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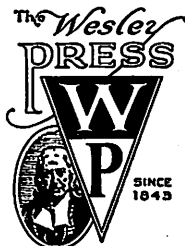

Conference Resolutions

Section I. Conference Officers

I. (a) We shall have a travelling Conference President, who shall receive \$3000.00 annually and house rent. This salary shall be apportioned to the churches and paid by them to the Conference Treasurer, who shall on the first of each month beginning with August 1, each Conference year, forward a check for one twelfth of the amount to him. He shall be required to travel the Conference and counsel and advise with the churches in matters of doctrine, finance, and other affairs that affect the spiritual and temporal welfare of the work. After consulting with the pastors, he may confer with the stewards if necessary with the purpose in mind to increase the pastor's salary. He shall hold one (1) quarterly meeting annually on each charge.

(b) His traveling expense shall be guaranteed him from the Conference Incidental fund, at the rate of .05 a mile for automobile travel, and actual train and bus fare; also his desk expense and all long distance telephone bills pertaining to his conference work shall be paid from the same fund.

2. (a) There shall be a Conference Pioneer Secretary who shall be elected by ballot from among the elders of the Conference. He shall be employed full time as supervisor of the work of Conference Missions under the direction of the Missionary Board. He may be employed in either pastoral or evangelistic work at the discretion of the Board. His salary shall be \$2600.00 annually and house rent. Income from pastoral and evangelistic labors shall be applied on this salary, the difference being made up monthly from the Pioneer Missionary Funds. He shall be allowed time to hold two meetings annually at his own discretion.

(b), The Conference shall be divided into five districts by a line from Sandusky to Portsmouth, and from Union City to Martin's Ferry, with the exception of a central district composed of Licking, Franklin, Morrow, Knox, Delaware and Union Counties.

(c) The conference Missionary Board shall be composed of the Conference President, the Pioneer Secretary, the W.M.S. President, and five additional pastors, one from each of the five districts of the Conference. These five members shall be nominated by the Committee on Pastoral Relations, and shall be elected by ballot. In presenting these nominations at least two names shall be submitted from each district.

(d) The Missionary Board shall meet at the beginning of the Conference year to formulate policies and lay general plans for the conduct of the work of Conference Missions during the year. The actual carrying out of these plans shall be in the hands of Executive Committees which in each district shall be composed of the Conference President, the

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Pioneer Secretary, and the District man. The full board may meet at any time at the call of the Conference President and the Pioneer Secretary. Desk expense, telephone calls, and mileage or fares incurred in the work of Conference Missions shall be paid from the Conference Missionary Funds.

(e) The five district men, with the Secretary, shall organize the pastors in the various districts for Pioneer Work. They shall designate one Sunday as a Pioneer Day, on which day the pastors shall exchange pulpits to bring a Pioneer message and raise offerings and pledges for the work.

(f) It shall require a written order of the Board for funds to be paid from the Conference Mission Fund.

(g) The Missionary Board may employ such pastors of the Conference as may be needed for pioneer meetings. Churches are urged to co-operate by granting their pastors a 2-week leave of absence with pay, if his services are requested by the Board.

(h) The missionary Board and the Conference Board of Trustees shall jointly administer the Church Extension Fund.

(i) Activities of the Board, with the amounts of salaries guaranteed and the amounts invested in each project, shall be reported to the conference annually.

3. The Conference shall elect a Camp Meeting Committee consisting of nine members, five ministerial and four lay to have entire supervision of the Campgrounds, and its improvements and the making of complete arrangements for Camp and Camp Meeting services, and also provide for the entertainment of the Annual Conference. They shall serve for terms of three years. The president of the Conference shall be an ex-officio member of the Camp Meeting Committee and Presiding Officer of the Camp Meeting Session. This Committee shall designate one of its members as Chairman, another as Secretary, and another as Treasurer. Each shall report to the Annual Conference and the report shall be incorporated in the conference minutes. The Treasurer's report shall be audited. This committee shall advise with the Conference Board of Trustees as to the location, erection, and improvements of conference buildings on the Campground.

4. It shall be the duty of the trustees of the Ohio Conference to receive, hold, and dispose of property within the bounds of the conference as provided in the book of Discipline, paragraph 120, and 384-389. In addition to this they shall also be empowered to act in certain instances as follows:

A. Resolved: the Trustees of the Ohio Conference shall be, and they hereby are, empowered to execute all necessary papers, mortgage deeds and papers of a like character, when necessary to secure loans to the Ohio

Annual Conference, or to any church within the conference needing funds to liquidate conference, church or parsonage indebtedness provided that the party or parties requesting such action shall set forth the true nature and purpose for which the loan is requested, and that both the President and Trustees of said Conference are satisfied that the object for which the loan or loans is sought is both necessary and desirable.

