ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION of the Champlain Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Connection of America.

The undersigned residents of the County of Clinton and State of New York, and citizens of the United States desiring to form a Society and as such to become incorporated under the provisions of an act of the Legislature of the State of New York, being Chapter 649 of the Laws of 1872 and the amendments thereto and the acts amended thereby, do hereby declare

I. The particular objects and nature for which said Society is formed are Benevolent, Missionary, Mission and Sunday School purposes, mutual improvement in Religious knowledge, and the furtherance of religious opinions.

II. The said Society or Corporation shall be known as "The Champlain Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Connection of America."

III. The number of Trustees or managers of said Society shall be five, and the names of such Trustees or Managers who are to manage the concerns of the said Corporation for the first year are John Quay, Artemas Bassett, Charles L. Comstock, Urban D. Lathrop and Albert Richardson.

RECORD OF DAILY PROCEEDINGS

TUESDAY AFTERNOON

The 106th Annual Session of the Champlain Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church opened Tuesday afternoon at 2:30, at West Chazy Camp Ground. Bro. Aldis Lamos played the trumpet, and "Majestic Sweetness" was the first hymn sung. Bro. Finch offered prayer.

Bro. Ray Morgan sang a solo.

The roll of Elders and Conference Preachers was then called. The Conference President, Rev. Charles Dayton, welcomed the Assembly, and read a Scripture Lesson. He then spoke on "The Burning Heart," applying it to Camp-ground interests. After prayer, a partial roll call of delegates.

It was voted that the bar of Conference be the first seven seats of the two center rows.

The Conference President read his Annual report, and it was adopted. See reports.

The President's Financial report was read and adopted, subject to the approval of the Auditing Committee.

The Reports on Pioneer Work and President's Home were given, and adopted as above.

The Committee on Courtesy presented Mr. and Mrs. Leo Cox. They were introduced to the Conference, and made brief remarks.

The Conference Treasurer reported. The report was adopted, subject to the approval of the Auditing Committee.

It was moved that there be a Finance Committee of 5 Elders and 2 laymen. It was voted that this be referred to the Nominating Committee.

The Committee on Church Extension read its report, and it

It was voted to adjourn. Bro. Klob dismissed by prayer.

WEDNESDAY FORENOON

Devotional leader, Mrs. Shippee. She read the 91st Psalm.

Bro. Clifton Chapman led in prayer.

BUSINESS: Roll call.

Minutes of Tuesday afternoon were read and approved.

The Committee on Resolutions read report, and it was adopted.

Rev. R. Gunsalus presented a Resolution. It was voted that it be laid on the table for further consideration.

It was voted to adjourn for Committee work.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON

Solo by Rev. Brainard, "Sunrise Tomorrow."

Several of the Pastors made brief memorial remarks about those on the list of "departed."

Verses from John 14 were read, and the song, "Safe to The Rock" was sung.

Closing prayer by Rev. Mattoon.

Scripture was read from Romans 12:9-13. The leader emphasized the eleventh verse. Prayer by Bro. Shippee.

BUSINESS. Roll call. Minutes of Wednesday afternoon read and approved as read. During the forenoon, the following names were called, and characters passed: O. M. Finch, Jesse Russell, Howard Chapman, Edwin Seaman, Russell Frase, Ralph Seaman, Herbert Seaman, Sumner Brainard, Clifton Chapman, Florence Carey, and Robert Gunsalus.

Dr. Claude Ries, of Houghton College.

The Committee on Nominations made a partial report. It was voted to consider it item by item. Item ONE was adopted by vote.

The hymn, "Love Divine" was sung, and Bro. Reginald Hewitt offered prayer. The address was titled, "Building the Walls of Wesleyan Methodism." The speaker reviewed the history of Israel from the release from Babylonian captivity through the building of the Jerusalem wall, applying each point in a unique way to interests of the Church.

One quote: "An essential—a direct and sustained STIR."

Dennis Osgood offered thanks in prayer.

BUSINESS resumed. Item 2 of the Nominating Committee's partial report was under discussion when there was adjournment by limitation of time.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON

Devotional leader—Rev. Northrup.

Scripture read, a part of John 21, followed by profitable remarks, and prayer.

BUSINESS: Roll call. Reading of Thursday forenoon business read and approved.

ORDER OF THE DAY. Camp meeting Business.

Dr. Claude Ries spoke inspirationally of Houghton interests. He then gave a study of the 51st Psalm. He spoke of the five "P's"—Pardon, Purity, Power, Pleasure, and Permanence.

Regular business resumed. Item No. 2 of the Nominating Committee Report was adopted by vote. The 3rd item was also adopted by vote. See reports.

