STANDING RESOLUTIONS

- 1. A Committee on Auditing and Finance, consisting of three ministerial members, the Chairman being an Elder, shall be elected each year, the duties of which shall be to examine and report on the Treasurer's books and all financial reports, except the W. M. S. and Y. M. W. B., and to be a standing Committee to advise on financial plans.
- All persons received into membership in the churches of our Conference, excepting those whose life of Christian fidelity has been of sufficient long standing, shall be received at first as associate members only.
- 3. When it becomes necessary for a church to call a pastor, it shall be the duty of the calling church to make provision for the expense incurred by the pastor in removing to the new field of labor. Money raised for this purpose shall NOT be applied on the pastor's salary. When an elder is elected to the Conference Presidency, expenses incurred in moving to the Conference Parsonage shall be paid from the Conference Treasury.
- 4. The Conference Sunday shall be the closing Sunday of the Conference year, and the out-going pastor shall be paid his salary for that Sunday by the charge he is leaving.
- 5. At the beginning of the Conference session the president shall appoint a Nominating Committee of not less than three members, two Elders and one Layman, to bring to the Conference a slate of Nominations for Committees, etc., for the Conference Temporary Organization. Delegates' Credentials shall be mailed to the Secretary not later than ten days before convening of Conference.
- 6. No person shall be received into membership in Allegheny Conference until he shall have properly filled out an application blank, which application together with recommendations of his references must pass the approval of the President and his Advisory Board. Exceptions to this rule may be made by the President and his Advisory Board when they deem it best.
- 7. The pastor of any church in the Conference shall be free to hold at least one revival meeting during the year, where ever he sees fit, and is recommended that his salary be paid him while he is absent.
- Each pastor shall send a monthly report on the blank provided, to the Conference President showing the progress and state of the work under his care.

- 9. Each church may elect a Nominating Committee whose duty it shall be to nominate candidates for church officers for presentation to the church at the itme of the annual election of officers. Such nominations shall not exclude other nominations at the time of the business meeting.
- 10. Churches having business with the Conference Board of Trustees requiring a visit of that body to their church, shall be responsible for the expense attached to such calls, unless released by the Board.
- 11. Inasmuch as trial sermons are hardly fair to church or candidate, and since the practice of having a trial sermon is contrary to the usual manner of locating preachers, we recommend that no preacher shall accept any such invitation; if given. Exceptions to this rule may be granted by the Conference President upon request of any church.
- 12. Since considerable expense of transferring automobile title and license attend the moving of a pastor from one state to another, we recommend that where possible the calling bear this expense.
- 13. We recommend that all Districts emphasize Sunday School activity, and that Conventions be arranged for in conjunction with the visitation of the Conference Sunday School Secretary, who shall visit one Convention of each District during the year, at Convention expense.
- 14. We recommend that no one be elected to Elders' Orders who does not have an abiding sense of divine call to give himself wholly to this one thing in cares and studies, and clearly determining by God's grace to give himself wholly to this holy ministry, if possible, long before the appointed day of ordination, and manifesting such a determination of faithful Christian service to the church or congregation whom he was called to serve during his years of preparation, so that as much as lieth in himself, he has and will apply himself wholly to the work of the ministry, except in all cases of absolute necessity of such diversions to a legitimate avocation for livelihood which jeopardizes the Lord's work or blames the ministry.
- 15. We recommend that each church equip its parsonage with the necessary heating and cooking equipment, because of the variation of requirements in this equipment for the individual parsonage.
- 16. We recommend that in election of local Church Advisory Committee each church permit the pastor to nominate the members of this Committee.
- 17. The Conference Secretary, as Chairman, with the Auditing and Finance Committee shall be a Standing Committee on Publications, whose duty it shall be to examine all matters pertaining to Conference printing and publication, and let contracts for same.

- 18. All churches shall have a systematic means of keeping records, as required by Discipline, Paragraph No. 74. The "Ideal Church Record," published by the Bethel Publishing Company, Elkhart, Indiana, is a suggested form.
- 19. Local church treasurers' books shall close April 30, thus making the Conference fiscal year from May 1 to April 30. All funds received after that date shall be counted in the following year. Funds will be credited on Sub-Treasurer's books if received by May 5.

To meet the requirements of Paragraph 165-4 of the Discipline regarding revision of the roll of membership, April 30 may be considered the close of the Conference year for Statistical purposes.

- 20. Minister's Pocket Credentials shall be issued annually to Elders and Conference Preachers who are eligible.
- 21. Since the use of the Wedding Ring is not in accord with the standards of our Church, we therefore, as a Conference, disapprove of our ministers performing or taking part in the ring ceremony.
- 22. We recommend that the mid-week prayer service be in the hands of the pastor to conduct or provide for according to his discretion.

REPORTS

Report No. 1 THE CONFERENCE PRESIDENT

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

Greetings to the members of the 105th Annual Session of the Allegheny Conference in the name of Him whose work engages our attention: Today we call the Conference to join in gratitude and praise to God for His many blessings, which have marked our way throughout the past months since we last met in Annual Session. It is with a profound sense of gratitude to Almighty God for His grace and guidance throughout the past year that we make this report.

As long as we live we may never be meeting together in another year more important than the one in which we are now meeting. It is called "the year laden with destiny." Should anyone be inclined to question the serious condition of the world, the reports of our radio newscasters and the contents of our daily newspapers will suffice. Every day tells the same old story of heartbreak, of tears and of tragedy: Divorce, broken homes, delinquent children, murders, suicides, robberies, holdups, wars, strikes, lockouts, famine. Sickening tragedy is everywhere. Added to that which is seen is something far more subtle, a spirit, a tendency, a tone, a bias, an under-tow, a current-call it what you will, but everyone is feeling the pull of it. John sums it up in the expression, "The whole world lieth in the wicked one." Then, too, the forces of Communism, Modernism, Catholicism and Paganism are challenging Evangelical Christianity as it has never been challenged in our day. Above and beyond all this is the creation for the first time in 2000 years of the New State of Israel. The days ahead will bring historic world-shattering events politically and religiously. The only way we can meet the crisis is to go deeper and deeper in God. He alone has the answer for our day. Those of us who still believe in the fundamentals of the Christian faith and seek to do the will of God as revealed in His Holy Word must think and work together now as never before. This is no time to be divided. Remember, "United we stand, divided we fall."

