Daily Proceedings

On Tuesday afternoon, June 29, 1954, the Champlain Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America convened on the West Chazy, New York Camp-ground for the opening of its 112th Annual Session. The President, Rev. Reginald Hewitt, called the assembly to order.

The roll of Elders and Conference Preachers was called. The Credentials Committee read the roll of delegates.

Rev. Elton Seaman led in singing "Standing on the Promises." Prayer was offered by Rev. Chas. Dayton.

Bro. Seaman presented Rev. Hewitt who gave his annual address. He read Psalm 126, and spoke on the last verse, the theme being "The Certainty of a Joyful Harvest." It was a challenge to us to realize a better harvest. He said: "The secret of it is—Going forth—Pastor and People—doing personal work; Weeping; Bearing the seed of the Word." He closed with emphasis of the thought "He shall come again, . . . bringing his sheaves with him."

The President then read his annual report, including several items. It was accepted by vote. (See Reports)

The Bar of the Conference was fixed as the first seven center seats. The Conference voted the hours of convening daily as follows a.m. 8:45 to 11:30; p.m. 1:30 to a closing by vote.

Rev. Otis MacDonald, Clifton Holmquist.

It was voted that we as a Conference express our appreciation of the work done in the Tabernacle and on the Ground.

It was found necessary to substitute the names of A. Northrup, Jr. and Clifton Randall as Members of the Memorial Committee.

It was voted to adjourn for Committee work.

Prayer by Edwin Seaman.

Wednesday a. m.

The roll was called.

Rev. Dennis Osgood led the devotions. Prayer by Brother Miller. Scripture read—Matt. 5: 1-20, with brief remarks.

The minutes of Tuesday afternoon business and evening meeting were read and approved.

The Committee on Courtesy presented Rev. George Hawthorne and Rev. Alton Liddick.

ORDER OF THE DAY—Card Call Representative.

Rev. George Hawthorne played a group of hymns on his Piano Accordion. He spoke of some instances of personal work, and then of false religions. Then he presented the need of Gospel Churches where the false religions are sweeping in; the Card Call Plan was explained, and an appeal made for it.

ORDER OF THE DAY—Tithing Secretary.

Rev. Edwin Seaman read his report. It was adopted as read. (See Reports)

The Conference Treasurer read his report, and it was adopted as read. (See Reports)

The motion prevailed that we pause for prayer for Miss Marjory Paine, and that the Secretary write Dr. Paine of this action. This was done, and Brother Liddick offered prayer.

There was a reading, by Edwin Seaman, of the minutes of the Committee on Church and Parsonage Building and Location, which report was adopted; and it was voted that these minutes be printed in the Conference minutes.

A short recess was voted.

ORDER OF THE DAY—Houghton Representative.

It was voted to extend the time for the Educational address.

Edwin Seaman was in charge of this period. Rev. Alton Liddick reported the Houghton College interests, emphasizing the strength of the spiritual aspects. Dismissal by Rev. H. Chapman.

Wednesday p. m.

The roll was called.

Rev. Howard Chapman led the devotional service, with Marjean Chapman leading the singing. The Scripture read was from James 5: 16-18, with comments. The minutes of the forenoon sitting were read and approved.

Introduced to the Body were Dr. Reisdorph, Rev. Frank Taylor. Each made brief remarks. Later, Rev. and Mrs. Kenneth Masterman were presented.

ORDER OF THE DAY—Connectional address.

This period was featured with—singing, prayer by Brother Putney, solo sung by Brother Masterman, and the Connectional address by Rev.

Reisdorph. His theme was "Footprints of a Kingdom Builder." He read from chapter one of Nehemiah, and used it as a background for his message. It was a fine message.

Characters passed during the afternoon—Edward Mein, James Keysor, Frank Wright, Howard Chapman and Marjean Chapman.

ORDER OF THE DAY—Camp-meeting Business.

The report of the Camp-meeting Treasurer was received. It was adopted. (See Reports)

The report of the Youth Committee was read by Kenneth Ross.

It was moved that it be accepted, and amended to the effect that it be considered item by item. There was no objection to item 1, 2 and 4. Item 3 was considered at length, and finally approved by vote.

