standing rule.)

Appreciation -- Upon motion by Rev. Pillsbury a rising vote of thanks was extended to Rev. Bray, our conference president, and a cash gift was presented to him as a token of appreciation for his labors during the past year.

Motion was unanimously adopted by vote, that the secretary be instructed to send to Dr. J. R. Swauger, General Home Missions Secretary, an expression of appreciation for his

assistance to the Illineis Conference during the past year. Greetings -- A letter of greetings from our absent elder, Rev. Francis A Davis, O.M.S.

missionary to Japan, was read by the secretary. By action of conference, the secretary was instructed to send a return letter of greetings to our brother.

Report of Pastoral Relations Committee -- Report was read to conference. Upon motion,

it was adopted. (See Report No. 29.)

Conference President's Address -- The president-elect, Rev. Bray, brought a short message based on Revelation 3:7: "I know thy works: Behold, I have set before thee an open door." In retrospect, he presented a short summary of the advances made by the Illinois Conference during the past year, and expressed praise to our gracious Heavenly Father for His sustaining strength in this work. In prospect, he pointed out the urgent need to enter whatever doors God opens for the extension of the work in the coming year. In conclusion he pointed out the fact that no man can shut God's doors to us.

Charge to the Ministers of the Conference -- The president committed to the ministers, as they rose and stood together, a charge to move forward into God's open doors, united in purpose and love. The charge was closed with prayer, and the entire congregation

Report No. 3.

Conference President

State of the Conference -- To the members of the third session of the new Illinois Mission Conference we extend greetings and give account of our stewardship and of the state of the conference:

This past year has been a year of tremendous challenge, increasing opportunity and blessed encouragement. It has been a year of seed time and harvest as well. There have been increases along almost every line. Our roster has increased from seven organized

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churches to ten; from a total church membership of 174 to 207; Sunday School enrollment from 911 to 968; Sunday School attendance from 507 to 640; W.M.S. membership from 102 to 112; and W.Y.P.S. membership from 48 to 70. Our financial interests have prospered, too, with an increase from \$58,600 to \$62,500 in total giving. The denominational rate of giving reached an all-time high this year of about \$140.00 per member. In our mission conference this past year it was \$302. Pastoral support increased from \$15,200 to \$23,500 (plus self-support earned by five pastors); value of church buildings and parsonages from \$213,000 to \$330,000. Our total indebtedness is \$51,400, which is only 16% of the value of the property we own. Title to all churches is held in the conference name.

Our churches were assigned \$1433.70 General Budget; they raised \$2184.71. They were assigned \$1169.25 Conference Budget; raised \$1947.63. Including the pastors' tithe and other giving, the total giving for the conference program was \$3428.62. All our churches met their budgets in full, and 100% of the Illinois Conference pastors have consistently reported monthly to Dr. J. R. Swauger, our General Home Missions Secretary, according to "The Progress Reporter" he issues monthly. 55% of our membership are Card Call subscribers; 54% take the Wesleyan Methodist; 52% take the Wesleyan Missionary; 23% the Wesleyan Youth.

In respect to our personal service, we have served the Oak Park church as pastor, ministoring forty seven Sundays and making about five hundred calls. In addition, we have held twenty five quarterly meetings, made forty two other church visits, made 229 calls on individuals, written 282 official letters and travelled 10,109 miles in conference promotion. We have edited, published and mailed 2,250 copies of our conference monthly bulletin, "The Illinois Tidings", with the part time help of a secretary who was paid \$50 a month out of the Conference President's Salary Fund. In view of the great need for finances in the extension work of the conference, we had recommended to the Finance Committee after our election that the balance of the President's Salary Fund be directed to the Conference Missions Fund for one year. The Oak Park church has graciously carried our full support for this past year and the only personal income received by us from the conference was the Christmas offering from the churches, gratefully acknowledged in the January Tidings.

We have met quarterly with the Missionary Board, which is the board of managers of the conference, to consider the state of all the churches and to plan together for the advance of the work. Several times the Conference Trustees have met with us in joint session to consider property matters. We have had five meetings of the Camp Meeting Board to plan for the 1952 Camp Meeting at Manville. We have examined the titles of all our church properties to see that none were loosely held. Deeds to all our churches are now in the conference look box in the Oak Park Trust and Savings Bank.

We resigned as chairman of the Committee on Itineracy and Orders immediately after the 1951 Conference, and Rev. Carl E. Clander was named chairman by the Committee. However, we served as examiner of the students in the Course of Study because of familiarity with the text books used.

