He was licensed a minister in 1907, Ordained in 1914. Attended Central Wesleyan College. Served as pastor of several churches of the Alabama Conference. President of Georgia Conference three years. President of Alabama Conference 13 years, 1923-1936. During his administration the number of churches increased 50 per cent and the membership increased 80 per cent. He was untiring and sacrificial in his service to the church. At the time of his death he was serving as assistant pastor of the Tuscaloosa Church.

The fifty-first annual session of the Alabama Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America convened in the tabernacle of the camp grounds at Camp Eden, St. Clair County, Alabama at 11:00 a. m., August 2, 1960.

Devotional service was conducted by Rev. V. O. Agan, reading from the 13th chapter of First Corinthians.

Roll called. Quorum of ministers and lay-delegates were present.

The President declared the conference ready for transaction of business.

The bar of the conference was fixed to include the first six seats in front of the auditorium and the platform.

The Nominating Committee for session committees read its report, which was adopted.

The Agenda for the session was read and adopted.

The Committee on Courtesies presented General Superintendent, Rev. B. H. Phaup as representative of the church to the conference.

The following Resolution was read and presented to the conference by Rev. C. P. Frederick: "The Pell City Wesleyan Methodist Church requests the 1960 session of the Alabama Conference grant permission, by vote, to swap property 75' by 100' more or less lying behind the church for property 30' by 238' more or less to the original owners of lot involved. By such action, authorizing trustees of the Alabama Conference to make a deed releasing the property involved, for the swap to be negotiated by the Pell City Wesleyan Methodist Church." By motion and vote the above resolution was adopted.

The Committee on Courtesies presented Dr. R. C. Mullinax, President of Central Wesleyan College as the representative of the college and the educational interests of the church.

The Order of the Day was called for the election of Conference Officials. Rev. B. H. Phaup presided for the election.

It was voted to proceed with other business during the intervals of counting votes by the tellers.

V. O. Agan receiving 58 of the 73 ballots cast for President was declared elected President.

The Secretary of the Board of Conference Trustees read the minutes of the meetings of the board during the year. By vote were adopted.

The Auditing Committee report was read and adopted. See Report No. 3.

E. L. Shigley, Sr., receiving 49 of the 75 ballots cast for Vice-President was declared elected Vice-President.

1. That any final decisions in negotiating with the Highway Department shall be approved by the Camp Board and by the Conference Trustees before becoming final.

Be it Resolved that in the event of the sale of any real property belonging to the Camp Meeting Association and deeded to the Trustees of the Alabama Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church. That the Trustees of said Alabama Conference be and are hereby authorized to make a good and sufficient deed to same.

4. That in the event of a change of location of the camp, parties owning private cottages shall be paid an amount equal to their actual investment, or shall be provided with a cottage on the new camp grounds equivalent to their present cottage.

Committee on Itinerancy and Elder's Orders gave its full report which was adopted. See Report No. 10.

Pastoral reports were read by M. C. Glass, Gerald J. Bragg, E. N. Brush, E. L. Crowe, J. T. Rinehart, Prentiss Gardner, E. L. Shigley, Jr.

Committee on Statistics read the report on statistics, reading only the items read in the pastor's reports. Report adopted.

Committee on Ways and Means reported. Report adopted. See Report No. 11.

The following Resolution was adopted to authorize the securing of a loan for the indebtedness on the President's Home.

Whereas a loan must be secured for the proper disposition of replacement of funds borrowed for the completion of the Conference President's Home.

Therefore, Be it Resolved: that the Board of Trustees of the Alabama Annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, be authorized, and they hereby are, to negotiate a loan with the St. Clair Federal Savings and Loan Association or other Agency, for an amount up to \$7,500.00. The Trustees are authorized to sign in behalf of the Alabama Annual Conference all such legal papers necessary to secure said loan and complete the transaction.

By motion and vote the above resolution was adopted.

Time and place of the next annual session of the Conference was voted. Time August 8, 1961, 11:00 a. m. Standard Time. Place Camp Eden, St. Clair County, Alabama.

