CONFERENCE RESOLUTIONS

Section I. Conference Officers

- 1. (a) We shall have a traveling Conference President, who shall receive \$2200.00 annually and house rent. This salary shall be apportioned to the churches and paid by them to the Conference Treasurer, who shall on the first of each month beginning with August 1, each Conference year, forward a check for one twelfth of the amount to him. He shall be required to travel the Conference and counsel and advise with the churches in matters of doctrine, finance, and other affairs that effect the spiritual and temporal welfare of the work. After consulting with the pastors, he may confer with the stewards if necessary with the purpose in mind to increase the pastor's salary. He shall hold one quarterly meeting which shall consist of a Friday, Saturday and two Sunday services annually. This slate to be published in the first issue of the Messenger and in The Wesleyan Methodist.
- (b) His traveling expense shall be guaranteed him from the Conference Incidental Fund, at the rate of .05 a mile for automobile travel, and actual train and bus fare; also that his desk expense and all long distance telephone bills pertaining to his conference work be paid from the same fund.
- 2. (a) The Conference Missionary Board shall be composed of the Conference President as Chairman; the Vice-President as the Executive Secretary; the W. M. S. President and five additional ministers, one from each of the five districts of the Conference. These five members are to be nominated by the ex-officio members of the Board and elected by the Conference.
- (b) It shall require a written order of the Board for funds to be paid from Conference Missions funds.
- (c) The Missionary Board may employ such pastors of the Conference as may be needed for pioneer meetings. Churches are urged to co-operate by granting their pastors a 2-week leave of absence with pay, if his services are requested by the Board.
- (d) The Vice-President shall act as the Executive Secretary of the Board, and with the five men elected from the districts, shall survey the field and carry out the plans of the Missionary Board for Pioneer Evangelism. Their traveling expenses shall be paid for at the rate of .05 per mile for automobile travel and actual train and bus fare fully cared for; the Executive Secretary's desk expenses and all long-distance telephone bills pertaining to this pioneer work shall be paid, from Conference Missions funds; remuneration for the Vice-President shall be arranged by the President and his advisory board.
- (e) The five elected men, with the Secretary shall organize the pastors on the various districts for pioneer work and shall set aside a Sunday as Pioneer Day, and the pastors shall interchange on that day,

bringing a pioneer message and raising offerings and pledges for this work.

- (f) The Conference shall be divided into five districts by a line from Sandusky to Portsmouth and from Union City to Martin's Ferry, with the exception of a central district composed of Licking, Franklin, Morrow, Knox, Delaware and Union Counties.
- 3. The Conference shall elect a Camp Meeting Committee consisting of nine members, five ministerial and four lay, to have entire supervision of the Campgrounds and its improvements and the making of complete arrangements for camp and Camp Meeting services, and also provide for the entertainment of the Annual Conference, they shall serve terms of three years. One ministerial member of the Committee shall be designated as Chairman by ballot, annually at its regular session. This Committee shall designate one of its members as Treasurer, and another as Secretary. Each shall report to the Annual Conference and the report be incorporated in the Conference Minutes. The Treasurer's Report shall be audited. This Committee shall advise with the Conference Board of Trustees as to the location, erection, and improvements of Conference buildings on the Campground.
- 4. We recommend a standard traveling expense of .05 a mile to the Conference Board of Trustees, Missionary Board, and Camp Meeting Committee, to be paid from the Conference Incidental Fund, the Conference Missions Fund, and the Camp Meeting Treasury, respectively.

Section II. Annual Session of Conference

- 5. (a) The Annual Conference shall convene on the fourth Monday of July and continue through the following Sunday.
- (b) Camp Meeting shall open with the Friday evening service of Conference week.
- (c) The Friday preceding Conference shall be set aside as a day of prayer for Conference and camp.
- 6. All elders and licentiates are required to attend the entire session of Conference. It shall require a vote of Conference to pass the character of any minister who fails in this regard.
- 7. (a) It is recommended that persons elected as Lay Delegates to Conference shall be able to attend the entire session.
- (b) The Conference Secretary shall provide blanks for Delegates' Credentials, including the following items: certificate of election, address of Delegate, information as to how long the Delegate intends to remain at Conference, the pastor's address and telephone number. These credentials are to be returned in advance of Conference to a Standing Committee on Credentials, appointed by the President.
- 8. (a) Pastors shall file statistical reports with the Committee on Statistics no later than the Tuesday morning meeting. Failure to do this shall require public explanation on the floor of Conference. In the case of a church without a pastor, the church secretary shall prepare and file the report.
 - (b) The Conference shall omit the reading of the statistical re-

ports by the pastors, and instead the Committee on Statistics shall post on the bulletin board certain items of vital interest, for the instruction of the members of the Conference.