We believe that this has been a year of continued and consistent progress in almost every department of our work. We haven't seen the progress we desire; but, when so many are at a standstill, we are glad for a consistent progress, even if it is slow. As you will see by our report we have organized three new churches this year which have added 49 members, and yet our Conference Roll shows a very small gain. Beloved, we need to do something more than we are doing to conserve and to enlarge our membership. God has answered prayer and some of our churches have had good revivals. We believe the best for years in some cases.

In the Pioneer Field this has been a banner year as you will see by the report of the Pioneer Secretary.

We have earnestly tried to stir our ministers to a new sense of prayer by getting them to gather in groups once a week, if possible, to pray their problems through. We cannot talk or think them through. If we do not pray them through, they will never be solved. In some parts of the Conference there has been an excellent response; in other parts the response has not been so good. Then, too, we felt led to ask for a week of prayer in our churches. The response and the reports from this were indeed heartening. Some said that this week was as good as a revival. Brethren and Sisters, the conviction deepens that the supreme need of the church is the spirit and habit of prayer. There are many needs, we know, but the need of prayer transcends them all. If only the church of Christ could be impelled to pray, there would be an end of barrenness and failure. It is the lack of prayer that lies at the root of all our troubles, and there is no remedy but in prayer. The habits of worldliness will never be broken by strong and fiery words of censure. The powerlessness of the church cannot be cured by reproach. Neither can spiritual destitution and moral laxity be removed by clever analysis and urgent appeal. Things will never be better till prayer is restored to its true place in the organization of the church and the habits of individual believers. If only the people of God could be baptized into a passion of prayer, spiritual life would quicken, miracles would return, souls would be saved, and finances would come easy. Beloved, it is going to take courage to face the days which are ahead. We can find the needed courage only in the place of prayer as did the Apostles in Acts 4: 23-31; otherwise we will be confused, perplexed, bewildered and as fearful as the rest of the world about us. Let us as ministers take the lead, enter the arena of intercessory prayer and then encourage our people to do so.

The other things which we have been accomplishing this Conference year will show up in our report. We have continued throughout the year in the work assigned to us by the last Annual Conference. To the best of our knowledge and ability through prayer, we have sought earnestly the guidance of the Holy Spirit in every action which has been taken. Following is a report of our actions:

In other words, it took \$5,525.93 and 48 people to get one other person saved and into the Church . . . 'Let us make an intensive campaign for souls this year.'" Crime has increased 800% the last 40 years. 60,000,000 Americans make no profession of religion. Many of them do not even believe in God. Seventy-six per cent of our public school children do not attend any Sunday School. Let our cry this year be, "All out for souls!"

Conclusion: As we bring this report to a close we wish to thank each one for their splendid cooperation and for the many who have prayed for us. It is indeed heartening to have different ones tell us how they have

felt led to pray for us at different times. We greatly appreciate this. We are grateful for the increased burden of prayer which is coming upon the Conference. Our only hope lies in prevailing prayer and a heaven-born, God-sent, Spirit-wrought revival. We know not what the future holds but we do know "The great, the Mighty God, the Lord of hosts" still lives and still challenges: "Call unto me, and I will show thee great and mighty things which thou knowest not." He did that very thing in Wesley's, in Edward's, in Finney's in Torrey's day and in Wales at the turn of the century. He is greater than the sum total of all adverse conditions. Jeremiah cried out in his day, "Ah, Lord God! behold, there is nothing too hard for thee." What He did in other days, He will do and can do in ours. Has God ceased to honor prayer and faith? No! The promise never fails to bear fruit E-X-C-E-P-T when God's human cooperators fail to meet the conditions. This coming year, if Jesus tarries, let us do our best to cooperate with the Holy Spirit and to meet the conditions for God to work.

Report No. 4

COMMITTEE ON AUDITING AND FINANCE

Your Committee on Auditing and Finance submits report and recommendations as follows:

ITEM I. WHAT SHALL CHURCHES PAY?.

- 1. The following Denominational Budget items: \$2.00, Foreign Missions; \$1.50, Education; \$1.25, Pension Plan; \$1.00, Home Missions; \$.25, Hephzibah Orphanage; \$.25, Administrative Budget; \$.20, General Conference Travel and Entertainment Fund. (Above items mean church member, per year.) \$.05 per Sunday School member annually for Sunday schools.
- 2. Undivided Conference Budget which shall be equal to 10% of the sum obtained by adding the three following items: Pastor's salary, parsonage rent and church incidental expenses. (To be remitted monthly.)
 - 3. Conference Group Life Insurance, \$.30 per member.
 - 4. Conference Entertainment, \$.35 per member.
- 5. The Pioneer self-denial envelopes for remittances of \$.25 or more per month (above tithe) shall be given our continued support.
- 6. Promotion of the Home Missionary program shall be encouraged by subscriptions to the Card Call Plan among pastors and laymen generally wherever possible.
- 7. The pastor or the person responsible for the sale of the Conference Minutes in the local church shall remit \$.35 per copy to the Chairman of the Committee on Sale of Conference Minutes, by March 31.
- 8. The above items, with the exception of Paragraphs 6 and 7, shall be sent to the District Sub-treasurers. Church Treasurers are to make MONTHLY remittances to the credit of Undivided Budget, Conference Missions and Pioneer Fund. Other items may be remitted at the discretion of the church unless otherwise specified.
- 9. Church Treasurers' reports to Quarterly Conference shall be made as of the close of the month preceding the Quarterly Conference. All Church Treasurers' records for the Annual Conference year shall close April 30. The Conference fiscal year is thus from May 1 to April 30.

ITEM II. WHAT SHALL THE SUNDAY SCHOOL PAY?

1. The first Sunday School offering of each month to Conference

Missions for the use of churches not yet self-sustaining, etc. according to the recommendations of the Conference Missions Board.

- 2. Sunday School Birthday offerings to Conference Missions.
- 3. The items above to be paid to the Church Treasurer for payment to the District Sub-treasurer.

