Conference Resolutions

Section I. Conference Officers

1. (a) We shall have a traveling Conference President, who shall receive \$3380.00 annually and house rent. This salary shall be apportioned to the churches and paid by them to the Conference Treasurer, who shall on the first of each month beginning with August 1, each Conference year, forward a check for one twelfth of the amount to him. He shall be required to travel the Conference and counsel and advise with the churches in matters of doctrine, finance, and other affairs that affect the spiritual and temporal welfare of the work. After consulting with the pastors he may confer with the stewards if necessary with the purpose in mind to increase the pastor's salary. He shall visit each church at least once annually.

(b) His traveling expense shall be guaranteed him from the Conference Incidental Fund, at the rate of six cents a mile for automobile travel and actual train and bus fare; also his desk expense and all long distance telephone bills pertaining to his conference work shall be paid from the same fund.

2. (a) The Conference shall be divided into five districts by a line from Sandusky to Portsmouth, and from Union City to Martin's Ferry, with the exception of a central district composed of Licking, Franklin, Morrow, Knox, Delaware and Union Counties.

(b) The Conference Missionary Board shall be composed of the Conference President, the Conference Vice President, the W. M. S. President, and five additional pastors, one from each of the five districts of the Conference. These five members shall be nominated by the Committee on Pastoral Relations, and shall be elected by ballot. In presenting these nominations at least two names shall be submitted from each district.

(c) The Missionary Board shall meet at the beginning of the Conference year to formulate policies and lay general plans for the conduct of the work of Conference Missions during the year. The actual carrying out of these plans shall be in the hands of Executive Committees which in each district shall be composed of the Conference President, the Conference Vice President, and the District man. The full board may meet at any time at the call of the Conference President and the Vice President. Desk expense, telephone calls and mileage or fares incurred in the work of Conference Missions shall be paid from the Conference Missionary Fund.

(d) The five district men, under the direction of the Conference President, shall assist him in his Pioneer duties, and shall organize the pastors in various districts for pioneer work. They shall designate one Sunday as a Pioneer Day, on which day the Pastors shall exchange pulpits to bring a Pioneer Message and raise offerings and pledges for the work.

(e) It shall require a written order of the Board for funds to be paid from the Conference Mission Fund.

(f) The Missionary Board may employ such pastors of the Conference as may be needed for pioneer meetings. Churches are urged to co-operate by granting their pastors a two-week leave of absence with pay, if his services are requested by the Board.

(g) The Missionary Board and the Conference Board of Trustees shall jointly administer the Church Extension Fund.

(h) Activities of the Board, with the amounts of salaries guaranteed and the amounts invested in each project, shall be reported to the Conference annually.

3. The Conference shall elect a Camp Meeting Committee consisting of nine members, five ministerial and four lay to have entire supervision of the Campgrounds, and its improvements and the making of complete arrangements for Camp and Camp Meeting services, and also provide for the entertainment of the Annual Conference. They shall serve for terms of three years. The president of the Conference shall be an ex-officio member of the Camp Meeting Committee and Presiding Officer of the Camp Meeting Session. This Committee shall designate one of its members as Chairman, another as Secretary, and another as Treasurer. Each shall report to the Annual Conference and the report shall be incorporated in the Conference minutes. The Treasurer's report shall be audited. This committee shall advise with the Conference Board of Trustees as to the location, erection, and improvements of Conference buildings on the Campground.

4. It shall be the duty of the Trustees of the Ohio Conference to receive, hold, and dispose of property within the bounds of the Conference as provided in the book of Discipline, paragraph 120, and 384-389. In addition to this they shall also be empowered to act in certain instances as follows:

A. Resolved: the Trustees of the Ohio Conference shall be, and they hereby are, empowered to execute all necessary papers, mortgage deeds and papers of a like character when necessary to secure loans to the Ohio Annual Conference, or to any church within the Conference needing funds to liquidate Conference, church or parsonage indebtedness provided that the party or parties requesting such action shall set forth the true nature and purpose for which the loan is requested, and that both the President and Trustees of said Conference are satisfied that the object for which the loan or loans is sought is both necessary and desirable.

