CONFERENCE RESOLUTIONS

- 1. All Statistical reports shall be filed with the Statistical Committee no later than the second day of Conference.
- 2. Pastors shall equalize the amounts required for Budget before overreaching any one item, and it shall be the pastor's duty to inform his people at the beginning of the year concerning the amount to be raised and he shall at once proceed to raise the amount assessed his charge.
- 3. Inasmuch as the work of the Conference demands the attention and attendance of all its Elders and Licentiates, therefore we will not employ as pastor or evangelist any Elder or Licentiate or pass the character of any Elder or Licentiate except by vote, who does not attend the entire session of Conference. The Committee on Pastoral Relations shall not give employment to any preacher who does not meet the requirements of this standing rule, without bringing his excuse before the Conference for its action in the matter.
- 4. Any minister accepting work on a charge at the hands of this Conference who resigns or abandons it before the year is out without a good excuse or lawful reason, shall be considered by said Conference and it shall take a vote of Conference to pass his character.
- 5. Inasmuch as the work of the Conference demands the attendance of Delegates as well as preachers, therefore we discourage the election of any person as Delegate to Conference who does not intend to attend the entire session. Information of the Delegate's intentions shall be incorporated in their credentials.
- 6. We recommend that each church pay two dollars towards the board of each Delegate and pastor at Conference, said amount to be sent with the Delegate's credentials. Also that each church pay the traveling expenses to and from Conference.
- 7. The Secretary shall prepare blanks for Delegate's credentials, including the statement required by the last resolution. Said blanks are to be mailed to the pastors shortly before Conference, and when filled out by them to be sent to the Chairman of a Standing Committee on Credentials if possible, in order that they may be able to report immediately after the opening of Conference. Said committee shall be composed of two members appointed by the President.
- 8. The Secretary shall send a statistical blank to the clerk of each charge having no pastor, requesting that the same be filled out with all available statistics and returned to the Conference Secretary.
 - 9. For the future the Conference shall observe the disciplinary

rule requiring each pastor to read his statistical report on the floor of the Conference.

- 10. Friday preceding Conference shall be set aside as a day of prayer for the Conference.
- 11. Robert's Rules or Order shall be the Parliamentary guide of this body.
- 12. Wednesday afternoon and evening of Conference week shall be designated as Young People's Day.
- 13. Thursday evening of Conference shall be set apart for public missionary service.
- 14. We authorize the closing of the Treasurer's books one week before Conference.
- 15. We recommend that pastors, Sunday schools, W. H. & F. M. Societies, and Y. M. W. Bands remit all funds raised, quarterly.
- 16. Pastors shall preach on the subject of church benevolences at least once each year.
- 17. The first Sunday in October shall be set apart as a day of special prayer to be offered and efforts made to interest and enlist the young people of our Church in its work.
- 18. Be it required that all pastors of the Ohio Conference attend all sessions of the Camp Meeting unless providentially hindered.
- 19. All charges receiving a new pastor pay the moving expenses, the amount being agreed upon by the pastor and the church.
- 20. We order that no money be paid from the Conference Missionary Fund except by written order of the Missionary Board.
- 21. Each year there shall be incorporated in the Minutes a list of those who have died in the various churches during the year, the pastors being asked to provide the Secretary with the necessary information.
- 22. The Conference Treasurer, with all persons introduced to the Conference shall be honorary members of the Conference, and shall be accorded a seat within the Conference Bar.
- 23. Each occupant of the dormitory during Conference is to furnish his own bed linen and towels.
- 24. The new churches shall be assessed 25 per cent the first year; 50 per cent the second year; and full Budget the third year.
- 25. Be it required that all our workers, preachers and singers on the platform at Conference and Camp Meeting, wear sleeves at least to the elbows, and all their apparel in accord with the Discipline.
- 26. We recommend that first, every church in the Ohio Conference be urged to enter every open door that may be found within its borders, and inaugurate a church extension campaign including a special evangelistic program, specializing on Holiness, Church Organization and Church erection. Second, each pastor be encouraged to hold at least

one revival meeting a year, for some nearby pastor or at some point adjacent to his charge, with a view to organizing a Wesleyan Methodist Church.