B. Resolved: the Trustees of the Ohio Conference shall be, and they hereby are empowered to execute all necessary papers, mortgage deeds, and papers of a like character, when necessary to secure loans for the purpose of purchasing or erecting church or parsonage buildings in the pioneer work of the Conference, provided that the proposed project and the financing of it by means of the proposed loan shall receive the approval of the Conference President, a majority of the total membership of the Missionary Board, and a majority of the total membership of the Board of Trustees.

C. Resolved: the Trustees of the Ohio Conference shall be and they hereby are empowered to sign any or all deeds and papers for the transfer of real property that is now or hereafter may be held in trust by said trustees, provided the sale of such conference, church, or parsonage, or other real estate has been authorized and approved by the President of the Conference with the concurrence of at least one member of his advisory board.

5. We recommend a standard traveling expense of .05 a mile to the Conference Board of Trustees from the Conference Mission Fund and the Conference Incidental Fund, to the Missionary Board from the Conference Missions Treasury, and to the Camp Meeting Committee from the Camp Meeting Treasury.

6. Resolved: that there be a Church Building Fund to be loaned to the Churches for building purposes. This fund to come from the sale of the Fairmount Church, gifts, annuities and the budget item included in Conference Work. Said fund to be administered by the Conference Trustees and loaned on notes to be signed by the local trustees. Not more than 20% of the fund shall be loaned to any one church unless the calls for loans are such that the trustees find it necessary to grant a larger amount in order to keep the money in use. The interest to be figured at 3% for the total length of the loan and paid back at the rate of not less than 1% of the total per month. Special short term loans of less than one year can be made at 6% interest.

7. (a) The annual Conference shall convene on the fourth Monday of July and continue through the following Sunday.

(b) Camp Meeting shall open with the Friday evening service of Conference week.

(c) The Friday preceding Conference shall be set aside as a day of

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prayer for Conference and Camp.

8. All elders and licentiates are required to attend the entire session of Conference. It shall require a vote of Conference to pass the character of any minister who fails in this regard.

9. (a) It is recommended that persons elected as lay delegates to conference shall be able to attend the entire session.

(b) The Conference Secretary shall provide blanks for Delegate's Credentials, including the following items: certificate of election, address of Delegate, information as to how long the Delegate intends to remain at Conference, the pastor's address and telephone number. These credentials are to be returned in advance of Conference to a Standing Committee on Credentials, appointed by the President.

10. (a) It is required that each pastor obtain from the conference treasurer a signed statement of all budget monies paid to him. This statement shall agree with the pastor's statistical report, both of which shall be mailed to the chairman of the Statistical Committee not later than July 15th.

(b) The Conference shall omit the reading of the statistical reports by the pastors, and instead the Committee on Statistics shall post on the bulletin board certain items of vital interest, for the instruction of the members of the conference.

11. (a) The Special Orders of the Conference shall be: Monday evening, a Conference Sermon and Communion Service; Tuesday evening, Educational Service; Wednesday Afternoon, one half hour each to the Tithing Secretary and the Sunday School Secretary; Wednesday Evening, Pioneer Evangelism Service; Thursday evening, Missionary Service under the W.M.S.; Memorial Service when necessary, Friday afternoon; Sunday morning, Ordination Service.

(b) The Annual Session of the Ohio W.Y.P.S. Conference shall be held on the fourth Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday in June of each year in connection with a Bible Conference.

12. (a) All persons recommended to Conference, and those pursuing the Course of Study, shall appear before the Committee on Itineracy and Orders not later than the second day of Conference.

(b) Examinations shall be taken before a member of the committee or a person appointed by them. In order to receive credit for the current year, examinations must be taken by July 10.

(c) All persons taking Conference Course of Study shall pay \$1.00 registration fee.

13. The Budget Committee shall assign new churches 25% the first year, 50% the second year, and full budget the third year.

14. (a) The fiscal year for churches shall be from July 1 to June 30. All financial reports shall conform to this schedule.

(b) The Conference Treasurer's books shall close July 8.

15. (a) The Ohio Conference shall be authorized to charge 4% on loans to churches from the Superannuated Elder's Fund.

(b) All notes to churches shall be drawn up on the form given in the Minutes of 1940.

(c) Loans from the Superannuated Fund may be made by the conference pension board to ministers of the conference to assist them in paying arrears in income assessments at the time of joining the Wesleyan Pension Plan. Such Loans shall be secured by Notes, the duration of which shall not exceed 2 years. They shall be repaid in equal monthly payments and shall carry 2% interest computed semi-annually.