The following were elected as the Youth Commission to serve with the Y. P. President and another member of the youth group:

Charles Dayton, Kenneth Ross and Edwin Seaman.

It was voted that the matter of Campground wiring be referred to the Camp Meeting Committee.

The motion prevailed that we pay Mrs. Josephine Hewitt fifty dollars (\$50) for her work on the Camp Ground.

It was voted to adjourn for Committee work.

Prayer by Brother Wolcott.

Thursday a. m.

Rev. Floyd Tyler led the devotional period. There was a responsive reading of Matthew 18: 1-22, singing, and prayer by Sister Shippee.

The roll was called.

The minutes of the Wednesday afternoon business were read and approved as read.

Rev. Wm. Osgood was introduced, and spoke briefly.

REPORT OF THE TITHING SECRETARY

Dear Friends of the Champlain Conference.

Last year when the Conference elected me as Tithing Secretary I purposed in my heart to do my best in fulfilling the office. I have believed in tithing for years, have seen joy come into homes when they practiced it, have seen people amazed at how God makes the other nine-tenths stretch to meet the needs of the tither and have noticed that those who do not believe in tithing are those who have not tried it or do not practice it.

I not only believe in tithing but I believe in Storehouse tithing. I believe this for three reasons.

1. The Bible teaches it.

2. The Wesleyan Methodist discipline recommends that every church in the denomination adopted it as their financial plan. They must believe it to be the best plan.

3. It works. There is no better plan that I know of.

It was my purpose to bring a tithing message to every church, and I would have been able to, but when we purchased the Ogdensburg church, it seemed that this was going to take too much time from the Heuvelton charge and so we had to stop our travels in the interests of tithing. However, we did visit the following churches: Chichester, Springfield, Schenectady, Watervliet, Northside Cohoes, Fort Miller, Corinth, Bakers Mills, Canaan Hill, Mooers, West Chazy, Cadyville, West Plattsburg and Norfolk. Hadley and Stony Creek joined in the service at Corinth and the other churches of St. Lawrence Country in the service at Norfolk at a county Holiness meeting.

Our travels took us 1638 miles and we received \$98.33 in offerings.

I would recommend that someone else be elected to the office this year since I will probably be busy with two churches. It would be an advantage if it could be done by some pastor who had someone else in his church who could supply for him while he is traveling in the interest of tithing so that the home church would not suffer.

Recommendations

1. That the Conference have a full time traveling President.
2. That the President be granted two weeks vacation with pay, and be given permission to hold not more than two meetings during the year, outside the Conference.
3. That the President's salary be fifty-two dollars (\$52) per week, plus telephone, fuel, lights, and traveling expense not to exceed five cents per mile for the service of the Conference.
4. That the Conference be divided into four districts as follows:
 - Northern—Cadyville, Canaan Hill, Cooks Corners, Malone, Mooers, West Chazy, West Plattsburg.
 - St. Lawrence—Brookdale, Lisbon, East Pitcairn, Heuvelton, Macomb, Morley, Colton, Norfolk, Ogdensburg.
 - Central—Bakers Mills, Brant Lake, Chittenden, Corinth, Cambridge, Forestdale, Fort Miller, Glens Falls, Hague, Hadley, Long Lake, Stony Creek, Ticonderoga, West Sandgate.
 - Southern—Acorn Hill, Chichester, Cobleskill, Northside, Springfield,

Schenectady, Watervliet, Willow, Wyantskill, Catskill.

5. That the Conference Budget be four dollars (\$4) per member, and be raised quarterly if possible.

6. That any church engaging the President for revival meetings shall send the offerings direct to the Conference Treasurer. These offerings shall be above Budget.

7. That Ogdensburg be the pioneer church of the year; and that its pastor, Rev. Edwin Seaman, be authorized to travel the Conference and raise money for the project; that this money be listed under Conference Missions (Item VIII of the Pastor's Report).

8. That all monies raised to subsidize or build, repair new or old churches or parsonages be listed under Conference Missions.

9. Last year Cobleskill was voted \$175.00. The church did not use that money, but was obliged to borrow \$150 of the Conference to meet an emergency payment on mortgage. The Committee recommends that this \$150.00 be paid by the Conference to make up the balance to be used toward painting the parsonage.