B. Resolved: the Trustees of the Ohio Conference shall be, and they hereby are, empowered to execute all necessary papers, mortgage deeds and papers of like character, when necessary to secure loans for the purpose of purchasing or erecting church or parsonage buildings in the pioneer work of the Conference, provided that the proposed project and the financing of it by means of the proposed loan shall receive the approval of the Conference President, a majority of the total membership of the Missionary Board, and a majority of the total membership of the Board of Trustees.

C. Resolved: the Trustees of the Ohio Conference shall be, and they

hereby are, empowered to sign any or all deeds and papers for the transfer of real property that is now or hereafter may be held in trust by said Trustees, provided the sale of such Conference, church or parsonage, or other real estate has been authorized and approved by the President of the Conference with the concurrence of at least one member of his advisory board.

5. We recommend a standard traveling expense of .06 a mile to the Conference Board of Trustees from the Conference Mission Fund and the Conference Incidental Fund, to the Missionary Board from the Conference Missions Treasury, and to the Camp Meeting Committee from the Camp Meeting Treasury.

6. Resolved: that there be a Church Building Fund to be loaned to the churches for building purposes. This fund to come from the sale of the Fairmount Church, gifts, annuities and the budget item included in Conference Work, said fund to be administered by the Conference Trustees and loaned on notes to be signed by the local trustees. Not more than 20 percent of the fund shall be loaned to any one church unless the calls for loans are such that the trustees find it necessary to grant a larger amount in order to keep the money in use, the interest to be figured at 3 percent for the total length of the loan and paid back at the rate of not less than 1 percent of the total per month. Special short term loans of less than one year can be made at 6 percent interest.

7. (a) The annual Conference shall convene on the fourth Monday of July and continue through the following Sunday.

(b) Camp Meeting shall open with the Friday evening service of Conference week.

(c) The Friday preceeding Conference shall be set aside as a day of prayer for Conference and Camp.

8. All elders and licentiates are required to attend the entire session of Conference. It shall require a vote of Conference to pass the character of any minister who fails in this regard.

9. (a) It is recommended that persons elected as lay delegates to Conference shall be able to attend the entire session.

(b) The Conference Secretary shall provide blanks for Delegate's Credentials, including the following items: certificate of election, address of Delegate, information as to how long the Delegate intends to remain at Conference, the pastor's address and telephone number. These credentials are to be returned in advance of Conference to a Standing Committee on Credentials, appointed by the President.

10. (a) It is required that each pastor obtain from the Conference treasurer a signed statement of all budget monies paid to him. This statement shall agree with the pastor's statistical report, both of which shall be mailed to the chairman of the Statistical Committee not later than July 15th.

(b) The Conference shall omit the reading of the statistical reports by the pastors, and instead the Committee on Statistics shall post on the bulletin board certain items of vital interest, for the instruction of the members of the Conference.

11. (a) The Special Orders of the Conference shall be: Monday Evening, the Conference Sermon; 9:30 a. m. Tuesday, Communion Service;

1:30 p. m. Tuesday, Tithing Secretary's address; Tuesday Evening, Educational Service; 9:30 a. m. Wednesday, Sunday School Secretary; 11:00 a. m. Wednesday, Pioneer Service; 1:30 p. m. Wednesday, election of officers; Wednesday Evening, Denominational Representative; Thursday Evening, Missionary Service conducted by the Women's Missionary Society; Friday, 1:30 p. m. Memorial Service (when necessary); Sunday Morning, ordination service.

(b) The Annual Session of the Ohio W. Y. P. S. Conference shall be held on the fourth Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday in June of each year in connection with a Bible Conference.

12. (a) All persons recommended to Conference and those pursuing the Course of Study, shall appear before the Committee on Itineracy and Orders not later than the second day of Conference.

(b) Examinations shall be taken before a member of the Committee or a person appointed by them. In order to receive credit for the current year, examinations must be taken by July 10.

(c) All persons taking Conference Course of Study shall pay \$1.00 registration fee.

13. The Budget Committee shall assign new churches 25 percent the first year, 50 percent the second year and full budget the third year.

14. (a) The fiscal year for churches shall be from July 1 to June 30. All financial reports shall conform to this schedule.

(b) The Conference Treasurer's books shall close July 8.

15. (a) The Ohio Conference shall be authorized to charge 4 percent on loans to churches from the Superannuated Elder's Fund.