- 27. We shall have a traveling Conference President who shall receive \$1200.00 annually, said amount to be apportioned to the churches. He shall be required to travel the Conference and counsel and advise with the churches in matters of doctrine, finance and other affairs that affect the spiritual or temporal welfare of the work. To hold at least two quarterly meetings on each charge annually, the slate to be arranged by the President and published in the Wesleyan Methodist. Each charge is to have at least one Sunday each quarterly meeting except where other satisfactory arrangements can be made by the President with the pastor.
- 28. Inasmuch as it is necessary for both pastor and Conference President to arrange their program for the year, be it required that the President, at the Annual Conference prepare his slate for six months in advance, and post the same on the Conference bulletin board, as a guide for the pastors in arranging their programs for the Conference year.
- 29. The Conference Secretary shall provide for the pastors, cards to contain the following quarterly report: Amount of salary received, Amount of Budget raised, Number of pastoral calls made, General condition. Said report to be mailed to the Conference President quarterly.
- 30. All candidates taking the Conference Course of Study shall appear before the Committee on Itineracy and Orders, some member of the Committee, or some one whom the Committee may designate, when taking their examinations.
- 31. All those having business with the Committee on Itineracy and Orders shall appear before that Committee not later than the second day of Conference.
- 32. We recommend that all our pastors make special effort to inform all local preachers on their charges of the disciplinary requirements needed preparatory to study and to travel under Annual Conference direction.
- 33. Our pastors shall urge each family in the church to set aside at least one can of fruit, vegetables, meat, and pickles to be sent to the seat of Conference and Camp Meeting, for use there.
- 34. We recommend that the churches in the Ohio Conference receive all members or candidates for membership, as associate or probationary except those coming in by letter of transfer, and that we strictly adhere to the disciplinary requirements in receiving them.
- 35. We recommend that our churches through their Board of Stewards enter into a tentative agreement on pastor's salary within two weeks after the arrival of the pastor on the work, provided the salary has not already been agreed upon. Such tentative agreement to stand until the time of the

first Quarterly Conference, when a permanent salary shall be set as provided by paragraph 103 of the Discipline.

- 36. We shall have a Camp Meeting Committee consisting of 5 members, 3 ministerial and 2 lay, elected by the Annual Conference, to have entire supervision of the Campgrounds and its improvements and the making of complete arrangements for camp and Camp Meeting services, and also provide for the entertainment of the Annual Conference. One ministerial member of this Committee shall be designated as Chairman by the Conference, annually at its regular session. That the ministerial members shall serve for a period of 3 years and the lay members for 2 years, except when first elected the ministerial members shall be elected for 3 years. 2 years, and 1 year, respectively, and lay members for 2 years and 1 year respectively. That this Committee shall designate one of its own members as Treasurer, and another as Secretary. That an itemized financial report of all money received and expended by the Committee be presented by the Treasurer to each session of the Annual Conference and this report be incorporated in the Conference Minutes. We further recommend that this Camp Meeting Committee advise with the Conference Board of Trustees as to location, erection, and improvement of Conference buildings on the Campground.
- 37. The fourth Monday in July shall be the permanent date for the opening of Conference; the Camp Meeting to follow.
- 38. The Conference Missionary Board shall hereafter be elected by ballot.
- 39. A Wesleyan Methodist Love Feast and Holy Communion be the spiritual opening service in connection with the sermon on Monday evening of the future years of our Ohio Annual Conference.
- 40. To further aid in the work of church extension we recommend the adoption of a Minute Man Appeal Plan, similar to the denominational card plan for church extension, such appeals to be made only to assist in the purchase or erection of churches or parsonages. The plan shall be administered by the Board of Trustees, incidental expenses being paid from the Conference Incidental Fund so that the entire proceeds from the plan may go to the new project. Money from the appeals shall be paid through the Church Extension Treasury but shall not be given budget credit. No church shall receive the benefit of the plan more than once for the same building; but this shall not prohibit the Conference Trustees from authorizing loans or gifts from other sources for the benefit of said church.
- 41. All examination papers on the Course of Study for Elder's Orders must be in the hands of the Committee on Itineracy and Orders by the 10th of July.
- 42. We recommend that the Treasurer's and Sunday-school Treasurer's books of the several churches be audited annually.

