Standing Rules

CONFERENCE OFFICERS-Resolved: that the officers be installed during Conference, at a public service announced in advance; office to take effect

at the rise of Conference.

II. CONFERENCE PRESIDENT-Resolved: (1) That the Conference President be appointed, authorized and required to travel the Conference as President, having general supervision of the spiritual interests and benevolences thereof, holding at least one service at each church during the year under such date as he may announce in advance.

(2) That he shall raise funds to meet the demands of the Conterence work, assisted by the pastors, and he shall receive contributions for Missions, Education, That he shall raise funds to meet the demands of the Conference work,

and Superannuated Ministers where there are no pastors.

(3) That he shall have general supervision of the church property, and shall inquire into the titles of the same, to see that no property is loosely held, and shall look after the rental of Conference property and see that the rent is turned into the treasury and he shall investigate the possibility and feasibility of the sale of property not in use.

That he shall be authorized to grant letters to disband classes.

That he shall be required to write non-resident members of the Conference asking them in case they cannot attend to write the Conference a letter of greeting, stating the condition of their religious experience.

(6) That he shall devote as much time as possible and as occasion may af-

ford in evangelistic and other meetings in the Conference.

(7) That he may engage help from time to time, as may be advisable and who he may consider properly qualified to assist in holding Evangelistic and Quarterly meetings, such help to be remunerated from the Church Extension Fund.

(8) That he shall be paid from the Conference President's Salary Budget the sum of ninety dollars (\$90) per week for his services, the same to begin the first Sunday following the rise of Conference, and to continue through the second Sunday following the rise of the next Conference, the same to be paid monthbild sunday following the heat conference, the same to be paid installed by in advance; he shall also be paid official expenses, including secretarial help up to ten dollars (\$10) per week and he shall be paid five dollars (\$5) per week for utilities, and his premium on the Conference approved minister's health insurance policy shall also be paid. He shall also be paid five cents (5c) per mile car travel expense and ninety dollars (\$90) per month house rent or be provided a Conference Parsonage.

(9) That he shall act, or appoint to act, as Fraternal Delegate to all denominational or inter-denominational bodies as he deems advisable.

III. CONFERENCE TRUSTEES—Resolved: (1) That the Board of Trustees shall consist of nine members, three to be elected each for a term of three years

and each to reside within the bounds of the Conference.

(2) That the duly elected and qualified Trustees of the Annual Conference are hereby authorized and directed to sign for the purchase, sale, mortgaging and conveyance of real estate recommended by the Conference Board of Church Extension and Evangelism during the interim between the meetings of the Annual Conference, and all such action or actions shall be deemed to be legal and binding upon the Conference, and of as full force and effect as they would have been if such actions on the part of the Trustees had been specially authorized by the Annual Conference.

(3) That the President and Secretary of the Board of Trustees shall be authorized to sign on behalf of the Board of Trustees, such signatures to be valid

and binding as if all members of the Board of Trustees had signed said papers.

IV. BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION AND EVANGELISM—Resolved;
(1) That the Conference Board of Trustees and the President of the Conference Woman's Missionary Society constitute the Board of Church Extension and Evangelism of the Conference.
(2) That the Board of Church Extension and Evangelism is hereby author-

ized to pay out all monies from the Conference Church Extension Fund.

(3) That the Conference Board of Church Extension and Evangelism be the Board of Managers for the Conference in the interim of the Conference sessions. V. COMMITTEE ON CHURCH AND PARSONAGE BUILDING ALTER-ATION AND REMODELING-Resolved: That the Conference Board of Trustees shall constitute the Committee on Church and Parsonage Building, Location, Al-

teration and Remodeling.

VI. CAMP MEETING BOARD—Resolved: (1) That the Camp Meeting Board be constituted of a total of nine members, consisting of the Conference President, Conference Wesleyan Youth President, Charles City pastor, three Elders and three laymen. One Elder and one layman shall be elected by ballot each year for a term of three years.

That the camp ground property shall be under the care of the Camp Meeting Board.

That this Board shall have the power to engage workers beyond the (3)

present year. (4) That this Board, together with the Conference Secretary, constitute

the Orders of the Day Committee.

(5) That all pledges and cash received during the sessions of Conference and Camp Meeting be placed in the Camp Meeting Fund unless otherwise designated.

(6) That the incidental expenses of the Annual Conference, while in session, be paid from the Camp Meeting Fund.

