STANDING RESOLUTIONS

1. A Committee on Auditing and Finance, consisting of two Elders and one Conference Preacher, shall be elected each year, the duties of which shall be, to examine and report on the Treasurer's books and all financial reports, save missionary, and to be a Standing Committee to advise on financial plans.

2. All persons received into membership in the churches of our Conference, excepting those whose life of Christian fidelity has been of sufficient long standing, shall be received at first as associate members only.

3. When it becomes necessary for any church to call a pastor, it shall be the duty of the calling church to make provision for the expense incurred by the pastor in removing to the new field of labor. Money raised for this purpose shall NOT be applied on the pastor's salary.

4. The Conference Sunday shall be the closing Sunday of the Conference year, and the outgoing pastor shall be paid his salary for that Sunday by the charge he is leaving.

5. At the opening of the Conference Session the President shall appoint a Nominating Committee of not less than three members, two Elders and one Layman, to bring to the Conference a slate of Nominations for Committees, etc., for the Conference Temporary Organization. Delegates' Credentials shall be mailed to the Conference Secretary not later than ten days before convening of Conference.

6. No person shall be received as a member of Allegheny Annual Conference until he shall have properly filled out an Application Blank, which application together with the recommendations of his references must pass the approval of the President and his Advisory Board. Exemptions to this rule may be made by the President and his Advisory Board, when they deem it best.

7. The pastor of any church in the Conference shall be free to hold at least one revival meeting a year, wherever he sees fit, and it is recommended that his usual salary be paid him while he is absent.

8. Each pastor shall send a monthly report on the blank provided to the Conference President showing the progress and state of the work under his care.

9. Each church may elect a Nominating Committee whose duty it shall be to nominate candidates for church offices for presentation to the church at the annual election of officers. Such nominations shall not exclude other nominations at the time of the business meeting.

10. Churches having business with the Conference Board of Trustees requiring a visit of that body to their church, shall be responsible for the expense attached to such calls, unless released by the Board.

11. In as much as trial sermons are hardly fair either to church or candidate, and since the practice of having a trial sermon is contrary to the usual manner of locating preachers, we recommend that churches shall not ask any preacher to come for a trial sermon, and that no preacher shall accept any such invitation if given. Exceptions to this rule may be granted by the Conference President upon request of any church.

12. Since considerable expense of transferring of automobile title and license attends the moving of a pastor from one state to another, we recommend that where possible the calling church bear this expense.

13. We recommend that all Districts emphasize Sunday-school activities, and that Conventions be arranged for in conjunction with the visitation of the Conference Sunday-school Secretary, who shall visit one Convention of each District during the year, at Convention expense.

14. We recommend that no one be elected to Elders Orders who does not have an abiding sense of a divine call to give himself wholly to the function and ministry of an Elder in the WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH. And that no one shall be ordained to this office and work who is not applying himself wholly to this one thing in cares and studies, and clearly determining by God's grace to give himself wholly to this holy ministry, if possible, long before the appointed day of ordination, and manifesting such a determination in faithful Christian service to the church or congregation whom he was called to serve during his years of preparation, so that, as much as lieth in himself, he has and will apply himself wholly to the work of the ministry, except in all cases of absolute necessity of such diversions to a legitimate avocation for livelihood which neither jeopardizes the Lord's work nor blames the ministry.

Report No. 1

CONFERENCE PRESIDENT'S REPORT

To the members of the Ninety-ninth Session, Allegheny Annual Conference, Wesleyan Methodist Connection (or Church) of America, Beloved Fellow-Workers:

Greetings in the name above all names, even Jesus Christ our Lord, who loved us and gave Himself for our redemption.

With the passing of the year, have come startling changes and events. War clouds which last year hung only on the distant horizon, have swept in with amazing suddenness and have broken in stunning fury on our own territory. News reports flashed the sad intelligence that our forces had suffered a major defeat, and many of our soldiers and civilians had lost their lives.

Our President and our Congress met the attack of the enemy with a Declaration of War, and the resources of our nation have been devoted to the task of achieving victory.