(b) All notes to churches shall be drawn up on the form given in the Minutes of 1940.

Section III. Churches and Pastors.

16. In addition to the duties as outlined in the Discipline, it shall be the responsibility of our pastors to:

(a) Attend all sessions of Camp Meeting.

(b) Remain on the work he is appointed to for the whole Conference year. Any pastor leaving the work during the year shall not have his character passed except by vote of the Conference.

(c) See to it that all funds and receipts from his charge be sent to the Conference Treasurer at least quarterly.

(d) Co-operate with the stewards in notifying non-attending members of their financial responsibilities.

(e) Instruct all local preachers on their charge of disciplinary requirements to study and travel under Conference direction.

(f) Be sure all Conference preachers on their charge have necessary licenses and recommendations.

(g) Return Sunday School Reports monthly to the Sunday School Secretary.

(h) We also recommend that each pastor transfer his membership to the church he is serving.

17. It shall be the responsibility of our churches to:

(a) Pay the moving expense of the in-coming pastor.

(b) Pay pastor's salary for fifty-two weeks per year, beginning with the rise of Conference.

(c) Pay traveling expenses and room and board for pastors and delegates at Conference.

18. No church shall begin or continue in any major building or remodeling program until it has conferred with the Conference Committee on Church and Parsonage Building and Location. The Building Committee of said church shall sign a written agreement, to be acted upon by this Conference Committee. They shall also report monthly in writing to this Conference Committee; the matter of such reports and agreement shall be agreed upon mutually by these two committees concerned.

19. The Committee on Pulpit Supply shall conduct the vote on retaining the pastor not later than June 1st, giving the required two weeks notice in advance. The chairman of the Committee on Pulpit Supply shall immediately inform the Conference President of the results. If the vote is for a change and the pastor so desires, his name shall be placed on the list of available men. The list shall be sent to churches requiring same on or after June 10, and pastors desiring to be included on that list must notify the Conference President by that date.

Section IV. Standards of Practice.

20. We recommend the use of associate or probationary membership for all persons received on confession of faith.

21. We understand paragraph 51 in the Discipline to require that no one be received into membership of our local churches unless they have left off wearing of gold including the wedding ring. Be it further resolved that paragraph 52 regarding modest apparel be strictly adhered to.

22. We require that all workers, preachers and singers on the platform at Conference and Camp Meeting, wear sleeves at least below the elbow, and all their apparel be in accord with the discipline.

These men were elected to their respective offices.

Report No. 1

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE PRESIDENT

Greetings in the good name and grace of our Lord, to the members of the Forty-sixth Annual Session of the Ohio Conference. It is because of the Lord's tender mercies and free grace that we are again permitted to gather here these days to make report of the labors of this past year, and to prayerfully plan for the coming days as the Spirit may lead.

As we review the activities and labors of the past months, a deep feeling of gratitude and love to our Lord for His countless benefits upon our lives and labors wells up within the heart; gratitude also for the loyalty and consideration and prayers of the brethren and sisters of the Conference, both preachers and laymen, as they have faithfully carried on the Lord's work. It has been a delightful privilege to me to be a co-worker with you, in God.

We meet here today at a serious and critical time in the affairs of the nations of the world. War, bloodshed, and the miseries of down-trodden peoples of many places throughout the world have become the circumstance of modern life. A stupifying and deadly pall seems to have settled over the world. The will to rise up and oppose the life-sapping forces of this age is seriously affected. This dissipation of the moral and spiritual energies of our day has already made alarming inroads into the ranks of the professedly Christian Church and its kindred organizations. The struggle today has dropped to the level of human and physical survival and a cry for security from the cradle to the grave. Too few show any anxiety over the question of their soul's eternal interests and security. The overwhelming effect of this age of materialism upon the life of the Church is endangering its spiritual vigor and passion for the winning of souls from the devil's ensnarements and fetters. As those who have been called to be "workers together with God," we need to take heed to ourselves lest our Lord should come and find us asleep and unaware of the entanglements with this vain world. It is our duty and privilege to hold forth the Light to this darkening age.

