Daily Proceedings

Tuesday Evening, June 28, 1966

The 124th annual session of the Champlain Annual Conference of The Wesleyan Methodist Church of America convened on the West Chazy Campground, West Chazy, New York on June 28, 1966. The conference was called to order at 7:00 P.M. by the president, Rev. Charles A. Dayton.

The Roll was called and forty-one (41) ministerial delegates and twenty-nine (29) lay delegates responded.

The Devotional Period was presided over by Rev. Edwin Seaman, vice president of the conference. Rev. John Lamos led us in singing "I Know Whom I Have Believed". Rev. Hazel Perry gave her testimony after which Rev. Orville Lawrence read the Scripture lesson from John 15: 1-12. Dr. Harold K. Conference President's Report: Rev. Charles Dayton gave his annual report reviewing the work of the conference for the past year. He cited a number of churches which have made remarkable progress. His official acts (with corrections) financial report, and committee appointments were adopted. (See reports)

It was moved and supported that the Conference Sermon be presented each year by a ministerial member of the conference who shall be elected at the previous conference session.

It was moved and supported that this motion be amended by the addition of the words "and that the Committee on Itineracy and Elders Orders submit the nomination for this candidate."

It was voted that this main motion with its amendment be laid upon the table.

The Conference Agenda was read and approved.

Courtesy: The committee on courtesy introduced to the conference Dr. and Mrs. H. K. Sheets, Chaplain and Mrs. Quentin Hayes, and Rev. and Mrs. John Putney. Each brought words of greeting.

Conference President's Message: The vice president introduced our conference president, Rev. Charles A. Dayton. Using scripture taken from I Thessalonians 1:6-10, Brother Dayton spoke to us upon the subject of "Characteristics of a Model Church."

Benediction: At the conclusion of the message, the congregation gathered at the front of the tabernacle for the benediction offered by Rev. Florence Northrup.

Wednesday Morning, June 29, 1966

The Roll was called at 8:45 A.M.

The Devotional Period was led by Rev. Leland Boring. After singing, Brother

Boring read to us a scripture lesson from Philippians 4:4, 13 and commented upon the importance of rejoicing. Prayer was offered by Rev. Robert Finley.

Orders of the Day: The conference president suggested the following orders of the day for Thursday, June 30, 1966:

The Report of the Statistical Committee was read by Rev. Charles McCallum.

It was moved and seconded that those churches which have educational budget items outstanding on their report but have paid this budget in full give their receipts to the conference treasurer. A notation will be made in the minutes that these churches have paid their educational budget in full.

It was moved and seconded that this motion be amended by striking out the word 'educational'.

It was voted that we refer this motion with its amendment to a committee which shall return a recommendation to this body. The committee was elected as follows: Charles McCallum, Gerald Matson, Otto Finch.

Courtesy: The committee on courtesy introduced Dr. L. B. Ries of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. He gave us words of greeting.

Recess: We were recessed until 10:45 a.m.

Denominational Address: Following the recess the W.M.S. met with the main conference body to hear the denominational address. Our song leader, Rev. John Lamos led in singing "Beulah Land" after which the president introduced Dr. Harold K. Sheets, a General Superintendent of the Wesleyan Methodist Church. In his remarks, Dr. Sheets emphasized that this past quadrennium was an historic period in the life of the church, and he gave us a brief review of some of the issues with which we have wrestled as a church. Among these were the rebuilding of our international headquarters and the recent general conference with its three major concerns of merger with other denominations, internal problems, and a new pension plan. Wednesday Afternoon, June 29, 1966

The Roll was called at 1:30 P.M.

The Devotional Period was led by Rev. Hazel Perry. After singing "Majestic Sweetness", Sister Perry read from St. John 17, and an exhortation followed. Prayer was offered by Rev. Howard Chapman.

The Minutes of the Tuesday evening and Wednesday morning sessions were read and approved with corrections.

The Nominating Committee presented the first reading of its report for information.

Report of the Building and Location Committee: Rev. Edwin Seaman read a resume of the committee's actions. The report was adopted. (See reports)

A Recess was granted until 3:00 P.M.

Report of the Delegates to General Conference: Dr. Hollis Stevenson, Rev. Floyd Tyler, and the Conference President, Rev. Charles Dayton each gave oral reports as to the conduct and spirit of the 1966 General Conference Session.

Campmeeting Business: The campmeeting treasurer, Mrs. Betty LaPlante, gave her report. It was voted that this report be received in the spirit of praise and that it be referred to the auditing committee. (See report)

It was moved and supported that the annual conference elect a conference registrar who shall be responsible for registration and cottage fees, and that a deposit of one dollar (\$1) be placed for room reservations for the annual conference or camp for the following year. The Minutes of the Wednesday afternoon session were read and approved.

Order of the Day: Annual Conference vote upon merger.

The instructions from the General Conference relative to voting, the preamble to the documents on merger, and the resolution calling for approval of merger being read, opportunity was given by the chairman for anyone to ask questions upon the Proposed Basis for Merger and the Proposed Constitution. Following this, the members were directed to vote. The results are as follows: **Number of Ballots Cast 90, Number Voting Yes — 89, Number Voting No — 1**

It was voted to recommend the local church vote upon merger to be taken the second Sunday in September or during the week preceding.