THE OHIO CONFERENCE

- 43. There shall be incorporated in the Minutes annually an Honor Roll of those churches raising a full budget; those who have an equivalent of one half of its membership taking the Wesleyan Methodist, and those using the Storehouse Tithing Plan. Also the Conference Calendar and the locations of the churches shall be incorporated.
- 44. The Conference President's salary shall in the future be forwarded by the local churches to the Conference Treasurer, who shall on the first of each month beginning with September 1, 1940 forward a check for the amount of one-twelfth of the promised salary to the Conference President.
- 45. The Trustees of the Conference are authorized to charge 4% on loans from the Superannuated Elder's Fund; all others to draw 2%.

RECORD OF DAILY PROCEEDINGS

Monday, 8:00 p. m.

With a gracious sense of the presence of God and with a goodly attendance of preachers and people of the Ohio Conference, the keynote address was delivered by the Conference President, Rev. Leslie D. Wilcox, on the subject, "A Good Soldier of Jesus Christ." The message was freighted with truth and was most timely.

Tuesday, July 23, 1940, 9:30 a. m.

The thirty-third annual session of the Ohio Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church was called to order by the Conference President, Leslie D. Wilcox.

Devotions—D. E. Howard led the singing and the scripture was read by John Murdock. Prayer around the altar followed and a most gracious time ensued.

Hours—Hours of Conference were set as 9:30 a. m. and 1:30 p. m. Order of Day—The hour of 8:00 p. m. Tuesday evening was set as the time to hear the Educational address by President McConn.

Sympathy—A letter of sympathy was ordered sent to Brother Harmon McConn, in the loss of his companion.

Courtesy—The Committee on Courtesy presented Rev. Paul Pinney of Chippewa Lake, Rev. and Mrs. Jones of Marion Tabernacle, Rev. Claude Scott of the Michigan Conference, Rev. Albert Wagner of the Middle Atlantic States Conference, and various laymen of the churches in Marion: George's Run, Toronto, Fairview, Coshocton, Dunkirk, Vine Street, Fly, Athens, Northridge, Harrison Chapel, Sunbury, S. W. Sharon, White's Chapel, and Piqua; and also visitors from Indiana and South Carolina.

Resolution—Conference Resolution to the effect that the Honor Roll of churches raising full budget; those having half of the membership taking the Wesleyan Methodist; those using the Storehouse Tithing Plan; the Conference Calendar; and the location of the several churches be incorporated in the Minutes annually. Adopted.

Hour-10:00 a. m. Friday was set as the hour for the election of Officers.

Reports—G. W. Calhoon, K. M. Lewis, A. D. Osborn, Della Osborn, W. C. Roberts, Monna M. Rogers, L. A. Wilcox, Kenneth Dunn, Walter Rogers, Donald Fisher, and Earl Lutz reported after an action by the Conference that all reports be given from the front of the auditorium.

Excuse—Earl Lutz was excused from Conference after a rising vote of appreciation for his faithful labors at the Marion Church.

Report—Rev. L. D. Jones the present pastor of the Marion Tabernacle presented his report.

Adjourned.

Tuesday, 8:00 p. m.

The entire evening meeting was devoted to a Marion College service. Several either former or present students spoke in appreciation of the school, and President McConn of Marion College preached a sermon on world conditions. This was somewhat out of the ordinary for him but it was timely and blessed.

Wednesday, 9:30 a.m.

Devotions—Singing was led by Walter Rogers and prayer was offered by G. W. Calhoon.

Report—The Conference Treasurer reported. Report referred to the Committee on Auditing.

A Committee consisting of Claude Crocker, John Murdock to represent the Ministerial Convention, and Donald Fisher to represent the W. Y. P. WAYS AND MEANS

We advocate the following plan whereby we believe not only the pastor's salary may be increased, but all the financial obligations of the church be met:

- 1. The adoption of the Storehouse Tithing Plan, as recommended by the Discipline.
- 2. That there be at least quarterly a donation for the pastor, and that the Conference President also be remembered at the time of his Quarterly Meeting Visitation.
- 3. That the non-resident and non-attending members be communicated with once quarter and informed of the condition and needs of the church by the stewards.
- 4. That there be a study of the Discipline relating to finance and stewards duties, and also the duties of all church officers at least once a quarter.
- 5. That each church elect a Tract, Tithing and Educational Secretary who shall secure a tract box, to be kept filled with literature on tithing especially that published by our Church, and other religious subjects. Offerings shall be taken for this purpose. (For the information of all, tracts on this subject may be secured also from the Pilgrim Tract Society of Randleman, N. C.)
- 6. That each pastor transfer his membership to the church he is serving.
- 7. That the salaries of the pastors of the various churches include the 2 weeks of Conference and Camp Meeting, the tenure of the pastor's labors to begin the week following Camp Meeting.