VII. COMMITTEE ON STATISTICS AND CREDENTIALS—Resolved: (1) That a standing Committee on Statistics be elected, consisting of the Statistical Secretary and three other ministerial members. That three lay members be elected at the opening of Conference.

(2) That there be a standing Committee on Credentials whose duty it shall be to send each pastor, Sunday School Report blanks, Character blanks and Delegates blanks. The Delegate Credentials shall be returned to him one week prior to the opening of the Annual Conference. The Statistical Secretary shall be the Committee on Credentials.

VIII. FINANCIAL SECRETARY-Resolved: That the Conference shall elect a Financial Secretary for the Conference year, whose duty it shall be to study finances and bring recommendations to the Committee on Finance at the next Annual Conference, of which Committee he shall be first member. He shall also require the various treasurers of the Conference to secure a competent auditor and submit a certificate of audit to him. He shall give a report of the auditors to the Conference.

IX. BUDGET ITEMS-Resolved: That all Treasurers shall mark receipts "Budget" or "Not Budget."

X. LOCAL CHURCH YEAR-Resolved: That all local churches close their books on June 30. That all statistics be figured through this date and that local

church officers take office July 1.

XI. CONFERENCE FISCAL YEAR-Resolved: That the Conference Fiscal Year close July 15, and that all money shall be in the hands of the proper Treasurers on or before that date; that within seven (7) days thereafter each pastor shall submit to the Conference Treasurer his budget check sheet, with receipts covering the same, and his statistical blank, completed in full, except for the budget raised; that the Conference Treasurer shall fill in the budget raised items and hold reports for the Statistical Committee the first day of Conference.

XII. CONFERENCE DATE-Resolved: That Camp Meeting begin the first Sunday of August and continue through the second Sunday. That Conference

begin the following Monday and conclude Wednesday.

XIII. SUNDAY SCHOOL-Resolved: That Sunday School shall be held each Sunday of Conference and Camp Meeting.

XIV. LEAVE-Resolved: That no member shall leave the Conference ses-

sion without permission of the President.

XV. COMMITTEE REPORTS-Resolved: That all reports of Committees be made in legible writing, and handed to the Secretary at the time of giving of the report.

XVI. PASTORAL REPORT-Resolved: (1) That each ministerial member of our Conference report to his Quarterly Conference the number of sermons preached, prayer meetings attended, homes visited and pastoral calls made.

(2) That each Sunday School under pastoral oversight of Wesleyan Methodist pastors shall be included in a separate Statistical Report.

XVII. CONFERENCE PREACHER'S REPORT—Resolved: That all Conference preachers, not stationed by the Pastorial Relations Committee, shall report to the chairman of the Committee on Itineracy and Elder's Orders not later than 30 days prior to the first day of the Annual Conference.

XVIII. CREDENTIALS-Resolved: That each Annual Conference preacher

present his credentials at Conference for renewal and proper signature.

XIX. TEXT BOOKS-Resolved: That all persons shall be requested to bring

the text books to Conference in which they are to be examined.

XX. PASTOR'S SUPPORT DURING CONFERENCE—Resolved: That all pastors remain on their charges for one Sunday after Conference and that the church's financial obligation to the pastor, whether he be leaving the field or not, be extended through that Sunday.

XXI. MOVING PASTORS-Resolved: That each charge make provisions for

the moving expense of the incoming pastor.

XXII. MINISTER'S VACATION: Resolved: That the Conference President

and all pastors be given a two weeks vacation with pay.

XXIII. MEMBERSHIP IN SOCIAL SECURITY—Resolved: That the Pastoral Relations Committee encourage each pastor eligible for Social Security to join the plan.

XXIV. DEATH OR ILLNESS-Resolved: That the Conference Secretary be notified by telephone in case of death or critical illness in the minister's home,

and that he shall send cards at once to each pastor.

XXV. MINUTES—Resolved: That the Conference Secretary bill each church for the number of Minutes ordered by that church, and that the Conference Secretary bill the Conference Fund for those Minutes not ordered by individuals or churches.

XXVI. PUBLISHING OF THE EVANGEL—Resolved: That the Evangel be published monthly (except August); that the Editor be also Publisher, that he be nominated by a staff composed of President of the Conference, President of the Woman's Missionary Society, President of the Conference Wesleyan Youth and the Conference Sunday School Secretary, and after being elected by the Conference, the manner of financing the publishing of the Evangel be left to the Editor and his staff.