Adjournment by vote. Dismissal by Rev. Harold Stewart.

Thursday Afternoon, June 30, 1966

The Roll was called at 8:50 A.M.

The Devotional Period was led by Rev. David Ross. Having sung "In the Garden", the conference listened as Brother Ross led in prayer and exhorted us upon the text "Fear thou not for I am with thee" found in Isaiah 41:10.

The Pastoral Relations Committee gave the first reading of its report for information.

Budget Receipts: A previously elected committee asked to bring in recommendations relative to the problem of budget discrepancies on the statistical reports gave its report and it was adopted. (See reports)

Union of Churches Within the Conference: A matter relative to a study of the possibility of two of our Wesleyan Churches and a Free Methodist church merging to form one larger Wesleyan church was presented. It was moved and supported that this matter be referred to the President and his advisory board and that they be authorized to study the matter and make recommendations to the the conference. It was moved and supported that this motion be amended to include the Board on Church and Parsonage Building and Location as a part of this committee. By vote the amendment was passed and the main motion with its amendment was then approved.

Sunday School Board: The Sunday School Secretary nominated the following persons as members of the Sunday School Board until 1968: Rev. Floyd Tyler, Rev. Orville Lawrence, Mrs. Pauline Streeter. By vote these were elected.

President's Advisory Board: The conference president nominated the following as members of his advisory board for the coming year: Rev. Edwin Seaman, Mr. Raymond Smith. By vote these were elected.

Conference Scholarship Fund: It was moved and supported that a committee be elected to study the possibility of setting up a Conference Scholarship Fund, especially to aid in the matter of ministerial recruitment, with provision also to encourage the return of these students to service within the conference; this committee to be authorized to act, receive and administer funds, and this committee to report to their actions and recommendations to the 1967 annual conference. This motion was amended to include the Conference President as an ex-officio member of the committee. The main motion with its amendment was approved.

The Conference Scholarship Committee was elected as follows: Chairman, Rev. Everett Elliott; Dr. Hollis C. Stevenson, Rev. Edwin Seaman, with Conference President an ex-officio member.

Report of the Historical Committee of the Conference: Rev. Aldis Lamos reported in the behalf of this committee which was the creation of the last ministerial institute. Not having conference status, it was recommended that such a committee be elected by this conference to continue the study and work previously begun by the aforementioned group. It was voted that the members previously approved by the ministerial institute be the conference historical committee. The committee is as follows: Rev. Aldis Lamos, chairman; Rev. Otto Finch, Rev. C. C. Murray, Rev. R. B. Hewitt, Rev. C. L. Hill, and the conference president, ex-officio.

It was recommended by the chairman of the historical committee that the **Challenger** be the publication in which the work of the committee be printed.

July 4th Observance: It was voted that we properly observe the 4th of July on the Campground and that such observance be held at 1:30 P.M.

It was voted that Rev. Aldis Lamos be the head marshal for the 4th of July observance and that he be empowered to select a committee to work with him.

It was further voted that the Campmeeting committee be asked to take action during the interim between conferences, and that they lay plans for a 4th of July observance this coming year.

Report of the Committee on Resolutions: This report was given by Rev. Aldis Lamos. It was adopted by vote. (See reports)

While this report was being given, it was voted for an extension of time, until the report could be completed and approved.

Adjournment. It was voted to adjourn. Dismissal by Rev. Orville Lawrence.

Friday Afternoon, July 1, 1966

The Roll was called at 1:30 P.M.

The Devotional Period was led by Rev. Edwin Seaman. A number of persons present recalled the name and location of the first campmeeting which they ever attended. For a Scripture lesson, the conference body repeated from memory the first Psalm. Prayer was offered by Sister Florence Shippec. There followed a spontaneous season of rejoicing by singing "When I Have Gone The Last Mile".

The Minutes of the Thursday afternoon and Friday morning sessions were read and approved with corrections.

Conference Sermon: On motion the matter relative to the conference sermon which had been previously laid upon the table was brought before the body. It was voted that consideration of this matter be deferred until the Conference President could be present.

Ministerial Institute Report: The 1966 Chairman of the committee gave an oral report of prospective plans for the 1966 institute.

It was voted that we accept the invitation of the Cobleskill church to hold the institute in their church this fall.

It was further voted that the institute be held on October 10th-12th.

Rev. Richard Bennett gave a financial report of the 1965 institute. It was voted to receive this report and refer it to the auditing committee. (See report)

Committee on Itineracy and Elders Orders: The report of this committee was given and adopted by vote. (See reports)

Report of the Conference Sunday School Secretary: Rev. Floyd Tyler gave his report and it was voted to adopt the written report and that the financial report be received and referred to the auditing committee. (See report)

Calendar Committee: It was voted that the calendar committee for 1966-67 be the Conference President, Wesleyan Youth President, W.M.S. President, and the Sunday School Secretary.

Report of the Auditing Committee: The report of this committee was given. The part of the report covering financial statements for the current conference year was adopted.

It was voted that a new standing rule, number thirty-five (35), be created regarding conference financial procedures. (See report of the auditing committee and standing rules.)

It was further voted that a final cut-off date for all Conference treasurers shall be June 20th.