10. That Norfolk receive dollar for dollar toward liquidating the parsonage debt, if paid in one year. The debt is \$270.

11. That churches send their pastor to the Refresher Course, and that the church assist the pastor as far as possible in expenses.

12. That the Conference underwrite the rent for parsonages at Cambridge and Catskill to the extent of \$425 each. The money from the Wolcott fund to be used toward the Cambridge rent.

13. That we assist the Chittenden charge fifty dollars (\$50) toward painting the parsonage.

14. That we assist the Chichester Charge in moving the Pastor.

15. That the Conference assist the Fort Miller Church to the extent of fifty dollars (\$50) toward moving the pastor.

We rejoice in the glorious revivals in this country and other countries, and gladly fellowship any who believe in an inspired Bible, Divine Saviour, a personal experience of salvation manifested by a holy life.

Be it resolved that we will also maintain our testimony on points of doctrine they never, or seldom, touch, such as entire sanctification and the necessity of continued faith and obedience to avoid final and fatal apostasy.

Finally: be it resolved that, as one of the oldest Conferences in the oldest of the holiness churches, we will maintain the truth of Holiness not merely in our creed, but also in our lives, and so earn the encomium of being not only "holiness" people, but holy people.

REPORT OF THE YOUTH COMMISSION

The Youth Commission delegated by the 111th session of the Champlain to study the overall youth situation submits the following report:

The Youth Committee composed of Edwin Seaman, Charles Dayton, Kenneth Ross, Thomas Boghosian, Isabelle Hayes met October 15, 1953 at Long Lake, N. Y., and again June 29th at West Chazy, N. Y. to discuss the solution of promoting a suitable youth program for our Conference and Camp meeting at West Chazy, N. Y.

In studying the situation we recognize the following problems: 1. Improper supervision and entertainment of young people of all age groups; 2. Insufficient number of workers who are not engaged in Conference business; 3. Insufficient class room and recreational facilities.

Is a separate Youth Camp advisable?

RECOMMENDATIONS:

(1) Since it is our understanding that the Conference and Camp are engaging a full time youth worker, this problem is partially solved. (2) That the Camp-meeting Committee provide supervision for children under 12 years of age.

2. That as far as practical we engage teachers for classes from those not in the main body of Conference.

3. (1) Whereas the Women's Missionary Society now uses the Youth Tabernacle during conference, and the Youth group has out-grown this building, we recommend that we erect a building 30' x 60' for a Youth center. This building shall have sidewalls 8' high, with a platform wide enough to allow one class to be held on it if necessary; two classes can be held in the main area. We suggest that this be a shelter type building with three open sides, platform end closed in; OR—ANY TYPE OF BUILDING THAT THE COMMITTEE FEELS DESIRABLE.

Upon approval by this body we further recommend that a commission be continued to plan and execute the building of this center. We also recommend that this commission meet as soon as possible with the Camp-meeting Committee to formulate plans for financing and constructing this building.

4. Inasmuch as many young people who are working desire to attend Conference and Camp-meeting and then the rest of the season to apply themselves to their jobs, and the fact that the Pastors provide much of the

transportation to and from Camp, a separate Youth Camp does not seem feasible at this time. The expression of the Youth Conference of 1953 was unfavorable to a separate Youth Camp.

MINUTES OF THE CONFERENCE BOARD ON CHURCH AND PARSONAGE BUILDING AND LOCATION

July 10, 1953 Administration Building, West Chazy, New York

The Conference Board on Church and Parsonage Building and Location met at West Chazy, N. Y. on July 10, 1953. All members present. The members for the new year being Reginald Hewitt, Charles Dayton, Arthur Northrup, Sr., Floyd Tyler, and Edwin Seaman. Edwin Seaman was re-elected secretary.

A motion was made and carried that all churches desiring to build or improve property to exceed \$1000.00 must submit plans and a sketch if possible to the Church and Parsonage Building and Location Committee.

Rev. Kenneth Ross presented plans for the expansion of the church at Watervliet. This is to be a full basement, app. 36' by 35', with a brick veneer superstructure, which is to provide for added S. S. rooms and pulpit and platform space. A motion was made and carried that they be permitted to proceed with their plans.

