Journal of Daily Proceedings

The Kansas Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America assembled for the eightieth annual session in the Conference Tabernacle at Miltonvale, Kansas, at 2:00 p.m., Wednesday, May 31, 1950. Conference was called to order by the President, the Rev. W. A. Smith.

Ronald Brannon led in the opening song service. Dr. F. R. Eddy, Publishing Agent and General Representative offered the opening prayer. Rev. F. C. Hill, President Emeritus, led the devotional hour. He read from Numbers the thirty-second chapter especially emphasizing verses eleven and twelve. He urged us to wholly follow the Lord as did Joshua and Caleb. At the invitation of the President Brother Hill also led in prayer.

The roll was called. Forty-three Elders, ten Conference Preachers, and Forty-Nine Delegates answered the roll call.

STATISTICAL GLEANINGS

The 80th Annual Kansas Conference marks another milestone in the history of the Church. We offer thanks unto God for the progress made and for His Divine leadership.

The Statistical Committee has prepared a full report for future reference and hereby submit some items of interest:

We are glad to report the following gains in Church literature: 114 Wesleyan Methodists, 5 Missionary Magazines, 50 Youth Journals, and 19 Sunday School Banners. There is a gain of 35 in Church membership. After losing 2 churches to the Nebraska Conference, we still have a gain of 9. The Sunday schools show a gain of 105 members and a gain of 167 in attendance. It is encouraging to note an increase of 21 family altars. The value of Church Property has made a gain of \$114,050.00. There are 186 Card Call Subscribers to report this year. We note that while the total Pastors receipts have increased nearly \$2,000.00, the budget has suffered an equal loss. However, the following Churches reported every item of budget in full— Ames, Belleville, Bethany Chapel, Clay Center, Concordia, Denver, Englewood, Eskridge, Heber, Hollis, Hutchinson, Idana, Kansas City, Kans., Hall, Lawrence Creek, Miltonvale, Mulberry, Phillipsburg, all Topeka churches, Victor Willis, Wichita West Side, Wilchita Seneca St., Williams Chapel, Wesley Center, and Wesley Chapel.

Resolutions

1. Fiscal Year. Resolved, that the closing date of the fiscal year be two weeks before the opening date of the Annual Conference Camp Period, and we request that all statistical reports be in the hands of the Conference Treasurer at least one week before the Conference Camp Period. He shall forward the blanks to the Statistical Chairman who shall be able to report at an early session of Conference. (The fiscal year for 1950-51 shall close May 23, 1951.)

2. Conference and Camp Date. Resolved, that Conference begin annually at 2:00 p. m. on the first Wednesday in June and continue daily until completed, and that Camp begin on Friday night of the same week and continue through the two following Sundays.

3. Order of Business. Inasmuch as it is the desire of the Conference to complete its business as soon as possible it is recommended that the following procedure of business be followed:

First, All recommendations to travel or study be turned directly to the Assistant Secretary who shall turn them to the Committee on Itinerary and Orders.

Second, Ministers' reports shall be given immediately after Officers' reports are given, and continued whenever other business will permit.

Third, The following order of business shall be followed in each session:

- a. Roll call
- b. Minutes
- c. Communications
- d. Special Committees
- e. Standing Committees
- f. Sessional Committees
- g. Unfinished business
- h. Ministers' reports

Fourth, Business shall continue from 8:30 a. m. to 12 noon and from 1:30 to 4:30 each day with no adjournment for committee work, unless deemed very necessary. It is understood that important Committees may meet during sessions if necessary.

4. Nominating Committee. Resolved, that we elect a committee of five elders, including the President ex-officio, and three delegates-elect, from three churches designated by the Conference to:

First, examine the credentials that are in the hands of the committee at the time of its first meeting.

Second, nominate all sessional committees and be prepared to report at the first session of the Conference.

Third, examine all delegates' credentials, whether regular or alternate, which are turned in to the Committee after the first seating of delegates, and to report such to the Secretary who shall read the names added to the roll at the next session at which they are automatically seated, if no objections are raised.

Fourth, nominate the personnel of all Conference Boards and report at an early session of the Conference.