ITEM III. WHAT SHALL THE CONFERENCE TREASURER PAY?

- 1. To the Conference President:
 - A. Salary per week, \$60.00.
- B. Annually, \$900.00 for traveling expenses incurred in the pursuit of the duties of his office. From this sum the president shall provide adequate liability insurance for his car.
- C. An amount equal to his telephone bill, including all toll calls made in the interest of the Conference.
 - D. The sum of \$100.00 annually for vacation purposes.
- E. An amount equal to the cost of all miscellaneous items which relate to the duties of the President's office such as telegrams, flowers for deceased, etc.
- To Mrs. H. C. Van Wormer the sum of \$10.00 per week for secretarial services for the Conference.
- 3. The following sums from the Conference Budget, in appreciation for services rendered: The necessary amount to bring the offering for the Conference Secretary up to \$100.00; Conference Treasurer, \$100.00; Each District-Sub-Treasurer, except West Virginia, \$50.00; West Virginia, Sub-Treasurer, \$25.00; Group Insurance Secretary-Treasurer, \$25.00; Camp Meeting Fire Marshall for services at Conference, \$10.00; Statistical Chairman, \$15.00; New Aid Treasurer, \$25.00. He shall also pay the above and all other members of Conference Boards or Committees, an amount equal to all expenses incurred in the pursuit of their duties, in connection with their respective offices, upon presentation of such expense accounts.
- 4. The sum of \$35.00 monthly to Ada Dishong from the "Assistance Fund."
- 5. The Conference Budget shall be distributed as follows for the ensuing year: Conference Budget, 75%; Conference Missions, 10%; Miscellaneous Fund, 1%; Pension Plan, 9%; Assistance Fund, 5%.

CONFERENCE SUNDAY SCHOOL SECRETARY

To the members of the Allegheny Conference, Greetings!

Hardly anyone would contradict the assertion, that we are living in strange and serious times. The days in which we are living are days of growing intensity; they are days of upheavel, revolution, unrest, agitation and confusion. Things are happening and great changes are taking place. You realize and I realize that apart from Christ, man has no righteousness, Godliness, Holiness, and no eternal life, and therefore, no hope beyond death and the grave. Millions in sin and shame are dying. Is it not time we pray the Lord of harvest to stir our hearts as never before?

In John 4:25, Jesus said, "Say not ye, there are yet four months and then cometh harvest? Behold, I say unto you, lift up your eyes, and look on the fields, for they are white already to harvest." Jesus made this so personal, "I say unto you." He admonishes us to lift up our eyes and look. Behold, the fields are white already to harvest.

When we think of the hundreds and thousands of boys and girls that are unreached by any Sunday school at all it stirs our heart. Then too, children are much easier to win to Christ than adults.

Vast sums of money, much time, and great labor are expended for Rescue Missions and Juvenile Delinquency. But if it were put into definite Sunday school work it would cause us to marvel at the results.

Less than one of every three people in the United States has any sort of connection with the Sunday school or church. Thirty-seven million of our young people are not being reached. We must seek out those in our communities who are not reached by church or Sunday school.

The Sunday school is important, it supplies eighty-two per cent of the church world. It gives us ninety-seven per cent of our ministers. The highest, first, and supreme concern of pastors, superintendents, and teachers should be the salvation of precious souls. This is infinitely higher, nobler, sweeter and more sublime than mere numbers, yet we must reach them if we are to see them saved.

At our last Annual Session of Conference on Sunday morning it was our privilege to conduct Sunday school for our boys and girls who attend Conference with their parents. We had a splendid time, the attendance was 116. Many expressed real appreciation for this Sunday school at Conference.

It was our privilege to attend the Titusville District Convention, December 31, 1947 in behalf of the Sunday school and also, a night service at the Stewart Run church.

We mailed out the Monthly Average blanks, as well as other Sundayschool literature, during the Conference year. It has been a real blessing to work, pray, and labor in the interest of the Sunday schools of our Conference.

Report No. 12 CONFERENCE PIONEER SECRETARY

To the 105th session of Allegheny Conference we bring greetings from the Pioneer Department in the Name of Him who said, "I am He that liveth, and was dead, and, behold I am alive for evermore, Amen; and have the keys of hell and Death."

We are happy to report that this has been a year of victory and progress in this phase of our conference work, and the condition of this department of our Conference is better at the present than at any time since we have had the oversight of it. Real progress is being made in almost every one of our Pioneer churches.

During the first five months of this conference year we spent much of our time laboring with the faithful few in the completing of the church and parsonage of our new work at Tallmadge, Ohio, known as the Hampe Memorial Church. The Hampes moved into the parsonage in October and the church was completed and occupied in November. The total valuation of this property is \$15,000 and the present indebtedness is slightly over \$700. This was one of those rare oportunities that come to us, to have failed in taking advantage of it would have resulted in a real loss to our Conference.

Another new work came our way during the year with the organization of the Berkley church. This is indeed a very promising work. It had its beginning with a revival held by two laymen, Brothers Ward Adams and A. D. Manners. It continued to grow and develop and we were asked to organize it into a Wesleyan Methodist Church in July. This was another very unusual opportunity. We are truly grateful to our Heavenly Father for permitting it to come our way. Later the building was deeded to our Conference without any cost at all to us. Plans are now under way for the building of a parsonage. Seldom in one year do we find two such unusual opportunities as these.

Two of our Pioneer bands were organized during the year. Those at Hadley, Pa. and Olive Hill, W. Va. This is, and must ever be our aim. It is our fervent hope that during this year some others who have been laboring diligently to this end will reach their objective. Two new Pioneer points have been added this year. The work at Riverside Park, W. Va. has

again come into our Conference, and on May 19 the little group at Ashtabula, Ohio were organized into a Pioneer band and received into the Conference.

Another forward step was made at Robertsville, Ohio in the building of a basement church. The building is now completed with the exception of a few finishing touches. They have been worshiping in it since the early part of the year. This building is valued at \$5,000 and has an indebtedness of about \$1,500 part of which is covered with pledges. Without question this comfortable, permanent place of worship will have much to do with the building up of this congregation.

