Daily Proceedings

Tuesday Evening, June 29, 1965

The 123rd Annual Session of The Champlain Annual Conference of The Wesleyan Methodist Church of America convened on the West Chazy Campground, West Chazy, New York on June 29, 1965 at 7:00 P.M. The Conference was called to order by the President, Rev. Charles A. Dayton.

The Roll was called and thirty-one (31) ministerial delegates and twenty-seven (27) lay delegates responded.

The Devotional Period was presided over by Rev. Edwin Seaman, Vice President of the Conference. Rev. Charles McCallum led us in singing "O That Will Be Glory". Rev. The Church and Parsonage Building and Location Committee met at West Chazy on July 11, 1964. At this meeting, permission was granted the Colton church to sell the property adjoining the church for \$2000.00.

It was understood that the Wesleyan Youth Council and this Committee would decide jointly on the church extension project of the year.

It was voted that the 500 Club be continued and that the money go to the Rockville area church this year.

It was also voted that the Committee approve of and help raise an offering for the new Youth Dorm on the Campground.

On Aug. 16, 1964, this Committee met at Long Lake and approved the purchase of the Hall house adjoining the church property which was to be deeded to the Conference.

A letter was read from Mrs. Burls of Norfolk, N.Y. expressing her desire for the Conference to buy her home for a parsonage there. It was voted that the President look into this matter further.

On Oct. 2, 1964, this Committee went to Rockville to see about the purchase of land for a new church there. Three sites were looked at and proposals made. None of these materialized. Later we learned that the property near the home of Rev. Taber was available and unanimously approved of by the local church and contractor. Though we had not definitely looked this property over at the time we visited there as a possible site, we knew where it was, and permission was readily granted to purchase this land. Negotiations are in progress at the present time.

On May 10, 1965, the Committee went to Cobleskill and approved the building of a new church there at a cost of \$27,000.00. Permission to borrow \$20,000.00 was granted.

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL SECRETARY

Honorable President, Brethren in the Ministry, Lay Delegates:

Once again it is our responsibility to present to the Annual Conference the report of the Sunday School Secretary. It is truly a great honor to be a part of the Kingdom of God and to be charged with promoting this on earth. It is therefore, with a recognition of the challenge and also the enormity of the task that I make this report.

As I have reviewed the evaluation as revealed by the annual statistical report, the importance of the Sunday Schools to our churches is increasingly evident. The churches of our Conference spent some \$7559.00 in Evangelistic help and reported 452 seekers. The reports also show that there was a gain in membership of 80 and also that 80 Sunday School Scholars joined the church. Thus it appears that the Sunday School is the most effective channel for attaining new members.

I also observed that while our average attendance has fallen off 46, the Potential Regular attendance shows a gain of 262, the Cradle Roll 4, The Home Department 14 and the total enrollment a gain of 280.

Again, I observed that every Sunday School reports the use of Wesleyan Methodist Literature and that the Sunday School expense is \$19,981.00, an increase of \$1032.00 over last year.

We do appreciate the faithful service and loyal devotion of the officers and teachers in our Sunday Schools who number 466.

We were privileged to have the Champlain Conference SHARE Convention on October 1, 1964 in Glens Falls with well over 300 in attendance. Every Sunday School in the Conference except one was represented to avail themselves of the fine program presented by Dr. Paul Kindschi and his staff. The Sunday School Board submits the following recommendations:

That everyone attending the NSSA Convention be officially appointed by his local Sunday School;

Each Sunday School use and report the results of the Standard of Achievement score sheet.

That the Sunday School Secretary be nominated as one of the Delegates to General Conference.

Standing Rules

1. The Resolutions of this Conference shall be printed in the Minutes of the Conference each year.

2. All visiting members of our own, or other Churches in harmony with our principles, shall be invited to honorary seats in the Conference.

3. The Conference Secretary shall receive fifty dollars (\$50) per year for his labor, and any incidental expenses shall be in addition to this amount.

4. The Conference Treasurer shall receive fifty dollars (\$50) per year for his services in caring for the funds.

5. The Treasurer of the Superannuate Ministers' Relief Association also shall close his books one week before the Conference Session.

6. All monies disbursed by the Conference Treasurer during the interim of Conference shall be upon order of the President, except in case of payment to the President, when such order shall be issued by the Vice President. It is understood that any payment ordered by the Conference direct may be paid by the Treasurer without an order as directed above.