Fifth, nominate the Committee Chairmen for next year.

Sixth, nominate the District Chairmen.

Seventh, nominate a minister of the Conference to preach the Conference sermon next year.

5. Election of Conference Officers. Resolved, that the election of Conference Officers be held the second day of Conference at 9:00 a. m.

6. President's Duties. Resolved, that the Conference President shall First, travel the Conference and hold one-half of the Quarterly Meetings. Second, urge the proper repair and insurance of church property. Third, call a meeting, upon request of the Board of Stewards or Pastor to help arrange a workable financial plan for the church. Fourth, raise funds for the Church Extension Program.

7. Field Man. Resolved, that we elect by ballot a General Field Man to labor under the Missionary Board whose duties shall be:

First, to promote Church Extension.

Second, to serve as Sunday School Secretary.

Third, to promote Bible School Evangelism.

Fourth, to assist the President when needed.

8. Auditing of Financial Reports. Resolved, that all financial reports together with the books that are to be audited by the Conference Auditing Committee be submitted to said Committee before being read on the Conference floor.

9. Introduction of New Business. Resolved, that all introduction of new business of such a nature as to require an election must be presented not later than noon of the third day of Conference.

1. Orders of the Day. Resolved, that the Camp Meeting and Campground Committees be permanently the Committee on Orders of the Day, to prepare ahead of time the Conference Program for publication in the "Visitor."

11. Camp Meeting Committee. Resolved, that the President of the W. Y. P. S. be a member ex-officio of the Camp Meeting Committee.

12. Evangelistic Help. Resolved, that the Campground and Camp Meeting Committee be authorized to engage evangelistic help for the Camp Meeting as far in advance as deemed advisable.

13. Additional Delegate. Resolved, that when more than one delegate from any one church presents credentials to this body, there shall

appear in the credentials the name of the elder that entitles the church to the additional delegate.

14. Superannuate Service. Resolved, that one public service in each Annual Camp Meeting or Conference period be set aside in honor of the Superannuated Ministers and for the purpose of creating interest in the Superannuate Fund and that it be the duty of the Superannuate Board to arrange for such a service.

15. Installation of Officers. Resolved, that all Conference Officers continue in office until the close of the annual session of the Conference when there shall be an installation service held for the installation of the officers as are to appear in the Conference minutes; this service to be arranged by the Pastoral Relations Committee.

16. Calling a New Pastor. Resolved, that the Pulpit Supply Committee of the church desiring to call a new pastor give due attention to Paragraph 86, Section 3 of the Book of Discipline which reads in part: "The Pulpit Supply Committee shall not propose to the church or charge the name of any elder or annual conference preacher who is not a member of the Annual Conference in which the church is located, except by the consent of the President of the said Annual Conference and his Advisory Board.

17. Pastors Paid Through Conference. Resolved, that the church's financial obligation to the pastor whether he be leaving the field or not, be extended throughout the Conference and Camp Meeting Period.

18. Pastor's Moving Expense. Resolved, that the class hiring a minister shall within ten days after his arrival pay to him his moving expenses, this not to be applied on his salary.

19. Pastor's Expense at Annual Sessions. Resolved, that inasmuch as the pastor is actually a representative of the local church at the Annual Camp and Conference and the Ministerial Association, that the local churches pay their pastor's expense, including room, board and transportation, the same to be paid in advance.

20. Pastors, Released for Meetings. Resolved, that we earnestly request each of our churches to release their pastor for one meeting of three weeks' length to be held on a new field or on one of the weaker charges under the direction of the Missionary Board, and that the church pay his salary during his absence.

21. Pastor Nominates Steward. Resolved, that it be the sense of this Conference that the pastor be granted the privilege of nominating one member of the Board of Stewards from each church on his charge.

22. Reporting of All Contributions. Resolved, that the Conference President and each pastor urge the people to make all contributions through their local church and society treasuries, in view of more equitable distribution of funds.

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23. Vacations. Resolved, that the Conference President be granted a vacation over two Sundays, that the greater part of three weeks might be taken if desired, and that he be given two week's pay in addition to his regular salary at the time he chooses for his vacation.

