JOURNAL OF DAILY PROCEEDINGS

The seventy-fourth annual session of the Kansas Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Connection (or Church) of America assembled in the Conference Tabernacle at Miltonvale, Kansas, at 10 a. m., Tuesday, August 1, 1944, with the President in the chair.

Rev. W. S. Hotchkiss made earnest remarks upon "The Spiritual Morale that God wants for His People." Reading Acts 2:1-4, he urged upon Pentecost realities. Alice Boyd led in singing "All Hail the Power of Jesus Name." Rev. Glen Cockcroft led in prayer.

The roll was called. 46 Elders, 8 Conference Preachers, and three honorary enrollees answered present.

Credentials—The secretary of the Nominating Committee presented the names of 55 Delegates-elect, their credentials having been duly examined. The partial report was adopted and the Delegates-elect were seated. See Conference Roll.

Gerald Carry and George Sundstrom were elected Committee on Credentials. They presented the names of 6 more Delegates-elect. On motion, the delegates were seated.

This committee also presented a recommendation from the Wesley Center Church that Lorraine Mitchell be received to travel under the direction of the Conference. It was also recommended by the Wesley Center Church that Arnold Larue be received preparatory to travel. On motion these were referred to the Committee on Itineracy and Orders.

Memorial to Congress—The special committee of C. Floyd Hester, Lorin Miller and Mrs. Pearl Davidson elected to frame a memorial to the National Congress and the Kansas State Legislature, presented the following.

National—The Kansas Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church in annual session at Miltonvale, Kansas, August 5, 1944, sets forth the following resolutions as registering the attitude of this assembly toward the liquor traffic and kindred evils as operating in the United States and elsewhere among the armed forces of our Army, Navy and Air Corps:

Whereas, our nation is in an all-out war, that demands the very best in manhood and efficiency of the men in service, and the greatest possible efforts of all in civilian life if our nation is to win the war; and

Whereas, the use of alcoholic liquors causes inefficiency, waste and loss in man-hours both in services and industries, and;

Whereas, it is a scientific fact that alcoholic beverages are detrimental to the physical and moral well-being of our people; and

Whereas, the failure of our Army and Navy authorities to restrict the sale and use of alcoholic liquors in our Army and Navy camps and adjacent territory has brought a condition greatly deplored; and

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Whereas, the manufacture, sale and distribution of alcoholic liquors consumes men, munitions, and materials urgently needed for the prosecution of the war effort; and

Whereas, the reaction of the nerve force and endurance qualities through the use of tobacco by our armed forces impairs the accuracy, and impedes the progress of the offensive of war; and

Whereas, social disease as a result of the accessible places of vice near our army camps constitutes a great menace to our fighting forces, in the destruction of brain and brawn; therefore be it

Resolved, that we call upon the President and the Congress of the United States to declare a state of emergency and pass necessary legislation to forbid the manufacture and sale of alcohol liquors except for medicinal and scientific purposes for the duration of the war, and be it further

Resolved, that the government regulations of tobacco advertising prohibit: First, the use of pictures or portraits of women in both civilian and military life, and the use of pictures or portraits of men in the armed service; in tobacco displays whether on billboards or in periodical advertising, and Second, prohibit the advertising of tobaccos over the radio; and be it further

Resolved, that vice-districts in the region of army camps be entirely eliminated.

State—The Kansas Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America in annual session at Miltonvale, Kansas, August 5, 1944, adopted the following resolutions as setting forth the attitude of the Ministers and Delegates of this assembly on the liquor question in Kansas:

Whereas, the Kansas State Constitution specifies that, "The manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors shall be forever prohibited in this state, except for medical and mechanical purposes." (As amended, 1880); and

Whereas, 436,688 Kansans (over 89,000 majority-voted in 1934 to retain this prohibition measure in our state constitution; therefore, be it

Resolved, that we call upon the Governor and the state legislature of the State of Kansas, in session beginning January, 1945, to repeal the malt beverage act passed by the Legislature in 1937 and to enact a law formally defining intoxicating loquors as those containing more than one-half of one per cent of alcohol.