Section III. Churches and Pastors

16. In addition to the duties as outlined in the Discipline, it shall be the responsibility of our pastors to:

(a) Attend all sessions of Camp Meeting.

(b) Remain on the work he is appointed to for the whole conference year. Any pastor leaving the work during the year shall not have his character passed except by vote of the Conference.

(c) See to it that all funds and receipts from his charge be sent to the Conference Treasurer at least quarterly.

(d) Co-operate with the stewards in notifying non-attending members of their financial responsibilities.

(e) Instruct all local preachers on their charge of disciplinary requirements to study and travel under Conference direction.

(f) Be sure all Conference Preachers on their charge have necessary licenses and recommendations.

(g) Return Sunday School Reports monthly to the Sunday School Secretary.

(h) We also recommend that each pastor transfer his membership to the church he is serving.

17. It shall be the responsibility of our churches to:

(a) Pay the moving expense of the in-coming pastor.

(b) Pay pastor's salary for fifty-two weeks per year, beginning with the rise of Conference.

(c) Pay travelling expenses and room and board for pastors and delegates at Conference.

18. No church shall begin or continue in any major building or remodeling program until it has conferred with the Conference Committee on Church and Parsonage Building and Location. The Building Committee of said church shall sign a written agreement, to be acted upon by this Conference Committee. They shall also report monthly in writing to this Conference Committee; The matter of such reports and agreement shall be agreed upon mutually by these two committees concerned.

19. The Committee on Pulpit Supply shall conduct the vote on retaining the pastor not later than June 1st, giving the required two weeks notice in advance. The chairman of the Committee on Pulpit Supply shall immediately inform the Conference President of the results. If the vote is for a change and the pastor so desires, his name shall be placed on the list of available men. The list shall be sent to churches requiring same on or after June 10, and pastors desiring to be included on that list must notify the Conference President by that date.

Section IV. Standards of Practice

20. We recommend the use of associate or probationary membership for all persons received on confession of faith.

21. We understand paragraph 51 in the Discipline to require that no one be received into membership of our local churches unless they have left off wearing of gold including the wedding ring. Be it further resolved that paragraph 52 regarding modest apparel be strictly adhered to.

22. We require that all workers, preachers and singers on the platform at Conference and Camp Meeting, wear sleeves at least to the elbow, and all their apparel be in accord with the discipline.

Section I, Resolution No. 6: Resolved that there be a Church Building Fund to be loaned to the churches for building purposes, this fund to come from the sale of the Fairmount Church, gifts, annuities and the budget item included in Conference Work. Said fund shall be administered by the Conference Trustees and loaned on notes to be signed by the local trustees. Not more than 20% of the fund shall be loaned to any one church unless the calls for loans are such that the trustees find it necessary to grant a larger amount in order to keep the money in use. REPORT OF CONFERENCE PRESIDENT

Dear Fellow Christians and Co-Laborers:

Greetings in the love and grace of our Lord to the members of the 44th Annual Session of the Ohio Conference of The Wesleyan Methodist Church of America. We are privileged indeed to meet here on these sacred grounds in another Annual Session to make report of the various activities engaged in during the past Conference year, to reflect upon the great mercies and the sustaining power and grace of our God in the midst of conflicts, temptations and testings. We have much to be thankful for at the hands of the Lord.

We are here to enjoy once again the rich and heart-warming delights of Christian fellowship as brothers and sisters in holy bonds. But we are here above all else to meet God. If we fail in this regard at this year's gathering we shall have missed His best for us during these days. I trust that each of us have come to learn of Him the great Head of the Church, Jesus the Christ, and just what He would have us to know and do as we anticipate and plan for another year's labors in the behalf of souls.

We meet here at a time when "the hearts of men are failing them for fear, and for looking after those things which are coming on the earth." John, the faithful follower of the Lord, expresses the concern, understanding and heart feelings of the true Church of our day in these words—"the whole world lieth in wickedness." The world is full of unrest, confusion, suspicion and perplexity. "Wars and rumors of wars," are the order of the day. This very spirit is taking its toll within the ranks of the Church. It is our solemn duty and the personal obligation of each of us to ever be on guard against a spirit of disunity, compromise and complacency within our ranks. Let us strive to ever know the ungrieved presence of the Holy Ghost in our midst.