Resolved, that we recommend that each charge grant their pastor a one Sunday leave of absence from his work, that the greater part of two weeks might be spent for vacation and that the church give him one week's pay in addition to his regular salary at the time agreed upon by pastor and church for vacation.

24. Money to Treasurer. Resolved, that the pastors be urged to send all remittances to the Treasurer in whole dollars when possible. That the budget money be remitted quarterly from the local churches.

25. Calling List. Whereas, most of the friends and members of our local churches are won through the personal contact of the pastors; and whereas many of these friends and prospective members are lost in the changing from one pastor to another because the incoming pastor does not know of these people nor their interest in the church;

Be it resolved, that this Conference ask each pastor to prepare a calling list of all the homes connected with the church and Sunday School, listing the relationship they hold to the church, listing their names and addresses by city, street and number; the same to be kept for his own work while on the pastorate and to be given to his successor on the field.

26. Church Delegate Expense. Resolved, that each local church pay the Annual Conference Church Delegate room, board and transportation expenses, the same to be paid in advance.

27. Hope Mission Support. Resolved, that the churches be urged to take offerings once a month for Wesleyan Hope Mission, and that the Superintendent be permitted to visit the charges of the Conference in the interest of the mission.

28. Church Extension. Resolved, that the first Sunday school offering of each month and all Sunday school birthday offerings be given to the Missionary Board for Church Extension and to help weaker churches not yet self-supporting; and that the pastor and superintendent help stimulate the giving in these offerings. That these monies are to be loaned under the supervision of the Missionary Board without interest.

29. Conference Visitor. Resolved, that each Sunday school of the Conference pay \$1.00 to supplement the subscription income of the "Visitor," the same to be sent to the editor.

30. Conveying Property. Resolved, that all instruments conveying property for church or parsonage use, carry the official name of the church, viz., "The Kansas Conference of The Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, Inc."

"Let no man despise thy youth; but be thou an example . . ."

We suggest:

1. That each district plan at least three Conventions this year with the district chairman in charge, inviting at least once, the Conference W. Y. P. S. President as guest speaker.

That the chairman of the convention take an offering to be given the President to apply on his expenses.

2. That each society sponsor a Youth Revival, the Executive Council being responsible for securing the evangelist, advertising and financing the meeting.

3. That each Church sponsor a local rally, inviting the Young People from other churches to attend.

4. That the leaders for Young People's services be carefully chosen and the leaders names be posted quarterly. It is recommended that the President lead at least once a quarter.

5. That emphasis be given to the monthly Missionary Meeting, noting that the offering received applies on Church budget and is divided 50% to Foreign Missions, 25% to Home Missions, 25% to Education.

6. That emphasis be placed on the offering of W. Y. P. S. Educational Sunday, which is the third Sunday in July. All educational budget money received during the Summer quarter may be credited to the W. Y. P. S. (See paragraph 254, section 13 of the Book of Discipline).

7. That all societies sending money to the Conference treasurer remit the same by check or money order rather than small change.

8. That each individual society have its books closed and its report sent to the Conference secretary at least two weeks prior to Conference.

9. That attention be given to local representation at the Annual W. Y. P. S. Conference:

a. That the local President or Vice-President is delegate Ex-officio.

b. That each society is entitled to two delegates elect and one additional delegate for societies whose membership exceeds 25.

c. In case there is no local W. Y. P. S. organization, the Pastor may appoint a representative (age 13-40) to the Annual W. Y. P. S. Conference.

10. That the delegates credentials be sent to the Conference Secretary along with the local Report.

11. That the Annual W. Y. P. S. Conference convene on Tuesday morning of the Annual Camp meeting and that session be held from 8:30 a. m. to 10:00 a. m. and from 1:15 p. m. to 2:30 p. m. each day until business is completed.

12. That there be a nominating committee composed of the W. Y. P. S. Conference Executive committee and first delegates elect from the Abilene and Ames societies. (Societies rotating alphabetically) That this committee be ready to report at the first session of Conference.

13. That the W. Y. P. S. Conference President be paid 5¢ per mile while traveling in the interests of the Conference W. Y. P. S.