We report that throughout the conference our laymen and ministers are loyal to our Wesleyan doctrines and are sacrificially promoting the work of the churches, the conference and denomination. Our people are spiritually minded and are concerned over spiritual growth and Bible Study. We believe these to be encouraging evidences of true New Testament Christianity.

One of the vital needs of the conference is for a full-time president. Our Illinois Conference -- "At the Crossroads of the Nation" -- is teeming with millions that know not Christ. Opportunities for starting new churches are on every hand. We have several pioneer churches that face building projects this coming year and have not the funds to employ contractors, nor the membership to warrant a large mortgage to finance building. Our only alternative is to follow the example of Nehemiah and the leaders who rebuilt Jerusalem. A full-time president could rally the pastors and laymen to these centers of need, and help the local people with the construction work. But a man cannot well be pastor, have oversight of the churches and conference business, and be absent in a building program for any length of time. However, because of our infancy and lack of people and finances it appears that we will have to struggle along with the pastor-president arrangement until such a time as funds are available to support a conference president full time without crippling the extension funds of the conference. Let us make this a real matter of faith and prayer.

In closing, let us pay tribute to those whose patient, sacrificial leadership has laid the foundations for these days of advance. The report of activities herein stated is given only in the interest of a full accounting of our stewardship, not with boasting, but with a deep sense of coming short in the fulfillment of our responsibility. We love the brethren and count it a high honor to be counted one of the number who live and die for the cause of Christ and our beloved Rosleyan Methodism in Illinois.

Report No. 26.

Missionary Board.

According to the Discipline (Para. 278), the Missionary Board is the Board of Managers of the Conference in the interim of Conference sessions; therefore your board has met quarterly this year to consider the interests of the conference. We met August 4, 1951, to set up the budgets for the year, since we were so directed by Conference when it adjourned with unfinished business. In this meeting the starting of a pioneer work under the direction of Rev. O. F. Price was authorized. This resulted in the launching of a Wesleyan witness in the former Danish Lutheran Church in Sheffield, Illinois. We were granted the use of the building, provided we would paint it. This was done in September, and a pioneer revival was held. We paid the parsonage rent all year. (See Sheffield item below.)

On October 27th, February 2nd, and May 3rd, we held meetings and considered the needs of all the churches and allocated funds for the various pioneer works. (See financial statement below.)

We purchased the former Hoyne Avenue E.U.B. church and parsonage at Hoyne and Iowa Streets in Chicago on November 30, 1951. A church was organized there with 16 charter members on January 20, 1952. Rev. Harry Moeller is the pastor.

On September 8, 1951, a new church was organized with 8 charter members at 10723 S. Perry St., Chicago, in the Roseland district in a building formerly occupied by the Roseland Church of the Nazarene. Rev. Wendel Craker is the pioneer pastor. Mrs. Craker has worked in an office and supported her minister-husband in this first year of pioneer effort. Mr. and Mrs. S. Hugh Paine, Jr., who purchased this building personally have deeded this property to the Conference, taking in return a note without interest for the amount of personal funds invested. We were also aided with a full Card Call.

On May 8, 1952, a new church organization of 11 charter members was effected at Creve Coeur as a result of the strenuous labors of our pioneer workers, Rev. and Mrs. Ronald E. Mullen. This work was begun several years ago and has been more largely subsidized than most of our pioneer efforts. We rejoice that a loyal group has finally been established.

A good deal of the ground work has been done toward the purchase of the former Christian Church building in Maywood, Illinois. We hope to see an organization effected here shortly after conference.

Investigation concorning the possibility of pioneer effort has been made in Geneseo, Kewanee, Peoria (southwest), Bloomington, Danville, Urbana-Champaign, Hammond, Chicago (southwest and northwest), and some other smaller places.

Because the actual giving of Illinois Wesleyans for conference missions is buried in the mass of financial statistics, we report that it came to more than \$2366.00 this past year. This is income from pastors' tithes, conference missions budget and special gifts. If we add to this the Card Call giving and the payments made on one pioneer project mortgage by one of our consecrated laymen, the total Illinois giving for church extension amounts to more than \$3200, or a per capita giving for this item alone of \$16 per member. We praise God for this willingness to lay our means at the Saviour's feet for the advance of the Gospel. Only as we keep this same spirit that motivated the early New Testament church will we be able to meet the challenge of this hour.

Report No. 27.

Camp Meeting Committee.