- 9. (a) The Special Orders of the Conference shall be: Monday evening, a Conference sermon and communion service; Tuesday evening, Educational service; Wednesday afternoon, one half hour each to Tithing Secretary and the Sunday School Secretary; Wednesday evening, W. Y. P. S. Rally; Thursday evening, Missionary service under the W. M. S.; Memorial Service, when necessary, Friday afternoon; Sunday morning, Ordination service.
- (b) The Annual session of the Ohio W. Y. P. S. Conference shall be held on the fourth Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday in June in each year in connection with a Bible Conference.
- 10. (a) All persons recommended to conference, and those pursuing the Course of Study, shall appear before the Committee on Itineracy and Orders not later than the second day of Conference.
- (b) Examinations shall be taken before a member of the committee or a person appointed by them. In order to receive credit for the current year, examinations must be taken by July 10.
- (c) All persons taking Conference Course of Study, shall pay \$1.00 registration fee.
- 11. The Budget Committee shall assign new churches 25% the first year, 50% the second year, and full budget the third year.
- 12. (a) The fiscal year for churches shall be from July 10 to July 10. All financial reports shall conform to this schedule.
 - (b) Conference Treasurer's books shall close July 15.
- 13. (a) The Ohio Conference shall be authorized to charge 4% on loans from the Superannuated Elder's Fund.
- (b) All notes shall be drawn up on the form given in the Minutes of 1940.

Section III. Churches and Pastors

- 14. In addition to duties as outlined in the Discipline, it shall be the responsibility of our pastors to:
 - (a) Attend all sessions of camp meeting.
- (b) See to it that all funds and receipts from his charge be sent to the Conference Treasurer at least quarterly.
- (c) Co-operate with the stewards in notifying non-attending members of their financial responsibilities.
- (d) Instruct all local preachers on their charge of disciplinary requirements to study and travel under Conference direction.
- (e) Be sure all Conference Preachers on their charge have necessary licenses and recommendations.
- (f) Return Sunday School Reports monthly to the Sunday School Secretary.
- (g) We also recommend that each pastor transfer his membership to the church he is serving.

- 15. It shall be the responsibility of our churches to:
 - (a) Pay the moving expense of the in-coming pastor.
- (b) Pay pastor's salary for fifty-two weeks per year, beginning with the rise of Conference.
- (c) Pay traveling expenses, room and board for pastors and delegates at Conference.

16. No church shall begin or continue in any major building or remodeling program until it has conferred with the Conference Committee on Church and Parsonage Building and Location. The Building Committee of said church shall sign a written agreement, to be acted upon by this Conference Committee. They shall also report monthly in writing to this Conference Committee: The matter of such reports and agreement shall be agreed upon mutually by these two committees concerned.

Section IV. Standards of Practice

- 17. We recommend the use of associate or probationary membership for all persons received on confession of faith.
- 18. We understand paragraph 51 in the Discipline to require that no one be received into membership of our local churches unless they have left off wearing of gold including the wedding ring. Be it further resolved that paragraph 52 regarding modest apparel be strictly adhered to.
- 19. We require that all workers, preachers and singers on the platform at Conference and camp meeting, wear sleeves at least to the elbow, and all their apparel be in accord with the Discipline.

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RECORD OF DAILY PROCEEDINGS

TUESDAY, JULY 27, 1948, 9:30 A. M.

The forty-first annual session of the Ohio Conference was called to order by the President, Rev. Leslie D. Wilcox. Singing of "Happy Day" was led by William Dillon. The President read and commented briefly on Acts 20:28-32, and Robert McIntyre led in a gracious season of prayer.

The Committee on Credentials presented their report of the list of Delegates. The report was corrected and adopted, thereby seating those Delegates. Roll was called and corrected.

