Reports

STANDING RESOLUTIONS

I. CONFERENCE

1. The Conference shall convene on Wednesday following the first Monday of August.

- 2. The Conference and Church fiscal year shall close June 30, and the Conference Treasurer shall close his books July 15.
- 3. There shall be a standing Committee of Ways and Means, composed of four ministers and three laymen, of which the Conference president and the Conference Treasurer shall be members ex-officio.
- 4. The Conference shall elect a standing Nominating Committee of seven, of which the Conference President shall be a member ex-officio, no two of the elected members of which shall be from the same church, and not more than two of the elected members from the same district. This Committee shall nominate the Standing Committees and the Committees of the temporary organization, provided that nominations may be made from the floor.
- 5. The Board of Church Extension and Evangelism shall serve as the Committee on Church and Parsonage Location and Building.
- 6. Priority on dormitory rooms shall be given to minister and delegates attending 'Conference.
- 7. No divorced person who has remarried shall be ordained.
- 8. Officials shall assume office in the next meeting after election.
- 9. There shall be a Publications Committee of three, of which the President and the Secretary shall be members ex-officio.
- 10. The Conference President, after having exercised his perogative in the reception of ministers coming from other denominations shall immediately refer them to the Committee on Itineracy and Elders' Orders, which shall make a thorough investigation as to the ministry and life of such applicants and shall report their findings to the President after which appointments may be made.
- 11. For the purpose of operating the Camp Meeting, there shall be a committee of seven Wesleyans, four of whom shall be elected by the Conference, the President of the Conference being ex-officio one of the four and chairman of the Committee, two others being elders, and one a layman; and three of whom shall be elected by the Board of Directors of the Camp ground Association, the Presdient of which Association shall be a member ex-officio, and one an elder and the other a layman. Each elected member shall serve for three years, provided that the Conference shall elect one the first year for one year, and another for two years, thereby assuring the election of one member annually.
- 12. The Standing Resolutions shall be printed in the September Messenger.
- 13. The Conference Treasurers of the Missionary Society, of the Wesleyan Youth, and the YMWB shall send a report of the itemized receipts from each church to the Conference Treasurer immediately after their books close.
- 14. The Conference Treasurer and the Statistical Committee shall check the pastor's report before he reads it on the floor.
- 15. The Conference President shall urge each church to carry adequate insurance on its property.
- 16. Since television in its present state is so radically demoralizing in its range, be it resolved that the Kentucky Conference register its disapproval of any one within the conference endorsing or owning a television set. Furthermore, be it resolved that the Kentucky Conference will not license preachers or workers, ordain elders, or station ministers who own or have a television set in their possession.
- 17. It is hereby resolved and ordered by the Kentucky Conference of

the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, in session assembled this 7th day of August, 1964: That a majority of the Trustees of said conference are hereby fully empowered to buy, sell, convey, morgage or lease property for, or on behalf of said conference provided, however, that between the sessions of the Kentucky Conference, a majority of the Conference Board of Church Extension and Evangelism, as the designated Board of Managers of the said Kentucky Conference, shall signify their agreement therewith by a special resolution and order authorizing each and every transaction.

18. The Book of Discipline of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America shall constitute the polity under which the Kentucky Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America shall operate as a corporation.

II. CHURCH

- 19. No charge shall call a pastor or supply from other conferences or denominations as long as there are available ministers in the conference qualified for the work.
- 20. The vote on the pastor should be taken the first week of June, unless special permission is granted by the President and his Advisory Board Ballot for the vote should be prepared by the clerk. The results of the vote shall be reported at once to the President.
- 21. Church elections shall be held so that elected officials fill their offices on July 1, provided that the treasurer shall fill his office July 15.

III. MINISTRY

- 22. Let all pastors transfer their membership to their new appointment. Budget assessments by the Wars and Means Committee shall include such membership.
- 23. Any preacher horrowing a book from the Conference Library may hold it for only one month. There will be a flat rate of twenty-five cents for the month and five cents for each day over the month.
- 24. Pastors shall read to their congregations the General Rules, Discipline, Article III. paragraphs 34-40; Special Directions, Discipline, Section IV. paraghaphs 82-88, 100; The Standing Resolutions; the report of the Committee on Moral Reform; and shall urge them to familiarize themselves with the Wesleyan Methodist Discipline.
- 25. In this age when immodesty and worldliness are subtly creeping into the Holiness Movement, let every minister earnestly contend for and faithfully preach the Word of God without fear or favor. Let us refuse to compromise with the ungodly element which is robbing the church of her glory and preachers of the divine anointing.
- 26. All ministers not attending both conference and camp without a written excuse from the Conference President and his Advisory Board shall be placed under discipline and be required to appear before the Character Committee of the next annual conference for clearing. Further, no pastor shall be permitted to accept revival meetings or camp meetings if they conflict with conference or camp meetings.
- 27. Our own evangelists shall not conduct revivals or camp meetings in our Wesleyan Methodist churches within the bounds of our conference at the time of our Youth Camp, Annual Conference, Camp Meeting, or Ministerial Institute.
- 28. In order to assist the Statistical Committee in its work be it resolved that we comply with Section VI, Par. 228 of the Discipline. All reports

shall be in no later than July 15 to the Conference Treasurer and then the Conference Treasurer shall notify the President of all such delinquent reports not in by July 20. We hereby instruct the Statistical Committee to indicate with an asterisk at the proper place in the minutes showing that such reports do not appear because they were too late. The Statistical Committee shall set a date for the beginning of its work before conference.

Report No. 1 PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Members of the Kentucky Conference and Friends:

Our Heavenly Father permits us to assemble one time more in the interest of His Eternal Kingdom. This is big business — the greatest business in the universe. We gather to report gains, losses, existing conditions, and to make plans for the expansion of the Kingdom under divine direction.

The past year has been one of definite progress and blessing in many areas, but one of great anxiety in some areas of the conference. Confusion, turmoil, division, and deception exist the world over. The conference has not been exempt from Satanic intrusion. We must recognize Satan's tactics and not allow him to set one against another. Wesleyan institutions, principles, property, polity, and doctrines must be recognized and respected, allowing for wholesome differences of opinion and at the same time giving definite cooperation. Very definitely as the last hours of this age draw nigh, distress, disaster, and an attempted deluge of diabolical defeat will bring more defection from the paths of righteousness. But the promise of the Great Emancipator still holds - the gates of hell shall not prevail against His church. Undaunted courage, unfaltering faith, and unfettered allegiance to our Saviour will bring unrivaled victory. For some it may be martyrdom under the encroaching tyrannical red beast of communism or under the united apostate, antichrist superchurch, but it will mean a crown of righteousness, victory, and everlasting joy for the faithful.

We must gird ourselves for the titanic struggle. We must love and pray one for another. We must live with eternity's values in view. We must not stoop to petty politics in church work. We must not gossip, but pray. We must seek first the Kingdom of God and His righteousness. Urgent, prevailing prayer, and undying devotion to God, and a mighty passion for the lost must ever engage the man of God.

Conference progress is apparent. The financial structure of the churches and the conference has been tightened to care for indebtedness existing from the erection of churches and parsonages in the past three or four years. The Atwood church in Louisville has installed a new roof and air conditioning, consolidating the payment for the same with a previous loan on a house purchased in view of a contemplated parking lot. Bloomington church has installed a new roof. Calvary pioneer church in Owensboro has assumed \$7,000 more of the debt on their new church, thus releasing the same amount to the conference for payment on a church site at Lebanon, Kentucky. Camp Taylor church has added a brick front including doors and windows, changed the basement entrance, and made other improvements. The Covington church is the one new church built this year, which is evaluated with the site at \$35,000. Highland Park has installed air conditioning and made other improvements. Mt. Zion has a complete new interior of panel, windows and doors. Roselawn at Madison is consolidating their debt under one bank. Sale Avenue in Louisville has finished a new ceiling, installed new pews, and laid a carpet on the platform and around the altar. Sylvania has a parsonage under construction. Watterson Trail has a new sanitary system and parking lot, and plans landscaping. Whitehall has added a utility room and a bathroom. Other churches have made some improvements. A great asset to us all is the new sanitary system on the campground. Thankful generosity will pay for this and the balance due on the new dormitory.

Lebanon, Kentucky is the recommended pioneer project on which we must concentrate to pay for the valuable church site on which to build as soon as providence provides funds and a pioneer man.

Gains or losses in membership, Sunday School attendance, periodicals, and giving will be known when the statistical committee and the conference treasurer report.

President's Activities

My assigned duties have taken me to every church in the conference at least once and to some several times. Multiplication of duties and business has made arduous tasks, but God has given strength. To serve the conference has been a pleasure. I have preached 123 times; taught Sunday School 11 times; conducted 40 church business meetings; had 35 conference board meetings; attended four Marion College Board meetings; attended the conference ministerial institute; the East Central Missionary Convention at Cadillac, Michigan, several missionary services, and revival meetings; edited the MESSENGER; and carried on the secretarial work of the office.

Voted that September 20 be observed as Pioneer Calendar Sunday.

August 27, 1964

The Board met enroute to and at Covington, Kentucky.

Voted on motion to pay off the \$2600 plus on the Loan of Calvary-Owensboro to the Wesleyan Investment Foundation.

Voted that the Conference President negotiate with the Hayes' for the sale of Hope Mission in the Kentucky mountains.

September 17, 1964

The Board met in connection with a trip to Lebanon, Ky. and looked over a number of prospective locations for a new church there.

Voted to authorize Rev. Wm. Bramble of Covington, Ky. to purchase lots agreed upon August 27 for \$12,500 with the seller donating \$2500 on the same.

Also voted to authorize the Covington Church to borrow \$22,000 from Weslevan Investment Foundation.

Voted that Rev. Wm. Bramble proceed with plans, specifications, and prices from the local lumber company.

Voted that Rev. Wm. Bramble send name and address of their attorney to Church Extension Dept. at Marion, Ind.

September 24, 1964

The Board made a visit to Brazil, Ind. and by agreement and a unanimous vote application for Card Call was approved.

March 6, 1965

The Board met in the basement of the Atwood Church with all mem-

Voted to appoint Rev. Lester Fox as supply for Old Union Church.

Voted on motion to sell the Chesterville Church Building.

Voted on motion to terminate the services of the pastor at Pekin, Ind. Passed a recommendation that all organized churches pay in full their Pension Fund assessments of \$3.50 per full member.

Voted to proceed with the purchase of property at Lebanon, Ky.

March 22, 1965

The Board met at the Pekin, Ind. Parsonage.

April 6-7-8, 1965

The Board met in 4 separate sessions during Ministerial Institute.

April 20, 1965

The Board met at the Sylvanian Church and discussed the parsonage situation and gave some specifice directions regarding the building and the finances.

April 23, 1965

Voted by phone and correspondence to approve the consolidation of the Atwood church debt and an additional loan of \$6000 from the Greater Louisville First Federal Savings and Loan Association.

May 11, 1965

Voted to authorize the Owensboro Calvary church to apply for and to increase their loan to \$10,000 at the Owensboro Federal Savings and Loan Assn. thus releasing \$7,000 for Pioneer use in the conference.

June 3, 1965

The Board met at the Sylvania Church.

Voted that we put \$7,000 into the Lebanon, Kentucky project.

June 18, 1965

The Board met at the Camp Ground during Youth Camp.

Voted that the Covington church sell the lot north west of the church for \$3,000 and not less than \$2500.

July 12, 1965

The Board met in the new building at the Camp Ground

July 13, 1965

The Board met at Mr. Blanchard's cabin at the Camp Ground.

Voted that we order the Pioneer Calendars for next year as was discussed.

July 23, 1965

The Board met again at the Atwood church.

Voted that we grant Ron Meade \$150 on his tuition for his last semester at Marion College with the understanding that if he doesn't serve in the Conference or in Wesleyan Missions work according to contract he is to repay the same.

Resolutions of Church Extension Board

September 17, 1964 and March 6, 1965 signed joint resolutions with the Covington, Kentucky Wesleyan Methodist Church authorizing the trustees of said Covington Church and the Trustees of the Kentucky Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, Inc. to sign a note for \$22,000 to Wesleyan Investment Foundation, Marion, Ind, another for \$6000 and to these loans another loan for \$1000 as of April 8.

April 23, 1965 through the Conference President signing, approved a loan of the Atwood church from Greater Louisville First Federal Savings and Loan Assn., for said church to consolidate their present debt of \$7800 with an additional loan of \$6000 for church improvements.

May 11, 1965 signed resolution for Owensboro Federal Savings and Loan Assn. authorizing the Conference President to sign necessary documents for an additional \$7000 loan for the local church to assume.

Recommendations by the Church Extension Board

I. Calendar System

1. A pioneer calendar shall be provided by the Church Extension Board for a Sunday in September chosen as Pioneer Sunday, at which time pledges shall be taken in each church to be paid in 10 monthly payments.

2. A pioneer secretary appointed by each local church shall announce or have announced on the Second Sunday of each month the pledge collection on the Third Sunday, and shall collect and tabulate opposite each pledge the monthly contribution, then have the church treasurer remit the total collected each month to the Conference Treasurer.

3. Pioneer works may be granted permission by the Church Exten-

sion Board to use their money locally as may be needed.

4. Previous to Pioneer Sunday there shall be a rally of the pastors in each district presided over by the Conference President or another designated by the Church Extension Board, when goals for each church may be suggested.

5. Fields and Goals: (1) Money shall be saved for centers of population to be invested in property or to employ men of pioneer ability. (2) We urge a goal of \$10,000 this year toward reducing indebtedess and payment for purchase of a lot at Lebanon, Kentucky.

11. Sunday School

The first Sunday of the month Sunday School Offering in full shall be remitted by each Sunday School Treasurer for much needed pioneer work.

III. Revolving Fund

This fund shall be increased by gifts and at the discretion of the Church Extension Board from regular pioneer funds not to exceed \$500 per year.

IV Mother Church

We urge the larger churches to co-operate with the Church Extension Board in starting a prayer meeting or a Sunday School in a new section as well as in tithing their church tithes and offerings for mothering a new work under the Church Extension Board.

V. United Effort

We suggest and urge co-operation of the conference W.M.S. and the Youth Executive Council with the Church Extension Board to help our pioneer work as may be needed.

VI. Deeds and Legal Documents

- 1. That the Conference President be custodian of deeds and conference records to be kept in a safe.
- 2. That the Conference President shall collect all deeds or records of deeds for filing, at the time of his visitation in Quarterly Conferences.
- 3. The Board will recommend no authorization or the signatures of the Conference Trustees on notes or mortages for churches until there is a joint deed made to the local and conference trustees.
- 4. All churches involved in any major indebtedness shall be under the supervision of the Church Extension Board.

Report No. 8 COMMITTEE ON WAYS AND MEANS

Item I. Budget

- 1. We recommend that the conference pay General Budget Assessments as follows: General Wesleyan Youth \$2.00 per active member of W.Y.; World Missions \$2.00 per full member; Australia \$.25; Church Extension and Evangelism \$1.50; Superannuate Pension Plan \$3.50; Church Administrative Fund \$2.00; General Conference Expense and Entertainment \$.50; Board Meeting Expense \$.15; Hephzibah \$.35; Sunday School \$.25 per member based on the number in main school; Educational Budget \$4.00; Wesleyan Seminary \$.30.
- 2. We recommend that our churches pay conference budget as follows: Conference Work Fund \$1.00; Conference Entertainment \$1.00; Camp Meeting Fund \$1.00; Conference Wesleyan Youth \$.50 per full church member; Conference Parsonage Fund \$.50; Conference Sunday School \$.05 per member enrolled in main school; Conference President's Salary \$1.00; an amount equal to 10% of the pastor's cash salary; Minister's Group Insurance Fund \$.50 per member; Ministerial Institute \$.10 per full member; and that the Sunday School Offering for the first Sunday of each month be sent to the Conference Treasurer for Pioneer Evangelism.

All budget money shall be sent in monthly in even dollars.

- 3. We recommend a study of the income of the churches of the conference with the idea of making a percentage assessment to the churches. Item II. Pastor
 - 1. Each pastor shall encourage the Storehouse Plan of Tithing.
 - 2. All pastors shall encourage membership in the Card Call Plan.
- 3. The pastoral year shall end with the last Sunday of Camp and the church he is serving shall pay his salary until that time.
- 4. All churches shall provide their pastors suitable living quarters, all their utilities, fill their obligations by monthly donations and definitely arrange with the pastor the number of revivals he is allowed to conduct.

The pastor shall receive two weeks vacation with pay exclusive of Conference and Camp Sundays.

5. Each pastor's moving bill shall be paid by the contracting church.

Item III. Conference President

- 1. The Conference President shall be paid \$80 per week, one half of his Social Security, Hospitalization Insurance, house rent, utilities, desk expense and secretarial help, traveling at & per mile in connection with conference work, and he shall receive two weeks vacation with pay.
- 2. The Conference President shall meet with the Board of Stewards and encourage the church to provide adequate support for their pastor.
- 3. Each church shall hold four quarterly meetings annually, one to be held by the Conference President at his convenience, and three to be arranged by the pastor.
- 4. The Conference President shall give as much time as possible to supervising the pioneeer works and the smaller churches.
- 5. The Conference President's tithe is to be deducted for the Parsonage Fund.

Item IV. Miscellaneous

- 1. The Conference Treasurer and the Conference Secretary shall receive and honorarium of \$75 each.
- 2. All superannuated ministers and their wives of our conference shall be entertained free during camp.
- 3. We recommend that the Board of Church Extension be empowered between the sessions of the Conference to make available for present use any surplus in any fund.
- 4. We recommend that the Kentucky Conference Ministerial Student Aid Fund at Marion College be placed under the Conference Church Extension Board with recommendations from the donors.
 - 5. We recommend that the minutes be sold for \$1.00 per copy.

We recommend:

Report No. 17 COMMITTEE ON MORAL REFORM

We, your committe on moral reform, submit to this conference and the churches of this conference the following resolutions:

- 1. Since our homes are the tributaries which feed the stream of our national and religious life, we call upon our ministers to challenge our entire church congregation to make our homes Christian.
- 2. Inasmuch as we are living in a world of unrest, of contention, and of strife, which is the result of the spirit of the anti-Christ, we ask our people to seek the peace of unity of faith once delivered to the saints, to seek understanding in the midst of misunderstanding, to cover our brother's faults with the grace of charity and by fellowship to those who may be weaker in the faith.
- 3. We call our people to return to a reverence, for the Lord's Day and stress the necessity of a faithfulness to all services conducted on that day. We urge our families to worship as a family unit and sit together. We intreat our people to abstain from social and secular interest and indulgences that take away the holiness of the Lord's Day.
- 4. Believing in the integrity and devotion of our God appointed church leaders in all levels of administration, we urge our people to support them by their prayers and cooperation in furthering the work of the Lord through the channels of Wesleyan Methodist Church.

We feel that the leaders should, in return, be sympathetic and have a common understanding toward the conference's beliefs and standards.

- 5. We further urge that our people exercise their disapproval of obscene literature, immodest attire, (we interpret modest attire to mean women wearing three quarter length sleeves, their dress below the knee and higher at the neck with the young girls included. Also the women wearing their hair according to I Cor. 11:15.) And that we exercise our disapproval of tobacco, intoxicating beverages, degrading radio and television programs, also the discouraging of television as a whole because of the general tendency to unwholesome influence.
- 6. Be it resolved that the pastors exhort our people to fulfill their responsibility as citizens in registering their vote in all areas including local, state, and national levels.
- 7. In the midst of the racial tension we discourage our people from participating in or encouraging any pleasure groups that produce unchristian attitudes. We exhort our people to treat the Negro with dignity and respect since God has made of one blood all people.
- 8. We wish to reaffirm our historical beliefs and standards against the putting on of gold and costly apparel, which includes the engagement and wedding ring.
- 9. We also disapprove immodest attire, this pertaining to the wearing of shorts, slacks, etc. And parents to exercise their paternal authority over their household to this end.

the News of Good Tidings Swiftly to our neighbors near and far in a United Effort.

