Journal of Daily Proceedings

The Champlain Annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Connection of America convened for its seventy-seventh session, at Forestdale, Vermont, April 23, 1918, at 7:30 P. M.

Rev. E. D. Carpenter, the President, called the Conference to order. Rev. A. J. Allen had charge of the song service. The Spirit of the Lord was upon this part of the service. A number of prayers were offered in behalf of the Conference session, and for Brother C. A. Heath and family in their sickness.

Rev. E. L. Elliott brought the message of the evening from the text found in Exodus 14:15, "Go Forward." The message was the keynote that was needed. Benediction by Rev. C. C. Hill.

Second Day-Wednesday Morning Meeting

Rev. J. J. Davison had charge of the devotional service. Songs were heartily sung and a number of prayers offered. The Lord was gracious at this time. The roll was called, and the following answered to their names: Twelve Elders, three Licentiates, and twelve Delegates.

A partial report of the Committee on Credentials was approved, with the understanding that the future names be added to the roll without the necessity of a vote.

The Bar of Conference was fixed to include the first four rows of seats.

Rev. C. E. Hill was called to the chair.

The President made his report. The same was approved. See Report No. 1.

The Committee on Pastors' Credentials was elected as follows: Rev. F. H. Wright and Leroy Stafford.

Moved that all visiting members shall be welcome to honorary seats who are in harmony with our principles.

Rev. C. B. Harvey, a returned Missionary from India, was introduced and made some welcome remarks, saying that God is moving forward and that He is on the giving hand in India as well as here and we must come up to the standard.

Sister C. B. Harvey was introduced. She praised God for the "tie that binds," and said that if we would comply with His ways He would direct our paths.

Brother J. S. Willett, our Connectional Agent, was introduced. He said he believed God was able to make this one of the best

sessions the Champlain Conference ever held, and that the watchword had been given in going forward.

Professor J. S. Luckey, of Houghton Seminary, was introduced. He said he felt at home, as so many of the young men and women of the Champlain Conference had attended Houghton School.

By vote the time of opening and closing the sessions of the Conference was fixed as follows: Opening, 9 A. M. and 1:30 P. M.; closing, 11:30 A. M., and in the afternoon by vote.

It was moved and supported that the matter of our Conference President traveling the Conference be referred to the Committee on Pastoral Relations.

The Camp Meeting Committee made their report. The same was approved. See Report No. 2.

The report of the Committee on Orders of the Day was accepted as follows: Election of Conference officers, Thursday, 9:30 A. M.; Houghton Representatives, Thursday, at 10:30 A. M.; Superannuated Ministers' Relief Association, Friday morning at 9:30; Connectional Representative, 10:30 A. M.; Woman's Home and Foreign Missionary Society, Friday evening; Conference Sunday School Secretary, Friday, 2 P. M.; Memorial Service, Saturday, 9:30 A. M.; Missionary Representatives, Saturday, 10:30 A. M.

Moved to adjourn for committee work.

Benediction by C. E. Hill.

Wednesday Afternoon Meeting

The devotional service was led by G. N. Wyher. The first Psalm was the lesson read.

At the call of the roll the following responded to the call of their names: Twelve Elders, three licentiates, twelve delegates.

Minutes of the morning session were read and approved.

C. E. Hill was called to the chair.

The name of E. D. Carpenter was called and character passed.

The Committee on Itineracy and Orders gave their report. The same was approved. See Report No. 3.

The report of Acorn Hill was given by Richard Palmer.

Miss Hattie Crosby, a returned missionary from Africa, was introduced. She said that she was enjoying the fellowship of the saints of God, and that it was her prayer that there would be rejoicing with the angels of God over the sinners that would be saved. "Blest Be the Tie that Binds" was sung at the close of her remarks, and God's presence was felt.

The names of E. L. Elliott, W. N. Abare, J. J. Davison, E. Trowbridge, S. C. Fox, K. F. Schaubhuth were called and characters passed.

The order of the day having arrived, Conference joined in singing the song, "His Grace is Satisfying Me." F. E. Wood offered prayer. J. S. Willett preached from Genesis 5:24, "Enoch Walked With God." There was no fault found in Enoch's life. The secret of the Lord is with them that fear Him, and we must be agreed to walk together, and God always leads His people into holiness.

On motion Conference adjourned for committee work.

