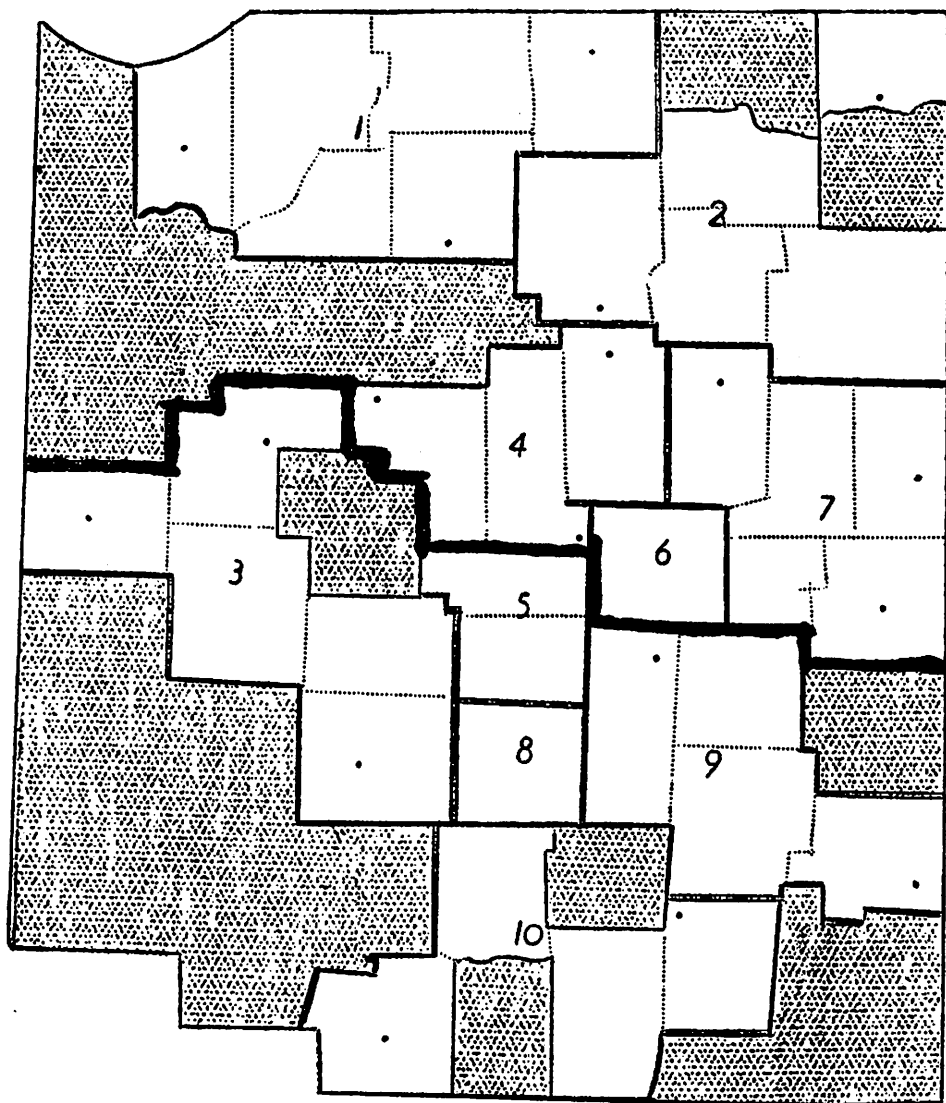

B. Conference Budget:

The Conference Budget shall be sent to the Conference Treasurer as Undivided Budget at the end of each month, and shall be figured on the following percentages:

All churches whose regular Sunday School offering and regular church tithes and offerings average the following per week for the month, shall remit as indicated:

- Less than \$50.00 per week shall remit 7%
- \$50.00 to \$99.99 per week shall remit 8%
- \$100.00 to \$149.99 per week shall remit 9%
- \$150.00 to \$199.99 per week shall remit 10%
- \$200.00 and above remit 11%

These receipts shall be apportioned as follows:

- 64% for the Conference Operating Fund
- 18% for the Conference Extension
- 8% for Camp Meeting
- 4½% for Camp Wiring Project
- 3½% for Conference Youth Work
- 2% for Conference Sunday School Work

This is retroactive as of July 1, 1962.

C. Assessments Mailed:

In accordance with the Discipline, paragraph 377, exact assessments will be made for each church on the above basis and mailed to the respective pastors by the Conference Secretary within two weeks of the rise of this Conference session.

E. Adjustment of Funds:

All adjusting of funds and renaming of funds shall be under the direction of the Board of Trustees, and if during the Conference year there becomes a deficit in funds, the Board of Trustees shall be authorized to raise the Conference Budget 1% for the balance of the year.

The one hundred fourteenth session of the Indiana Annual Conference of The Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, convened on the Fairmount Campground, Fairmount, Indiana, at 7:30 p.m., August 6th, 1962.

III. CONFERENCE

President, and two elders and two laymen nominated by the Nominating Committee and elected by the Conference. The term of the elected members shall be for one year and they shall not serve for more than four consecutive years. It is recommended that no one, other than Conference President and the Vice-President be at the same time a member of the Conference Board of Extension and Evangelism, and the Conference Board of Trustees.

The Secretary of the Conference shall record in the Journal the transaction of said loan after the words: "Indiana Yearly Conference of The Wesleyan Methodist Church of America has ordered the execution of the following loan."