To briefly sum up the material gain that has come to the Conference this year through the Pioneer Department would be as follows: 3 new churches organized bringing a total of 43 new members into our Conference along with three church buildings and one parsonage the valuation of which is approximately \$21,000 but with an indebtedness of only about \$2,000. To rightly place credit for these blessings we feel would be as follows:

- To our Kind Heavenly Father for His unspeakable goodness and His Kind Providences.
- 2. To the loyal, sacrificing, and persevering, pastors and people of these new works.
- 3. To the loyal churches and people of the Conference for their financial support and for their prayerful interest as well.

While there has been much manual labor connected with our work this year we have been busy with the spiritual side as well. During the year we have traveled 20,500 miles, held 6 revivals, preached 135 times, conducted 3 pioneer services during the year, and made 31 visitations to our various pioneer appointments, and attended General Conference as delegate. Conducted one funeral and officiated at one wedding.

By authorization of the Conference President we performed the following official acts during the year:

- 1. July 19, 1947, Organized Barkley church, with 14 members.
- 2. July 29, 1947, Appointed Laura Weatherholt and Leona Cramer as pastors of this newly organized church.
- 3. August 14, 1947, Appointed Michael Terifay to Pioneer work at Riverside Park, W. Va.
- 4. September 18, 1947, Appointed Michael Terifay to Pioneer work started at Weston, W. Va.
- 5. April 5, 1948, Authorized payment of \$100.00 to J. C. Himes for his labor at Cottage Hill and Brookville.
 - 6. April 18, 1948, Broke ground for new church at Vanport, Pa.
 - 7. April 21, 1948, Organized Hadley church, with 20 members.
 - 8. May 16, 1948, Dedicated church at Barkley.
 - 9. May 19, 1948, Effected Pioneer organization at Ashtabula, Ohio.

BOARD OF CONFERENCE TRUSTEES

Your Board of Trustees reports the following business transacted during the year:

1. June 7, 1947, a meeting of the Board of Trustees was held on the Campgrounds at Stoneboro, Pennsylvania.

Officers for the Board were elected for the coming year as follows: Chairman, Rev. H. C. Van Wormer; Secretary, Rev. H. N. Robinson. Voted also to place in nomination the name of Rev. H. N. Robinson as treasurer of the New Aid Funds.

Voted to grant permission to the Meadville church to build an addition to their church building, also to secure a loan of \$1,500.00 for the building of this addition.

Voted to grant permission to the Pittsburgh church to change their loan from the bank to Mr. Doyle Spicher.

Voted to authorize the Kenmore church to secure a loan of \$5,000.00 for the erection of their church basement, the Conference to underwrite the same.

Voted to authorize the New Aid Treasurer to draw from the treasury the sum of \$25.00 in appreciation for his services.

Voted to renew for one year the notes outstanding to churches and ministers.

- June 10, 1947, by correspondence: Approved a loan of \$100.00 to Rev. L. S. Burchfield for hospital expense.
- 3. June 25, 1947, by correspondence: Approved a loan of \$300.00 from Ministers' Aid Fund to Rev. R. L. Kuhn.
- 4. August 7, 1947, by correspondence: First, approved a loan of \$150.00 to the Pittsfield church for repairs on their church building.

Second, approved a loan of \$350.00 to the Pleasant Hill church for repairs on their parsonage.

5. August 12, 1947, a meeting of the Conference Board of Trustees was held in the Administration Building on Stoneboro Campgrounds, Stoneboro, Penna.

Rev. F. B. Miller, pastor of the Oak Grove church presented a request for permission to sell the Oak Grove parsonage to Mr. Byler for the sum of \$1,600.00, which request was granted.

Authorized the Conference President to have the President's parsonage painted and to have new hot water heater installed.

- 6. September 2, 1947, by correspondence: Approved a loan of \$150.00 from the Ministers' Aid Fund to Rev. J. L. Schell, for sickness.
- 7. September 10, 1947, By the visitation of Dr. Galon W. Hall to the Board of Trustees individually, approved the action of the Trustees of the Sandy Lake Circuit in selling the property located on the Franklin-Sandy Lake Road known as The Wesleyan Methodist Parsonage, to Galon W. Hall on March 6, 1935.

September 18, 1947, by correspondence: Voted to grant a loan of \$300.00 from the Ministers' Aid Fund to Rev. Ralph Manners.

9. October 2, 1947, a meeting of the Conference Board of Trustees was called to meet at Rimersburg, Penna.

Viewed a property located on Purity Avenue in Rimersburg and voted to authorize the Trustees of the Bethany church to purchase the above property for a parsonage for a sum not to exceed \$3,000.00.

Approved the plans of the Oak Grove church for the erection of a parsonage.

Voted to approve a loan of \$1,000.00 to the Hampe Memorial church from the McLeister Memorial Fund to be paid back out of pledges.

- 10. October 30, 1947, by correspondence: Voted to approve the purchase of a house and lot in Daybrook, West Virginia by the Bethel church to be used for a parsonage. Also voted to loan the Bethel church \$2,000.00 from Conference Funds for the purchase of the same.
- . 11. November 4, 1947, by correspondence: Voted to loan Rev. H. E. Yount \$200.00 from the Ministers' Aid Fund.
- 12. November 14, 1947, a meeting of the Board of Trustees was held at Smithport, Penna.

Voted to grant the Hortons church permission to open the ground back of their church with a view to stripping the coal and moving their church and remodeling it.

Voted to grant the Hortons church permission to remodel their church even if the coal stripping project does not develop favorably.

Voted to grant the Hortons church permission to sell their parsonage and erect a new one near their church.

13. November 24, 1947, by correspondence: Voted to loan the Bethany

church \$1,000.00 from the Church Aid Fund to apply on the purchase of their parsonage in Rimersburg.

14. January 5, 1948, by telephone: Voted to loan the Rev. Ada Dis-

hong \$300.00 from the Ministers' Aid Fund because of illness.

15. February 17, 1948, by correspondence: Voted to loan the Ashville church \$300.00 for the installation of hot water heater.