7. No monies shall be loaned by the Conference Treasurer except by order of the Conference, or by the consent of the President and his Advisory Board.

8. Each Elder shall make his engagements as Pastor with the understanding that if he be elected Conference President he shall be released from his engagement as Pastor within the period of three months following his election.

9. The first Sunday of each month shall be known as missions Sunday; the Sunday School offering to go alternately to (new) Church Extension & Evangelism and Conference Missions in that order, and that the conference missions offering be sent to the Conference Missions Treasurer. The Committee on Finance defines "Conference Missions" as the establishing new (or) subsidizing of the needy fields of the Conference.

10. In securing Evangelists for the Camp Meeting the Camp Meeting Committee is privileged to secure not more than one worker outside the Denomination.

11. The Camp Meeting Committee shall be composed of the Conference President, as Chairman, and three ministers and three laymen, all to be elected by ballot, the term of each office to be three years, the time of one minister and one layman expiring each year; also, the Conference Vice President, the President of the Missionary Society and the President of the W.Y. shall be members of this Committee.

12. Pastors shall state financial items in their statistical reports in even dollars, except in items affecting the Budget, and as far as possible are requested to report all Budget items in even dollars. When such rule is not followed, the statistical secretaries are authorized to drop decimals, except as provided above.

13. The Committee on Credentials shall secure from each delegate the necessary credentials as provided by our Discipline, with Post Office address of the same.

14. May 26th to the following May 25th shall be the term of all local Church officers, except the Committee on Pulpit Supply. May 25th shall be the close of the Conference year for Statistics. By June 2nd the pastor shall send to the Conference Treasurer all monies and receipts, with both copies of his statistical report made out, except budget items raised. These items the Conference Treasurer shall fill in and sign. In the event that the Conference Treasurer discovers a deficit in any of the budget items, he shall notify the Pastor. By June 9th the Conference Treasurer shall in turn pass the reports to the Auditor of Statistical Reports. The Auditor shall correct the reports (if mistakes are found), and by June 16th shall pass one copy to the Statistician, and one back to the Pastor. He shall also send to the Apportionment Committee the membership of the churches, Sunday Schools, and W.Y. The Statistician and Auditor shall give Pastors opportunity to explain apparent errors but (new) no changes shall be accepted after the Wednesday before Conference convenes. The

the annual conference. These books shall be available at the conference president's office one week before the first day of conference. The elected auditors of financial records will audit all annual financial reports before their presentation to the conference body. The closing Sunday of the Conference year shall be the Sunday following the beginning of the annual conference. The Pastor's salary for this closing Sunday shall be paid by the church of which he is pastor; and for the Sunday of the new Conference Year by the charge to which he is going.

15. Newly elected Conference Officers take office after the close of Conference Sunday.

16. The Conference shall include in the Orders of The Day a special period to consider Camp Meeting business.

17. A Nominating Committee shall be elected to consider and nominate all elective Officers of the Conference. The Committee shall consist of four Elders and four laymen. No one shall repeat service on this Committee until an interim of one (1) year has elapsed. The report of the Nominating Committee shall be read to the Conference the day preceding the election.

18. The delegates' credentials shall be sent to the Committee on Credentials BEFORE THE OPENING DAY OF CONFERENCE, and the Conference Secretary shall send printed blanks with the Statistical, Character, etc.

19. The Conference recommends that each Charge grant its Pastor two weeks vacation, and also grant him permission to hold a two weeks meeting (over two Sundays) away from his local Charge — both vacation and meeting to be without loss of pay; and exclusive of Annual Conference and Camp meeting.

20. The first Sunday in May shall be PASTORAL VOTE SUNDAY.

21. CONFERENCE MISSIONS: (1) Conference President shall act as Pioneer Secretary. (This does not create the office of Pioneer Secretary.) The Conference Board on Church and Parsonage Building and Location shall be the Conference Board on Church Extension and Evangelism.

(2) There shall be at least one Conference Missions service on each Charge in the Conference this year, at which time all of the Conference Mission activities within the Conference shall be presented. This service shall be under the supervision of the Conference President, or one whom he may appoint.

Any person traveling the Conference in the interest of Conference Missions must be appointed and under the direction of the Conference President. Those thus appointed to travel the Conference in the interest of Conference Missions shall receive not to exceed five cents per mile.