The Conference Bar was set by order, to include the first 8 seats in

the 3 south tiers of seats, and the platform.

REPORTS

REPORT NO. 1

Report of Conference President

To the forty-first annual session of the Ohio Conference;

This is the thirteenth consecutive year in which I have reeported on the activities and duties of the Presidency, and this is the first time in which I have been compelled to give an incomplete report. Since late March, it has been necessary to lay aside my regular duties. Therefore the official actions which have been taken since that time will be reported by the Vice-President, who has served as Acting President from April 1 until about the middle of this month.

I desire to express my deepest appreciation to the officials of the Conference who made it possible for me to have a leave of absence from April 1, until a couple of weeks ago, when I have to some degree resumed the work of the presidency. Especially do I desire to express appreciation to the Vice-President, who has taken over all of the quarterly meeting work, and practically all of the correspondence during the last three or four months of the Conference year.

My activities have been as follows: I held quarterly meetings from the beginning of the Conference year until March 21, preaching 98 times, conducting 16 business meetings, 1 dedication service, and one church organization. My receipts have been as follows: Salary, \$2200; donations and gifts, \$139; offerings received for extra services etc., \$76.32. I have received for travel expense the amount of \$315.65; for desk expense \$19.46; and for telephone and telegraph, \$59.20.

The official actions of the President, and reports of the way in which the churches have been supplied, cover the following items:

1. Church organizations —

On Dec. 18, the North Terrace church, Zanesville, Ohio, was organized with 12 full members and 5 associate on the date of organization, and others to be received later. This is the new work begun by Donald Howard two or three years ago. It gives good promise for a fine church in this needy section of Zanesville. Brother Howard has been continued as pastor. The church is at present in the process of erecting a new church building.

2. Actions relative to the membership of the Conference —

On August 25 I received word that Ralph Haines had joined the the Central church in Dayton. Since he claimed not to have known that his name had previously been dropped from the roll of the Piqua church, until I notified him of that fact, I restored his name to the roll of the Conference and continued his appointment as a General Evangelist with the consent of the Advisory Board.

On August 10 I received the transfers of membership for Mr. and Mrs. H. S. Harrold from the Pilgrim Holiness Church. I refer them to the Committee on Itineracy and Orders for classification.

On February 2, I received the credentials of R. W. Cunningham

from the Christian and Missionary Alliance. I refer him to the Committee on Itineracy and Orders for classification.

Early in the year I made contact with H. W. Thompson, who was referred to the President and his Advisory Board because of the fact that it was alleged he was engaged in the sale of tobacco. I wrote Brother Thompson in regard to this matter and he promised to discontinue such sale of tobacco. I believe he has kept his word. I also intended to see and talk with him personally at the time of my quarterly meeting, but that was one of the meetings I could not hold. However, Brother Stratton had a talk with him at that time and reported the same to me. I recommend that Brother Thompson be continued on the roll as an unstationed elder.

The name of E. E. Reiber appeared in the report on Pastoral Relations last year as "being transferred to the Kansas Conference". I instructed Brother Reiber as to the two affidavits regarding personal indebtedness which must be supplied to the President before he can issue a letter of transfer. He has supplied only one of them. The other has never come, and correspondence in regard to the matter has brought no answer. Therefore his transfer has never been granted. The recent report of the Kansas Conference lists his name. I do not understand how that could be done. I have written the President of the Kansas Conference for information, but so far it has not arrived. Until such information arrives, or other change is made, the name of E. E. Reiber should still appear on the roll.

The name of J. D. Keller should be dropped from the roll since he has become a member of the Methodist Church.

3. Pastoral Appointments.

The last annual session of conference left several churches listed as in the hands of the President, and two or three other appointments have undergone a change. Those appointments and changes are as follows:

Immediately after Conference the church at Westerville made a protest against receiving the pastor appointed by last annual conference. Under such conditions, Charles Fisher resigned as pastor of Westerville. He later accepted a pastoral charge in Iowa conference where he has served throughout the year. The Westerville church declared their desire to call Arthur Koons as pastor. The president registered his protest to this arrangement both to the church and to Brother Koons. However the church gave Brother Koons a call by majority vote, and I informed him of such action. Subsequently he resigned from the pastorate at West View, and I accepted his resignation. He has served the Westerville charge throughout the year.