When the Conference in its last session decided to put someone in the field under the Missionary Board to serve as pioneer worker and to hold quarterly meetings when not on new fields or assisting the weaker charges, we were willing to assume such a responsibility while the experiment was in its initial stages.

The year has passed. The results of this experiment or venture are up for examination. It is impossible to put all the results in this report, but here are some of the activities.

We have entered three new fields. The first was Chanute, Kansas, where we labored in two meetings for several weeks. Eight weeks were given to the field in Mound City, Missouri. Five weeks were given to Paola, Kansas.

The fields in Chanute and Paola are promising. Some advancement is being made. While efforts in Mound City yielded no definite results, Chanute is moving towards an organization and Paola is open with a nice church and parsonage awaiting workers.

We assisted in five meetings, held thirty-five Quarterly Meetings, and preached 197 times. Miles traveled by car, 3,042; by train, 2,622; by bus, 1954; Total 7,618.

COMMITTEE ON BOUNDARIES

We, your Committee on Boundaries, wish to make the following recommendations:

That the new church at Topeka be known as the Oakland Wesleyan Methodist Church.

That the Conference be divided into six districts as follows:

District 2—Manhattan, Clay Center, Wesley Chapel, Bethany Chapel, Abilene, Antioch, Miltonvale, Salina, Idana.

District 3—Concordia, Hall, Belleville, New Hope, Morgan Chapel, Heber, Hollis, Union Valley, Greenleaf.

District 4—Wichita First, West Side, Wichita Seneca Street Mission, Hopewell, Grace Chapel, Hutchinson, Arkansas City, Chanute.

District 5—Mankato, Wesley Center, Hardy, Red Cloud, Formoso.

District 6—Cedar, Gaylord, Phillipsburg, Iowa Union, Inglewood, Naponee, Englewood, Colorado.

MORAL REFORM

We, your Committee on Periodicals and Moral Reform, admonish you as God did Isaiah, "Cry aloud and spare not, lift up your voice like a trumpet," against the lethargy and indifference to the moral standards of God's Word and our church.

In past generations the people of our churches looked upon

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the sins of the day with scorn. They were driven to prayer until God came. Today, the present sins have become so commonplace some hardly give them a thought. We admonish our pastors, evangelists and Christian workers to "Cry aloud and spare not" against the little things which sap the spiritual life from the church. As a rule our laity will hold no higher standards than our leaders. It behooves us to lift up the standards of our church before our people. "Remove not the ancient landmarks which our fathers have set."

"Be not conformed (or made like) to this world, but be ye transformed (in Christ)". Our Disciple says, "Our dress should publicly commit us to the maintenance of our Christian profession wherever we may be." When our women make their dresses too short, have permanents, wear sheer hose and toeless shoes, are we not conforming to this world? We reaffirm our position on jewelry, including the engagement and wedding ring, as being contrary to I Tim. 2:9, 10. Then note the professed Christian mothers clothing their children immodestly, putting on them half socks, sun-suits, scanty dresses and slacks, concerning which God says, "It is an abomination unto Me." (Deut. 22:5) Are we as Christian workers and followers of Christ endorsing such as this by failing to "cry aloud and spare not"?

We stress the need of more family religion. Christian parents should feel the responsibility of getting their children saved and sanctified. It is not enough to know our doctrines, but there must be a personal experience. Each generation must evangelize itself, or it will be said as was said of Israel after the death of Joshua. "There arose another generation which knew not the Lord." Let us earnestly pray for the salvation of our families. Let us pray further that the manifestation of God in revivals will not be history to our children.

"Remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy." Many do as they desire and heed not God's command. If we break it we are guilty. "Seek ye first the kingdom of God and his righteousness." If God's professed followers obey these two commands, we will have better Sunday Schools and church services. We speak against parents letting their children go home after Sunday School without being in the church services. God says "Forsake not the assembling of yourselves together." The downfall of every nation is hinged on this evil. Isaiah 58:13, 14.