- 16. March 3, 1948, by correspondence: Voted to loan Rev. James Hersman \$75.00 from the Ministers' Aid Fund to apply on the payment of doctor's bills.
- 17. March 30, 1948, by correspondence: Voted to approve a loan of \$300.00 from the Conference Budget to the Niles church.
- 18. April 9, 1948, a meeting of the Board of Trustees was held at Vanport, Penna.

The Board met with Rev. F. E. Satterfield, Pastor of the Vanport church, and Mr. J. M. Dorminey, and went over plans for the building of a church in Vanport. The Board took the following action:

Voted that we authorize the Trustees of the Vanport church to proceed with the erection of a church building according to plans presented; cost of building to be about \$5,000.00.

Voted that we recommend to the Conference Missions Board that the erection of a church in Vanport be made a Conference project.

19. April 14, 1948, a meeting of the Conference Board of Trustees was held at Franklin, Penna.

The Board in company with Rev. H. R. Waite and Mr. Sidney Beers viewed a lot on Buffalo Street in the city of Franklin, with two houses located thereon, and voted to authorize the Franklin church to purchase said lot and building for the sum of \$6,200.00, provided two-thirds of their church membership concur in the purchase.

Voted to grant the Annadale church permission to sell their parsonage. 20. May 11, 1948, by correspondence: Voted to loan Rev. Harold Garvin \$300.00 from the Ministers' Aid Fund.

Voted to grant the Franklin church permission to secure a loan of \$3,200.00 to apply on the purchase of their new property in Franklin, the Conference to underwrite the same.

May 8, 1948, viewed the buildings used by the Luciusboro church for a church and parsonage and voted to authorize the local board of trustees to purchase the same for a sum not to exceed \$1,630.00.

Voted to loan the Luciusboro church \$1,200.00 from Conference funds to apply on the purchase of their church and parsonage buildings.

May 25, 1948, by correspondence: Granted a loan of \$100.00 from the Ministers' Aid Fund to Rev. J. L. Schell.

Report No. 21

PENSION PLAN COMMITTEE REPORT

Your Committee "to study the new Pension Plan outlined by the General Conference and to bring a report of its findings to this body, reports as follows:

We understand that the Pension Plan is the outgrowth of a longstanding desire of the people of our Denomination for some adequate provision for the care of its superannuated, ordained ministers, and that this plan represents the best efforts of the men to whom the task was assigned. It was adopted by the General Conference which met at Houghton, New York in 1947 and is handed down to the Annual Conferences for their action.

We further understand that the general set-up of the Pension Plan is based upon the research of pension plans which have been in operation in other denominations for many years, and we have found no reason to doubt its financial soundness.

We have been in correspondence with Rev. E. L. Henderson of the North Carolina Conference which Conference adopted a pension plan of its own in lieu of the General Plan; and with Rev. R. C. Mulliax of the South Carolina Conference which Conference is yet pending in the matter; we have iterviewed at length Rev. E. J. Mills and Rev. Edward Smithee of the Indiana Conference which Conference adopted the new Pension Plan; and have interviewed Rev. O. G. Wilson as a Denominational representative; and we have had access to the Pension Plan office at our Church headquarters for information. We are pleased to submit herewith the result of our study and investigation:

The action of the Annual Conferences which have convened since General Conference is as follows: Those which have adopted the Pension Plan are Canada, Champlain, Dakota, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Kentucky, Michigan, Nebraska, North Michigan, Ohio, Oregon, Rochester, South Georgia, Wisconsin, Oklahoma. Those pending are Alabama, South Carolina, South Ohio and Tennessee. Those which did not adopt it are California, North Carolina and North Georgia. To summarize the above, three did not adopt, four are pending, 16 have adopted and two have not convened.

An interesting comparison is found among the four largest Conferences. They are in order of size: Indiana, North Carolina, Allegheny, and South Carolina. Indiana adopted the plan unanimously; North Carolina did not adopt the Plan; Allegheny is about to—everybody wonders; South Carolina is pending.

We have not ascertained the reason for which the North Georgia did not adopt the General Plan. The North Carolina Conference adopted a plan of their own making and of less cost to them than the General Plan. The California Conference did not adopt the Pension Plan for the reason set forth in the report of their Pension Plan Committee, which follows:

"Your Committee, which was appointed to investigate the Superannuate Pension Plan, which was recommended by the last session of the General Conference, wishes to submit the following report:

Whereas, the State of California provides an old age Pension Plan which exceeds the amount of support which would be provided by the Superannuate Pension Plan, and Whereas, the amounts received from the Superannuate Pension Plen would be deducted from the amount which the State would otherwise pay:

Therefore your Committee feels that there would be no benefits derived from the support of the Superannuate Pansion Plan and do hereby recommend that the California Conference do not support this Plan."

Signed: T. Y. Miller, John Henley, D. O. Dorr, George Thomas, Loueas Starr.

Our Denominational leaders feel that the Pension Plan is the answer to a call of many years for some adequate retirement fund for our aged and incapictated servants of the Church and consequently are desirous that it shall have the cooperation and support of all the Conferences. This is expected.

Rev. Mills and Rev. Smithee of the Indiana Conference advised us that the Plan met a hearty response in their Conference and its operation is off to a good start. It was their feeling that we would do well to adopt the Plan.

Rev. R. C. Mullinax of South Carolina states, 'if our preachers are interested enough to pay their fees and join, I think I would favor our adpting it as a conference. If, however, it is going to benefit only a small group of our preachers, I do not think we should join." The action of South Carolina Conference is yet pending.

Rev. E. L. Henderson of the North Carolina states "Personally I am not opposed to the General Conference Plan for I voted for it so those desiring to go into it might have a chance to do so."

In considering a Pension Plan, it must be borne in mind that the benefits to be desired will be such and only such as a Pension Plan will provide. It is to be differentiated from an Aid fund or any other fund which provides aid for purposes other than superannuation. Benefits are thus provided for Elders who by reason of ill health or advanced years are superannuated, and for the widows of Elders who are members of the plan. These benefits are to be dispensed on a basis, which to us, seem to be the only fair basis for paying such benefits, viz, years of service rendered.