We, your Camp Meeting Committee, do submit the following report: We have held five meetings this past year to promote the interests of our Annual Camp Meeting.

1) We met at Manville, Illinois, on July 31, 1951. By vote it was decided to engage the Manville Holiness Camp grounds for the date of July 21-30, 1952, and to negotiate with the Manville Camp's Board of Directors for possible permission to erect cottages with the right to remove them or soll them to the board in case we needed to use another camp. (This was done on Labor Day, 1951, when the chairman met with the Manville board men, and our committee was requested to submit a proposed contract in writing. Our committee is still studying the matter, but is waiting for more camp experience before drawing up a contract and making any final recommendation to the Conference on this matter.)

2) We met at Rockford, Illinois, on August 4, 1951. The camp finances were reviewed and all payments approved. We also authorized the engagement of the 1952 camp workers, and these engagements were entered into by letter immediately, including written

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engagement for the use of the camp grounds in 1952.

3) At Rockford, Ill., March 6, 1952, the committee members present approved a plan of operation for the proposed Youth Camp to be held in conjunction with the annual camp members ing. This plan was the product of a provious meeting of the W.Y.P.S. executive council. We also elected Rev. L. G. Anderson as camp buyer for 1952 with 6# a mile car allowance for miles traveled in the interests of the camp.

4) At Princeton, III., on May 2, 1952, the Touth Camp schedule was approved by the full committee and correlated with the adult and children's program. (See full schedule on page two of the July TIDINOS.) Rev. Harry Moeller, Hoyne Avenue Church pastor, was elected to be assistant buyer. The calling of the Rev. Misses Hazzard and Richardson, of Camden, New Jersey, as camp evangelists for 1953, was approved. Two Bible study classes for the adults during the 1952 camp were authorized, with Rev. Wm. H. Dyer teaching Holiness doctrine, and Mr. S. Hugh Paine, Jr., teaching Romans. The Chairman was authorized to work with the W.Y.P.S. leaders in setting up a counseller system and selecting suitable personnel.

5) At Manville, Illinois, on July 23, 1952, matters of camp operation were considered.

Resolved, that the Illinois Conference Missionary Board be composed of nine members, five of which shall be ministers and four laymen; that in said number the Conference Trustees shall be included as members ex-officio, as well as the ex-officio members declared in the Discipline. 2) Duties. Resolved, a) (Present article placed here.); b) That the Missionary Board act as the conference committee on church and parsonage location."

C. Article IV, Section 1). Change to read:- "Resolved, that (starting with Camp of 1954) the Camp Meeting begin on the first Monday after the 27th of July; (no further

change from present reading.)"

- D. Article IV, Section 8). Renumber, and completely revise to read:— "12) Minutes. Resolved, a) That the cost of printing the annual conference minutes be pro-rated among the churches on the basis of membership reported at conference; b) That the total number of minutes to be printed be ascertained on the basis of family units among the membership and active constitutiony."
- E. Article IV. After Section 7) insert a new section, as follows:-- "8) Superannuate Ministers' Aid Committee. Resolved, that a Superannuate Ministers' Aid Committee of three members be elected by Conference, and that one of said members shall be designated by Conference as the treasurer of all pension funds."
- F. Article IV. After new Section 8), insert another new section, renumbering old 9) and 10) as new 10) and 11), respectively:- "9) Orders of the Day Committee.

 Resolved, that the president, vice president and secretary of conference shall constitute the Orders of the Day Committee."
- G. Article V, Section 2), Item b). Reletter item as it now stands to make it item c), and insert a new item, as follows:- "b) That the Camp Meeting Committee have charge of the Camp Meeting Fund and appoint a treasurer to receive all monies and make all authorized disbursements from the same."
- H. Add a new article and sections, as follows:- "VII. Miscellaneous. 1) Conference Paper. Resolved, that the Conference publish a monthly paper called "The Illinois Tidings", that the conference president shall be designated editor-in-chief, and that the heads of the conference auxiliary organizations be designated contributing editors.

 "2) Conference Prayer Secretary. Resolved, that a prayer secretary be elected annually to promote the special prayer interests of the conference; and that it be his duty to inform the churches of coming revival meetings and other special prayer needs.
- "3) Expense of Conference Officers. Resolved, that all incidental expenses of all conference officers, committees, official boards and helpers shall be paid by the conference treasurer when approved by the president."

6. That the following societies constitute the Honor Roll as defined in the Plan of Work: Chicagoland, Hoyne Avenue, Oak Lawn, Pecria, Princeton, Rockford and Wyanet.