Resolutions and Laws

I. CHURCHES

A. Houses of Worship:

Our houses of worship should not be open to any evangelist or ministers of any other church to hold a series of meetings or to maintain regular appointment for another congregation; provided, however, that usual denominational courtesies be extended to other ministers in occasional appointments. A waiving of the above by a contract or lease of building must be obtained through the Board of Trustees of the Indiana Conference.

B. Pastoral support:

1. All charges should in addition to the regular stipulated salary, assume the responsibility of providing a suitable home in which the pastor may live, a heating plant for that home, and, also, payment of utilities, including fuel, electricity, water, water-conditioning, and sewage, also the pastor's medical, surgical and hospitalization insurance premium. The parsonage telephone, except for personal long-distance calls, shall be considered as church incidental expense and paid for by the church.

2. All charges and stations to which a pastor shall move shall pay the moving and transportation expenses of said pastor, the same to be done in addition to his salary. When the Conference demands the services of any one, it shall bear the moving expenses, if any expense shall be incurred.

3. Each charge should grant their pastor each year two weeks vacation with pay.

C. Pulpit Supply:

1. No charge shall call any one as pastor, or to supply the work by ministers coming from other denominations as long as there are ministers in our Conference qualified and available to take work. The President after he has exercised his prerogative in the reception of ministers coming from other denominations is to immediately refer them to the Committee on Itineracy and Elders' Orders, who shall make a thorough investigation as to the ministry and life of such applicants, who shall report their findings to the President, after which, appointments may be made.

2. It is recommended that churches giving a vote for recall of their pastor, vote on or between the third and fourth Sundays of May.

D. Annual Business:

The Annual business meeting of the local church, which is referred to in Par. 165 (4) of the Discipline, shall be held during the month of June.

E. Church Council:

1. It is recommended that each church have a church council which shall serve as the co-ordinating committee for the entire church program. This council may be composed of the pastor, the S. S. Supt., the church treasurer, the president of the WMS, the president of the WY, the first member of the advisory committee, the chairman of the Board of Stewards, the chairman of the pulpit supply committee and

other leaders or committee members as the church may deem advisable.

2. The pastor may call the council together monthly or as many times during the Conference year as deemed advisable. The council may initiate business, make referrals, listen to reports, and serve in an advisory capacity for the entire church program. The Boards of the church shall continue to function as specified by the Discipline and in no way should this council displace any other committee or board nor assume any authority vested in any other committee.

3. When such a council exists, it should be the duty of the council to meet with the conference officials at least one time during the Conference year when the official visits the church to discuss problems and ideas which have to do with the better operation of the local church.

F. New Organized Churches:

Conference Budget shall not be assigned a newly organized church until one year from the end of the fiscal year in which they are organized.

II. PASTORAL DUTIES

A. Insurance:

1. It is the duty of the pastors to look after the insurance of our church and parsonage properties. All insurance shall provide for losses caused by fire, lightning, hail and tornado. A failure on the part of the pastor shall be a censurable offense. If the church fails to insure their property upon reasonable effort of the pastor to secure the same, then said failure shall be reported to the President of the Conference who shall then have the property insured. In such cases all insurance monies received from losses by fire, lightning, hail and tornado shall be used in Church Extension work as the Conference Board of Trustees considers best.

B. Statistics:

1. Each pastor and evangelist shall file a complete statistical report with the statistical committee, without fail, by July 10. In reporting statistics, all figures given shall be in even dollars at the nearest dollar, i.e., \$1.01 to \$1.50 shall be reported as \$1.00 and from \$1.51 to \$1.99 shall be reported as \$2.00. This applies to all except budget and benevolence items. All unaccounted for members appearing in the membership list shall be referred to the discontinued list. All members in excess of the number reported shall be reported as received.

2. When a pastor or evangelist shall not have submitted satisfactory reports, including statistics, and, in the case of a pastor, when his church's Superannuated Pension budget is not paid in full, he shall be referred to the Character Committee before his official character be passed.

3. Delegates credentials secured from the secretary shall be mailed to the assistant secretary by the pastor, not later than July 10.

C. Quarterly Meetings:

1. All quarterly meetings shall be arranged for by the pastor and his advisory board and shall be held near the close of each fiscal quarter. The pastor shall report quarterly to the President and Vice-President on blanks formulated by the President. This report shall be sent in immediately following the quarterly business meetings.

D. Calling List:

1. Each pastor should prepare a calling list of all the homes connected with the Church and Sunday School; listing the relationship they hold to the church; listing their names and addresses by city, street and number, the same to be kept for his own work while on the pastorate and to be given to his successor on the field.

E. Church Extension & Evangelism:

1. Each pastor whose total receipts from his charge exceeds \$4000 per year should seek to start a new work or make his services available for a revival meeting in a new or weaker church to help establish it. A weaker church shall be considered as one whose pastor's receipts are \$2500 or less. The charge which he pastors should grant him such privilege without censure, with full remuneration of salary while in such a meeting. The church to which he goes should defray his traveling expenses and should receive regular offerings during the meetings for the establishing of their own work. The Vice-Presidents shall serve as coordinators of this plan by recommending and helping to arrange such meetings.

2. All pastors should seek the council of the church advisory committee when a revival meeting away from the church is anticipated. No pastor should hold more than two revival meetings away from his charge unless by the consent of the Conference President.

III. Conference**A. Conference Officials:**

1. There shall be a President and two Vice-Presidents elected, one of these shall be designated as the First Vice-President and the other as the Second Vice-President. One Vice-President's work shall be primarily in the northern area of the Conference and the other in the Southern. These areas shall be designated north and south by a line running east from the Illinois State line following the northern boundary of district three and continuing along the southern boundary of districts four, six and seven to the Ohio State line. The three officials shall determine which Vice-President shall work in which area. The Vice-Presidents shall assist the President in presiding at the Annual Conference.