It was voted to amend the report of the Committee on Ways and Means, changing the item of Conference Work Fund to \$6.50 and the

This has been one of the finest improvements in this Conference for a long time. Thanks to God-Thanks to Rev. E. L. Shigley, Sr.,- Thanks to Rev. Willet Vess-(these two Brethren make up the building committee with the Conference President.) Thanks to Rev. W. O. Kirkes, the blueprinter-Thanks to a host of Pastors, and some laymen- Thanks to Dr. Culiver Lee who sold us the lots at a very nominal sum, giving us back \$1,000.00- Thanks to the City of Pell City, for their contribution of sending their machines out to grade and landscape the yards.-Thanks to Sister C. D. Robertson, who was a masterful cook for the working men, while building on the Conference Parsonage. The building is very convenient and adequate. Rev. E. L. Shigley, Sr., was the foreman, and worked very hard on this project. It has been a distinct honor to have the privilege of being the first Conference President to live in this house. The value of this house is about \$25,000.00.

FRIENDSHIP—Built a nice comfortable parsonage.

SELMA—Has completed one of the nicest parsonage in the Conference, and its value is about \$17,500.00.

TUSCALOOSA—Has purchased the corner lot adjacent to the Church.

BESSEMER—Is now completing Sunday School rooms in the basement of the Church.

COLUMBUS, Ga.—Is building a parsonage now.

REPORT No. 8
MORAL REFORM

Seeing the great laxity and general let-down of moral standards, and the drift toward worldliness which constantly faces our people, and recognizing that the outward man cannot be effectively reformed until there has been a genuine change of the inner man. We your Committee on Moral Reform would recommend the following:

1. That we delight only in God and the things that are eternal, and that we show that delight by seeking first the Kingdom of God in all life's relationships.

2. That we deny ungodliness and worldly lusts as evidenced by abbreviated and immodest clothing, jewelry of every kind, and by our love for ease in general.

3. That we defy every effort of Satan to destroy the sanctity of the marriage vows and home through the demoralizing influence of Hollywood, whether in the theatre or through the deplorable medium of television.

4. That we decry the sin of Sabbath desecration, and emphasize

that it is not a day for secular pursuits, but for sacredness.

5. That we desist from all bickering and back-biting and every other carnal principle or practice which would bring division among God's people.

6. That we depart from every practice that would prove in any way to be a stumbling block to others or would in any way lead others toward the world.

7. That we despise the damning influence of liquor and tobacco traffic and the narcotic trade.

8. That we defend and exalt the truth of the Gospel by holy and exemplary living in all avenues of life, that we may thus glorify God before a world which lies in heathen darkness.

CATHOLICISM:

WHEREAS: In view of the Papal Bull, The Unum Sanctum, which states, "We decree, affirm, define and pronounce that it is altogether necessary for salvation that every human creature be subject to the Roman Pontiff" and,

WHEREAS: The same decree pronounces that the supremacy of the Pope, even in temporal things, is to be enforced, and that temporal power is subordinate to the ecclesiastical; and,

WHEREAS: The Syllabus of Errors of 1864 condemned and refuted eighty errors, including freedom of the Press, Protestantism, Bible Studies, civil marriages, free scientific investigation, separation of Church and State, public schools and religious toleration; and,

WHEREAS: The Vatican Council (in 1870) defined as "divinely revealed dogma," that the Roman Pontiff, when he speaks *ex cathedra*, is an independent organ of infallibility, (retroactive in scope); and,

WHEREAS, These decrees have never been repudiated, but are still the canon law of the Roman Catholic Church; and

WHEREAS: Every member of the Roman Catholic Church is subject to the Papal encyclicals on pain of ex-communication, regardless of political persuasion, nationality, civil authority or national responsibilities; and,

WHEREAS: The Roman Catholic Church is at one and the same time an authoritative religious organization and a political power—an international political organization of priests, bishops, archbishops and cardinals, controlled by the Roman See; and,

WHEREAS: One of the candidates for the office of President of the United States of America is a member of the above-described religious and political organization.