14. That the Conference Secretary have a copy of these suggestions mimeographed and sent to each local society. That the local President read them to the society within 30 days after Conference and 30 days before Conference, and that they be posted during the year.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT

"Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost:

Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you: and, lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the world." Matt. 28: 19, 20.

Missionary work is something every Christian must do or he is in danger of losing in grace and getting out of fellowship with the Son of God who gave the Great Commission.

The command is not only given to those feeling the special call to mission work but to everyone. God does not command men concerning their personal salvation—instead He invites and entreats, but concerning others He commands saying, "Go"—and "Ye shall be witnesses." The field depends on volunteers who answer as Isaiah, "Here am I." The command is urgent because a plan of salvation has been provided for the redemption of the human race and the time is short to reach the millions of hungry hearts who are awaiting the Bread of Life.

Doors are standing ajar in every part of the world. The Macedonian Cry goes forth, "Come over and help us." What shall we do? Shall we turn them down cold? Shall we do a little? or is this Gospel worthy of an "all out" effort to win the weary and the wild for the fold of God? If Jesus so loved us that He gave Himself to "taste death for every man"—what should we not be willing to do for Him? It is a small thing to sing songs, say prayers and speak a lot of nice things about Jesus, but actually can we honestly say we are following Christ because we go to church and enjoy the good things of the Gospel, yet do little in the way of making "a real sacrifice" in order to evangelize a thousand million souls who have never heard of Christ.

Shall we ask ourselves the question, "What have I done for Him?" I speak the conviction of my heart when I say, "I have done comparatively nothing." I am not satisfied, but I am crying to the Lord to help me to make the most of the opportunities which come to me. To meet lost souls at the end of the way whom I might have won to Christ is a serious thing to think of. Paul said, "I am free from the blood of all men." What a word.

Our Master was hated with the most cruel hatred ever demonstrated upon earth, but in the face of all this He made the most of every opportunity, won every battle, and by death conquered death in order that every soul may go free. What shall we do with His command and with our opportunities?

PLAN OF WORK

We, the Committee on Plan of Work, hereby recommend:

Division I. Local Work

1. That our Conference goal for the coming year be 800 members, 325 honorary members, and 1000 magazines.

2. That a Men and Missions program be sponsored by the men to solicit their help and interest in the cause of missions.

3. That we observe at least four of these "Challenge Days":

A. Harvest Home Day, October 13. We urge each society to send cash to the College Office and provisions to the College Kitchen. (Not to be applied on Budget.)

B. Wesleyan Missionary Day. Stress should be placed on getting new subscriptions circulated among the unsaved.

C. World Day of Prayer. We recommend that each society observe this occasion, an offering being taken for Medical Missions. (Not to be applied on budget.)

D. Easter. Programs and offerings for Home Missions denominationally supported.

E. May Day. A designated day for gifts including clothing, bandages, money, or other articles to be sent with outgoing missionaries or used on home fields.

Supplies for foreign mission fields should be sent to 32 Bergen Ave., Jersey City, New Jersey. Follow mailing instructions in Magazine Directory in sending gifts to home fields. Receipts are now given.

4. That the President of each society be responsible for arranging for one evening each month to pray especially for Mission Work, the same to be preceded by a day of fasting. That an offering be taken for the arm of the Work listed monthly, giving emphasis to that work.

July—Wesleyan Hope Mission

August—Child Evangelism

September—Ozark Missions

October and November—Education

December—Orphanage

January and February—Kansas Conference Missions

March and April—Home Missions

May and June—Foreign Missions

5. That each society elect a magazine solicitor to secure new subscriptions and all renewals to meet quadrennial goals.

A. That the magazine solicitor of each society be responsible for placing the magazine and other literature in as many public places as possible.

6. We recommend an active, interceding, Corresponding Prayer Partner group in each society with a secretary to report to the Conference secretary, Mrs. Clara Rist, 117 North Clark St., Salina, Kansas.

7. That the missionary activities among the Jews be continued under the direction of Nina Miller, 1615 Atchison, Topeka, Kansas. Each society should devote some definite time and attention to this work.