Almost over night we have been called upon to face tremendous responsibilities and to perform extraordinary tasks. This will require many changes from the normal way of life, and involve much sacrifice.

Already the effect of these sweeping changes have been felt in our churches, creating problems that can only be solved on our knees. The attendance at our services has been cut by the tire and gas situation. Particularly is this true in the rural communities.

Another serious problem is that of working on the Sabbath. Let him beware who dogmatically attempts to settle this question for the other man's conscience. If any man feels, as I feel, that I would violate my conscience by working on the Sabbath, let him carefully keep his conscience clear and trust God to see him through. But let him refrain from judging his brother who may not look at the matter from the same viewpoint. These remarks may seem inappropriate to a report such as I am expected to make, but they reveal a condition which affects us all.

The work of the Conference has moved forward with a beautiful unity during the year. The loyalty of pastors and people has been inspiring. The coöperation in the Pioneer Work has been heartening and eternity alone will reveal the results of the quarters which have rolled into the treasury each month.

It is worthy of special notice when a church pays off its indebtedness. This past year we have had at least two outstanding cases of such victory. The Erie Church paid its debts in full and is now clear; \$14,500.00 were paid in six years, which is a remarkable achievement. The Indiana Church paid off in full the indebtedness which had been incurred when it enlarged

the church a few years ago. These are splendid achievements and deserve our deep appreciation.

Spiritually it has been one of the greatest years of the Conference. There has been a deepening in my own soul for which I have been grateful to the Lord. The revivals in a number of the churches were outstanding and far-reaching. The Week of Prayer and the Day of Prayer which followed were of inestimable value to the Conference and to the churches. God has blessed our Conference with a oneness of purpose and a unity of spirit which makes the position of Conference President one of delightful service. I have been happy in my work as your President, and am grateful for the trust you have reposed in me.

Memorial: During the year, it has pleased the Lord to remove from our midst our beloved Brother, Rev. A. D. Fero, who, after a brief illness, passed to his heavenly home on January 4, 1942. I recommend that our Committee on Nominations be authorized to nominate a Committee on Memoirs to hold a suitable memorial service.

COMMITTEE ON AUDITING AND FINANCE

Your Committee on Auditing and Finance makes recommendations as follows:

1. Approval of Item IV of the Conference President's Report. We recommend that the Conference President receive a salary of \$45.00 per week and traveling expenses incurred in pursuit of the duties of his office to the amount of \$500.00. He to provide adequate liability for his car. Salary to be paid by the Conference Treasurer. We also recommend that when the President is called on special occasions and extra meetings outside his regular Quarterly Meeting Schedule incurring extra expense the offering on these occasions shall apply to these expenses and not be credited to his salary. (No budget receipt will be given for such offerings.)

2. Adoption of the Conference Treasurer's Report, as we find his report correct according to our judgement; and that he be authorized to draw from the treasury the sum of \$30.00 and traveling expense to and from seat of Conference, in appreciation of his labors.

3. That each Sub-Treasurer be paid the sum of \$20.00 in appreciation of their labors, plus a sum equal to all expenses incurred in their duties, such as traveling expenses, banking, postage, stationery, etc.

4. That F. W. Dreyer be paid \$5.00 in appreciation of his labors while acting as Acting Treasurer.

5. That our Sunday schools be urged to continue giving the first Sunday of the month offering to Conference Missions for paying debts and mortgages, Church Extension, and helping pastors whose salary is inadequate, as recommended by the Conference Mission Board.

6. Approval of the report of the Committee on Sale of Conference Minutes and that 700 copies, or more, if demand is sufficient, be printed for this year. Cash balance on hand to be placed in Conference Incidental Fund.

7. Approval of the report of the Committee to receive Conference Entertainment Fund. We recommend the fee be continued at 25 cents per member.

8. Continuation of the New Aid Plan.

9. Recognition and hearty support of the following Connectional interests: Foreign Missions, \$2.00 per member; Home Missions, \$.50 per member. (This sum to be raised by sources exclusive of the Conference Mission offering from the Sunday school;) Education, \$1.50 per member; Hephzibah Orphanage, \$.25 per member.