The following were elected the Finance Committee:

The Nominating Committee read the list of nominations for Conference officers.

The Committee on Pastoral Relations gave the first reading of its report.

It was voted that—

There be 425 copies of Conference Minutes printed, or as many as the President and Secretary deem necessary; that the Conference President and Conference Secretary be the Publishing Committee of said journals, to obtain the job printing at the least expense, without decrease of the value of the journal, the cost to be sustained by the Churches, the price determined and assessed by the Publication Committee.

The Tithing Secretary reported. The report was accepted. See reports.

The following characters were passed: Stanley Klob, Wilbur Matson, Gerald Matson, Ray Morgan, Edward Mein, Flora Ressler, Florence Shippee, Fred Shippee, and Elsie Taylor.

It was voted to adjourn. Prayer by Bro. Brainard.

It was voted that the officers of the Superannuate Ministers' Relief Association be elected as the Board of Superannuate Ministers' Aid.

It was voted that there be printed on the first page of the Conference Minutes the date of incorporation with the act of incorporation.

It was voted that the 107th Annual Session of the Champlain Conference convene for its opening service on the last Tuesday of June, the 28, 1949, at 2:30 P. M.; that the roll of elders and Conference preachers be called at this time; that immediately following this roll call the President address the Conference assembly; that the Conference sermon be preached Tuesday evening, at 7:30; and that there be no preaching services during the day sessions of Conference week, unless an urgent need requires otherwise.

It was voted to have a Ministerial Institute, to be held from Tuesday evening September 28 to 30th.

ORDER OF THE DAY . . . Sunday School Hour.

The Sunday School Secretary, Rev. W. F. Lewis, gave his report, which was accepted. See Reports.

A rising vote of thanks to Bro. Lewis for his long service was voted and expressed.

It was voted that Rev. W. F. Lewis be Sunday School Secretary, *Emeritus*.

Rev. Reisdorf addressed the assembly relative to matters of Sunday School interest. Quote: "The Sunday School is not only the largest department of the Church,—it is larger than the Church."

It was voted to extend the time to 11:45.

It was voted that we recommend to the Camp-meeting Committee the purchase of TWO fire extinguishers; that they be placed at convenient places on the grounds; and that some one be trained as to use and care of the same.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

1. The Wesleyan Methodist Church of America is the harbinger of the Gospel of Jesus Christ, which is the Power of God unto Salvation. SUNDAY SCHOOL SECRETARY'S REPORT

The average Sunday School attendance in the Champlain Conference (and it is one of the three important points toward which we should strive) has increased from 621 in 1925 to 1365 in 1947 (I trust this year will be even better), and from 25 Sunday Schools in 1925, we now have 34. Finances have also made a remarkable showing, total raised, in 1925 was \$294 and in 1947 it was \$4663, doubtless many of these last mentioned dollars went into missions, church extension, Hephzibah, etc. Isn't this a remarkable record? It could have been even better IF ALL had worked as zealously as several, (pastors and laymen—young and old) have done.

Those other two points mentioned above (beside average attendance) are (a) increased effectiveness in teaching, and (b) actually

THE CHAMPLAIN CONFERENCE

winning them to Christ and the Church. To do this a "Training Class" AND monthly "Workers Meetings" will very greatly aid you. Properly watching the records will also help. Check the absentees, follow-up, get new recruits, constant planning, are essential to "get places." In small towns and communities, a complete survey—with frequent checks—is highly profitable. In larger Towns and cities, contacts must also be made, usually through your members who are alert to their responsibilities, and other ways you can learn.

About those quarterly reports. "Believe it or not," but they do help, I am convinced. During the last several years there appears to be just ONE miss from 100 per cent—One school missed once. Conference folks do read those reports, sometimes I make mistakes in copying the record and am I corrected? Glad of it, Thanks.

Other things that should be considered are (I) Uniformity, in (a) elections—when held—see Discipline, Par. 165, page 91 and 333 & 334. (b) in counting average attendance. Enrollment, new scholars admitted after 3 Sundays consecutive attendance, dropped when removed from the community, unless away to school or college, etc.; or when joining another Sunday School, or when absent for 3 months. The average attendance is not of course based on enrollment, however we should strive for 100 per cent average attendance based on enrollment. Check that enrollment at least quarterly. No one should be counted present when they are not, in the totals and average. That means whether at Conference or in some other Sunday School. The individual should receive credit on his or her personal record. In cases of severe storm, epidemic, etc., when the Sunday School is closed do NOT count it in taking your average. Let's start the new Conference year together in these things.