Other provision for temporary help for Conference Preachers and those who are not superannuated would have to be supplied in case of need. While, in effect, this increases the cost of the Pension Plan, yet the amount of increase, comparatively speaking, would be small, and could in all probability be supplied from the present source of superannuate funds without necessitating an increase in assessment.

It should be remembered that after the Pension Plan is in operation for one full year, benefits will be paid on the same basis as though one had been paying into the Pension Plan for all the years of his ministry. Thus it is clearly seen that it could quite logically require all the support that is being asked.

A compiling of figures as to an estimated total cost to our Conference

follows: On the basis of last year's membership, at \$1.50 per member, the Conference would pay \$4,424.00. This added to the Annual Thanksgiving offering which is asked for the Pension Plan this quadrennium, totals about \$5,624.00, which would be forthcoming from the Conference. Allowing that each pastor would join, their total assessment would amount to about \$1,500.00, not to include the entrance fee of \$25.00 per pastor, which would cost the ministry some \$2500.00 the first year. The total of these sums reaches quite a high figure of \$9,624.00. Let it be remembered that subsequent annual payments would be less the approximate \$2500.00 cost of enrolling, or an approximate total of \$7,124.00.

During the past 10 years our Conference has paid to its superannuates (which number has been remarkably low for the size of our Conference) the sum of \$4,324.00.

This furnishes an interesting comparison. Having paid an annual average of \$432.40 to our superannuates during the past 10 years (which was far too small) against a cost of \$9,624.00 for us to join the plan the first year.

However, when the total is broken down, and the facts of the case are set forth, the total is an accumulation from approximately 3000 individuals and the Pension Plan will cost the individuals of this Conference no more than it costs the individuals of any other Conference. Hence, the cost to our Conference is commensurate with the cost to the other Conferences. While the record of our past expenditures for superannuates is small, yet we have in the new Pension Plan the same assurance of pensions as any other Conference, if and when our list of Superannuates becomes large.

According to the statistics of our Conference last year, the total receipts for Pastors equalled approximately 41% of the total for all purposes. The Pension Plan, on the basis of the statistics for the same year, calls for approximately $1\frac{1}{2}$ % of the total for all purposes, and this for the preacher tomorrow when he or his widow are unable to provide for themselves.

The Conference Auditing and Finance Committee, who are a part of the Committee submitting this report, have considered the question of how the financing of the Pension Plan may best be accomplished if this Conference chooses to adopt it. It is the opinion of the Auditing and Finance Committee that the \$1.00 per member now feeding the New Aid Fund may be diverted to the Pension Plan without jeopardizing the work which the New Aid Fund is now doing. Further explanation of this will be brought in with the report of the Auditing and Finance Committee if the Pension Plan is adopted. The source of income for our present Superannuate Fund is 10% of our Conference Budget. It is highly probable that this could be used as part payment of the new Pension Plan assessment. Thus it could be estimated that the above mentioned sources

would pay 83% or about \$1.25 of the \$1.50 per member assessment. In this way the adoption of the Pension Plan would represent only a 25 e per member increase in our budget items.

Both the Free Methodist Church and the Methodist Church require 2% from their ministers' income rather than 1% required by our Pension Plan. Their other sources of income exceed the \$1.50 per member which is asked by our Pension Plan. In the case of the Free Methodists, their retired men receive benefits of \$10.00 for each year of service rendered. In our plan it is \$20.00 for each year of service rendered. In their Plan more than 36 years of service is not recognized in paying benefits which limits their benefits to \$360.00 annually. There is no such limitation in our Plan.

For an example of what amount of benefits may be received by a retiring minister in comparison to the cost to the minister, we use the case of our Conference Secretary. One percent of his salary (using 1947 as a basis) would total \$325.00 by the time he reaches age 65. Adding the initial fee of \$25.00 when joining, the total he will have paid into the Plan will be \$350.00. He will then be entitled to benefits on the basis of 37 years of service which would be an annual amount of \$740.00, a quarterly amount of \$185.00, or \$61.66 monthly as long as both he and his wife should live. Thus it is seen that his benefits the first year would more than double all that he has personally paid into the Plan during the 13 years between the time the Plan started and the time he reaches retirement age. This is not taking into account the \$1.50 annual assessment to be paid by the laymembers.

A telegram received by Brother Wilson from Brother Nicholson yesterday, states that the Dakota Conference has just unanimously adopted the Pension Plan.

The adopting of a Conference Pension Plan, on the basis of past statistics, could doubtless be made to operate at a lower over-all cost to the Conference and ministers. However, there would be the disadvantage of being isolated from all other Conferences in this matter. Any minister leaving our Conference would lose his benefits accumulated through the years of his service, and any minister coming to us from another would lose his accumulation of benefits in other Conferences, if he has not been a member of the General Pension Plan for 10 years. If he had been a member of the General Pension Plan in other Conferences for 10 or more years, he could then retain his membership in the General Pension Plan by paying 2% of his income instead of 1%. The disadvantage is obvious.

The General Conference Plan is a Parent organization and the Annual Conferences sustain the relation of brothers and sisters to each other, and under the Parent organization stand ready to help or be helped as the case may require.

Your Committee Chairman wishes to rectify an incorrect statement

made by him in the March or April issue of the Conference Messenger. The Statement was:

"A special Committee has been appointed by the Conference President to study the Pansion Plan and bring in a recommendation relative to it at Conference. If it is not recommended by the Committee, a plan will likely be presented which is considered by the Committee to be of equal or greater merit."

This statement takes the Committee beyond the bounds for which it was appointed, viz., "To study the new Pension Plan as outlined by the General Conference and to bring a report of its findings to the Annual Conference." This Committee does not have authority to submit a Conference Pension Plan should the New Pension Plan not be adopted. Your Chairman apologizes for making this mis-statement.

Instructive information concerning the foreign fields given by Ruth Argo. Prayer is requested concerning the difficulty in obtaining visas for South America. Many phases of the needs of Africa were presented as: bandages, receiving blankets, flower and vegetable seeds.

Additional instruction concerning the work at Preston, Ky. by Mary Gursky. Inquiries from the floor registered the interest of the Conference in this mission project. An itimized report submitted on receipts and expenditures for the past year. Pledges and offering received.

