## STANDING RULES

1. The Conference Treasurer is authorized to close his books two weeks before Conference convenes.
2. The Conference President and the Board of Trustees shall constitute a committee for the building and location of churches and parsonages and the examining of deeds and the transferring of property.
3. The Office expense of the President, Secretary and Treasurer shall be paid by the Conference.
3. All legal documents shall be held in the custody of the Conference President and the same be locked in a fire-proof safe.
4. The Conference President and his Advisory Board shall have power to arrange the religious services at Annual Conference.
6. The Camp Meeting Committee shall consist of twelve members with equal representation from each district and the Conference President as chairman. The Conference WY President shall be an ex-officio member.
7. All conference Treasurers shall have their books audited by a competent bookkeeper or auditor.
8. The church treasurer is authorized to close his books one month before Conference.
9. All pastors are to be given a two weeks paid vacation with one Sunday absent from the pulpit. Time spent at Annual Conference and Camp Meeting shall not be counted as vacation but is required as pastoral obligation.
10. It shall be the duty of all pastors to look after the insurance of their church and parsonage. All insurance shall provide for fire, lightning and tornado. If the church fails to do so upon reasonable efforts of the pastor, the Conference President shall be notified and he shall take care of such business. A failure on the part of the pastor shall make him responsible to the Conference Board of Trustees and the Conference President.
11. Each pastor is requested to keep a file of his calling list and all those connected with the church and Sunday School, with names, addresses and phone numbers; and that the same be kept for his own work and turned over to his successor.
12. Each pastor shall seek to organize a new class or give his services in a revival meeting to a new or weaker church to help establish it. The church which he serves as pastor should grant him such privilege without censure and with full remuneration of salary while in such meeting. The President shall serve as co-ordinator and help arrange such meetings.
13. The Conference President shall appoint at a proper time two more members to serve on the statistical committee.
14. Resolved that we adhere to Paragraph 132 (2) in The Wesleyan Methodist Church Discipline, and that the President and his Advisory Board give due consideration to the men of this Conference.
15. Resolved that any pastor receiving aid from the Conference Board on Church Extension and Evangelism shall not be a member of said board.
16. Resolved that Annual Conference shall convene on Monday following the last Sunday of Union Point Camp Meeting.
17. Resolved that the Conference President attend at conference expense only those conventions and meetings which are necessary and required by the Annual or General Conference.

18. Resolved that the Conference President be allowed to conduct revivals outside the Conference, not to exceed the period of time required for two two-week meetings.

19. Resolved that the Finance and Budget Committee become a standing committee of the Conference and that the Conference Treasurer be an ex-officio member and that the Conference President be an ex-officio member.

20. Resolved that if a pastor desires to resign his work during the interim of the Annual Conference, he shall give the President and his Advisory Board notice at least two weeks before the effective date of resignation. However, if the President and his Advisory Board deem the cause for his desire to resign sufficient, they may accept his resignation immediately.

21. Resolved that all charges and stations to which a pastor shall move pay the moving and transportation expenses of said pastor, the same to be done in addition to his salary. When the Conference demands the services of anyone, then it shall bear the moving expenses if any expenses shall be thus incurred.

## RECOMMENDATION

1. We recommend that all pastors seek earnestly to raise a full budget and that due consideration be given to the Pension Plan budget.

The Georgia Annual Conference, Inc., of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America convened for its second annual session on Union Point Camp Grounds at Union Point, Georgia, on July 31, 1961 at 3:00 o'clock p. m.

OPENING- The President, the Rev. W. M. Phillippe, Jr., called the Conference to order after a brief devotional talk.

ROLL CALL- The roll call of elders and conference preachers was made. Twenty elders and nine preachers were marked present.

CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE- The motion by W. T. Brinson carried that there be an election of a three member credentials committee. They were elected with C. L. Cawthon, Chairman; James Meaders, and C. V. Hicks.

RECESS- The Chair declared a recess in order the delegates credentials might be approved.

CALLED TO ORDER- The Conference was called to order by the Chairman.

CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE REPORT- The report of the credentials committee was heard and adopted. See page 6, for report #1.

CONFERENCE BAR- The motion by C. L. Cawthon carried that the conference bar include the first five rows of pews and the rostrum.

CONNECTIONAL REPRESENTATIVE- Dr. B. H. Phaup from Wesleyan World Headquarters was introduced and a standing vote expressed the desire of the Conference to seat him as Chairman.

CONFERENCE AGENDA- Report #2 for the conference agenda was read and adopted.

NOMINATING COMMITTEE REPORT- Report #3 on nominations was read and adopted.

STATISTICAL COMMITTEE- The President nominated Herman Golden, Sr., and C. Y. Hodges to serve on the statistical committee. They were elected.

COMMITTEE ON ITINERACY AND ELDERS' ORDERS- The President appointed Ray Phillips, Eunice Smith, and Madge McKinley as lay members on the Committee on Itineracy and Elders' Orders. This action was ratified by the Conference.

RECESS- The motion carried that the Conference be recessed for the day.

#### TUESDAY MORNING MEETING MEETING 9:15

OPENING- Chairman B. H. Phaup called the Conference to order.

ROLL CALL- The roll was called and the following delegates were seated within the bar: Enoch Smith, Leon Daniels, Dewey Wright, Allie Deem.

**MINUTES-** The minutes of the proceeding day were read and approved.

**CONFERENCE PRESIDENT'S REPORT-** The report of the Conference President was read. See report #4. The motion by C. V. Hicks carried that the report be adopted and that the item regarding the Liberty deed on November 22 be referred to the Conference Trustees, and that the item regarding the deficiency on the President's income be referred to the Finance Committee.

The motion by C. V. Hicks carried with the amendment by R. Hicks that only the financial (and official acts) portions of the President's report be placed within the Minutes.

**COURTESY COMMITTEE-** The Committee on Courtesy presented L. W. Barbee, W. C. Young and Carl Johnston, elders from the South Carolina Conference. The motion by C. L. Cawthon carried that these men be given a seat with honorary privileges within the bar.

The Courtesy Committee also presented R. C. Mullinax and Richard Lively.

The motion by R. R. Hicks carried that these and all others so introduced be given an honorary place within the bar of the Conference.

**AUDITING COMMITTEE REPORT-** A partial report of the Auditing Committee was heard and adopted. See report #5.

**PASTORAL RELATIONS REPORT-** The first reading of the Pastoral Relations Committee report was heard. See report #6.

**INCREASE OF STATISTICAL COMMITTEE MEMBERS-** The motion by C. L. Cawthon carried that the President appoint one more member from each of the four districts to work on the Statistical Committee. Those so appointed were: Robert Wagnon, W. H. Hampton, C. M. Payne, and Mrs. Roy Anderson.

**ASHEURN CAMP REPORT-** The report of the Ashburn Camp Meeting was read and adopted. See report #7.

**SUNDAY SCHOOL SECRETARY'S REPORT-** The report of the Sunday School Secretary was heard. The motion carried for the adoption of the general report. The motion carried for the adoption of the financial portion. See report #8.

**CYC CAMP REPORT-** The report of the Christian Youth Crusaders' Camp was read and adopted. See report #9.

**RECESS-** By motion the conference was recessed until time for the orders of the day when Dr. R. C. Mullinax would give an educational address in the interest of Central College.

## TUESDAY AFTERNOON MEETING 1:30

**CALL TO ORDER-** The Conference was called to order by President Phillippe. Dr. R. H. Phaup presided.

**TIME SET FOR MEMORIAL SERVICE-** The motion carried that the Memorial Service be held at 4:45 p. m. on Wednesday.

**ELECTION OF OFFICERS-** The motion of S. A. Hamby carried that the first ballot for President be a nominating ballot.

The following tellers were appointed: C. V. Hicks, W. H. Hampton, Grady King, Dewey Wright, Carlton Preston and James Waddell.

There was an appeal to the opinion of the Chair that H. J. Lewis being a Conference Preacher and having served as co-pastor, be denied voting power. The motion by C. V. Hicks carried that the opinion of the chair be refused and that the Conference recognize H. J. Lewis as having voting privileges with the assumption that they had not been serving as co-pastors.