We should take our stand and instruct our young people against the evil in the use of tobacco in any form, the so-called soft drink Coca Cola, alcoholic beverages including beer, ferment-

ted wine and fermented cider. Let us faithfully follow our Disciplinary admonition of Section 58, under Special Rules. An examination of the political organization of the present day would convince the Christian citizen that consistency would cause him to affiliate with the Prohibition Party to help it organize and grow.

Let us also remember that card-playing, dance halls, movies and worldly parties destroy the spiritual morale of our young people, and result in lowering the standards of the church. All social gatherings should be supervised by the pastor.

Our church publications cannot be substituted without serious loss. Other holiness literature should come second. We give too much place to Sunday newspapers which fill the minds of our young people with comics. Satan sees to it that this portion of the paper finds lodgment in their minds. Let us choose safe reading for our children.

Let us as professed people of God go forth on our knees in intercessory prayer. Let us "cry aloud and spare not," that deeper spirituality may be ours.

STATISTICAL GLEANINGS

The work of the past year is completed. Only eternity can reveal the full record of accomplishment for Christ and His cause; however, some marks of advancement can be noted as we review our labors. Your statistical committee has prepared a full report for future reference. The following report includes gleanings which are of especial interest:

Fifty churches reported. A total of 688 Wesleyan subscriptions (657 last year); 509 Missionary Magazines (429 last year); and 266 Young Peoples' Journal subscription (249 last year) was reported.

There were 205 members received, making the present membership 1605 (increase of 70). A total of 341 family altars, 1065 tithers was reported. There were 49 Sunday Schools reporting with a total average attendance of 2200 (2040 last year). The grand total in the Sunday Schools stands at 4228; 529 Vacation Bible School Scholars were reported.

There are a total of 44 church buildings and 39 parsonages with a total valuation of \$199,400.00. The indebtedness stands at \$19,378.15, having decreased \$7,484.24 the past year. The follow-

ing churches cleared the indebtedness from their property: Abilene, \$3,950.00; Hardy, \$500.00; Leavenworth, \$50.00; Phillipsburg \$1,700.00; Victor \$168.00. The total insurance on all church property is \$74,900.00.

The total pastors' salary paid was \$41,812.91, a gain of \$5945.91. The yearly average paid per pastor was \$836.25 (weekly average \$16.08).

The Budget was overpaid \$1688.82 (111%). Percentages of budget items raised are: Foreign Missions, 147 percent; Hephzibah Orphanage, 117 percent; Connectional Home Missions 113 percent; Education 102 per cent; Kansas Conference Missions, 102 percent; Camp Maintenance, 100 percent; Conference Fund 99 percent; Connectional Sunday School 94 percent; Superannuate 94 percent. A total of 40 churches paid a full budget, while 37 overpaid.

The total for all purposes was \$134,965.96, an average of \$84.09 per member. We thank God for His manifest blessings during this Conference year.

RESOLUTIONS

1. Evangelistic Help. Resolved, That the Camp Meeting and Campground Committee be authorized, if they see fit to do so, to engage evangelistic help for the Camp Meeting two years in advance.

2. Election of Conference Officers. Resolved, That the election of Conference Officers be held on the second day of Conference at 9:00 a. m.

3. Subscription Lists. Resolved, That all subscription lists and monies raised at Conference for all purposes be put through the hands of the Treasurers of the Conference, the W. H. & F. M. S., or the Camp Meeting committee, and that said Treasurers furnish the Conference President with a copy of the subscription lists which they hold that he may furnish each pastor a list of subscriptions from his charge.

4. Sanctity of God's House. Resolved, That such work as making quilts and disposing of the same be performed in the homes of the people and not in the houses erected for public worship.