Our task of carrying forward the work committed to our hands is not an easy one. As we see the onward march of subtle and sinister forces of the coming Antichrist, it does appear that our task will of a certainly become even more exacting and difficult. We are not sufficient of ourselves to even attempt to oppose the forces of evil that confront us. Our sufficiency is of God. The arm of flesh will certainly fail. Through God, "we do not war after the flesh," for the weapons of our warfare are not carnal, but mighty through God to the pulling down of strongholds." It is the tactics of the enemy of souls and of the Church to divide and conquer. We must ever be on our guard to

watch against anything which might mar God's pattern in our midst or occasion a weakening within our ranks, or which might foster a spirit of division and thus grieve our Lord and defeat His purposes. I would repeat here the words I have written on another occasion, "It is our solemn duty and the personal obligations of each of us to ever be on guard against a spirit of disunity, compromise, and complacency within our ranks. Let us strive to ever know the ungrieved presence of the Holy Ghost in our midst."

I have earnestly sought in the fear of God to faithfully care for the spiritual and material interests of the Church, including the local, Conference and general concerns. This year has been one of strenuous labors and tests and at times some perplexing problems. Through it all the Lord has stood by and His good grace has been my constant source of aid and comfort. Praise His name! In the work of the Presidency I visited each of the organized churches in Quarterly Meeting work save one which was cared for by the Vice-President when I was ill. I also visited each of the pioneer projects and made a goodly number of other trips in the interests of Conference work. I held 23 business meetings, preached 121 times, had 8 church dedications and 2 anniversary services, assisted with 2 baptismal services, and attended the Leader's Conference at Miltonvale, Kansas. Rev. Walter McKee, alternate delegate, went in my stead to the N. H. A. Convention at Indianapolis, Ind. From the Conference Treasurer I received \$3380.00 for salary, \$24.65 for desk expense, \$602.54 for travel expense, and \$132.10 for telephone tolls and tax. Cash gifts and donations amounted to \$151.55, funeral fees \$15, wedding fees \$10, and parsonage rent \$480.

On January 4, 1952 there was a loss by death of one of our elders, Mrs. Edith McIntyre, co-pastor with her husband, Rev. Robert McIntyre at Coshocton. A memorial service will be held later in this session to the memory of her saintly life.

I. Appointments, Transfers, Resignations, Withdrawals:

August 3, 1952, As instructed by the Conference last year the President and Advisory Board met with Elder L. A. Smothers regarding his non-attendance at the 1952 session of Conference. His character was passed. The name of H. W. Thompson was also thus submitted. No interview was effected in this case.

Last year two churches were listed as in the hands of the President. With Advisory Board approval these were supplied as follows.

August 10, 1952, Appointed Mrs. Genevieve Wright pastor of Bradford Church.

August 11, 1952, Appointed Kenneth Brannon, Annual Conference preacher of the Allegheny Conference as supply pastor of Zanesville, Park Street Church.

August 28, 1952, Authorization granted Kenneth Brannon, pastor at Zanesville, Park Street Church.

September 20, 1952, Evan Edwards informed me that he had joined another church body and was taking a work in that organization. His name should thus be dropped from the roll of Annual Conference preachers.

September 27, 1952, Renewed Cora Kingery's Letter of Standing.

November 1, 1952, Yorton Clark resigned as pastor of the Athens Church due to ill health. Since that time the church has been supplied by several persons. For a period of several months E. C. Kenney has served as supply pastor.

March 10, 1953, Issued Transfer for W. C. Roberts to the Iowa Conference. Also transferred Deaconess Myrtie Roberts to the Iowa Conference. These names should be dropped from the Conference Roll.

June 10, 1953, Received letter from the pastor of the Dayton, Central Church stating that Mrs. Mary Chandler had withdrawn her membership from the local church and at the same time had sent in her Annual Conference Preacher's credentials and withdrew from the Conference. Her name should be dropped from the Conference Roll.

June 25, 1953, By Conference instruction last year and with the Advisory Board concurring K. M. Lewis was appointed as Chairman of the Auditing Committee and Virgil Snyder as the second member of the Committee. On July 3, 1953, C. O. Scott was appointed as Chairman of this Committee since Brother Lewis declined to serve.

July 7, 1953, Received Transfer of Annual Conference Preacher, Bert Sayre, from the North Carolina Conference. I refer him to the Committee on Itineracy and Orders for examination and classification.