On the first ballot R. R. Hicks was elected Conference President with 40 out of 69 votes.

The motion by C. V. Hicks carried that the first ballot for Vice President be a nominating ballot.

On the first electoral ballot, M. L. Arnold was elected Vice President with 41 out of 68 votes.

On the first ballot, P. L. Swauger was elected Secretary with 47 out of 65 votes.

**AUDITING COMMITTEE PARTIAL REPORT-** The Auditing Committee reported the Conference Treasurer's Books to be in good order. See report #5.

**CONFERENCE TREASURER'S REPORT-** The report of the Conference Treasurer was heard and adopted. See report #10.

**PENSION PLAN REPORT-** The report of the Pension Plan was heard and adopted. See report #11.

**PENSION PLAN OFFERING-** An offering of \$211.60 was taken with more pledged from various churches in order to make up the deficit in the Pension Plan budget.

**ELECTIONS-** On the first ballot, Jarmen G. Day was elected Treasurer with 55 out of 64 ballot.

On the second ballot Nathan Poppell was elected Trustee with 36 out of 59 votes cast.

On the first ballot, T. W. Mobley was elected Trustee with 54 out of 57 votes. Term of these two lay trustees to expire in 1964.

**VACANCY FILLED-** The motion by Ralph Day carried that C. L. Cawthon fill the vacancy in the Pastoral Relations Committee caused by

the election of R. R. Hicks to Presidency.

ADJOURNMENT- By motion the Conference was adjourned for the day.

#### WEDNESDAY MORNING MEETING 8:30

CALL TO ORDER- The Conference was called to order by Chairman B. H. Phaup.

PRESENTATION OF NEW PRESIDENT- Raymond R. Hicks, the newly elected President was officially presented to the Conference.

APPRECIATION- A standing vote of thanks was unanimous to W. M. Phillippe, Jr. for his faithful leadership as President in years past.

COURTESY COMMITTEE- The Committee on Courtesy presented Richard Friot, elder from the Florida Conference.

ADVISORY BOARD- The President nominated the following as members of his Advisory Board: M. L. Arnold, P. L. Swanger, Okay Highsmith, and Gene Smith. The motion carried that they be elected as nominated.

DISTRICT CHAIRMEN- The President nominated the following to serve as District Chairmen: Ashburn District, G. E. Akridge; Atlanta District, Ralph Day; Augusta District, J. C. Duke; Hortense District, W. M. Phillippe, Sr. They were elected.

GROUP INSURANCE- The motion by W. H. Hampton carried that the Conference re-convene at 1:00 to hear a presentation on group insurance.

The motion by W. M. Phillippe, Jr. carried that the two insurance representatives be given thirty minutes each to present their program and that the decisions involved be left up to the President and his Advisory Board.

HEPHZIBAH- The motion by W. H. Hampton carried that Brother Jesse Towner be given fifteen minutes at a convenient time to speak on the work at Hephzibah Home.

DIRECTOR OF CHRISTIAN YOUTH CRUSADING- The Sunday School Board nominated Miss Annette Walker to serve as the new Director of Christian Youth Crusading. She was elected.

SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD MEMBER- Gracy King was re-elected to serve as a member on the Sunday School Board with a term to expire in 1963.

COMMITTEE ON ITINERACY AND ELDERS' ORDERS REPORT- A partial report was given by the Committee on Itineracy and Elders' Orders. The motion carried that Grafton Pressley and R. N. Cooley receive Elders' Orders as recommended. See report #12.

**SECRETARY OF WESLEYAN MEN-** M. A. Lively was elected to serve as the Secretary of Wesleyan Men.

**TITHING SECRETARY-** W. H. Hampton was elected to be the Tithing Sec.

**EDUCATIONAL SECRETARY-** James Meaders was elected as Educational Secretary.

**VACANCY COMMITTEE-** The following persons were elected to serve on the Committee on Vacancies: Grafton Pressley, Chairman; S. A. Hamby, W. M. Phillippe, Jr., Dewey Wright, J. G. Day.