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED THAT: 1. Apart from any reference to political philosophies, personalities or religious convictions; and recognizing the right of every individual to be free in the choice of his religious faith and the right of such election to public

office as an American citizen regardless of faith; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT: 2. Notwithstanding this above fact, we as a Protestant denomination, the Alabama Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, vigorously object to the nomination to the office of President of the United States of America, a member of the above described religious faith, ecclesiastical and political organization—so that the people of our constituency will be aware of the inherent dangers involved in the issue; and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT: 3. We urge our people to carefully weigh the seriousness of electing to the highest office of the nation a man whose loyalties would be divided with conflicting interests of priority nature, which would prevent him from properly fulfilling the requirements of said office, and may even compel him to act contrary to the best interests of our nation, inasmuch as the principles of his faith are diametrically opposed to the principles of American government and jurisprudence.

REPORT OF WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

We, Your Committee on Ways and Means offer the following recommendations:

I. That the budget be set as follows: Conference Items, President's Salary, Conference Missions, Conference Work, and Pastor's Sick Benefit Fund be combined and known as Conference Budget Fund, and that the assessment for this fund be \$6.50 per member from all churches. That there be an assessment of \$1.50 per member for Conference Parsonage and that five cents per member of school be assessed for Conference Sunday School Work. That the General Budget be: World Missions, \$2.00; Australia, 25 cents; Brainerd Indian School, 25 cents; Church Extension and Evangelism, \$1.50; Superannuate pension plan, \$2.00; Church Administration Fund \$1.00; General Conference Expense and Entertainment, 50 cents; Board Meeting Expense, 25 cents; Hephzibah Home, 35 cents; General Sunday School, 20 cents per member (based on total number of members in main school); Education \$3.00. We further recommend that each church pay the travel and registration expense of pastor and delegates to Annual Conference.

II. We recommend that the Conference President be paid a salary of \$3,600.00 with \$750.00 for travel, plus all utilities, from Conference Work Fund, and that he devote full time to administration and promotional duties of his office. We recommend, further, that he be permitted to hold two revivals during the year with the privilege of keeping receipts from same. All other monies received from local churches and revivals, above the two permitted revivals, be turned into the Conference Work Fund.

III. We recommend that the Conference President hold or arrange for...at least two quarterly conferences or services on each charge during the year, others when necessary upon invitation of pastor or church, and that he seek to encourage pastors and churches to observe the Communion of the Lord's Supper at least quarterly. That he meet with the Board of Stewards on each charge and advise

with them relative to the discharge of their duties in both local and denominational finances.

IV. That the matter of development of pioneer fields be given special attention: That the President take a survey of prospective new fields and report his findings to the Board of Church Extension and Evangelism of the Conference with plans and recommendations for development of same, and that the board make provisions for execution of such plans as it may approve.

If, and when, it is thought that the need justifies it, a Conference Pioneer Evangelist may be engaged by the Conference or by the Board of Church Extension, to labor under the instructions of that Board.

V. We recommend that for promotional activities the Conference continue the division into five districts the same as last year.

VI. That new churches facing a financial struggle be assessed only twenty-five percent of the regular conference budget for the first two years.

VII. That item 2 of the Standing Rules of the Conference be amended to harmonize with this report.

5. A \$500.00 note to be negotiated to the conference from the Jackson Fund for the President's Parsonage, this note to be paid by August 15, 1960.
6. The note on the Ensley parsonage to be paid for six months. This amount to be repaid by the Ensley Church in 12 months at 4 per cent interest.
7. \$240.00 given the Columbus, Ga. church on the church note.
8. The Church Extension Board Members be reimbursed 4c per

mile for travel expense and 1c extra for each member traveling in same car.