Other recommendations of the committee were disposed of as follows: Recommendation number two was referred by vote to the Pastoral Relations Committee. Recommendation number three was approved. (See report)

Standing Rule Changes: It was voted that standing rules number three and four be amended by striking out '\$50' and inserting the figure '\$100'. It was further voted that standing rule number thirty-four be amended by adding the sentence: "The representative to the regional N.A.E. shall be reimbursed for basic expense in attending the annual regional meeting; the same not to exceed fifty dollars (\$50).

Auditing Committee: The motion prevailed that we elect an auditing committee to be a standing committee and that it be a committee of three members.

Recess for ten minutes.

Adjournment by vote. Dismissal by Rev. Elwyn Putney.

Saturday Morning, July 2, 1966

The Roll was called at 8:45 A.M.

The Devotional Period was led by Rev. Otis McDonald. After singing, Brother McDonald quoted passages from II Chronicles and Philippians and gave testimony as to the manner in which these promises have sustained him. Rev. Charles McCallum offered prayer.

The Minutes of the Friday afternoon session were read and approved.

Characters Passed: During the forenoon session the characters of the following persons were passed: Clarence Murray, Robert Finley, Clifton Chapman, Marjean Chapman, Ralph Seaman, John Putney, Howard Chapman, Dale Cook.

The Report of the Apportionment Committee was given and adopted by vote. (See report)

Conference Sermon: The motion concerning whether or not the Conference President's message should be replaced by a Conference sermon delivered by a ministerial member of the conference, and how that candidate should be determined was once again brought before the body. (See minutes of Tuesday Evening).

The amendment to the main motion which stated "that the committee on itineracy and elders orders submit the nomination for this candidate" was lost.

It was moved and supported that the main motion be referred to the Committee on Itineracy and Elders Orders who shall report back to the conference their recommendation.

Wesleyan Youth Activities: The campmeeting committee returned a report of its action relative to the problem of Wesleyan Youth registration and activities in the boys dormitory. Considerable discussion followed during which the Conference W.Y. president read a statement from the Wesleyan Youth executive council stating their readiness to cooperate with the wishes of the Conference body.

It was moved by Rev. Donald Stanton, W.Y. Secretary, and seconded by Rev. Donald Klob, Wesleyan Youth President, that the Wesleyan Youth registration office be moved from the boys dormitory and that no class rooms in the dorm be used this year.

Recognizing that such action would seriously curtail the youth program this year, it was moved and supported that we recess to permit delegates to examine the facilities and the arrangement of rooms in the dorm before any further action be taken.

Recess: We were declared in recess by the conference president.

Saturday Afternoon, July 2, 1966

The Roll was called at 1:30 P.M.

The Devotional Period was led by Rev. Everett Elliott. Brother Elliott read as a Scripture lesson I Peter 5 and followed this with prayer.

The Minutes of the Saturday morning session were read and approved placing the motion relative to the use of the boys' dorm directly before us for action. (See minutes of morning session)

Use of Boys' Dormitory: The motion referred to above was placed before the body. The motion was LOST.

It was voted that we adopt the recommendation of the campmeeting committee relative to this matter. The recommendation is as follows:

"Since our Camp and Youth Program comes from a central administration, certain problems do arise in executing these plans. In view of these problems, we urge that the Camp and Youth boards be allowed to carry out these plans in a discreet manner, dealing with problems as they do arise."

It was further voted that if it should be found not advisable to continue the present use of the boys' dorm for registration and classrooms, that the campmeeting committee be empowered, if they feel it advisable, to provide another building or other suitable space for the Wesleyan Youth activities.

"It is recommended to strike out in standing rule number 28 the words 'the conference president's message' and insert the words 'conference sermon to be delivered by the conference president or someone whom he shall designate'. It was moved and seconded that this recommendation be adopted. The motion was LOST.

The main motion "that the conference sermon shall be presented each year by a ministerial member of the conference who shall be elected at the previous conference session was carried by vote.

Report of Wesleyan Youth Elections: The report of the Wesleyan Youth elections was given and the officers approved. (See W.Y. minutes for listing of officers.)

Report of the Card Call Secretary: Rev. Elwyn Putney gave an oral report. It was adopted.

The Pastoral Relations Committee gave the final reading of its report.

The appointments were read and this part of the report was adopted.

The recommendations were read and recommendations one through four (1-4) were approved.

Recommendations five, six, and seven (5, 6 & 7) were approved.

Recommendation number 8 was approved.

Recommendation number 9 was approved. (See complete report)

The Report of the Secretary of Wesleyan Men was given by Raymond Smith. This oral report was adopted by a standing vote of thanks.

Report of the Statistician: This report which was given earlier was adopted. (See reports)

REPORT OF THE CHURCH & PARSONAGE BLDG. & LOCATION COMMITTEE

The Committee met at West Chazy, New York on July 7, 1965 to discuss with the Pastor of the Mooers church and his Building Committee the possibility of putting an addition on their church for Sunday School rooms and a fellowship hall. This addition is to be 40' by 34' with the roof 18" lower than the church roof but with the same pitch. A motion prevailed that the Mooers Church be allowed to borrow up to \$15,000 with the local church as collateral.

On Sept. 8, 1965 the Committee met at Plattsburgh, N.Y. to discuss the purchase of property known as 62 Elizabeth St., with dimensions 100' by 170' 9", and which borders our church property at 66 Elizabeth St. This space seemed necessary if we are ever to expand at our present location. A motion prevailed that permission be granted to purchase this property and that the Conference Trustees be authorized to sign the necessary papers for the securing of loans.

