- 1. The Conference Treasurer is authorized to close his books three weeks before Conference convenes.
- 2. The Conference President and the Board of Trustees shall constitute a committee for the building and location of churches and parsonages and the examining of deeds and the transferring of property.
- 3. The office expense of the President, Secretary and Treasurer shall be paid by the Conference.
- 4. All legal documents shall be held in the custody of the Conference President and the same be locked in a fire-proof safe.
- 5. The Conference President and his Advisory Board shall have nower to arrange the religious services at Annual Conference.
- 6. The Camp Meeting Board shall consist of twelve members with somal representation from each district and the Conference President as Chairman. The Conference WY President and the Conference Vice President shall be ex-officio members.
- 7. All conference treasurers shall have their books audited by a competent bookkeeper or auditor.
- 8. The Church treasurer is authorized to close his books one month before Conference.
- 9. All pastors are to be given a two weeks paid vacation with one Sunday absent from the pulpit. Time spent at Annual Conference and Camp Meeting shall not be counted as vacation but is required as pastoral obligation.
- 10. It shall be the duty of all pastors to look after the insurance of their church and parsonage. All insurance shall provide for fire, lightning and tornado. If the church fails to do so upon reasonable request of the pastor, the Conference President shall be notified and he shall take care of such business. A failure on the part of the pastor shall make him responsible to the Conference Board of Trustees and the Conference President.
- 11. Each pastor is requested to keep a file of his calling list and all those connected with the church and Sunday School, with names, addresses and phone numbers; the same to be used for his own work and turned over to his successor.
- 12. Each pastor shall seek to organize a new class or give his services in a revival meeting to a new or weaker church to help establish it. The church which he serves as pastor shall grant him such privilege without censure and with full renumeration or salary while in such meeting. The President shall serve a co-ordinator and help arrange such meetings.
- 13. The Conference President shall appoint at a proper time two more members to serve on the statistical committee.
- 14. The statistical committee shall be composed of two experienced members and one inexperienced member. (Experience referring to those who have previously served on the statistical committee.)
- 15. All pastors of charges are to get their statistical reports to the statistical committeen Chairman one week before Conference convenes. 16. Resolved that we adhere to paragraph 132(2) in the Wesleyan Methodist Church Discipline, and that the President and his Advisory

Board give due consideration to the men of this Conference.

17. Any pastor receiving aid from the Conference Board on Church Extension and Evangelism shall not be a member of said board. 18. Annual Conference shall convene on the Monday following the last Sunday of Union Point Camp Meeting.

- 19. The President shall attend at Conference expense only those conventions and meetings which are necessary and required by the Annual or General Conference.
- 20. Resolved that the Conference President be allowed to conduct revivals outside the Conference, not to exceed the period of time required for two two-week meetings.
- 21. The Finance and Budget Committe shall be a standing committee the Conference and the Conference Treasurer and the Conference Ashall be ex-officio members.
- 22. If a pastor desires to resign his work during the interim of the Annual Conference, he shall give the President and his Advisory Board at least two weeks notice before the effective date of resignation. However, if the President and Advisory Board deem the cause for his desire to resign sufficient, they may accept his resignation immediately.
- 23. All charges and stations to which a pastor shall move shall pay the moving and transportation expense of siad pastor, the same to be done in addition to his salary. When the Conference demands the services of anyone, then it shall bear the moving expense if any expenses be thus incurred.
- 24. All ministers who come to Conference with unpaid budgets will have their characters passed by the Conference and not by the Character Committee.

RECOMMENDATION

1. We recommend that all pastors seek earnestly to raise a full budget and that due consideration be given to the pension plan.

JOURNAL OF DAILY PROCEEDINGS

The Georgia Annual Conference, Inc., of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America convened for its thirduannual session on Union Point Campgrounds at Union Point, Georgia, on July 9, 1962 at 9:45 a. m.

OPENING- The President, the Rev. R. R. Hicks called the Conference to order after a short devotional talk.

ROLL CALL- The roll call of elders and conference preachers was made. Twenty elders and three conference preachers were marked present. Mrs. H. J. Lewis, having withdrawn her membership from the Crossroads Charge and having been, for some time a supply pastor in a church of another denomination, was recognized as withdrawn from the Conference.

The motion by James C. Meaders carried that the name of H. J. Lewis be referred to the Committee on Itineracy and Elders' Orders.

CONFERENCE BAR- The motion by J. C. Duke carried that the Conference Bar include the first five rows of seats and the platform.

CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE- The President nominated W. T. Brinson and C. V. Hicks to serve as the Committee on Credentials. The motion by W. H. Hampton carried for their election.