Did you know our Conference was organized in 1923 with seven churches? The W. H. & F. M. S. now W. M. S. reported four societies but did not name them. There were fifty-eight active and fifteen honorary members. Total offering of \$63.50. In 1924 the societies named were: Atwood, Highland Park, Camp Taylor, Mt. Calvary, Whitehall, and Sylvania. Their total giving was \$128.12. Last year after forty-two years, thirty-five societies reported with a total giving of \$9557.20. Let every society, large or small, use the Guide. It helps get out of that same-plan rut. Increased attendance and a greater vision will be the reward.

Miss Farmer toured our Conference Church by Church last fall, Rev. Harris Earl visited a few Churches. October 30, 31 and November 1, Rev. and Mrs. Robert Lytle, Miss Pearl Crapo, Miss Hilda Clark of Honduras and Miss Freda Farmer were God's instruments in giving the Tri-City Area a great Missionary Convention. The ladies of the Conference had their own retreat during Ministerial with Mrs. Mariam Sheets as guest speaker. July 6-10 five of us were privileged to attend the Quadrennium Area Missionary Convention at Cadalac, Michigan. The Saunders will tour our Conference Church by Church from September 28 to November 3. We hope to have three or four conventions through out the Conference year.

Again this year we have pledged \$2400 on the support of the Ellises, \$1200 on the support of Marcia Earl, \$1200 on the support of the Peltons. You have given freely and God has blessed you for it.

It has been our pleasure to travel parts of three weeks with Miss Farmer, to visit many of our Churches during the year, to organize the W. M. S. at Walker Chapel, to help with the various Missionary endeavors of the Conference, to conduct two Missionary services, and to send out 154 letters and cards. You ladies are doing well, let us press on determined to make our best better for God's glory.

Report No. 5 WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

We, the Committee on Ways and Means, wish to make the following recommendations:

I. Conference

- a. The W. Y. President shall attend one rally in each Disrict during the year and District shall bear the traveling expense at the rate of seven cents a mile. The W.Y Secretary shall notify each District Chairman of this obligation previous to the President's tour.
- b. We recommend that the pioneer project of this year be left in the hands of the Executive Committee.
- c. We recommend that our missionary project for this year be the support of David and Debra Ellis.

- d. We recommend that the W.Y. Executiive Committee continue a quarterly Youth Bulletin, to be sent to the young people of the conference.
- e. We recommend that a Conference-wide Youth Rally be held Friday Night following the Annual Conference and Saturday be known as Youth Day at which time the Youth Conference will convene.
- f. We recommend that the Conference shall elect a Nominating Committee for the conference year which is to be a standing committee of five members with the Youth Conference President and Secretary as members ex-officio. This committee shall appoint the chairman and members of the (1) Ways and Means, (2) Resolutions Committee, (3) Statistical Committee, and (4) Auditing Committee.

g. We recommend that a Conference-wide "Youth Leader's Workshop" be held in September for the purpose of promoting the conference youth work. We urge the Pastors, District Chairman, and all local youth officers to attend.

h. We recommend that each local promote the International Youth Convention which will be held in Louisville Christmas week, and that we support it with our attendance and finances.

II District

a. We recomemned that the Districts be set up the same as the Conference Board of Extension and Evangelism.

b. We recommend that each District have at least four rallies during the year and that we use our Young People in a variety of programs for these rallies rather than always securing an outside speaker.

III. Local

- a. We recommend that the local treasurer's books shall close June 30.
- a. We recommend that the Local raise the amount of two dollars (\$2.00) per active member for the General W.Y. Program and that those churches not having an organized Local take an offering for the General Youth Program.
- b. We recommend that each Local raise the amount of one dollar (\$1.00) per active member for the Conference Expense fund.
- c. We recommend that each Local raise the amount of fifty cents (50¢) per active member for the Youth Camp Fund.
- d. We recome and that each Local raise the amount of ten cents (10¢) per active member to subsidize the expense of the Youth Bulletin.
- e. We recommend that the Executive Committee shall have the power to appropriate the youth money for the promotion of the General and Conference work.
- f. We recommend that each District in their District Rallies raise