9. The Church Extension Board to investigate the possibility of a work at Sylacauga.

STANDING RULES AND RESOLUTIONS

1. Opening of Conference - All meetings open at 8:45 a. m. except the opening day of conference and that at 11:00 a. m.

2. Conference President. The Conference President shall devote full time to administrative and promotional duties of his office. He shall be permitted to hold two revivals during the year with the privilege of keeping from same. All other monies received shall be turned into the Conference Work Fund.

He will hold or arrange for at least two quarterly conferences or services on each charge during the year, others when necessary upon invitation of pastor or church, and that he seek to encourage pastors and churches to observe the Communion of the Lord's Supper at least quarterly. That he meet with the Board of Stewards on each charge and advise with them relative to the discharge of their duties in both local and denominational finances.

2. Committee Reports. All reports of committees shall be made in writing and handed to the secretary at the adoption by the conference.

4. Sunday School. Sunday School shall be held at the camp on Sunday of the camp meeting and those attending the camp groups will be counted present in their respective churches. All Sunday Schools under the supervision of Wesleyan pastors are to be included in their statistical reports.

5. Quarterly Conference Reports. All treasurer's books shall be audited quarterly and all treasurers shall give a written report of all receipts and disbursements at each quarterly conference.

6. Credentials. Each annual conference preacher shall present his credentials at each annual conference session for renewal and proper signature. Paragraph 170 subdivision 2 of the Book of Discipline 1959 Edition shall be adhered to in renewing authorization of annual conference preachers.

7. Illness or Death. The secretary shall be notified by telephone in case of critical illness or death in a minister's home and he shall mail notices at once to each pastor.

8. Financial Year. The financial and statistical year of each church shall close June 30th each year and all receipts and budget monies be mailed to the Conference Treasurer not later than July 15th with a completed pastor's report.

All pastor's reports not in the hands of the Statistical Committee by the first day of conference shall be omitted from the Statistical Report.

9. Ministerial, Labors. The pastor's labors shall terminate with the Sunday following the close of the annual conference session.

10. Moving Pastor. Each church shall make provision for the moving of the incoming pastor, either by paying moving expenses or providing way to move him.

11. Vacation. The Conference President and all pastors shall be given a two weeks vacation with pay, with one Sunday absent from their pulpit.

Also that the pastor have the privilege of holding two revival meetings each year, as arranged between him and the church.

12. Conference Entertainment. Each member and each visitor to the annual conference above 12 years of age shall be required to pay \$2.50 for entertainment purposes, and children between the ages of 6 and 12 shall pay \$1.25.

13. Trustees. (A) Buying Church Property.

All property purchased by a local congregation shall be taken in the name of the Alabama Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, a corporation doing business in the State of Alabama.

The following paragraph shall be inserted in every deed, "That

this property is taken in the name of the Alabama Conference exclusively for the benefit of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, subject to the direction of the local Board of Trustees with the pastor and the Annual Conference with its Board of Trustees."

If the said local church shall cease to exist as an organized Wesleyan Methodist Church, the conference, at the direction of the President and his Advisory Board, with the approval of two-thirds of the conference Board of Trustees, either separately or in session, shall have authority to do as it deems advisable in the local situation, and if any money is received from the sale of said property, it shall be used as Conference Mission Fund to establish another new church.

(B) Mortgaging Church Property.

1. Resolved that the Conference Trustees be empowered and requested to sign and execute a mortgage in behalf of any local church or church group. When the said church or church group shall request it at a business meeting announced at each regular meeting for at least 8 days prior to the meeting and further providing that at least two-thirds of the eligible local church voters are favorable. A copy of the said minutes of the local meeting shall be presented to the conference trustees, together with a suitable mortgage properly drawn up for their approval and signatures.

2. The local church property only shall be security for the mortgage in question.

(C) Selling Church Property.

Resolved that if at any time the local church, at a public business meeting which has been announced by the chairman of the local Board of Trustees at each public meeting for at least 8 days previously, shall if a two-thirds vote of the eligible voting membership, desire to sell, transfer, or trade the local church property, or any part thereof, that a copy of the minutes of this meeting be presented to the Chairman of the Annual Conference Trustees together with a warranty deed properly drawn and that they take into consideration the request together with the deed and if there is no moral issue involved, they shall sign the deed and thus convey a clear title to the said property.

