STANDING RESOLUTIONS

1. A Committee on Auditing and Finance, consisting of three ministerial members, the Chairman being an Elder, shall be elected each year, the duties of which shall be to examine and report on the Treasurer's books and all financial reports, save missionary, and to be a standing Committee to advise on financial plans.

2. All persons received into membership in the churches of our Conference, excepting those whose life of Christian fidelity has been of sufficient long standing, shall be received at first as associate members only.

- 3. When it becomes necessary for a church to call a pastor, it shall be the duty of the calling church to make provision for the expense incurred by the pastor in removing to the new field of labor. Money raised for this purpose shall not be applied on the pastor's salary. When an elder is elected to the Conference Presidency expenses incurred in moving to the Conference Parsonage shall be paid from the Conference Treasury.
- 4. The Conference Sunday shall be the closing Sunday of the Conference year, and the out-going pastor shall be paid his salary for that Sunday by the Charge he is leaving.
- 5. At the beginning of the Conference Session the President shall appoint a nominating Committee of not less than three members, two Elders and one Layman, to bring to the Conference a slate of Nominations for Committees, etc., for the Conference Temporary Organization. Dele-

gates' Credentials shall be mailed to the Secretary not later than ten days before convening of Conference.

6. No person shall be received into membership in Allegheny Annual Conference until he shall have properly filled out an application blank, which application together with recommendations of his references must pass the approval of the President and his Advisory Board. Exceptions to this rule may be made by the President and his Advisory Board when they deem it best.

7. The pastor of any church in the Conference shall be free to hold at least one revival meeting during the year, wherever he sees fit, and it is

recommended that his salary be paid him while he is absent.

8. Each pastor shall send a monthly report on the blank provided, to the Conference President showing the progress and state of the work under his care.

- 9. Each church may elect a Nominating Committee whose duty it shall be to nominate candidates for church officers for presentation to the church at the time of the annual election of officers. Such nominations shall not exclude other nominations at the time of the business meeting.
- 10. Churches having business with the Conference Board of Trustees requiring a visit of that body to their church, shall be responsible for the expense attached to such calls, unless released by the Board.
- 11. Inasmuch as trial sermons are hardly fair to church or candidate, and since the practice of having a trial sermon is contrary to the usual manner of locating preachers, we recommend that no preacher shall accept any such invitation, if given. Exceptions to this rule may be granted by the Conference President upon request of any church.
- 12. Since considerable expense of transferring automobile title and license attends the moving of a pastor from one state to another, we recommend that where possible the calling church bear this expense.
- 13. We recommend that all Districts emphasize Sunday School activity, and that Conventions be arranged for in conjunction with the visitation of the Conference Sunday School Secretary, who shall visit one Convention of each District during the year, at Convention expense.
- 14. We recommend that no one be elected to Elders' Orders who does not have an abiding sense of divine call to give himself wholly to the function and ministry of an Elder in the WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH. And that no one shall be ordained to this office and work who is not applying himself wholly to this one thing in cares and studies, and clearly determining by God's grace to give himself wholly to this holy ministry, if possible, long before the appointed day of ordination, and manifesting such a determination on faithful Christian service to the church or congregation whom he was called to serve during his years of preparation, so that as much as lieth in himself, he has and will apply himself wholly to the work of the ministry, except in all cases of absolute necessity of such diversions to a legitimate avocation for livelihood which neither jeopardizes the Lord's work or blames the ministry.
- 15. We recommend that each church equip its parsonage with the necessary heating and cooking equipment, because of the variation of requirements in this equipment for the individual parsonage.
- 16. We recommend that in election of local Church Advisory Committee each church permit the pastor to nominate the members of this Committee.

- 17. The Conference Secretary, as Chairman with the Auditing and Finance Committee shall be a Standing Committee on Publications, whose duty it shall be to examine all matters pertaining to Conference printing and publication, and let contracts for same.
- 18. All churches shall have a systematic means of keeping records, as required by Discipline, Paragraph No. 74. The "Ideal Church Record," published by the Bethel Publishing Co., Elkhart, Indiana, is a suggested form.
- 19. Local church treasurer's books shall close April 30, thus making the Conference fiscal year from May 1 to April 30. All funds received after that date shall be counted in the following year. Funds will be credited on Sub-Treasurer's books if received by May 10.

To meet the requirements of Paragraph 165-4 of the Discipline regarding revision of the roll of membership, April 30 may be considered the close of the Conference year for Statistical purposes.

- 20. Minister's Pocket Credentials shall be issued annually to Elders and Conference Preachers who are eligible.
- 21. Since the use of the Wedding Ring is not in accord with the standards of our church, we therefore, as a Conference, disapprove of our ministers performing or taking part in the ring ceremony.

REPORTS

Report No. 1

THE CONFERENCE PRESIDENT

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

Greetings to the members of the 103rd Annual Session of the Allegheny Conference in the name of Him whose work engages our attention! Today we call the Conference to join in gratitude and praise to God for His many blessings which have marked our way throughout the past months since we last met in Annual Session.