XXVII. NOMINATING COMMITTEE—Resolved: That a Nominating Committee to consist of Conference President ex-officio as chairman, three Elders elected by the Conference and three church Delegates of the Conference to serve in alphabetical order of the churches. Said delegates shall notify the Conference President of their availability by July 1. Successive church delegates shall serve as alternates. Said Committee to nominate Conference session committees. They shall bring in at least two (2) nominations for each vacancy of Conference Trustee, Trustees to Miltonvale Wesleyan College and members of the Camp Meeting Committee. That the full report be read and posted at the first session of Conference.

XXVIII. MID-YEAR CONVENTION COMMITTEE—Resolved: That the Committee on Mid-Year Convention consist of three members elected for three years; one member to be elected each year. The host pastor to be a member exofficio.

XXIX. CITATION COMMITTEE—Resolved: That there be a standing committee on Citation composed of three members. The Secretary Treasurer of the Superannuated Pension Plan shall be chairman of this Committee. The other members shall be elected annually. It shall be the duty of this committee to prepare and present appropriately worded citations to those Elders who have served the Conference twenty-five (25) years or more on a consecutive or cumulated havis Those eligible for citation shall be notified 30 days prior to the time of presentation.

XXX. SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD—Resolved: That the Sunday School Sessions Committee be dissolved and that the Sunday School Board be expanded to five members and that the Sunday School Secretary be responsible to report to the Annual Conference. THE CHURCH

"The Christian Church is the entire body of believers in Jesus Christ. The

Founder and only Head of the Church is Christ.

"A local church is a body of believers formally organized on gospel

principles, meeting regularly for purpose of worship, edification, and evangelism. "The Wesleyan Methodist Church of America is a denomination consisting of those members within annual conferences and local churches who hold the faith set forth in these Articles and acknowledge the ecclesiastical authority of its governing bodies."

The result of the voting on this Constitutional Change was 68 yes; 0 no. The SECOND CHANGE recommended to add following "bounds" in Par. 60 (1) on line 2, the parenthetical cross-reference: (as modified by VIII, 5 below). The reference is to Article VIII, Par. 69 (5). This portion of the Discipline would then read as follows:
"Par. 60. The Constitutional rights of each annual conference shall include the following:

"(1) The right to take charge of all the ministers and churches within its bounds (as modified by VIII 5 below) except such of the general officers . . ." (The remainder is unchanged.)

The result of the voting on this Constitutional Change was 68 yes;

0 no. The THIRD CHANGE recommended that the second paragraph in Par. 30 of the Discipline be deleted. This is Article of Religion XIX, and entitled "The Rites and Ceremonies of Churches." (If all these proposals are approved, this would likely become Article XX, inasmuch as an Article entitled "The Church" would become XIX. This would necessitate the renumbering of the Articles of

Religion from this point forward.) This Article now reads:

Par. 30. "It is not necessary that rites and ceremonies should in all places be the same or exactly alike, for they have always been different and may be changed according to the diversities of countries, times, and men's manners, so that nothing be ordained against God's Word.

"Every particular church may ordain, change, or abolish rites and ceremonies, so that all things may be done to edification."

The proposal is to delete the last short paragraph, making this Article

"It is not necessary that rites and ceremonies should in all places be the same or exactly alike, for they have always been different and may be changed according to the diversities of countries, times, and men's manners, so that nothing be ordained against God's Word."

The result of the voting on this Constitutional Change was 67 yes; 0 no.

CONFERENCE: PRESIDENT'S REPORT

To the 111th session of the Iowa Conference: Greetings in the name of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christi

This past year of the conference work has not been without problems, difficulties, and even tragedies but through all the precious leadership of the Holy Spirit has been sensed. The cooperation of pastors and people has made the labors most pleasant.

Needless to say, we have not been able to see all accomplished that I had been hopeful for but many evidences of progress can be noted for

which we thank God.

, ii 🕡 🕝 Of utmost importance, a number of our churches have reported real

revival of late.

The response of the churches to the budget and church extension needs has been most gratifying. For the first time in several years, our Treasurer will report Church Extension Fund with a credit balance. An all time high of \$8,522.81 was raised this year for church extension work. As well, the Conference Fund deficit has been reduced.