On April 20, 1966, the Committee met at West Chazy, N.Y. to consider the very detailed and well-drawn plans of the proposed Ellington Church. The people of the Ellington Church plan to help in the construction of the church with whatever skills they have, such as plumbing and electrical. After carefully studying the plans, the Committee voted to approve the project with an expenditure not to exceed \$50,000.

THE REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL SECRETARY

To the 124th Session of the Chaplain Annual Conference assembled:— Greetings in that Name above every name, the Worthy Name of our Lord Jesus Christ!

It is with mingled feelings that I make this report of the Sunday School Secretary. It has been a privilege and a pleasure to serve the Conference in this capacity for the past several years. I have appreciated the cooperation and support given as we have endeavored to promote the great work of the Sunday Schools. The counsel and advice and hours of service rendered by the Sunday School Board have been of great value. All of this is evidenced by the consistent and steady growth of our Sunday Schools. During the past ten years the average attendance has gone from 1951 in 1956 to 2547 in 1966.

Other signs of advancement have been evidenced by the improvement and expansion of plant facilities. Among these are: a new church at Cobleskill; a remarkable transformation has taken place at Bakers Mills; Schenectady and Plattsburg, Elizabeth St. have outgrown their quarters; Mooers is expanding their plant; Morley has added Sunday Schools rooms . . . , thus it goes throughout the conference; the Lord's blessing is manifest on every hand.

Of thirty-one Sunday Schools reporting to the Sunday School Secretary four have organized CYCs, three taught WETI courses and eighteen held VBS. These are instruments of great value to the church and Sunday school in its great task of carrying out the Great Commission and we would urge more of our leaders to utilize them.

Another item to be given consideration is the use of Wesleyan Literature. All of those reporting do use our own materials. However, there are many who in some departments turn to other sources. At Headquarters we have a capable and efficient staff of workers who are producing the best material for Wesleyan Methodists, materials, in fact that are sought by other Denominations and produced by us with their headings. In this area we strongly recommend that our Sunday Schools give support to our materials and thus enable the Department to continue to upgrade and improve the quality, practicality and appeal of the tools produced.

This year we are hold the seventh Crusader Camp here at West Chazy. Across the years God has blessed this effort among our boys and girls, providing needed staff of counsellors and teachers, physical facilities and meeting other needs and enabling this camp to be a means of bringing many of the campers to a real experience of Salvation. We wish to thank all those who have labored in this field.

As our Brother Lamos again takes up the reins of leadership, I pledge my

cooperation to him and urge each of you to back him in this task with your prayers and support and carry forward the Kingdom of God in the Sunday School. Thank you for allowing us to serve as Sunday School Secretary these years.

REPORT OF THE SUPERANNUATED MINISTER'S RELIEF ASSOCIATION

Minutes of the Annual Meeting: The Superannuated Minister's Relief Association of the Champlain Conference, met at West Chazy, N.Y. June 30, 1966. Rev.

Floyd Tyler, President presided. Minutes of the last meeting were read. Treasurer's Report was read. It was received and referred to the Auditing Committee.

Rev. Reginald Hewitt suggested that the title of the Association be changed. Dr. Sheets gave a judgment on this matter stating that it might well be quite an involved matter, though not impossible. REPORT OF THE AUDITING COMMITTEE

The financial records of the Champlain Conference have been audited and found to be correct with the material available.

However certain records were not available for complete audit and therefore it is the opinion of the auditing committee that we adopt Standing Rule No. 35 dealing with auditing and financial record keeping and reads as follows:

- A. That all organizations be required to furnish a complete set of records for audit each year. Namely — a copy of the annual report, ledgers and journals, check books, cancelled checks, bank statements, receipt books or records and an analysis of fund locations.
- B. All vouchers for budget credit should be handled with the same acknowledgements as cash.
- C. All funds be handled through bank checking procedures.
- D. The Conference President shall be responsible to have in his records proof custodians of funds who handle at any one time an amount in excess of \$1,000 are bonded. The President's Advisory Board shall verify the bonds as to form and sufficiency.
- E. All fund balances shall be declared at the close of the fiscal year by all treasurers. Any excessive fund balances shall be deposited in a savings account for other bona-fide interest bearing account.

The committee also recommends the following:

1. All financial records shall adhere to a common cut-off date on June 20.
2. The Pastoral Relations Committee shall give attention to what items shall be paid from the Conference President's Salary budget and what items shall be paid from the Conference Work fund.
3. The quarterly checking of financial records shall be made by all treasurers of conference funds with a report being furnished to the executive officer of the organization involved indicating the accuracy of the records and the availability of funds.

Standing Rules

1. The Resolutions of this Conference shall be printed in the Minutes of the Conference each year.

2. All visiting members of our own, or other Churches in harmony with our principles, shall be invited to honorary seats in the Conference.

3. The Conference Secretary shall receive one hundred dollars (\$100) per year for his labor, and any incidental expenses shall be in addition to this amount.

4. The Conference Treasurer shall receive one hundred dollars (\$100) per year for his services in caring for the funds.

5. The Treasurer of the Superannuate Ministers' Relief Association also shall close his books one week before the Conference Session.