2. They shall be given a two weeks' vacation with pay and shall have the privilege of holding one revival meeting yearly, in or out of the Conference, at a time of their own choosing and for which they are to receive the remuneration personally.

B. Officials' Duties:

1. Each church shall be visited at least once during the year by a Conference official, but some churches, at the discretion of the officials, may be visited more often. During such visitation the official may bring a message, listen to a pastoral message, sit in a church business meeting, meet with any board or committee of the church he may choose, counsel with the pastor and work for a closer coordination and understanding between pastor, church, and Conference. At least once during the year at the time of a visitation the Conference Official shall meet with the church council as described in Section I, E, sub-paragraph 3, to discuss finances, pastor's salary, problems, and ideas, or anything which has to do with the better operation of the local church.

2. President—The Conference President shall supervise the entire program of the Conference, being responsible for all matters of a general nature and devoting as much of his time as possible to visitation of the local churches.

3. The Vice-Presidents, besides the visitations listed above shall work with the weaker churches in counseling, securing pastors to hold revivals (See section II, sub-paragraph E) and make every effort to strengthen the weaker churches. With the counsel of the President, they shall determine where and when to hold revival meetings in a new or weaker church. They shall also determine the length of such meetings and the number of such meetings each Vice-President should hold during each quarter. The offerings received during such meetings, unless raised for a local project or for Conference Extension, shall be turned to the Conference Treasurer and placed in the Conference Operating Fund. The Vice-Presidents should keep in close contact with those churches in their area receiving Conference support by visiting them at least once a quarter with the aim of making them self-supporting as quickly as possible. They should promote church extension in their visitation and should see that funds are raised for that purpose. And they should work with the Board on Conference Extension and Evangelism in the planning of new works and have as a goal the organizing of at least one new church in each area during the Conference year.

4. The President shall call a meeting of the ministers and their wives in the different parts of the conference during the conference year. The purpose of this meeting is to promote the work of the conference. The president shall set forth goals, suggest means of attaining these goals and in general seek to promote a greater interest in the Conference program. All pastors shall be required to attend this meeting except when a legitimate cause may hinder.

5. The President and Vice-Presidents shall constitute the executive committee of the WESLEYAN MESSENGER. They shall be responsible for editing and circulating it. The departments which use the columns of the WESLEYAN MESSENGER regularly shall make contributions toward the expense of the same.

C. Annual Conference:

1. Each Annual Conference shall be held at Fairmount, Ind., beginning on the Tuesday nearest August eighth.

2. The first Sunday of the Annual Gathering belongs to the old conference year and the second Sunday of the Annual Gathering belongs to the new conference year. This applies to pastoral appointment.

3. The fiscal year begins July 1st and ends June 30.

4. The sitting of the Conference for each day is considered as one meeting.

5. In examination of characters the Conference officials shall be called first.

6. Effective at the rise of the 1961 Conference the Conference shall pay the hospitalization premiums of the Superannuated ministers and their dependents unless they are properly covered with hospitalization otherwise, and, provided they are eligible to receive Superannuated pension benefits, and, provided they shall have received a Conference appointment at the hands of this Conference for ten years previous

to their retirement. Those Superannuates receiving hospitalization benefits at the present time shall continue to do so.

7. The President and Vice-Presidents shall be consulted before any love offerings are taken during the annual encampment.

8. When the churches which have been placed in the hands of the President decide as to who shall be their pastor before the Minutes are sent to press, the same shall be entered in the Minutes as if ordered by this conference.

9. The Emergency Benefit Fund shall be used for the relief of ministers of the Conference or their widows who shall make application to the Conference President for financial assistance in time of emergency. This fund is to be administered by the Conference Board of Trustees.

10. In the election of President and Vice-Presidents, the first ballot shall be a nominating ballot. The two names receiving the highest number of votes shall be the nominees.

11. A citation in the form of a certificate, shall be presented to all those who have been appointed by the Conference, and have given twenty-five years of service to the Wesleyan Methodist church.

D. Secretaries:

1. The Secretary and the Assistant Secretary constitute a committee on communications.

2. The Assistant Secretary is to act as reporter of the Conference to the Marion daily papers, and the church periodicals.

3. The Conference Secretary is authorized to purchase a floral offering for the family in the event of death of any of our ministers. The same to apply to elders or conference preachers in the events of the death of minister's husband, wife, son or daughter. The father and mother of the Conference Officials, who are not pastors, shall be included. When requested, the price of the flowers shall be given as a missionary memorial. The memorial to be paid from the Conference Operating Fund.

E. Treasurers:

1. The Treasurers shall submit their reports by July 25th, to the Auditing Committee who shall audit the same and in their report to this body they shall show they have audited the same.

F. Boards:

1. Board of Conference Extension and Evangelism:

a. The Conference Board of Extension and Evangelism shall be composed of the Conference President, the two Conference Vice-Presidents, the Conference W.M.S. President, and two elders and two laymen nominated by the Nominating Committee and elected by the Conference. The term of the elected members shall be for one year and they shall not serve for more than four consecutive years. It is recommended that no one, other than Conference President and the two Vice-Presidents be at the same time a member of the Conference Board of Extension and Evangelism and the Conference Board of Trustees.

2. Board of Trustees:

a. The Board of Trustees shall authorize all disbursements not otherwise provided for.