**JUDICIARY COMMITTEE-** The following elders were elected to be members of the Judiciary Committee: M. L. Arnold, Chairman; C. M. Payne, Ralph Day, W. T. Brinson.

**COMMITTEE ON ITINERACY AND ELDERS' ORDERS-** The term of J. C. Duke having expired, caused a vacancy to which he was re-elected until 1965.

**STATISTICAL CHAIRMAN-** Grafton Pressley was elected to serve as the Chairman of the Statistical Committee for the coming year.

**PASTOR'S REPORTS-** The motion by Ralph Day carried that pastors' statistical reports not be heard this session.

**PASTOR'S REPORT-** The report of W. M. Phillippe, Sr. was heard.

**DELEGATES' REPORTS-** The motion by C. L. Cawthon carried that the delegates not be asked to give a personal testimony.

**PASTOR'S REPORT-** The report of Ralph Day was heard.

**THANKS-** A unanimous vote of thanks carried to Dr. Phaup for his able chairmanship and leadership during the session.





## REPORT #17. MORAL REFORM COMMITTEE

Believing that the followers of Christ are responsible for exercising influence upon our nation and the world, the following resolutions are presented:

**THE HOME:** As the family is the foundation of our society, we urge family devotions, families activities and discussions. Our families should seek to hold a consistent standard of righteous living by guarding against unprofitable and evil radio and television programs, unwholesome music and literature which does not serve a worthy purpose.

Rather than criticising our youth, let us purpose to lead them into the things of God by understanding their problems and diligently showing them the way.

An urgent need exists for instruction concerning the evils of tobacco, alcohol, and the attendance at places of questionable reputation.

**THE CHURCH:** We urge that each church support the Annual Conference and General Conference programs. We feel definitely the need for a pouring out of God's spirit upon His people during this dark hour in the history of the world. We should proclaim Jesus Christ as "The hope for all mankind".

We recommend that each church endeavor to arrange youth programs of recreation based upon Christian principles.

**THE SCHOOL:** The public school which our children and youth attend often offer activities detrimental to Christian conduct. We recommend that our youth refuse to participate in such activities, and that requests and explanations be made to the proper authorities. We reaffirm our faith in the creation of man by the immediate creative act of God according to the Genesis account and not by the process of evolutionary transition.

**SOCIAL INTEGRATION:** We urge continued opposition to the movement of social integration, inter-marriage, and other such institutions. We further oppose violence and disorder as created by the so-called "freedom rides" and "sit-in" movements. We believe that such movements are organized by Communist pressure groups and are a result of Communist teaching and infiltration.

**POLITICAL AND RELIGIOUS FREEDOM:** The government that leads our nation needs and should have our prayers. We urge continued support for the constitutional and historical position of the principle of separation of church and state. We further urge our people to begin now to build an effective opposition to the re-election of a Roman Catholic to the Presidency of the United States. We urge that all pastors stress to the people the importance of voting in elections at all levels of government.

Be it further resolved that the conference oppose communism, whenever possible, on all fronts and continue to oppose the admittance of Red China to the United Nations and U. S. recognition of said country. We further urge our people to write their Congressmen, Senators, and Governments officials concerning this matter.

## REPORT #19. FINANCE COMMITTEE

The Finance Committee, conferring with the Conference Treasurer, having given serious study to the financial responsibilities of the Georgia Conference submit the following informative report and recommendations:

Anticipated Expenditures ..... \$ 7,975.00

Anticipated Budget income at \$11.00 per member ..... 7,975.00

This budget includes Conference Parsonage payment and repairs; Sunday School work, and Conference Minutes. This is only an arrangement of items which were not included as budget items in the past.

This budget does not take care of present deficit of \$736.32, (\$686.32 President's salary and car expense; \$25.00 Secretary's salary; and \$25.00 Treasurer's salary), but does insure against future deficit if each church pays its budget.