10. Continuation of sending the Birthday offerings from the Sunday school to the Conference Missions Fund.

11. Payment of \$50.00 Quarterly to Superannuate G. W. Richardson.

12. That the Conference Budget be raised undivided, said budget to be equal to 10 per cent of the sum obtained by adding the following three items: Namely, Pastor's cash salary, Parsonage rent, and Church incidental expenses. Budget apportionment to be remitted to Conference Sub-treasurers monthly. (Budget may be paid from the incidental fund of the church treasury or by special offerings for that purpose.) Distribution of Budget as follows: Conference Expense, 70 per cent; Conference Missions, 20 per cent; Superannuated Ministers' Fund, 2 per cent; Miscellaneous Fund, 8 per cent. Distribution apportionment subject to revision by Auditing and Finance Committee, to maintain an equalized distribution.

13. That each church be asked to contribute \$6.00 per year to provide a portion of the Group Insurance Premium as required by State Law. To be remitted to Sub-treasurers with regular Budget remittance.

14. Payment of \$20.00 per month toward salary of Conference President's Secretary.

15. That the Conference President be authorized to draw from the Conference Incidental Fund without contacting his Advisory Board, such small miscellaneous sums as required for flowers, telegrams, etc.

16. Approval of the report of the Conference Trustees.

17. Approval of the financial item of the Conference Pioneer Secretary's Report.

CONFERENCE PIONEER SECRETARY

To the members of the Ninety-ninth Session of the Allegheny Conference we bring greetings from your pioneer fronts.

Sixty-five million unchurched American people—25,000,000 of them youth between the ages of sixteen and twenty-two moving into the fiercest conflict in human history give an unprecedented aspect to today's world picture. The population of the nation has for the past few years increased at the rate of $2\frac{3}{4}$ per cent annually while the Church's increase has been less than $1\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. Every year we have a larger percentage of unsaved, unchurched, non-Christian than we had the year before. The only bright spot in this grim, dark picture is the Pioneer field which it opens and the fact that the Allegheny Conference and the Wesleyan Methodist Church are alert to the challenge.

The Conference pioneer trails have led your Secretary from metropolitan areas of the great industrial centers, through mining towns, into hamlets and rural communities covering an itinerary of 12,000 miles the past year. A report of this itinerary follows:

Item I. Quarterly Meetings—A schedule of twenty-one quarterly meetings in the eleven pioneer churches was a part of the duties assigned to the Secretary at the last Conference session.

Item II. Conventions, Revivals and Camp Meetings—During the year we have conducted twelve revival meetings, 2 camp meetings and 3 conventions.

1. The first pioneer meeting of the year was at Kramer, a small mining town near DuBois, Penna. Along with this effort we conducted a Daily Vacation Bible School with an average attendance of seventy some pupils. We also conducted a house to house visitation, praying in over 100 homes.

2. From Kramer we went to Luciusboro, Penna., for a revival campaign and Bible School. Here there was an enrollment of 75 in the Bible School.

3. In August we entered Johnstown, Penna. with a tent meeting which continued through the second week in September. Rev. Guy Terpe did most of the preaching. After the campaign closed it was impossible to find a suitable place of worship for the little group who were helped in the effort; consequently, through the winter the work was held by a weekly service which was conducted in the homes of the people.

4. Throughout May we put on a second campaign in the city of Johnstown. Rev. Jesse Whitecotton was with us for ten days. Miss Virginia Bailey had charge of the music. Contacts have been made which we hope will soon result in a strong work in that growing and strategic center. The tabernacle will remain for the summer or until we are able to find a more suitable building.

5. Rev. T. McCracken and Rev. J. I. Rambo conducted a tent meeting at Riverview, Penna., last September. At the close of this meeting a building was rented and a regular Sunday afternoon preaching appointment was established.

6. In January we held another meeting at Riverview and organized a Sunday school. Later Miss Opal Oman was appointed to assist Brother McCracken in the work. The Sunday school averages an attendance of 52. The attendance at the church services run a little higher than this.