Report No. 5

REPORT ON MORAL REFORM

We, the Ohio Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, recognizing the deplorable condition of our land, do pledge ourselves to whole-heartedly support every properly constituted effort toward moral reform, and do especially urge our ministers and departmental leaders to give definite attention to the following:

1. We recommend careful teaching concerning modesty of dress and proper respect for the sacredness of the body. 1 Peter 3:3, 4. "Whose adorning let it not be that outward adorning of plaiting the hair, and of

wearing of gold, or of putting on of apparel, but let it be the hidden man of the heart, in that which is not corruptible, even the ornament of a meek and quiet spirit, which is in the sight of God of great price." 1 Timothy 2:9, 10. "In like manner also that women adorn themselves in modest apparel, with shamefacedness and sobriety; not with broided hair, or gold, or pearls or costly array; but (which becometh women professing godliness) with good works."

In this we urge that our women be better examples, and that unitedly we train our children and youth to wear apparel which does not accentuate the suggestiveness of sex.

Deploring the tendency to nudity of the body and limbs at public bathing beaches and pools, we do urge that all our people and children stay away from them.

We further urge that our children be taught the facts of life, so they may know the reasons for proper modesty in dress.

- 2. We do urge careful teaching of the Bible standards regarding divorce, the sanctity of marriage, and the sacredness of the home.
- 3. We do urge, through the Sabbath school, the Junior church, the Daily Vacation Bible School and the Y. M. W. B. that we teach the children of our constituency the awfulness of sin, the evils of Sabbath desecration of drinking and of smoking, and that we warn them against the marijuana cigarette drug.
- 4. We register our protest against the anti-Christian and modern school program which undermines the faith of our children and young people and tends to deify the natural appetite and remove restraint of the same.
- 5. We urge strong opposition against the present day literature, which lifts the degrading practice of smoking and drinking to a plane of legitimate art, and which features flirtation and courtship between the married as a matter of course. Therefore we do urge our strongest opposition to all profane literature and ungodly amusements which do now corrupt our land.
- 6. We urge our people to refrain from patronizing restaurants and stores that sell liquor, if it be possible, and in every effective way show our disdain for the liquor traffic.
- 7. We recommend that this report be read to the churches at least twice during the Conference year.

One Note, \$112.00, dated October 1, 1931. Due in one year; interest 6%; Superannuated Elders Funds; signed by three individuals. This note is listed in minutes as Endowment Note. Two years interest paid on this note. Last payment made March 18, 1935.

Report No. 8					
PRESIDENT'S REPORT					
To the members and friends of the Ohio Conference, Greetings					

It is with hearts full of gratefulness and praise that we report to this body in this eventful year of 1940. In the midst of the general confusion, chaos and uncertainty of this world in which we sojourn, we are thankful for the unchanging promises of God and the faithfulness of our Covenant-keeping Christ. By His grace we can report advances during a year past, and can look forward to greater possibilities in the year ahead, if Jesus tarries. We are in no mood to just "Hold the Fort" but to press the battle to the very gates and to storm the citadels of evil for the precious prize of the souls of men.

Our annual report covers several items, first of which is

The State of the Work

The past year has seen definite progress throughout the Conference. We believe the spiritual state of the Conference is better than ever. This of course means in general, but it also applies to the majority of the churches, although there are a few points, where difficulties of an unprecedented or unusual character have given the work a temporary setback. Several of our churches have this year experienced unusually deep and thorough revivals whose fruitage has lasted. For this we praise God, and pray that such work may continue and spread to every point. This is the normal state of the Church and should be the constant aim of every Christian.

The much desired advance into new fields has continued throughout the year, resulting in the organization of four new churches besides the opening of still other new fields concerning which the Missionary Board will give report. Our new church organizations are as follows:

October 24, I organized a new church in the city of Toronto, Ohio, where a revival meeting had been previously carried on under the direction of Rev. Guy Blankenship, from the Wesleyan church at Rochester, Pa. Seventeen new members were received the first service and I believe several others have been received since. Rev Blankenship was continued as pastor.

January 14, a church was organized at Southwest Sharon in Medina County, by George Hawthorne and Roy Vaughn. This work resulted from the pioneer efforts of George Hawthorne entending back over a previous period of some months. Brother Hawthorne was continued as pastor until March 5 when C. B. Newbury was chosen as the new pastor.