As we reflect upon the labors of these past months a feeling of deep and heart-felt gratitude wells up within to our God who has faithfully led us and freely given unto us of His abounding grace and aid in the times of need. For what has been accomplished His name is to be praised and magnified. At best, our efforts have seemed to come so short of reaching the mark we had desired and in this we are made to feel unworthy and humbled before our God. The spiritual, numerical and material gains made this year are correctly evaluated and recorded in that eternal world where, "the books" shall one day be opened.

I wish to express my thanks and appreciation to each one for your loyal support and co-operation during the year and for your many prayers and the generous financial aid you gave me during the long weeks of my

physical distress and affliction and while I was in the hospital. Your many "get well" greetings and personal expressions of concern and kindly interest in my welfare were often heart touching and a source of encouragement. May the Lord reward each one as only He can. I especially feel moved to express my gratitude to Rev. Donald E. Howard, our Conference Vice-President, Rev. Harry Ward, our Pioneer Secretary, and to my wife for their willing efforts in sharing my regular tasks and duties during the time of my illness. God bless them.

My activities during the year have been as follows: I have visited each of the churches in the Conference except those contacted by the persons mentioned above, including the pioneer points, save one. I preached 105 times, held three dedication services, sixteen business meetings, organized one church, conducted three funerals. From the Conference Treasurer I received \$2600.00 for salary, \$439.70 for travel expense, \$80.74 for telephone tolls and tax, \$29.30 for desk expense items and \$288.00 for special love offerings from churches during my illness. I also receive \$138.54 additional offerings from the churches for this special item, and \$102.60 cash gifts throughout the year. Also \$25 00 for funeral services.

As one of the elected delegates by the last Annual Conference I attended the National Holiness Association Convention held at Flint, Michigan April 4-8. This was a great gathering of many workers from various holiness churches and organizations throughout the nation and proved to be a time of wonderful spiritual inspiration and information to those in attendance. Further report of this Convention will be given later in the session by the other delegate.

My official actions and supervision of the work of the Conference is as follows:

I. Church Organizations, Dedications, and Other Official Actions.

Sept. 17, 1950 Conducted note burning service and dedication of parsonage at West Dayton.

Oct. 24, 1950 Signed deed in behalf of the Conference for church property located on Pratt St., Athens, Ohio as per sale authorized by action of the Conference Trustees Dec. 20, 1949.

Jan. 11, 1951 With Advisory Board approval I agreed to recommend the Zanesville, N. Terrace work under direction of the Missionary Board. This recommendation was later accepted by the Board Jan. 16th.

April 1, 1951 Dedicated the newly purchased property located at 1427 Oakland Park Ave., Columbus as a place of worship and also as a parsonage. This property is a wonderful addition to the work at Columbus. Brother Robert McIntyre, the pastor, and his people are to be commended for their forward looking vision and their aggressive labors.

April 11, 1951 Organized a Wesleyan Methodist Church at St. Marys with sixteen members. The charter was left open for a few days and the

total charter membership totaled nineteen. Rev. Emmett A. Moore, the pastor, was continued as such following the organization. He has made application for membership in the Conference. I refer him to the Committee on Itinerary and Elder's Orders.

May 20, 1951 Dedicated a new church building located at 5407 Warren Ave., Norwood, Ohio. Under the labors of Rev. Donald C. Fisher and his people and the evident favor of the Lord a beautiful and commodious church building stands as a monument of faith, vision and toil in the name of our Christ. Further account of this service is to be found in the June 1951 issue of the Conference Messenger.

June 22, 1951 Met with the Advisory Board to consider the possible disbanding of the Cincinnati, Fairmount work. Action was taken to disband the church at Fairmount. Later I met with the Conference Trustees to consider plans for the sale of the property at 2835 Beekman St., Cincinnati, Ohio.

July 7, 1951 Gave approval to purchasing two lots by the Piqua Church on the corner of Clark and Wilson Ave., for location of a new church building. Cost of lots to be \$900.00.

July 7, 1951 Received by letter the statement of resignation of Rev. Robert McIntyre as President of the Conference W.Y.P.S. due to his being elected by the General Conference Society as President of the Marion College Area. I refer this item to the Conference W. Y. P. S. Executive Council for appropriate action.

II. Appointments, Transfers, Resignations:

Last year's annual session of the Conference left five churches in the hands of the President. The following disposition was made regarding these;

July 29, 1950 R. D. Kitzman was appointed to supply the work as recommended by the Conference.

August 12, 1950 Darwin Gentry was appointed as supply to Dayton, Hyde Park Church.

Sept. 13, 1950 Appointed Wendell Dozier as pastor of the George's Run Church after receiving word that the Church had voted favorably for him as pastor.

Aug. 12, 1950 Appointed Glendon Murphy as pastor of the Piqua Church, with approval of the Missionary Board and concurrence of the Advisory Board.