G. Salaries:

1. The President shall receive \$100.00, the Vice-Presidents \$50.00, Secretary \$100.00, Assistant Secretary \$50.00, Treasurer \$300.00, Assistant Treasurer \$50.00, each member of the Auditing Committee \$25.00, each member of the Statistical Committee \$40.00, Pension Plan Treasurer \$100.00, and expenses; the expense of the Committee on Itineracy and Elders' Orders; the same to be paid from the Conference Operating Fund. The Conference Sunday School Secretary shall receive \$100.00 and each member of the Conference Sunday School Board \$50.00, the same to be paid out of the Sunday School Treasury.

H. Minutes:

1. The Conference Minutes are to be distributed with a minimum of one copy for every four members of the church or fraction thereof and that the same be paid for out of the Conference operating fund. Additional copies may be purchased at 75¢ per copy.

IV. COMMITTEES:

A. Itineracy and Elders' Orders:

1. The Committee on Elders' Orders is to transfer all persons to the study list who may have been recommended to travel and may not have been given work, providing they are meeting the disciplinary requirements in the course of study.

2. When recommendations to travel and to study preparatory to travel are presented to the Conference in session, they shall be recorded by the Secretary and automatically referred to the Committee on Itineracy and Elders' Orders, without having been read to the Conference.

B. Camp Meeting:

1. The Camp Meeting Committee shall nominate and the Conference elect the one to preach the opening sermon of the next Conference with his alternate.

2. The Conference shall elect five members of the Camp Meeting Committee. Three of which are to be ministerial members, one to be elected each year for a term of three years; two to be lay members one to be elected each year for a term of two years.

3. The Conference President shall be a member ex-officio of the Camp Meeting Committee.

C. Building:

1. No building or major repair involving structural changes on church property shall be undertaken without the approval of the Conference Building Committee.

D. Nominating:

1. A nominating committee shall be elected during the session of Conference, consisting of two ministers and two laymen, the President as chairman. This committee shall meet prior to the next Annual Conference and fill committees with nominees to be approved or disapproved by the conference. This committee shall be nominated and elected from the open floor of conference and shall serve for one year only, except the chairman who retains this position by virtue of his office.

V. OTHER RESOLUTIONS

- A. The use of the wedding ring is not in accord with our standards as a Church, therefore we as a Conference disapprove of our ministers performing or taking part in the ring ceremony.

VI. BURIAL ASSOCIATION

- A. Each local church should elect a Local Secretary for the Burial Association, whose duty it would be to promote the interests of the Association and to seek to obtain new members for the same. And if the church so elects, collect the dues of members and forward them to the General Secretary.
- B. We earnestly request that the pastor present, or have presented, the work of the Burial Association at least once during the conference year, and seek to obtain new members for the same.

VII. PENSION PLAN

- A. Let it be clearly understood by every member of the Conference that aside from the provisions of the Pension Plan the Conference has no fund upon which to draw to meet the financial needs of the Superannuated or permanently incapacitated ministers or their dependents.
- B. Let it further be understood by the membership of the Conference that following the rise of the 1952 Indiana Conference any eligible minister who has failed to join the plan will have voluntarily waived his right, and that of his dependents, to any financial aid from the Conference in the case of his superannuation, or physical disability, which forced him to retire from active service within the Conference before or after the age of retirement.
- C. Any person receiving a pastoral or general evangelist appointment shall be expected to be a member of the Superannuated Pension Plan.

B. Conference Budget:

The Conference Budget shall be sent to the Conference Treasurer as Undivided Budget at the end of each month, and shall be figured on the following percentages:

All churches whose regular Sunday school offerings and regular church tithes and offerings average the following per week for the month, shall remit as indicated:

Less than \$50.00 per week shall remit 7%
 \$50.00 to \$99.99 per week shall remit 8%
 \$100.00 to \$149.99 per week shall remit 9%
 \$150.00 to \$199.99 per week shall remit 10%
 \$200.00 and above remit 11%

These receipts shall be apportioned as follows:

64% for the Conference Operating Fund
 18% for Conference Extension
 8% for Camp Meeting
 4½% for Camp Wiring Project
 3½% for Conference Youth Work
 2% for Conference Sunday School Work

This is retroactive as of July 1, 1962.

C. Assessments Mailed:

In accordance with the Discipline, paragraph 377, exact assessments will be made for each church on the above basis and mailed to the respective pastors by the Conference Secretary within two weeks of the rise of this Conference session.

D. Budget to Conference Treasurer:

All church budget excepting that raised by the W.M.S., the Y.M.W.B., and the Wesleyan Youth shall be sent to the Conference Treasurer.

E. Adjustment of Funds:

All adjusting of funds and renaming of funds shall be under the direction of the Board of Trustees, and if during the Conference year there becomes a deficit in funds, the Board of Trustees shall be authorized to raise the Conference Budget 1% for the balance of the year.

Item II. Remuneration of Officials:

The salary of the president shall be \$400.00 per month plus hospitalization insurance and utilities (including fuel, electricity, water conditioning, and sewage), and that the vice-presidents' be \$350.00 plus hospitalization insurance and utilities, and that the same be paid by the Conference Treasurer monthly, with expenses incidental to their work. Travel expense shall be paid at the rate of \$0.07 per mile. These items shall be paid from the Conference Operating Fund. The three shall employ secretarial help as needed.

1. We recommend that the Ways and Means Committee study a program of life, health and accident insurance for the ministers of the Conference. We further recommend that they study immediately the hospitalization program which is now in effect for the conference officials and superannuates, and if a more favorable program is found, that they recommend the same to the trustees of the Conference.