ORDERS OF THE DAY REPORT- The report of the Orders of the Day Committee having been read, the motion by S. A. Hamby carried that it be adopted with the understanding that it be used as a directive for the Conference procedure and not to be re-written in the minutes.

RECESS- The motion by S. A. Heaby carried that the Conference be recessed until the call of the Chair.

CALL TO ORDER- The President call the Conference to order.

ROLL CALL OF DELEGATES- The roll call of delegates was made as approved by the Credentials Committee and twenty delegates were marked present. The motion carried that Mrs. Robert Wagnon be seated as delegate from Girard.

The motion by W. H. Hampton carried that the delegates from the newly organized Brinson Memorial and North Brunswick Churches be seated within the Conference Bar.

The motion by W. T. Brinson carried that delegates arriving late be placed on the Conference roll and seated within the bar as approved by the credentials committee.

NOMINATING COMMITTEE REPORT- By motion of S, A. Hamby, the report of the Nominating Committee was adopted. See report #1.

STATISTICAL COMMITTEE APPOINTMENTS— The President nominated Robert Wagnon and Mrs. Madge McKinley to serve on Statistical Committee; They were elected.

James C. Meaders was nominated and elected to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Grafton Pressley, as Chairman of the Statistical Committee.

COMMITTEE ON ITINERACY AND ELDERS' ORDERS APPOINTMENTS- The President nominated Mrs. Mozelle Morgan, Mr. George Crittenden and Mrs. C. M. Payne to serve as the lay members on the Committee on Itineracy and Elders' Orders. They were elected by the Conference.

RECESS- The motion by M. L. Arnold carried that the Conference be recessed until the call of the Chair.

CALL TO OKDER- The Conference was called to order by President Hicks.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT- The report of the Conference President having been given, the motion by Ralph Day carried that it be adopted. See report #2.

RECESS- The motion by S. A. Hamby warried that we have a ten minute recess.

CALL TO ORDER- The President called the Conference to order. General Superintendent Rufus D. Keisdorph was introduced to the Conference and invited to take the Chair.

AUDITING COMMITTEE REPORT - A Partial report of the Auditing Committee was given and adopted. See report #3.

CAMP MEETING BOARD REPORT- The report of the Camp Meeting Board was given in two parts. The first part was adopted after the motion of W. T. Brinson. The second part (July meeting) was adopted after the motion of Jas Meaders. See report #4.

SUNDAY SCHOOL SECRETARY'S REPORT- The report of the Sunday School Secretary was given in two parts. The activities portion was adopted after the motion of W. T. Brinson. The financial portion was adopted after the motion of Gene Smith. See report #5.

CYC CAMP REPORT- The report of the CYC Camp was given and adopted after motion of J. C. Duke. See report #6.

PASTORAL REPORTING- The motion by J. C. Duke carried that a committee be set up to spell out the design for pastoral reporting. The following brethrem were elected: M. L. Arnold, Halph Day and Horace Hudgins.

RECESSED TO CALL OF CHAIR.

CALL TO ORDER- The Conference was called to order by the President, R. M. Hicks.

VACANCY FILLED- W. T. Brinson was nominated and elected to serve on the Pastoral Melations Committee in place of R. C. Harrell who was called away due to serious illness of a son.

PASTORAL REPORTING— The Committee set up to spell out the method of pastoral reporting recommends that pastors read only gain or loss of members, item #3, Numbers 14-15, total budget assigned, total budget raised and total for all purposes item 11. Signed: M. L. Arnold, Ralph Day, Horace Hudgins.

The motion by S. A. Hemby carried that this report be adopted.

COMMITTEE ON ITINERACY AND ELDERS ORDERS! REPORT- A partial report of

The Committee on Itineracy and Elders' Orders was read and adopted after the motion by James C. Meaders. See report #7.

TREASURER'S REPORT- After the reading of the Conference Treasurer's report, the motion by Ralph Day carried that it be adopted. See report #8.

RECESSED- A recess was declared for the day.

TUESDAY MORNING MEETING 8:45 A. M.

CALL TO ORDER- After devotions led by M. L. Arnold, the Conference was called to order by the President.

MINUTES- The minutes of the previous day were read and adopted.

ROLL CALL- On the roll call 29 Ministers and 30 delegates were recorded present.

After the roll call Dr. Rufus Reisdorph was presented as Chairman.

COURTESY COMMITTEE- The Courtesy Committee presented the Rev. J. C. Black from the Church of the Nazarene.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS- The time for the orders of the day having arrived, the election of Conference officers began.