5. Pastor's Moving Expenses. Resolved, That the class hiring a minister shall within ten days after his arrival pay to him his moving expenses, this not to be applied on his salary.

6. Reporting All Offerings to Pastors. Resolved, That all monies be reported to the Pastors for entry on their Statistical Report in order to give due credit both to the Charge and to the Conference.

7. Unleavened Bread. Resolved, That it be the sense of this Conference that all our churches use unleavened bread in the administration of the Lord's Supper. We suggest the following recipe: One-third cup flour, 1 teaspoon butter (heaping), moisten with milk enough to roll. Mark in $\frac{1}{2}$ inch squares and bake as pie dough. The above will serve 50 persons.

8. Pastor Nominates Steward. Resolved. That it be the sense of this Conference that the pastor be granted the privilege of nominating one member to the Board of Stewards from each church on his charge.

9. President's Duties. Resolved, That the Conference Presidents shall, First, travel the Conference and hold one-half of the Quarterly Meetings. Second, urge the proper repair and insurance of church property. Third, call a meeting of the Board of Stewards and help arrange a workable financial plan for that church.

10. Vacations. Resolved, That the Conference President be granted a vacation over two Sundays that the greater part of three weeks might be taken if desired, and that he be given two weeks' pay in addition to his regular salary at the time he chooses for vacation.

Resolved, That we recommend that each charge grant their pastor a one Sunday leave of absence from his work, that the greater part of two weeks might be used for vacation and that the Church give him one week's pay in addition to his regular salary at the time he may choose for vacation.

11. Nominating Committee. Resolved, That we elect a Committee of five elders, including the President ex-officio, and three delegates-elect, from three churches designated by the Conference to: First, examine all credentials that are in the hands of the committee at the time of its first meeting. Second, nominate all sessional committees and be prepared to report at first session of Conference. Third, nominate the personnel of all Conference Boards and report at an early session of the Conference. Fourth, nominate the Committee Chairmen for next year. Fifth, nominate the District Chairman.

12. Theological Institute. Resolved, That the traveling expenses of instructors to and from the Institute be paid from the Conference Fund, and also such books as may be needed for Institute work.

13. Superannuate Service. Resolved, That one public service in each Annual Conference Session be set aside in honor of the Superannuate Ministers and for the purpose of creating interest in the Superannuate Fund, and that it be the duty of the Second Vice-President to arrange for such a service.

14. Superannuate Constitution. Resolved, That the Constitution of the Kansas Superannuate Association be printed in the Conference Minutes once in five years, and that a note be carried regularly in the Resolutions stating the year of last publication. (Published in 1943 Minutes.)

15. I Per Cent Assessment. Resolved, That we require all active ministers to pay 1 per cent of their cash salary to the Superannuate Fund, this not to be applied on the Budget.

16. Conference Loans. Resolved, That the Conference Treasurer shall issue no loans from any Conference monies except by sanction of the Conference Board of Trustees.

17. Additional Delegates. Resolved, That when more than one Delegate from any one church presents credentials to this body, there shall appear in the credentials the name of the Elder that entitles the church to the additional Delegate.

18. Fiscal Year. Resolved, That the fiscal year of the local church close ten days before Conference and that the statistical report be made on the basis of money received up to that time. That the pastors mail immediately to the Conference Treasurer the completed Statistical Report and budget receipts, who shall check them and give them to the Statistical Chairman, who shall then be prepared to report at an early session of Conference.

19. Pastor Paid Through Conference. Resolved, That the church's financial obligation to the pastor, whether he be leaving the field or not, be extended throughout the Conference and Camp Meeting period.

20. Orders of the Day Committee. Resolved, That the Camp Meeting and Campground Committee be permanently the Committee on Orders of the Day, to prepare ahead of time the Conference Program for publication in the "Visitor."

21. Election of Conference Treasurer. Resolved, That the election of the Conference Treasurer be held following the reading of the Treasurer's annual report, rather than at the time of the election of the other officers of the Conference.