14. Marriage. No minister may perform a marriage involving a divorcee except in cases where thorough investigation reveals that the divorce has been on scriptural grounds. This does not prohibit the remarrying of persons who have been divorced from each other.

15. Resolved that we, the Alabama Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, declare our opposition to the present trend of drift toward worldliness as evidenced by the mad rush for earthly possessions, the immodesty in dress, such as wearing of slacks, sleeveless dresses, shorts and other apparel which do not conform to scriptural standards of decency, and the adorning of the body

with jewelry and rings, including the wedding ring, and the practice of wearing short hair among the women. We, therefore, do earnestly request that all our local churches comply with this expressed standard. It shall be the duty of our pastors and ministers to support this standard rule.

16. The Alabama Conference believes that the use of the wedding ring ceremony in holy matrimony and the wearing of the wedding ring is a violation of both Scriptural admonition and our Book of Discipline. We do hereby voice our opposition to this practice and sincerely request the ministers of the Alabama Conference to refrain from conducting such weddings. We request that this rule be considered by the Committee on Ministerial Character before the Ministerial Character blanks are endorsed.

Be it further resolved that no one be asked to preside over our conference sessions that is not in harmony with this Rule and Rule 15.

17. In the judgment of the Alabama Conference, viewing television programs of the type commonly offered in response to the public clamor for entertainment, is an impediment to the development of holy character. We deplore the current television programs' evil effects upon the moral and spiritual life of the Nation. The principles of Wesleyan Methodism — being the epitome of the Christian religion — obligates Wesleyan Methodists to an unblamable life which constantly rebukes every form of evil and zealously advocates holiness of heart and life. Therefore we must request our ministers and members, as those who must give an account unto God in the Day of Judgment for anything which tends to influence toward evil, to refrain from the purchase of television sets and from viewing such programs for Jesus' sake.

Since Paragraph 39 of the Discipline declares: "It is the duty of all ministers and members of the church to maintain godliness and to oppose all moral evil." And since ministers, especially, are examples and patterns to the flock of Christ, the Alabama Conference expects each of its ministers to set a wholesome example and to be a godly pattern in this respect, so that those to whom he ministers will follow his example and avoid this which menaces vital godliness.

Inasmuch as this resolution expresses the will of the Wesleyan Methodists of Alabama, in Conference assembled, and inasmuch as the Ministers of the Alabama Conference are obligated to comply with each of the Standing Rules of the Conference (See paragraph 141, section V, subsection 4) we request that this rule be considered by the Committee on Ministerial Character before the Ministerial Character blanks are endorsed.

18. Be it resolved that each district of the conference be represent-

ed on the nominating committee of the conference.

Be it further resolved that no member except the Conference President shall be eligible to succeed himself on the committee.

The conference president shall be co-chairman.

19. When the Conference President is elected Editor of the Alabama Wesleyan, he is to be granted the privilege of choosing the Business Manager of the paper.

REPORT No. 1 PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Dear Ladies:

Our Quadrennial slogan, the slogan chosen for this conference session, "Work His works . . . the night cometh," has made a profound impression upon my heart and mind. If we as missionary women are to follow Christ in this declaration: "I must work the works of Him that sent me, while it is day; the night cometh, when no man can work," we must put first things first and be about our master's business if we are to serve this present age.

Soon after conference it was my privilege to speak to the Tuscaloosa WMS in a regular meeting and I was delighted to meet the East Lake ladies and install their officers for the new conference year. Two weeks ago I met with the Ensley Church and reorganized their WMS.