J. P. Enty was continued as supply pastor of the Park Street Church for the year since no other appointment seemed advantageous.

Aug. 17, 1950 With approval of Advisory Board, Wendell Weaver was appointed to evangelistic work.

Aug. 24, 1950 Issued Letter of Standing to Ralph Gibson.

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Aug. 28, 1950 Issued Letter of Transfer for John Cole to the Kentucky Conference.

Sept. 4, 1950 Received Transfer of James W. Hodges from the Kentucky Conference.

Sept. 21, 1950 Issued Letters of Transfer for George and Olga Marie Norman to the South Carolina Conference.

Oct. 18, 1950 Mr. George Fisher was continued as Secretary of the Men's Missionary League of the Conference.

Oct. 20, 1950 J. Howard Berridge wrote that he was withdrawing from the Conference to affiliate with another Church organization.

Oct. 27, 1950 Appointed Floyd Thayer to evangelistic work.

Jan. 8, 1951 Received L. Edmund VanOrder upon recommendation of the Miami Shores Quarterly Conference and upon being reinstated as a Conference Preacher he was appointed, with Advisory Board Approval to evangelistic work.

Feb. 2, 1951 Issued Letter of Standing to Arthur L. Vess.

March 4, 1951 L. Austin Myers resigned as pastor of the Empire Church.

March 8, 1951 Empire Church voted to have Steven Nutter serve as supply. I gave approval to this arrangement. Later Brother Nutter gave up the work due to physical ailment.

May 13, 1951 I met with the Empire Church to consider a supply pastor for the remainder of the year but none seemed available. The work has been cared for by local help.

March 19, 1951 Appointed Wm. Wright, with Advisory Board approval, as evangelist and singer.

April 11, 1951 Upon the special request of the Zanesville, Park Street Quarterly Conference and with Advisory Board approval and the Committee on Itineracy and Elder's Orders, I appointed Stanley Morse to the work of Song Leader and Musician. Note Par. 96 of Discipline.

April 11, 1951 Appointed L. Austin Myers to the work of evangelism.

July 9, 1951 Received Letter of Transfer for Annual Conference Preacher, Yorton Clark from the Iowa Conference. He has filled out the Questionnaire for Conference membership. I refer him to the Committee on Itineracy and Elder's Orders.

July 12, 1951 Issued Letter of Standing to R. D. Kitzman.

July 12, 1951 Issued Letter of Transfer for L. D. Wilcox to the South Carolina Conference.

July 14, 1951 Received application for Conference membership from Rev. Roy O. Lemons. I refer him to the Committee on Itineracy and Elder's Orders for examination and classification.

III. Approval of Evangelistic Help, Miscellaneous:

Aug. 7, 1950 Gave approval to Rev. Walter Shearer to use Rev. T. L. Shirk as evangelist at Chippewa Lake Church.

Oct. 24, 1950 Permission given Rev. Bert Anderson to use Rev. Elmer Sickmiller of Michigan for revival services in October and November at Chillicothe Church.

Feb. 3, 1951 Approval given Rev. Dale Duvall to use Rev. Dennis Barber of the Pilgrim Holiness Church in revival services at Kenton Church.

March 13, 1951 Gave approval to Rev. R. A. McCorkle to use Rev. George E. Harvey as evangelist at Rittman Church.

April 20, 1951 Approval given Rev. Carl Huff to use Miss Sylvia M. Pipkin and her helper of Bellefontaine, Ohio as workers in revival services and D.V.B.S. at Weirton Church.

May 5, 1951 Approval given Rev. Darwin Gentry to use Rev. Carson Whitacre as evangelist at Hyde Park Church.

June 27, 1951 With Advisory Board approval the Athens Church was permitted to extend a call, as pastor, to Rev. Yorton Clark of the Iowa Conference.

July 3, 1951 Approval given Rev. Kenneth Martin to engage Rev. Carson Whitacre to conduct revival services at Miami Shores.

Report No. 2

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE SECRETARY OF THE CONFERENCE MISSIONS BOARD

1950-1951

One year ago we stood on this Conference floor, after having been elected to the office of Pioneer Secretary, and pledged ourselves to the service of this Conference. We said we would not spare ourselves in promoting the interests of the Conference although we were taken by complete surprise by the action of the Conference and had no plans laid for the work, and very little of any value were turned over to us, although the former Pioneer Secretary has never failed in advising us, or in helping us in any way it was possible for him to do so. I appreciate this more than words can tell.