July 25, 1953, Received Transfer of Freddie Kimberlin of the Kentucky Conference. Since he has not as yet submitted the application form required by the Conference I refer him to the Committee on Itineracy and Orders for examination.

II. Church Organizations, Dedications:

November 6, 1952, Organized the pioneer work at Cumberland into a Wesleyan Methodist Church with 8 charter members. John VanCise was appointed as pastor.

June 11, 1953, Organized a church at Nellie, Ohio with 10 charter members. Paul Rexrode, Annual Conference Preacher of the Allegheny Conference was appointed as supply pastor. Plans are under way to construct a 32' X 56' frame building as a place of worship before winter.

July 7, 1953, Organized a Wesleyan Methodist Church of 9 charter members at St. Albans, W. Va. This has been an independent holiness work for several years and has been pastored during this time by its founder, Rev. Bert Sayre. Arrangements are under way to transfer title of the church property to trustees of the Wesleyan Methodist Church.

September 28, 1952, Dedicated a fine concrete block basement church at Piqua. The pastor is Kenneth Martin.

May 31, 1953, Dedication of the Bradford Church Building. Rev. Donald E. Howard, the Vice-President, conducted this service. The faithful labors of Rev. Allen Baker and Rev. Merrill Bagley, former pastors, and their people had brought the building into existence and under the labors of Genevieve Wright the present pastor and her husband much work was done on the interior of the building in getting it ready for the dedication.

July 19, 1953, Under the labors of Rev. Daniel Woodward of the Dayton, Central Church, a beautiful and modest place of worship of concrete block and brick construction in the heart of Dayton has been

erected and is now dedicated. Both pastor and people are to be commended.

July 26, 1953, After many discouraging experiences and adverse circumstances the people at the Zanesville, North Terrace Church have reconditioned and redecorated their building within and stuccoed it without and it is now dedicated. The building is a real asset to the community where it is located. The labors of several pastors have gone into this project. The present pastor is Walter W. Jeffries.

III. Approval given for Evangelistic help, Miscellaneous:

July 31, 1952, To Emmet Moore to use Donald Hostetler and family as singers at St. Mary's.

January 5, 1953, To Dale Duvall to use Lawrence Runkle as evangelist at La Rue.

August 17, 1953, To Bert Anderson to use Miss Isabelle Rollins as youth worker at Chillicothe.

January, 5, 1953. To Walter Lybarger to use R. N. Gleason as evangelist at Mt. Vernon.

January 10, 1953, To Roy Deeter to use B. H. Pugh as evangelist at Whites Chapel.

April 3, 1953, To N. Lee Shultz to use Frank Arthur as evangelist at Westerville.

July 3, 1953, To Allen Baker to use Vaugh Davis as youth worker at Paden City.

October 14, 1952. With majority of Advisory Board concurring authorized sale of Lot N. 4980, located at 445 N. Grand Ave., Marion, Ohio, and small building on lot. Net proceeds from sale to be applied on building costs of new church being erected at Mark and Jefferson Streets.

April, 8, 1953, Gave approval to purchase church building and three lots on Stanton Ave., Lima, Ohio. Report of the Conference Trustees will give further details of this transaction.

June 4, 1953, Recommended to the Conference Trustees sale of the abandoned Curtis Ridge church building and lot located in Noble County. This property was one of the older works in the Conference but has not been functioning as a church for several years. The building is in bad state of repair. Trustees report will give further details of this transaction.

There is one further matter which I should present to you in this report.

For a period of several years our Conference has had listed among its standing resolutions a statement bearing upon the question of the wearing of gold as it relates to the receiving of members into our local churches. This resolution is numbered 21 in the present 1952 edition of the Conference Minutes. During the Wednesday afternoon meeting of the 1952 session of Conference a proposal was made to delete the above resolution and substitute in its place a statement less specific in character and requirements. It was stated by those seeking the change that Resolution 21 created a condition of membership and called in question the right of the Conference to maintain said resolution in its present form. During the consideration of the proposal, I, as chairman of that meeting,

ruled that Resolution 21 does not contravene the rights of our members and thus the proposal was out of order. No member of the Conference took action to reverse the ruling even though opportunity was given to do so.