RESOLUTIONS

I. YOUTH & PRESENT TRENDS

We the Committee on Resolutions, submit the following report:

A. WHEREAS, The rate of crime is increasing at an alarming rate, and in proportion to the increase of the printing of obscene literature, and WHEREAS, The irreverence to God and the things of God are shown to exist in the minds contaminated with such filth, and WHEREAS, The indiscreet radio and television programs are contributing to this demoralizing effort, it is

RESOLVED, That we shall use every effort in our power to make the Christian home a citadel of strength for our children against these evils through prayer and reading of God's Word, through the instilling of the principles and precepts of God's commandments, and through faith, and

RESOLVED, That we shall endeavor to make our church services an inspiration to them, so that they will make a complete dedication of their time, talents and lives to God.

RESOLVED FURTHER, That the parents strive to make possible their attendance at the church for every means of Grace, and their annual attendance at the Bible and Youth camps.

B. WHEREAS, The common trend of our day is to the abbreviated and immodest attire, it is

RESOLVED, That we as a church and as parents lead our youth by example and admonition in the Scriptural manner of attire.

II. THE COLLEGE & THE GOALS

WHEREAS, Marion College is currently engaged in an approach to the

North Central Accrediting Association for regional accreditation, it is

RESOLVED, That we reaffirm and intensify our support of the college.

1. Through a spiritual ministry of prayer for spiritual growth, for a dedicated faculty, for students to prepare for the work of the church, and for adequate finances,

2. By encouragement of young people to attend Marion College,

3. By voluntary financial support beyond the educational budget,

4. By cooperation with the conference educational secretary to arrange for an educational service at least once each two years in the local church,

5. By the election of an educational secretary in each church.

III. THE CHURCH & FORCES OF EVIL

WHEREAS, The forces of evil are combining in a gigantic effort to destroy the spiritual life of the Church, it is

RESOLVED, That we adhere to the Doctrines of the Church as taught by God's Word, placing strong emphasis upon definite experiences of grace, both in conversion and in entire sanctification, our lives bearing witness of such experiences by consecrated, sacrificial, holy living.

RESOLVED FURTHER, That our pastors and leaders stress the importance of reading God's Word, of intercessory prayer and definite witness, diligently refraining from worldly living and every activity that would rob us of spiritual power.

WHEREAS, Communism is an atheistic world conspiracy dedicated to the elimination of God from the minds of men, and,

WHEREAS, It is reported that for every child today learning of Christ from any source, five are being taught by Communism, and that God does not exist, and

WHEREAS, No human counter force has yet been developed which has stopped the onslaught of Communism, and

WHEREAS, Communism continues to advance because its opponents have failed to study and understand its motivation, strategy and tactics, and

WHEREAS, It is imperative that Christians recognize atheistic Marxist philosophy which has insidiously permeated and measurably directs the intellectual climate of our society, and

WHEREAS, Communism, like any conspiracy, to be defeated must be exposed, it is

RESOLVED, That

A. At the Indiana Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, through our ministers, church leaders, and lay leaders, encourage and develop programs enabling all our people to become informed concerning their peril, and the nature, strategy and tactics of Communism, that will prompt them to undertake with faith in God intelligent action dedicated to the defeat of this militant atheistic conspiracy and the triumph of Christian liberty, and

B. That our ministers and church leaders sound a warning and inform us as to the danger of the false security of socialism that leads to Communism, and

C. That we seek to vote intelligently, using the power of the ballot vote to defeat this evil of creeping socialism, and

D. That we declare our allegiance to God, our country, and as God's Word admonishes, praying for them that have the rule over us.

V. THE ARMED FORCES & OUR RESPONSIBILITY

WHEREAS, Many of our own young men are being called to the armed forces to defend Democracy, it is

RESOLVED, That each local church pray fervently that each serviceman experience a saving knowledge of Jesus Christ, continued growth in grace, and God's protection,

RESOLVED FURTHER, That besides maintaining frequent personal correspondence, that all cooperate wholeheartedly with the Wesleyan Servicemen's Commission.

VI. BUYING & PAYING

WHEREAS, We are living in days of credit buying with long term payment, it is

RESOLVED, That our ministers and laymen be extremely careful not to become involved beyond their ability to pay, and thereby bring a reproach upon our beloved Zion.

VII. THE LORD'S DAY & THE OBSERVANCE

WHEREAS, The tendency prevails to desecrate the Lord's Day in making Sunday a day of worldly pleasure instead of a holy, consecrated day to be used for God's glory, it is

RESOLVED, That our people by protest, precept, and practice endeavor to demonstrate to this materialistic generation how God intended this day to be observed.

Tuesday, 1:00 p.m.

Worship in Song—The group joined in singing "Give Them the Word" and "We Are His Witnesses."

Worship in the Word—Mrs. Gracia Banker, devotional speaker for this annual session, read Luke 11:5-13. Her message centered around the thought that "We have nothing with which to feed a hungry, needy world—but we have access to One who has a plentiful supply and is abundantly able." Following the challenging message, Mrs. Banker led in prayer.

Roll Call—5 conference officials, 50 presidents and 60 delegates responded to the calling of the roll.

PLAN OF WORK

- We, the Plan of Work Committee, submit the following recommendations:
- I. INSPIRATIONAL—To arouse and give direction to a missionary spirit.
 - A. Keeping a monthly Fast and Prayer Day and promoting a Women's World Fellowship Circle in each local society and each secretary sending in her annual Prayer Partner report to the Women's World Fellowship Secretary within sixty days after the Annual Conference.
 - B. Seeking spiritual depth and missionary appeal in each meeting and nurturing a spirit of prayer.
 - C. Inviting returned missionaries (Wesleyan Methodist if possible) for special rallies or individual missionary services.
 - D. Providing a missionary library, adding the books of the reading course each year including the Study Book and encouraging and stressing the reading of same.

