Standing Rules

- 1. Conference President—Resolved, (1) That the Conference President be required, authorized and appointed to travel the Conference as President, having general supervision of the spiritual interests and benevolences thereof, holding at least one service at each church during the year under such date as he may announce in advance; (2) That he shall raise funds to meet the demands of the Conference work, assisted by the pastors, and he shall receive contributions for Missions, Education, and Superannuated Ministers, where there are no pastors; (3) That he shall have general supervision of the church property, and shall inquire into the titles of the same, to see that no property is loosely held, and shall look after the rental of Conference property, and see that the rent is turned into the treasury, and he shall investigate the possibility and feasibility of the sale of property not in use, and report his findings to the next Annual Conference; (4) That he shall be authorized to grant letters to disband classes; (5) That he shall be required to write non-resident members of the Conference asking them in case they cannot attend, to write the Conference a letter of greeting and state the condition of their religious experience; (6) That he shall devote as much time as possible and as occasion may afford in evangelistic and other meetings in the Conference (7) That he may engage such help from time to time, as may be available, and who he may consider properly qualified to assist in holding Evangelistic and Quarterly Meetings, such help to be remunerated from the Church Extension Fund, (8) That he shall be paid from the Conference Budget the sum of sixty dollars (\$60) per week for his services; the same to be paid monthly, in advance; he shall also be paid official expense, and rent as adjusted by the Camp Meeting Committee.
- II. Legal Duties of Trustees—Resolved, that the duly-elected and qualified Trustees of the Annual Conference are hereby authorized and directed to sign for the purchase, sale, mortgaging and conveyance of real estate recommended by the Conference Missionary Board during the interim between the meetings of Annual Conference, and all such action or actions shall be deemed to be legal and binding upon the Annual Conference, and as of full force and effect as they would have been if such actions on the part of the Trustees had been specially authorized by the Annual Conference. It is further resolved that the President and the Secretary of the Board of Trustees shall be authorized to sign on behalf of the Board of Trustees all necessary papers in carrying out the authorized actions of the Board of Trustees, such signatures to be valid and binding as if all members of the Board of Trustees had signed said papers.
- III. Church Exension Fund—Resolved, that the Missionary Board is hereby authorized to pay out all monies from the Church Extension Fund.
- IV. Committee Reports—Resolved, that all reports of Committees be made in writing, complete and ready for the printer, and handed to the Secretary at at the earliest possible date after such report has been made.
- V. Camp Meeting Committee—Resolved, (1) That the Camp ground property be under the care of the Camp Meeting Committee; (2) That this Committee shall have power to engage workers beyond the present year.
- VI. Sunday School—Resolved, that each Sunday School under the pastoral oversight of Wesleyan Methodist pastors shall be included in a separate Statistical Report.
- VII. Minutes-Resolved, that the Conference Secretary bill each church for number of minutes ordered by that church and that the Conference Sec-

retary bill the Conference Fund for those minutes not ordered by individual churches.

- VIII. Conference Officers—Resolved, that the officers be installed during Conference, at a public service announced in advance, and office to take effect at the rise of Conference.
- IX. Leave—Resolved, that no member shall leave the Conference Session without the permission of the President.
- X. Pastor's Report—Resolved, that each ministerial member of our Conference report to his Quarter y and Annual Conferences: the number of sermons preached; prayer meetings attended; homes visited and pastoral calls made.
- XI. Text Books-Resolved, that all persons shall be requested to bring the text books to Conference in which they are to be examined.
- XII. Credentials—Resolved, that each Local and Annual Conference Preacher present their credentials at Conference for their renewal and proper signature.
- XIII. Camp Meeting Fund—Resolved, (1) That all pledges and cash, received during the sessions of Conference and Camp Meeting, be placed in the Camp Meeting Fund unless otherwise designated; (2) That the incidental expenses of the Annual Conference, while in session, be paid from the Camp Meeting Fund.
- XIV. Sunday School-Resolved, that Sunday School shall be held each Sunday of Conference and Camp Meeting.
- XV. Death or Illness—Resolved, that the Conference Secretary be notified by phone in case of a death or critical illness in a minister's home, and that he shall send cards at once to each pastor.
- XVI. Conference Fiscal Year—Resolved, that the Conference Fiscal Year close July 15th; that all money shall be in the hands of the proper Treasurers on, or before that date; that immediately thereafter, each pastor shall submit to the Conference Treasurer his budget check sheet with receipts covering same, and his statistical blank completed except for the budget section; that the Conference Treasurer shall fill in budget items and return to the pastor as soon as possible.
- XVII. Moving Pastors—Resolved, that each charge make provision for moving expense of the incoming pastor, within thirty days after the Annual Conference adjourns.
- XVIII. Pastors Support During Conference—Resolved, that it be our plan that all pastors remain on their charges for one Sunday after Conference, and that the churchs financial obligation to the pastor, whether he be leaving the field or not, be extended through that Sunday.
- XIX. Minister's Vacation—Resolved, that the Conference President and all pastors be given a two weeks vacation with pay, with one Sunday absence from their pulpits.
- XX. Camp Meeting Committee Member-Resolved, that the Conference President, and the Conference W. Y. P. S. President be members ex-officio of

the Camp Meeting Committee, and that the Committee be constituted of a total of ten members.

XXI. Publishing of Evangel—Resolved, that the Evangel be published monthly; that the Editor be also Publisher; that he be nominated by a staff composed of President of the Conference, President of the W. M. S., President of the Conference W. Y. P. S., and the Conference Sunday School Secretary, and after being elected by the Conference, the manner of financing the publishing of the Evangel be left to the Editor and his staff.