(3) All offerings taken for Conference Missions shall be forwarded to the Conference Missions Treasurer, and credited to Conference Missions. The Conference Missions Treasurer, upon the recommendation of the Conference President and the Conference Board on Church Extension and Evangelism, shall disburse these funds. Any designated funds can be disbursed by notice received in writing from the Conference President, and that all monies raised to subsidize, build or repair new or old churches and parsonages be listed under Conference Missions by all treasurers and societies of the Conference.

(4) Whereas the W.Y. is an organization that is aggressively supporting the Conference Pioneer projects, we recommend that as far as possible all monies for pioneer work be passed through the Local Wesleyan Youth Treasurer, to the Conference Missions Treasurer of the Champlain Conference. We further recommend that the local Conference Missions program be sponsored by the W.Y. as far as possible.

22. During the year each Sunday School shall take an offering for the maintenance of the Conference President's home.

23. The Conference President shall be ex-officio member of the Board on Church and Parsonage Building and Location; the term of the other members shall be two years each, the term of two members expiring each year.

24. No new business shall be introduced to the Conference Body after Friday noon, without a two-thirds vote of the Body.

25. Our Conference shall meet for its Annual Session the first Tuesday after the last Monday in June, except the years of the General Conference. On such years our Conference shall begin the second Tuesday following the General Conference. (These dates to be subject to the approval of the General Board of Administration.)

26. Each Church member over 14 years of age shall be apportioned \$2.50 per year for CONFERENCE MISSIONS.

27. The Pastors shall not be required to read their statistical reports (before the Conference Body).

28. The Bar of Conference shall be the first seven center rows of seats; Conference shall open at 7:00 p. m., the first day (Tuesday); The 7:00 - 8:00 p. m. period shall be an organizational business session led by the President. At 8:00 the Conference Body shall hear the Conference President's Message; the hours of Conference following the first day shall be 8:45 to 11:30 a. m. and 1:30 p. m. to closing by vote; the roll call shall be before the devotional service; and Work Week shall be the first full week in June.

29. The Superannuated Ministers' Relief Association shall supplement payment of Insurance Plan assessments to the extent of \$400. (four hundred dollars) annually.

30. In the event of the death of a minister or his wife, churches desiring to send flowers, shall send money instead.

31. Each church shall take an offering to help defray expenses of the Ministerial Institute and send it to the proper person.

32. The treasurer of the Superannuated Minister's Relief Association, shall give as a part of his annual report, a report on the Denominational Pension Plan.

33. The treasurer of the Superannuated Ministers Relief Association shall also be treasurer of the Denominational Pension Plan.

34. The Conference shall provide annually \$50 toward the expense of sending a representative to the National Holiness Ass'n. Annual convention.

Camp Ground Rules

General Rules

Ever bear in mind that these grounds and buildings are church property, and respect them as such.

The religious services are for your benefit — take advantage of them.

Only young people who come at the recommendation of their pastor will be permitted the benefits of the Young People's Financial Plan.

Each young person is required to attend the regular Young People's Meeting; also — the evening service, and one other service during the day.

I. Care of Grounds

1. Place waste paper and garbage only in containers provided. Do not throw it on the grounds.

2. Waste paper and other refuse may be burned only in drums provided for this purpose.

3. Empty waste water in appointed place — at back of the grounds. Do not throw it out the window or on the ground.

4. Do your part toward keeping the grounds around your cottage or dormitory neat and looking clean.

5. No dogs or cats are allowed.

II. Personal Conduct

1. The use of tobacco, profanity, obscene literature, card playing and gambling are prohibited on the Campgrounds.

2. Wearing apparel must be modest at all times. The wearing of slacks, shorts, gym clothes or bathing suits is prohibited on the grounds. Men are requested to wear shirts, and ladies to wear hose.

III. Dormitory and Cottage Rules

1. Campers are requested to be in their rooms for the night at 10:30 unless engaged in the tabernacle.

2. The rights of your neighbors must be respected: therefore, quiet must prevail in all rooms and dormitories.

3. Remember that there are others who will occupy these rooms after you, therefore, keep them clean, and leave them in good condition.