7. Rev. Charles Baker conducted a tent meeting at Daybrook, West Virginia, with Rev. A. J. West as evangelist last summer.

8. Brother West assisted G. B. Clay in a pioneer meeting at Pittsburgh, in the opening of the new location on North Side, Pittsburgh.

9. Rev. Clarence Chess conducted a tent meeting at Robertsville, Ohio. Results are yet expected from this effort.

Item III. Daily Vacation Bible School—In addition to the two Bible

Schools already mentioned we conducted a union school in which the four churches of Penn Run, Penna., participated. During this school we were in revival work with the Rich Hill congregation.

Item IV. Locations:

1. Shortly after the last session of Annual Conference, the work at Pittsburgh was removed from the south Main Street location to a more promising and permanent location in the heart of North Side, Pittsburgh. Gratifying results obtain from this move.

2. As a result of a contact made through the Kramer meeting the Union Church at Soldier was placed under the pastorate of Rev. and Mrs. Hoiem of Punxsutawney, Penna. The Soldier congregation desire continuation of service from the Punxsutawney work.

3. A church building at Platea, Penna., is in the process of being deeded to the Allegheny Conference. Brother and Sister Dentler, pastors at Keepville, organized a Sunday school and established a preaching appointment there. Platea opens the door to a hungry, receptive and promising community as a pioneer project.

Item V. Organizations:

1. A class of eighteen members was organized at Wild Cat, following a revival conducted by Rev. J. C. Himes, who was appointed pastor of the work.

2. The first business meeting since 1915 was conducted at the Stewart Run Church last September. Seven were received into membership, officers were elected and the church re-organized. The interior of the building has been redecorated, new carpet has been purchased, and plans for other improvements are being made.

Item VI. Buildings:

1. Mentcle purchased the building in which they worshiped, an annex has been built and electric lights installed. The debt has been almost, if not entirely, paid.

2. Nu Mine has purchased a lot and material and will soon break ground for a new church and parsonage.

3. A portable tabernacle 28x44 has been built for pioneer work, at a cost of \$626.40. It is in service at Johnstown.

Item VII. Prospecting—Prospecting has been done at Brewster, Youngstown and Girard, Ohio; Butler, East Butler, New Bethlehem and Torpedo, Penna. House to house visitation has been done in the mining town of Yellow Dog, also a rural community near Freeport, Penna.

Item VIII. Finances—Received from Treasurer, \$1218.42. Credited as follows: Salary, \$773.42; Expenses, \$200.00; Evangelistic help, \$53.00; Entertainment, \$73.00; Incidentals, \$21.40; Lumber, \$46.30; Piano, \$35.00; Installation of electricity in tabernacle, \$16.50; Total, \$1218.62. Received from Johnstown, \$200.00. Credited as follows: Evangelistic help, \$160.00; Transportation of tabernacle, \$40.00. Total, \$200.00. Received from other sources, \$820.50. Credited as follows: Salary \$760.50; Traveling

expenses, \$30.00; Gifts, \$30.00. Total, \$820.50. Grand Total, \$2238.90. Total Salary, \$1533.92.

Item IX. Recommendations:

1. That each District provide a portable tabernacle for use within its own boundary lines.

2. That coöperative effort be made to establish a new church in each district during the coming Conference year.

Report No. 15**CONFERENCE BOARD OF TRUSTEES**

During the year the Conference Board of Trustees met and conducted business as follows:

1. At the office on the Stoneboro Campgrounds on June 7, 1941. Approved plans presented by Rev. C. L. Chess for a parsonage at Mount Calvary Church.

Authorized the purchase of a lot next to the White Memorial church, Struthers, Ohio, for parsonage purposes.

Authorized the Treasurer to pay a sum, not to exceed \$100.00 for moving expenses for incoming pastor to Brown Hill Church.

Secretary instructed to correspond with Mr. and Mrs. Chester York relative to the status of funds being received from the sale of Bethshan Home.