We are grateful that the military phase of World War II has been brought to a victorious conclusion, that our boys are returning home again, and that we are returning to somewhat of a normal period once more. However, the close of the war has brought to the church a mighty challenge. We are not in a bright day nor are the times ahead of us hopeful from any point of view. Christians have never faced conditions such as we are today witnessing. Darkness has settled down upon the world. Satan is making a final effort to gain permanent control of the human family. We are in a fearful moral and spiritual drift. Dr. Corlett says, "The trend in the realm of morals is alarming and unless it is checked soon it will be calamitous." Another says, "With immorality increasing at all age-levels, with dishonesty multiplying in all phases of life, and lawlessness mounting on every hand, we face a desperate need of God's undertaking. The deeply intrenched sin of our land will never be uprooted and destroyed wthout an earthquake-type of revival." In speaking about some congressmen who have been meeting regularly for prayer, spiritual fellowship and discussion of our nation's ills, another said, "They have seen that, if we do not have within the VERY NEAR FUTURE a revival of true religion and morality, we are going to toboggan into a whirlpool of confusion, strife and distress, if not outright revolution. Their burden has been to awaken our leaders to see our real peril." As we face the Church, generally speaking, we are no better off, for the Christian Church seems to have lost consciousness and urgency of a mission. It is not burning with a passion which characterizes those having a mission to a generation which has lost its way and which is hopelessly lost unless it is brought to Christ; it does not feel the urgency of the only saving message which will meet the needs of this day. There is a great tendency to heal slightly the hurt of the people, for salvation is being offered without repentance, a Christian life without a spiritual dynamic and separation from the world, an entire sanctification without a death to self and sin, and a so-called eternal security which is security in sin instead of salvation from sin.

But what an hour to beseech God for a mighty outpouring of His Spirit upon our nation and our churches! What an hour for a nation-wide revival! What an hour for our ministers to sound a clear call to repentance. to a regeneration which changes the heart and conduct, to entire sanctification which has a death to sin, and to a Christian life which has a spiritual dynamic and real old-fashioned separation from the world. This is no hour for the ministry to be guilty of just pronouncing shibboleths, repeating pointless phrases, stating meaningless platitudes, repeating doctrinal statements into which is put no real significance, and preaching sermons which have little or no application to the present needs of our congregations or to the people about us generally. As far as we know we have no minister in Allegheny Conference doing this. But, Brethren, let us put more spirit, more heart, more passion, more zeal and more faith in our work. Let us come before our people with real faith in a living God, with a burning passion for the lost, with greater emphasis on personal work, and with a realization that we have the message which will meet the urgency of this fearful hour. This is no hour to lower our standards, but to hold them high and to show degenerate people the path to life is by way of holiness of heart and life, and warn them to flee the wrath to come. Brethren, let us not lose our way today but keep a clear vision of the need of the hour.

We are glad for the ministers of Allegheny Conference. We believe that this is the desire of every one. We appreciate your holding to the OLD PATHS. May it ever be so. We deeply appreciate our laity who demand that we hold to the OLD PATHS. This is encouraging. May God help us to work together in this perilous hour to steer a straight course, regardless of the pressure to compromise from the outside. Let Allegheny Conference be true to her God-given mission.

We are glad to report that there has been real material gain this year. Several churches have been reducing and erasing indebtedness on their church or parsonage properties. Others have been acquiring new properties and new locations. Punxsutawney and Bethel have lovely new church buildings. Riverview has erected a fine basement church. Grove City is in the process of building when the obstructions are overcome. Oil City has been able to sell their building on the hill, have purchased and remodeled a building in a much better location. Johnstown was able to buy a nice church building with parsonage attached at a very reasonable figure. We now have a fine church building in an excellent location in Pittsburgh. This year we saw the purchase of the much talked of President's Parsonage in Titusville. There have been other improvements on our church

properties which we cannot take time to mention. These are splendid achievements, we believe.

This has been a year when there have been some unusual revivals in some of our churches. A number of them have made real advances this year spiritually, for which we are grateful. On the whole we feel there has been a deepening in spiritual life. May this continue. Many churches have had a good gain in their Sunday Schools. However, we have not seen the gain in church membership we would have liked.

That the following be adopted as a Standing Resolution: (We are asking this on account of there being so much divergence of opinion the last few years, so that there will be a uniform standard in our Conference): Since the use of the wedding ring is not in accord with our standards as a church, We therefore, as a Conference, disapprove of our ministers performing or taking part in the ring ceremony.
- 2. That since there is a conspiracy in the land to eliminate sound evangelical preaching from the radio, we therefore co-operate in every way possible to encourage and to help our Connection to maintain a vital, spiritual and definitely Wesleyan Program on the air.
- 3. That we take a definite, positive stand and that we maintain as a Conference an alert action in every area of influence against the inroads of infidelity and apostacy which are getting into the Church in general and which are largely responsible for the vast indifference to the gospel displayed by the present generation.
- 4. That we take a militant stand in every way possible against the present trend to glamorize drinking. Mrs. D. Leigh Colvin, president of the National Women's Christian Temperance Union, declared recently, "Alcoholics committed to mental institutions have jumped in number from 3,760 in 1922, year of peak prohibition enforcement, to the present average of 12,000 annually. Most startling and unthinkable phase of this increase is that the number of women alcoholics committeed jumped from 400 in 1922 to 1,854 in 1943, or about 450 per cent, largely due to the alcoholic beverage industries drive to glamorize drinking." She further predicted a sharp increase in liquor-caused insanity during the post-war years, because of the "Tutoring of men to drink in military service and the steadily increasing production and advertising of alcoholic beverages as shown by internal revenue reports, the cry of liquor shortages notwithstanding."
- 5. That since the program of the present Youth for Christ movement has not always been acceptable with our holiness people in many centers, because the gospel messages have too often been flavored with the teaching of eternal security, because the manner of dealing with seekers in many instances has been too shallow and because in many places there has been a decided overweight of program, entertainment, antics of the master of ceremonies, which savor more of civic clubs than a religious service, we therefore deem it advisable, at least in some quarters, that we go in for Holiness Youth Group meetings on Saturday nights. In some Holiness

groups there has been a pioneering in this which has proven successful. The youth come together, bring friends, the messages are strictly evangelistic, and they have the "mourner's bench" where seekers are invited to comethey come. Then the youth pray with and for them until they are really saved or sanctified. No speaker is invited who does not believe in and preach holiness. There will be decided advantages to such meetings besides the actual gatherings. The leaders of these groups will be loyal church workers, not "independents", within or without the denomination and conference. There will be more of a natural tendency and influence to tie these young folk to the church. Besides it will be a witness for Christ, not possible to be given in any other manner, to have a large Spirit-filled group together from the different churches. Brethren, let's see what can be done in a spiritual way for our young folk.