6. All monies disbursed by the Conference Treasurer during the interim of Conference shall be upon order of the President, except in case of payment to the President, when such order shall be issued by the Vice President. It is understood that any payment ordered by the Conference direct may be paid by the Treasurer without an order as directed above.

7. No monies shall be loaned by the Conference Treasurer except by order of the Conference, or by the consent of the President and his Advisory Board.

8. Each Elder shall make his engagements as Pastor with the understanding that if he be elected Conference President he shall be released from his engagement as Pastor within the period of three months following his election.

9. The first Sunday of each month shall be known as missions Sunday; the Sunday School offering to go alternately to (new) Church Extension & Evangelism and Conference Missions in that order, and that the conference missions offering be sent to the Conference Missions Treasurer. The Committee on Finance defines "Conference Missions" as the establishing new (or) subsidizing of the needy fields of the Conference.

10. In securing Evangelists for the Camp Meeting the Camp Meeting Committee is privileged to secure not more than one worker outside the Denomination.

11. The Camp Meeting Committee shall be composed of the Conference President, as Chairman, and three ministers and three laymen, all to be elected by ballot, the term of each office to be three years, the time of one minister and one layman expiring each year; also, the Conference Vice President, the President of the Missionary Society and the President of the W.Y. shall be members of this Committee.

12. Pastors shall state financial items in their statistical reports in even dollars, except in items affecting the Budget, and as far as possible are requested to report all Budget items in even dollars. When such rule is not followed, the statistical secretaries are authorized to drop decimals, except as provided above.

13. The Committee on Credentials shall secure from each delegate the necessary credentials as provided by our Discipline, with Post Office address of the same.

14. May 26th to the following May 25th shall be the term of all local Church officers, except the Committee on Pulpit Supply. May 25th shall be the close of the Conference year for Statistics. By June 2nd each pastor shall send to the Conference Treasurer all monies and receipts, with both copies of his statistical report made out, except budget items raised. These items the Conference Treasurer shall fill in and sign. In the event that the Conference Treasurer discovers a deficit in any of the Budget items, he shall notify the Pastor. By June 9th the Conference Treasurer shall in turn pass the reports to the Auditor of Statistical Reports. The Auditor shall correct the reports (if mistakes are found), and by June 16th shall pass one copy to the Statistician, and one back to the Pastor. He shall also send to the Apportionment Committee the membership of the churches, Sunday Schools, and W.Y. The Statistician and Auditor shall give Pastors opportunity to explain apparent errors but no changes shall be accepted after the Wednesday before Conference convenes.

Treasurer's Books shall be available at the conference president's office one week before the first day of conference. The elected auditors of financial records will audit all annual financial reports before their presentation to the conference body.

The closing Sunday of the Conference year shall be the Sunday following the beginning of the annual conference. The Pastor's salary for this closing Sunday shall be paid by the church of which he is pastor; and for the Sunday of the new Conference Year by the charge to which he is going.

15. Newly elected Conference Officers take office after the close of Conference Sunday.

16. The Conference shall include in the Orders of The Day a special period to consider Camp Meeting business.

17. A Nominating Committee shall be elected to consider and nominate all elective Officers of the Conference. The Committee shall consist of four Elders and four laymen. No one shall repeat service on this Committee until an interim of one (1) year has elapsed. The report of the Nominating Committee shall be read to the Conference the day preceding the election.

18. The delegates' credentials shall be sent to the Committee on Credentials BEFORE THE OPENING DAY OF CONFERENCE, and the Conference Secretary shall send printed blanks with the Statistical, Character, etc.

19. The Conference recommends that each Charge grant its Pastor two weeks vacation, and also grant him permission to hold a two weeks meeting (over two Sundays) away from his local Charge — both vacation and meeting to be without loss of pay; and exclusive of Annual Conference and Camp meeting.

20. The first Sunday in May shall be PASTORAL VOTE SUNDAY.

21. CONFERENCE MISSIONS: (1) Conference President shall act as Pioneer Secretary. (This does not create the office of Pioneer Secretary.) The Conference Board on Church and Parsonage Building and Location shall be the Conference Board on Church Extension and Evangelism.

(2) There shall be at least one Conference Missions service on each Charge in the Conference this year, at which time all of the Conference Mission activities within the Conference shall be presented. This service shall be under the supervision of the Conference President, or one whom he may appoint.

Any person traveling the Conference in the interest of Conference Missions must be appointed and under the direction of the Conference President. Those thus appointed to travel the Conference in the interest of Conference Missions shall receive not to exceed five cents per mile.

(3) All offerings taken for Conference Missions shall be forwarded to the Conference Missions Treasurer, and credited to Conference Missions. The Conference Missions Treasurer, upon the recommendation of the Conference President and the Conference Board on Church Extension and Evangelism, shall disburse these funds. Any designated funds can be disbursed by notice received in writing from the Conference President, and that all monies raised to subsidize, build or repair new or old churches and parsonages be listed under Conference Missions by all treasurers and societies of the Conference.

(4) Whereas the W.Y. is an organization that is aggressively supporting the Conference Pioneer projects, we recommend that as far as possible all monies for pioneer work be passed through the Local Wesleyan Youth Treasurer, to the Conference Missions Treasurer of the Champlain Conference. We further recommend that the local Conference Missions program be sponsored by the W.Y. as far as possible.