THE W. M. S. PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Dear W. M. S. Presidents and Delegates to the Allegheny Annual Conference:

Greetings in the Precious Name of Jesus, our Savior and coming King! We need not tell you that we are in momentous days, for if you are praying, reading your Bible and keeping up with the events of the day, you realize that what we do for the Master we must do NOW.

Gospel opportunities are opened to us now which may be closed tomorrow. Japan's eagerness for Christianity must be satisfied immediately or the desire will leave. China and India are already in a state of
civil war, confusion and animosity. Our missionaries are already meeting some of those conditions. The establishing of the new State of Israel is a direct promise of prophecy fortelling Jesus' coming. South
America is steeling against the entrance of Protestant Christianity and
Catholism is growing stronger even in our nation. The oppression of the
spiritual Church of Jesus Christ is increasing and who knows how soon
she will have to cry, "How long, Lord, How long!"

Since these conditions face us, let us bestir ourselves to greater devotion and more whole-hearted service for the Master than ever before. As we take inventory of the past year, may we take upon us a new inspiration and determination to stand in the gap and intercede for the lost that we may not fail God to whom we must give an account nor the people for whose salvation we are responsible.

Our activities for the year, June 1947 to 1948, were as follows: We had charge of our usual duties as president in conducting the Annual Conference Session and the Stoneboro Camp Meeting W. M. S. prayer services. June 25-30, we attended the General Conference held at Houghton, New York, where we served on the Committee on Memorials. July 26, we held a missionary service at West Virginia Camp and spoke at two other missionary services during the year.

We instigated the organizing of several new societies, though we were not able to be there at the time of their organization. Sister Comadoll, our assistant organizer, organized three new societies. Following are the new societies organized this year:

- 1. West Hill-organized Sept. 24, 1947, with 15 members.
- 2. Clarksburg-organized Oct. 2, 1947, with 11 members.
- 3. Pritchard and Mt. View-organized Oct. 16, 1947, with 21 members.
- 4. Cottage Hill-organized Feb. 18, 1948, with 8 members.
- 5. Barkley-organized May 25, 1948, with 12 active and 3 honorary members.
 - 6. Hadley-organized May 26, 1948, with 11 members.

Since our last session Brother and Sister Henry Ortlip have gone to

China as missionaries and our other Conference Missionaries are still on their fields of service: Rev. and Mrs. J. L. Landrey and Miss Hazel Jones in India; Rev. and Mrs. William Saunders in Africa. The term of Rev. and Mrs. Saunders will be up this next April. During this time they are still our special support and are entirely dependent upon us for both their salary and home-coming expenses. Besides these, we have supported Sister Grace Wood in Australia and Sister Mary Gursky at Preston, Ky. In addition we raised money for the necessary equipment and a jeep for Brother and Sister Ortlip as well as aided in many other projects; such as, the car and Bible School in Australia.

Rev. J. R. Swauger, Connectional Home Mission Secretary, visited many of our churches in the Conference, in the interest of Australia. Also, Brother and Sister Ortlip visited what churches they had time to reach before leaving in the fall.

Rev. A. Argo, returned missionary from Africa, was engaged as our Camp Meeting speaker. Rev. and Mrs. Argo toured the Akron and New Castle Districts two weeks in March and Rev. Argo traveled the Titusville and Indiana Districts three weeks in May. Good reports have come in concerning the results of their services. Sister Argo is engaged as our Conference missionary speaker for the public service June 4th.

General Conference has made some definite changes with which we must become familiar. First, our name has been changed to "Woman's Missionary Society of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America." Also some changes have been made in our report blanks, the outstanding one being the dropping of credit for boxes, clothing, etc., sent to home missionaries. Third, an intensive mission study course has been introduced to encourage reading and study along missionary lines. Examinations are given and certificates granted to those who meet the requirements. We urge all to do what they can along this line. We need missionary training. Fourth, the idea of giving a memorial gift of money instead of floral tributes in honor of our deceased loved ones has been promoted by our General Conference. We think this is most commendable and pleasing to the Lord and urge all to make such gifts instead of the usual floral tributes given at funerals.

Most of all, the challenge of our day is before us. We know not when our Lord will come and this dispensation will be closed, but the nearness of His coming should stir us to do our best to gather precious sheaves before the Harvest Day is past. May God grant us courage and grace to stand the strain and stress of this hour and may we push ahead 100% for God and souls!

COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

Be It Resolved:

- 1. That since the main theme of our Annual Conference is "Intercessory Prayer" we, the Woman's Missionary Society, shall adopt this theme in this Conference session and in our local societies throughout the coming year.
- 2. That we give ourselves to Bible Study and intercessory prayer, in our private devotions, around our family altars, creating a greater passion for souls, and an enlarged vision for world wide evangelism.
- 3. That we shall by the help of the Holy Spirit endeavor to faithfully attend all missionary activities and devise lawful means to interest our women in missionary work at home and abroad. We shall not be negligent by our indifferent and selfish motives and pleasures, in our sacred task of inspiring and having a missionary spirit.
- 4. a. That we individually give ourselves more earnestly to Prayerful and intellectual study of the Wesleyan Missionary and other helpful material, whereby, we may obtain profitable information from our missionary fields as to their activities and needs. James 1:5.
- b. That in our missionary prayer meetings we stress that necessity of prayer for our missionaries, churches, and officials, rather than social functions.
- 5. That we adhere to scriptural methods of raising funds for missions, and out of sacrificial hearts and lives, give heartily as unto the Lord and His Holy cause, for the Lord loveth a cheerful giver.
- 6. That we faithfully hold to Biblical standards of our discipline in creating a wholesome atmosphere in our homes, endeavoring to counteract the tendency to juvenile delinquency. Proverbs 22:6.
- 7. That we abstain from attending the motion picture theater, reading and allowing our children to read the worldly comic books, buying Sunday newspapers, and Sabbath desecration. Matt. 5:8.
- 8. That we who are mothers tell our own children the true story of life and instruct them in the care of their bodies, in order that they may hold the truths sacred and be prepared to face the immoral standards of this day.
- 9. a. That we uphold by precept and example modesty of dress, as becometh holiness, by which we mean wearing dresses at least half way between the knees and ankles, with long sleeves, and modest necklines, which denotes purity and deep spirituality, 1 Timothy 2:9, 10; also, we adhere to Deut. 22:5, "The woman shall not wear that which pertaineth unto a man . . . for all that do so are abomination unto the Lord thy God."
- b. We refrain from the wearing of jewelry, nude shades of hoisery, ornamental hats, and world hair dress. 1 Peter 3: 3, 4.

c. We also dress our girls and boys modestly which includes wearing long hose.

d. We further urge the avoidance of unnecessary debts, and

neglecting long standing bills.

