CONFERENCE MINUTES.

Tuesday Morning, September 1, 1914.

Conference opened at 10 a. m., by singing, "Close to Thee," Vice-president C. P. Carkuff in chair, who read Ephesians, 4th chapter. A. B. Gould voiced prayer. "The Blood Will Never Lose Its Power" was sung. Twelve ministers and licentiates answered roll call. A. W. Curry was introduced.

The first four seats of the tabernacle were named as conference bar.

A. W. Curry was elected chairman of the Credential Committee. J. F. Hiner was elected the other member.

A. B. Gould, C. S. Weigel, J. F. Hiner were elected on the Nominating Committee.

A partial report of Credential Committee was read and adopted. Mrs. Charles Johnson, West Union; Mary Shannon, Albaton; Mrs. Cora Howlett, Marengo; Mrs. John D. Williams, Jr., Marengo; John D. Williams, Jr., Marengo; Laura Everett, South Troy; William Gipe, Immanuel; Charles Sauer, Hoover; Vallie Hoy, Bethel; and H. F. Boll, Dundee, were seated as delegates.

Motion prevailed that Wm. Gipe and H. F. Boll act in the nominating Committee.

Motion prevailed that Byron Hoover and Geo. Smith be post-masters.

Motion that A. W. Curry and Laura Everett be Committee on Examination of character. W. R. Emerson is chairman ex-officio.

The names of D. W. Scott, George Smith, and A. M. Stephens were ordered placed on conference roll.

Mrs. Breneman moved that rule for adjournment be suspended for this morning and that we now adjourn.

C. P. Carkuff offered prayer. Adjourned.

Tuesday Afternoon, 1:30.

Conference opened by singing "I'm Happy With Jesus Alone."

J. F. Hiner read the 4th chapter of 2 Corinthians and offered prayer. Roll call was responded to by 6 elders, 10 licentiates, and 9 delegates.

Minutes of morning session were read and corrected.

The President read some of the Standing Rules.

The Credential Committee presented the name of John Yancey, of Charles City as delegate.

The Nominating Committee offered a partial report which was adopted.

By vote of conference the hour of 2:30 p. m., on Thursday was given to the conference Sunday School secretary.

A letter of standing of A. W. Curry of the Dakota Conference was read and referred to the Committee on Itineracy and Orders.

Communications were read from Geo. Cameron, of Daysland, Alberta, Canada, and Ira E. Bradley, of Des Moines, Iowa.

A letter of transfer of Geo. and Ina Doty from the Kansas Conerence to the Iowa Conference, was read. These letters were referred to the proper Committee.

The motion to make Friday afternoon at 2:30 the time for election of officers prevailed.

All matters which bear upon the building fund were ordered given to a committee which shall be elected for this purpose. C. P. Carkuff, C. S. Weigel, John D. Williams, Jr., A. B. Gould, and Charles Sauer were duly elected.

The request for funds from the Albaton charge was referred to this committee. Similar requests from Bethel and West Union were also referred to the Committee.

Dr. Ruby Paine's letter to the Iowa Conference was read, followed by May Lord and W. R. Emerson leading in prayer.

Conference instructed the secretary to send greetings of the conference to Dr. Ruby Paine.

The President appointed John D. Williams, Jr., and Laura Everett the two lay members on Itinerancy and Orders' Committee. Conference adjourned.

A. B. Gould pronounced benediction.

Wednesday Morning, September 2.

"He Hideth My Soul" and "I Love to Walk With Jesus" were sung in opening. W. L. McDowell read a few verses from Mark, 2nd chapter, commenting thereon, and led in prayer.

Seven elders, 5 licentiates, and 10 delegates answered roll call. The minutes were read and corrected.

Rev. Dan Smith of the Kansas Conference was introduced.

Prof. S. W. Bond, President of Miltonvale College, was introduced and spoke a few words in behalf of his school.