On September 11, I appointed Delbert Fruth supply at West View, to labor under the supervision of Harry McQuigg.

On August 10, Everett Cole was appointed pastor at Nelsonville.

The Park St., church in Zanesville was left in the hands of the President, due to the fact that the Pastoral Relations Committee of last year were unable to obtain sufficient information to enable them to arrive at a decision as to what appointment should be made at that church. Following Conference I began to look into the situation to try

to determine what course of action should be pursued. Several trips had to be made to Zanesville before a conclusion was reached. On Sept. 20 it became apparent to me that for the best interests of the work as a whole there should be a change at Park St., therefore, I appointed Hiram Maddox as an evangelist. The church had to be supplied until a regular pastor could be found. Walter W. Jeffries served very capably in this relationship for quite a number of weeks, Finally, on Jan. 16 the church notified me of their choice of R. W. Cunningham for pastor. The Advisory Board gave their sanction to this and on Feb. 2, he was appointed as pastor.

On Dec. 2, I received notification from Dunkirk that they had chosen Lewis Doughenbaugh as pastor. This received the sanction of the President.

Mar. 15, H. Schupbach received appointment as pastor of pioneer work at Weirton.

Further report of official actions will be given by R. J. Stratton, who has served as Acting Conference President from April 1 until early July.

Report of Vice-President

To the Fellow-laborers and Members of the Conference:

Greetings in the grace and bonds of Him for whose glory we labor and by whose love we serve.

During the last week of March while attending our Conference Ministerial Institute and Holiness Convention at the Chippewa Lake Church, I received word by letter from our Conference President, Brother Wilcox, telling of his serious physical condition which would necessitate his being relieved for an indefinite period of time from all Conference duties and activities by order of his doctor. I entered at once upon the work as acting president the weekend of Apr. 4 by conducting Quarterly Conference services at the Findlay Church and continued throughout the remainder of the Conference year conducting the Quarterly Conferences as scheduled and giving attention to the other requirements and duties in the work of the Conference.

As I visited the churches I was made to feel anew and with renewed emphasis that the mission of the church is primarily and essentially spiritual. If we fail here, we have no right to exist or to bear His name before the world. Life is too short, the day of our eternal accounting too near for us to be engaged in anything but what will aid directly or indirectly in the great task of awakening, persuading and grooming souls for two worlds. We are in danger of forgetting in these perilous days that we are called to "spread *Scriptural* holiness over these lands." The Lord has been pleased to grant us some heartwarming experiences and give us some souls for our hire as we have labored for Him. I conducted 15 Quarterly Conferences and 3 ad-

ditional business meetings and made several special trips involving church problems, preached 49 times and traveled nearly 4000 miles. From the Conference Treasurer I received \$119.64 for traveling expense and \$2.80 for postage. Also received \$21.00 in cash gifts and donations from some of the churches.

My official actions are but few:

- On May 18, I accepted the resignation of L. Edmund VanOrder as pastor of the West Dayton Church necessitated because of ill health.
- 2. On May 23, I consented to Harold Harrold supplying the West Dayton Church as pastor for the remainder of the year.
- 3. May 25, Edward Angell withdrew by transfer to the Kansas Conference.

Brethren, we are living in a great day; our challenge is great, our needs are great, the promises of God are precious and great, and our resources in God are even greater. Our Lord assures us, "Lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world." Let us be reminded of this fact in our day—our danger as a church is great also. We are in danger of silencing the message of *True* Holiness by keeping silent on some of its vital issues in order to escape this world's reproach and opposition. We are in danger. "Think not with thyself that thou shalt escape—For if thou altogether holdest thy peace at this time, then shall there enlargement and deliverance arise—from another place;—and who knoweth whether thou art come to the kingdom for such a time as this?" Esther 5:13-14.

REPORT NO. 3

The Conference Missionary Board

Your Conference Missionary Board wishes to report the following business during the year.