Benediction by L. M. Hayes.

Wednesday Evening Meeting

H. S. Hill conducted the devotional service. F. H. Wright and J. S. Willett offered prayer. A Scripture lesson was read from Isaiah 6th chapter. The Word was preached by C. E. Hill. Text, Jeremiah 1:9. God has always had men with whom He could carry on His work; that God's representatives have always been men of God; Christ was coming again to gather His people together; that each of us was a part of the great plan of God; the sin of Jeremiah's day was idolatry; we need the touch of God upon our lips and hearts. The Spirit of God was upon the message and the messenger. God truly touched hearts. "A Charge to Keep I Have" was sung. Brother Willett conducted the altar service. Seeking souls called upon God, and the saints of God were refreshed and blessed. There was a wave of glory upon the service. Benediction by J. S. Willett.

Thursday Morning Meeting

F. E. Wood led the devotional service. Psalm 46 was read. A number of prayers were offered. The dews of the morning were upon this service. Song, "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name" was sung.

At the call of the roll thirteen Elders, three Licentiates and fourteen Delegates answered to the call of their names.

The minutes of the last session was read and same approved.

The Committee on Pastoral Relations gave a partial report. See Report No. 4.

The Committee on Missions made their report. The same was adopted. See Report No. 5.

Moved and supported that the Secretary should write a letter to the Rev. C. A. Heath and wife to express the sympathy of the Conference in their sickness.

The names of A. J. Allen and Mrs. S. A. Green were called and characters passed.

The order of the day having arrived, the Conference proceeded to the election of officers. Tellers were appointed as follows: W. F. Lewis and Byron Chambers, scatter ballots; H. S. Hill and E. L. Elliott, collect ballots.

President's Advisory Board—Left for the President to nominate. Committee Missionary Board—Left to the President to nominate.

Conference considered the place and time of holding the next Annual Conference. Invitations were received from Hague, N. Y., and Glens Falls, N. Y. Hague received nineteen votes and Glens Falls ten votes. Hague, N. Y., was, therefore, selected as the place of holding the next session of Conference, and the time was fixed as the first Tuesday in May, A. D. 1919, at 7:30 P. M. It was voted that Rev. F. H. Wright should preach the opening sermon; D. W. Summers alternate.

Conference gave way to the order of the day. Song, "When We All Get to Heaven," was sung.

Report on Education was given by F. H. Wright. The same was adopted. See Report No. 6.

Professor J. S. Luckey spoke on the work at Houghton. He said the great commission had been given to go into all the world and carry the Gospel; that any church or people that refused to obey would certainly fail; that while we had a mountain top experience, the work was always at the base of the mountain; that the tone of the school was "God is with us." He spoke of our missionaries that had attended the school, and had given their lives in the mission field; that Houghton was making plans to have one of their students on the missionary field; to be a success there were three things that were necessary: Grace, Method, and Ability.

The name of A. C. Dow was called and character passed.

Conference adjourned on limit of time.

Benediction by E. L. Elliott.

Thursday Afternon Meeting

C. C. Hill had charge of the song service. Hebrews 2nd chapter was read. A precious season of prayer was held.

The roll was called. Thirteen Elders, three Licentiates and fifteen Delegates responded.

The minutes were read and approved.

The President nominated Rev. A. J. Allen and I. L. Prouty for Advisory Board.

The President also nominated for Conference Missionary Board E. D. Carpenter, ex-officio; A. J. Allen, E. L. Elliott, O. G. Wyman and the President of the W. H. & F. M. Society.

Conference elected the persons so nominated.

The Committee on Resolutions made partial report. The report was approved. See Resolution No. 1.

Conference voted that the money received from the sale of the church building at Ellenburg, N. Y., should be used to repair the church property at Glens Falls, N. Y.

Name of F. H. Wright was called and character passed.

Name of J. F. Wright called and character passed, and by his request, J. F. Wright was placed on the superannuated list by vote of the Conference.

Rev. S. Brown, from the Christian Advent Church, of East

Clarendon, Vt., was introduced, and in his remarks said he had never forgotten the Wesleyan training he had received, and that he intended to fight the good fight of faith and finish the race set before him.

Names of L. M. Hayes, F. L. Wright, H. S. Hill, O. G. Wyman were called and characters passed.

By vote of the Conference, F. H. Wright and Leroy Stafford were excused from the remaining part of the Conference session.