The third church was organized at Marion, Ohio, resulting from the efforts of Rev Earl Lutz to combine the former church which we had at State St. with the mission group, organized some years previous by Rev. Henry Livingston and known as the Toledo Avenue Mission. After thoroughly explaining to them the doctrines and polity of the Wesleyan Methodist Church this group voted by a very large majority to become a Wesleyan church. The organization was effected on April 17. At the same time the former organization at State St. was disbanded, five of its members transferring to the new church which is to be known as the First Wesleyan Methodist Tabernacle of Marion, Ohio.

On July 9, the fourth new church was organized in Dayton, Ohio. This also was the outcome of a group who had been working independently under the name of Wesley Chapel, located on Burns Ave., in that city. After careful explanation of our standards, this group also voted to cast in their lot with the Wesleyan Church. Accordingly the organization was effected on July 9. Fred Stansbury, a local preacher from Edgemont, Dayton church, has been pastoring the group.

The churches left in the hands of the Conference President have been cared for as follows:

On July 30, I sanctioned the choice of the West Dayton church, by appointing Kenneth Dunn as pastor.

On August 4, the appointment of Harry Stanley to the pastorate at Coshocton was sanctioned.

August 5, I sanctioned the appointment of J. M. Williams as pastor at the Belmont, Dayton church.

The work at White's Chapel has continued throughout the year under the supervision of Fred Fields with the help of E. W. Cole. The work there has grown greatly following a revival meeting during the winter or early spring.

Allen Baker continued the work at Rine Memorial Mission for a time but the work fell off and was finally abandoned. We recommend this name be dropped from the roll of appointments.

The Conference Appointment of Levi J. Cherryholmes to the pastorate at Senecaville never materialized due to the fact that Brother Cherryholmes failed to send word of his acceptance within the time which he had promised. Accordingly Paul Robinson was appointed to that charge on August 7. He has done most excellent work there.

On September 8, the church at Fairmount, Cincinnati, requested the resignation of their pastor, Nicholas Plementosh. Accordingly I appointed James Zuch to have oversight of the work. With the help of Herbert Brannon, Leo Moran and Brother Ford this work was continued until in January when the building was damaged by fire so severely that it has not been used for services since. In view of this fact and of the scattering of the former members, I recommend that this church be declared disbanded and that the point be placed under the supervision of Missionary Board for the development of future work. There is now a distinct possibility there. The legal tangles which so long prevented purchase of the building and its repair so that services might be resumed have all been ironed out. Repair is actually under way and we believe there is a possibility for Fairmount although it will have to be practically all new work.

On April 4, I accepted the resignation of Warren M. Davis from the pastorate of the Piqua tabernacle, appointing John Woodhouse to take oversight of the work. This arrangement has continued until now.

November 17, on presentation of satisfactory evidence of standing in the M. E. Church, I gave Guy Blankenship, a certificate that he had been received as an Annual Conference Preacher in the Ohio Conference.

On July 13, I received the transfer of N. Lee Shultz, Elder, from the

North Michigan Conference.

In addition to these transfers, as above listed, the name of Warren M. Davis is to be stricken from the roll, he having surrendered his credentials as an Elder in the Wesleyan Methodist Church, at my request, under date of April 9.

Work of the Presidency

In pursuance of the duties of traveling President, I have traveled the Conference throughout the year, holding quarterly meetings at each charge, as well as preaching at other points where valuable contacts could be made, and also holding two revival meetings. I have preached 163 times and have held some 53 business meetings besides the organization services at new church. In addition to this I have toured the Conference with the Missionary Board, visiting each charge in their deputation work. My mileage in this work, not including the traveling with the Missionary Board, is approximately 7960 miles at an estimated cost of \$182.00.

I have received \$1086.47, President's Salary. Also gifts and dona-

tions to the amount of \$85.00.