During Camp Meeting, the newly-elected Board consisting of Leslie D. Wilcox, Mildred Stratton, Claude O. Scott, Harry E. Ward, Donald C. Fisher, Eldon Martin, and Robert McIntyre, met on Victory Camp Grounds, with the president presiding. The Conference having set the Pioneer Secretary's salary, we turned our attention to our financial status. Considering our balance on hand and what we hoped would come in from cash and pledges, we tried to outline our activities for the Conference year. The making of a schedule for the financial tour was left in the hands of the President and Pioneer Secretary.

February 10, 1948. A full Board met at the Conference Parsonage. Authorized payment of \$300.00 for purchase of property in South Zanesville. Discussed the report of the Missionary Secretary on various points under his direction.

Discussed the need and possibility of a building for worship at Tiffin. Voted that the President and Missionary Secretary be responsible for supplying Weirton Chapel until Conference, (On about March 15 Harold Schupbach was sent as pastor).

Authorized payment of \$100.00 for purchase of seats for Cumberland Chapel. Motion prevailed that L. D. Wilcox, C. O. Scott and R. W. McIntyre constitute a committee to investigate the purchase of a house trailer.

Motion prevailed that we underwrite evangelistic meetings at Creston that are held with the approval of the Missionary Board.

June 14, 1948. The Board met at the Conference Parsonage.

Approved the action of the Missionary Secretary in closing the Tiffin Mission. Authorized payment of \$25.00 per month, until Conference time, for rental of house trailer for living quarters at Weirton.

Voted to guarantee J. T. Bartlett and Dennis Matherlee \$125.00 each for Weirton tent-meeting.

Discussed possibility of organizing at Weirton. Harry Ward and Harold Schupbach to bring report to the next Board meeting.

Discussed Missionary Secretary's report on Creston, S. Zanesville and S. W. Sharon. Voted to ask the folk at S. W. Sharon to pay F. A. Taylor \$10.00 per week.

Approved the holding of a tent-meeting at Miami Shores, and to guarantee J. T. Bartlett \$100.00 for said meeting.

Approved payment of \$100.00 to Dale Duvall for traveling expense to Cumberland.

Approved payment for travel and board at Conference of Dale Duvall, C. O. Scott and Harold Schupbach.

June 23, 1948. The Board met at Victory Camp Grounds with only five members present.

Authorized payment of \$50.00 to Bro. Ward to move the tent and seats to Wooster, Ohio.

Voted to take option on two lots at Miami Shores if necessary.

July 14, 1948. The Board met at Victory Camp Grounds again with only five members present.

Voted to purchase lots No. 767 and 768 at Miami Shores for building site for the new church.

Authorized payment of \$50.00 for rental of truck to move seats from Creston, also tent and seats from Wooster.

Voted to pay Robert McIntyre \$25.00 for helping in the Wooster tent-meeting.

Following is the financial report:

Balance on hand \$916.10, Received \$6669.18, Total \$7585.28, Disbursed \$5125.76. New Balance \$2459.52.

Administration, \$2369.00; Cumberland \$388.30; Creston \$90.00; Weirton \$362.00; Tiffin \$42.00; S. REPORT NO. 4

Report of Missionary Secretary

Our activities and labors have been in a different field this year due to the call of the Conference and the call of the Master. Immediately following Conference we began to make every adjustment necessary to diligently perform the duties outlined by the Missionary Board. This has been a year of battles, but thank God there has been some victories. Being new in this field there were some lessons to be learned, some mistakes made, and many things that had to be left undone. In this period of adjustment from pastor to Pioneer Secretary, we have appreciated the help that you have given us. The former Pioneer Secretary did everything humanly possible to help us in this work. Then we have sensed the leadership of the Lord, without which we would have utterly failed. Also we have felt that the members of this Conference were standing behind us with their prayers. To God we offer grateful praise and to you fellow laborers sincere thanks.

We have had to work against two major hindrances this year. First, it has been almost impossible to either rent or buy any place for worship or suitable living quarters for our preachers. Second, we have been able to find only a few men who were able or willing to pioneer. Thus at least three of the pioneer points have suffered losses which otherwise would not have occurred.

My time has been divided thus; August 1 to September 11, visited the mission points; September 12 to November 9, made financial tour; November 11 to 23, held revival at Weirton; November 24 to March 14, pastored at Weirton; March 15 to June 20, visited several independent groups and made contacts in various other places; June 21 to July 4, held pioneer tent-meeting at Miami Shores; July 9 to July 18, held pioneer tent-meeting in Wooster.