22. During the year each Sunday School shall take an offering for the maintenance of the Conference President's home.

23. The Conference President shall be ex-officio member of the Board on Church and Parsonage Building and Location; the term of the other members shall be two years each, the term of two members expiring each year.

24. No new business shall be introduced to the Conference Body after Friday noon, without a two-thirds vote of the Body.

25. Our Conference shall meet for its Annual Session the first Tuesday after the last Monday in June, except the years of the General Conference. On such years our Conference shall begin the second Tuesday following the General Conference. (These dates to be subject to the approval of the General Board of Administration.)

26. Each Church member over 14 years of age shall be apportioned \$2.50 per year for CONFERENCE MISSIONS.

27. The Pastors shall not be required to read their statistical reports (before the Conference Body).

28. The Bar of Conference shall be the first eight center rows of seats; Conference shall open at 7:00 p.m., the first day (Tuesday); The 7:00-8:00 p.m. period shall be an organizational business session led by the President. At 8:00 the Conference Body shall hear the Conference sermon; the hours of Conference following the first day shall be 8:45 to 11:30 a.m. and 1:30 p.m. to closing by vote; the roll call shall be before the devotional service; and Work Week shall be the first full week in June.

29. The Superannuated Ministers' Relief Association shall supplement payment of Insurance Plan assessments to the extent of \$400. (four hundred dollars) annually.

30. In the event of the death of a minister or his wife, churches desiring to send flowers, shall send money instead.

31. Each church shall take an offering to help defray expenses of the Ministerial Institute and send it to the proper person.

32. The treasurer of the Superannuated Minister's Relief Association, shall give as a part of his annual report, a report on the Denominational Pension Plan.

33. The treasurer of the Superannuated Ministers Relief Association shall also be treasurer of the Denominational Pension Plan.

34. The Conference shall provide annually \$50 toward the expense of sending a representative to the National Holiness Ass'n. Annual convention.

The representative to the regional N.A.E. shall be reimbursed for basic expense in attending the annual regional meeting; the same not to exceed fifty dollars. (\$50)

35. (NEW) All organizations shall be required to furnish for audit a complete set of records each year; namely: a copy of the annual report, ledgers and journals, check books, cancelled checks, bank statements, receipt books or records, and an analysis of fund locations.

All vouchers for budget credit shall be handled with the same acknowledgements as cash.

All funds shall be handled through bank checking procedures.

The Conference President shall be responsible to have in his records proof that custodians of funds who handle at any one time an amount in excess of \$1,000 are bonded; the President's advisory board shall verify the bonds as to form and sufficiency.

All fund balances shall be declared at the close of the fiscal year by all treasurers. Any excessive fund balances shall be deposited in a savings account or other bona-fide interest bearing account.

Camp Ground Rules

General Rules

Ever bear in mind that these grounds and buildings are church property, and respect them as such.

The religious services are for your benefit — take advantage of them.

Only young people who come at the recommendation of their pastor will be permitted the benefits of the Young People's Financial Plan.

Each young person is required to attend the regular Young People's Meeting; also — the evening service, and one other service during the day.

I. Care of Grounds

1. Place waste paper and garbage only in containers provided. Do not throw it on the grounds.

2. Waste paper and other refuse may be burned only in drums provided for this purpose.

3. Empty waste water in appointed place — at back of the grounds. Do not throw it out the window or on the ground.

4. Do your part toward keeping the grounds around your cottage or dormitory neat and looking clean.

5. No dogs or cats are allowed.

II. Personal Conduct

1. The use of tobacco, profanity, obscene literature, card playing and gambling are prohibited on the Campgrounds.

2. Wearing apparel must be modest at all times. The wearing of slacks, shorts, gym clothes or bathing suits is prohibited on the grounds. Men are requested to wear shirts, and ladies to wear hose.

III. Dormitory and Cottage Rules

1. Campers are requested to be in their rooms for the night at 10:30 unless engaged in the tabernacle.

2. The rights of your neighbors must be respected: therefore, quiet must prevail in all rooms and dormitories.

3. Remember that there are others who will occupy these rooms after you, therefore, keep them clean, and leave them in good condition.

4. Because of fire hazard, there must be no cooking of food in the dormitories.

Journal of Daily Proceedings

Opening — The Woman's Missionary Society of the Wesleyan Methodist Church convened for the sixty-first annual session at the West Chazy Campground, West Chazy, New York, June 28, 1966 at 7:00 P.M.

Col. 3:23 was the basis of thought — "doing heartily unto the Lord". I Cor. 13 was read as love is the basis for hearty service to the Lord. Love is noted in Gal. 5:22 as the fruit of the spirit. Roll Call — Roll was called and responded to by each society receiving their report blanks and free literature for the coming year.

Mission Study Sec. Report — Josephine Hewitt, Mission Study Secretary reported. (see report no. 8)

Book reviews were given as follows: "The Story of Sadhu Sundar Singh" by Doris Lamos; "The Bamboo Cross" by Myrtle Larabee; "Out of the Dark" by Mrs. MsEwen; "The Spirit of Holiness" by Francelia Holmes; "Counted Worthy" by Jessica Benjamin and "Thirty Years with South Sea Cannibals" by Josephine Hewitt.