- II. **INSTRUCTIONAL**—To guide by teaching and by precept the Christian's responsibilities.
 - A. That as mothers and Christian women to live lives filled by the Holy Spirit that will make Christianity attractive to our youth. We further recommend that every effort be made to conserve the tremendous potentialities of our children for Wesleyan Methodism by encouraging them to accept the church calendar of activities as foremost.
 - B. That as members of the Woman's Missionary Society we pray diligently for our World conditions and especially pray for our President and other world leaders. In the face of Catholicism, Communism and any other false doctrines that we consistently pray and instruct our families upon these evils. Recognizing that there is darkness in the world let us also recognize The Light of the world. John 1:5 reads "The light shineth in darkness and the darkness comprehended it not," or "... the darkness does not overcome it."
 - C. We recommend, that as members of the Indiana WMS, our local presidents encourage our ladies to cooperate and pray for our conference officials.
- III. **ORGANIZATIONAL**—To devise lawful means to interest others in missionary work.
 - A. Membership—sponsoring aggressive membership campaigns throughout the church and Sunday school.
 - B. Leadership—training members to become capable leaders.
 - C. Service—praying earnestly for a revival among our WMS members that they feel their personal responsibility to the meetings and encouraging the participation of every member in the programs.
 - D. Youth—seeking to reach young people with the missionary message and using them in our services when possible.
- IV. **FINANCIAL**—To put forth a systematic effort to raise money for the support of the gospel at home and abroad.
 - A. That all money raising projects be in harmony with the spirit and principle of the church.
 - B. That we recognize our responsibility to Marion College beyond the point of financial appeals, including Honorary Enrollment, by intercessory prayer for the Administration, Faculty, and present Student Body and that we train our youth in loyalty to our church-related college.
 - C. That each society support the work of the American Bible Society by an annual offering, preferably taken during the Universal Bible Reading period with funds channeled through the Conference WMS Treasurer.
 - D. The Executive Board expresses appreciation for your cooperation in raising 80¢ per active member to defray the expenses of the Conference Working Fund and we recommend that this be continued.
- V. **BENEVOLENT**—To do such other work as may be for the good of the souls and bodies of perishing humanity.
 - A. Purpose of Community Missions.
 1. To enlist every WMS member in some form of personal service in the home community.

2. To enlarge our Christian impact on community morals.
3. To strengthen the influence of the church on the outside world by cooperating with the pastor in visitation, individual witnessing and person soul-winning
4. To promote a program of social service with the Gospel as its motive, helping in homes where needs arise from illness or emergencies.

VI. **DIRECTIONAL**—To stress the promotion and the reading of the WESLEYAN MISSIONARY.

- A. That, for increased knowledge of missionary activities, the local society promote a "Let us read to intercede" campaign, secretary keeping a monthly record of individuals reading the WESLEYAN MISSIONARY completely, with due annual recognition to be given by the local society.
- B. That each local strive for 100% subscription to the WESLEYAN MISSIONARY plus a 10% increase in subscriptions and that an endeavor be made to send gift subscriptions to the public library, offices, hospitals, homes for the aged, and such other public places deemed advisable. Also we recommend that subscriptions be encouraged as gifts for weddings, anniversaries, new converts and new families contacted by the church.

Recommendations:

1. Whereas there is a deficit of approximately \$1000 in the Foreign Student Aid Fund, we recommend that each society send in an offering equal to 50¢ per active member to liquidate this amount.
2. We recommend that each society make some provision of assistance with meals for the parsonage family when an evangelist is being entertained. We further recommend that this be done in cooperation with the parsonage lady's desires.
3. We recommend that this Plan of Work be read at least twice a year to the WMS members.

Motion—A motion was made and seconded that Rev. Eugene Cockrell serve as assistant secretary. It was carried by a unanimous vote.

Adjournment—Adjournment was upon consent.

Thursday, July 19, 1962

Call to Order—The conference was called to order by the president, Eldine Landis.

Devotions—The devotions were led by Rev. Eldine Landis, president of our Indiana Wesleyan Youth.

Motion—A motion was moved and seconded and adopted that we dispense with the calling of the roll until after Special Orders.

Election—The following were elected as delegates to General Conference:

Rev. Eldine Landis by election of his office.

Clifford Huffman received 52 of the 85 votes cast.

Harold North received 46 of the 87 votes cast.

1st Alternate—Don Shoemaker received 52 of the 82 votes cast.

2nd Alternate—Harold Bardsley received 30 of the 82 votes cast.

A motion was made the two highest for alternate to General Conference be elected.

Roll Call—The roll was answered by 4 officers, 2 of the Camp Meeting Committee, 2 district chairmen, 62 delegates, 17 presidents.

Minutes—The minutes were read and adopted.

Special Orders—The report of district 11 was read by the Conference Secretary and was adopted.

Report—The first reading of the Ways and Means Report was read. This consisted of only the changes that were made. (See Report No. 5)

Minutes—The minutes of the Indiana Wesleyan Youth Camp Committee were read and approved.

Motion—A motion was adopted that we extend the time for completion of the election of the General Conference delegates.

Adjournment—Adjournment was upon consent.

Friday, July 20, 1962

Call to Order—The Conference was called to order by the president, Eldine Landis.

Devotions—The devotions for this session were in charge of Rev. Charles Adkins.