TELLERS APPOINTED- The President appointed James Teddars, Robert L. Brush and R.F. Skelton as distributing tellers and Earl Donaldson, George Kitchens and Samuel Carter as collecting tellers.

NOMINATING BALLOT- The motion by C. V. Hicks carried that the first ballot for both President and Vice President be considered as a nominating ballot.

PRESIDENT - Conference President R. R. Hicks was re-elected with 48 our of 59 votes on the first ballot.

VICE PRESIDENT- M. L. Arnold was re-elected Vice President with 30 out of 57 votes on the third ballot.

SECRETARY- P. L. Swauger was re-elected Secretary with 55 out of 58 votes on the first ballot.

COURTESY COMMITTEE- The Committee on Courtesy presented Rev. Malcom Ellis, Wesleyan Missionary to Africa and Dr. and Mrs. R. C. Mullinax from Central Wesleyan College.

The motion by R. R. Hicks carried that these be invited within the Conference Bar.

TREASURER- Jarmen G. Day was re-elected as Conference Treasurer with 51 out of 58 bellots on the first vote.

TRUSTEES- R. R. Hicks was re-elected as Conference Trustee with term to expire in 1965 with 38 out of 57 votes on the first ballot.

C. M. Payne, whose term also expired, was re-elected until 1965 with 30 out of 57 votes on the first ballot.

GENERAL CONFERENCE DELEGATES- R. R. Hicks was elected Ministerial delegate to General Conference with 47 out of 59 votes on the first ballot.

M. L. Arnold was elected as alternate Ministerial delegate to the General Conference with 39 votes out of 56 on the second ballot.

Jarmen G. Day was elected lay delegate to General Conference with 40 out of 57 votes on the second ballot.

- M. A. Lively was elected lay delegate-at-large with 40 out of 59 votes on the second ballot.
- T. W. Mobley was elected as alternate lay delegate for either of the two duly elected lay delegates with 44 out of 58 votes on the first belief.

COURTESY COMMITTEE. The Committee on Courtesy presented the Rev. C. V. Marchbanks, elder from the South Carolina Conference.

HERGER- A ballot vote with 41 "yes" and 13 "no" was effected expressing interest in the following resolution:

Be it resolved that our Church continue to pursue the possibility of union on mutually accepted terms with the Pilgrim Holiness Church and other sister churches of like precious faith as the doors may providentially open.

PASTOR'S REPORT- The motion carried by C. V. Hicks that the Conference hear the pastor's report of W. T. Brinson before recessing.

The report of W. T. Brinson for Brinson Memorial Church was read.

RECESS- The Conference was recessed for lunch.

ORDERS OF THE DAY- The time for orders or the day having arrived, Dr. R. C. Mullinax gave the educational address.

Mr. Jesse Towner presented the work and victories of Hephzibah Home.

SUNDAY SCHOOL SECRETARY- M. L. Arnold was nominated and elected as the Sunday School Secretary.

EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY- James C. Meaders was nominated and elected to serve as Educational Secretary.

TITHING SECRETARY- W. H. Hampton was nominated and elected to be the Tithing Secretary.

WESLEYAN MEN- M. A. Lively was nominated and elected to serve as the Secretary or Wesleyan Men.

DELEGATE SEATED- The motion by J. C. Duke carried that R. C. Mathis be seated as delegate from Toccoa.

PENSION PLAN- C. M. Payne was nominated and elected as Secretary of the Pension Plan

CARD CALL- P. L. Swauger was nominated and elected as Card Call Secretary.

CHURCH EXTENSION AND EVANGELISM- The following were nominated and elected to serve on the Board of Church Extension and Evangeliam: C. L. Cawthon, S. A. Hamby, C. M. Payne, Gene Smith.

SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD VACANCY- The motion by S. A. Hamby carried that the office of Grady King be recognized as vacant, Brother King having retired from his Church and moved to another state.

J. C. Duke was nominated and elected to rill the vacancy left by Grady King.

SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD- Edwin Lundy was nominated and elected to serve on the Sunday School Board with a term to expire in 1964.

The motion by C. V. Hicks carried that the CYC Director be an exofficio member of the Sunday School Board.

STANDING RULE— The motion by Mitchell Walker carried that the Vice President of the Conference be added to the Camp Meeting Board as an exofficio member and that this item be added to standing rule #6.

STATISTICAL COMMITTEE TERM- The motion was made and supported (by S. A. Hamby), that no one have to serve more than one year in succession on the Statistical Committee.