## BUDGET BREAK-DOWN:

President's salary: \$5.50; Work Fund: \$3.40; Camp: \$1.00; S. S. Work-fund: \$ .10; President's parsonage: \$1.00. Total Conference Budget: \$11.00

## GENERAL CONFERENCE BUDGET:

World Missions: \$2.00; Church Extension: \$1.50; Education: \$3.00; Pension: \$2.00; Sunday School: \$ .20; Orphanage: \$ .35; Australia: \$.25; Brainard: \$ .25; Administrative: \$ 1.00; Gen. Conf. Entertainment: \$ .50; Board Meeting .25. TOTAL: \$11.30.

We recommend that this budget be adopted for the year 1961-1962.

We go on record as recognizing the President's desire that the tithe of his salary as President should be paid into the Conference work fund.

By agreement with the Conference President we recommend that when the President is used for revival meetings within the Conference one half of his offering in the meeting will be sent to the Conference treasury and placed in the work fund for conference expenses, after personal expenses are deducted.

We recommend that if the Conference President be called in a special business meeting, the church calling be requested to re-imburse him, but not less than \$10.00. The Conference Treasurer will bill the church.

We recommend that all churches remit the Conference President's salary as soon as possible in the new conference year.

We recommend that the Conference President be paid \$71.05 per week as full time President, and that he receive a car allowance of 4¢ per mile, and that the Church Extension Department be requested to appropriate \$50.00 per month for Conference Parsonage utilities, and that the telephone expense be paid out of the Conference Work fund.

We recommend that if the salary of \$686.70 and an outstanding bill for pump repair of \$70.00 due the past President W. M. Phillippe, Jr., does not come in within sixty day, that the Finance Committee be authorized to assess the Conference membership accordingly to the amount needed.

## REPORT #23. BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION AND EVANGELISM

We recommend that the Department of Church Extension in Marion, Indiana be petitioned for the following aid: Monthly; \$42.00 for Savannah, \$50.00 for Dairen, \$35.00 for Toccoa, and \$50.00 for Macon; and that moving expenses be provided for Raymond R. 2. The closing dates of the quarters shall be September 30, December 30, March 30, and June 30. All monies and receipts shall be remitted not later than five days after the ending of each quarter.
3. The local treasurer's books shall close June 30, and the annual statistical reports shall be postmarked by July 7.
4. The Conference Treasurer's book shall close July 15, and she shall mail said reports to the Chairman of the Statistical Committee by July 22.
5. Membership dues shall be one dollar and seventy-five cents (General, \$1.00; Conference Work Fund, 75¢).
6. Benevolent Credits: Credit shall be given to all societies for receipts properly signed by the pastor, local President and local Treasurer. Said receipts are to be remitted to the Conference Treasurer quarterly.
7. The election of conference officers shall be at the Tuesday afternoon meeting of the Conference session.
8. Delegate's credentials for the Conference shall be mailed to the Secretary not later than July 15.
9. The Y. M. W. B. is recognized as a part of the missionary work. The superintendents of the local bands shall be seated within the Conference bar without voting privileges. Local Y. M. W. B. Superintendent's reports shall be mailed to the Conference Superintendent not later than July 15.
10. The Conference Treasurer shall have her book audited by a competent auditor and submit a statement from the auditor to the Conference.
11. All conference officers, local presidents and duly elected delegates shall compose the voting body of the Conference.
12. There shall be four district chairmen to promote projects, conventions and other missionary interest.
13. The reading of the statistical report by the delegate shall be preceded by appersonal testimony. Items to be read are: name of society, name of president, number of members, total receipts, all disbursements and any other item of interest.

## W. M. S. STANDING RULES

14. Friday before Conference shall be observed as a day of fasting and prayer.

15. Each society shall send to the Conference Treasurer at least \$5.00 annually for General Church Extension and Evangelism.

16. Time shall be given the Conference Y. M. W. B. Superintendent to conduct a workshop during the Annual Conference Session.

17. The Annual Conference will pay the expense of all Conference officers except when their fee is paid by the local society as president or delegate.

18. The W. M. S. Conference Minutes shall be included in the publication of the Annual Georgia Conference Minutes.
