JOURNAL OF DAILY PROCEEDINGS.

Fairmount, Indiana, August 17, 1915.

The Sixty-seventh Annual Session of the Indiana Conference assembled in the auditorium on the camp ground at 8:30 A. M. The devotions were conducted by Elders A. Worth, R. L. Fisher, C. A. Billheimer and C. S. Smith, followed by a gracious season of testimony and praise.

The roll was called, 43 Elders and 6 Licentiates answering to their names. The following named persons having presented proper credentials were enrolled as delegates: George W. Felton, H. M. Crilley, Elizabeth Lee, Lona Vanclue, Eva Lovin, Andrew Layman, Emma Irby, A. A. The Committee appointed at the last Annual Conference to arrange statistical blanks in harmony with the form ordered by the action of the General Conference submitted its report. The report was adopted. (See report No. 1.)

Upon motion the Revs. H. T. Hawkins and T. M. Bodenhorn were elected a committee to assist the pastors in harmonizing their reports with the plan adopted.

A motion prevailed that the Conference Secretary be elected Chairman of the Committee on Statistical Blanks. Rev. S. E. Baker was elected a second member of the Committee.

The bar of the Conference was fixed to be the first four seats in front and at the sides of the rostrum together with the rostrum.

The Conference then proceeded to elect a Committee on Pastoral Relations in the following named persons: E. J. Pitts, W. M. Bailey, W. J. Seekins, Edna Baker, Minnie Flagg and Eli Roberts.

L. H. Carter was elected Chairman of the Committee on Vacancies. W. L. Thompson, H. T. Hawkins, H. M. Crilley and Frank Noggle were added to the Committee.

Edna Baker offered her resignation as Conference and Campmeeting Reporter. Her resignation was accepted and Aurie Bodenhorn was elected to fill the vacancy.

The Conference Sunday-school Board was elected as follows: W. J. Seekins, H. T. Hawkins, H. T. Arnold and T. M. Bodenhorn.

A motion prevailed that the Campmeeting Committee be instructed to secure Wesleyan Methodist Evangelistic help for our Campmeetings.

The following officers of the Library Association were elected: W. L. Thompson, President; G. W. Felton, Vice-President; N. E. Smith, Secretary; J. E. Smiley, Treasurer.

Upon motion Conference adjourned. Benediction by R. L.

Fisher.

Second Meeting, Tuesday, 2:00 P. M.

The devotions were conducted by Elders A. L. Blake and T. J. Pierce.

The roll was called, minutes were read and approved.

The President then read his annual address to the Conference. Upon motion the address was approved and ordered published in the Minutes and the Wesleyan Methodist. The President then read his official report. The report was adopted. (See report No. 2.) Upon motion the Rev. Eber Teter was elected Chairman of the Investigating Committee requested by the President. Elders H. C. Brown, C. A. Billheimer, H. T. Hawkins, A. P. Fooshee and Laymen Frank Noggle and George Mount were added to the Committee.

Upon motion Saturday afternoon was made a special order to hear the Sunday-school Board. Motion prevailed to make Wednesday evening the special order to hear the W. H. and F. Missionary

Society.

Third Meeting, Wednesday, 8:30 A. M.

Recommendations to be received to pursue the Course of Study were presented for Francis Berkebile, Hazel Conover, Paul Billheimer, Lewis Pratt, Earl L. Glover, Charles E. Wood. Upon motion these and all other like papers were ordered passed to the Committee on Elders' Orders.

J. Hester was placed in nomination for Church Extension Secretary and Evangelist. Upon motion the Secretary was instructed to cast the ballot of the Conference for J. Hester. This was done and J. Hester was declared elected.

A motion prevailed making it a standing order of this Conference for the President to nominate the Advisory Board and that the Conference elect his Nominations. The President nominated and the Conference elected Elder W. L. Thompson and Layman John L. Rigsbee as the Advisory Board.

Expressions of appreciation and promises of faithful service were offered by the newly elected officials T. P. Baker, W. J. Seekins, F. R. Eddy, W. L. Thompson, S. E. Baker, J. Hester and George W. Felton. A popular demonstration of love and confidence in these brethren caused a gracious outpouring of the blessing of the Lord, and a standing vote pledging support to these officials was unanimous.

Upon motion Conference adjourned.

Wednesday night at 7:30 the Special Order was called, which was the meeting of the W. H. & F. M. Society. After an appropriate program Sister Cleo Young, a returned missionary from Africa, delivered an effective address. An appeal was made, whereupon cash and suscriptions were given to the amount of \$260.55.

The roll was called and the minutes were read and approved.

The following resolution was adopted: "Inasmuch as our people are investing thousands of dollars in these grounds and improvements, and, inasmuch as they continue to respond to appeals for the support of the work of the Campmeeting Association, and inasmuch as it is proper and just that they be properly informed as to the uses made of the funds contributed and methods employed, Resolved: That we, the members of the Indiana Annual Conference, do hereby request the Board of Campmeeting Directors, for the information of the public, to read the minutes of their deliberations to this body."

The Committee on Statistics submitted their report. A motion was made to adopt the report. A motion to amend the report by instructing the Secretary to harmonize the report with the Conference orders, calling any to his assistance he may choose, was carried. The report was adopted as amended. (See report No. 16.)

The minutes were read and upon motion they were adopted.

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS.

Brethren of the Indiana Conference:

Through the good providence of God we have been permitted to assemble in the capacity of another Annual Conference, the sixty-seventh session of the Conference's history. Some marked changes have taken place since we last met. A number, who were with us last year in the annual gathering, have been called to the eternal reward, among them Rev. Joseph Tague, pastor of the Westfield charge.

The work in the Conference during the year has been in a great measure prosperous. Every arm of the work has met with a degree of success. A new organization, at Rochester, has been added to the Conference, with Rev. S. M. Van Blaricom, pastor. A valuable church property has been purchased at Thorntown. A new and substantial church building has been erected at Waveland. A new and commodious tabernacle has been built at New Castle. A

church property has been secured at Sylvania, and a number of churches have undergone repairs at a considerable cost, which certainly speaks well for our work and people and is highly commendable.

A number of our circuits and churches have been blessed with good revivals, which has resulted in an increase of the numerical as well as the spiritual strength of these circuits, which is very gratifying indeed. Some of our churches have held their own in the face of very unfavorable conditions. For this they are certainly deserving of great credit.

In the face of the financial depression of the country and the discouraging effect it has had on our people, the work has been fairly well supported, and on most of the charges the Budget will be full and on some overflowing.

I feel it my duty to commend the work of our faithful pastors for their careful supervision of the work and their untiring effort to make it a success.

It is to be regretted, however, that some of our work has suffered as a result of mismanagement and for want of impartial and unselfish shepherding. A man with no knowledge of the mechanism of a watch could tear it to pieces, but to construct that valuable piece of mechanism requires knowledge, skill, experience and patience.

In the work of God and soul saving men are needed who are skilled in the work of construction, and not in destruction.

The man who seeks above everything else personal aggrandizement, will sacrifice the welfare of the cause and church to reach the end desired; and no church or charge is safe in the hands of such a pastor. Careful, impartial, unselfish shepherding is essential to the success of any church.

That the pastorate is scripturally recognized is seen from many scriptural references. "And I will give you pastors according to mine heart, and they shall feed you with knowledge and understanding." "And he gave some, apostles; and some, prophets, and some, evangelists; and some, pastors and teachers." We are to understand that the angels of the churches of Asia Minor were persons sent by Jehovah to preside over those churches, and to them the epistle is directed, not as pointing out their state or condition, but the churches under their care. Angel of the church here, answers exactly to that officer of the synagogue which was called the messenger of the church, whose business it was to read, pray, and teach in the synagogue, and which Paul in Eph. 4:11 terms pastor.

The position of the Wesleyan Church is in keeping with the Scriptures upon this point.

As political parties must have representatives in office who are of the political faith of those parties, so must churches have pastors who are of the religious faith of the churches they represent and serve as pastors. Hence the importance of Wesleyan churches being served by pastors who are exactly in sympathy with the principles and doctrines of the Wesleyan Church.

As the Baptism of the Holy Ghost is an indispensable qualification for the ministry, it is a part of the equipment of a Wesleyan pastor. It is said to be "the soul's panoply for the Lord's war against the Devil," "and is proof aganst all distractions and disturbances." "I indeed baptize you with water unto repentance," says John, "but he that cometh after me, he shall baptize you with the Holy Ghost and fire." Fire baptized pastors will move the people.

True fire has its seat in the heart. It melts the affections; simplifies the desires; expands the sympathies; it suffers long and is kind, and all its furnace flames centers in the love-nature.

False fire runs up in the head and centers in the imagination. It produces rashness; condemns all that do not agree with it; produces an unbalanced view of truth; raises unscriptural doctrines; magnifies non-essentials, and puts the wrong construction on God's word. A fanatic has a hot head and a cool heart; but he, whose heart is the receptacle of true fire, has a warm heart and a cool head.

Just in proportion as the head becomes hot will the heart become cool. Fire is a blessing if it is kept in the furnace, but if it gets in the furniture it will burn down the house.

The pastor must not only possess that equipment that enables him to preach with power and unction, but he must be an example to the flock of which he is overseer. Among the various precepts of the Apostle Paul for Timothy's direction the following is recorded: "Let no man despise thy youth; but be thou an example of the believers, in word, in conversation, in charity, in spirit, in faith, in purity." In Peter's exhortation to the elders this admonition is to be found: "Neither as being lords over God's heritage, but being ensamples to the flock. And when the chief shepherd shall appear, ye shall receive a crown of glory, that fadeth not away."

The true shepherd will care for and protect his flock from the influences that threaten its growth and development. There are devouring wolves which threaten the peace and prosperity of God's Zion. The one to be feared most is the one that appears in the sheep's coat, but inwardly has the disposition to devour.

All who have been ordained elders in the Wesleyan Methodist Church have answered the following question in the affirmative:

"Will you be ready, with all faithful diligence, to banish and drive away all erroneous and strange doctrines contrary to God's word, and to use both public and private monitions and exhortations, as well to the sick as to the whole, within your charge, as need shall require and occasion be given?" Will you? Do you?

The pastor should be a feeder and not a fleecer. Do not understand me to say that the pastor is not to be rewarded for his services. The ox is not to be muzzled that treadeth out the corn. The servant is worthy of his hire. He that is taught in the word is to communicate to him that teacheth in all good things; but the work of the shepherd is that of feeding and caring for the sheep, and the sheep are to surrender the fleece, when it is necessary for its removal, to give place for the new fleece, and to reward the shepherd for his labor. Give and it shall be given you. There are a lot of people that never don a new fleece, spiritually, because they refuse to give the shepherd of their means as God has prospered them, temporally.

"Feed the flock of God which is among you, taking the oversight thereof, not by constraint, but willingly; not for filthy lucre, but of a ready mind."

A well fed, well sheltered, well cared for flock, will produce a good fleece; but a half fed, poorly cared for flock, will not produce a good fleece.

One of the qualifications requisite on the part of one to be an overseer of the flock of God is that he should not be a novice.

A novice is one newly converted to the faith, inexperienced, untutored in the things to be taught and management of the affairs of the Church, and has no reference to age. It is impossible for one who is not deeply experienced in the things of God to guide others in the way of life.

Then the Apostle gives his reason why a novice should not be appointed to the work of an overseer.

"Lest being lifted up with pride he fall into the condemnation of the devil." Says Dr. Adam Clark, "It is natural for man to think himself of more importance than his fellows, when they are intrusted to his government. The Apostle's term puffed up, inflated, is a metaphor, taken from a bladder when filled with air or wind. It is a substance, has a certain size, is light, can be the sport of the wind, but has nothing in it but air. Such is the classical coxcomb; a mere puffball, a disgrace to his function and despised by every intelligent man. Should not we say to those to whom it may concern, 'From such Apostles, O ye mitred heads, preserve the Church;

and lay not careless hands on skulls that cannot teach and will not learn."

There are those, who have assumed the responsibility of shepherding the flock of God and have been for years performing the functions of that office, who have never passed from the novice state. They feed not the flock of God. The diseased they do not strengthen, neither have they healed that which was sick, neither have they bound up that which was broken, neither have they brought again that which was driven away, neither have they sought that which was lost; "but with force and cruelty have ye ruled them," so says the Prophet Ezekiel, "And they were scattered because there was no shepherd."

There is another side to this question which we should not fail to give an intelligent consideration. We cannot expect to organize Wesleyan Methodist churches and establish the principles and doctrines of Wesleyanism with what is known as the driftwood of the world. By this I mean persons who have no stability of character, but are tossed about by every wind of doctrine. They unite with the church under the labors of a certain evangelist, because they become attached to the man, and when the evangelist is gone they are gone, and their religion as well.

Others are taken into the Church at the time of a Church organization, or revival meeting, not according to discipline, perhaps, but simply wholesaled in without a knowledge of the discipline and its requirements; then when the heat of the meeting or the influences under which they were received subsides, and they are face to face with the real issue, they will inform you very emphatically that they are not Wesleyans after that type, and if that is Wesleyanism they want their names dropped from the church roll at once. Their request should be granted.

Others are received into the Church who profess to be in sympathy with the Church and in harmony with the principles and doctrines of the same, but who have soured on the churches to which they formerly belonged because they were not recognized by those churches as suitable persons to be leaders, or because they were not favored with positions of honor and trust in the church at the hands of its membership. Such persons are, usually, insubordinate to law and authority themselves, and when in authority think that everybody else is insubordinate to law and authority, therefore they rule with an iron hand. Of such persons we may expect the same thing, when they fail to obtain what they sought to obtain, by becoming members of the Wesleyan Methodist Church. Such people will have trouble wherever they go.

To this class of persons belong those who will leave the Church if the pastor is not returned, or if he is returned, or if a certain preacher is sent to the charge; who will leave the Church, if a certain man is elected President of the Conference, or evangelist; who sings, in long meter, that old familiar song, "Political wire pulling in the Church," just because they are not in position to do the pulling.

There is another thing that cannot be overlooked by any church without suffering loss in its effort for God and souls. It is essential that Christian fellowship and unity exist among the members of a church. There is nothing so convincing to the world of the reality of the religion of the Lord Jesus Christ as to see a profession of it confirmed by these two characteristics of that religion.

In the Master's appeal to the Father for His followers He said, "Sanctify them through Thy truth," "that they may be one," "that the world may believe that Thou hast sent me."

When the membership of a church begins to surrender the delicateness of the Spirit, whether it be the pastor, or the flock, and begin to harden themselves just a little toward their brehren, the glory, then departs from Israel, for the Ark has been removed and the church is converted into a family of Ichabods. They, now, begin to bite and devour one another, and the devil lays down his arms, for the victory is won.

Then it is essential that the members of a church find their place in the body, or sphere of labor, and be content to occupy the same. Victory is sure when every man stands in his place around about the camp. It is when we try to get into the place of another, or fight with a weapon that we are not familiar with, that we suffer defeat and loss to the church.

Shamgar, a Jewish farmer, when attacked by the enemy, had nothing with which to fight but an ox-goad; but he was familiar with its use, and he handled it to a good advantage, slaying six hundred Philistines, and delivered Israel from the hands of the enemy. He fought with something, the use of which he well understood, and God made it omnipotent in his hands.

In war for God and souls, it is best to use the weapon that is best suited to us, or, in other words, ascertain where in the body we belong, or what member of the body we are; then earnestly and diligently apply ourselves to the performance of the functions that is enjoined upon that member, that there may be no schism in the body, but that unity and Christian fellowship may be seen and felt. Then can appropriately be sung, "Blest be the tie that binds our hearts in Christian love."

RESOLUTIONS AND LAWS OF THE INDIANA CONFERENCE.

I.

The Evangelists shall be required to devote their entire time to the work and give a report of the first and third quarterly meetings, and the pastors shall report the second and fourth, in the Wesleyan Methodist, and in case of failure to do so, except for lawful reasons, they shall be subject to censure by this Conference.

II.

It is contrary to the spirit of our Discipline and our principles for our preachers to assist at any service with oath-bound societies.

III.

That any candidate for Elders' Orders, or to travel under the direction of this Conference, who fails to attend the Institutes and examinations of the Conference without sufficient cause shall be deemed unworthy of the trust and care of souls and refused a place among us as a minister of the gospel, and when they shall fail to attend the Institute or to report to the Committee for two years, they shall be dropped from the roll.

IV.

That it is the sense of this Conference that our houses of worship should not be opened to any evangelist or minister of any other Church to hold a series of meetings or to maintain a regular appointment for another congregation; provided, however, that usual denominational courtesy be extended to other ministers in occasional appointments.

V.

Any waiving of the above resolution by contract or lease of buildings must be obtained through the Board of Trustees of the Indiana Conference.

VI.

Whereas, the Discipline requires that the stewards meet the pastors and agree with them as to the amount necessary for their support, be it resolved that the circuits may at the same time enter into an agreement in writing with the pastor as to the services he is to render to the Church. In case the pastor shall fail to render

said services, unless providentially hindered or released by thecharge, said failure shall be considered a sufficient cause to make a new adjustment of the amount originally agreed upon. Otherwise the contract shall be binding upon both parties the same as other financial obligations incurred by contracting parties.

VII.

Each pastor shall file a duplicate report with the Statistical! Committee by the second day of Conference, said report to be kept on file one year.

VIII.

Financial Plan.

(1) The President shall travel the Conference holding quarterly meetings and have general oversight of the missionary interests in the Conference and shall be known as the Missionary Secretary and Evangelist. He shall, as he shall have time, assist pastors in raising Conference Funds. He shall, at the time of the passing of his character, give a report of his work during the year and report the condition of the work, together with such statistics as may be useful to the Conference in planning for the work of the coming; year.

(2) The second Evangelist shall be known as the Conference: Sunday-school Secretary and Evangelist, and his duties shall be that of the Sunday-school Secretary as outlined in the Discipline, together with the duties devolving upon him in the work of the quarterly meetings, and at the time of the passing of his character he shall give a full account of the progress and conditions of

the work.

(3) The third Evangelist shall be known as Church Extension Secretary and Evangelist, and his duties shall be to hold quarterly meetings and work up the interests of the Church Extension work.

(4) The fourth Evangelist shall be known as the Conference: Educational Secretary and Evangelist, and it shall be his duty to travel the Conference holding quarterly meetings, and in connection with this work up the School interests, obtaining students and money.

(5) These persons thus elected, if not Trustees, shall counsell with them in all plans to make the work a success for God and the

Church.

(6) These persons holding quarterly meetings shall not be excused from the same, only in case of death or sickness in their family, or extreme providential hindrances.

IX.

The membership, as much as possible, shall pay all their contributions for the Conference and Connectional Interests to the pastors, who shall receipt them for the same and see that it is paid to the proper authorities. Where money is paid direct to the Conference Treasurer by the membership, he shall send a duplicate receipt to the pastor of the charge where such persons are members.

X.

All charges with a membership of twenty-five or more shall, in addition to the regularly stipulated salary, assume the responsibility of providing a suitable home in which the pastor may live.

XI.

We recommend that all charges and stations to which the pastor moves pay the moving and transportation expenses of said pastor, the same to be done in addition to the salary, provided that this shall not interfere with previous arrangements between pastors and charges.

XII.

All unaccounted for numbers appearing on the statistics in the membership list shall be transferred to the discontinued list. The roll of all the classes upon the charges shall be put into the hands of the pastors and they shall have charge of the same and make all entries therein.

XIII.

The Committee on Elders' Orders are hereby empowered to transfer all persons to the study list who may have been recommended to travel and have not been given work.

XIV.

It shall be a standing rule of Conference until revoked by vote that the President shall receive \$35, the Secretary \$50, the Assistant Secretary \$15, the same to be apportioned pro rata among the various funds of the Conference.

XV.

The official character of no pastor shall be passed until he shall have submitted a satisfactory report including statistics.

XVI.

The ordination services shall be held in connection with the memorial services of the Conference.

XVII.

Pastors shall pass their statistical reports to the Committee on Ministerial Character, who shall examine the same and report their regularity or irregularity. Hereafter these reports shall not be read in open Conference.

XVIII.

The Board of Conference Trustees shall formulate plans to govern the Educational Secretary and Church Extension Secretary in their work, this to be a standing rule of the Conference until revoked by this body.

XIX.

It shall be a standing rule until revoked by vote of this Conference that the President shall nominate his Advisory Board and the Conference shall elect his nominations.

REPORTS

Report No. 1.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CONFERENCE STATISTICS.

We, your Committee appointed to arrange Statistical Blanks in harmony with the action of the General Conference, begs leave to submit the following report:

The action of the General Conference ordered a uniform Statistical Blank to be used by all the annual conferences, the same to be printed and distributed by our Publishing House. This took the matter out of the hands of the Committee until such a time as we

could obtain a supply. This was done at the earliest date possible, but only at a date when it was impossible to confer or to correct certain mistakes and oversights which appear in the makeup of the Blanks. These were to contain blank lines for the use of Conferences having funds not outlined in the uniform plan. This through some oversight, doubtless, was not done and your committee found a serious difficulty in providing a suitable plan for reporting our work this Fall. The matter was further complicated by the fact that funds are called by a different name in the new blank than our methods in the past have provided for. This does not in any way effect the destination of the funds, but confuses our pastors as to methods of reporting their labors. We therefore recommend the following:

- 1. As our methods require Regular Quarterly Meeting Evangelists and do not provide for a Salaried President, as such, and as it is essential to the work of the Finance Committee to have the Conference Evangelist's apportionment and "Other Evangelistic Help" kept separate, we recommend that the Sub Item "Conference Evangelist" be inserted in Item VII and all monies paid for Quarterly Meetings be reported here. Further, that we leave the Sub Item Conference President's Salary vacant and report all other Evangelistic Help in the Sub Item "Evangelistic Help."
- 2. Under Item VIII For Benevolences, add the Sub Items "Bible School," "Conference Sunday School Apportionment" and "Minute Fund," these to be included in the Total for said Item. The Sub Item "Undivided Budget," with our methods, is ambiguous, and we recommend that we do not use it, but report our funds itemized as heretofore.
- 3. We recommend that the Sub Item "Bible School" be added to Item X, as it is properly coordinate with "Education" and is Connectionally assigned to this Conference.
- 4. We recommend that the Sub Items "Bible School," "Conference S. S. Apportionment," and "Minute Fund" be added to Item XI.
- 5. We recommend further that inasmuch as blank lines for the use of these Sub Items do not appear in the Uniform Blanks, and inasmuch as these Sub Items are essential to the work of this Conference, that this Conference elect a committee whose duty it shall be to provide blanks for our use that shall contain the above described Sub Items in addition to that provided for by the action of the General Conference.
- 6. We recommend that this Conference appoint a Committee of two whose duty it shall be to assist the Pastors this Fall in ad-

justing their reports to those recommendations, said work to be done and turned over to the proper Committees not later than Wednesday noon.

Report No. 2.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT.

During the Conference year the following items of business have been referred to me for my consideration and adjustment.

- 1. Received J. L. Jones, from the Baptist church, to pursue the Course of Study preparatory to taking work at the hands of the Conference.
- 2. Granted Elder John G. Kennedy a letter of transfer to the Illinois Conference.
- 3. Granted Elder Cerena Jay a letter of transfer to the Pentecostal Nazarene Church.
- 4. Received Rev. Amos Pearson, from the Pentecost church, to pursue the Course of Study, preparatory to taking work at the hands of the Conference.
- 5. Received Elder B. B. Gifford by letter of transfer from the South Ohio Conference, according to disciplinary provisions.
 - 6. Granted Elder James Jester a letter of standing.
- 7. Accepted the resignation of Rev. B. I. Eddy as pastor of the Fishersburg charge.
- 8. Issued a Conference license to the following persons, they having taken work within the bounds of the Indiana Conference: Joseph Tague, Allen Tague, Lucinda F. Smith, Emma Payne, E. E. Cory, B. I. Eddy, K. C. McCollum, F. O. Spitlar, Edgar Zike, C. L. Enyeart and C. E. Neyhart.
- 9. Appointed Elder J. F. Pressnall pastor of the Fishersburg charge.
- 10. Appointed Elder Aaron Worth pastor of the Westfield charge, made necessary by the death of the pastor Rev. Joseph Tague.
 - 11. Granted a letter of standing to Elder C. M. Moore.
- 12. Granted a letter of transfer to Elder J. L. Snider to the Michigan Conference.

- 13. Received a church, organized by Elder S. M. VanBlaricom, at Rochester, Indiana, and appointed him pastor of same.
- 14. Accepted the resignation of Elder Dolly R. Eddy, to take work in Africa, she being appointed to general evangelistic work in this conference.
- 15. In the month of April, 1915, I received the following communication:

Gunkle Zion Church, Lafayette, Ind., April 18, 1915.

As we, the members of the church, feel keenly the conditions existing by the indifference of the people of the community, and a part of the members, not attending the services and contributing to the expenses, we feel it best to abandon preaching at this time, as we cannot meet the expenses of the church and a pastor. We, as a part of the members who bear a greater part of the expenses of the pastor and church, pray the Indiana Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, to please relieve us of this burden at this time. As we deplore and feel keenly the conditions at present we feel it will be best to disband as a church.

Signed: Edward Gunkle, Nellie Gunkle, Idella Cole, Mary Cole."

In view of the fact that we do not own the church property at this place, and cannot control it, the above request was granted, the Advisory Board consenting.

- 16. I recommend that the resolutions and laws of the Indiana Conference be published in the Conference Minutes, as last year.
- 17. Appointed chairman of committees as follows: Memorials Elder C. S. Smith; Resolutions, A. Worth; Finances, L. H. Carter.
- 18. Because of the importance of the Sunday School interests, I recommend that a special order be made for the consideration of that important subject, and that the Conference Sunday School Board have charge of the program.
- 19. The ladies of the W. H. & F. M. Society of the Indiana Conference request that time be given them for the consideration of their work. I suggest that a special order be made to suit their convenience.
- 20. Granted Walter and Miriam Jennings letters of transfer to the Lockport Conference in the same relation they sustained to the Indiana Conference, they being licentiates pursuing the Course of Study preparatory to taking work at the hands of the Conference.
- 21. Received Elders A. U. and Lydia Murphy by letter of transfer from the North Michigan Conference.
 - 22. Early in the Conference year a controversy arose between

the pastor of the Hamlet charge, Rev. K. C. McCollum, and members of the Hamlet church, as to the rights of members and the authority of the pastor. Both pastor and members appealed to me for a decision on the controverted point. The point in question was, "Has the pastor the right to remove a member from the church without the action of the church to which he belongs." An attempt was made by the pastor to have the name of the class-leader of that church removed from the roll. The result of the vote was eighteen to nothing in favor of retaining the class-leader in the church. The pastor then held that he had a right to remove his name and asked me for an opinion.

I interpreted Paragraph 61 of the Church Discipline to mean that the authority to receive members into a Wesleyan Methodist church is vested in the church, and not in any person; and that the authority to remove names from the church roll is vested in the church, and not in the pastor or any other person. To this opinion the pastor took exceptions and wrote me that I was wrong in my interpretation of the Discipline.

The pastor then served notice on the class-leader that his rights as leader were taken from him and that he could no longer exercise the functions of that office in the church.

The class leader and two other members of the church exercised their rights under the Discipline and called a meeting of the church over the pastor's protest and notified me to be present to interpret the Discipline in the presence of the church and to rule on the controverted points. With Rev. W. L. Thompson, ministerial member of the Advisory Board, I attended that meeting.

My decision was, 1. That the authority to remove a name from the church roll is vested in the church, and can be done by the church, by the consent of that person, otherwise by due process of disciplinary law. 2. That the pastor of the Hamlet circuit had superseded his authority in his effort to take from the class-leader of the Hamlet church his rights of exercising the functions of that office in the church.

In our effort to adjust matters on this charge we found the pastor insubordinate both in spirit and conduct to the Law and Authority of the church, and he has remained so throughout the year.

On the occasion of the fourth quarterly meeting of the Hamlet charge, held at the Brems appointment, after the license of two licentiates of long service in the church had been discontinued without cause, I urged that the Disciplinary requirement on page 61 of the Church Discipline be observed in that meeting. It reads as follows:

"The Quarterly Conference shall inquire into the character and usefulness of licentiates and exhorters and may admonish them and take away their license; or it may renew them each year when it shall judge their gifts and usefulness justify a renewal." Feeling that I had in my possession sufficient evidence for the inauguration of an inquiry and for not renewing the pastor's license, whose membership is with this charge, I objected to the renewal of his license for the following reasons:

Reason 1. On page 61 of the Church Discipline is found the following: "No Licentiate, who is delinquent in his effort to pass the Course of Study shall be considered worthy of employment at the hands of an Annual Conference, of which the Committee on Itinerancy and Elders' Orders shall be judge." This Brother is delinquent in his effort to pass the Course of Study, judged so by the Committee on Itinerancy and Elders' Orders, also by the Theological Institute and Ministerial Association, as seen by the records on page 68.

Reason 2. Insubordination to the Law of the Discipline and Authority of the Church.

Reason 3. Writing letters in which he reflects on the former pastor, speaks evil of certain members of his charge, and charges certain Conference officials of falsifying.

A faction of the church, through the influence of the pastor, refused to listen to an inquiry into the pastor's character, and assumed an attitude of insubordination to the Law of the Discipline and Parliamentary usages. At this stage of the meeting we were ordered to vacate the building, which was a schoolhouse, which we did, adjourning the meeting in confusion.

The pastor then presided over a meeting which renewed his license in the absence of a large per cent of the membership.

I recommend that this Conference appoint a committee who are versed in the Discipline of the Church to consider this part of the President's report and report to this body at as early a date as possible, giving special attention to the following points:

- 1. Was the President correct in his interpretation of the Discipline as to the authority of the pastor and the rights of members?
- 2. Was the President and his Advisory Board correct in ruling that the pastor of the Hamlet charge superseded his authority in his effort to take from the class leader of the Hamlet church his rights of exercising the functions of that office in the church?
- 3. Had the President a Disciplinary right to inaugurate an inquiry into the character and usefulness of the pastor, and had he just grounds for objecting to the renewal of his license?

4. Was the business transacted in that part of the quarterly meeting, over which the pastor presided, legal? and if not what relation does he sustain to the Indiana Conference?

Item 3. We recommend that the Conference President, who is also Missionary Secretary, be paid \$900 per year and the other Conference Evangelists \$800, and, inasmuch as the apportionment is insufficient to meet this need, we further recommend that a suffi-

Item 4. We recommend that the Connectional Representatives

shall, in their appeals, conform to the Conference Budget.

Item 5. We recommend that all money payable to the Conference Treasurer be paid to the pastor and by him to the Conference Treasurer for his convenience in reporting.

Item 6. We further recommend that all Circuits and Charges that are not paying at least \$500 salary be earnestly requested to

raise the sum at least 20 per cent or until it reaches \$500.

Report No. 5.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE.

Report of the Special Committee to consider the questions of Church law, as raised by the report of the President of the Conference.

- 1. The rights of a class leader. The President of the Indiana Annual Conference, of the Wesleyan Methodist Connection of America, ruled upon this point as follows: That a class leader could only be elected or removed by a vote of the Church of which he is a member, and that when elected, he can exercise the functions of said office until it becomes vacant either by death, resignation, or by vote of the church electing him. On motion, the committee sustained said ruling, which makes it the interpretation of the law in such cases.
- 2. Who has a right to ask for an investigation into the character or usefulness of licentiates, when their licenses are up for renewal? The committee decided, that the Presiding officer or any member of a quarterly conference had a right to ask for an investigation, and that the President of an Annual Conference, and his advisory board has the right to investigate, the actions of any one employed to travel under the direction of the Annual Conference, and object to the renewal of any license, until said objections are answered to the satisfaction of the quarterly conference, as not being good.

- 3. Where a licentiate is traveling under the direction of an Annual Conference and fails to meet the requirements of the discipline, so that said licentiate is not entitled to continue to be so employed or travel under the direction of an annual conference, has the President of an Annual Conference a right to object to the renewal of his license? It was the judgment of the committee that any act or failure of a licentiate that cuts off his right to be continued in the employment as a minister to travel under the direction of an Annual Conference, would be an objection to renewing his quarterly Conference license, unless the reasons for the non-compliance with the requirements of the discipline were satisfactorily explained.
- 4. The question was raised as to the relation of a licentiate to an Annual Conference, who is insubordinate to the Discipline of the Church, and rules of the Annual Conference, to which said licentiate is amenable. The committee decided, that where such insubordination is proven, that it was a sufficient reason for discontinuing said licentiate in conference relations.
- 5. All matters contained in the report of the President, that pertained to any personal matters, we judge should be settled as such by the parties, in the way the Discipline prescribes.
- 6. Since the party at interest in the matters brought out in the President's report has announced his withdrawal from the Wesleyan Mehodist Church, we, the committee, decide that it takes all matters to which he might have been a party out of our jurisdiction, and advise that the Indiana Conference so decide.

Report No. 6.

COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS.

1. The present age is one of unrest in all departments of human life. Never in the history of the world has the spirit of war so dominated all the nations of the earth. Isaiah declares that every battle of the warrior is with confused noise and garments rolled in blood, and never in all the world's history has the hell-born fever fed upon the blood of slaughtered millions as it is doing today.

We record our protest against all forms of war for either commercial supremacy or the acquisition of territory from other powers. We believe the divine mission of Christ meant peace on earth and good will to men, and we pray for the time to speedily come when swords shall be beaten into plough shares and spears into pruning hooks and nations learn war no more.

2. We recognize but three institutions as divinely ordained of God: the Home, the Church and the State. The marriage relation constitutes the basis of the home and we look with alarm upon the increasing divorce evil in our country by which the foundations of the home are destroyed.

3. We recognize the Church as the proper sphere of all moral and spiritual activity and the multiplication of secret societies for the so called purposes of benevolence uncalled for, as the Church is the true medium for the exercise of the benevolent purposes in caring for the sick and poor.

4. We hail with delight the growing sentiment on the temperance reform in all the world. We congratulate the great Russian Empire, that owns one sixth of the land surface of the globe, in abolishing the drink traffic throughout her entire realm, and when the exigencies of war forced England to undertake the curtailment of the liquor traffic we look with horror at the clergy of the Established Church standing behind the breweries and distilleries and perpetuating the world's greatest curse.

5. We insist that all the voting citizenship of this country shall align themselves with such political parties as declare in their platforms for the utter annihilation of the liquor traffic and the rescue of our boys and girls from the snares of the demon rum.

6. We demand more stringent legislation on the part of the Government for the suppression of the white slave traffic which is endangering the foundations of society and eating like a canker at the core of the Nation's heart.

7. We are in favor of such restrictions in the emigration laws

of this land as will prevent the influx of such people as are alien in their principles and habits to American ideas and institutions.

- 8. We look with alarm upon the growing power of Mormonism in our land as a false system of religious faith, and the fact that they own all the good agricultural lands between the Rocky Mountains and the Sierra Nevadas of over 350,000 square miles, and the further fact that they control the electoral vote of six of the Western states ought to cause the Church to send a trumpet blast of protest from every pulpit in the land.
- 9. We would emphasize our faith in American institutions by an emphatic protest against the pagan superstition of Papal Rome in her hatred of our public schools and our Christian faith, and we will, by every means in our power, maintain the faith of our fathers and protect our free institutions to the end.

Report No. 13.

REPORT OF CONFERENCE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD.

1. Evangelism.

Evangelism is winning souls to Jesus Christ through the art of preaching. To evangelize is the same glorious work through the art of teaching. This is the great mission of the church.

The Sunday School is the Church—not a part of it nor a select few chosen to represent the larger part of the church by proxy, but the whole church, organized, God commissioned and mentally and spiritually equipped for successful evangelism. God's plan of sav-

ing men puts the church under solemn obligation to evangelize the lost in and through the work of the Sunday School.

When the unsaved in our Sunday Schools, the object of His love in redemption, becomes the living passion of our hearts, His heart burden for these, becomes our burden, the travail of His soul our travail. Then, and not until then, shall we have met the fullest obligation to Jesus Christ, growing out of our life relations to Him.

Jesus Christ, when here on earth was "the temple and shrine of eternal divinity." When he returned to heaven with our spiritulized and glorified humanity, he appointed His own sainthood, or body, in His stead and place. And, with the glory of His indwelling divinity, in the person of the Holy Ghost, these "Won Ones" are to carry on the great work of soul saving.

Our teaching, entreaties and prayers for those under our tuition in our Sabbath Schools, are to be as though they were His own. Our love for the lost should be at least a faint reflection of His love. We should teach the "unparalleled condescension" and mercy of God in Jesus Christ. We should do it in a way that they may feel that we feel it and, with Christ, their Salvation.

Salvation received and enjoyed obligates us to show in the Sunday School, as well as elsewhere, our appreciation of this wonderful gift. We can do this by shining, and loving and joyful living, as proof of the gospel we teach.

The Sabbath School affords the best workable material for the great work of salvation. The plastic of the young, their hearts, though tainted by sin, yet uncorrupted by long years of sinfulness, their minds and characters in the formative period are better adapted and more easily reached than in the later years. Many can be saved then and only a few when they live to be older.

One-half of all who are saved are converted before the age of sixteen. Five-sixths of those won to Christ are saved before twenty years old. Where men live to be seventy, only one out of six thousand are converted. Five-sixths before twenty and one-sixth in a rapidly decreasing ratio, until at the age of seventy only one out of six thousand who live Christless lives up to that age are saved. This necessitates that we shall not only sow the seed, but bring forth the harvest, before souls pass into the danger zone beyond the age of twenty years.

These startling facts should not only awaken us to a sense of our obligation in Sunday School work, but stir us to Holy zeal, interest and love for Sunday School evangelism.

The work demands our best in love, in mental training, and in spiritual equipment. Pentecost will do for the officiary and

teachers of our schools what it will do for the pulpit. Pentecostal blazing love and power will bring glorious results of evangelism in our Sunday Schools.

2. Our Standards.

A standard has the quality of a model, gauge, pattern or literary attainment; also of a high degree of excellence.

God has always presented high standards for His people. Isaiah says, "Go through, go through the gates; lift up a standard for the people." In the New Testament He has lifted up the standard of Holiness of heart and life for His people, and says, "Go ye therefore and teach all nations." One manner the Church has of fulfilling its mission is by lifting the standard and teaching in the Sunday School.

The standards for excellence in our Sunday Schools which we recommend are two:

I. A loyal Sunday School.

Three points indicating loyalty are mentioned, the meeting of which places the school in the ranks of the Loyals and are as follows:

- 1. Loyal to God. A Bible in the hands of each teacher during Class period.
- 2. Loyal to other Sunday Schools. The names of each member enrolled.
 - 3. Loyal to the Church.
 - a. By paying the Conference Apportionment.
 - b. By using Wesleyan Methodist Literature.

Any school can and should reach these points of excellence, but some have not seen the importance of doing so.

The other standard is higher and is for the benefit of the stronger schools, showing them how to work for Jesus, and is named:

II. The Front Line Sunday School.

There are five points of excellence to attain in becoming a Front Line Sunday School.

- 1. A loyal Sunday School.
- 2. Graded according to Discipline.
- 3. Have a local Sunday School Board.
- 4. Teacher's Meetings.
- 5. Departments.
 - a. Cradle Roll.
 - b. Home Department.
 - c. Missionary Department.
 - d. Temperance.
 - e. Teachers Training.

We should not demand that our standards should be lowered, but rejoice that our leaders call our attention to ways, in which we may devote our consecrated efforts in the service of our King and redouble our diligence to attain to them.

3. We hereby instruct the graduates from the Teachers Training Course in our Bible School to take their examinations by using the Indiana State Sunday School Association Questions and thus receive the advantage of the diplomas issued by the Association.

Finance.

Although the financial condition in our country has been severe the past year, yet a majority of our schools responded either in full or in part to the apportionment by this body.

Forty paid in full their apportionment; and fourteen paid the same in part. Forty-seven schools did not respond in any part to this conference obligation.

We hereby urge and instruct our Pastors, Churches and Sunday Schools to cooperate with the Conference Sunday School Secretary and Sunday School Board to secure the necessary finance to carry on the work. The apportionment for the coming year is eight cents for each member in our schools; one-half of the apportionment to be paid not later than November 1, 1915, the other half to be paid the latter part of the Conference Year.

Districting the Conference.

We hereby approve of the work of our Conference Sunday School Secretary in holding Sunday School Conventions, believing them to be of great and lasting good to our Sunday School work.

We recommend that the Conference Sunday School Board be authorized to district the Conference for holding District Sunday School Conventions, the object of which will be to awaken an increased interest in all lines of Sunday School Work, these conventions to be in charge of the Conference Sunday School Secretary, who shall conduct the same according to plans inaugurated by the Conference Sunday School Board.

Statistics.

In harmony with our excellent standards, we have gathered statistics that show the exact relation of each school to these standards. We urge all our pastors and people to study carefully the statistics.

It affords us great pleasure to report the Sunday Schools on the following charges as "Loyal" according to these standards: Fairmount, 3; Fountain City, 1; Kirklin, 1; Kokomo, 2; Larwill, 2; Mt. Etna, 1; Marion, Nelson St., 1; Peru, 2.

Sunday Schools on the following charges reached our excellent "Front Line" standard: Bryant, 1; Elwood, 1; Hamlet, 1; Marion, Nelson St., 1.

Ethel Sears tendered her resignation as Secretary of the Society. By vote her resignation was accepted. On motion Grace Vickery was elected to fill the vacancy of the unexpired year.

First Meeting, August 18, 1915.

The Woman's Home and Foreign Missionary Society of the Indiana Conference assembled in the school building on the camp ground at Fairmount, Indiana, Wednesday at 2:00 P. M., with President, Eva McMichael in the chair. Devotional was conducted by Lucinda Smith.

The roll of societies was called and twenty responded.

Upon motion Lula Van Matre was elected to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Emma Fall from the Statistical Committee.

Amanda Baker was elected Committee on Courtesies. Susie B. Teter and Ida Hopkins were elected Committee on Credentials.

Credentials for twenty-one delegates were presented and their names were entered upon the roll. Motion carried to seat all delegates not having credentials and give them the privilege to vote.

The following Committees were elected: Committee on Post Office Addresses—Auvie Harvey, Esta Smith; Committee on Memorials—Mary Spitlar, Setta Caldwell; Committee on Resolutions—Stella Pitts, Aurie Bodenhorn, Mary Smith; Auditing Committee—Edna Baker, Effie McMichael.

Bessie Baker, delegate to the General Conference at Houghton, N. Y., read her report. The report was approved.

It was moved and carried to hold our meetings at 7:00 P. M. that they might not conflict with the sessions of the Annual Conference.

Cleo Young, returned Missionary from Africa, was introduced to the Society and gave a most interesting and instructive talk concerning our mission work in Africa.

Upon motion the meeting adjourned. Benediction by Cleo Young.

Public Meeting, Wednesday, 7:30 P. M.

Miss Cleo Young delivered an address of unusual interest on her trip to Africa and her work among the natives. Rev. E. Teter made an appeal for money and \$260.55 by cash and subscriptions was raised.

Third Meeting, Thursday, 7:00 P. M.

The meeting was opened by singing "All Hail the Power of Jesus Name" and scriptural quotations were given by members.

The roll was called and seventeen delegates responded. The

minutes were read and approved.

Four more delegates were seated in the body increasing the total number enrolled to twenty-five.

The Treasurer submitted a partial report. On motion the re-

port was adopted. (See report No. 1.)

The report of the Committee on Resolutions was read and a motion carried to adopt the report item by item. All items were adopted upon motion, except No. 2, which was deferred until some future meeting. (See report No. 2.)

A motion prevailed that an informal meeting be held Friday

at 8:00 A. M.

By motion the meeting adjourned.

Fourth Meeting, Friday, 8:00 A. M.

F. R. Eddy, Secretary of the Annual Conference, gave an explanation at this informal meeting of his work last year in preparing the minutes of this Society for publication. A motion prevailed to extend to him a vote of thanks for his labors.

Letters from Anna Boardman Smith, Dolly R. Eddy and

Miriam C. Sprague were read before the Society.

The President gave a list of articles badly needed at the Mission Station in Africa and the different Societies pledged to furnish the same.

It was suggested that each Society send rolls of bandages with the linen, also that we slip in some pretty gifts for Christmas to cheer the missionaries who see so little of the beautiful.

Bessie Baker gave a talk concerning Anna K. Folger's work among the white mountaineers of the South and the need of children's clothing. The members of the Society expressed their inten-

tions of sending supplies to this work, also to the work in Alabama of which Rev. F. M. Roberts has the oversight. Some clothing has already been sent by different Societies and more expected to be sent soon.

Upon motion the meeting was adjourned.

Meeting of Executive Board, Friday, 10:00 A. M.

The Executive Board accepted the resignation of Edna Baker as a member of the Auditing Committee and Susie B. Teter was elected to fill the vacancy.

Fifth Meeting, Friday, 7:00 P. M.

The meeting opened by singing "Rescue the Perishing." Devotions were conducted by Mary Smith.

The roll was called and eleven delegates responded. The roll of Presidents was called and four responded.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read, corrected and approved.

On motion \$50 was voted to Mrs. Avery. Upon motion \$10 was voted for the schooling of the worthy young man suggested by Anna K. Folger.

A letter from Dolly R. Eddy was read before the Society. Also Susie B. Teter gave a brief review of a letter received from Mrs. F. M. Roberts expressing her appreciation of the buggy received by them.

A motion carried that an itemized account of the articles to be sent by the different Societies to the Mission Sation in Africa should not appear in the printed minutes.

On motion the Secretary was instructed to send letters of greeting to Brother and Sister B. I. Eddy and Brother and Sister F. M. Roberts.

By motion the meeting adjourned. Benediction by Eva Mc-Michael.

Sixth Meeting, Saturday, 8:30 P. M.

The meeting opened by singing "Rock of Ages" and the devotions were conducted by Setta Caldwell.

Eleven delegates and five Presidents responded to the roll call. The minutes were read and approved.

The Committee on Post Office Addresses submitted its report. On motion the report was adopted. (See report No. 3.) The Committee on Memorials read their report. Upon motion the report was adopted. (See report No. 4.) The Auditing Committee submitted its report. Upon motion the report was adopted. (See report No. 5.)

Nelson Street Missionary Society requested the privilege to withdraw from the contest for the banner. On motion the request was granted.

The Y. M. W. B. Organizer and Treasurer submitted her report. Upon motion the report was adopted. (See report No. 6.)

A letter from Mrs. E. G. Hartson was read before the Society.

The Treasurer submitted her final report. On motion the report was adopted. (See report No. 1.)

The President read her report. Upon motion the report was adopted. (See report No. 7.)

A motion carried to allow the officers of the Society their ex-

Upon motion the second item of the report of the Committee on Resolutions was adopted. (See report No. 2.)

The Committee on Statistics submitted their report. Upon motion the report was adopted. (See report No. 8.)

A motion prevailed that the first ballot in the election of President be a nominating ballot. The Society proceeded to vote and Auvie Northam and Eva McMichael were nominated for President. Upon ballot Auvie Northam received a majority of all votes cast and was declared elected.

A motion carried that the one receiving the next highest number of votes be the nominee for Vice-President. A motion carried that the Secretary be instructed to cast the ballot of the Society for Eva McMichael for Vice-President. This was done and Eva McMichael was declared elected.

Upon motion the Secretary was instructed to cast the ballot of the Society for Bessie Baker for Treasurer. This was done and Bessie Baker was declared elected.

On motion Nettie Carter was elected Y. M. W. B. Organizer and Treasurer.

Upon motion the Vice-President was instructed to cast the ballot of the Society for Grace Vickery for Secretary. This was done and Grace Vickery was declared elected.

On motion it was made a standing order of the Society that each member of the Statistical Committee be elected to serve two years. To conform to this order, the Secretary was instructed, upon motion, to cast the ballot of this Society for Ida Payne as a member of the

Statistical Committee to serve next year. On motion the Secretary was instructed to cast the ballot of this Society for Mary Spitlar as a member of the Statistical Committee for two years. These instructions were carried out and Ida Payne and Mary Spitlar were declared elected.

The minutes were read and approved. Upon motion the meeting adjourned. Closed by singing the Doxology. Benediction by Clara Mow.

CONSTITUTION OF LOCAL SOCIETIES.

Article I. Name: This Society shall be called the Woman's Home and Foreign Missionary Society of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of

Article II. Purpose: The purpose shall be to arouse and give direction to a missionary spirit among the people, to devise lawful means to interest them in missionary work, to put forth systematic efforts to raise money for the support of the gospel at home and in needy places and to do such other work as may be for the good of the souls and bodies of perishing humanity.

Article III. Membership: (1) Active membership in this Society is open to any woman signing these articles of organization and paying into the treasury the sum of \$1 annually.

- (2) Any man may become an honorary member by a payment of the same.
- (3) The item in this article regarding finance may be considered suggestive rather than compulsory.
- (4) Any active member of a local Society is eligible to election to any office in the Society.

Article IV. Meetings: (1) This Society shall, if possible, hold regular monthly meetings.

(2) The annual meeting for the election of officers shall be held the month preceding the Conference Session, and the official year shall begin at the close of said session.

(3) All dues of local societies shall be paid to the Treasurer of the Conference Society, said money to be divided between Home and Foreign Missions as designated by the local Society. Also that at least 25 per cent of all moneys earned to be brought to Conference to be used by the Conference Society.

Article V. Officers: (1) The officers of this Society shall consist of a President, who shall be a member of the Wesleyan Methodist Church; a Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, Work Director, and Superintendent of the Y. M. W. B.

(2) Officers shall be elected annually by ballot.

Article VI. Duties of Officers: (1) The President shall preside at the meetings of the Society and shall have the general oversight of the work.

- (2) In the absence of the President, the Vice-President shall perform the duties of the office.
- (3) The Secretary shall keep a record of members, keep the minutes of all meetings, and make an annual report according to report blanks, to the Conference Society.
- (4) The Treasurer shall receive all monies raised by the Society and remit the same as directed by the Society.
- (5) The Work Director shall have charge of the manual work performed by the Society.
- (6) The Superintendent of the Y. M. W. B. shall be responsible for the organization of bands, shall have general oversight of the band work, and report the same to the Missionary Society. In case no Society exists the Organizer or Conference Superintendent of the Y. M. W. B. shall appoint.

Article VII. Delegates: At the last regular meeting preceding the session of the Annual Conference Society this Society shall elect one person, who, together with the President, shall be the delegates to the Annual Session of the Woman's Home and Foreign Missionary Society of the Conference.

Article VIII. Committees: There shall be a Program Committee and such other Committees as shall be deemed necessary.

Article IX. The Conference Y. M. W. B. year shall close with our Conference year, and the report of local bands be brought to Conference, including a list of paid-up members, so that our State Organizer shall be able to send a complete report to the Connectional Y. M. W. B. Superintendent.

COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS.

We, your Committee on Resolutions, beg leave to submit the following report:

1. We recommend that the Constitution of Local Societies be

printed in the Minutes.

2. Resolved, that \$50 of the Foreign Money be sent to Clara Wilson, Treasurer of the General Conference Society, to be applied on the Dispensary in Africa for which said General Conference So-

ciety has obligated itself.

We recommend that \$100 be appropriated to the India work, whatever part of which is necessary to finish paying for the Oxmobile be expended for that purpose, the remainder to be applied on current expenses. That \$50 of the Home money be sent to the General Conference Treasurer to be applied on the salary of Rev. F. M. Roberts and that his note of \$35, which this Society holds, be cancelled and returned to him. That \$25 be sent to Viola Dickens, teacher in Alabama Mission. That \$25 be appropriated toward the erection of a building for the Industrial feature of the school work at Alabama Mission.

Inasmuch as we have been informed as to the indebtedness of Sister Avery, we recommend that we take steps toward helping to

relieve this indebtedness.

3. We recommend that \$15 of the General Fund be given to the Bible School and that \$10 of the same fund be given Miss Sadie Betz, a licentiate from Bryant, to assist in defraying her expenses in the Bible School.

4. We recommend that a Committee of three be elected who shall confer with the officials of the Bible School in making satisfactory plans for a Missionary program during Commencement week. This Committee is to report during Conference session.

5. We recommend that the following resolution be presented to the Conference: Inasmuch as the General Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America approved of the resolution presented to that body by the W. H. & F. Missionary Society requesting each Annual Conference to show its appreciation of the labors of its Conference Missionary Society by publishing its minutes free of charge, we, the members of the W. H. & F. Missionary Society of the Indiana Annual Conference request that this body ratify the action of the General Conference.

6. We recommend that all money brought to Conference from

the local Societies and Y. M. W. Bands be in the form of bank drafts or checks made payable to the respective Treasurers of the Conference Society and Band Organizer and Treasurer, the names of said officers to be found in the minutes.