Roll Call—The following answered roll call: 3 officers, 1 member of the Youth Camp Committee, 2 district chairmen, 64 delegates, 20 presidents.

Special Orders—Districts 8 and 9 reported and their reports were adopted.

Special Orders—District 10 was given permission to leave to form a committee to nominate a district chairman.

Report—A 2nd partial reading of the Ways and Means Report was read.

Information—Rev. Wayne Tippey presented his resignation from the Youth Camp Committee.

Motion—A motion was made that the resignation of Rev. Wayne Tippey be rejected. It was moved and adopted. A rising vote of appreciation was given by the conference body.

Recommendation—A recommendation was made by the Ways and Means Committee that letter F be deleted and read to say: That the Ways and Means Committee be appointed by the Executive Council and to meet prior to the opening session of conference.

Recommendation—That a memorial number 1 be sent to the General Conference and that a Denominational Youth Talent Contest be held twice during each Quadrennial. It received a second and a question was called concerning the clarification of the memorial. It was adopted.

Election—Rev. Eugene Cockrell was elected to fill the unexpired term of Rev. Wayne Tippey, which was one year.

Motion—A motion was made that the Executive Committee take into consideration the shortening of time to transact business. It was adopted.

Standing Rules

I. AREA

- A. The Area President is to receive entertainment and traveling expenses while traveling our conference, the same to be paid by the group asking his service.

II. CONFERENCE

- A. The first session of the WESLEYAN YOUTH CONFERENCE shall convene on Tuesday of Youth Camp, the time to be determined by the WESLEYAN YOUTH CAMP COMMITTEE, and the sessions shall continue daily throughout until all business is transacted.
- B. The PRESIDENT shall appoint the chairman of each committee, and the Executive Council shall nominate the rest of the committee; their report to be read and voted upon in the first session of the annual conference.
- C. There shall be elected an ASSISTANT SECRETARY whose duty shall be to assist the secretary and to compile the statistics. The secretary shall be given the privilege of making the nomination.
- D. The TREASURER shall report at the annual conference the locals that have raised the budget in full.
- E. The WESLEYAN YOUTH TREASURER shall pay from Conference Expense Fund each year the sum of fifty dollars toward the expense of printing the minutes. The Wesleyan Youth Secretary shall co-operate with the conference secretaries in determining the number of pages used.
- F. The WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE shall be appointed by the Executive Council to meet prior to the opening conference.
- G. Copies of the REPORT OF WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE shall be mailed within three weeks after the close of the main conference, one copy to each district chairman, pastor and local president. These reports shall be carefully presented to each local by its president as soon after conference as possible.
- H. There shall be a WESLEYAN YOUTH CAMP COMMITTEE of seven members. The Executive Council shall be members ex officio; the president of Wesleyan Youth shall be chairman of said committee; the other three members to be elected for a term of three years. One shall be elected annually or until his successor is elected so that the term of all will not expire at the same time. The Wesleyan Youth Camp Committee shall elect one of its members as treasurer of the Youth Camp.
- I. The WESLEYAN YOUTH CAMP MEETING COMMITTEE shall be seated as members of the conference.
- J. There shall be a YOUTH CAMP of one week duration and the date of the camp shall be set by the Wesleyan Youth Camp Committee.
- K. The Youth Camp recreational equipment is to be accessible during the conference and camp meeting, and the Youth Camp Committee is to be responsible for such.
- L. The Executive Council of the Wesleyan Youth shall have complete

charge of helping new works.

- M. Members of the EXECUTIVE COUNCIL shall not hold the office of District Chairman, but shall work in co-operation with and under direction of the president.

III. DISTRICT

- A. That the Executive Council call a meeting of all DISTRICT CHAIRMEN semi-annually.
- B. Each district shall elect an ADULT COUNSELOR to counsel and assist in the plans of the district. This advisor may be beyond age of membership in Wesleyan Youth.

IV. LOCAL

- A. All organized locals keep permanent records of MEMBERSHIP AND FINANCES. This list of members shall be revised at the close of each conference year.
- B. All churches shall send their DELEGATES' CREDENTIALS and STATISTICAL REPORTS to the secretary by July 5.
- C. The LOCAL PRESIDENT shall consult with pastor when making out his annual WESLEYAN YOUTH REPORT, to avoid inconsistencies in the same.
- D. The EXECUTIVE COUNCIL of each local Wesleyan Youth should consult with the pastor and his board of stewards before planning its financial program for the year.
- E. The General Wesleyan Youth EFFICIENCY STANDARD is to be adopted and promoted and each society rating is to be reported in the annual statistical reports.
- F. That all monies raised for budget and special projects be sent to the Conference Youth Treasurer.

A. Be it resolved:

C. Be it resolved:

1. That all youth who have not as yet entered into the deeper experience of holiness of heart, diligently seek this fullness of the Spirit.
2. That we further evidence our love to Christ by a complete separation from the things of the world, such as screening the television, modesty of dress, habits that would harm our bodies, and keeping in mind that our bodies are the temples of God, thus preparing ourselves for better service to God and our fellow men.
3. That we present to all youth, Christ as the solution to all their problems testifying to the transforming power of Christ in our own lives.
4. That in the coming year there shall be more emphasis given to personal evangelism, with the goal set forth for each WY'er, "Each one win one for Christ each six months."