L. A. Johnson, of Dakota Conference was introduced.

Credential Committee presented the certificates from John Horn, St. Charles and Howardville; Mrs. R. V. Wiltse, St. Charles and Howardville; Agnes Dodd, Charles City; Jennie Emerson, Charles City; and Miriam Day, St. Charles and Howardville, which were accepted.

Motion prevailed that A. B. Gould be a committee to write J. W. Leedy with reference to his report to the conference as a licentiate and bear greetings from this conference.

Motion prevailed that there be created a committee to be known as the Committee on Orders of the Day of which the Conference President shall be chairman. A. B. Gould and F. A. Butterfield were elected the other members.

Motion that an order be drawn on the treasury for bill of the secretary amounting to \$1.22, prevailed.

C. P. Carkuff was called to the chair while the President made his report of the Holiness Convention in Chicago to which he was sent as delegate from this conference.

The report, after quite a lengthy discussion on the topic, was adopted.

Letters were read from L. W. Easton of Riverside, California, and Delia Howlett of Kunso, West Africa.

Conference ordered that the secretary send greetings from this conference to all who write to the conference.

Motion prevailed to have the letter from Delia Howlett published in the Wesleyan.

Adjourned by limitation.

Professor S. W. Bond pronounced the benediction.

Wednesday Afternoon.

"Leaving All to Follow Jesus" was sung. Brother Dan Smith, of Kansas Conference, read the 32nd Psalm and led in prayer.

Six elders, 11 licentiates, and 14 delegates answered roll call.

The minutes were read and added unto.

The Committee on Orders of the Day submitted a report.

Motion prevailed to rescind the previous action of conference in regard to the Sunday School hour.

The report of the Committee on Orders of the Day was adopted.

The report in full of the Committee on Nominations was read and adopted.

Motion prevailed that the Memorial Committee be made a Committee on Memorials to the General Conference next June and that a member be added to this committee. C. P. Carkuff was added to this committee by vote.

The Conference Sunday School Secretary made her report which was adopted.

R. W. Mack, of Miltonvale, Kansas, brought a report from Rev. J. T. Platt.

F. A. Butterfield moved that the Missionary Board be instructed to look after all the charges and churches of the conference each year to which no pastor has been assigned with a view to renewing the work at these points if possible and report concerning each to the annual conference with recommendations relative to the disposition of same. Motion carried.

Motion was carried that C. P. Carkuff preach on Wednesday p. m. at 2:30.

Adjourned.

George Doty pronounced the benediction.

Thursday Morning, September 3.

"Leaving All to Follow Jesus" was sung. Psalms 94 and 116 were read. R. W. Mack paid his "vows" unto the Lord. Frank Ballou and F. A. Butterfield led in prayer.

Seven elders, 7 licentiates, and 13 delegates answered present. Minutes were read and approved.

A. B. Gould was elected conference reporter.

The Credential Committee reported the name of Bertha Ellis for elders orders by her quarterly conference at Hoover, which was referred to the Committee on Itinerancy and Orders.

The partial report of the Credential Committee naming Frank Ballou, Dayton Valley; Lucy Kirkpatrick, Dayton Valley; Bertha Williams, Pleasant Hill; and Lottie Buttermore, South Troy was adopted.

Motion prevailed that a Committee on Boundaries be created with R. W. Mack as chairman. F. A. Butterfield was elected second member and John D. Williams, Jr., third member on this committee.

Orders of the Day being called, Professor S. W. Bond was called to the platform to present the school.

"Three items must be kept in mind," he said, "in connection with the education of our young folk. 1st, Religious surroundings; 2nd, Social surroundings; 3rd, Educational surroundings." Effort is made to make these the best possible at Miltonvale.

Adjourned by limitation 30 minutes late.

A. P. Breneman pronounced the benediction.

Thursday Afternoon.

Conference opened by singing "Close to Thee." Twenty-seventh Psalm was the reading selected by Amy Breneman who also led in prayer.