The order of the day having arrived, the congregation stood and sang "Stand Up, Stand Up for Jesus." J. S. Willett offered prayer. Text from Hebrews 13th chapter, 8th verse, "Jesus Christ, the same yesterday, today, and forever." Brother Willett preached a very able sermon. In his remarks he said God never reasoned only as He reasoned with men. God is all-wise and never changes. God's code of morals is always the same; that before the mountains were discovered God was in the flowers; that what God was He is and always will be, and to not only build for today, but to build for eternity, and receive the crown of glory that fadeth not away. This was a great meeting. God was present our souls to greet, and glory crowned the mercy seat.

Conference came to order and voted that the President of the Conference be authorized to secure the transfer of local church property to the Conference where conditions are so it can be done.

Moved and supported to adjourn. Benediction by J. J. Davison.

Thursday Evening Meeting.

A. J. Allen led the devotional service. Brother J. S. Willett made some stirring remarks in behalf of the L. S. U., to which the people responded with their means.

Rev. E. D. Carpenter offered prayer.

D. W. Summers was the speaker of the evening, preaching from the text found in Galatians 5:1, "Stand fast therefore in the liberty wherewith Christ hath made us free." He said that our nation was carrying on this war from the standpoint of liberty; as a nation we had national rights; as a people we had our personal liberty, and that the bondage of guilt was the worst kind of bondage, and that God does a thorough work and sets His people free.

J. S. Willett exhorted the people to seek God and walk in the light and liberty of the saints of God. This was a gracious service. Benediction by J. S. Willett.

Friday Morning Meeting

The devotional service was led by H. S. Hill. The presence of the Lord was felt. The roll was called, to which thirteen Elders, two Licentiates and thirteen Delegates answered to the call of their names.

Minutes of the last session were read and approved, with slight correction.

Name of C. E. Hill was called and character passed.

The Conference gave way for the order of the day, it being the meeting of the Superannuated Ministers' Relief Association. For minutes of the same see Report No. 7.

Conference resumed work.

The Camp Meeting Committee was elected as follows: Our President, Rev. E. D. Carpenter, Chairman of the Committee; the pastors of West Chazy, Mooers, and West Plattsburg, and two laymen, Dr. Walter Stevenson and Leroy Stafford.

Sunday School Secretary H. S. Hill nominated E. L. Elliott as helper in the northern part of the district, and W. F. Lewis for the southern part. The same were elected.

The name of Arthur Baker was called and character passed.

Conference gave way to the order of the day.

I. S. Willett, our Connectional Agent, first spoke in behalf of the mission work. He said our missionaries, Dr. Paine and Sister Barts, had just arrived at Syracuse, and that the Missionary Board was trusting, planning and doing all they could. While the way was blocked to Africa, the way was open to India; that plans were being made to send some missionaries there in June. Financially the missionary work was in the best condition it ever was. Second, he spoke briefly of the educational work. Third, he spoke of the work of the Sunday School; that it should begin with the cradle roll: that every Wesleyan Methodist Sunday School should use our Weslevan Methodist literature, and that the Wesleyan Methodist paper should be in every Wesleyan home. Fourth, he spoke in behalf of the Liberty Loan, and that at this critical time every Conference should take out bonds as far as they were able. There were amens and a hearty response from the whole congregation to all the different branches of this great work.

The Conference closed because of time limit. Benediction by O. G. Wyman.

Friday Afternoon Meeting

Song service was led by W. F. Lewis.

The roll was called, to which thirteen Elders, three Licentiates, and fifteen Delegates answered to the call of their names.

The minutes of the morning session were read and approved.

Names of G. D. Jock and C. C. Hill were called and characters passed.

At the order of the day the Conference Sunday School Secretary's report was given by E. L. Elliott, on account of the illness of F. H. Wright. The report was adopted as read. See Report No. 8.

The Conference voted that the Conference Treasurer should pay the deficiency of three dollars and forty-nine cents.

Professor J. S. Luckey made some remarks on the Sunday School work, and said if we are to succeed we must have some efficient teachers; persons who know and will teach the Book; that the teacher must study and know the child; and to succeed it is necessary to have the ability to hold the attention of the Sunday School class; success depends on the effort we make; the teacher should make a survey of the whole lesson and decide on the main points, and then emphasize those points.