At this time we are glad to be able to say that we have lived up to all that we promised, and have done the best we knew how. We have not spared ourselves in the work. We have never failed to carry out any and every decision the Conference Missions Board arrived at. As has always been the case, no doubt there are those who have, and will criticize the activities of the C.M.B. and especially its secretary for what has, or has not been done during the year. In spite of realizing this would happen, we have refused to plunge recklessly into some project without justifiable reasons merely to say we had attempted to do something, and to

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save face. That has not been my method of operating, and God forbid it ever shall be.

Immediately after the rise of last Conference, we began to apply ourselves to the work the Conference had elected us to do, and in spite of hindering powers, opposition, and innumeral obstacles, we are bound to give honor, praise and glory to the God of all grace who has enabled us, and through whom we are able to say, this has been a very good year in the Pioneer Department.

The response to the Pioneer appeal, last Pioneer Day was most gratifying. According to the latest reports I have, there was a total of \$10,501.19 pledged to Pioneer work, and there was a total of \$9,498.05 paid. A loss of less than 10%. We have a balance on hand of \$3,070.52. I believe you will find this to be the best financial report ever in the Pioneer Department of the Conference.

My activities for the year have been varied indeed; even to helping with the dishes in the dining hall during Youth Conference.

We held revival meetings at Wooster, S. W. Sharon, Mt. Vernon, St. Marys, and a five night revival at Nelsonville. Besides we preached numerous other places, made investigations, held one Quarterly Conference at Weirton, W. Va., while our Conference President had to remain at home sick. And visited all the mission points.

We were able to organize one new Church this year. This came about through corresponding with Brother Emmett A. Moore, Pastor of an independent work in St. Marys, and then of visiting them and preaching for them a couple different times. This culminated in an organized Wesleyan Methodist Church with 19 full members on April 11, 1951. We predict good, profitable, and prosperous days ahead for this our newest Church.

While opportunities are almost limitless within the bounds of our Conference for us to enlarge ourselves, yet we have been severely handicapped by the need of men, and suitable equipment. When we wanted to launch a tent campaign this spring at a certain place, we were faced with the embarrassing fact that our tents were unusable because of deterioration. After purchasing a tent from the St. Marys Church we were faced with another embarrassing fact that we had no seats. With the balance on hand of Pioneer money, it is my opinion some new equipment should be purchased.

Just a little over two weeks ago on July 8, we investigated an opportunity in Charleston, W. Va., a portion of our Conference where we have long wanted to enter. This is an independent work, with a good church building in a good location of the city, a Sunday School ranging from 60 to 100. They are interested in the Wesleyans taking over. This is a real opportunity, and should be given immediate attention after the rise of this conference. There are other places just waiting our coming, such as

Urbana, O.; Franklin, O.; Glendale, W. Va.

It is my opinion the new conference year will be the best in several, by way of new organizations, and points.

One of the first official actions of the C.M.B. after the rise of Conference one year ago, was to vote the closing of the work at Springfield, Ohio. This work seemed to be going backward instead of forward, and was a real heavy item of expense to the Department. No services were held at this point after last Conference. Amount expended will be found in the financial report.

On October 31, after consent of the C.M.B. the work at Delaware was closed because of poor attendance, and a seeming waste of finances. Attendance was only running from 8 to 12. It was the opinion of several that our location in Delaware was against us. Amount expended will be found in financial report.

On January 16, at the request of N. L. Shultz, the Zanesville, N. T. work was received under direction of the C.M.B. guaranteeing Brother Shultz \$40.00 per week plus \$15.00 per month rent. On March 28, this guarantee was changed to \$45.00 per week, plus \$15.00 per month rent, on request of Brother Shultz.

Other Churches and Pioneer points left under the direction of the C.M.B. are as follows:

Columbus—Rev. Robert and Edith McIntyre, Pastors. This Church continues to make forward strides, and have purchased a new brick and block bldg. located on Oakland Ave. This building not only affords them a fine place of worship, but also provides excellent living quarters upstairs for the Pastor. The future looks good for the Columbus Church. The C.M.B. made no guarantee to the Pastor.

Piqua—Rev. Glendon Murphy, Pastor. In spite of Brother Murphy living in Dayton, and working at secular employment with little time given to visitation, Piqua has had an excellent year, both in attendance and financially. They worship in a store room, but are looking for a place to buy and build. We predict this new conference year to be the best ever for Piqua. No salary guarantee.

Wooster—Rev. Leroy Wilcox, Pastor, guaranteed \$40.00 per week salary, plus rent.

This Church has not shown the advancement this year we had anticipated. However, they have purchased a large dwelling at 1004 E. Bowman St. which serves both as Chapel and Parsonage. We do predict this new conference year will be a good one for Wooster.