10. a. That we refrain from patronizing establishments selling intoxicating beverages, and also discourage the use of tobacco in all its forms since we so greatly detest the use and effects of both. 2 Cor. 7:1.

- b. That we be patriotic by displaying the American Flag in observing "Flag Day" June 14, and our other national holidays, thereby, honoring our God who gives us freedom and liberty, and in memory of our veterans who served and gave their lives for their country that, "our government for the people, by the people should not perish from the earth."
- 11. That these resolutions be read in each society frequently enough that all members be informed of the proposed attainments and requirements.

COMMITTEE ON PROGRAM AND PLAN OF WORK

We recommend:

1. That at the first meeting after Conference each local society hold an installation service which includes the outline of the work and consecration to their office, suggested helps: Section 13 and 30 of the Discipline.

2. a. That the program and plan of work be read and discussed as soon as the Minutes are received. This includes the Standard of Efficiency as drawn by General Conference for local societies, to be secured from Miss Katrina Russ, 3901 S. Washington St., Marion, Indiana.

b. We also urge that the President of each society refer to these

as a reminder during the year.

- 3. a. That each society endeavor to hold a public meeting monthly, praying especially for the requests found in the Wesleyan Missionary. We suggest that a spirit of evangelism be carried on in our local communities by the members of societies, each one feeling a personal responsibility to bring at least one soul to Christ during the year.
 - b. That our Holiness Conventions, where possible, observe a

Missionary service.

- 4. a. That we urge our societies to carry out the "Praytr Partner" plan as presented in the Missionary Magazine of August, 1945, by Mrs. Lola Smith.
- b. That each society urge their prayer partners to keep in touch with our Home and Foreign Mission fields, thereby bringing first hand knowledge to our societies.
 - 5. That each society have an aggressive solicitor for the Wesleyan

Missionary. Where it is difficult to get subscriptions we urge the use of the club plan.

- 6. That the President of each society remind those attending Stone-boro Camp Meeting of the daily Missionary Prayer Meeting from 4:15 to 5:00 o'clock, urging them to be faithful in this work of intercession.
- 7. a. That all society officers and Annual Conference delegates be members of the church.
- b. That each society put forth a special effort to send their President and a delegate to the Annual Conference, assuming their expense for transportation.
- c. That delegate's credentials, and statistical report be sent to Mrs. Eunice Comadoll, Sandy Lake, Penna., at least two weeks before Conference.
- d. That each society send fruit and vegetables or its equivalent in cash, to Conference, large societies to send at least two dozen quarts and small societies at least one dozen. Fruit or vegetables to be all of one kind from each society. Same to be credited at purchase price. We recommend giving cash where possible, some to be sent anytime during the year to Superintendent of Dining Hall, or brought to Conference. Amount to be credited under "Other Objects."
- c. That twenty-five cents per member be raised for delegates entertainment and sent to the sub-treasurer before the books close April 30th.
- f. That each society instruct their delegate how much to pledge at the public missionary service. Unless otherwise specified, these pledges are divided one-third for Home and two-thirds for Foreign Missions.
- 8. a. We recommend that each society use the designated Study Book also the Program Calendars and other helps and as far as possible encourage all members to follow the Mission Study course as recommended by General Conference. All material to be secured from Ruth Stonebraker, West Middlesex, Penna.; Conference Secretary of Mission Study Course.
- b. That each society have a Program Committee varying once a quarter. We suggest the President act as Chairman of said Committee.
- 9. a. We recommend that each local society contribute five dollars or more annually for the support of Hephzibah Orphanage, the same to be applied on budget.
- b. That each local society contribute three dollars or more annually to the "Medical Student Fund," not to apply on budget.
- 10. We recommend and urge each local society to respond to the card call plan and thus assist in the extension program of the Church.
- 11. a. That we send program suggestions, Sunday-school literature and flannelgraph lessons to our Mountain Missions, Hephzibah Orphanage, and Indian Missions, also bandages for Home and Foreign when required. (Note: Bandages should be cut two to four inches wide and

tightly rolled. Number of pounds to be reported as items of interest on annual report blank.)

- b. Also boxes of new and used clothing and other provisions are to be valued by local society and be reported as items of interest on annual report blank.
- 12. That we endeavor to raise one-fourth of the Church Educational Budget, including L. S. U. Pledges.
- 13. That the Red Letter Days as given in the Standard of Efficiency be observed where possible. That Easter and Self-Denial offerings be used for Home Missions.
- 14. a. We suggest that where suitable, each society have a Mercy and Help Committee, whose duty shall be to visit the sick and needy and give aid where necessary, and send flowers or greeting cards to shut-ins.
- b. We encourage the giving of special remembrance gifts as recommended by the General Conference for the promotion of definite missionary work as a living tribute to the memory of deceased loved ones instead of the usual extravagant floral tribute.
- 15. We suggest that we put forth a special effort to secure every woman in the Church as a member of the society or bring about a ten per cent gain in total membership.
- 16. a. It is required that one dollar dues be paid by both active and honorary members: that said dues be divided and sent in, and specified as fifty cents dues, the other fifty cents to be placed in the treasury to be paid out with the offerings for budget expenditures.
- b. Let all dues and monies be sent through the local church treasurer to the district Sub-treasurer.
- 17. That since the retiring President is Acting President during the Conference session, we suggest that the Society send her to the Conference, and elect the new president as delegate.
- 18. We further suggest that a missionary be secured to hold special services, as early as possible in the year.