I have preached 132 times, held several business meetings and one dedication service. Also traveled 15,991 recorded miles:

I have received from the Conference treasurer \$1680.00 for salary and \$639.64 for travel plus \$49.36 for telephone and desk expense. From offerings in revival meetings \$40.00; from gifts \$117.85; from special services \$97.00; for parsonage rent \$360.00.

Last year only two organized churches were left in our care. New Bloomington has had a good year and Norwood has had an extra good year. Both of these will be reported by their respective pastors. One mission point was organized; On December 18 our Conference President organized a class of 16 full members and 5 associates at Zanesville (N. Terrace). This newest church is making excellent progress and is now in a building program. Bro. F. A. Taylor is doing an excellent job at S. W. Sharon. Much improvement has been made on the church building and we trust that there will soon be an organization effected there. Weirton Heights will be reported by Bro. Harold Schupbach who has been pastoring there for the last four months. We are no longer carrying the Tiffin work due to various difficulties that arose during the year.

Three new missions have been started this year. Cumberland is the first one. Bro. Dale Duvall felt led of the Lord to open with a tent meeting in Cumberland and as the Lord opened the door we were able to rent a chapel there for services. This has continued throughout the year with regular services and an increasing attendance. The future looks bright at Cumberland. South Zanesville is the second new point. Bro. Howard held a tent-meeting there immediately following the Cumberland meeting. He had a group who requested this tent-meeting and were interested enough to follow up the revival with services in one of their homes. Not until February were they able to buy a small building in the heart of town for a place of worship. The group at South Zanesville is small but they have a vision that will carry them a long way in establishing a strong holiness church in that city. The work is under the supervision of Bro. Howard but Bro. John Welch has been conducting the services. The third new point is at Miami Shores, just out of Dayton. Bro. Kenneth Martin, a local preacher from Central Church got a burden for this field and with the help of some of the Dayton pastors made a survey that revealed the need of a holiness church at Miami Shores. The Dayton Holiness Tent-Meeting was held at the Shores June 10 to 20. Then J. T. Bartlett and the Missionary Secretary carried on the tent-meeting until July 4. Feeling that we should go on with the meeting we engaged Bro. and Sr. Gladstone Woodhouse for eight more days. The people became very much interested in our church and on July 12, Bro. D. C. Fisher organized a Mission with Bro. Kenneth Martin as pastor. The first regular Sunday morning Sunday School found 37 present. This work bids to be a bright spot in our pioneer efforts.

Besides the three new points this year, an effort is being made to get a work started in Wooster. Bro. Robert McIntyre helped the Missionary Secretary in a pioneer tent-meeting there from July 9 to 18. The first Sunday School session was held in Memorial Hall July 25 with 19 present. Wooster is a city of 14,000 population and very little holiness being preached, This is a challenge. What shall we do with it?

These are only a few of the fields that we should be taking the full gospel message to, as many are longing for the true light. We had hoped to start work in Toledo, but to date the doors have not fully opened. Other cities that show good promise for the future are; New Philadelphia, Mt. Vernon, Orrville, Prospect and Stroud's Run.

Let us continue to push forward into the enemy's territory and snatch as many as possible from the grip of false doctrines. Only with a full program of pioneer evangelism will we be able to do this. Others have marked the way. God is leading us forward. Lord help us to follow.

We covenant with you to call only when there is actual need, if you will respond when the call comes. We dare not neglect this part of the work of the Lord.

REPORT NO. 12

Report on Moral Reform

RESOLVED:

- 1. That, we, the members of the Ohio Conference, realizing the allconquering, strengthening power of prayer, will make it a more vital part of both private and family life; that we will maintain family piety and righteousness in our homes; that we will keep the family altar aglow with holy fire.
- 2. That, due to the alarming condition of the Divorce problem and realizing that something must be done, we, the members of the Ohio Conference, for the sake of our oncoming generation and the cause we love, urge our pastors and christian workers to diligently warn our people and teach our children the sanctity of the marriage covenant and God's abhorrence of the divorce evil, and the danger of hasty marriages.
- 3. That, we will diligently teach our children the snare of the movies, taking a definite stand against the film movies in our public schools, also taking a definite stand against mixed bathing or public beaches.
- 4. That, because of the inroads of immodesty in dress entering our holiness ranks and the laxness even amongst our members, we, under the authority of God's Word, the members of the Ohio Conference, will not only walk profitably, uprightly and well-pleasing in the sight of God,