Cumberland Mission—Rev. Harold Schupbach, Pastor. No guarantees. This work has continued throughout the year without much change over last year. At a recent visit there the ones present expressed themselves favorable toward organization in the near future.

Marion, N. Grand Ave. Mission—In my opinion this point has not

been given the care it should have had ever since being turned over to the Wesleyans. M. L. Starlin was appointed there as Pastor without any guarantees, but about the middle of the year had to give it up because of sickness. From that time until July 1, different ones have preached there, when on July 1, we appointed Rev. Eugene Fulmer as Pastor. Brother Fulmer is a recent graduate of Transylvania Bible School at Freeport, Pa. Since he has been pastoring, the attendance has just about doubled. For the month of July we guaranteed Brother Fulmer \$20.00 per week salary plus rent. We believe with a competent Pastor, this work will make great improvements.

Mt. Vernon; Mission—Rev. Robert Vermilyea, Pastor. We feel the chief hindrance to this work from its very beginning has been a suitable place to worship. Until recently they have worshiped in a dwelling at 302 Coshocton Ave., but are now meeting in a small township hall which is not adequate nor conducive. However it is the best they can find at present. In spite of this handicap, Mt. Vernon has had a very good year, with at least a 20% increase in Sunday school. However at the last Board meeting of the C.M.B. during Youth Conference, it was voted to close the Mt. Vernon Mission. Feelings were divided on this matter, and not all of those present would give a consenting vote to close the Mission. We guaranteed the pastor a salary of \$35.00 per week.

S. W. Sharon—Under the pastoral leadership of Rev. F. A. Taylor, this point has enjoyed a very good year; showing quite an improvement over the past year. We hope to see this an organized work within a year. No guarantees.

South Zanesville—Brother D. J. Sodeman was appointed to this work at last Conference time, without any guarantees. The work has had a good year, and improved decidedly over the past year, until they found it necessary to enlarge their place of worship. We fully expect this work to be organized before another Conference rolls around.

Strouds Run—This work has been carried on under the supervision of C. E. Knight, with Rev. Roy Deeter doing the preaching. There have been no guarantees. The work has had a prosperous year, and it is my opinion some definite steps should be taken towards organization before another Conference.

Report No. 9

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON MORAL REFORM

We, the Ohio Conference of The Wesleyan Methodist Church, recognizing the deplorable condition of morals and ethics in our land, do pledge ourselves to wholeheartedly support every properly constituted effort toward moral reform, and do especially urge our ministers and departmental leaders to give definite attention to the following:

I. We recommend careful teaching by our pastors concerning modesty of dress and proper respect for the sacredness of the body. "Whose adorning, let it not be that outward adorning of plaiting the hair, and of wearing of gold, or of putting on of apparel, but let it be the hidden man of the heart, in that which is not corruptible, even the ornament of a meek and quiet spirit, which is in the sight of God of great price." (I Peter 3: 3, 4.) "In like manner also, that the women adorn themselves in modest apparel, with shamefacedness and sobriety; not with broided hair, or gold, or pearls, or costly array; but (which becometh women professing godliness) with good works." (I Tim. 2: 9, 10.) "The woman shall not wear that which pertaineth unto a man, neither shall a man put on a woman's garment: for all that do so are abomination unto the Lord thy God." (Deut. 22: 5.)

We further recommend that parents train their children in the wearing of modest clothing, in order to safeguard young lives from the perils of sinful lusts.

II. We recommend careful teaching of the Bible standards regarding divorce, the sanctity of marriage, and the sacredness of the home.

III. We recommend that our people be urged to have a greater regard for the sabbath day, heeding the divine admonition found in Isaiah 58: 13, 14: "If thou turn away thy foot from the sabbath, from doing thy pleasure on my holy day; and call the sabbath a delight, the holy of the Lord, honourable; and shalt honour him, not doing thine own ways, nor finding thine own pleasure, nor speaking thine own words: Then

shalt thou delight thyself in the Lord; and I will cause thee to ride upon the high places of the earth, and feed thee with the heritage of Jacob thy father: for the mouth of the Lord hath spoken it.

IV. We recommend that our people be taught the evils of the use of tobacco and alcoholic beverages, and that our young people be warned of the deadly snare of the use of narcotics.

V. We register our protest against the modern anti-Christian school program, and do strongly urge that our people do all in their power, through proper active interest and influence, to improve the schools in their local communities.