Conclusion: As we bring this report to a close we wish to thank each one for his splendid co-operation, and for the many who have told us they were praying for us. This has been a great encouragement in the time of heavy burdens. We know not what the future holds, but we are sure God will not fail us.

COMMITTEE ON AUDITING AND FINANCE

Your Committee on Auditing and Finance submits the following report and recommendations:

- On June 28, 1945 by correspondence with the Conference President. we recommended that \$25.00 per month be paid Florence B. Dray from the Superannuated Minister's Fund for the balance of the Conference year.
- Approval of Item II of the Conference President's Report. We recommend that he receive a salary of \$50.00 per week, and the sum of \$750.00 for traveling expenses incurred in the pursuit of the duties of his office. He shall provide adequate liability insurance for his car. We further recommend that when the Conference President is called for special meeting or occasions outside his regular Quarterly Meeting Schedule, all offerings shall be for expense incurred and no budget receipt shall be given.
- Adoption of the Conference Treasurer's Report, as we find his books neatly kept and correct according to our judgment.
- That the Sunday Schools be urged to continue giving the first Sunday School offering of the month to Conference Missions for the use of churches not yet self-sustaining, etc., according to the recommendations of the Conference Mission Board.
- Continuation of sending Birthday offering from the Sunday School to the Conference Mission Fund.
- That the New Aid Plan be published in the Annual Journal of the Conference and that all pastors urge their churches to the prompt payment of the \$1.00 per member assessment as set forth in the plan.
 - 7. Approval of the financial report of the Group Insurance Secretary-

Treasurer, and that the deficit of \$27.33 for the Conference portion of Premium payment, and the deficit of \$9.72 in the expense fund be paid from the Conference Incidental fund. The Conference portion of our insurance premium shall be paid on the basis of membership. EACH church within the Conference shall remit to its District Sub-treasurer an amount equal to 30 cents per member annually, as early in the Conference year as possible.

- 8. That the Conference Budget be raised undivided, said budget to be equal to ten per cent of the sum obtained by adding the following three items: Pastor's cash Salary, Parsonage rent and Church Incidental expenses. This budget to be remitted to Sub-treasurers monthly. Distribution of Budget to be made by the Conference Treasurer as follows: Conference Expense, 78 per cent; Conference Missions, 10 per cent; Superannuated Minister's Fund, 10 per cent; Incidental Fund, 22 per cent.
- 9. That the Pioneer Self-Denial envelopes for monthly remittance of 25 cents (above the tithe) be given our continued support.
- 10. Recognition and hearty support of the following Connectional Budget askings: Foreign Missions, \$42.00 per member; Home Missions, \$1.00 per member; (This does not mean Conference Missions) Education, \$1.50 per member; Hephzibah Orphanage, \$25 per member.
- 11. That the fee for Conference Entertainment be \$.25 cents per member. This fund shall be remitted by the local church treasurer to the District Sub-treasurer not later than May 10th.
 - 12. Approval of the Financial Item of the Pioneer Secretary's Report.
- 13. Approval of the Financial Item of the Conference Treasurer's Report.
- 14. Approval of the Financial Item of the New Aid Treasurer's Report.
- 15. That the Conference President be authorized to draw from the Conference Incidental Fund for such miscellaneous items as telegrams, telephone calls, flowers for deceased, etc., without contacting his Advisory Board.
- 16. Local church Treasurer's report to the Quarterly Conference shall be made as of the close of the month preceding the Quarterly Conference. All church treasurer's records for Annual Conference year shall close April 30th. The Conference fiscal year is thus from May 1st to April 30th for the local church. Sub-treasurer's books shall close May 10th and Conference Treasurer's books shall close May 20th.
- 17. That the Conference Treasurer be authorized to pay from the Conference Expense Fund the following sums annually, in appreciation for services rendered: Conference Treasurer, \$100.00; Each District Sub-treasurer, except West Virginia, \$50.00; West Virginia District Sub-treasurer, \$25.00; Group Insurance Secretary-Treasurer, \$25.00; Camp Meeting Fire Marshall for services at Conference, \$10.00. He shall also pay to the above and all other members of Conference Boards and Committees, an amount equal to all expenses incurred in the pursuit of their duties in connection with their respective offices upon presentation of such expense accounts.
- 18. That the following be made a memorial to the next General Conference; (See Resolution and Memorials for text.)
- 19. That the sum of \$25.00 per month be paid from the Superannuated Fund to each of the following: Fred P. Kerst, Gracia L. Fero and Florence B. Dray.

- 20. Adoption of the report of the Committee on Sale of Conference Minutes. That pastors be urged to remit to the Committee on Sale of Conference Minutes for copies of Minutes received within 30 days after receipt of same.
- 21. That all Sunday Schools remit the 5 cents per Sunday School member Connectional assessment to their District Sub-treasurer. This remittance may be made at any time before April 30th.
- 22. That funds remitted from the Special Offering for the purchase of a house trailer, according to the recommendation of the Conference Mission Board, shall be remitted to District Sub-treasurers and credited to Pioneer Fund.

CONFERENCE SECRETARY OF EVANGELISM

The outstanding need of the church today is a profound, deep, conscious, thorough-going spiritual awakening. An awakening that revives a sin conscience and produces a sin consciousness. An awakening will turn people to God under genuine conviction for sin, followed by a thorough repentance with a godly sorrow. We need more than a mere mental assent to the truth that Jesus died on Calvary for our sins, and all we have to do is accept this fact to become a Christian. That statement, "Accepting Christ as our personal Savior," is the teaching of Eternal Securitists, and I fear, is being adopted by many of our Holiness people and preachers. It presents security in Christ, but does not present deliverance from sin, and

there can be no salvation, no genuine security in Christ until we have first had deliverance from sin. We are not saved in our sins by accepting Christ as our personal Savior, but we are saved from our sins in answer to repentance and faith. He who is not saved from his sins is not saved at all. As Secretary of Evangelism, I urge upon our preachers in the Allegheny Conference that we eliminate from our ministerial vocabulary the present modern term of "accepting Christ as our personal Savior," and hold firmly and tenaciously to the doctrines of Conviction for Sin, a Godly Sorrow and genuine Repentance for the same, and insist on a definite thorough-going New Birth by the Divine Spirit, whereby the believer receives the inner witness of the Holy Spirit assuring him he is a child of God.

To this end our ministers must be both negative and positive. We must enlighten people as to what they may expect to be saved from, as well

as what they may be saved to.

In our methods of Evangelism we are confronted with the problem of altering some, if not much, of our work. The work of personal Evangelism is more and more being forced upon us if we would win souls to Christ and and to our churches. We are now in the day when we MUST go out into the high-ways and by-ways and compell them to come in. We will have to come down out of our mountain of Spiritual Blessing to definitely minister to the needs of those in the valley. Much of our church difficulty is born out of our religious laziness. "Our work will work if we will work it." The message for these last days is in a large measure the Personal Message, the work of personal soul winning. The evangelistic fires MUST be kept burning if we expect to survive.

My labors have taken me into a number of conventions and meetings the past year where I have spoken on Personal Soul Winning, and general evangelistic lines. God has very signally blessed in these services, conventions and meetings. There were 11 in all.

The financial remuneration from these labors has been ample to cover traveling and other expense connected with my work.

CONFERENCE SUNDAY SCHOOL SECRETARY

Jesus said, "I will make you fishers of men." I know of no richer field to realize this blessed privilege of being fishers of men than in the work of our Sunday Schools. To realize this means that everyone who becomes "fishers of men" must leave all and follow the one who promised this success.

To win and to hold new Sunday School Scholars will mean WORK. There is nothing that can or will take its place. Truly where the people have lost the VISION souls perish.

Key Men: The pastor and the Sunday School superintendent are the key men in the Sunday School. We have yet to find a Sunday School where pastor and superintendent are awake to the possibilities offered by the Sunday School that the Sunday School is not growing; and where there is a lack of interest the Sunday School is on the decline and goes back instead

of forward.

An Asset: With so many homes not having family alters and no spiritual training whatever, thank God for the thirty minutes given each week in the Sunday School to receive spiritual instruction. Also the Sunday School is a feeder to the church. In checking figures that we have at hand, in our own conference, over a ten year period our churches received 2,881 members, from this number 1,687 were from the Sunday School. In our 1941 Minutes the churches received 459 members, and 209 were from the Sunday School. These figures are self-evident that it pays to work to build up our Sunday School. According to statistics over this period there were only five churches in the United States that showed an increase in Sunday School membership, our own denomination being one of them, for which we thank God. One of the leading denominations reports that from 1939 to 1944 there was a loss of 25,000 members. Reports for the entire United States reveals a loss of 400,000. This will give us some idea of the job that is ahead of us.

It was our privilege to attend the Sunday School Convention of the Titusville District and we thank the Lord for this good Convention. In our last Indiana District Holiness Convention we pressed the need of building up our Sunday Schools, and also some safe, sound and sensible methods

to help increase our attendance.

We mailed out Rally Day announcements, notices for the Sunday School Thanksgiving offering, the Connectional assessment blanks to all cur Sunday Schools. Sorry we did not receive the annual report blanks in time to mail before Conference. Pastors, Superintendents and Teachers let us all pray and work to build up our Sunday Schools. For Jesus said, "The night cometh when no man can work."

THE PIONEER SECRETARY

To the members of the 103rd Annual Gathering of the Allegheny Conference,

Greetings!

An unprecedented bewilderment seems to hang over our world today. H. G. Wells, famous British author and historian says, "The end of everything we call life is close at hand, and cannot be evaded. The world has become jaded and devoid of recuperative power. Ordinary man is at the end of his tether and only a small, highly adaptable minority of the species can possibly survive."

A leading press writer says, "We now are in a new Dark Ages era. Civilization has already capitulated to barbarism by default of its own standards. The survivors of morality and civilization are as in the other dark ages, fleeing into ivory towers, feeling themselves helpless to be more than chroniclers and observers of the disintergrating age. Christian observers say, "a revival or ruin."

We praise God that as a Conference we are emphasizing "revival." Every district in the Conference has moved forward in pioneering the past year.

Akron District sponsored a project at Loyal Oak, Ohio. Kenneth and Ann Hartley were appointed to the pastorage. The district also gave \$450.00 for the erection of a tabernacle at Robertsville, Ohio.

New Castle District. The Greenville Church purchased an abandon church at Hadley, Penna. In November we conducted a revival there and by authorization of the President, on November 19, Mr. Jack Sheffer was appointed as pastor.

Indiana District. A project was opened at New Bethlehem, Penna. Two revival meetings were conducted, the first by Rev. J. C. Himes and his co-workers, the second by your pioneer secretary and Miss Marjean Bennett. Rev. Himes was given charge of the work.

West Virginia District. Rev. C. V. Earnhart was called to assist in conducting a Sunday School at Wendell, West Virginia. A regular preaching appointment was opened, and in March God gave us a gracious revival there.

Titusville District. Oil City, though one of our oldest works, has remained pioneer in its progress. Recently a building was purchased in a central location. The first floor was remodeled as a chapel room with pastor's living quarters upstairs. The W. Y. P. S. of the Titusville District voted to give financial aid to this new project.

Organization. By authority of the Conference President, a church organization was effected at Riverview and at Vanport, April 28, 1946.

Building and Dedication: At Grove City two buildings were purchased for the sum of \$300.00. These were razed and nearly enough material was salvaged to erect a church building. The foundation is now ready for the superstructure. C. P. A. permission has been granted and work will begin immediately on the building.

A basement church was erected at Riverview at an approximate cost of \$3,500. The building was dedicated April 28.

Other Activities. A four weeks tent campaign was conducted in Fairmount. W. Va. Fairmount is a leading industrial center, and is over-run with small independent religious groups. Commercial and religious racketeers had preyed upon the city until the people had grown suspicious and were slow to respond. God helped us in a measure to break down prejudice and prepare the way for a future permanent work.

Prospecting was done at Uniontown, Butler and Greensburg, Penna., Awman, Albright and Roseville, West Virginia, and Windham, Ohio.

In July Paul Wilkerson resigned the pastorate at Laurel Hill. The work was placed under the direction of T. W. Comadoll. Later the church was closed. As a temporary arrangement, provisions were made for the congregation to merge with Canton Second Church. In July Rev. Dale Brannon was transferred from the work at Riverview to Pleasant Hill. By authorization of the president, Rev. Kenneth Brannon was appointed as pastor of the Riverview work on August 1.

The Johnstown work was moved from Oakhurst to Moxham and was-formally opened December 16.

By authorization of the Mission Board Miss Marjean Bennett of Brant Lake, New York was engaged as song leader for five pioneer revivals.

Services: Forty visits were made to the churches; eight revival meetings; two camp meetings; one Daily Vacation Bible School; four conventions; one weekend meeting. Travelled approximately 16,000 miles.

STONEBORO CAMP MEETING ASSOCIATION PRESIDENT

To the members of Allegheny Conference, Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

Greetings in the name of Him whose work engages our attention! It is with a grateful heart that we bring to you at this time a report of Stoneboro Camp Meeting Association.

V-J Day came at the beginning of the Camp which made it possible for an additional number of people to attend. The crowds were much better than they have been on account of gasoline rationing.

It is easy to say that the 1945 Camp was the greatest, but more than one declared this to be a fact. There was much in evidence to confirm the convictions of those who so spoke.

Our workers were the Rev. H. Robb French, of Marion, Indiana, and the Rev. R. G. Flexon, of Indianapolis, Indiana, as evangelists, and the Rev. F. B. Dennard, of Greensboro, N. C., as song leader. We never saw men labor in so close harmony. The heart-searching, serious, and heart-warming truth set forth by them was rugged, radical and Scriptural. No quarter was given to sin of any kind. Yet, there was a challenge in the message to reach higher heights and deeper depths in grace. The singing of the Rev. Frank Dennard was unsurpassed, was always in the Spirit and was deeply blessed of God. Sister Markell and Brother Yount, the Camp pianists, the Rev. Jos. B. Markey, Superintendent of Grounds, the Rev. W. R. Kopp, leader of morning prayer-meetings, the Rev. D. B. Hampe, leader of the morning Love Feasts, the Rev. James F. Merrifield, leader of the Ring Meetings, the Rev. We feel again that it is not out of place to mention the good order and the willingness on the part of all to meet the Camp Meeting standards, without undue pressure being brought to bear.

In closing, let me urge everyone to pray that Stoneboro Camp will be true to the same rugged, old-fashioned standards for which she was organized, that she will continue to maintain the emphasis upon the distinctive tenet of Wesleyanism, Scriptural, second-blessing holiness, and that she will continue to keep red-hot for God.

GROUP INSURANCE TREASURER

1. LIFE:

Number of members reported last year, 78; members lost, discontinued or deceased, none; members gained, 15; present enrollment, 93. The following are those enrolled during the year: Warren Anderson, E. Dale Brannon, John J. Coon, William Cowan, C. V. Earhart, Earl Garvin, Marjorie Jones, Beulah Landrey, L. B. Owens, H. L. Speas, F. E. Satterfield, Richard Terpe, Ivah B. Van Wormer, H. Blaine West, and Silas West.

During the past year the cost of our insurance per member per quarter was \$3.81. Of this amount the individual paid \$2.10 and the Conference \$1.71. The total needed for the church to meet its portion was \$533.52. However, as stated above, only \$506.19 came in from the churches which leaves the churches \$27.33 in the red in this obligation. We observe in the Conference Minutes of last year that five churches failed to pay anything on their insurance obligation, which is 20 cents per member per year. Had these five churches paid their portion, it would have met the need within 13 cents.

Hospitalization:

Number enrolled in new group as of July 1, 1945, 28; number joining through the year by new membership or Certificate of Transfer, 13; members discontinued during the year, 1; present number enrolled, 40. Total payments received from insured, \$721.20; payments to Hospital Service Association, \$719.95; cash balance on hand, \$1.25.

Since the payment of benefits does not pass through my hands, I have no way of knowing the number of those having received benefit dur-

ing the year.

There are only two enrollment dates for this insurance during the year. They are July 1st and January 1st. All applications for enrollment must be in the hands of the Group Insurance Treasurer, accompanied by the first quarterly payment by the 10th of the preceding month.

It is essential that the Group Insurance Treasurer be notified of new born children, or newly acquired husbands or wives if such individuals are to receive the benefits of the policy.

Expense Account: The expenses of handling of both types of insurance have been combined in the following financial report: Received in special offering last Conference, \$2.94; from insured with payments, \$18.97; total, \$21.91. Expenditures: two phone calls to Pittsburgh, \$1.14; 1,000 government postal card receipts, \$13.00; 500 postal card reminders, \$7.75; letter file, \$.75; form letters, \$.50; envelopes and postage, \$8.49. Total, \$31.63. Deficit, \$9.72.

Recommendation: That the office which cares for these two insurance groups be known as the Conference Group Insurance Secretary and Treasurer.

RESOLUTION AND MEMORIALS TO THE GENERAL CONFERENCE

Book Committee Recommendation: The book Committee being in regular Session this fourteenth day of June, 1945, passed the following action:

"In the years since the organization of the Denomination, the usages of business and the manner of our Church control have gradually changed until the word 'CONNECTION' in our legal Church name has become not only meaningless, but cumbersome and illogical in legal papers.

"Therefore, the Book Committee advises all of our Annual Conferences to take action petitioning the next session of the General Conference, to be held in 1947, to change the Church's name to read, "THE-WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH OF AMERICA."

"And that said General Conference shall instruct the Trustees of the Corporate Body to take the necessary legal steps to correct and amend the Articles of Incorporation to agree with this action;

"And that in the revision of the Discipline all parts of the same shall be made to agree with this action."

An Explanation of the Matter: It is understood that this action does not affect any titles now held, or that will be received before the legal action of the General Conference.

All titles made, until otherwise ordered by the General Conference, will be made as they have been ordered in the past.

If, and when, the General Conference orders this change, full announcement of this course of action will be published.

If, and when, the General Conference legally makes the change in the name of the Church, the new name will legally and regularly become the successor and will control all titles to property as now held; and no changes of court records will become necessary. The Articles of Incorporation have already been changed at different times and this action will simply clarify the name and Articles of Incorporation.

Form of Resolution Recommended:

Resolved, that the Allegheny Annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Connection (or Church) of America, in session this 4th day of June, 1946, hereby petitions the General Conference next to be held in June, 1947, that since, the word 'Connection' in the Church name has ceased to have a clear meaning and is burdensome in legal papers,

Therefore, we do petition the General Conference to change the name of the denomination to read,

'THE WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH OF AMERICA'

And that the General Conference instruct the Trustees of the Corporate Body to take necessary steps to correct the Articles of Incorporation in harmony with this action and,

That in the revision of the Discipline all parts of the same shall be made to agree with this action.

Proposed Memorial to the General Conference:

Paragraph No. 102 of the Discipline shall be changed to read as follows: Paragraph 102. Stewards. Each pastoral charge shall elect a board of Stewards of which the first elected shall be designated chairman. Where a number of churches constitute a pastoral charge, the Quarterly Conference shall determine the number of stewards each church shall have, but

each church shall elect its own steward or stewards. Each church on a charge shall be entitled to at least one steward. The stewards shall be a Standing Committee of Ways and Means, and shall agree with the pastor on the necessary amount for his support at the time of his engagement and annually thereafter as set forth in the following paragraph (103). They shall not hold etc. (No further change in paragraph).

Paragraph 103 shall be omitted as it now appears and made to read

as follows:

Paragraph 103. The chairman of the board of stewards shall call a meeting of the stewards annually, within thirty days prior to the time of voting on a pastor, for the purpose of fixing the pastor's salary for the ensuing year, or arranging a plan of support when a salary is not paid. The chairman shall notify the pastor of said meeting and it shall be the duty of the pastor to be present thereat. When an amount is agreed upon the stewards shall at this meeting apportion to each appointment, according to their best judgment, the proportion of the salary it shall raise. This action shall be recorded by their Secretary, whom they shall elect to keep a record of all their doings, and reported by their chairman to the Pulpit Supply Committee, which in turn shall communicate same to a new pastor at the time he is notified of having been called. The secretary of the stewards shall read and submit a written report of the proceedings of this meeting to the Quarterly Conference for its sanction, or if the charge consists of a single church, a report shall be made to the church. It shall also be the duty of the stewards at each appointment to labor diligently to secure the payment of the pastor's salary in full.

Immediately following and included as a part of paragraph 86, the

following shall appear:

When extending a call to a new pastor, the Pulpit Supply Committee shall state the amount of salary or plan of remuneration as set forth in paragraph 103.

(Proposed by Rev. E. D. Lupton, of the Conference Auditing and Finance Committee and adopted with the Report of that Committee.)

Report No. 21

THE NEW AID FUND PLAN (Reprint)

I. An Aid Fund shall be established in Allegheny Conference for the purpose of giving material aid to churches and ministers who may have a pressing need.