XXII. Conference Date—Resolved, that Camp Meeting begin the first Monday after the 3rd of August, that Conference open on Friday afternoon at 3:30 for Committee organization; that the Camp Meeting close on Sunday night; that Conference close on Wednesday.

XXIII. Financial Secretary—Resolved, that the Conference shall elect a Financial Secretary for the Conference year, whose duty it shall be to study finances and bring recommendations to the Committee on Finance at the next Annual Conference, of which committee he shall be first member; he shall also work with the Statistical Secretary in figuring budget totals for each church to be entered on the statistical blanks. He shall also secure the services of a competent auditor to audit the books of the Conference.

XXIV. Budget Items-Resolved, that all Treasurers shall mark receipts "Budget" or "Not Budget."

XXV. Committee on Statistics—Resolved, that a standing Committee on Statistics be elected consisting of Statistics Secretary and three other ministerial members. That three law members be elected at opening of Conference.

XXVI. Missionary Board—Resolved, that the Conference Board of Trustees, and the President of the Conference W. M. S. constitute the Missionary Board.

XXVII. Committee on Church and Parsonage Building and Location—Resolved, that the Conference Board of Trustees shall constitute the Committee on Church and Parsonage Building and Location.

Journal of Daily Proceedings

The Ninety-eighth session of the Iowa Annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, was called to order on the camp grounds at Charles City, Iowa, Friday, August 10, 1951 at 2:00 p.m. The Vice President, Rev. Martin W. Cox president for the opening portion of the Conference.

CONFERENCE PRESIDENT'S REPORT

To the members of the Ninety-eighth Session of the Iowa Annual Con-

erence we herewith give greetings and present this report:

We will not burden you with a lengthy report in written form for in the following items listed under "Official Acts" and "Other Activities" you may find a summary of the years work.

We wish, however, to point out certain matters that encourage and thus

burden us too.

The last Conference took action setting a goal of 10% increase in church membership feeling this would be one measuring stick on our spiritual gains. We are sorry that we could not reach this goal but are happy to report an 4.7% increase for the Conference as a whole. Fourteen churches lost membership again this year. Six of them were the same churches who lost membership last year. Two churches held their own with neither a loss or gain being recorded.

Our great burden is to see all our churches productive for Christ. We have a great challenge to use our present organization more efficiently. Many places we could double our service with only a small per cent of increase in cost. We have buildings, the minister, pay for the utilitiess, and all other costs whether we have our plant operating full capacity or one-half or one-third.

Why cannot we adopt a slogan such as "Doubling for Christ in a Decade".

This would mean adding only from 1 to 10 members per church per year decade of the control of the con

pending on the size of your congregation. Please do not think of our recommendations along this line as a membership drive to secure only names for a

list. We are thinking of this as goal for souls born again and building the into the active interest and participation of the church of Christ.

May God forgive us for any excusing of failures, indolence and defeatist attitude. We have a great God, a true Gospel and some splendid abilities, if we channel and use them properly, it will cause others like us to discover the way of the Spirit led life. MISSIONARY BOARD REPORT

Your Missionary Board begs to submit the following report:

The \$1200.00 received from the sale of the old Bethel Parsonage and used in getting work started in Des Moines, and held by a note from Des Moines, was cancelled.

Settlement of Mabel Young property Fund which brought \$1100.00 into Conference Missions Fund, plus \$1100.00 to Foreign Missions \$1100.00 into an investment fund for the Howardville Church.

3. Considerable improvement at the parsonage in Manchester where Rev. Thomas Hersey is doing fine work. The Board ordered Rev. Paul R. Davis to conduct a meeting there this year after which the work was formally organized.

After much investigation and having placed Rev. Robert Ossman in Dubuque at beginning of year, it seemed that the Board and Rev. Ossman felt the doors continuing to close. We therefore closed out the Dubuque funds by writing to all donors and asking them to designate what to do with their contributions. Most of the contributors desired their money to be transferred to assist in the purchase of a parsonage at Des Moines.

The Board authorized a Card Call for a new parsonage at Des Moines, Iowa. The Card Call plus Dubuque funds, and an additional amount out of the Missionary Fund, furnished \$1,000.00 for a down payment on a very

adequate new parsonage.

The Board authorized a Card Call for pastor's living quarters at Denison, Iowa. The sale of the house rented by the Denison pastor necessitated new living quarters. The pastor, Rev. Richard Jamieson, built a very commodious apartment in the basement of the new Denison church. This basement apartment opens on the back lawn and the splendid workmanship makes this an excellent modern living quarters for the pastor for the present.

7. A re-financing of loans secured by several churches and the Conference are in the completing process of being transferred from signature notes to mortage loans on nearly every property under Missionary Board supervision. This new method of financing has received high commendation by responsible

financiers.

8. Upon the written request of the Rockford, Iowa congregation, the Board sold the Rockford, Iowa church building. The church was a very large structure in much need of repair which would have run into thousands of dollars. The small congregation there has secured the use of an adequate hall without cost for worship services. The church still owns a parsonage and lots in Rockford.

9. The Waterloo, Iowa, First Church completed a splendid brick and concrete Educational Building which was dedicated on Sunday, April 1, 1951.

The arrangement made at the last Annual Conference increasing the Board of Trustees to nine members, and making this Board of Trustees the Missionary Board, plus the President of the Woman's Missionary Society, has worked very satisfactorily for this year. The work of the Conference has been co-ordinated much better, and it has expedited many matters of business. To have your Board of Trustees and Missionary Board elected by ballot gives much more security to the Conference as a whole than if elected only from the floor, and changed from year to year. This joint Board, acting as it does as the Official Board of Directors for the Conference, meets well too with the complex requirements found in business and in the realm of law and property. complex requirements found in business and in the realm of law and property management.