22. Camp Meeting Committee. Resolved, That the President of the W. Y. P. S. be a member ex-officio of the Camp Meeting Committee.

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23. Trustees Authorized. Resolved, That all actions heretofore taken by the Trustees of the Annual Conference in the interim between the meetings of such Annual Conference concerning the purchase or conveyance of real estate are hereby approved and confirmed and held to be as binding upon the Annual Conference as they would have been if such actions had been specifically authorized by the Annual Conference.

Resolved, That the duly elected and qualified Trustees of the Annual Conference are hereby authorized and directed to take such necessary actions as to them may seem proper and expedient and to the best interests of the Annual Conference and the Local Churches concerning the purchase, sale, mortgaging and conveyance of real estate during the interim between the meetings of the Annual Conference and all such actions so taken by the Trustees shall be deemed to be legal and binding upon the Annual Conference and as of full force and effect as they would have been if such actions on the part of said Trustees had been specifically authorized by the Annual Conference.

24. Introduction of New Business. Resolved, That all introduction of new business of such a nature as to require an election must not be presented later than Thursday noon of Conference.

25. Installation of Officers. Resolved, That all Conference Officers continue in office until the close of the annual session of the Conference when there shall be an installation service held, for the installation of the officers as are to appear in the Conference Minutes; this service to be arranged by the Pastoral Relations Committee.

26. Pastors Released for Meetings. Resolved, That we earnestly request each of our churches to release its pastor for one meeting of three weeks length to be held on a new field or on one of the weaker charges under the direction of the Missionary Board, and that the church pay his salary during his absence.

MORAL REFORM

We find from the study of God's Word that His chosen people fell into carelessness, first because they did not take time to be holy, and then they began to desire to be like other people. They failed to cast out the enemies that God had told them to utterly destroy and as a result, again and again, they fell into terrible bondage.

Similarly, many people today desire to look like others, first excusing, then condoning the appearances, the conversation and practices of the world, but I John 2:15 reads, "Love not the world, neither the things that are in the world. If any man love the world, the love of the Father is not in him. Let our adorning be the hidden man of the heart, our conversation and activities be such as becometh children of God. "For the Lord taketh pleasure in his people; he will beautify the meek with salvation." Ps. 149:4.

May our Wesleyan Methodist homes speak of the One whom we serve. May they be neat, clean, but modestly furnished. Let

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us sift from our magazine racks and library tables such questionable magazines and story papers as introduce the deeds of sin and the movies into our homes and see that only our religious papers or other clean, wholesome reading material is placed before our children and before any who may be entertained or chance into our homes. Let us earnestly seek to glorify God also with the songs and music used and seen on our pianos.

There is a tide of irreverence sweeping through our churches today from the pulpit to the pew that is bringing disastrous results to our services and we fear, greatly grieving the Spirit of our God. While it is most noticeable among the children in their behavior during services, we find among the adults a tendency to irreverence in visiting before services, entering service during prayer to the extent of disturbing those praying, whispering and holding consultations during prayer and song services. In Ecclesiastes 5:1 this admonition is given: "Keep thy foot when thou goest to the house of God, and be more ready to hear, than to give the sacrifice of fools; for they consider not that they do evil". Older children and even young people visit and read Sunday school literature during the services. We believe this is displeasing to God and is bringing a reproach upon our churches.

When asked what impressed him most on a certain visit to the United States, the Prince of Wales replied, "The beautiful manner in which the parents obey the children." Let us be diligent in curbing this inflow of irreverence by encouraging family grouping in services, speaking in subdued voices before and after services, teaching our children that rigid punishment will be administered for misbehavior in church and that God's house is a place of true worship and reverence.

These are days when most of us are prospering financially. There is a temptation to self indulgence and unnecessary spending but may we as true followers of Jesus practice self-denial by refraining from excess spending for such items as Coco-Colas, soft drinks and various confections. Let us be true stewards of the money God has entrusted to us, always keeping in mind the furtherance of the kingdom of Christ. May we be faithful in holding the standards of His Word high, always remembering that we are to walk through this world as living epistles of His love and grace.