but will dress outwardly as becometh holiness; that, we as Christian parents will apply the same standards to our children; that, we as christian ministers, will apply the same standard to our platform workers; that we herewith reaffirm our stand as a Conference against the modern trend of bobbed hair, permanent waves, the wedding ring, jewelry, the wearing of slacks, shorts, anklets, short skirts, and many other forms of nudity; that our ministers and their families set the example in plainness, neatness and simplicity of dress; that modesty means being sufficiently covered.

5. That, since the Lord's Day was instituted as a day of worship as well as a day of rest, we recommend that the Lord's Day be kept holy by (1) regular attendance of the means of grace and (2) that the Lord's Day be kept holy with no buying, selling, working or causing others to labor on our behalf unnecessarily, reading of secular papers, or social visiting where God is not glorified.

6. That, since our nation is encouraging in such alarming proportions the liquor traffic and the curse of smoking has invaded the ranks of young and old alike, each pastor and layman will be diligent in raising his voice and influence against these evils; that we as Christians refrain from patronizing any establishments handling or selling such.

7. That, we as brethren and sisters in the Lord will contend to create wherever we are an atmosphere conducive to deep spirituality, laying aside any lightness and all undue levity. Even when quoting others let us remember that "as he which hath called you is holy, so be ye holy in all manner of conversation." 1 Peter 1:15.

8. That, our pastors be responsible to hold these truths before the people from time to time during the Conference year.

REPORT NO. 15

Conference Trustee's Report

Your Conference Trustees beg leave to submit the following report.

August 8, 1947. The motion prevailed that the local church in Piqua be authorized to dismantle the present church building in Piqua or the lot owned by the local church and the Ohio Conference.

Gave this church permission to build a basement church provided half of the amount of the cost of the building be in the treasury before building operations begin.

In compliance to the instruction of the conference the motion prevailed that we construct a vault on the camp ground, in which to keep the record books and necessary papers of the conference. After some inquiry learned that such a vault, without heat during the winter months, would not be satisfactory, also because of lack of funds, the vault was not built. However a fair substitute was found which probably would cost about forty dollars, and could be kept in the home of the secretary. We would recommend that this matter be further investigated.

April 2, 1948. By common consent the Wesleyan Methodist Church of Columbus, Ohio, was given a gift, from The Church Extension Fund, the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) toward the purchase of a lot upon which to build a church building.

June 26, 1948. Motion prevailed that we give from the Church Extension Fund, the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) to the Wesleyan Methodist Church at Conesville, Ohio, also to the North Terrace Church at Zanesville, Ohio.

July 28, 1948. Motion prevailed that the Dayton West Church complete the parsonage basement, according to plans, so that it may be used as a place of worship, until such a time as the church building can be built.

Motion prevailed that the loan, on the parsonage now owned, by the above church, be refinanced to acquire money needed to complete the new church building.

- 4. That, Helen Calhoon and Mildred Scott be a committee of two to arrange with the campmeeting committee for the children's work during the conference and camp.

In a previous meeting we voted to pay Mother Wilcox Thirty Dollars (\$30) for her labors of love.

REPORT NO. 2

Plan of Work

1. We recommend that each local society follow closely items I, II, III, and IV of the General Conference Plan of Work as found in the 1947 leaflets and on page 17 of the August 1947 Wesleyan Missionary.

2. We recommend and urge that more time be given in each local

meeting to prayer, with a Fast and Prayer Day as often as possible.

3. We recommend careful study of and adherence to the items of the Local Society Standard of Efficiency.

4. We recommend continued cooperation with the new set-up for

the Y. M. W. B. and W. Y. P. S. programs.

5. We recommend that each local society be assessed \$1.00 to apply on the cost of laundering, and the general care of camp bedding.

6. We recommend that each society send an offering of not less than \$.50 to the Conference W. M. S. Treasurer before Dec. 1, the same to be sent to the Mexican work as a Christmas offering, not to apply on budget.