2. At Hannaville, Penna., June 25, 1941. Local trustees of Canal Church authorized to purchase a lot on Route 322 for the erection of a parsonage.

Instructed Rev. G. B. Clay to investigate the terms by which the Simpson M. E. Church, Pittsburgh, Penna., could be purchased.

Instructed the Treasurer to transfer the loan made to the Meadville Church from the Conference Mission Fund to the Church Aid Fund.

Authorized the Trustees to underwrite a loan up to \$1000.00 for the construction of a parsonage at the Mount Calvary Church.

3. At the office on Stoneboro Campgrounds, August 19, 1941. Authorized the trustees of Massillon Church to improve the Sunday-school rooms and install new pews.

Approved plans to remodel and enlarge the McLeister Memorial church.

4. At Grace Church, Akron, Ohio, September 17, 1941. Instructed the Secretary to write the pastor, Rev. Catharine Carr, that in the judgment of the Board it would not be wise to purchase the proposed parsonage at this time.

Authorized the McLeister Memorial Church to proceed with the construction of a parsonage after plans have met with the approval of the Conference Board of Trustees.

At the petition of the local board of trustees of Grace Wesleyan Church, the Conference Board of Trustees reconsidered the matter of the purchase of parsonage mentioned above, and, by telephone and personal contact, authorized them to proceed with the purchasing of the same.

5. At Brown Hill Church, October 31, 1942, Authorized the local trustees to purchase the Stearns property for a parsonage.

Authorized the Conference Treasurer to pay the \$365.00 owing Brown Hill Church from insurance collected after the original parsonage had burned.

6. By Correspondence, January 30, 1942. Approved the action of the Conference President, who is also President of this Board, in authorizing Greenwood to accept a lot from William Blair and start erection of a church building.

Approved the acceptance by the local trustees of Greenwood Church of the sum of \$1950.00 for the parsonage property. This being the amount allowed by the Government, to clear property for the erection of the Keystone Ordinance Plant.

Approved the installation of a basement and furnace and the erection of a chimney in the North Springfield church.

Authorized the purchase of a lot by the Nu Mine Church.

Authorized the purchase of a parsonage property by the Salem Church.

7. At Grace Wesleyan Church, May 20, 1942, (Akron, Ohio.) Approved the purchase of a property at 659 Sanford Avenue, Akron, Ohio for a parsonage for Grace Church.

At Cleveland, Ohio. Authorized the local trustees to purchase a property at 1461 90th Street for a parsonage for Cleveland Church.

Authorized the signing of an agreement between the Allegheny Annual

Conference and the People's Bank of Clymer, Penna., guaranteeing the liquidation of the loan to the Tarentum Church.

8. By telephone May 27, 1942, approved the Conference Board of Trustees making a loan from the People's bank of Clymer, Penna., to assist Grace Wesleyan Church and Cleveland Church in the purchase of parsonages.

Report No. 17

STATISTICS—SUB-TREASURERS, JOINT COMMITTEE

Recommendation for Statistics:

1. That all Conference Budget, Conference Missions, Pioneer New Aid, Group Insurance, Home Missions, Foreign Missions, Y. M. W. B., Education and Hephzibah Orphanage funds be sent through the local church treasurer to the Sub-Treasurer in one monthly remittance. These funds to be entered upon pastor's statistical report as follows: (1) In Items VIII and X, Conference Budget, Conference Missions, Pioneer, New Aid, Group Insurance, combined in one fund and reported as **Conference Fund**. (2) In Items VIII and X, Home Missions, Foreign Missions (including Y. M. W. B.), Education and Hephzibah Orphanage to be entered in their respective places. (3) In Item XI Conference Fund to be fully itemized as Conference Incidental Fund, Conference Missions, Pioneer, New Aid and Group Insurance. (Totals for aItem VIII and XI must agree. Total of Item X must agree with Sub-Treasurer's book but need not agree with totals of Items VIII and XI.) (4) Cash receipts direct for Conference or Connectional Treasurers for Home Missions, Foreign Missions, Y. M.

W. B., Education and Hephzibah may be reported in Item X provided said receipts are in the hands of the Sub-Treasurers before their books close.

2. That local church books be closed on the third Monday preceding Conference (May 17) and Sub-Treasurer's Books close not more than four days later (May 20.) All money and receipts must be in the hands of Sub-Treasurers by that date for proper credit.

3. That the Secretary supply each Sub-Treasurer with a sufficient number of Statistical Blanks to supply one to each pastor of his district. Sub-Treasurer to fill Item X in accordance with his books at date of closing (May 20) sign same and mail to respective pastors within five days of closing date. Pastor may then make up Statistical blanks in usual manner, working from Item X as signed by Sub-Treasurer. (This does not mean that a pastor must wait until receiving signed Statistical blank to make up his report. Statistics should be well in hand and report ready to be completed upon receipt of signed blank.)

4. That pastor's Statistical Blanks, with any necessary corrections, be in the hands of the Statistical Committee not later than noon of Conference Thursday.

Recommendations for Local Treasurers and Missionary Societies:

1. That local church treasurers specify the **organization sending** and note **proper distribution** of funds with each remittance. This is essential to proper credits.

2. That wherever practical local Missionary Societies make proper division of funds before placing in hands of local treasurer for remittance to Sub-Treasurer. This refers especially to Conference and Camp pledges and W. H. & F. M. Society dues. Conference Pledges are properly divided one-fourth Home Missions and three-fourths Foreign Missions (Unless otherwise specified.) Camp Meeting Pledges are divided three-eighths Home, and five-eighths Foreign (Unless otherwise specified.) W. H. & F. M. S. dues of \$1.00 are divided one-fourth Home and one-fourth Foreign (Unless otherwise specified.) (One-half of dues, or the entire sum when only \$.50 is credited to "Other Benevolences," and cannot be credited to Home or Foreign Missions.) Y. M. W. B. Conference and Camp Pledges and Dues are all credited to **Foreign Missions.** Y. M. W. B. allows one (month's) offering for Education and one (month's) offering for Home Missions. All other funds are Foreign Missions.

3. That Conference Y. M. W. B. pledges be sent **through the Sub-Treasurers** to Mrs. Robinson. Conference W. H. & F. M. Society pledges be sent **through the Sub-Treasurers** to Mrs. Rachel L. Dreyer.

4. That local Societies be informed that **personal gifts to individuals** are not counted on Budget, but may be credited to "Other Benevolences."

Recommendations for Sub-Treasurers:

1. All funds for Education, Missions, and Orphanage from the Church

be sent from the Sub-Treasurers direct to the Conference Treasurer who will disburse to proper sources.

2. That Conference appoint Mr. Russell S. Baldwin to act as Chairman of Sub-Treasurers, and that all information concerning their duties be sent directly to him. He, in turn, to notify each Sub-Treasurer by mail.

3. That inquiry be made by Conference Trustees regarding the expense of bonding Conference Treasurer and Sub-Treasurers. And, if practical, that these officers be bonded. We feel this will be a protection to both Conference and Treasurers.

COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

Be it Resolved:

1. That we, the members of the Woman's Home and Foreign Missionary Society, shall not be diverted from our sacred task of arousing and directing missionary spirit by habitual attendance to missionary activities, and with clean hands and pure hearts devise lawful means to interest them in Missionary work at home and abroad.

2. That with minds informed with the progress and needs of each branch of our missionary work, and with hearts of one with passion for the lost of earth, we cease not to pray daily for the missionary enterprise in the Home and Foreign fields.

3. That we shall strictly adhere to scriptural methods of raising funds for missions, but out of sacrificial hearts and lives, give heartily as unto the Lord and His holy cause.

4. That we, our people, young and old, uphold by precept and

example, modesty of dress, by which we mean wearing long hose on children, avoiding short sleeves, low-necked dresses, short skirts, and nude shades of hosiery which draw attention to our bodies and so tend to destroy purity and deep spirituality; also, that we adhere to Deut. 22: 5 and 1 Timothy 2: 9, 10.

5. That we persistently adhere to Christian standards that create an atmosphere in the home and in the church so conducive to spirituality in these perilous times of departing from the faith of our fathers that the world may know we belong to the King of kings and look for His return for His holy bride.

6. That, as far as possible, we refuse to patronize grocery stores, restaurants or other places selling liquor, since we most deeply abhor drinking and smoking.

7. That we continue to maintain our stand against divorce laws, public amusement parks, public bathing beaches, and moving picture shows.

8. That we, as mothers who are sacrificing our sons for our country, do not neglect to pray for and correspond with them.

9. That these resolutions be read in each local society frequently enough that all members be well informed of their proposed attainments and requisites.

COMMITTEE ON PROGRAM AND PLAN OF WORK

We recommend:

1. That at the first meeting after Conference each society, having new officers, hold an installation service.

2. That the Program and Plan of Work be read and discussed as soon as the Minutes are received. We also urge that the President of each society refer to this as a reminder during the year.

3. That each society endeavor to hold a public meeting monthly, using Sister Reisdorph's prayer page, praying especially for the requests found in the Wesleyan Missionary. Also, we suggest, that a spirit of evangelism be carried on in our local communities, by the members of our societies, each one feeling a personal responsibility to bring at least one soul to Christ during the year.

4. That each society elect one or more Corresponding Secretaries to keep in touch with our different mission fields, thereby bringing first hand knowledge to our women.

5. That we have an aggressive Solicitor for the Wesleyan Missionary in each society. Where it is difficult to get subscriptions, we urge the use of the club plan.

6. That the President of each society remind those attending Stone-

boro Camp Meeting of the daily Missionary Prayer Meeting from 4:15 to 5:00 p. m. urging them to be faithful in this work of intercession.

7. (a) That each society put forth a special effort to send their President and Delegate to the Annual Conference, assuming their expenses for transportation.

(b) That Delegate's Credentials be sent to Mrs. Verna Vogan, Sandy Lake, Penna., at least two weeks before Conference.

(c) That fifteen cents per member be raised for Delegate's Entertainment and sent to Conference with the Delegate.

(d) That each society send at least one dozen quarts of fruit or vegetables to Conference, fruit to be credited at twenty cents per quart and vegetables at fifteen cents per quart.

(e) That each society instruct their Delegate how much to pledge at the Public Meeting. Unless specified, this pledge is divided one-fourth for Home and three-fourths for Foreign Missions.

(f) That each society send fifteen cents per member to the Annual Conference for entertainment fee for General Conference Delegates.

8. That we urge the use of the study book and the excellent programs in the Wesleyan Missionary.

9. That we endeavor during the year to raise one-fourth of the Church Educational Budget.

10. That each local society raise the General Conference Budget of not less than six dollars for Mountain Missions and five dollars for Hephzibah Orphanage. Let all dues and budget obligations be sent through the local church treasurer to the respective District Sub-Treasurers.

11. That we send clothing and supplies to our mountain missions, Hephzibah Orphanage, and Indian Mission, including a few bandages. (Note: Bandages should be cut two inches to four inches wide and tightly rolled. These may be valued at fifty cents per pound, the amount credited on the Statistical Report, but not apply on Budget.)

12. That we stress the need of Home Missions, raising as much for this as possible. Two hundred dollars of the total Conference receipts to be used at Zion's Hill Mission.

13. That we continue the support of Dr. Sim I. McMillen.

14. That the Red Letter Days as given in the Standard of Efficiency be observed. That Easter and Self-Denial offerings be used for Home Missions.

15. (a) We suggest that where suitable each society have a Mercy and Help Committee.

(b) That our Holiness District Conventions, where possible, observe a Missionary Service.

(c) That each society have a live program committee, varying once a month, thereby each member be made to feel a greater interest in Missionary Work. We suggest the President act as Chairman of said committee.

(d) We urge that dollar dues be paid by all our members.

16. That since the retiring President is Acting President during the Conference session, we suggest that the society send her to conference and elect the new President as Delegate, where possible.

17. We further suggest that, if possible, a missionary travel the Conference this coming year.