One note of reference to the forthcoming Treasurer's report, the newly established Revolving Fund shows a balance on hand of \$7,298.15. This is, for the most part, monies loaned to the conference for church ex-

This is, for the most part, monies loaned to the conference for church extension work and reflects the keen interest of our people in church extension. During the past year, four churches were dedicated to God; Waterloo Falls Avenue; Hutchinson, Minnesota; Riverview Church in St. Paul, Minnesota and Waterloo First Church. These properties have a combined evaluation of \$365,000.00. Sioux City building project was brought to completion at a cost of approximately \$52,000.00. It was a great privilege to organize the Church with 12 full and 13 junior members. Anoka church property was purchased at the nominal sum of \$37,500.00.

Our conference is continuing the building trend. Bennezette Church is presently in the midst of a \$15,000.00 project. Falls Avenue Church is working on plans for an additional educational unit. Emily, Minnesota church has voted to build a new sanctuary. The Conference trustees are recommending to this conference body that we move forward with a conference parsonage building project in the immediate future. I am heartly in favor of this projection. In my opinion, it would be in the best interest of the conference to have a conference owned home with office space rather than the unending rental allowance situation which now exists.

A great deal of time has been spent in looking for possible new church extension fields. The areas of Davenport, Iowa, Mankato, Minnesota and

South Minneapolis were investigated.

There was a gain of 84 full members in the conference this year.

I preached 145 times, conducted 34 business meetings, held five revivals and traveled 34,000 miles with the following expenses:

This material is now available to the Sunday Schools without charge. Each pastor has been supplied with a list of available material. Further disposition will be made of this fund as the Sunday School Board has opportunity to make plans during the conference session. So far, five Sunday Schools have used some part of these materials.

Report No. 6 DIRECTOR OF C.Y.C. REPORT

Last fall Rev. Calhoun, our Conference President, informed me that the Conference elected C.Y.C. Director had resigned and that the Committee on Vacanies had appointed me to fill that position. Transferred to me were the files and material of our previous Director all in good order, just waiting to be read and digested. By February I had completed the C.Y.C. studies to receive certification as an approved C.Y.C. Director in the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America and sent my application in to our Headquarters at Marion, Indiana. Shortly I received information that I was a certified Director of C.Y.C.

Having completed this course of study I have found that the C.Y.C. Program has tremendous potential as a tool to gain, train and keep our youth for Christ and the church, even as a sleeping Giant that need only be awakened and put to work. We are hoping that more of our churches might discover and use this magnificent program to the benefit of their youth and to the Glory of God.

With the invaluable advice and help of Mrs. Cotrone, former C.Y.C.

Director of the Conference, we planned and prepared for the 1964 C.Y.C.

Camp to be held at Charles City July 6th through the 10th. Using the Camp Curriculum and theme put out by our Denominational C.Y.C. office, the camp theme was "On the Trail with Christ" and the course used in the classes was "These are God's Wonders", we planned a program and schedule that we believe provided a week of Christian camping in which the boys and girls could increase in wisdom and stature and in favor with God and man. Mrs. Louise Getty of Alden, Michigan was secured as our Evangelist and presented the entire story of "Pilgrim's Progress" using the beautiful "Scene O-Felt" visual aids put out by the Munn Art Studio. Aunt Louise, as the Camper's knew her, kept camper and staff on the trail with Christ as she told of Pilgrim's journey from the City of Destruction to the Celestial City. At the Cross, approximately 50 of our 117 Campers found their Saviour and saw their burden of sin roll away. Then as Pilgrim put on the Armour of Truth about 25 or 30 campers sought for heart purity and the infilling of the Holy Spirit. Miss JoAnn Gould, a 4th year camper from Des Moines, Iowa received the Camper of the Year Scholarship Award. Thirty three 6th graders were recommended to WeJuHi Camp for the next year.

We thank the Lord for a good camp and also thank the 38 dedicated workers who devoted themselves to the task. We felt that the Lord blessed in giving wonderful unity and co-operation among the staff as each worked at their excitored duty as wate the Lord.

in giving wonderful unity and co-operation among the staff as each worked at

their assigned duty as unto the Lord. The recruiting of workers for C.Y.C. Camp is the biggest single job for the Director and involves months of letter writing and correspondence with many, many individuals each year. We feel that there should be a willingness to do their share by each Pastor and church in the Conference since C.Y.C. Camp is part of our Conference Program. We also feel that a coordination of the various Conference Camps, CYC, WeJuHi and Family Camp through joint leadership meetings each year to deal with the problems of grounds care and maintenance, planning for future needs of recreational facilities and housing, and kitchen and food preparation information could be shared to help with this enormous task. The present housing situation where we must use private rooms and cabins and place a counsellor's campers in five or six different places—none under direct supervision of the counsellor—is not at all adequate or ideal. Other ideas of programing and sceeduling could be also shared.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES & CHURCH EXTENSION AND **EVANGELISM REPORT**

To the 111th session of the Iowa Annual Conference: This has been another year of blessing and victory. We praise God for His leadership in the work of the Conference.