In October I arranged for the speaker and attended the four district missionary rallies. The rallies were held at Selma, Brent, Birmingham First and Talladega North Street. The Rev. We, the Resolutions Committee, wish to submit the following report:

Recognizing that the return to holy convictions, spiritual worship, and Bible standards is the hope not only for our personal salvation but also for the survival of our nation and believing that God has raised up the Wesleyan Youth for this purpose, we would earnestly urge that every Wesleyan Youth resolve to aim constantly at pleasing God and promoting deep spirituality through constant Bible study, a consistent prayer life, and a complete abandonment to the will of God which would be shown by a complete separation from all worldliness. II Cor. 6:17-18.

We suggest, in the light of the looseness of dress in the present age, that we refrain from the wearing of immodest clothing. I Peter 3:1-5.

Since jewelry is definitely unscriptural, we feel that our young people should refrain from the wearing of jewelry in any form, including the wedding ring, class ring, and the like, and gold in any form. I Peter 3:3; Isaiah 3:16-4:1.

We also wish to register our protest against the custom of women cutting their hair. I Cor. 11:1-16.

We recommend that we honor the Lord's Day by faithfully attending all services and refraining from buying and selling, joy riding, picnics, parties and other ways of desecrating the Sabbath. Exodus 20:8.

We observe with great alarm the degrading tendency of the television and movies and recommend that our young people refrain completely from the viewing of them and attendance of ball games, carnivals, professional all-night and Sunday afternoon singings and

other ungodly attractions that would hinder us in striving for deeper spirituality and a closer walk with God. Psalm 101:3.

We recommend that our young people abstain from mixed bathing.

We recommend that our young people do not use tobacco or alcoholic beverages in any form.

We resolve that the young people of the Alabama Conference set aside one day a week for prayer and fasting for an old-fashioned, Holy Ghost revival that we need so badly in this day.

We also suggest that the conference secretary send a copy of these resolutions to each local society, and that the copy be read and explained by the adult counsellor of each local.

We recommend that our young people strive to have a clear witness of being, saved, sanctified, with a real determination to stand true to the Lord.

REPORT OF THE PLANNING COMMITTEE

We, the Planning Committee, wish to submit the following report.

We recommend that some reward of recognition, to be chosen by the Executive Council, be given to the society having the largest number of points according to the general efficiency standard.

We would further recommend that the sum of \$30.00 be paid to the W. Y. President, and \$15.00 each to the Secretary and the Treasurer.

District Organization: The Alabama Conference Wesleyan Youth shall be divided into five districts which shall be called Southern, Central, Eastern, Western, and Northern. The Southern District shall be composed of the following locals: Active, Columbus, Ga., Montgomery, Prattville, Selma, Stanton and Jemison Mission. The Central District shall be composed of Bessemer, Birmingham First, Cordova, East Lake, Ensley, Jasper, and Springdale. The Eastern District shall be composed of Anniston First, Anniston Norwood, Golden Grove, Harpersville, Pell City, Talladega First and Talladega North Street. The Western District shall be composed of Ada Chapel, Brent, Fairview, Friendship, Greensboro, Tuscaloosa, Waycross, Mt. Ivah, Wesley Chapel, and West Blocton. The Northern District shall be composed of Fort Payne, Mentone, Mt. Carmel, Mt. Zion, Nixon Chapel, and Glencoe Mission.

The minutes of the Annual Convention shall be published in the minutes of the Alabama Conference, and the Annual Conference shall be reimbursed for doing so.

The Treasurer's books shall be closed fourteen days before the annual business meeting and all local annual reports be sent to the Treasurer fourteen days before the annual business session. These shall be checked for accuracy concerning dues and turned over to the chairman of the Statistical Committee.

Each active member shall be assessed \$1.85 to be divided as follows: \$1.50 for general dues, \$.25 for conference dues, \$.10 for area dues. Each associate member shall be assessed \$.35 to be divided as follows: \$.25 for conference dues and \$.10 for area dues.

The Budget assessments shall be paid from the treasury of the locals as deemed advisable.

We recommend that the District Chairman meet with the Executive Council during the annual camp meeting to plan and promote the district rallies for the coming year.

We recommend that the Executive Council plan the date and details of the Wesleyan Youth Camp. We further recommend that the Youth Convention be held during Youth Camp.