Report No. 8.

Plan of Work Committee.

We, your Committee on Plan of Work, submit the following recommendations: A. Standards of Efficiency.

- 1. That arrangements be made with the pastor for one missionary prayer meeting each month.
- 2. That a minimum of ten meetings be held during the year in which prayer is given a prominent place and business is transacted (5%), and at least one public meeting (5%).
- 3. That prayer partner circles be formed in each society, with a prayer partner secretary to keep record of the same and report to the Conference Prayer Partner the number of local prayer partners not later than sixty days after rise of conference.
- 4. That the president, secretary, treasurer and 75% of the active membership be subscribers to The Wesleyan Missionary.
- 5. That a solicitor be elected for The Wesleyan Missionary gaining not less than two subscriptions a year and as many renewals as possible, and send report blanks monthly to the conference magazine solicitor, Mrs. Bertha Durey, 506 N. Pleasant St., Princeton, Illinois.
- 6. That a delegate be elected to the W.M.S. annual conference (5%), and that the delegate be instructed by the local society regarding the amount to be pledged by that society at the annual conference session (5%).
- 7. That the dues of \$1.00 per member be sent directly to the conference W.M.S. treasurer, and shall be divided by her as follows: \$0.25 for home missions and \$0.25 for foreign missions, to be applied on budget; \$0.50 for conference and general conference (5%); and that all monies and vouchers be sent to the conference W.M.S. treasurer monthly.
- 8. That we secure every woman in the Church as a member of the society, or bring about a ten percent gain in total membership.
- 9. That each local society pay annually an amount equal to \$0.25 per active member to be used as a general administrative fund, not to apply on budget.
- 10. That the Efficiency Standard be read in the society at least once a year.
 (Ten percent credit shall be given for each of the above items, and all societies making a grade of eighty per cent shall be placed on the Honor Roll.)
 - B. Plan Of Work.
 - 1. That we read the books designated and use the program calendars and helps.
 - 2. That we send five dollars to Hephzibah Orphanage.
- 3. That each society send five dollars or more to the Conference W.M.S. treasurer for the upkeep of the dining hall.
 - 4. That each society send cash or donations to the dining hall.
- 5. That local societies inquire into the needs of the home mission stations and orphanages before sending used clothes, and that no monetary value be placed on same; that such boxes be reported merely as to the number sent; that boxes of new merchandise be reported as to monetary value and that the sending society evaluate same, the voucher of evaluation signed by the missionary be forwarded to conference W.M.S. treasurer for proper receipting.
- 6. We recommend and urge each local society to subscribe to the Card Call plan and thus to assist in theextension program of the Church.
- 7. a) That each society send an offering for the support of medical missions, which will apply on foreign missions budget. Also contribute three dollars or more to the Med-
- ical Student Fund, not to apply on budget.
 b) That our local societies make bandages and that these be forwarded promptly to the Missionary Home, 32 Bergen Avenue, Jersey City, New Jersey, to await outgoing missionaries, the number of pounds to be reported with no value attached.
- 8. That three report blanks be sent to each society, two of which should be carefully filled out, one to be sent to the chairman of the statistical committee two weeks before conference.
 - 9. That the "In Remembrance" folders be used by the societies. Money should be sent

to the conference W.M.S. treasurer, and the folders to the family.

10. That each society send two dollars or more to the conference W.M.S. treasurer to apply on the Wesleyan Missionary Magazine deficit, not to apply on budget.

11. That at the assigned monthly fast and prayer day each member lay aside the price of a meal for the special requests that are presented in the Wesleyan Missionary Magazine.

12. That each society promote the Penny-A-Meal Plan for 1 foreign missions, 1 home missions and 1 conference missions, not to apply on budget.

13. That each society send in \$0.10 per member in coins or stamps directly to the president for desk fund, not to apply on budget.

14. That as far as possible each society provide the following camp necessities:

a) 1 Turkish towel and wash cloth.

Silverware -- service for six, including table spoons. 1 table cover 3 yards long. b)

a) 2 pillow covers, of feed or flour sacks.

2 bibless plastic aprons.

1) Quilt or blanket.

15. That we issue an award to the societies that qualify according to the following points: a) Making the Honor Roll in the Efficiency Standard.

b) Securing magazine subscriptions equal to the active membership of the society.

c) Pursuing the Mission Study Course, sending name of local secretary to conference mission study secretary.

Sending newly elected W.M.S. president to the annual conference session.

e) Membership in the Card Call plan.