At the close of Professor Luckey's remarks, four diplomas were given as follows: Raymond Barnard, Mrs. Fred Barnard, Mrs. H. S. Hill, Mrs. Edith Potinger. They were presented to H. S. Hill, their teacher.

A motion was made by A. J. Allen that the apportionment on all charges be raised to fifty cents per member on the Conference Budget. After both sides were quite thoroughly discussed, the motion prevailed by a standing vote.

The order of the day having arrived, the song, "He Leadeth Me," was sung. J. S. Willett offered prayer and preached from the Word recorded in Isaiah 54:10, "For the mountains shall depart, and the hills be removed, but my kindness shall not depart from thee, neither shall the covenant of my peace be removed, saith the Lord that hath mercy on thee." The mountains of old Vermont State are the old landmarks, but they shall all depart before the kindness of the Lord shall depart from His people; don't throw away your cross, but take up your cross; rebellion is not redemption, neither is endurance redemption; when Paul repeatedly asked God to remove the thorn, God said, "My grace is sufficient;" when ever God asks His children to bear heavy loads He always comes to help them; God is the soul's friend, and He never turns His back on Israel; God believes in His people, with all their faults; men may lose faith in you, the Church may lose faith in you, but God never loses faith in His child; atonement means the remedy

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for sin; "My mercy shall not depart," saith God; God's judgments never fall until infinite patience has been exhausted.

There were many hearty amens to this message. At the close Brother Harvey spoke in behalf of the soldier boys.

Conference resumed work again.

Names of A. F. Lent, A. E. Moses, T. A. Moses, G. N. Wyher, D. W. Summers were called and characters passed.

Moved and supported to adjourn. Benediction by F. E. Wood.

Friday Evening Meeting

This was a Missionary Meeting. See the Secretary's report and the Treasurer's report (Report No. 9).

Saturday Morning Meeting

The song and prayer service was led by Richard Palmer. This proved to be a very gracious service.

The roll was called and eleven Elders, three Licentiates, and ten Delegates answered to the call of their names.

The minutes of the last session were read and approved.

The report of the Pastoral Relations Committee was read and accepted as read. See Report No. 10.

The Committee on Apportionment gave their report. The same was approved. See Report No. 11.

The names of W. F. Lewis and F. E. Wood were called and characters passed.

The Conference gave way to the order of the day, it being Memorial Service, which was in charge of C. E. Hill, in honor of Sanford Inman, H. H. Rickert, Hiram Rickert, and Sister Miriam Churchill Sprague. C. C. Hill offered prayer. "Blest Be the Tie That Binds" was sung. C. E. Hill made some very touching remarks about those who had gone on before, and that we should follow the Lord as faithfully as they did. In behalf of Brother H. H. Rickert, said he had courage and that he left a good record of his faithfulness. W. F. Lewis spoke next; he said the life of Brother Rickert had always been a great help to him; while he was a great sufferer, he bore it patiently, and was faithful to his call. Brother C. E. Hill spoke in behalf of Sanford Inman, of the meetings they had held together, that souls were saved; Brother Inman was a man that had freedom and liberty in his soul. G. D. Jock then spoke of Brother Inman, that he was a good man, a good

neighbor, an ideal Christian, that he was a very successful class leader, that he always discharged his duties faithfully.

C. E. Hill spoke of Hiram Rickert, how he was always faithful to his church and one of his best members. W. A. Lewis spoke of him as a faithful man and a great worker; he always accomplished what he undertook, and as a class leader he always performed his duty.

H. S. Hill spoke in behalf of Miriam C. Sprague; that she was one that had gone out from the church at Chittenden to give her best in the Master's service. He then read a paper, which is here given:

Miriam Churchill Sprague

Among the different places from which our Lord and Saviour has called workers to carry the Gospel to those in darkened lands, Chittenden, Vermont, stands near the head. Nestled in the Green Mountains of Vermont, like Bethlehem, the birthplace of King David and our Saviour, away from the tainted air of the cities, and a place where the air is softened and purified as it blows through the branches of the pine and spruce, here have been born children in humble homes, that have gone out to carry the tidings of salvation to those in foreign lands.

One of the three that have gone as missionaries from the little Wesleyan Church here is Miriam C. Sprague.