VI. We recognize that television is a modern science of communication akin to radio. However, in view of (1) the domination of telecasting time by the tobacco and brewing industries, (2) the general unwholesome quality of its programs, (3) the high cost of television sets, and (4) our duty as Christian stewards to give a good account of our time and money, we do strongly urge our people to refrain from owning television sets and from viewing its unwholesome programs. We do further urge them to use whatever influence they can to encourage clean programming, and the banning of liquor advertising.

VII. We recommend that this report be read quarterly in each local church.

On July 27, we met at the Missionary Tabernacle at 8:30 A. M. We made the following recommendations:

1. A body composed of each local Y.M.W.B. Superintendent or a representative chosen by her shall meet at 3:00 P. M. Tuesday of conference week.

2. The Statistician, Corresponding Secretary, Mission Study Secretary, and Prayer Partner Secretary shall be ex-officio members of the Conference body.

(These recommendations will be Standing Resolutions)

August 1, we met on Mildred Stratton's porch. The following motions were made and carried: 1. Moved we give Mother Wilcox twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) for the care of the laundry. 2. Moved the bill for printing the Missionary Rally posters be turned over to the treasurer, Mildred Lewis. 3. Moved we give Belle McMillan twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) as a love gift for her labors on the campground. 4. Moved we give the Home Mission stations Wheelrim, Hope, Cook's Branch, and Means a personal gift of ten dollars (\$10.00) each.

Report No. 4

PLAN OF WORK

A. General Items

We recommend:

1. That a consecration and installation service for the newly elected W.M.S. officers be held after Conference.

2. That the observance of the monthly "Fast and Prayer Day," with April continued as the self-denial month, also the "Penny-a-meal" plan, be continued.

3. That the Prayer Partner Plan and Child Evangelism Program be emphasized.

4. That a continued use of the W.M.S. Program Calendar, and the frequent use or reference to the Conference Minutes, be an aid in maintaining a high efficiency standard.

5. That a special drive for the Wesleyan Missionary be held during the months of August and December with the local President, Secretary, and Treasurer, and 75% of the active membership subscribers.

6. That we stress the continuation of the Memorial Folders to assist in furthering the cause of Home and Foreign Missions, rather than expensive floral tributes for the deceased.

7. That the local societies inquire into the needs of the Home Mission Stations and Orphanage before sending used clothing, with no monetary value placed on same, but that such boxes be reported merely as to the number sent; that boxes of new merchandise be reported as to monetary value, and that the sending society evaluate the same, the

voucher of evaluation signed by the missionary to be forwarded to the Conference W.M.S. Treasurer for proper receipting.

8. That we contribute toward the Women's Institute in Africa, as the needs are presented, suggesting large sized quilt blocks, simple or easy patterns on pillow cases, etc. for beginning sewers.

9. That stress be placed upon Personal Evangelism with special emphasis upon the other races in local communities, especially the Jew and the Negro.

10. That the President and at least two members of each local society take the Mission Study and Reading Course.

11. That each society give attention to the Dormitory room furnished by them, checking for improvements or replacements needed, and that societies which have not furnished a room consult the Camp Meeting Matron for such.

B. Financial Items (Compiled)

We recommend:

1. That each society pay annually an equivalent of 25¢ per active member to be used as a General Administrative Fund. (Non-budget)

2. That each Society continue the Christmas offering for the Mexican Mission, the amount of not less than 50¢ to be sent to the Conference W.M.S. Treasurer by Dec. 1st. (Non-budget)

3. That each society respond to the Card Call Plan, thus assisting in the Extension program of the church. (Non-budget)

4. That the dues of \$1.00 per member be sent directly to the Conference W.M.S. Treasurer, 25¢ to apply on Home Missions and 25¢ to apply on Foreign Missions Budget, and that all monies and voucher receipts be sent to the Treasurer at Quarterly periods.

5. That we continue to pay to Edna Taylor Fund. (Non-budget)

6. That each society contribute \$3.00 or more annually to the Medical Student Fund. (Non-budget)

7. That systematic giving to the Day Fund be continued. (Non-budget)

8. That the \$1.00 Laundry Fund be continued. (Non-budget)

9. That each society render an annual program at which time an offering be taken for the support of Medical Missions. (F. M. budget)

10. That we observe Educational Harvest Day with program and cash contributions and supplies, the cash to apply on budget.

11. That each society contribute \$5.00 or more annually for the support of Hephzibah Orphanage. (Budget)

12. The continued use of Thank offering boxes especially for aiding in raising Home Missionary Fund. (Budget)

13. That the local societies be urged to contribute \$5.00 toward the General W.M.S. President's Evangelistic World Tour, to be sent in dur-

ing the first quarter. (Non-budget)

14. That we contribute to the Australia Fund. (Budget)
