

DAILY PROCEEDINGS.

The Champlain Annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Connection of America convened for its eighty-second session at Mooers, N. Y., April 24, 1923, at 7:30 P. M.

Rev. A. J. Allen, the President, called the conference to order. Songs, "My Saviour First of All" and "Near the Cross" was sung. The President made some very helpful remarks, and made some announcements. Scripture lesson was read from Isaiah, 53d chapter. Opening prayer was offered by O. G. Wyman. Duet was sung by Robert Flanders and Floyd Banker, "My Sheep Know My Voice." Rev. Harley S. Hill was the speaker of the hour. The text used was found in Isaiah 53:5, 6: "But he was wounded for our transgressions, he was bruised for our iniquities: the chastisement of our peace was upon him: and with his stripes we are healed. All we like sheep have gone astray; we have turned every one to his own way: and the Lord hath laid on him the iniquity of us all." The blessing of the Lord was upon the message. Benediction by Richard Palmer.

Wednesday Morning Meeting.

Rev. C. L. Hill had charge of the devotional service. Songs, "There Shall Be Showers of Blessing" and The Way of the Cross Leads Home" were sung, and a number of prayers offered. The presence of the Lord was felt.

At the call of the roll the following answered to the call of their names: Sixteen Elders, three Licentiates, eighteen Delegates.

A partial report of the Committee on Credentials was approved with the understanding that the future names be added to the roll without the necessity of a vote.

Bar of Conference was fixed to include the first four rows of pews.

Rev. Frank S. Niles presented the interests of the Lord's Day Alliance and made some very impressive remarks, stating that there are 2,560 churches interested in this great work in New York State.

The Vice-President was called to the chair while the President made his report. The same was adopted. See Report No. 1.

The Committee on Itineracy and Orders made their report and the same was adopted. See Report No. 2.

The Committee on Courtesy introduced Rev. J. S. Willett, the Connectional Agent, and President J. S. Luckey of Houghton College. Both made brief remarks.

The Committee on Orders of the Day made a report and the same was adopted, as follows:

Saturday evening, Young People's Service with Rev. J. S. Willett in charge.

In harmony with the arrangement made by our Conference President, preaching each afternoon at 3 P. M. by Rev. J. S. Willett.

A Committee on Passage of Character was elected as follows: A. J. Allen, W. N. Osgood, Elders; C. B. Armstrong, Layman.

A Committee on Pastoral Relations was appointed as follows: A. J. Allen, E. L. Elliott, H. S. Hill, D. W. Summers, Elders; Robert Flanders, E. L. McKnight, S. T. Jones, Laymen.

Moved and supported to adjourn, so Committees could attend to their work. Benediction by E. D. Carpenter.

Wednesday Afternoon Meeting.

Rev. Richard Palmer was in charge of the song and praise service. Song, "Wonderful Words of Life" was sung. Lesson was read from the second chapter of Titus. Brother Palmer offered prayer. The roll was called, to which seventeen Elders, three Licentiates, eighteen Delegates responded to the call of their names.

The minutes of the morning session were read the same adopted.

The Vice-President was called to the chair.

The name of A. J. Allen, was called and character passed.

The names of E. D. Carpenter and J. J. Davison were called and their characters passed.

The order of the day having arrived, the Conference Sunday School Secretary made his report and the same was adopted. See Report No. 3.

The Tithing Secretary made his annual report and same was

adopted.

A recess of ten minutes was enjoyed by all. Song, "My Jesus I Love Thee" was sung. Prayer was offered by Brother Willett. He then brought the message of the afternoon from the Word of God recorded in Acts, 7th chapter, 58th verse, also 9th chapter, 20th verse, and in Philemon, 9th verse. This was a very helpful message to all present.

Committee on Courtesy introduced Rev. C. R. Sumner, Methodist pastor, Beekmantown, N. Y., and Rev. A. H. McKnight, the

Baptist pastor of Potsdam, N. Y.

Moved and supported that we as a Conference approve of transferring the Peekskill charge to the Middle Atlantic Conference.

Moved and supported that the President and Advisory Board confer with the other Conference Presidents and their Advisory Boards of this State and elect a Director for the Lord's Day Alliance work.