The motion by C. V. Hicks carried that this motion be referred to the Committee on resolutions.

STANDING RULE CHANGE- The motion by S. A. Hamby carried that standing rule #1 be changed to read 3 weeks rather than 2 weeks.

Whereas, In reference to Jesus the quotation is given: "Numerous traditions have grown up around Thomas, for example, that his twin was a sister named Lydia or that he was a twin brother of Jesus himself:" (January-February-March Quarterly 1961 page 125), therefore;

Be it resolved that the Georgia Conference go on record as being opposed to and as requesting published explaination for this seeming let-down of the Fundamentalist view-point.

Report #8- CONFERENCE TREASURER

In order to help the conference understand the first section of this report it is necessary that I give you additional information. I wish to congratulate you on your errorts this past year in the work or the Lord. All items of General Budget have been paid with the exception of \$226.65 on Education and \$77.03 on General Sunday School. I regret that these items were not paid in full. Items on General Budget are assigned at set amount per member and when any church fails to pay their budget in rull for that item, it is left unpaid unless some other church is very active and overpays their budget by that amount. I realize that some of our churches have done their best toward paying their budget and have not quite made it. Some of the churches that have paid their budget in full were the ones least able to do so. Three churches in the conference have made no attempt to pay their budget nor have they even written a letter to acknowledge their responsibility to the organization. I trust that every pastor and every delegate will go back to their homes aware of the need and of the responsibility of the local churches.

In all the Conference Budget items we have had a successful year. Due to the cooperation of the churches and the skillful!leadership of Rev. Hicks, we have a good report. As you are all aware, we began the year with .00 in President's salary fund, .00 in the Conference work fund. Also the conference voted to overdraw the President's salary in the amount of \$354.90 to pay Rev. W. M. Phillippe, Jr. the salary due to him. This was paid in rull at Conference Last year. We began this year overdrawn by that amount. By vote of the Conference, each Church was to

pay \$1.00 per member to repay this and other unpaid expenses reported by Nev. Phillippe, Jr. It would seem that the churches did not wish to do this as only 8 charges responded to this request sending in a total of \$269.00 which was used toward replacing the amount overdrawn. This Left \$85.90 that was not repaid. However due to the fact that this conference year had only 11 months in it and Mev. Hicks was paid for only eleven months and because Rev. Hicks paid into the President's salary fund \$230.32, we were able to overcome this shortage. Due to effecient operation and aided by Rev. Hicks' payment of \$221.00 into the Conference work fund, we were able to complete the year with a good balance in that fund. President's parsonage fund was changed from a non-budget item at conference Last year and began the year with \$23.13 was aided by payment by Rev. Hicks or \$150.00 which enabled us to finish the year with a good balance in that fund. Ashburn Camp fund closed the year with \$77.50 in treasury, because this emount came in after Ashburn Camp had closed.

Non-budget items of interets include the sale of the Conference parsonage at Odum for \$4,555.00 to the Liberty Wesleyan Methodist Church. After deducting the amount of the loan due on the property the net proceeds of sale (\$3,408.78) was deposited with the Wesleyan investment Foundation. Conference Extension runds (\$60.00 of which was paid by Rev. Hicks) had paid \$300.00 toward the purchase of Prinson Memorial Church and had agreed to pay \$200.00 more when the deal is closed. Conference pioneer has paid to Savanah First Church \$731.40; to Darien \$550.00, The Home Department and the Wesleyan investment Foundation has loaned Liberty in Turner County \$600.00, Savannah First Church \$279.73, and the Prinson Memorial Church \$1,000.00. The Home Department has given aid in the amount of \$3,470.71. Aid was disbursed as follows: Conference President \$600.00 (Phillippe \$50.00)(Hicks 550.00), Savannah \$378.21, Darien \$550. Jesup \$357.50, Toccoa \$385.00, Waycross \$150.00.

We should give our thanks to the Home Department and every member of our Conference should be amember of the Card Call Plan and support every effort of the Department.

The cost or the Fioneer calendars was paid from pioneer funds (\$19.21).

Conference Work Funds were distursed as follows: The operation of the President's orrice \$1,518.13. This includes office and travel expense, telephone and all board meeting expense with the exception of \$66.22 & which was paid from funds from sale of the Conference Parsonage. This also includes the cost of all stationery for President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer. This includes phone bills of \$68.70 paid for W. M. Phillippe, Jr.

Please not that \$70.00 was paid by the WMS for their part of 1960 Minutes.

Also please note that over payment of the Pension Plan is due to this item being paid in this conference year to make up a deficiency from last year and a special offering of \$211.50 is not posted to any church account. Also \$20.75 for another Pension Plan offering with no budget credit.