II. Have a goal and "press toward" it. Whether you have 10, 50, 100 or more have a determination to make a gain. Sure "circumstances alter cases," some communities lose a large per cent of their enrollment by big families moving out, BUT you may not know that yet, so disregard it and have a goal. What will you try to gain in average attendance this Conference year? Of course, planning, practicing, and presenting a program is bound to give someone a "head-ache," let it be known it may, and likely will, mean work and sweat and tears, but it ALL does count for the Lord IF we keep prayer sweet, for oftentimes we make contacts that mean "another soul for Christ and the church." Isn't that what we want to do?

III. "Bring them in." Get pupils converted AND joining the church, as associates at first and in accordance with our Discipline, as active members later, and regardless of age, financial condition or previous conditions. Sometimes apples rot, but we still gather apples if we have the opportunity. They (converts and apples) will surely not "turn out good" unless gathered.

STANDING RULES

1. The Resolution of this Conference shall be printed in the Minutes of this Conference each year.

2. All visiting members of our own, or other Churches in harmony with our principles, shall be invited to honorary seats in the Conference.

3. The Conference President shall receive twenty dollars per year for postage and stationery; also any needed traveling expense. At any time the President be required to travel the Conference, his duties and pay shall be defined by the Conference.

4. The Conference Secretary shall receive twenty-five dollars (\$25) per year for his labor and incidental expenses.

5. The Conference Treasurer shall receive twenty-five dollars (\$25) per year for his services in caring for the funds.

6. In making his report, the Conference Treasurer is authorized to close his books one week before Conference session. The Treasurer of the Superannuate Ministers' Relief Association also shall close his books one week before the Conference session.

7. All monies disbursed by the Conference Treasurer during the interim of Conference shall be upon order of the President, except in case of payment to the President, when such order shall be issued by the Vice President. It is understood that any payment ordered by the Conference direct may be paid by the Treasurer without an order as directed above.

8. No monies shall be loaned by the Conference Treasurer except by order of Conference, or by the consent of the President and his Advisory Board.

9. Each Elder shall make his engagement as Pastor with the understanding that if he be elected Conference President he shall be released in his pastoral engagement.

10. (New) The first Sunday of each month shall be known as Missions Sunday, the Sunday School offerings to go alternately to Home Missions and Conference Missions, in that order, and be sent to the Conference Treasurer. (The Committee on Finance defines "Conference Missions" as the establishing of new and (or) subsidizing of the needy fields of the Conference.)

11. In securing Evangelists for the Camp Meeting, the Camp Meeting Committee is privileged to secure not more than one worker outside the Denomination.

12. The Camp Meeting Committee shall be composed of the Conference President, as Chairman, and three ministers and three

laymen, all to be elected by ballot (after the Conference of 1923), the term of office to be three years, the time of one minister and one layman expiring each year.

13. Pastors shall state financial items in their statistical reports in even dollars, except in items affecting the Budget; and as far as possible are requested to report all Budget items in even dollars. When such rule is not followed, the Statistical Secretaries are authorized to drop decimals, except as provided above.

14. The Committee on Credentials shall secure from each delegate the necessary credentials as provided by our Discipline, with Post Office address of the same.

15. The closing Sunday of the Conference year shall be the Sunday following the beginning of the Annual Conference. The Pastor's salary of this closing Sunday shall be paid by the Church of which he is Pastor; and for the first Sunday of the new Conference year it shall be paid by the charge to which he is going.

16. Newly elected Conference Officers shall take office after the close of Conference Sunday.

17. The Conference President shall include in the Orders of the Day a special period to consider Camp Meeting business.

18. A Nominating Committee shall be elected to consider and nominate all elective Officers of the Conference. The Committee shall consist of four Elders and four laymen. The report of the Nominating Committee shall be read to the Conference the day preceding the election.

19. Each Church member over fourteen years of age shall be apportioned fifty-two cents per year for Church Extension.

20. The Delegate's credentials shall be sent to the Committee on Credentials BEFORE THE OPENING DAY OF CONFERENCE, and the Conference Secretary shall send printed blanks with the statistical, character, etc.

21. The Conference recommends that each Charge grant its Pastor two weeks vacation, and also grant him permission to hold a two weeks meeting (over two Sundays) away from his local charge—both vacation and meeting to be without loss of pay, and exclusive of attending the Annual Conference and Camp Meeting.

22. (New) The first Sunday in May shall be PASTORAL VOTE SUNDAY.

23. (Newly adopted as a Standing Rule.) (Also: Report No. 10 in 1947 Minutes.)

1. The Conference President shall act as Pioneer Secretary. This does not create the office of Pioneer Secretary.) The Confer-

ence Board on Church and Parsonage Building and Location shall be the Church Extension Committee.

2. There shall be at least one Church extension service on each charge in the Conference this year, at which time all of the Church Extension activities within the Conference shall be presented.