II: The Aid Fund shall be established and maintained by:

 Such gifts as interested persons shall see fit to give.
 An annual assessment on every church of the Conference of a sum equal to one dollar per member, payable, if possible, before the end of the first quarter of each Conference year.

- III. The Aid Fund shall be divided into two divisions, namely:
 - 1. For churches, 60 per cent.
 - 2. For ministers, 40 per cent.
- IV. Disbursements from the Aid Fund shall be under the direction of the Conference Board of Trustees, who shall be governed by the following rules:
 - 1. Aid to Churches:
- A. Loans may be made to any church of the Conference to assist in buying a property, building a church, paying a pressing debt, buying or building a parsonage, meeting an emergency obligation, or paying a needy pastor in time of emergency.
- B. All loans shall become due and payable at the end of each Conference year, provided that the privilege of renewal for one year may be granted, at the discretion of the Board of Trustees, to churches making written application for such renewal. Any church not paying their indebtedness when due, and failing to make application for lawful renewal for the loan shall immediately forfeit a sum equal to 5 per cent of its indebtedness to the Conference, which amount shall be remitted to the Conference Aid Treasurer within 30 days. This payment shall not be deducted from the original amount of the loan.
- C. In considering a request from any church for a loan, the Board of Trustees shall note the record of that church as to its loyalty to the Conference by the payment of its Conference obligations and its cooperation with Conference efforts.
- D. No gift outright shall be made to any church. Only the vote of the Annual Conference can cancel any loan made from the Aid Fund. Such a vote can be taken only upon recommendation of the Board of Trustees.
 - 2. Aid to Pastors:
- A. Loans may be made to any pastor of the Conference serving under Conference appointment and holding Authorization papers, or to any evangelist who is an Elder of the Conference, for the purpose of helping him in times of emergency or extreme need to meet pressing obligations or procure necessities, deprivation of which would expose him or his household to unwarranted hardship and suffering or handicap him in his service as a pastor.
 - B. (Same as 1-B).
- C. In considering the application of a pastor for a loan, the Board of Trustees shall take note of the pastor's record as it relates to his promptness and carefulness in meeting his financial obligation, his habits of thrift, his cooperation in seeing that his church meets its Conference obligation, his loyalty to the Conference and its standards, and his period of service in the Conference.
 - D. (Same as 1-D).

THE PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Dear Co-laborers of the W. H. and F. M. Society; Greetings in Jesus' Precious Name!

We have passed another milestone in our attempt to spread the gospel. It has been a difficult and unusual year. Though we rejoice at the cessation of war and the return of our boys, yet we sense that conditions have not righted themselves as they should. The economic and political upheavels are nost serious. Our Christian world is endangered. Still we find in the missionary field that our greatest opportunities are unfolding. We believe in this momentous hour, that God is giving us another chance to spread His Word and put off the day of the Anti-Christ's coming. God grant we may endeaver with heart and soul and strength to pray down an old-fashioned revival that will stem the awful tides of hell that are closing in upon us.

We humbly and gratefully praise God for the victories He has given us in this work. By the help of the Lord, we held a missionary meeting at West Virginia Camp, spoke once in Massillon, and gave several missionary flannelgraph talks and coducted daily prayer meetings during Stoneboro Camp, which were unusually well attended. We attended the Quadrennial Convention of the Eastern Area at Houghton, N. Y., October 30 to November 1. There were 34 Allegheny folk there. Nine new Societies have been organized this year, for which we thank God. They are: Grove City, Carrolton, Pittsburgh, North Springfield, Middlefield, Hillville, Mentcle, Appollo and Pleasant Hill (Emeigh).

Brother and Sister Landrey made a very successful and fruitful itinerary of the Conference during April and May and are to be our speakers at Conference. Sister Hazel Jones is elected to return to India soon.

We do not know how to express our gratefulness to God for His help and marvelous leadings, nor to you, dear women, for your cooperation and enthusiastic missionary endeavors. We believe this only the beginning of what the Lord wants Allegheny Women's Home and Foreign Missionary Society to do. If we keep close to Him, another year will show many strides made in the great whitened harvest fields. We pray the Lord will fully equip us for this labor of love! Amen!

COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

Be It Resolved:

- 1. That, since the main theme of our Annual Conference body is Prayer and personal Evangelism, we, the Women's Home and Foreign Missionary Society, shall in like manner incorporate this theme in the Conference session and in our local meetings throughout the coming year.
- 2. That we give ourselves to intercessory prayer privately and in our monthly day meetings with a deeper soul passion than in the past. A praying society will make a praying church.
- 3. That we shall not only arouse and direct a missionary spirit in our regular Missionary services, but also engage in personal evangelism by systematic home to home visitation and personal contact.
- 4. That we, individually, give ourselves more earnestly to prayerful and intellectual study of the WESLEYAN MISSIONARY and other helpful material whereby we may attain profitable information from our missionary fields as to their activities and needs. II Timothy 2:15.
- 5. That we adhere to scriptural methods of obtaining funds for Missions and that we give freely to His cause and the salvation of perishing souls, knowing that He freely gave Himself for us.
- 6. That we, who are mothers, tell our own children the true story of life and instruct them in the care of their bodies, in order that they may hold these truths sacred and be prepared to face the immoral standards of

this day. Men's and women's meetings for this purpose, held by competent, spiritual leaders, are also recommended.