Gold and Blue seal certificates for the trienium were passed out. These honor certificates were passed out to twenty societies.

A conference project was discussed. The project of providing enough plastic quilt covers for all camp quilts will be continued. The kitchen needs cereal dishes and chef aprons, also tea aprons with small towel attached. Adjustable metal door hangers are needed in the girl's dorm.

It was voted that any further business coming up be taken care of by the executive committee.

There was discussion on making cushions for the seats in the missionary tabernacle. Information regarding this will be given to us by the president thru the "Challenger".

Report — The treasurer reported that \$301.00 had come in to date for the Bozaks. She also reported that cash received in the public service was \$69.09, paid pledges amounted to \$241.25 and unpaid pledges \$1,276.00, making a total of \$1,586.34.

The following minutes of a special executive meeting were read and approved.

Helen Seaman, Mrs. Dayton and Jewel Finley met in a special meeting on the evening of June 30, 1966 following the public missionary service. It was decided to give the Blackburn's, our missionary speakers, \$100.00 to cover mileage and an honorarium. Public Service

Mr. and Mrs. Martin Bozak, lay missionaries elect to Sierra Leone, were commissioned for this task in an impressive commissioning service conducted by Rev. Charles Dayton and assisted by Dr. Harold K. Sheets.

A ladies trio consisting of Mavis Hemeon, Betty Taber, and Jessie Klob beautifully sang the song "So Send I You".

Rev. and Mrs. James Blackburn, missionaries from Haiti were presented. Diane Blackburn, their daughter, sang "I'll Sing of the Mercies of the Lord" in creole.

Mrs. Blackburn spoke briefly of the love that constrained them to serve in Haiti and the joy of seeing endarkened hearts find the freedom and joy of His salvation.

Rev. Blackburn lifted out the words from Esther "Who knows but that thou art come to the Kingdom for such a time as this". He felt this was their message as they went to Haiti and see the political and social unrest along with the superstition and bondage of sin. He applied this as the message of the Christian everywhere with sin so apparent in every form on every hand. If we fail, how many souls will be lost. Many feel the missionary or other Christian workers sacrifice, he said, but it is only as they look at it thru the medium of finance. He pointed out that it is not a sacrifice to do the will of God, but it is always a sacrifice to disobey God. The lasting things are sacrificed when we disobey. He left us with the challenge of doing service for God where we are or to where God would lead us. Rev. Blackburn closed his message with prayer.

Interim Minutes

On July 7, the executive council met at the president's home for a meeting. Present were Mrs. Dayton, Mrs. Ralph Seaman, Doris Lamos, Jessie Klob, Betty Taber and Jewel Finley. Mrs. Seaman opened the session with prayer.

Two new council members were welcomed, namely: Doris Lamos, new Vice President, and Jessie Klob, new Y.M.W.M. Superintendent.

It was voted that \$50.00 be given to John and Ruth Putney as a personal gift from the conference missionary society.

It was voted that \$100.00 be given to some Columbian project that the Putneys would suggest.

It was noted that there are three layettes to be given away. One for Mrs. Bennet, and then discussion was made on asking Mrs. Earl if she knew of any expectant missionary lady that could use the other two layettes. If we don't find a need now, they shall be held until a need arises.

The efficiency rating of the 64-65 year was figured at 95%.

Discussion was made on combining workshops and Missionary conventions. It was decided it wasn't feasible this year as the workshops should not be shortened due to the area convention reports. It was suggested to get the area chairmen together to decide on a missionary for a missionary district tour to help save on expense of each district calling a missionary separately. This to be a recommendation to the district chairmen to have four successive missionary conventions with the same missionary.

It was decided that the delegates get together following the area convention to decide on the type of program for workshops and designate each ones part.

Mrs. Dayton is to get the itinerary ready for Rev. Dekker's travel tour Jan. 30-Feb. 20.

Discussion was made on a missionary for conference next year. The first choice was Mr. and Mrs. Ellsworth Fowler from Puerto Rico, 2nd choice Iona Driscoll, also from Puerto Rico.

Words of appreciation were given for the comforting message sent the Bowden family during the loss of their daughter and sister.

Zelda Russell dismissed the meeting by prayer.

A short meeting was held in the Conf. President's home June 9, 1966 at which time Mrs. Dayton, Doris Lamos and Jewel Finley were present. Doris Lamos led in an opening prayer.

Discussion was made on how to launch a program to help the Bozaks in raising \$800.00 for special equipment to take to Sierra Leone, W. Africa.

It was decided that a letter be sent to each society to urge them to take a special offering to be sent to Mrs. Seaman before camp that she might put it with the S. S. offering to be presented to the Bozaks some night during conference week.

In as much as the Fowler's or Miss Driscoll are not going to be available to us for travel this coming conference year, it was voted to ask the Ortlips from Haiti who will be able to come March 5-29.

It was mentioned that the Blackburn's from Haiti will be our annual conference speakers this year.

Mrs. Elsie Johnson, Australia's delegate to General Conference may be available to be in our conference sessions. It is to be looked into at General Conference, the feasibility of asking her.

We were dismissed.