4. Because of fire hazard, there must be no cooking of food in the dormitories.

The following book reviews were given: "Pelendo, God's Prophet in the Congo"—by Mrs. Jessica Benjamin from Schenectady, "Coral in the Sand"—by Mrs. Verna Stanton from Glens Falls, "The Disciplined Life"—by Mrs. Lois Harvey from Catskill, "The Doors Were Opened"—by Mrs. Antoinette Earl from West Chazy, and "400 Mile Trek to Nepal" by Mrs. Josephine Dayton from West Chazy. (In a later session the sixth book, "Ploughing in Hope" was reviewed by Mrs. Anna Lamos from Waterford)

Standing Rules — The Standing Rules report was read and voted on item by item, with certain revisions made as seemed advisable. (see report)

Memorials — The report on Memorials was read and discussed by the body. This report was voted on and passed as recorded in the report. (see report No. 7) It was voted to authorize the Executive Committee to add any Memorials they feel should be included to send to General Conference.

Session was adjourned. Northern District stayed to elect a District Chairman to replace Mrs. Jessie Klob, who resigned.

Seventh Meeting — Friday, July 2, 1965 — 1:30 P.M.

Worship in Song — Mrs. Florence Northrup led us in singing "When I Survey the Wondrous Cross".

Worship in the Word — Mrs. Edith Murray led our devotions by reading Psalms 142. She cited an actual experience of a boy who lived in a cardboard box as related to her by Mr. Bruce Hawthorne, a Mission worker at Akron, N.Y. She challenged us to a greater concern for the unchurched in our several localities.

Roll Call — The roll was taken.

Courtesy — Mrs. Grace Eck, new pastor's wife at Ellenburg Depot, was presented to the body.

Action — The motion was made and passed that we take care of the campground bedding as a Conference Missionary Project for this coming year. This includes laundering of blankets, and providing plastic cases for storing blankets and pillows.

Community Missions Report — In the absence of our Vice-President, Mrs. Marjorie Stevenson, the Community Missions report was given by Mrs. Betty Vogan which was accepted. Along with the report was included a recommendation to have uniform blanks for Community Missions reports, which was considered separately.

After lengthy discussion, the motion was made and carried that our reporting for Community Missions be on a general basis.

The body also voted that a uniform report blank, adapted to the above motion, be sent to each society to facilitate in future reports for Community Missions.

Courtesy — Mrs. Irene Lawrence, new pastor's wife from Cobleskill, was introduced to the group.

Book Review — The remaining book review on the book "Ploughing in Hope" was given by Mrs. Ralph Lamos from Waterford.

Judges Report — Mrs. Betty Vogan, chairman of Judges committee, reported Mrs. Mary LaBombarde as Community Missionary of the year. It was voted that the Secretary send a letter of congratulations to Mrs. LaBombarde and that a write up be put in the **Challenger** concerning her work.

Tag Day Report — Mrs. Helen Tyler reported that one new subscription had been received and that tags were handed out to the subscribers.

Posters — Mrs. Betty Vogan gave the report of the judges on the poster contest, taking time to review the qualifications for poster-making. First prize was awarded to Corinth, second prize to Chichester and third prize to Malone.

Literature — Free literature was handed out to each society. Mrs. Zelda Russell announced that missionary literature and supplies may be obtained through the Literature Department at Marion, Indiana.

Action — It was ratified by the body that Mrs. Gail Cook be the Northern District Chairman.

The minutes of this session were read and approved.

The session was adjourned.

Public Service

The public Missionary Service was held Thursday evening, July 1, 1965 in the main tabernacle. The service was opened with a Congregational song, "Throw Out the Life Line" after which Rev. Edwin Seaman, Vice President of Champlain Confer-

ence, led in prayer. A Ladies Trio, composed of Betty Taber, Mavis Hemeon, and Helen Tyler, rendered a trio "Fill All My Vision", after which Rev. Charles Dayton conducted an installation service of the officers.

Rev. John Banker, a member of our Champlain Conference working for Wycliffe Bible Translators, was introduced and brought a few remarks concerning his work in Viet Nam. Josephine Dayton, Conference W.M.S. President, brought greetings and gave recognition to the Honor societies. A male quartet, composed of John and Leon Lamos, Stanley Hill, and David Ross, sang "Let the Lower Lights Be Burning". Rev. and Mrs. John Putney and children, missionaries to Colombia from our Champlain Conference, were then introduced.

Mrs. Putney spoke of various things the missionary must learn to adjust to, but felt that they really hadn't had to sacrifice much in their labours for Christ in Colombia. She left us the challenge to be missionaries right here at home, carrying the burden for unsaved friends, neighbors and loved ones all about us.

Rev. Putney told us about the political situation in Colombia, explaining how the Communists instigate feelings of unrest among the people, telling them that they are slaves to the present. He left us the challenge of being love slaves for Christ.

Rev. Stanley Hill, a former pastor in the Champlain Conference now pastoring the Oak Park Wesleyan Church at Chicago, played a saxophone solo, "So Send I You" for the offertory. Dr. Virgil Mitchell closed in prayer.

Interim Minutes

The executive council met July 4, 1964 at 1:30 p.m. with Lorraine Randall, Helen K. Seaman, Marjorie Stevenson, Josephine Dayton and Jewel Finley in attendance. In opening, Marjorie Stevenson led in prayer.

It was decided that the sum of \$60.00 be paid to Mrs. Stark to cover her travel expense, and all over travel expense be a love offering to her. Mrs. Seaman to check the amount given to her four years ago, and if that was more, to increase the amount this year to match the amount of that year.

It was decided to give Rev. and Mrs. Harris Earl \$50.00 as a love offering plus telling him that we will give \$100.00 to the project he is raising money for.

We were dismissed.

The executive council met July 7, 1964 at 5:45 p.m. with Lorraine Randall, Helen K. Seaman, Marjorie Stevenson, Josephine Dayton and Jewel Finley in attendance. Helen Seaman led in prayer.

The meeting was called to determine the dates best for the workshops, missionary tour and conventions.

Workshops were discussed. It was decided to have evening sessions of 2 hrs. each, a ½ hr. of general get together, then two separate sessions of ¼ hr. each.

WMS PRESIDENT'S REPORT 1964-65

"For we are labourers together with God — every man's work shall be made manifest; for the day shall declare it — If any man's work abide which he hath built thereupon he shall receive a reward. If any man's work shall be burned, he shall suffer loss — moreover, it is required in stewards that a man be found faithful." (I Cor. 3:9, 13-15, I Cor. 4:2)

The year 1965 marks the 60th occasion the women of our Champlain Conference have assembled together to rejoice in the Lord, to do business of the Kingdom in planning for the coming year, and to bring an account of their year's labour in their own particular corner of the Lord's vineyard.

A clear teaching of Scripture is the emphasis on the fact that there is a time of reckoning — the necessity of giving an account for activities engaged in. This should not seem strange. It occurs in all phases of everyday living — whether it is family life, school work, or at the job — wherever one is under the authority of another.

What is true for individuals is also true for organizations. In a sense, that is one purpose of Annual Conference — it is a time of rendering an account of the year's activities as a local society. When one has worked hard and faithfully and can show gains for his efforts, what a joy it is to share his victories with others. This is true even when these victories may represent losses, as far as cold figures are concerned. On the other hand, to the indolent the necessity of reporting has the opposite effect.

- (4) One new society organized — Ellington, Connecticut.

In addition there have been District Workshops in each of the four Districts; WMS Conventions in three Districts, besides four local Conventions — namely, Corinth, Glens Falls, Watervliet and Schenectady.

Two local projects completed this year which are in evidence on the camp-grounds are the curtains in the Dining Hall, made by the Ogdensburg society with other societies contributing to the cost; and the curtains in the boys' dorm, made by the Glens Falls society.

As president I have visited a number of the societies at their invitation; written monthly articles for the Conference publication; sent out over a hundred pieces of correspondence; presided at three Executive Committee meetings; and attended the committee meetings of the Camp Meeting Board.

As Christ taught that the work of the church is divided into several responsibilities (preaching, teaching, evangelism, etc.), so is the work of the WMS. As we face a new year in a world that grows more and more complex and challenging, may we each stand in our particular niche remembering that the requirement is that "a man be found faithful."

Finance Committee read their report. The report was adopted. See reports.

The Champlain Youth desiring to see the Gospel spread within our Conference concur with the Conference in the raising of \$5,000.00 through the 500 club for the construction of a new church building at Cobleskill, N.Y. Carried.

The Minutes of the Saturday sessions were read and accepted. Adjourned to meet at the call of the Chair.

1:35 p.m. a special session was called because of the lack of a majority vote in one election. We proceeded to elect a conference delegate to General Conference. The vice President was elected to be this delegate. Alternate delegate to General Conference, Richard Bennett.