The names of J. F. Wright, A. E. Moses, T. A. Moses, E. Trow-bridge and F. H. Wright were called and characters passed.

Moved to adjourn. Benediction by Rev. C. R. Sumner.

Wednesday Evening Meeting.

The song service was in charge of W. F. Lewis. Songs, "There is Sunshine in My Soul" and "Power in the Blood" were sung. Rev. H. J. Bullock and Rev. C. E. Hill offered prayer. Rev. D. W. Summers was the speaker of the evening. Text used is recorded in Songs of Solomon, 6th chapter, 10th verse, "Who is she that looketh forth as the morning, fair as the moon, clear as the sun, and terrible as an army with banners?" Also Matthew, 16th chapter, 18th verse, "Upon this rock I will build my church and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it."

At the close song "Are You Washed in the Blood" was sung.

Benediction by Rev. John Waitman.

Thursday Morning Meeting.

Wm. N. Osgood was in charge of the devotional service. Song "What a Friend We Have in Jesus" was sung. Mrs. Mabel Mein and Rev. C. A. Heath offered prayer. Scripture lesson was read

from the book of Colossians, first chapter. The presence of the Lord was manifest in this service.

The roll was called and seventeen Elders, three Licentiates and nineteen Delegates answered to the call of their names.

The minutes of the afternoon session were read and the same adopted.

The Conference Treasurer made a partial report and the same was approved. See Report No. 4.

Moved that E. D. Carpenter write a letter to Brother and Sister J. F. Wright in behalf of the Conference.

The President appointed H. S. Hill, H. J. Bullock, tellers, for the election of Conference officers. The following were elected:

Moved that the Committee on Orders of the Day should give one hour for a tithing service in the next Conference session.

Conference Missionary Board—The President and the President of the W. H. & F. M. Society, E. L. Elliott and C. L. Hill.

Camp Meeting Committee—The President and pastors of West Chazy, Mooers and West Plattsburg charges; Laymen, Stephen Wright, Roy Stafford and Dr. Walter Stevenson.

Advisory Board-President, E. D. Carpenter, Harry Miller.

The President and Vice-President made brief but very helpful remarks.

Moved that the President and his Advisory Board meet the other Presidents of the Rochester and Lockport Conferences with their Advisory Boards, and elect a representative to work with the Sunday School Association of this State.

President Luckey, President of Houghton College, spoke regarding the work at Houghton. He spoke of the early days, and the

continual growth of Houghton Seminary until the final permission of the Boards of Regents of the State of New York permitting Houghton Seminary to become a chartered College. President Luckey called on Brother Willett to speak regarding the Houghton College work, and he spoke very highly regarding the work of Houghton College.

Adjourned by limitation of time. Benediction by Rev. C. E. Hill.

Thursday Afternoon Session.

Devotional service conducted by F. E. Wood.

Roll call, fifteen Elders, three Licentiates, twenty Delegates answered to the roll.

Minutes of the morning session were read, and the same approved.

Conference at 2 P. M. gave way for the meeting of the Superannuated Ministers' Aid Society. See Report No. 5.

The hour having arrived for the order of the day, song "Pass Me Not, O Gentle Saviour" was sung. Scripture lesson read was a part of the 24th chapter of the Epistle of St. Luke. Prayer by Richard Palmer. Special singing by Ruby Chapman and Mildred Wheeler. Brother Willett took his text from Luke 24:16th and 32d verses. No autos, no flying machines, so the only thing they could do was to walk. It is a grand thing to walk sometimes, and commune with nature. Note eight things: 1. Take note definitely of Jesus of Nazareth. 2. Jesus was mighty in deed and word. 3. He said he did this before God and the people. 4. The chief priests delivered him to death, to be crucified. 5. Blighted hopes. 6. These men had scripture minds anyway. 7. Certain women startled us which found he had risen. 8. Certain with us found facts were according to the women's version of the resurrection. Don't live entirely on visions of the past, but get some visions for the present and for yourself. Be sure and note how Jesus goes after these two men going to Emmaus. Jesus came to them because they needed Him. He comes to us because we need Him. A very profitable line of truth was presented and the blessing of the Lord was upon the service.