WMS PRESIDENT'S REPORT 1965-66

To the Local Presidents, Delegates, and Friends assembled here in this 61st Session of the Champlain Conference Annual Conference:

Once more we are assembled together on our beloved campground to report on our year's work as local missionary groups; and to gain fresh inspiration and know-how to equip us for the coming months. The passage of the year has been so swift, and the drift of world events of such a nature that we are reminded most forcibly that truly "the night cometh when no man can work." This con-

viction should fill our souls with a deep gratitude to our God for His keeping power which gives us a sense of direction in a confused and changing world; and a greater determination, that would amount to almost a compulsion, to do our part and fill our place in the Lord's vineyard. Realizing that our time to labor is short we regret all the more keenly any losses and rejoice greatly in each gain of the past year.

During this time the Conference WMS sponsored a Workshop in each of the four districts last fall. Each District has also held a Convention this Spring. Miss Esther Smeenge of our African field was the well-received speaker at three of the Districts and the Saunders from Africa were the featured speakers in an impressive service in the Northern District. Besides these District Conventions there were at least four local Conventions held. During the winter months Mr. Paul Dekker from Africa made a three week tour of the Conference bringing never-to-be-forgotten challenge to all who heard his message.

A good group of around 30 represented the Champlain Conference in August at the Area Convention of the WMS held on the Rochester Campgrounds and brought back helpful reports which were presented at the Fall Workshops.

The Conference WMS president and the two elected delegates attended and participated in the very recently held General Conference at Houghton College. There our Conference delegation was pleased to receive and bring home a third prize on one of our posters that had been entered.

The WMS was ably represented in the ground breaking ceremonies for Ellington, Conn. church by the vice president who made appropriate remarks.

All the various aspects of our WMS work have been promoted and participated in by our Conference organization. For this we had 695 in total membership, 668 Prayer Partners, 27 Prayer Circles, 418 Readers of the Study Book and \$13,166.43 in offerings. Of these the magazine subscribers, offerings, readers, and missionaries prayed for represent gains.

The project for the year has been to launder the camp quilts and purchase plastic storage cases for them. There has been fine cooperation in both phases of the project.

The YMWB has been very active this year, with a membership of 1615 and total offerings amounting to \$4,405.42; both being substantial gains over last year.

Your president, in addition, has visited various societies upon invitation, sent out over 150 pieces of correspondence besides writing the monthly letter for the local societies printed in the Conference organ, **The Challenger**. She also served with her husband as special speakers at a Retreat of a group from our newly integrated Reformed Baptists last August.

I would feel remiss if I did not speak a word to express my deep sense of gratitude to each Conference officer for their oft times sacrificial service; and to each local group for their loyal support throughout the year. I particularly want to thank you for the fine response that you made when the Literature Secretary's request for ideas and suggestions for the new Quadrennial theme was forwarded to you. She has voiced her own appreciation both verbally and by letter.

It is always a joy to serve our Lord, and such wonderful cooperation makes serving as your leader a pleasure. May we each seek to know Him in a deeper sense these days together that we may return home with new vision for the coming year.

Standing Rules

We recommend:

6. That we send the necessary supplies to the Campground and these needs be itemized sometime in the Challenger during the year.

7. That the Local Magazine Solicitor use some systematic method in keeping her records. (Preferably the method of filing both by alphabet and expiration date.)

8. That the men of the Churches be urged to become Honorary Members and participants in the work of Missions when expedient.

9. That each local officer include the name of the newly elected local officer of that capacity in their final report: President and Delegate to Conference President, Vice President to Conference Vice President on Community Missions Report, W.W.F. Secretary to Conference W.W.F. Secretary, Magazine Solicitor to Conference Magazine Solicitor, and Y.M.W.B. Supt. to Conference Y.M.W.B. Supt.

10. That the preparation of exhibits be displayed at Conference. Societies displaying exhibits for World Missions send sufficient funds to cover postage to Marion, Ind. (It is considerate to contact missionaries as to urgent needs.)

11. That we continue the forwarding of Sunday School charts, flannelgraph material, and Sunday School quarterlies to fields where there are English Speaking Schools.

12. That the Treasurer of the Conference Society be elected a Committee of Remembrance with the authority to send flowers or some suitable tribute to those of our number who shall be called to their eternal reward. We further recommend that this shall include pastor's wives and officers of our Conference Missionary Society.

13. That the conference make a financial contribution annually to the Challenger.

14. That along with the delegates' credentials a list of the names of the deceased of the current year and a brief statement of their activities in the society be sent to the Conference Secretary.

15. That a study of the statistical reports be made and charts be compiled revealing the results of the year's activities in its different phases. These studies to be made by the four districts rotating in alphabetical order.

16. That the newly elected W.M.S. president and delegate be present at least 50% of the sessions of annual conference in order to qualify for efficiency credit. (Refer to the minutes of previous conference year to obtain information.)

17. That all treasurer's final reports and monies be postmarked by May 20th; all other reports and delegates credentials (with the exception of Reading Report) postmarked by and not later than June 1st. (see list of officers for names and addresses.)

a. Credentials to be sent to Conference W.M.S. Secretary.

b. Two statistical blanks and all receipts from treasurer to Conference Statistician.

c. W.W.F. Report to Conference W.W.F. Secretary.

d. Magazine Report to Conference Magazine Solicitor.

e. President's Report to Conference President.

f. Community Missions Report (including name of Community Missionary of the Year) to Vice President.

18. That these shall comprise our Special Projects:
