Conference Resolutions

Section 1. Conference Officers

1. (a) We shall have a traveling Conference President, who shall receive house rent and \$4500 annually, \$300 of which shall be applied on his utilities. This salary shall be apportioned to the churches and paid by them to the Conference Treasurer, who shall on the first of each month, beginning with August 1, each Conference year, forward a check for one twelfth of the amount to him. He shall be required to travel the Conference and counsel and advise with the churches in matters of doctrine, finances, and other affairs that affect the spiritual and temporal welfare of the work. After consulting with the pastors he may confer with the stewards if necessary with the purpose in mind to increase the pastor's salary and to urge that adequate remuneration be given Evangelists for their services. He shall visit each church at least once annually. At the time of his election the first ballot shall be a nominating ballot. He shall be granted a two weeks' vacation with pay.

(b) His traveling expense at .06 per mile or actual train or bus fare, also his telephone, long distance phone calls pertaining to Conference work, desk and secretarial expense, shall be paid from Conference incidental funds.

(c) He shall be Custodian of Deeds.

THE OHIO CONFERENCE

(d) There shall be a full-time traveling Vice-President. His duties shall be to assist the Conference President in carrying out the program of the Conference and the Conference Missions Board in the field of Pioneer Evangelism and in the General Administration of the Conference work. This shall include evangelistic campaigns on mission points and in other churches of the conference as time and duties permit.

(e) From Conference Missions Funds, he shall receive living quarters, telephone and desk expense, travel expense, and a guaranteed salary of \$3900, \$300 of which shall be applied on his utilities. His offerings from evangelistic meetings on pioneer points and in organized churches, including all monies handed to him while engaged in these meetings, shall apply on his guaranteed salary. He shall be granted the privilege of holding one evangelistic campaign during the year either within the Conference or elsewhere, which shall not apply on his guaranteed salary. He shall be granted a two weeks' vacation with pay. At the time of his election the first ballot shall be a nominating ballot.

2. (a) The Conference shall be divided into six districts by a line from Sandusky to Portsmouth, and from Union City to Martin's Ferry, with the exceptions of a Central District composed of Licking, Franklin, Morrow, Knox, Delaware, Union, Ross and Pickaway Counties, and the Wheeling District bounded on the west by the Western County lines of Carroll and Harrison Counties extended South to Willow Island and directly east from Willow Island to the Allegheny Conference Line.

(b) The Conference Missionary Board shall be composed of the Conference President, and Conference Vice-President, the W. M. S. President, and six additional pastors, one from each of the six districts of the Conference. These six members shall be nominated by the Committee on Pastoral Relations, and shall be elected by ballot. In presenting these nominations at least two names shall be submitted from each district.

(c) The Missionary Board shall meet at the beginning of the Conference year to formulate policies and lay general plans for the conduct of the work of Conference Missions during the year. The actual carrying out of these plans shall be in the hand of Executive Committees which in each district shall be composed of the Conference President, the Conference Vice-President, and the District man. The full board may meet at any time at the call of the Conference President and the Vice-President. Desk expense, telephone calls and mileage or fares incurred in the work of Conference Missions shall be paid from the Conference Missionary Fund.

(d) The six district men, under the direction of the Conference President, shall assist him in his Pioneer duties, and shall organize the pastors in various districts for pioneer work. They shall designate one Sunday as a Pioneer Day, on which day the Pastors shall exchange pulpits to bring a pioneer message and raise offerings and pledges for the work.

(e) It shall require a written order of the Board for funds to be paid from the Conference Mission Fund.

(f) The Missionary Board may employ such pastors of the Conference as may be needed for pioneer meetings. Churches are urged to cooperate by granting their pastors a two-week leave of absence with pay, if his services are requested by the Board.

(g) The Missionary Board and the Conference Board of Trustees shall jointly administer the Church Extension Fund.

(h) Activities of the Board, with the amounts of salaries guaranteed and the amounts invested in each project, shall be reported to the Conference annually.

3. The Conference shall elect a Camp Meeting Committee consisting of nine members, five ministerial and four lay to have entire supervision of the Campgrounds and its improvements, and the making of complete arrangements for Camp and Camp Meeting services, and also provide for the entertainment of the Annual Conference. They shall serve for terms of three years. The President of the Conference shall be an ex-officio member of the Camp Meeting Committee and presiding officer of the Camp Meeting Session. This Committee shall designate one of its members as Chairman, another as Secretary, and another as Treasurer. Each shall report to the Annual Conference and the report shall be incorporated in the Conference minutes. The Treasurer's report shall be audited. This Committee shall advise with the Conference Board of Trustees as to the location, erection, and improvements of Conference buildings on the Campground.

4. It shall be the duty of the Trustees of the Ohio Conference to receive, hold, and dispose of property within the bounds of the Conference as provided in the book of Discipline, paragraph 120, and 384-389. In addition to this they shall also be empowered to act in certain instances as follows:

A. Resolved: The Trustees of the Ohio Conference shall be, and they hereby are, empowered to execute all necessary papers, mortgage deeds and papers of a like character when necessary to secure loans to the Ohio Annual Conference, or to any church within the Conference needing funds to liquidate Conference, church or parsonage indebtedness, provided that the party or parties requesting such action shall set forth the true nature and purpose for which the loan is requested, and that both the President and Trustees of said Conference are satisfied that the object for which the loan or loans is sought is both necessary and desirable.

B. Resolved: The Trustees of the Ohio Conference shall be, and they hereby are, empowered to execute all necessary papers, mortgage deeds and papers of like character, when necessary to secure loans for the purpose of purchasing or erecting church or parsonage buildings in the pioneer work of the Conference, provided that the proposed project and the financing of it by means of the proposed loan shall receive the approval of the Conference President, a majority of the total membership of the Missionary Board, and a majority of the total membership of the Board of Trustees.

C. Resolved: the Trustees of the Ohio Conference shall be, and they hereby are, empowered to sign any or all deeds and papers for the transfer of real property that is now or hereafter may be held in trust by said Trustees, provided the sale of such Conference, church or parsonage, or other real estate has been authorized and approved by the President of the Conference with the concurrence of at least one member of his advisory board.

5. We recommend a standard traveling expense of .06 a mile to the Conference Board of Trustees from the Conference Mission Fund and the

Conference Incidental Fund, to the Missionary Board from the Conference Missions Treasury, and to the Camp Meeting Committee from the Camp Meeting Treasury.

6. Resolved: that there be a Church Building Fund to be loaned to the churches for building purposes, this fund to come from the sale of the Fairmount Church, gifts, annuities and the budget item included in Conference Work, said fund to be administered by the Conference Trustees, and loaned on notes to be signed by the local trustees. Not more than 20 per cent of the fund shall be loaned to any one church unless the calls for loans are such that the trustees find it necessary to grant a larger amount in order to keep the money in use, the interest to be figured at 3 per cent for the total length of the loan and paid back at the rate of not less than 1 per cent of the total per month. Special short term loans of less than one year can be made at 6 per cent interest.

Section II. Annual Conference Session

7. (a) The annual Conference shall convene on the fourth Monday of July and continue through the following Sunday.

(b) Camp Meeting shall open with the Friday evening service of Conference week.

(c) The Friday preceding Conference shall be set aside as a day of prayer for Conference and Camp.

8. All elders and licentiates are required to attend the entire session of Conference. It shall require a vote of Conference to pass the character of any minister who fails in this regard.

9. (a) It is recommended that persons elected as lay delegates to Conference shall be able to attend the entire session.

(b) The Conference Secretary shall provide blanks for Delegate's Credentials; including the following items: certificate of election, address of delegate, information as to how long the delegate intends to remain at Conference, the Pastor's address and telephone number. These credentials are to be returned in advance of Conference to a Standing Committee on Credentials, appointed by the President.

10. (a) It is required that each pastor obtain from the Conference treasurer a signed statement of all budget monies paid to him. This statement shall agree with the pastor's statistical report, both of which shall be mailed to the chairman of the Statistical Committee not later than July 15th.

(b) The Conference shall omit the reading of the statistical reports by the Pastors, and instead the Committee on Statistics shall post on the bulletin board certain items of vital interest, for the instruction of the members of the Conference.

(c) The W. Y. reports submitted to the Annual Youth Conference shall be the basis for reporting W. Y. membership on the pastor's statistical blank. The W. Y. President shall, soon after the close of Youth Camp, mail each pastor a signed statement with membership information for his annual conference report.

11. (a) The Special Orders of the Conference shall be 7:00 p. m. Mon-

day—Communion Service preceding the Conference Sermon; 9:00 a. m. Tuesday—Opening business session of Conference; 1:30 p. m. Tuesday—Tithing Secretary's Address; Tuesday Evening—Sunday School Hour; 11:00 a. m. Wednesday—Denominational Address; 1:30 p. m. Wednesday—Election of officers; Wednesday evening—Pioneer Service; 10:00 a. m. Thursday—Educational Service; 1:30 p. m. Thursday—Evangelism Service; Thursday evening—Missionary Service conducted by the Women's Missionary Society; 1:30 p. m. Friday—Memorial Service (when necessary); Sunday morning—Ordination Service.

(b) The annual Session of the Ohio W. Y. Conference shall be held on the fourth Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday in June of each year in connection with a Bible Conference.

12. (a) The members of the Committee on Itineracy and Elder's Orders shall be elected by ballot.

(b) All persons who feel that they have completed the Disciplinary requirements for ordination shall appear before the Committee on Itineracy and Elders' Orders on the first day of Conference, and all others pursuing the course must appear not later than the third day of Conference.

(c) The Committee will continue to adhere strictly to the intent of the Disciplinary rules pertaining to the course of study. Any person who fails to pass at least one book each year will be referred back to his quarterly Conference. This committee will give only written examinations which must be taken in the presence of some designated examiner. No candidate may hope to receive credit in the current year for any book, who fails to take examination before July 15.

13. (a) The fiscal year for churches shall be from July 1 to June 30. All financial reports shall conform to this schedule.

(b) The Conference Treasurer's books shall close July 5.

14. (a) The Ohio Conference shall be authorized to charge 4 per cent on loans to churches from the Superannuated Elders' Fund.

(b) All notes to churches shall be drawn up on the form given in the Minutes of 1940.

Section III. Churches and Pastors

15. In addition to the duties as outlined in the Discipline, it shall be the responsibility of our pastors to:

(a) Attend all sessions of Camp Meeting.

(b) Remain on the work he is appointed to for the whole Conference year. Any pastor leaving the work during the year shall not have his character passed except by vote of the Conference.

(c) See to it that all funds and receipts from his charge be sent to the Conference Treasurer at least quarterly.

(d) Cooperate with the stewards in notifying non-attending members of their financial responsibilities.

(e) Instruct all local preachers on their charge of disciplinary requirements to study and travel under Conference direction.

(f) Be sure all Conference preachers on their charge have necessary licenses and recommendations.

(g) Submit monthly reports to the Conference President on prepared forms, and also return monthly report blanks to the Sunday School secretary.

(h) We also recommend that each pastor transfer his membership to the church he is serving.

16. It shall be the responsibility of our churches to:

(a) Pay the moving expense of the in-coming pastor.

(b) Pay pastor's salary for fifty-two weeks per year, beginning with the rise of Conference, and grant him a 2-week vacation.

(c) Pay traveling expenses and room and board for pastors and delegates at Conference.

(d) We recommend that each church assist its pastor to meet his social security payment by giving him a cash gift equal to at least half of the social security assessment on his salary as pastor.

17. No church shall begin or continue in any major building or remodeling program until it has conferred with the Conference Committee on Church and Parsonage Building and Location. The Building Committee of said church shall sign a written agreement, to be acted upon by this Conference Committee; they shall also report monthly in writing to this Conference Committee; the matter of such reports and agreements shall be agreed upon mutually by these two committees concerned.

18. The Committee on Pulpit Supply shall conduct the vote on retaining the pastor not later than June 1st, giving the required two weeks notice in advance. The chairman of the Committee on Pulpit Supply shall immediately inform the Conference President of the results. If the vote is for a change and the pastor so desires, his name shall be placed on the list of available men. The list shall be sent to churches requiring the same on or after June 10, and pastors desiring to be included on that list must notify the Conference President by that date.

Section IV. Standards of Practice

19. (a) We recommend the use of Associate Membership as a probationary membership for all adults who are received into the church on confession of faith.

(b) We recommend and urge all our pastors and churches to receive into JUNIOR MEMBERSHIP all boys and girls who give evidence of being genuinely converted, that they be baptized, and that they be given a course of instruction by the pastor in the doctrines and standards of our Church. (Discipline, Par. 73, Sub. (2)).

20. We, the Ohio Conference, declare our opposition to worldly practices and adornment. We believe that the wearing of the wedding ring is a violation of the scriptural injunction against the wearing of gold, which is not purely utilitarian in its use, because the wearing of the wedding ring encourages the wearing of other superfluous ornaments and adornments. We, therefore, do earnestly request that all our local churches comply with this expressed standard. It shall be the duty of our pastors and ministers to support this resolution.

21. We require that all workers, preachers, and singers at Children's and Youth Camps, Conference and Camp Meeting, wear sleeves below the elbow, and all their apparel be in accord with the Wesleyan Methodist Discipline.

22. In the judgment of the Ohio Conference the common use of television is an impediment to the development of holy character. Inasmuch as ministers are examples and patterns to the flock of Christ, the Ohio Conference expects each of its ministers to set a wholesome example and to be a godly pattern in this respect, by not owning or permitting a television set to be brought into a church parsonage.

Reports

Report No. 1

THE CONFERENCE PRESIDENT

Christian greetings to the members of the Fifty-Second annual session of the Ohio Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America.

It is a glorious blood bought privilege to serve the Lord and I have found it a real privilege to serve the church. The Ohio Conference includes many of God's choice saints and they have cooperated wonderfully to make my task a pleasure. God has especially helped and lifted me in the last two or three months until it has been easier to see over and through the problems and difficulties. All praise be unto Him.

Real progress has been apparent in some areas. Many worthwhile new contacts have been made. A number of building projects have been under way. Some excellent Sunday School gains have been made in several churches and two or three remarkable revivals have given basis for rejoicing. The Quadrennial report of our Denominational Sunday School Secretary, Dr. Rufus D. Reesdorph, showed a 224% increase in the Ohio Sunday School enrollment from 1938 to 1958. Our increase was the highest for any Conference our size or larger and compared with a percentage increase in the entire church of 98.8%.

It was a source of shame and genuine concern to find that we reported to the General Conference a total gain in full members of three for the four years. The gains that we have made in Sunday School and finances indicate that we are reaching new people. Evidently we are failing to bring them up to the standards of the church or we are so budget conscious that we are not urging them into full membership. Whichever may be the case, our failure should drive us to real concern and definite action.

Our budgets have suffered this year. More churches have failed to pay full budget than has been the case for years. This in spite of the fact that our total funds raised will be down little if any. I realize that the Headquarters Fund, Marion College and the Pioneer Pledges have been responded to in a very commendable way but it would appear that renewed emphasis must be placed on the payment in full of the budgets that we assign ourselves.

It is a certainty that we have not exhausted the heavenly resources and I doubt if we have scratched the surface of the reservoirs of resources in time, talent, men and money within the Ohio Conference. It seems that God would speak to us as He did to Moses saying, Speak, to the Wesleyans

of the Ohio Conference, that they GO FORWARD. Even as He did for them — He will do for us. We need to hear and heed His command. He will work out all of the details and bring us deliverance from our foe and new territory to inherit.

Just a word of appreciation for our Vice President, Rev. Donald E. Howard. He has not only worked tirelessly and traveled much in making many very excellent contacts but has carried the entire load of the Pioneer program and shared the other responsibilities in a way that made my load much lighter.

In traveling the Conference, I have preached just over 100 times and have driven well over 15,000 miles. From the Conference Treasurer I have received \$768.04 for travel, \$320.75 for phone and \$67.00 for desk expense. My salary was \$4500.00, parsonage rent was figured at \$840.00, the Conference paid one half of my social security which amounted to \$70.88 and I received from revivals, fees, gifts and donations \$263.16.

Report No. 3

THE VICE PRESIDENT

To the pastors and lay delegates of the Ohio Conference in its fifty-second annual session, greetings in the name of our Victorious Leader, Jesus Christ. Concerning the activities of the Vice President we share the following report.

To the best of our ability we have sought to fulfill our obligation as outlined in the provisions of Conference Resolution number 1 paragraph 1, sub-paragraph (d) pertaining to the duties of the Vice President.

We want first of all to express our sincere appreciation to both pastors and laymen for your prayers and co-operation without which our labors would have accomplished little.

We have traveled more than fifteen-thousand miles in Conference work, conducted eight revival campaigns, visited more than twenty independent Holiness groups preaching for many of them in their regular Sunday or mid-week services, attended several revivals, besides assisting the Conference President in the office and elsewhere as need demanded.

We also spoke at two Pioneer Evangelism Rallies, assisted in one funeral and in one church dedication. During our vacation period we labored as evangelist in the Brooksville Florida Camp with Brother Charlie Wireman as our co-worker. While the burdens at times have been heavy, the travel strenuous and the problem difficult, yet His grace has been sufficient, and we count it all joy to have served the Master in this challenging field.

Two Missions have been opened this year, one at Millersburg and one at Wheeling, West Virginia. A Mission organization was effected at Wheeling early in the year to facilitate the progress of the work; and also a Women's Missionary Society was organized there by our W.M.S. President, Sister Day. Three building campaigns have been sponsored by the Board: Millersburg, where the building is of block and cut stone construction; Lafferty, where the building is of cinder block; and at South Zanesville, where a Sunday School unit and Chapel, first unit of the new building, has been erected of concrete block. Arrangements were made and a new parsonage purchased for the Miamisburg Church. Further interesting information will be given concerning these buildings in the Wednesday evening Pioneer Evangelism Service.

Several of the independent Holiness groups have become definitely interested in the Wesleyan movement and in Ohio Conference in particular, and at least two of them are now using our Sunday School literature. We have some definite suggestions to make to the Conference Missions Board concerning our relationship to these works. We have made many new friends for the Conference and the Church during this year of travel and contacts, and we have hopes that these will be one of the means of extending our borders and enlarging our field of service as a Conference.

The County Seat Survey was an important co-operative activity of the year. A little more than fifty percent of the pastors fulfilled their assignments, and the information secured has been filed and will be of great assistance to the Pioneer department.

New fields are opening for Pioneer Evangelism and Church Extension. A new work in the Mount Carmel area of East Side Cincinnati is an immediate must, if we are to conserve our Wesleyan families who live in that section. There are five families in that vicinity who are waiting for us to act. Some of these are serving temporarily in other holiness churches. We must build in this area soon or lose them to other denominations. An interested family in Marietta, Ohio, wants us to open a work there as soon as possible. Our pressing need is for consecrated, dedicated men and money. We must have men with a vision and an aptness for the work of Pioneering. Pray ye the Lord of the Harvest.

Our new Denominational leaders are proposing a "Forward Movement" on every level of Church activity for this quadrennium. May we as a conference neither lag behind in vision nor in labor, but may we arise and build while it is day.

3. Authorized sale of Lima property. To ask \$6900.00. Not less than \$6000 to be accepted.
4. Approved the appointment of John VanCise as pastor at Nellie.
5. Authorized Vice-President to rent a storeroom in Portsmouth to hold revival services.
6. Authorized Conference President to sell Lima Church property for \$5,000.
7. Authorized the building of a Pease house type chapel at Millersburg.
8. Ordered that we pay \$250 to Mr. Jewett for asphalt tile which he installed in Miamisburg Church.
9. Approved action of Executive Committee in purchase of a lot in Millersburg from Mr. Hostettler for \$700.00. Purpose of lot to give access to church building site in Millersburg.
10. Granted permission Northridge Church to use tent for fee of \$25.00. Meeting to be concluded by July 5th.
11. Approved tent meeting in New Rome in August with Harry Stanley as evangelist. Also approved pioneer tent meeting in Portsmouth in late August and early September.
12. Ordered the Dayton Mission pastored by Heldron Sorrell be placed under the direction of the Conference Missions Board.
13. Approved opening Sunday School at Yorkville.

THE CONFERENCE TRUSTEES

We, your Conference Board of Trustees, submit this report of official actions taken during this year:

Victory Camp Ground, Galena, Ohio, August 8, 1958. Re-organization meeting. Donald C. Fisher, Chairman; R. J. Stratton, Secretary; other members of the Board: Harry McQuigg, Ernest Massie, E. R. McMillan.

Gave approval to the Oakfield Church to make purchase of a lot for a parsonage location.

Gave approval to plans submitted for an addition to the Mark Street Church building, Marion, Ohio.

A grant of \$300.00 was authorized to be paid from the Church Extension Fund to the Sherrodsville, Ohio, Church to assist in construction of a frame superstructure on the present church foundation.

Zanesville, Ohio, September 12, 1958. Approval was given to State approved plans submitted by Rev. Miss Erma Toms, pastor, for the new church building to be constructed at 36 Shawnee Ave., South Zanesville, Ohio—a chapel, furnace room, rest rooms, to be built of concrete blocks were approved for immediate construction.

Authorized a loan of \$700.00 from the Church Building Fund to the South Zanesville Church to aid in construction of the new chapel unit.

Authorized a grant of \$200.00 from Church Extension Fund to assist with the above project.

Authorized the local trustees of the North Terrace, Zanesville, Ohio church to purchase a residence property for use as a parsonage, located at 728 St. Louis Ave., purchase price to be \$12,000.00.

Authorized the securing of a loan of \$12,000 from the Zanesville Federal Savings and Loan Association at 5½ per cent, monthly reduction plan, for a period of sixteen (16) years.

By resolution, D. C. Fisher, Chairman, and R. J. Stratton, secretary were authorized to sign any and all necessary papers relative to the negotiating of loans necessary for purchase of the property at 728 St. Louis Ave., Zanesville, Ohio.

Sunbury, Ohio, November 3, 1958. Authorized a grant of \$200.00 to the Piqua Church from the Church Extension Fund to assist in finishing the interior of the new church building superstructure.

Gave tentative approval, subject to inquiry and further approval by the Chairman and Secretary, to the Miamisburg Church to purchase a house and lot located at 843 Johnson Street for use as a parsonage. Cost to be \$8700.00 with a down payment of \$1500.00 and a mortgage loan for \$7200.00. Monthly payments, including interest and insurance to be \$53.00.

By mutual agreement the Conference Treasurer was authorized to make payment of gasoline expense to Rev. Dennis Matherlee, Conference Evangelism Secretary, to aid in his attending the denominational Convention on Evangelism to be held December 30 - January 1, 1958-59 at the camp ground, Brookville, Florida.

Millersburg, Ohio, November 21, 1958. Formal resolution was adopted appointing Robert J. Stratton as legal agent of the Conference Corporation.

Approved a loan of \$700.00 from the Church Building Fund to the Mis-

sionary Board in behalf of the Lafferty Church to assist with building costs. This loan is for a three months (3 mo.) period of time at six (6%) per cent interest. Date of note—Nov. 15, 1958.

Victory Camp Ground, Galena, Ohio, January 6, 1959. Final approval was given to make sale of the church property at 208 West Stanton Avenue, Lima, Ohio, as previously agreed upon by joint telephone conference with members of the Trustee Board and the Conference Missionary Board on December 20, 1958. By formal contract agreement with C. H. Saylor & Son, Lima, Ohio, agents, it was agreed to sell the property to the Lima Church of God for \$5000.00 cash.

Agreed to borrow \$600.00 from the Westerville Church at four (4%) per cent, payable semi-annually, and this amount to be placed in the Conference Church Building Fund to be re-loaned, under direction of the Conference Trustees, to the churches. No additional monies shall be borrowed on this basis except in multiples of \$100.00, and at the time of the semi-annual anniversary dates. Note to be dated January 1, 1959. Jan. 19, 1959, mutually agreed to make the initial loan for \$800.00 instead of \$600.00 and note to be made out in agreement with this change.

Columbus, Ohio, February 24, 1959. Authorized a loan of \$500.00 to the Miami Shores Church from the Church Building Fund at three (3%) per cent on the total for a period of one (1) year.

Zanesville, Ohio, March 13, 1959. In view of the fact that earlier negotiations to purchase a parsonage for the North Terrace Church did not materialize, a motion authorizing purchase of a six room residence for a parsonage located at 2004 Wilmer Street, Zanesville, Ohio for \$10,000.00 was passed.

The North Terrace Church, Zanesville was authorized to borrow \$11,900.00 at 5½% from the Zanesville Federal Savings and Loan Association to make purchase of the Wilmer Street property and to clear the amount due on an original loan. This loan is to be secured by a blanket mortgage on the church property and the parsonage. Authorized the Chairman and Secretary to sign all necessary papers relative to this transaction.

Authorized a grant of \$100.00 from the Church Extension Fund to assist in making purchase of the Wilmer Street property.

Millersburg, Ohio, April 7, 1959. Gave approval to the local church group to proceed with the building of a 34 ft. x 70 ft. church building of concrete block construction and cut stone veneer finish according to plans approved by the State. Church is located on North Clay Street.

Westerville, Ohio, May 26, 1959. Authorized the Chairman to arrange to have much needed roofing repairs made on the Conference parsonage in Westerville and to have the exterior of the office building painted.

By roll call vote authorized a loan of \$500.00 at 3% for three years to the Weirton, W. Va. Church from Conference Building Fund to finish the interior of the church building and the upstairs of the parsonage.

Authorized the Conference Treasurer to pay in advance the full amount of the assigned budget for General Conference Expense Fund.

Victory Camp Ground, Galena, Ohio, July 21, 1959. Authorized the Columbus Church to refinance their present loan with the Buckeye Federal

Savings and Loan Association, Columbus, Ohio, up to \$13,500.00 with interest rate of 6% for twenty (20) years, thus decreasing monthly payments from \$115.00 to \$95.00. It was further stipulated that all monies received from this loan be used to liquidate indebtedness.

By roll call vote the Secretary of the Conference Trustees was authorized to sign any and all necessary papers relative to the refinancing of the Columbus Church loan with the Buckeye Federal Savings and Loan Association.

Authorized D. C. Fisher to sign first mortgage papers for the Mingo Junction Church parsonage for the amount of \$8,300.00. Said mortgage is a consolidation of first and second mortgages of an earlier date and changes neither rate of interest nor amount of monthly payments.

Victory Camp Ground, Galena, Ohio, July 29, 1959. Authorized the St. Albans, W. Va., church to purchase a house adjacent to the church building on Coal River Road for use as a parsonage.

Authorized a loan of \$700.00 to the St. Albans Church from the Church Building Fund at 3% for three years according to provisions of Conference Resolution No. 6 to assist in purchase of the parsonage. Also authorized a grant of \$200.00 from Church Extension Fund for the same purpose.

It was during this Conference year, 1958-59, that there passed from our midst one of Ohio Conference's most exemplary and trustworthy servants. As a trustee of the Conference he was true to his trust. He gave many, many years of love service to his Lord and to his church, and to his Conference in various capacities and especially as a trustee, and for the past eleven years as caretaker of Victory Camp Ground. Brother E. R. McMillan was one of the Lord's truly good men. To the Church and to the Conference he was a devoted, loyal, and dependable layman. We need more laymen like him. On September 26, 1958 his earthly tasks were finished. Now, his eternal joys are real.

1. The name of the local President shall be placed on the roll rather than the retiring President's name. (1938)

3. The Conference Society Treasurer and Y. M. W. B. Superintendent shall pay all money by check. (1943)
4. All Y. M. W. B. monies shall pass through the hands of the Conference Superintendent to be remitted to the General Superintendent quarterly. (1943)
5. The President, Vice President, and Y. M. W. B. Superintendent are to be a Standing Committee to arrange for the Thursday evening service. (1943)
6. The Secretary shall be a Standing Committee on Credentials. (1943)
7. Each local society is urged to send the President, or Vice President, and a delegate to Annual Conference and to pay the expenses of the same. (1945)
8. The Conference Treasurer's books and the Y. M. W. B. Superintendent's books shall close June 25. (1958)
9. Individual contributions either cash or provisions to benevolent objects can receive credit only when a receipt is turned in to the local society. (1949)
10. Two Statistical blanks shall be filled out; one to be sent to the Statistician by July 10, the other to be brought to Conference. (1949)

The first one was the Catholic which ended in the martyr of many; the second, which was the entering of Protestant missionaries 100 years ago, ended with war and imprisonment; the third has been since World War II and God has prospered the work in Japan and will continue to as the church is faithful in sending, praying, and giving.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

To the women of this 52nd session of the Ohio Conference of this W. M. S., greetings in His Great Name!

How rapidly the days, weeks and months have slipped away from us to make another whole year since we last met! I wonder if we have seen all accomplished that we aimed to do for Christ and His cause in this year. We shall not relive the last but we have a new one before us. What shall we do with it?

Our theme "To Make Christ Known" came to us from the recent General Conference. It has been a challenge to me and I want it to grow upon me down through this coming year. Organizations are necessary, records must be kept, reports need to be given but shall we do all as Isa. 64:2 says, "To make thy name known to thine adversaries, that the nations may tremble at thy presence."

By way of reporting the conference activities, Miss Freda Farmer toured the conference this year church by church, challenging our people to pray and give in the interest of her calling, Tiawan. \$1,283.60 was raised in that tour. Miss Gertrude Fulk gave stirring messages in district rallies as she traveled in the interest of Haiti. \$1,064.00 was raised in these rallies. The Glenn Barnett family was invited to represent missions at the Bible Crusaders Camp. They were a great blessing to our boys and girls.

Two new W. M. S. groups were formed this past year. One very cold winter day I had the privilege of traveling by bus to Wheeling, W. Va. It was so cold that they hardly expected any woman to be traveling, but a fine group came to meeting and we organized a W. M. S. It was here that the question was asked by a man, "When may we make pledges for missions?" Even I was a bit taken back. This is a new work, no church building, a small group of people, but wanting to make pledges for missions. God will certainly bless and honor them. Then just at the close of the conference year it was a thrill to organize another W. M. S. at Miamisburg. This too is a new work but I am expecting great things from our God when we put Him and His cause first. May the Lord richly bless these pioneer points.

As to finances you will be interested to know that our special project for books to send to Australia with Jim and Melva Ridgway reached the sum of \$456.80. The White Christmas offering was \$547.58. Then a very interesting item was the fact that Mrs. Ruth Felton says we are one of three conferences to belong to the \$1,000 club for self-denial. Our offering was \$1,057.46. Mrs. Felton also encouraged us by telling me that a great percentage of all Jewish funds come from Ohio and she says she thought every church in Ohio supported a missionary by the funds which come to her. The dormitory incidental fund has reached \$122.29. We are ready to purchase the linoleum as soon as we find the people to put it on the floor. The total raised for all purposes this year was \$32,266. My expenses for desk, travel, and telephone were \$48.01.

Several times during the year it was my privilege to speak on missions. I participated in two missionary conventions and sent out numerous letters and cards. It was a real joy to be able to attend the General Conference and trust before this session closes we shall be able to convey to you a little of the inspiration and help which we received. Some changes were made and we shall attempt to explain them and put them into working as soon as possible. Some gains have been made this past year but let us take the challenge "To Make Christ Known" and really do things for Him if Jesus tarries another year.

Report No. 11**PLAN OF WORK****General Items**

We recommend:

1. That a consecration and installation service for the newly elected W. M. S. officers be held the first meeting after the annual election.

2. That we observe the monthly "Fast and Prayer" day with April continued as self-denial month. That we continue the "Penny-a-meal-plan" which applies on World Missions.

3. That we promote a Women's World Prayer Circle in each society, making use of the new Woman's World prayer materials, and that the local Prayer Partner Secretary act also as W. W. F. Secretary, filling out the annual W. W. F. Prayer Circle report and mailing it to the Conference W. W. F. Secretary within 60 days after conference.

4. That we use the program helps suggested in the **Wesleyan Missionary** with frequent reference to the conference minutes.

5. That a special drive for the **Wesleyan Missionary** be held beginning with the rise of Conference.

6. That the local solicitor keep up to date records, including correct addresses and expiration date of **Wesleyan Missionary** subscribers, giving prompt attention to expiration slips and endeavoring to secure renewals immediately, and that she submit quarterly reports to the Conference Solicitor.

7. That we stress the Memorial Folders to assist in furthering the cause of World Missions, rather than expensive floral tributes for the deceased.

8. That we contribute toward the Women's Institute in Africa as the needs are presented, suggesting large-size quilt blocks, simple or easy patterns on pillow-cases, etc., also cut out dress material for beginner sewers.

9. That more stress be placed upon personal evangelism including children, adolescents, the aged and infirm, with special emphasis upon Jew and Negro.

10. That each active and honorary member participate in the Reading Course, and an effort be made to get others to participate.

11. That a special effort be made for active and honorary membership dues to be paid during the first quarter.

12. That every society make a great effort to enlist the interest of the entire church, especially the men and youth, for the cause of missions using them as assistants on committees and programs.

13. That the society remember the camp in regards to the following items: good clean used mattresses, chairs, plastic sponges, etc.

Financial Items

We recommend:

1. That each society pay annually an equivalent of \$.25 per active and honorary member to be used as a Conference Working Fund.
2. That the dues of \$1.00 per member, active and honorary, be sent directly to the Conference W. M. S. Treasurer, and that all monies and voucher receipts be sent to the Treasurer quarterly.
3. That a statement of the items of Local Church work (baskets, gifts, and other local projects), the amount of the Card Call stubs and monies reported under "Other Objects" (postage, desk expense, reading books, etc.) must be signed by the local president and sent in with the quarterly report to the Conference W. M. S. Treasurer in order to receive credit.
4. The final remittances must be in the hands of the Conference W. M. S. and Y. M. W. B. Treasurers on or before June 25.
5. That each society render an annual program presenting Medical Missions at which time an offering of \$3.00 or more is to be sent to the Medical Fund.
6. That each society respond to the Card Call plan, thus assisting in the Extension program of the church.
7. That we observe Education Harvest Day with a program and cash contribution to apply on budget.
8. That each society contribute annually for the support of Hephzibah Children's Home, Brainerd, and Australia.
9. That each society contribute \$1.25 or more to the Camp Incidental Fund to be dispersed at the discretion of the Executive Committee.
10. That each society participate in the Honorary Enrollment Plan of our colleges.
11. That each society contribute to the "Mile of Dimes" project for Mission Field equipment, to the equivalent of one foot per active and honorary member.
12. That we stress giving toward Jewish work.
13. That each local society support the work of the American Bible Society by an annual offering, preferably taken during the Universal Bible Reading Period. Channel funds through conference W. M. S. Treasurer.
14. That we pay an amount equivalent to at least \$3.00 per active member to the Missionary Support Fund, from which Freda Farmer and Mildred Huff are supported, and that the money be sent in as soon as possible.