8. In view of the fact that our missionaries are to be benefitted by the Pension Plan, we recommend that each society help support this worthy cause.

9. That each society elect a Missionary Study Secretary whose duty will be to stimulate interest in religious reading and to report to the Conference Missionary Study Secretary.

10. That the president review the Plan of Work quarterly before the society.

11. That we avail ourselves of the excellent materials given in the Wesleyan Missionary and Wesleyan Methodist, also that the adopted study book be used in regular meetings.

12. That each local president appoint a committee to contact the sick in person or by correspondence, and assist the pastor in every possible way in reaching souls and furthering the kingdom.

13. That the president of each society be responsible for the reading of the Moral Reform at some suitable service during the year.

14. That all local dues, including honorary, be sent to the Conference Missionary Treasurer, Mrs. Bertha Wilson, 647 Watson Ave., Topeka, Kansas, one half of the same to be applied on Missionary budget. Please designate specifically where the credit is desired.

15. That all membership dues be paid by May 1st to local treasurer.

16. That all money be disbursed quarterly through our local and conference treasurers. That this money be in the hands of the conference treasurer at least two weeks before Conference.

17. In view of the great need in the Home Mission fields we urge an increase in the Card Call pledges.

18. That each society contribute at least \$5.00 for the Hephzibah Orphanage except in cases where the church budget is less than \$5.00.

19. That each society contribute at least \$6.00 for Home Missions denominationally supported.

20. That each society contribute \$1.00 per member (active and honorary based on membership of preceding year) to the salary of Grace Davis.

21. That each society contribute \$5.00 to the storm and screen window project of M. W. C. (not to apply on budget).

22. That the annual report be prepared by the President, Secretary, and Treasurer of the local society, which serves as an audit of the Treasurer's report. One copy to be sent to Committee on Statistics, Leah Macy, Longford, Kansas, two weeks before Conference, the duplicate to be brought to Conference by the delegate. Place the name of the new president for the coming year on the back of the report blank.

23. That the President of each society appoint a committee to gather supplies and cash for the conference dining hall.

24. That each society grade themselves by the Efficiency Standard. A grade of 10% will be given on each of any ten points chosen. Societies with a score of 100% will be placed on the honor roll.

25. That we issue an award to each local society that makes a grade of 125% or more in standard efficiency, that secures magazine subscriptions equal to the active membership of the society, that has prayer partners, and sends newly-elected president to the annual conference.

26. We recommend that the forms in the Discipline on page 316, Article 438 be used for the delegate credentials for annual conference.

Y. M. W. B. PLAN OF WORK

We, your Committee on Plan of Work, submit the following report:
We recommend:

1. That the Plan of Work and Efficiency Standard be read by the Superintendent each quarter and the needed items be stressed.

2. That the songs and Scriptures required by Aileen Shea in the Bulletin and the names of missionaries and their stations be used in memory work.

3. That we measure up to the Efficiency Standard. Each band with a grade of 100% will receive an award at conference.

4. That each member of the church be urged to join the Y. M. W. B.

5. That the bands have at least one meeting each month and weekly where possible and that the money be sent quarterly to the superintendent, Mrs. Lorine Hotchkiss, 501 Moro, Manhattan, Kansas.

6. That our membership goal be 1650 and our goal for dues and offerings be \$3,000.

7. That each band bring a pennant and poster to conference.

8. That an award be given at conference to the band that has the greatest percent on the following items:

1. Hold at least twelve meetings.

2. Having the greatest percent increase in membership.

3. For raising the largest amount of money per member.

4. For bringing pennant and poster to conference.

5. For having a Child Evangelism Class.

9. That the new Superintendent be elected at the annual election of the Woman's Missionary Society to take office immediately following conference and the same be Treasurer of the band. We request each superintendent to attend conference.

10. That the superintendent's books be closed two weeks before conference and that all annual reports be sent to the Conference Superintendent. All reports not sent in before this date will not be recorded.

11. That one cent per active member and honorary member be sent as desk fund. (Superintendent's expense.)

12. That each band pay ten cents per member, active and honorary, for the support of David Gale Wolfe, our project for this year.