- 7. That, believing the Bible to be the inspired word of God, we take heed to obey I Timothy 2:9-10 concerning modest apparel and adornment, practicing "distinguished plainness" which will publicly commit us "to the maintenance of our Christian profession" wherever we may be. See Discipline paragraph 53.
- a. In order to this, we advise dresses with proper neckline, with long sleeves, and with skirts that reach at least half way between the knee and the ankle. We believe this suggested length more nearly approaches Bible modesty than the dresses which expose limbs and are reduced to knee length when worn in a sitting position.
- b. We further urge the avoidance of the nude shades of hosiery, of jewelry, of ornamental hats and patterns of hair dress promoted by Hollywood. I Peter 3:3-4.
- c. Let us also attire our children in pilgrim dress (which, we believe includes the wearing of hose) according to Proverbs 22:6.
- d. Also, we adhere to Deut. 22:5, "The woman shall not wear that which pertaineth unto man . . . for all that do so are abomination unto the Lord thy God."
- e. We recommend also that our honorary members, the men, exercise modesty in dress, avoiding rolled or abbreviated socks, exposure of the chest, jewelry, and fads not in keeping with the glory of God. I Corinthians 10:31.
- 8. That we faithfully hold to the Biblical standards of our Discipline in creating wholesome atmosphere in our homes, endeavoring to counteract the tendency toward juvenile delinquency.
- 9. That we abstain from attending the motion picture theatre, and reading and allowing our children to read the wordly comic books, and buying Sunday newspapers. I John 3:3.
- 10. That we refrain from patronizing establishments selling intoxicating beverages, and also discourage the use of tobacco in all its forms, since we so greatly detest the use and effects of both.
- 11. That these resolutions be read in each Society frequently enough that all members be informed of their proposed attainments and requirements.

COMMITTEE ON PROGRAM AND PLAN OF WORK

We recommend:

- 1. That at the first meeting after Conference each loyal society hold an installation service which includes the outline of the work and consecration to their office. Suggested helps: Section 13 and 30 of the Discipline.
- a. That the program and plan of work be read and discussed as soon as the Minutes are received. This includes the Standard of Efficiency as drawn up by General Conference for local Societies, to be secured from

Mrs. Mabel Perrine, Rives Junction, Michigan.

- b. We also urge that the President of each Society refer to these as a reminder during the year.
- 3. That each Society endeavor to hold a public meeting monthly, praying especially for the requests found in the Wesleyan Missionary. We suggest that a spirit of evangelism be carried on in our local communities by the members of societies, each one feeling a personal responsibility to bring at least one soul to Christ during the year.
- 4. a. That we urge our societies to carry out the "Prayer Partner" plan as presented in the Missionary Magazine of August 1945, by Mrs. Lola Smith.
- b. That each society elect one or more corresponding secretaries to keep in touch with our Home and Foreign mission field, thereby bringing first hand knowledge to our women.
- 5. That each society have an aggressive solicitor for the Wesleyan Missionary. Where is is difficult to get subscriptions we urge the use of the club plan.
- 6. That the President of each society remind those attending Stone-boro Camp Meeting of the daily Missionary Prayer Meeting from 4:15 to 5:00 o'clock, urging them to be faithful in this work of intercession.
- 7. a. That all society officers and annual Conference delegates be members of the church.
- b. That each society put forth a special effort to send their President and a delegate to the Annual Conference, assuming their expense for transportation.
- c. That delegate's credentials and statistical report be sent to Mrs. Eunice Comadoll, Sandy Lake, Penna., at least two weeks before Conference.
- d. That each society send at least one dozen quarts of fruit or vegetables to Conference, to be credited at purchase price, to other benevolences.
- e. That fifteen cents per member be raised for Delegates entertainment and sent to the Sub-treasurer before the books close April 30th.
- f. That fifteen cents per member be raised for General Conference Delegate's expenses.
- g. That each society instruct their delegate how much to pledge at the public missionary service. Unless otherwise specified, these pledges are divided one-third for Home and two-thirds for Foreign missions.
- 8. That we urge the use of the Study Book and the excellent programs in the Wesleyan Missionary. We believe the use of the book review method is most successful.
- 9. That each local society raise a General Conference budget of not less than six dollars for Mountain missions, and five dollars for Hephzibah Orphanage. Let all dues and budget obligations be sent through the local church treasurer to the district Sub-treasurer.
- 10. That we send program suggestions, Sunday School literature and flannelgraph lessons to our Mountain Missions, Hephzibah Orphanage, and Indian Mission, also bandages when required. (Note: Bandages should be cut from 2 to 4 inches wide and tightly rolled. They may be valued at fifty cents per pound. The amount to be credited on the statistical report, but not applied on budget.)

- 11. That we endeavor to raise one-fourth of the Church Educational Budget, including L. S. U. Pledges.
- 12. That the Red Letter Days as given in the Standard of Efficiency be observed where possible. That Easter and Self-Denial offerings be used for Home Missions.
- 13. a. We suggest that where suitable, each society have a Mercy and Help Committee, whose duty shall be to visit the sick and needy and give aid where necessary, and send flowers or greeting cards to shut-ins.
- b. That our Holiness Conventions, where possible, observe a Missionary service.
- c. That each society have a live Program Committee, varying once a month, thereby each member being made to feel a greater interest in Mission work. We suggest the President act as Chairman of said Committee.
 - d. We urge that dollar dues be paid by all members.
- 14. That since the retiring President is Acting President during the Conference session, we suggest that the society send her to the Conference, and elect the new president as delegate, where possible.
- 15. We further suggest that where possible, a Missionary be secured to hold special services some time during the year.