REPORT #24- MORAL REFORM

Believing that the followers of Christ are responsible for exercising influence upon our nation and the world, the following resolutions are presented:

1. The Home: As the family is the foundation of our society, we urge family devotions, family activities and discussions. Our families should seek to hold a consistent standard of righteous living by guarding against unprofitable and evil radio and television programs, unwholesome music and literature which does not serve a worthy purpose.

Report 24 (Continued)

Rather than criticising our youth, let us purpose to lead them into the things of God by understanding their problems and diligently showing them the way.

An urgent need exists for instruction concerning the evils of tobacco, alcohol, and the attendance of places of

questionable reputation.

2. The Church: We urge that each church support the Annual Conference and General Conference programs. We feel definately the need for a pouring out of God's Spirit upon His people during this dark hour in the history of the world. We must proclaim Jesus Christ as "The hope for all mankind".

We recommend that each church endeavor to arrange youth programs of recreation based on Christian principles.

3. The School: The public schools which our children and youth attend often offer activities detrimental to Christian conduct. We recommend that our youth refuse to participate in such activites, and that requests and explainations be made to the proper authorities. We reaffirm our faith in the creation of man by the immediate creative act of God according to the Genesis account and not by the process of evolutionary transition.

4. Social Integration: We urge continued opposition to the movement of social integration, inter-marriage, and other such institutions. We further oppose violence and disorder as created by the so-called "freedom rides" and "sit-in" movements. We believe that such movements are organized by Communists pressure groups and are a result of Communist

teaching and infiltration.

5. Political and Religious Freedom: The government that leads our nation needs and should have our prayers. We urge continued support for our constitutional and historical position of the principle of separation of church and state. We further urge our people to begin now to build an effective opposition to the re-election of a Roman Catholic to the Presidency of the United States. We urge that all pastors stress to the people the importance of voting in elections at all levels of government.

Be it further resolved that the Conference oppose Communism wherever possible, on all fronts and continue to oppose the admittance of Red China to the United Nations and U. S. recognition of said country. We urge our people to write their Congressmen, Senators and government officials

concerning this matter.

We also urge that our people oppose higher taxes and fight inflation when possible.

W. M. S. STANDING RULES

- 1. All monies to World Missions, Church Extension or other missionary enterprises must be channeled through the Conference Treasurer.
- 2. All monies and receipts shall be remitted not later than five days after the ending of each quarter.
- 3. The local treasurer's books shall close one month before conference and the annual statistical reports shall be postmarked not later than three weeks before conference.
- 4. The Conference Treasurer's book shall close two weeks before conference and she shall mail said reports to the Chairman of the Statistical Committee.
- 5. Membership dues shall be one dollar and seventy-five cents (General \$1.00; Conference Work Fund 75ϕ).
- 6. Benevolent Credits: Credit shall be given to all societies for receipts properly signed by the pastor, local president and local treasurer. Said receipts are to be remitted to the Conference Treasurer quarterly.
- 7. The election of conference officers shall be at the Tuesday afternoon meeting of the Conference session.
- 8. The Y. M. W. B. is recognized as a part of the missionary work. The superintendents of the local bands shall be seated within the Conference bar without voting privileges. Local Y. M. W. B. Superintendent's reports shall be mailed to the Conference Superintendent not later than three weeks before conference.
- 9. The Conference Treasurer shall have her book audited by a competent auditor and submit a statement from the auditor to the Conference.
- 10. All conference officers, local presidents, and duly elected delegates shall compose the voting body of the Conference.
- 11. There shall be four district chairmen to promote projects, conventions and other missionary interest.
- 12. The reading of the statistical report by the delegate shall be preceded by a personal testimony. Items to be read are: name of society, name of president, number of members, total receipts, all disbursements and any other item of interest.
- 13. Friday before Conference shall be observed as a day of fasting and prayer.

- 14. Each society shall send to the Conference Treasurer at least \$5.00 annually for General Church Extension and Evangelism.
- 15. Time shall be given the Conference Y. M. W. B. Super-intendent to conduct a workshop during the Annual Conference Session.
- 16. The Annual Conference will pay the expense of all Conference officers except when their fee is paid by the local society as president or delegate.
- 17. The W. M. S. Conference Minutes shall be included in the publication of the Annual Georgia Conference Minutes.
- 18. The Annual Missionary Conference will pay to the Camp Meeting Board \$4.00 entertainment fee for each delegate, local president and Y. M. W. B. Superintendent present at annual session.