5. That we diligently seek the leadership of the Holy Spirit in all matters of our individual lives.
 6. That more consideration be given to other young people with the ultimate aim to win them to Christ.
- D. Be it resolved:
1. That we give our whole-hearted support and co-operation to all levels of the youth work, as well as to the program of the local church and college.
 2. That Wesleyan Youth would blend their accumulated musical talents together to glorify Christ.
- E. Be it resolved:
1. That each WY'er be urged to be a subscriber to the Wesleyan Youth, and that each society send at least two gift subscriptions to the school and local library (if permissible) and charitable institutions (hospitals, etc.).
 2. That all pastors set the example for their local societies by subscribing to the Wesleyan Youth.

 7. That we as youth would be more prompt and diligent in business matters; to co-operate with those who are in authority above us.

Report No. 5

REPORT OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

- I. We recommend that the Ways and Means Committee be appointed by Executive Council to meet prior to the opening conference.
- II. Rallies
 - A. We recommend that the district chairman be a member of the Wesleyan Methodist Church.
 - B. That the district chairman be responsible for the rallies and that notice of said rallies be sent to the local church pastor and youth president and to the Conference Youth President at least two Sundays in advance in order to promote closer cooperation between the district chairman and the president. Rallies should be held quarterly and if possible, monthly. If no other system is being provided by the district, rallies should be held on the fifth Sunday when it occurs.
 - C. As the Scripture recognizes that Christ grew in wisdom (education), stature (physical), and in favor with God (spiritual) and man (social), and while we recognize the needs for this balance in our rallies, in view of the late hour in which we live, we urge a strong evangelistic program and frequent fellowship within the district with the goal of more souls won in our rallies than ever before.
 - D. That the district chairman call a meeting of the local presidents, district officers, and district adult counselors within a month after the rise of this conference for the purpose of planning district rallies for the year. A notice of this should be sent to the Youth Conference President.

- E. A special youth rally be held in each district during the months of May or June for the express purpose of promoting the Indiana Wesleyan Youth Camp and Conference.
- F. That the following point system for district banner be adopted: Local president or vice president at rally, 5 points; Pastor present, 10 points; for each 1% of active members present (to be based on the current number of members except for those in college or the Armed Forces), 1 point; for each 1% membership increase over last year's membership, 1 point; for each non-member present, 1 point; for each mile traveled to the rally site, 1 point; for each organized visitation to hospitals, jails, county or nursing homes, 5 points.
- G. That a loving cup be passed to the society, and the award be based on the percentage of subscribers to THE WESLEYAN YOUTH as to the number of active WY members plus the number of subscriptions to THE WESLEYAN YOUTH.
- H. That the conference print and distribute to the locals suitable blanks to implement the point system.
- I. That a state-wide youth rally be held on the Fairmount Campground Friday night of Youth Camp week with the conference banner and loving cup being awarded on the same basis as that of district rallies. That the executive council and the youth camp committee share the responsibility of this rally.

III. Locals

- A. The local president shall be responsible to see that each purposed member fully understands the membership pledge and that each active and associate member signs a membership card annually. No one shall be reported as a member until the pledge card is signed.
- B. That the local president, adult youth counselor, and youth solicitor shall be responsible for promotions to subscriptions to THE WESLEYAN YOUTH and shall see that members subscribe.
- C. The local president shall be responsible for promoting projects suggested in Item III, Projects, Section B.

IV. Projects

- A. For conference project we recommend the following:
 - 1. That the Executive Council take up the advisement of a leader's conference for local presidents or representatives, district chairmen, and the Executive Council, and that the program be planned by the Executive Council.
 - 2. In keeping with the emphasis of the church extension program that assistance be rendered in such area as deemed advisable by the Conference Board of Trustees, and to such extent as deemed advisable by the Missionary Board.
 - 3. The Executive Council be responsible to promote the Bible quiz program and provide the information to the local presidents of such.
- B. For locals we recommend the following: That the locals plan and promote the interests of the Bible quiz in organizing and preparing of the local team, plan visitation programs and special meetings with members of the local, such as jail services, hospital and shut-in visitations, distributing tracts, and radio programs.

V. For finance we recommend the following:

- A. That the salary of the conference officers be as follows:
 - 1. President—\$150.00
 - 2. Vice President—\$75.00
 - 3. Secretary—\$100.00
 - 4. Ass't Secretary—\$15.00
 - 5. Treasurer—\$80.00Said salary to be paid in equal payments, on December 5, and the other June 1.
- B. That the desk and traveling expenses of the president, vice president, secretary, and treasurer, be paid from the Youth Conference Budget; and the desk and traveling expenses of the Youth Camp committee be paid from the Youth Camp Treasury and the said expenses be paid at least quarterly. That traveling expense be figured on the basis of 7 cents per mile.
- C. That four members and the coach of the winning quiz team be sent all expenses paid to the General Conference.
- D. That the budget for the following year be as follows:
 - 1. General Dues, \$1.50 per active member of the local.
 - 2. One-third of the Conference Budget to be designated for the Youth Camp and the rest used at the discretion of the Executive Council.
 - 3. On the basis of the above apportionment exact assessments for each item shall be made for each local and mailed to the pastors and local presidents by the conference secretary within three weeks of the rise of the main conference session.
 - 4. That above funds be sent in quarterly on remittance blanks furnished by the conference. Inasmuch as this is based on the church membership, the church should feel its responsibility to aid the local when necessary.
- E. That the Executive Council shall have power to appropriate money from the Conference Budget for the general promotion of the Youth Work.
- F. That all monies raised by the local for missions be forwarded to the Wesleyan Youth Treasurer for departmental credit and that said money be raised by monthly missionary offerings and be sent in quarterly with the Wesleyan Youth Budget.

VI. Memorial:

We recommend that a memorial be sent to General Conference and that a Denominational Youth Talent Contest be held twice each quadrennium.