7. We recommend systematic giving throughout the year in each local society for the Day Fund. We urge that the giving shall be not less than an average of \$3.00 per member. We suggest a plan of a monthly contribution of 25c per member. Money raised for this fund does not receive budget credit.

8. We recommend that at the time the delegate presents the conference report she present the need of the new Missionary Building and a special time be set when an offering shall be taken for the same. This offering shall be sent in with the first quarterly remittance of the Treasurer and does not apply on budget.

9. We recommend that each society make a greater effort next year to bring maps, posters, and curios for the Missionary Display Booth.

- 10. We recommend the observance of May Day by all societies. The gifts of Foreign Missionaries shall be sent to the Missionary Home, 32 Bergen Ave., Jersey City 5, N. J. Gifts for Home Missionaries shall be sent to the respective individuals.
- 11. Since gifts of used clothing to Home Missions no longer receive financial credit, we are not recommending a list of assigned stations. We recommend that a Station be contacted before sending to that Station that you may know if they can use the type of material you have to send.
- 12. We recommend the holding of at least two conventions in each District of the Conference during the year.
- 13. We recommend that the Plan of Work be read aloud in each local society once each quarter during the year.
- 14. We recommend that mimeographed copies of the Plan of Work be sent immediately following Camp to each local society.

REPORT NO. 4

Committee On Plans

We, the Committee on Plans, desire to submit the following report:

- 1. We recommend (a) that a gospel team, chosen from the more spiritual young people, be organized in each society to hold special services in jails, hospitals, and other institutions. (b) That the District Chairman shall arrange for these teams to visit other societies in the District, or Churches where there is no society, for the purpose of promoting Youth Work in each church. (c) That the expenses of these meetings be deducted from the offerings taken and the balance applied on the Tabernacle Fund.
- 2. We recommend that the President of the local society shall post on the church bulletin board a copy of the Constitution, a copy of the requirements of membership, and a copy of methods and plans adopted at this Conference session.
- 3. We recommend that one service quarterly be given to the direct study of the Discipline.
- 4. We recommend that each District make a special drive in obtaining Youth subscriptions and that some form of Contest be used in obtaining them, having as our goal a 25% increase in subscriptions.
- 5. We recommend (a) that each District secretary send a report of the activities of that District biannually to the Conference Secretary, all reports to be in by May 30th., including the names of the young people of that District in attendance at one of our colleges. (b) That the Conference Secretary send a combined report of the district activities biannually to each of these college students.
- 6. We recommend that each local society adopt and carry through some definite project for the coming year.
- 7. We recommend that each district hold at least one youth rally each quarter.
- 8. We recommend that the younger members of the Young People's Society be permitted to take an active part in the services and work of the Society.
- 9. We recommend that we have a more extensive program in announcing and publicising our Young People's Bible Conference-Convention and our Rallies by posters etc.
- 10. We recommend that the Conference W. Y. P. S. President visit at least one rally in each district during the year.
- 11. We recommend that our Young People's Societies be aggressive in placing the Wesleyan Youth in libraries, Children's Homes, and Hospitals, and that each member be a subscriber of the Wesleyan Youth.
- 12. We recommend that each local church plan special events for Youth Week.
- 13. We recommend that our local societies adopt the Door Bell Bundle Plan.
 - 14. We recommend that each local society have a visiting committee.

- 4. We recommend that the W. Y. P. S. Conference President be paid the sum of \$30.00 in appreciation of his labors and traveling expenses at the rate of \$.04 per mile.
- 5. We recommend that the Secretary and Treasurer be paid all desk expenses.
- 6. We recommend that each Society pay traveling expenses, room, and board for delegates to Conference.
- 7. We recommend that the W. Y. P. S. Treasurer pay \$25.00 to the Marion College Area W. Y. P. S. Treasurer for Area Assessment.
- 8. We recommend that the Conference Young People's Society pay for its share of space in the Conference minutes, and for five complimentary copies to be sent to the Area Presidents and the General Secretary.
- 9. We recommend that each Society contribute \$5.00 or more toward the support of David Day, same not to apply on budget. The remaining monthly missionary offerings may be applied on Foreign Missionary budget.
- 10. We recommend that each society be assessed \$1.00 per member for the Tabernacle Fund.