Under date of August 2, 1952 an appeal signed by two Conference Elders, Brother E. C. Kenney and Brother E. W. Cole, and a lay member of the Conference body, Brother C. E. Knight, was forwarded to the General Conference President at Syracuse, N. Y. for his decision in the matter. Subsequently, under date of September 20, 1952, a ruling was sent out declaring Resolution 21, "to be null and void," and that the appeal was sustained. Later on in the year after much prayerful consideration by several interested brethren from the Conference and elsewhere a committee was formed to give careful study to the whole question involved as to the effect, influence and scope of the ruling handed down relative to Resolution No. 21. It was apparent that the ruling would have far-reaching results not only in our own Conference but likewise throughout the entire Church. We felt pressed to do something about the problem. In counsel with the Advisory Board it was agreed that after further study and prayer and when it was opportune to do so that an appeal should be made to the Board of Review at Syracuse on the question of the ruling that had been handed down. On April 23, 1953 a notice of intent to appeal was sent to the Chairman of the Board of Review stating our purpose. The date of June 19, 1953 was set as the time to meet with the Board to present materials and considerations. The Committee that presented the documents consisted of Rev. D. E. Howard, Rev. D. C. Fisher, Rev. L. D. Wilcox and myself.

No decision on the part of the Board of Review has been forthcoming as yet. The matter is in their hands. They need our prayers for their responsibility is great. Let us likewise pray for one another.

Report No. 2

THE PIONEER MISSIONARY SECRETARY REPORT TO ANNUAL CONFERENCE

Mr. President, Pastors and Delegates of the Ohio Conference assembling here in annual session at Victory Camp Grounds.

It is by the Grace of God that we once more bring to you a report of the official actions of the Conference Missions Board, elected by the Annual Conference one year ago, together with a complete financial report.

As always, there are both good things to report, and, things not considered so good; and so it is with this report.

There was left under the direction of the C. M. B. at the close of last Conference five organized churches and seven mission points. The organized churches were, Bellaire, Dayton (Hyde Park), Mt. Vernon, Wooster and Zanesville (North Terrace). The Mission points were, Ashland, Cumberland, Hocversen Hts. (near Follansbee, W. Va.), Marion

N. G. Ave., S. W. Sharon, So. Zanesville, and Wapakoneta.

We shall first report on those things which we consider to be of a less appetizing nature. We shall also leave the mentioning of monies expended at each place to the financial report, and thus avoid too much duplication in reporting.

Very soon after last Conference the C. M. B. felt it wise to discontinue the work at Ashland, O. and the Secretary so notified Rev. Roy Lemons, pastor in charge, who graciously complied with these instructions.

On Aug. 31, at the expiration of our lease at Hooverson Hts., near Follansbee, W. Va., the Board felt it wisest not to renew said lease, or to continue the work in that place. The attendance remained small, very small in spite of the fact that Rev. James Myers, pastor in charge, worked diligently and very hard.

On Dec. 23, acting upon the request of Rev. Thomas Lentz, whom we had placed in charge of the Mission at Wapakoneta, O., we went to that city and after hearing Rev. Lentz and Rev. Emmett A. Moore (who had pastored this Mission before Rev. Lentz) relative to the status of the work, and the inadvisability of continuing, and having considerable knowledge of the work myself, we ordered the place closed immediately.

We feel it would be unfair to Rev. and Mrs. Lentz not to mention how hard they worked, and how faithful they were to this their first appointment, trying to make this work a success. They worked and supported themselves; they put in many long hours redecorating the Chapel, and spent much of their own money for materials needed. Indeed, we feel they did over and above what was asked of them, or expected.

On Jan. 30, with the aid of our Conference President we moved the equipment from the Wapakoneta Chapel, and had the lease canceled.

And now, looking at the better part of the report, we shall first report on the other churches and missions left under the direction of the C. M. B.

Dayton, Hyde Park: This church has made remarkable progress in every way, and has had very little, if any advice from the C. M. B. We recommend they be left no longer under the Board's direction.

Mt. Vernon: This is one of the churches organized last year. They are doing very well, and have had no further help from the Board since that body paid off its obligation of \$1,200.00 to them. We recommend they no longer be left under direction of the C. M. B.

Wooster: This work has had an increase in Sunday School attendance, both otherwise remains about the same.

Zanesville, North Terrace: This church has been given assistance both from the C. M. B. and the Church Extension funds, which we believe has been a means of stabilizing them, and the future looks brighter. When a housing problem arose immediately after last Conference for the pastor, the C. M. B. purchased a house trailer for \$1200.00 and parked it in the rear of the church to serve as parsonage.

Bellaire: It is our opinion that this is one of the strongest little churches in the Conference. The work is new, and has not grown fast, but is definitely growing in every way. At present they are searching for a suitable place to build, and hope to be in a building of their own

by next Conference time.

Cumberland Mission: It was our happy privilege to help organize this place into a Wesleyan Methodist Church last Nov. 6. We gave some financial assistance in buying property, but since organization they have carried on without assistance or oversight by the C. M. B.

Marion, N. G. Ave.: This work was placed under the supervision of Rev. John Woodward, pastor of the Silver St. Church in Marion. Soon after taking this work over, Bro. Woodward saw the need in the North Grand Ave. area, and was so burdened about it that he petitioned the C. M. B. to allow the Silver St. Church to promote a new building program on a different street, but in the same area, for this needy part of town. The C. M. B. gave consent, and the Silver St. Church contributed more than \$1,200.00 toward this worthy project. At this writing the new building is well under construction. The people, along with their pastor of the Silver St. Church, are to be highly commended for their interest in the spiritual welfare of this part of their city, and for their liberality toward a permanent improvement for the people of that area. Rev. Woodward was also authorized to negotiate the sale of the present property on North Grand Ave.

South West Sharon: This place continues in good fashion under the leadership of their pastor, the Rev. F. A. Taylor. It is our hope that these people will become an organized church before Conference time next year.

South Zanesville: Rev. Chester Demint was appointed pastor here immediately after Conference. They have enjoyed a good year, and this is another Mission point that should be organized before another Conference.

Besides the new organization at Cumberland, there have been two other churches organized this year.

On the night of June 12, our Conference President organized a society at the little town of Nellie, O. The need in this community was realized by some of our Coshocton Church people about one year ago. Rev. Robert McIntyre supervised, and acted as pastor, and in August they launched a tent meeting using Rev. Melvin Mitchell as Evangelist. Since then they have met part time in the local school house, and part time at the home of Brother and Sister Hartel. The C. M. B. approved their buying lots on which to build. They now have a pastor, Rev. Paul Rexrode, of the Allegheny Conference. The C. M. B. has not been put to any expense for this new work at Nellie, thanks to the folk who were interested in getting a church there.

St. Albans, W. Va.: This is a contact which we made a little over two years ago. Recently Rev. Bert Sayre, pastor and founder of a Mission in St. Albans, contacted our Conference President and requested the Mission be organized into a Wesleyan Methodist Church. Brother Stratton in turn contacted the Pioneer Secretary and we proceeded to St. Albans on Tuesday July 7, where we met the people, and organized with seven charter members that night, and leaving the charter open about two weeks for the benefit of those who were not present, but would be coming in later. On Saturday July 11, the Pioneer Secretary went again to St. Albans and received two more members into the church,

and held their election of officers for them. As each one was interviewed relative to membership, he gave a real impressive testimony to full salvation, belief in high standards, and desire for the faith once delivered unto the saints. They have a fine Sunday School which is running around 90 at the present time.

Bro. and Sister Sayre who came to St. Albans quite a number of years ago and started this work, gathering together a congregation, and erecting a church building, are to be commended for their gracious liberality in turning every thing over to the Ohio Conference. May God bless Bro. and Sister Sayre, and also this our newest church is our prayer.

On March 24, we granted permission to the Allegheny Conference to proceed with a new work at Sherrodsville, O. which is within the Ohio Conference area.

March 25, we officially took under direction of the C. M. B. the independant work at Lima, O. which Rev. J. E. Davidson has been pastoring.

Wednesday April 8, at a special meeting at Lima, O. we recommended purchase of a Baptist Church building in Lima, by the group pastored by Rev. Davidson. We also voted in favor of loaning the group \$500.00 from Conference Missions funds as an aid to making this purchase.