On the 27th of December, 1881, there came to the home of Columbus and Elmira Churchill a baby girl whom they named Miriam. When Miriam became old enough her godly parents took her to church and Sunday School, and early in life there came a desire in her heart to be a follower of Christ. She was baptized by Rev. C. E. Hill, then pastor at Forestdale, Vt., and joined her home church in 1902. In the spring of 1904 she, with her mother and two sisters, moved to Houghton where she attended the Seminary, where the writer was then a student in the same classes with her.

There came a time in her experience when God called her to carry the Gospel to the foreign field, and she who "lived not to please herself" said, "Here am I, Lord, I go at Thy command." Shortly before the time of her first term in Africa she was united in holy matrimony to George H. Sprague. Both she and Brother Sprague were sure that God wanted them to unite their lives together in service for Him. In a letter from Brother Sprague to the writer he says: "Why it should have been for only six years I cannot understand, but I am thankful for the six years and for

the sweet memories I have, and especially for the blessed hope of a future reunion."

At the time of Sister Sprague's death she was in Africa, serving a second term. She enjoyed better health and accomplished more than during their first term. On Sister Sprague's thirty-sixth birthday her co-laborer and much esteemed friend, Sister Day, passed the line of worlds to be with Jesus. Sister Sprague was saddened by the death of Sister Day, but considered herself in excellent health until the evening of December 31st, when the yellow fever fastened its iron grip on her life, and on January 4th she passed away from the land of darkness and sin to the land of light and glory to reign with Jesus.

Sister Sprague had a beautiful character. Her life of Christian service was a life of victory. "She was always sustained by the positive assurance that her heart and life were pleasing to God," and she was one that lived a life of blessed victory in her soul.

We are living in an age of heroes and heroines. Men on the battlefield in Europe are giving their lives for their country, but today we revere the memory of one who gave her life, not for her country, but to her God that the Gospel might be preached to those in darkened lands. Among those that are honored by our great Commander, King Jesus, will appear the name of Miriam C. Sprague. May her consecrated life of victory and service spur us on to higher and nobler living.

E. L. Elliott made some touching remarks in behalf of Miriam Sprague. He said they were associated together in their school days, and later they attended the school at Houghton together; that they crossed the water on the same boat; that the last time he saw her was on the mission field in Africa; that she was a hard worker, was in earnest, and could hardly spare time for a vacation when she much needed it, and he was sure the work lost a great deal when it lost this worker.

C. E. Hill spoke of the baptismal service, what a wonderful time it was, and how she asked for the baptism of the Spirit.

Benediction by C. E. Hill.

Conference resumed work.

Names of V. D. Otis and C. A. Heath were called and characters passed.

A report was read of the Macomb charge.

Moved and carried that the President be authorized to appoint the Chairmen of the different Committees, and to engage a man for the afternoon services at the next Annual Conference.

Meeting adjourned to meet at 2 P. M.

Saturday Afternoon Meeting

Song service was led by O. G. Wyman, A number of prayers were offered by the laymen. The Lord's presence was felt by all present.

The roll was called. Nine Elders, two Licentiates and ten Delegates answered to the call of their names.

The minutes of the morning session were read and approved.

The Conference Treasurer read his report. The same was adopted as read. See Report No. 12.

The Committee on Resolutions made report. The same was approved. See Resolutions Nos. 1, 2 and 3.

The Conference Tithing Secretary gave his report. The same was adopted. See Report No. 13.

The Conference Committee on Statistical Report was read and adopted. See Report No. 15.

The Secretary of the Woman's Home and Foreign Missionary adopted. See Report No. 14.

The Treasurer of the Woman's Home and Foreign Missionary Society gave their report. See Report No. 9.

Voted that the Conference President appoint a committee to take under consideration the advisability of holding our Conference session at the time of Camp Meeting. The following were appointed: A. J. Allen, E. L. Elliott, O. G. Wyman, W. F. Lewis, H. S. Hill and F. H. Wright.

Our Conference President, Rev. E. D. Carpenter, gave a stirring talk at this time, saying that he had never missed a Conference session since he had been a member, and that if we as preachers were faithful in preaching the Word the Lord would cause it to bring forth abundantly.

It was voted to pay the Conference Secretary fifteen dollars for his services.

Moved and supported to adjourn to the call of the chair. Prayer by J. J. Davison. Benediction by C. C. Hill. The minutes were approved.