Voted that the Conference be divided into districts for the promotion of the work same as last year, and that the Directors be appointed by the President and his Advisory Board.

Voted that there be held at least one tent meeting in each dis-

trict, time and place or places to be left to the President and his Advisory Board, and the Director of the District.

The names of C. E. Hill, F. L. Presley, G. D. Jock and H. R. LaVere were called and characters passed.

Voted to adjourn. Benediction by Wm. N. Osgood.

Thursday Evening Meeting.

The song and praise meeting was in charge of H. S. Hill. Songs, "I Shall Know Him" and "Sunshine in the Soul," with a number of other selections, were sung. A few testimonies were given to the mighty saving and keeping power of God. A fervent prayer freighted with the blessing of heaven was offered by Florence Baxter. Duet by Edith and Lillian Stevenson. Scripture lesson was read from the book of Galatians, 2d chapter. Special song by Ethel LaVere and Ruby Chapman.

Rev. H. R. LaVere brought the message, using for his text Gal. 2:20, "I am crucified with Christ; nevertheless I live; yet not I, but Christ liveth in me: and the life that I now live in the flesh I live by the faith of the Son of God, who loved me and gave himself for me." This was a very gracious service, one soul was at the altar seeking the Lord. The closing prayer by A. J. Allen.

Friday Morning Meeting.

Devotional service in charge of C. A. Heath. Songs, "The Solid Rock" and "The Sweet By and By" were sung. Prayer was offered by Brother Willett. Scripture lesson was read from St. John, 15th chapter, first ten verses.

At the roll call seventeen Elders, three Licentiates and twenty Delegates responded to the call of their names.

The minutes of the afternoon session were read and the same was approved.

Detailed report of the Camp Meeting Committee was given and the same was adopted. See Treasurer's Report No. 6.

An invitation was extended from the Macomb charge to entertain the next Annual Conference. The same was unanimously accepted. If for any reason they are not able to entertain, it was ordered that it be left with the President and his Advisory Board to secure a place.

Voted that the time for the next annual session to convene should be the Tuesday before the last Sunday of April, 1924, at 7:30 o'clock.

Voted that the President should preach the Conference sermon Wednesday at 3 P. M.

Voted that the Conference President be authorized to secure some one to preach every evening, except Friday, which should be reserved for the W. H. & F. M. Society.

Voted that the Committee on Religious Service provide for preaching each afternoon at 3 P. M.

Moved and supported that the Tithing Secretary be supplied with funds, not to exceed ten dollars, to provide needed equipment for each charge.

Order of the day having arrived, that being the election of General Conference Delegates. H. S. Hill and H. J. Bullock were appointed tellers.

The first Ministerial Delegate was Rev. E. D. Carpenter; the second, Rev. A. J. Allen. Reserves, first, Rev. H. S. Hill, second, Rev. L. M. Haves.

The first Lay Delegate elected was Dr. Walter Stevenson; the second, Robert Flanders. Reserves, first, S. H. Miller; second, R. I. Johnson.

The Committee on Courtesy introduced Florence M. Yorton, returned missionary from Africa. She made brief remarks.

The order of the day having arrived, our Connectional Agent spoke on the Missionary, Sunday School and Publishing interests, which was very helpful to all present.

Moved to adjourn. Benediction by W. F. Lewis.

Friday Afternoon Meeting.

The devotional service was led by Florence Baxter. Song, "I Need Thee Every Hour" was sung. Scripture lesson was read from the 66th Psalm. D. W. Summers, E. L. Elliott and Miss Baxter offered prayer.

At the roll call seventeen Elders, three Licentiates and twenty Delegates answered to the roll.

Minutes of the morning session were read and the same adopted. The Committee on Resolutions made two partial reports. The same were adopted. See Reports No. 1 and No. 2.

The name of S. A. Green was called and character passed.

Voted that the Vice-President be engaged to help in the tent meetings and in other places as the work demands.

Committee on Apportionment made their report. The same was approved. See Report No. 7.

A five mintutes' recess was enjoyed at this time.

Song, "Glory to His Name" was sung. Prayer by Brother Willett. Special song by Floyd Banker. The subject of the hour was "The Coming of the Lord." Text used was found in Acts 1:10, 11: "And while they looked steadfastly toward heaven as he went up, behold two men stood by them in white apparel; which also said, ye men of Galilee, why stand ye gazing up into heaven? this same Jesus, which is taken up from you into heaven shall so come in like manner as ve have seen him go into heaven." Titus 2:13, 14, "Looking for that blessed hope, and the glorious appearing of the great God and our Saviour Jesus Christ; Who gave himself for us, that he might redeem us from all iniquity, and purify unto himself a peculiar people, zealous of good works." The post and pre-millennialists both believe in the second coming of the Lord. The League of Nations failed because Jesus was not recognized in it, and that we have world government in which Christ is excluded. 1 Thess. 4:16, 17, "For the Lord himself shall decend from heaven with a shout, with the voice of the archangel, and with the trump of God: and the dead in Christ shall rise first: then we which are alive and remain shall be caught up together with them in the clouds, to meet the Lord in the air: and so shall we ever be with the Lord." Verse 18, "Wherefore comfort one another with these words." This was a time of great refreshing from the presence of the Lord.

Names of D. W. Summers, W. F. Lewis, G. M. Sellers and Florence Baxter were called and characters passed.

Moved to adjourn. Benediction by H. J. Bullock.

Friday Evening Meeting.

The Friday evening meeting was in charge of the W. H. & F. M. Society. See report of same. Report No. 7.

Saturday Morning Meeting.

Rev. G. M. Sellers had charge of the song and testimony meeting. Song, "I Shall Know Him" was sung. Prayer by Brother Sellers. Scripture lesson was read from Romans 8:1-6. A number of testimonies were given, and the presence of the Lord was felt.

At the call of the roll seventeen Elders, three Licentiates and twenty Delegates answered to the call of their names.

Minutes of the afternoon session were read and the same was adopted.

E. D. Carpenter and A. J. Howard were appointed to fill the



places of D. W. Summers and S. T. Jones, in their absence, on the Committee on Pastoral Relations.

Letter of Standing was granted V. D. Otis.

The names of Wm. N. Osgood, V. D. Otis, E. L. Elliott, H. S. Hill, F. E. Wood and L. M. Hayes were called and characters passed.

Moved to reaffirm report No. 3 of the last minutes. See Report No. 8.

Name of C. A. Heath was called and character passed.

Camp Meeting Committee made their annual report and the same was approved. See Report No. 9.

The hour of the day having arrived, that being the Memorial service, which was in charge of Rev. C. E. Hill, and in memory of Rev. S. C. Fox and Mrs. F. L. Presley. Brother Hill made some very sympathetic remarks in remembrance of the deceased, and read a lesson from the 21st chapter of Revelation. Song, "Blest Be the Tie That Binds" was sung. Prayer by E. D. Carpenter. Brother Hill said he could speak of Brother Fox from his heart, that his home was always open to the needy and when they were hungry they were always fed, and that he was a man of prayer and a man of victory, and his home was always open for religious service; that it is said a life is a noise between two worlds. If that is so, death is a hush between two worlds. But while the workman is taken the work goes on.

Brother Carpenter spoke of Brother Fox as a preacher, of his courage and great faith that never failed in time of need.

Brother Davison spoke of his warm-heartedness and the brotherly love that existed between them; that he was a man that moved things and was always ready to do anything and everything.

COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISTIC WORK.

Your Committee on Evangelistic Work reports as follows: We have carefully considered the subject referred to us and submit the following:

- 1. That the President travel the Conference.
- 2. That he shall hold at least one quarterly meeting on each charge during the year, and the balance of his time shall be devoted to church extension work in the Conference either in opening new work or in evangelistic service on fields already established as the best interests of the work may demand.
- 3. The arrangement of the dates for quarterly meeting work to be made by the President and his Advisory Board.

- 7. All money received by the President in his work to be credited to the charge from which received and to apply on Conference apportionment for said charge, the President to receipt to pastor and where there is no pastor to the charge, that they may get proper credit in settlement with Conference Treasurer.

COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS.

Resolution No. 1.

Your Committee begs leave to submit the following:

We, the members and visiting friends of the Champlain Annual Conference at Mooers, N. Y., from April 24th to 29th inclusive, hereby express to Rev. and Mrs. L. M. Hayes and the members and friends of the Mooers Wesleyan Methodist church our hearty appreciation for the splendid manner in which we have been entertained during the session of Annual Conference, and we pray that the riches of grace may rest in abundant measure on pastor and wife and the friends who have made our stay so pleasant and congenial.

Resolution No. 2.

We recommend two rules for our Camp Meeting work:

- 1. That in securing Evangelists for the Camp Meeting work that those of the Wesleyan Methodist church be secured if this can be done.
- 2. That the Camp Meeting Committee be composed of the Conference President as Chairman, and three ministers and three laymen, all to be elected by ballot after the Conference of 1923, the term of office to be three years, the time of one minister and one layman expiring each year.

STANDING RULES.

At the session of Conference the following Standing Rules of Conference were adopted:

- I. The Standing Rules of Conference shall be printed in the Conference Minutes each year.
- II. All visiting members of our own or other churches in harmony with our principles shall be invited to honorary seats in the Conference.
- III. The Conference President shall receive \$20.00 per year for postage and stationery; also any needed traveling expense. At any time the President be required to travel the Conference, his duties and pay shall be defined by the Conference.
- IV. The Conference Secretary shall receive \$15.00 per year for his labor and incidental expenses.
- V. The Conference Treasurer shall receive \$10.00 per year for his services in caring for the funds.
- VI. In making his report the Conference Treasurer is authorized to close his books April 15th of each year. The Treasurer of the Ministers' Relief Association shall also close his books April 15th.
- VII. In our Camp Meeting work, after the expense of the camp meeting has been paid by the Camp Meeting Committee or by the person whom they may designate, any unexpended balance shall be turned over to the Conference Treasurer.
- VIII. All monies disbursed by the Conference Treasurer during the interim of Conference shall b upon order of the President, except in case of payment to the President, when such order shall be issued by the Vice-President. It is understood, of course, that any payment ordered by the Conference direct may be paid by the Treasurer without an order as directed above.
- IX. No monies shall be loaned by the Conference Treasurer except by order of Conference or by consent of the President and his Advisory Board.

- X. Each elder shall make his engagement as pastor with the understanding that if he be elected Conference President he shall be released in his pastoral engagement.
- XI. In each month having five (5) Sundays, the Sunday School offering of the fifth Sunday shall be given to Home Missions.
- XII. That in securing Evangelists for the Camp Meeting work that those of the Wesleyan Methodist Church be secured if this can be done.
- XIII. That the Camp Meeting Committee be composed of the Conference President as Chairman, and three ministers and three laymen, all to be elected by ballot after the Conference of 1923, the term of office to be three years, the time of one minister and one layman expiring each year.
- XIV. Pastors shall state financial items in their statistical reports in even dollars, except in items affecting the Budget, and so far as possible are requested to report all budget items in even dollars. When such rule is not followed the Statistical Secretaries are authorized to drop decimals except as provided above.

Rev. Floyd Banker, who expects to go to India soon, was introduced and urged the people of the Champlain Conference for their support by their prayers.

Sister Florence Yorton, returned Missionary from Africa, was the principal speaker of the evening, speaking of the progress of our Mission work. This is the twentieth anniversary of the organization of the General Conference W. H. & F. M. S. We now have practically six stations and three out-stations and thirteen missionaries. Instead of horrible customs of olden days, now more civilized customs are practiced. Progress is seen in school work, for now the boys pay a small tuition, where in former years the Missionaries paid the parents for their children in order to get them into the school. There is also a better grade of teachers. The natives have more faith in the medical work and while getting medical aid their spiritual welfare is also looked after at the same time. There are over twenty native preachers and teachers at the present time. The natives are learning the great blessing derived from tithing and now there are three dedicated chapels on the field. Progress is also seen in the work in Japan, India and South America as well as in the homeland.