Last February we made some contacts in Toledo, O. and prospects were looking good for an opening in that city. A little later we were informed by our General Conference President that we were trespassing in the area of another Conference. We had understood that this was neutral territory between the two Conferences. Since that time we have tried to do nothing further in that area; but, we do most earnestly ask this Conference to instruct their delegates to the next session of General Conference to have the three border line counties of Williams, Fulton and Lucas, placed within the boundaries of the Ohio Conference where they rightfully belong.

Pledges for the support of the Pioneering Department of the Conference on last Pioneer Sunday made our hearts leap with joy for the generous financial response to the efforts put forth that day. The total pledged amounted to \$11,213.30. That represents the greatest pledge this Conference ever made to this arm of the Kingdom of God. I say praise the Lord!

Not only did the Conference pledge greater than ever before to this work, they also paid greater than ever before. Our Conference Treasurer reports to me that \$10,503.36 has come in on these pledges, this is better than 93 percent. A wonderful, and magnificent piece of work indeed. I say, "Hats off to the Ohio Conference!"

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

To Ohio Conference Youth:

God has again favored us by granting the privilege of meeting with other Christian young people on Victory Campground. Truly, the past year has been one of blessing in the Conference Youth Work and it has been a delight to serve you in this capacity. Although there is much room for improvement in our overall Youth program, we have seen some definite progress in many ways throughout the year. Last year's camp seemed to get our young people off to a good start spiritually and many have moved into a deeper experience of grace than they have ever known before. It is our prayer that this current camp will see some spiritual victories which shall stand the test of the day and continue triumphant.

We have endeavored to promote the Youth Work by keeping in contact with both Pastors and Local Presidents and have handled several hundred pieces of mail in this connection. We have traveled over 3800 miles in the interest of the Youth department and have engaged in the following activities:

1. Held a consultation period with various District Chairmen on the Campground at last camp meeting time. The purpose was to acquaint such leaders with the year's program.

2. I have spoken at rallies in the East Central, Southwest, Northern, Central, Northwest, and Eastern Districts and visited a rally in the Oakfield District.

3. It was a privilege to present the interests of our department and organize two new societies at Dayton, Miami Shores and Cumberland. Both groups constitute a fine addition to our growing membership.

4. I have met the Conference Executive Council in 3 sessions—one being held at Westerville and two at Sunbury.

5. I attended three meetings of the Area Youth Council, two of which were in connection with other gatherings.

PLAN OF WORK

A. General Items

We recommend:

7. That the local societies inquire into the needs of the Home Mission Stations and Orphanage before sending used clothing, with no monetary value placed on same but that such boxes be reported merely as to the number sent; that boxes of new merchandise be reported as to monetary value, and that the sending society evaluate the same, the voucher of evaluation signed by the missionary to be forwarded to the Conference W. M. S. Treasurer for proper receipting.
8. That we contribute toward the Women's Institute in Africa as the needs are presented, suggesting large sized quilt blocks, simple or easy patterns on pillow cases, etc. for beginning sewers.
9. That stress be placed upon Personal Evangelism with special

emphasis upon the other races in local communities, especially the Jew and the Negro.

10. That each society member participate in the Reading Course.

11. That a special membership drive be conducted as soon after Conference as possible with each society endeavoring to be a "Hold Fast" Society and gain as many new recruits as possible; also urging in those societies where no Men's Fellowship is organized, that we make an all out effort to gain them for Honorary members of the W. M. S.

B. Financial Items

We recommend:

1. That each society pay annually an equivalent of \$.25 per active member to be used as a General Administrative Fund. (Non-Budget) x 5.25

8. The continued use of Thank Offering boxes especially for aiding in raising Home Missionary funds. (Budget) x

9. That we contribute to the Australia Fund. (Budget) x 6.75

10. That each society continue the Christmas offering for the Mexican Mission, the amount of not less than \$1.00 to be sent to the Conference W. M. S. Treasurer by Dec. 1. (Non-budget)

11. That we continue to pay to the Edna Taylor Fund. x 10.00

12. That systematic giving to the Day Fund be continued, with the understanding that if the present status changes, the funds are at the disposal of the Conference W. M. S.

13. That each society contribute \$1.00 to the Dormitory Incidentals Fund. x 10.00

14. The prompt payment of Local Society Pledges made at Conference.