Motion made that the name of J. B. Omerod be dropped from the conference roll prevailed.

The minutes were read and approved.

Vice-president was called to the chair.

President Emerson made a statement from the Committee on Camp Grounds.

The motion prevailed that the Committee on Camp Grounds be instructed to buy or lease the piece of land for a permanent location providing a road can be procured to the place.

The President made mention of a matter at Guthrie Center which was referred to the Committee for the disbursement of funds from the building fund.

The motion prevailed that the time after the Orders of the Day were carried out, be given to the Woman's Missionary Society.

The Sunday School Secretary had charge of the hour from 2. At 3:40 Conference voted to suspend the orders of the day and adjourned in order that the Conference W. H. and F. Missionary Society might have the time for a session of that body.

Friday Morning, September 4.

"How Firm a Foundation" was sung. The President read 89th Psalm and led in fervent prayer.

Eight elders, 10 licentiates, and 19 delegates were present.

Minutes were read and corrected.

Time to hear the Connectional Editor was set for II o'clock. The names of the following were called and character passed:

Motion prevailed that the name of C. M. Howe be placed in the hands of the president to secure a report and then report at next annual conference.

By vote, the character of F. E. Fitch was passed and the secretary instructed to write to inquire of the relation he wishes to sustain to this conference.

The passage of the character of R. C. Moulton was deferred, by vote, until the president be able to correspond with him.

Motion prevailed to again change the order of the day and give the Connectional Editor the time immediately after roll call this afternoon.

The names of S. S. Cameron, A. A. Davidson, and Mrs. L. A. Bishop were ordered placed on the roll of our honored dead and that the secretary be instructed to write letters of condolence and assurance of the prayers of the conference to the bereaved.

Conference adjourned.

Sister Bertha Ellis pronounced the benediction.

Friday Afternoon.

"The Half Has Never Yet Been Told" was sung. C. S. Weigel read the 91st Psalm and led in prayer.

Six elders, 11 licentiates, and 16 delegates present.

The Orders of the Day being called, Brother F. A. Butterfield, the Connectional Representative, was called to the platform.

At his request "Blest Be the Tie" was sung after which he presented the Connectional work. He likened it to a tree with branches, each of which must be carefully cared for to make a symmetrical organization.

Orders of the Day again being called Conference proceeded to the election.

The President appointed A. B. Gould and Wm. Gipe tellers.

The Credential Committee presented the name of Geo. Barnett, of Bennezette, which was accepted.

For result of election see page 3.

The President ruled that the offices of President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, Advisory Board, Missionary Board, Board of Trustees, Committee on Presidency and Judiciary Committee are conference officers.

Motion prevailed that the president be authorized to name the chairman of the following committees: Resolutions, Sabbath Schools, Missionary, Moral Reform, to report at the beginning of the conerence.

The Statistical Committee reported 686 members. The Rev. F. A. Butterfield was elected ministerial delegate to the General Conference, with Rev. W. R. Emerson, alternate, and Frank Ballou, lay delegate, with H. F. Boll as alternate.

Motion prevailed that the expenses of these delegates to General Conference be paid from the Conference Fund.

The Treasurer made his report which was received and placed in the hands of the Auditing Committee.

The Committee on the disbursement of funds from the building fund, made its report which was adopted.

Motion prevailed to meet at 8:30 a. m., on Saturday. Adjourned.

E. R. Dodd pronounced the benediction.

Saturday Forenoon, September 5.

"I Need Thee Every Hour" was sung. C. P. Carkuff read the Beatitudes, commenting thereon and offered prayer.

Six elders, 8 licentiates and 9 delegates answered present. The minutes were read and corrected.

The following names were called and character passed: A. B.

Gould, F. J. Wilson, J. F. Hiner, Geo. H. Doty, D. W. Scott, and J. W. Leedy.

Charles City's Statistical report was read and adopted.