Saturday Evening Meeting

The Saturday evening devotional service was led by A. J. Allen and was a time of inspiration and blessing to many. Many personal testimonies to the saving and keeping power of God were given.

The congregation sang, "The Same Old Way." Scripture lesson was read by F. E. Wood, from the 34th Psalm. Prayer was offered by E. D. Carpenter. Song, "All the Way My Saviour Leads Me," was sung.

The message was brought by F. E. Wood, using as a text Hebrews 4:12 and 13. He spoke forcibly that the Lord seeth; that no evil escapes His all-seeing eye; that God is willing and abundantly able to save us from all sin; that the Word of God reveals to us our sins, and it is the weapon the preacher must use to win souls to God, and if men won't come to church we must go out into the highways and hedges and tell them about the Saviour. He also spoke of the necessity of bringing the children into the kingdom; to bear the Word effectually we must live holy lives. Following the sermon, Brother Wood sang "The Glad Way Home." Bendiction by F. E. Wood.

Sunday Morning Meeting

Song, "He Lifted Me," was sung. G. D. Jock and G. N. Wyher offered prayer. The love feast was in charge of A. J. Allen. The 91st Psalm was the lesson read by E. D. Carpenter. Some very interesting comments were made. Song, "Jesus Is All the World to Me," was sung. Brother Allen said he had been in the Champlain Conference nineteen years and had never missed a session; he made many encouraging remarks about his experience, saying that God had always answered his prayers and brought deliverance. Amen! Over one hundred testified in this meeting; many to the saving and sanctifying and keeping of their souls. This was a gracious meeting, marked by the presence of God.

Song, "If Jesus Goes With Me I'll Go," was sung.

Report of the Committee on Resolution of Thanks was read. See Resolution No. 3.

J. S. Willett read the lesson from 1 Peter 5:1-11. Prayer was offered by W. F. Lewis. The President gave the notices of the day. An offering for the pastor for entertaining the Conference was taken, amounting to about \$35.00. Amen! Glory!

The congregation stood and sang "Guide Me, O Thou Great Jehovah."

J. S. Willett preached the ordination sermon from the text found in 1 Peter 5:10, "Make you perfect, stablish, strengthen, settle you." It is God's purpose that our life should not be a defeat. Man is very imperfect, but God's Word teaches that if man will, he may be made perfect; that man has a standard for weights and measures, and God's standard for man is perfection. "Be ye perfect as I am perfect" is His command. God never asks any impossible things of His people. The disgrace of man is he will stay in disgrace when he might be perfect. God measures man not by his gold, but by what he has in his heart, and that opportunity never comes a second time; we must learn to take advantage of the opportunity that comes our way. We will be just as busy in Heaven as we are in this world; a good motto for the Christian is to push; that God wants quality more than He wants quantity. First, is to have; second, to hold; third, to possess. When we meet the conditions, God always does His part; God always uses means to answer the prayers of His people.

Rev. H. S. Hill, pastor of the Wesleyan Methodist Church at Chittenden, Vt., was ordained. This was a blessed service to all present. Benediction by C. E. Hill.

Sunday Afternoon Service

The meeting opened with the Y. M. W. B. song by Brother and Sister Harvey. They also made some very interesting remarks, and showed some of the gods and costumes of the people of India. They sang in the Indian lauguage "Nothing but the Blood of Jesus." Brother Harvey gave an address in the Indian lauguage, and Sister Harvey interpreted it in English. The congregation sang "My Saviour First of All."

The Scripture lesson was read from St. Luke 7th chapter, and prayer was offered by J. J. Davison. Song, "Face to Face," was sung. The message was brought to a large congregation by O. G. Wyman from the text found in Isaiah 66:13, "As one whom his mother comforteth, so will I comfort you, and ye shall be comforted." He spoke of the mother side of God; of our mother's love; of the sacred name, mother; the mother state in which we were born, and of our mother nation.

E. D. Carpenter made some touching remarks at the close of the sermon, and urged the people to get right with God. A solo was sung by F. E. Wood, "Can a Boy Forget His Mother's Prayers?" The congregation rose and sang, "Lord, I Am Coming Home," and one soul responded to the invitation of the song, and came to the altar for heart cleansing. God's benediction was on this service.

Sunday Evening Service

E. D. Carpenter had charge of the communion service. Over seventy partook at the Lord's table. Richard Palmer and L. M. Hayes offered prayer. "We Must Travel the Same Old Way" was sung. A Scripture lesson was read from Matthew 25th chapter. C. E. Hill offered prayer.

A. J. Allen was the preacher of the evening. The text used was Revelation 6:17, "The great day of His wrath has come, and who shall be able to stand?" First, it was a great day when the sun made its first appearance across the continent; second, it was a great day when God made the house that the soul of man lives in; third, it was an awful day when the enemy went into the Garden and deceived man and captured him at his will; fourth it was a great day in Judea when the shepherds and wise men found the Christ; fifth, it was a great day at Calvary when the Christ was crucified, and the sun would not give its light. He spoke of the great day for the Negroes when they were set free; that it will be a great day when all the nations gather, and each receives their rewards of eternal destiny. It is a great day when the son goes to war, parting from loved ones. And, lastly, it will be a great day of reunion when the loved ones all return home from the north, from the south, from the east, and from the west, and receive their eternal rewards.

The people stood and sang "Just As I Am." One seeking soul came to the altar. The Spirit of the Lord was on the people.

Brother Carpenter said a few touching words. The song, "Blest Be the Tie That Binds," was sung, Benediction by J. S. Willett.

Thus closed another session of Conference that all could heartily say, "Lord, it is good for us to be here."

CAMP MEETING COMMITTEE REPORT

The Champlain Conference Camp Meeting, held at West Chazy, N. Y., August, 1917, was a very successful meeting. And what do we mean by a successful religious meeting? A meeting where God's Word is preached under the anointing of the Holy Spirit, and where that Spirit actuates the saints. Other things are of secondary value. In St. Luke's account of Pentecost, the author devotes forty-five verses to the account of the Spirit's descent, the behavior of the Spirit-filled, and to an epitome of Peter's preaching, while only two verses are needed to measure the results.

The preaching at our Camp Meeting last year was Pentecostal. Our evangelists and pastors presented the truth with power. The singing was beautiful because enriched by the Holy Spirit, and God's saints were Spirit-moved. To God be all the glory! Heaven will reveal the numerical results.

The new tabernacle was completed and ready for use August 1. It was dedicated on Sunday, August 24, 1917, Rev. J. J. Coleman preaching the dedicatory sermon. Text, 1 Peter 1:3.

I am compelled to report a slight damage to the new building from the heavy winds and snow. The damage is being repaired and we trust this repair will be permanent. We rejoice in the fact that nearly enough funds were cheerfully given to pay for the new building last year.

We have engaged as workers for the coming Camp Meeting Rev. J. J. Coleman, Professor of Theology at Houghton Seminary, and Rev. S. A. Mow. The singing will be in charge of Brother Mow, assisted by our own Conference workers. All indications point toward an unusually good meeting.

The total amount raised last year was \$922.51. Unpaid pledges,

\$83.00. Cash on hand, \$300.00. Total expenditures, \$1,422.78, leaving a deficit of \$117.27. Total cost of tabernacle, \$1,125.25.

Various improvements are under way. The roofs on all the Camp buildings have been newly painted. A new platform has been built for the well. Some dead trees have been removed and young trees will soon be taking their places.

Our needs are not all monetary. Every charge in our Conference should have a representative delegation, led by the pastor, at our coming Camp Meeting. This is possible. Discreet planning and real self-denial will make it possible for many to attend the annual Conference Camp Meeting. Your plan should include the Camp Meeting, and you should work your own plan. Let us begin now and make it the best feast our Conference has ever enjoyed.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MISSIONS

Your Committee on Missions submits the following report:

1. The missionary enterprise of the Christian Church is the most gigantic in scope, the most lofty in purpose, the most unselfish in spirit and the most constructively useful of all the enterprises of

world history. It demands our attention. It needs our support. It is of God's own planning. Therefore we cannot neglect it and be free from guilt. We are responsible for what we may do in Christ's service. Failing to do that, we forfeit God's fullest measure of blessing.

- 2. All the branches of missionary activity are fields of service and means of growth and expansion for the Church. The history of the various branches of the Christian Church demonstrate that those branches which have grown are the ones which have been wisely and aggressively missionary. If our Church as a whole, or any Conference, or any single church, or any individual person, would grow in grace and usefulness, one and all must be missionary in fact. Our usefulness ceases when we cease to minister to others.
- 3. While the needs of the foreign mission work cannot be overemphasized, we must not fail to put due emphasis on Home and Conference Missions. It is when the home fires blaze highest and brightest that the fires can be kindled along the front. The advance in forign missions cannot be made without an adequate home base. By definitely planning and working an aggressive Conference missionary policy we shall be making a stronger home base.
- We believe this Conference shall raise its present Missionary Budget in full and make provision for a literal working Conference base.

Report No. 6.

EDUCATION

Missions and Education are the two great benevolent institutions of our Conference and Connection. As to the relative value of these and as to the responsibility involved in them there is no line of differentiation. The same God who, through His Son, said, "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel," said through Paul inspired by the Holy Ghost, "Study." There is a reason for this equality in value. Soul-saving and soul-training cannot be separated. Spirit-unctionized instruction usually precedes intelligent yielding to God, whether that yielding means salvation or service. And the more intelligent the yielding the greater will be the service rendered. Exceptions there may be; but they are exceptions, not the rule.

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Evidently our Conference does not believe this. Last year the Conference contributed \$890.48 for missions and \$605.20 for education. Both sums are meager enough, but why such discrimination? The Connection makes an equal apportionment to each local church. The reasons are varied. The missionary appeal stirs the emotions of men and women, and they act on their emotions. Childless individuals rarely cultivate a desire to see the children of the Church educated in a Christian institution of learning, placing greater value upon a so-called civilization based upon religion than upon one based on religion and education. There is also a lack of knowledge on the part of our people concerning our educational work. When you read the missionary columns in the church paper and lay it aside not having acquainted yourself with the educational situation, you have made yourself sadly one-sided. The dusky child must be reached by the Gospel. To close our hearts to the appeal from the outstretched hands of our dusky brother's child is to cut us off at once from the favor of God. The incoming of God's mighty, surging, soul-permeating love makes such an attitude toward the lost and darkened races an absolute impossibility. But what about our own flesh and blood who need training for service? What about the vast, pent-up potentialities latent in our Wesleyan young people? Would Sister Miriam Day, of precious memory, ever have found her place of service without Houghton Seminary? Look at your missionary forces today and think; then give of your means and men to our great educational interests of the Church. Not less for the missionary work, but at least an equality for the educational work.

Now, we have local needs. Our young ministers need help in pursuing the Conference course. We need the stimulation that would be ours from the exchange of thought. The danger of mental stagnation can be averted. We can hold Ministerial Associations, Holiness Conventions, Sunday School Conventions, and do Institute work in connection with our Annual Camp Meetings. These advanced steps would result in increased efficiency in service.

MINUTES OF THE SUPERANNUATED MINISTER'S RELIEF ASSOCIATION

The Superannuated Minister's Relief Association of the Champlain Conference met for its forty-seventh annual session Friday afternoon, April 26, 1918, in the Wesleyan Methodist Church at Forestdale, Vermont.

The President, Rev. A. J. Allen, called the meeting to order. Prayer was offered by the Rev. J. J. Davison and the Rev. H. S. Hill.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

Moved and approved that the Treasurer be instructed to pay the balance due on Rev. John Blanchard's monument.

The Treasurer's report was read and approved, after correction. Rev. E. D. Carpenter made the following resolution, which was carried:

"That any pastor who has served more than twenty years in the Conference, and has at retirement (whether from age or ill health) not means to comfortably care for himself, shall, if he have a wife or family to care for, receive not less than sixty dollars (\$60.00) per year; and shall, if single, receive not less than thirty dollars (\$30.00) per year.

"And a widow of any pastor who has rendered a good term of service, and is not comfortably provided for, shall receive not less than thirty dollars (\$30.00) per year.

"Said amount not to be paid beyond the interest and collections of each year and the authorization of the Constitution and By-Laws of said Society."

Moved and approved that the Treasurer be instructed to invest \$500.00 or \$1,000.00 in United States Liberty Bonds.

The Association proceeded to the election of officers. The following were elected: President, Rev. A. J. Allen; Vice-President, Rev. F. H. Wright; Secretary, Rev. H. S. Hill; Treasurer, Rev. C. E. Hill.

It was moved and carried that the Treasurer be paid \$15.00 for his services.

Adjourned by motion to meet at the call of the chair.