MISSIONARY BOARD REPORT

For the Year of 1939-1940

"Thanks be unto God who giveth us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ." At the beginning of the new Conference year your Missionary Board formulated a plan for definite action for extension work within the bounds of the Conference. It was agreed that the best method to

promote interest and action in this work in the direct approach to our people. Therefore a tour embracing the entire Conference was arranged for and completed before the first of January. We were heartened by the enthusiastic response of our people to the calendar presentation, and by this method about \$800.00 was easily raised. A small amount of this fund was used to strengthen work which had been started previous to this year. It was the unanimous opinion of the Board that the most of these funds should be used for an intensive pioneer campaign within our territory. A tent worth much more was purchased for the sum of \$150.00. Three tent campaigns have been conducted under our supervision. Numerous things hinder the immediate organization of a mission or church from such endeavors, denominational prejudices, misunderstanding, or direct Satanic influences. While much good has been done and some souls have received definite help from our meetings in Greenville and in Glouster we cannot as yet report an established work in either place, however we feel that friends have been made which the Mission Board should seek to interest further in our work.

We engaged the services of Brother John Murdock and Brother George Hawthorne for the Glouster and Mt. Blanchard meetings. The latter meeting has developed a group of interested people; and with your prayers and the blessing of the Lord we believe it will result in an organization in the near future.

All the expenses of the year's program up to this present session of Conference have been met with a balance of \$50.00 or more in the M. B. fund.

The work at Southwest Sharon was continued under the supervision of the Board until its organization. In early March we approved the opening of a new work in Chippewa Lake with Brother Hawthorne in charge. This work is still in progress under our supervision. The Mt. Blanchard work also continues under the Board's direction, and prospects for a mission work in Glouster in the near future are good. Requests have come from various parts of the State regarding Wesleyan work, and with the continued prayers and financial assistance of our people Ohio Conference will move forward in the new Conference year. Pastors can greatly assist by regularly presenting the work, and by forwarding the Calendar money to the Conference Treasurer monthly.

We wish also to register our thanks to God for His help and blessing, and also to the people of Ohio conference and its friends who have so loyally supported this arm of the work. There is much land yet to be possessed. "Pray ye therefore."

BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Your Board of Conference Trustees beg leave to submit the following report of actions during the past Conference year:

August 1st, 1939. Moved and supported that in renewing the Findlay notes, rate of interest be reduced to 4% from date of new note. No interest on old note to be charged. Ask Belmont, Dayton to renew note of \$416.13 leaving off the 13 cents and charge no interest from date of August 19, 1939. Moved and supported that we ask Kenton Church to pay \$2.00 per month beginning October 1st, 1939.

Moved and supported that we ask the Coshocton Church to pay interest on their note to date, and ask Vine Street, Cincinnati Church to pay \$10.00 per quarter until note is paid.

Rev. J. M. Williams and E. R. McMillan were appointed to notify Claude Thurston to pay balance due on the old Oxford church building in thirty days or otherwise the contract would be declared null and void.

March 20th, 1940. By motion decided to give the old Oxford church building to the Sunbury Church providing that this organization would remove the building within one year from date.

By motion the Conference Treasurer was instructed to call for funds, through the Conference Extension Pledge, for Vine Street, Cincinnati Church.

April 16, 1940. By order of the Board of Trustees the Secretary of the Board authorized Rev. C. L. Wright, Conference Treasurer to call for funds, through the Conference Church Extension Funds, for the following churches: West Dayton, the new church at Marion Ohio, Plainfield, and parsonage at Jelloway.

April 30, 1940. Rev. J. M. Williams, Rev. A. D. Osborn and E. R. McMillan, members of the Conference Board of Trustees, signed a contract with the Church Extension Board of the Church of Christ in Christian Union for the sale of the North Street Church of Marion, Ohio for the sum of \$500.00. \$150.00 of this sum was paid on above date, and the balance to be paid on or about July 1st, 1940, at which time a Quit Claim deed was to be given by the Conference Trustees for the above amed property. Owing to some delays, this deal was not completed until July 18, 1940.

June 1, 190. The Secretary of Board of Trustees authorized Rev. C. L. Wright, Conference Treasurer, to send Rev. John Woodhouse, Dayton, Ohio, the sum of \$45.00 for the Piqua charge. Sixteen dollars of this for insurance and twenty-nine dollars for interest on mortgage.

April 30, 1040. Moved and supported that \$25.00 be given to Rev. John Woodhouse to be used for expenses of revival meeting at Piqua charge. Moved and supported that the \$150.00 received from the sale of

the North Street Church, Marion, Ohio be transferred to the Trustees of the First Wesleyan Tabernacle of Marion, Ohio, and also that the balance of the \$500.00, \$350.00, be transferred to the above Trustees as soon as received by the Conference Treasurer.