Board Actions

The Board approved the challenge to each church to be three percent of the total raised for all purpose during the current year for Conference Church Extension.

The Board approved an additional loan for the completion of the

Hutchison, Minnesota church project.

The president and secretary of the Board were authorized to negotiate a loan with the Home Federal Savings and Loan Association of Sioux City,

Iowa for the Sioux City church in the amount of \$35,000 at 6% interest.

The Board approved the re-financing of the Des Moines church.

An \$80.00 per month allotment to the Waseca church was approved for a six month period.

An allotment of \$50.00 per month was approved to the Des Moines Church for a three month period.

A subsistance of \$175.00 per month to the Minnehaha Avenue Church

The interest rate of 6% was established for out-going loans from the conference treasury.

Permission was granted Mr. LeRoy Grant to connect with the Camp ground man-hole, with an easement to the city of Charles City for the maintenance of the sewer line, with the provision for two "Y's" to be included for additional service to the camp ground.

A request from Rev. N. K. Long for permission to remodel the River-

COMMITTEE ON MORAL REFORM REPORT

We, the Committee on Moral Reform, submit the following resolutions:

1. We as Wesleyan Methodists emphasize the authority of God's Word as the basis of moral and ethical conduct, and that we stress the necessity

of the new birth, and the experience of holiness of heart.

2. We take our stand against the practice of many professed Christians who desecrate the Lord's Day by unnecessary buying and selling, and participat-

ing in, or viewing worldly entertainments.

3. We would emphasize loyalty to the church through prayer, moral

support and systematic tithing.

4. We would urge that the ministers and laymen of our church take active part, based upon Scriptural principles, regarding moral issues which confront us in civil and state government,

5. We urge that Wesleyan Methodists support the constitution of the

United States in its declaration of equal rights and freedom for all peoples.

6. That we maintain a strong family loyalty by daily worship and wholesome recreation.

7. We would maintain the need of holy Christian examples in areas of conversation, apparel and general living.

8. Viewing the degeneration of morals in our times and the near second coming or our Lord Jesus Christ, we would exhort to deeper spiritual life and watchfulness.

9. We recommend that our people promptly bring all possible pressure to bear upon Congress to act upon, and pass a constitutional amendment that will define the areas of freedom within which a teacher may engage in Bible reading and prayers in the public schools.

10. Observing the trends of the educational system of today we stress the need of a Christian education and would recommend that we support our Wesleyan Methodist Schools and that we also give careful consideration for Christian education on the elementary level.

11. We urge upon all believers the necessity and importance of witnessing

and soul winning in their daily lives.

W.M.S. PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Greetings to the one hundred and eleventh session of the Iowa Conference.

It is a joy to represent this auxiliary of the church and to bring this report.

Rev. Robert Crosby, returned missionary to Colombia and Puerto Rico toured our conference October 22 through November 24, 1963. He presented the Colombia Scholarship Fund and Student Aid for which \$927.52 was raised.

Miss Lois Sheridan, missionary to Sierra Leone, Africa, has been invited to tour our conference this fall, October 14 through November 22.

One new society was organized this year at Anoka, Minnesota, September 24

with 8 charter members.

The general interests of the church have been promoted in addition to special projects. A grand total in cash and vouchers raised by the W.M.S. and the Y.M.W.B. was \$15,998.92. Of this amount the W.M.S. raised \$12,654.18 and the Y.M.W.B. raised \$3,344.74.

Some of the items of interest would be: Alma Aldinger support, \$1,200.00; Education, \$336.12; Honorary Enrollment \$258.14; Scholarship to Miltonvale, \$50.00; White Christmas, \$587.29; Self-Denial, \$325.57; Haiti Operation Helping Hand, \$1,050.82; and Conference Extension, \$965.09 which is an increase of over \$237.00 more than last year.

There has been an increase of \$2,462.05 in over all giving. Also an increase of 92 members and 45 Missionary Magazines. The W.M.S. bought \$100.00 worth of chairs for the camp dining room. Also cared for the cleaning and needs of

of chairs for the camp dining room. Also cared for the cleaning and needs of the camp guest rooms.