PLAN OF WORK

Y. M. W. B. STATISTICAL REPORT

We, the Committee on Plan of Work, hereby recommend:

Division 1. Local Work

1. That this Plan of Work be reviewed quarterly in each Local Society.

2. That we observe at least four of the "Red Letter Days":

A. Harvest Home Day, October 13. We urge each Society to send cash or donations to the Harvest Home committee to receive credit on the Educational Budget.

B. Easter—Programs and offerings for Home Missions Connectionally supported.

C. The World Day of Prayer—We recommend that the District Organizers make definite plans for the observance either by District or Local Societies.

D. May Day—To be known as gift day, gifts of clothing, money, or other articles such as can be sent out with outgoing missionaries or used on the home fields.

Before sending donations please secure information concerning proper addresses. (See Magazine Directory).

E. Wesleyan Missionary Day.

3. That each Society elect annually a Magazine Solicitor to secure new subscriptions and renewals.

4. That each Society establish a circulating Missionary Library and thereby stimulate the reading of Missionary books; and that a record of books read be kept by each reader on Work Chart in Program Booklets.

(Note—Library to be in hands of a librarian elected by the Society. Allow no books to become part of library which have not first been approved by Pastor of the Church and President of W. H. & F. M. S.)

5. That we recommend the use of a monthly envelope system for the collection of dues, the Treasurer to keep record of the amounts paid in.

6. That all local dues be sent to our Missionary Treasurer, Mrs. Bertha Wilson, 647 Watson Ave., Topeka, Kansas. One-half of the same to be applied on Missionary Budget. Please designate specifically where this credit is desired. (See Treasurer's book, Item C under Number 4.) Honorary membership dues apply on Missionary Budget.

7. That all money be disbursed through our Local and Conference W. H. & F. M. S. Treasurers. That all money or receipts applying on budget be sent from the local W. H. & F. M. S. Treasurer to the Conference W. H. & F. M. S. Treasurer quarterly.

That this money should be in the hands of the Conference Treasurer at least two weeks before Conference.

8. That each Society contribute 5 cents per active member to pay General Conference Delegates expenses.

9. That each Society contribute at least \$6.00 for Home Missions Connectionally supported.

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10. That an effort be made by each Society to secure subscriptions to the Card Call Plan either by individuals or by Societies.

11. That we urge each Society to contribute at least \$5.00 to the Hephzibah Orphanage, except in cases where the church budget is less than \$5.00.

12. That each Society be responsible for the raising of \$1.00 or more for the new W. H. & F. M. S. and W. Y. P. S. Tabernacle.

13. That each local President appoint a committee whose duty shall be to contact the sick in person or by correspondence and to work in harmony with the pastor in rendering assistance that will help in reaching souls and building up the Kingdom of God.

That the President of each local Society be made responsible to arrange with the pastor for one evening of the third week each month to pray especially for mission work, the same to be preceded by a day of fasting. We also recommend that an offering be taken at each of these services as follows:

A. September for The Missouri Avenue Hope Mission.

B. October and November for Education.

C. December for Orphanage.

D. January and February for Kansas Conference Missions.

E. March and April for Home Missions.

F. May, June and July for Foreign Missions.

15. That in harmony with the recommendation of the General Society we urge that our ladies observe Friday of each week as a day of fasting and prayer for a Connection-wide revival until it comes.

16. That we use material printed in the Wesleyan Missionary, also the new study book, "Miracles in Black" in our regular meeting.

17. That the annual report be prepared by the President, Secretary and Treasurer of the local Society, which serves as an audit of the Treasurer's report. One copy to be sent to Committee on Statistics, Ruby Anderson, 410 Monroe Street, Topeka, Kansas, two weeks before Conference. The duplicate to be brought to Conference by the Delegate. Place the name of the President for the coming year on the back of the report blank.