This service shall be under the supervision of the Conference President, or one whom he may appoint. Any person traveling the Conference in the interests of Church Extension must be appointed and under the direction of the Conference President. Those thus appointed to travel the Conference in the interests of Church Extension shall receive not to exceed five cents per mile.

3. All offerings taken for Church Extension shall be forwarded to the Conference Treasurer, and credited to Church Extension. The Conference Treasurer, upon the recommendation of the Conference President and the Church Extension Committee, shall disburse these funds. Any designated funds can be disbursed by notice received in writing from the Conference President.

4. Whereas the W. Y. P. S. is an organization that is aggressively supporting the Conference Pioneer projects, we recommend that as far as possible all monies received for Pioneer work be passed through the local W. Y. P. S. treasurer to the treasurer of the Champlain Conference.

We further recommend that the local Church Extension program be sponsored by the local W. Y. P. S. as far as practical.

Voted to adjourn

STANDING RULES

1. The Standing Rules of the Conference Missionary Society shall be printed in the Conference Minutes each year.

2. The Conference Treasurer is authorized to close her books one week before the Conference session begins.

3. One of the two statistical blanks sent to each society, after being carefully filled in, is to be given to the statistical committee at the beginning of Conference, the other is to be retained by the delegate and read to the local society at the first meeting of the new year. Receipts and disbursements must be made to balance before being placed in the hands of the statistical committee also giving rating according to efficiency standard.

4. All money raised by the society shall be used for missionary work, and no money paid out without a vote of the society.

5. The Conference President shall receive annually five dollars, the Treasurer ten dollars and the Secretary three dollars, to defray expense of postage and writing material.

6. The voting body shall be composed of Conference Officers, Y. M. W. B. Superintendent, Presidents of local societies, and one delegate from each local society, lady pastors and pastor's wives.

7. Each local society shall continue sending six dollars to Southern Mountain Work, and five dollars or more to Hephzibah Orphanage. This must be sent through the Conference Treasurer applied on the budget.

8. It is required that twenty-five cents per member of the local society dues be forwarded through the Conference Society Treasurer to the General Conference Treasurer for the general fund. Also that twenty-five be retained in the Conference treasury and the remaining

fifty cents be used directly for missionary work and be applied on local church budget.

The local societies shall disburse all Conference and General Conference funds through the Conference Treasurer, who shall in turn remit all General funds to the General Conference Treasurer.

9. Each society is to make provision for a missionary to travel the Conference as early in the year as possible, allowing ample time for each charge.

10. The Plan of Work should be read quarterly to our local societies to keep us enthused in our work.

11. We recommend that the Treasurer of the Conference Society be elected as a Committee of Remembrance with authority to send flowers or other suitable tribute, to those of our number who shall be called to their eternal reward. We further recommend that this shall include all pastor's wives and officers of our Conference Missionary Society.

PLAN OF WORK

We recommend that each local W. M. S.:

1. Have regular monthly meetings, at which we urge the use of missionary programs, (study books and missionary papers are good sources of material for this) along with prayer and business.

2. Observe special days with appropriate program.

3. Endeavor to secure every woman of the congregation and any other interested person as a member, and to enlist the men as honorary members and co-workers.

4. Form an active prayer partner group with a prayer partner secretary to keep records of same and report to Conference Corresponding Secretary.

5. Elect officers who are subscribers to and readers of the "Wesleyan Missionary" and the "Wesleyan Methodist." Endeavor to have the "Wesleyan Missionary" in every home.

6. Continue sending good usable clothing, notions, pictures, medical supplies to our Home Missionaries, cheerfully accepting the value set by the workers.

7. Send to Conference, articles prepared for our Home Mission stations to be displayed for our mutual interest and inspiration. These things to be received, arranged for exhibit, and packed for mailing at close of Conference by a committee which shall be appointed at first session.

8. Continue contributions of canned goods and other supplies for the Camp.

9. Send a correctly balanced, complete statistical blank with delegate to be presented to the statistical committee at the first session.

10. Send delegate's credentials to the Conference Missionary Secretary at least one week before the Conference convenes. (See form No. 438 of Discipline.)

11. Send at least ten cents per member to the Conference Treasurer not later than May 1st, for the fund for cleaning dormitories and Association cottages, which work shall be under supervision of our Committee named for that purpose.

12. At a meeting before Conference, elect officers for the coming year, including a magazine solicitor and a delegate, (other than church delegate if possible), whose room and board shall be provided for Conference week. Instruct their delegates how much to pledge for missions. (Each Band also should be prepared to make a pledge).

13. Receive from their delegate a clear and comprehensive report at the first meeting after Conference.