C. P. Carkuff was called to the chair. The President made his annual report which was adopted.

The character of President Emerson was passed. The motion that the matter of the Cameron note be referred to the three trustees present and that they shall report at this conference prevailed.

Committee on Missions made their report, which was adopted.

The report of Committee on Vote of Thanks was read and adopted.

A special committee of one—C. S. Weigel—was created to wait upon Mr. C. Haymond with thanks from this conference for the use of the camp grounds.

The Sunday School report was read and adopted.

A Committee on Revivals was created, with E. R. Dodd to report at next Annual Conference.

Conference instructed the Camp Meeting Committee to secure the best possible evangelist available.

The report of the Missionary Board was read and adopted.

The report of the Committee on Itinerancy and Orders was read and adopted.

The following resolution was adopted:

That we greatly appreciate the excellent judgment and faithfulness of the present administration in the successful management of our Connectional interests, and we hereby pledge, cheerfully, our unqualified support.

The report of the Committee on Moral Reform was read and adopted by a rising vote.

The report of the Committee on Memorials to General Conference was read and adopted as partial report.

The secretary was instructed to publish conference minutes and draw on conference fund for payment for same.

Motion prevailed that the conference treasurer and secretary each be paid \$10 for labors.

The statistical report of Marengo charge was read.

Conference voted that the Committee on Itinerancy and Orders arrange for a ministerial institute to be held in the spring.

Motion was made that the Union Ridge appointment be discontinued and the payment of interest on the church cease.

Adjourned by limitation.

R. W. Mack pronounced the benediction.

Saturday Afternoon.

"I Will Praise Him" was sung. George H. Doty read the 91st Psalm and led in prayer.

Six elders, seven licentiates and eight delegates present.

Minutes were read and corrected.

Unfinished business was taken up and the motion concerning the Union Ridge Church prevailed.

F. J. Wilson moved that the president be authorized to grant letters to the individuals of disbanded classes. Motion prevailed.

The Committee on Apportionment of Superannuated Ministers' Fund was read and adopted.

The report of the Camp Meeting Committee was read and adopted.

Conference adjourned for committee meetings, to convene at the call of the chair.

President called conference to order.

The report of the Statistical Committee was read and adopted.

The motion prevailed that George Smith and E. R. Dodd be a committee to make apportionment of budget of the various charges.

Conference ordered three hundred minutes printed.

The Auditing Committee made report, which was adopted.

The motion prevailed to accept no time less than twenty-five years' lease for camp grounds.

Motion prevailed that the location of camp grounds be left in the hands of the president and his advisory board.

The report of the Committee on Pastoral Relations was read and adopted.

Motion prevailed that Sister May Lord be in the hands of the Missionary Board.

At the president's recommendation, it was voted to sell the Diagonal property and put it into property at Charles City, the money to be disbursed through the Building Fund.

The report of the Committee on Postoffices was read and adopted,

The Committee on Apportionment of Budget made a report, which was adopted with an amendment.

Motion prevailed that the president, in connection with his advisory board, sell the parsonage at Wayne.

Adjourned.

"Praise God" was sung. G. E. Houck pronounced the benediction.

Evening Session.

Called to order by President.

Conference voted that it had no jurisdiction whatever concerning Elsie Webster Fund, and therefore had no recommendation to make.

Conference adjourned sine die.

Reports from the following societies were read and adopted: Dayton Valley, Emmanuel, Hoover, Pilot Rock, South Troy, and Fairview.

Received dues, but no report from Howardville.

Motion to adjourn. Carried.

Third Meeting.

Called to order, Saturday morning at 7:30 by singing, followed by prayer by Sister Laura Everett.

Minutes were read and adopted with slight correction.

Proceeded to the election of officers by ballot. Motion made that we tax each member of the local societies ten cents to help defray the expenses of delegate to General Conference.

Minutes read and adopted. Motion made and supported that we do now adjourn.