Rev. Charles Dayton presented plans for a hall at Corinth 40' by 60' to house the S. S. bus, Pastor's car, toilets, S. S. rooms, and fellowship rooms. The estimated cost is \$6,000.00. \$1,000.00 is to be raised before building so that the indebtedness will not exceed \$5,000.00. A motion was made and carried that they be permitted to proceed with their plans.

Rev. Reginald Hewitt reported about a Baptist church at Halfmoon that might be available if it was anything that we wanted. A motion prevailed that the purchase of this church be left in the hands of the President.

The Conference Board on Church and Parsonage Building and Location met at Glens Falls, N. Y. on September 7, 1953. Members present were Reginald Hewitt, Charles Dayton, Floyd Tyler and Edwin Seaman.

A letter from Malone was read asking for permission to build a new entrance and to paint a portion of the Malone Church. The Board voted to grant this permission.

A motion was made and approved that the Conference buy ten gallons of paint for the Norfolk Church if the people of that church will put it on.

The proposition of starting a new work at Catskill was discussed. Rev. Ross sent an estimate of the cost of a portable tabernacle which was read as follows:

"The total looks like \$1275.29 at prevailing prices. Here is the type

of construction—Concrete floor 24' x 40' with row of blocks around the outside to serve as forms; 8' studs 16" O.C.; 2" x 6" rafters 24" O.C.; $\frac{1}{4}$ pitch roof with asphalt shingles on roll roofing; homasote board outside and inside with exception of ceiling which is celotex raised up into the gable 2' giving a 10' ceiling in the center; three windows on each side and two in the front; 2-3' doors in front; ceiling and side walls insulated with Kimsul. Wiring and lights will cost extra, however, it should not run too high if our own men can do it. Steel chairs will cost about \$250.00 more. It looks like we would have \$1800 to \$2000 in it when completed." A motion was approved that when President Hewitt and Rev. Ross deem it a secure proposition that we erect a portable tabernacle at Catskill.

A motion was also approved that if Willow starts extensive decorating program the conference give \$100 towards it.

The Conference President, Rev. Reginald Hewitt, contacted each member of the board relative to the work at Catskill, New York. It was unanimously agreed that a building there should be rented for the present and services held. Rev. Kenneth Ross and George Koch to be in charge of the services.

Rev. Hewitt was appointed to see to the rental of the building.

January 25, 1954—Heuvelton, New York

The Conference Board on Church and Parsonage Building and Location met at Heuvelton, N. Y. on Jan. 25, 1954.

Members present: Reginald Hewitt, Charles Dayton, Floyd Tyler, Edwin Seaman.

Members absent: Arthur Northrup. Mr. Northrup wanted to attend but couldn't because of a previous engagement. However, he reported that he knew about the building and was in favor of its purchase if the rest of the committee felt that the purchase price was right.

After a dinner at the Heuvelton parsonage, the group drove to Ogdensburg where they looked over the building in question.

This building is the former No. 6 school house of Ogdensburg situated on the corner of David and Congress St. It is a large two room school which would convert into an auditorium approximately 24' by 54' with an annex on back app. 16' x 40' which could ultimately be the beginning of a parsonage. There is a full basement under the auditorium. Electricity and city water are already in the building although the fixtures and plumbing are gone. The building seems to be sound with good walls and straight lines to the building everywhere. It would need, however, new windows, plumbing, light fixtures, a heating system, paint and redecoration.

The owner, Mr. Ben Brown of Massena, asked \$7,000 for the building. The Board felt that this was too much.

Charles Dayton made the motion which was seconded by Floyd Tyler and approved by the board that we purchase the building if possible but not to exceed \$5,000 in the purchase price.

A motion was made by Edwin Seaman and seconded by Charles Dayton and approved by the board that the Conference President Rev. Reginald Hewitt be authorized to see to the purchase of the building and to borrow money for the payment of it. He appointed Edwin Seaman to do the preliminary work of purchase since he was living near Ogdensburg.

The meeting was adjourned with prayer.

Standing Rules

1. The Resolutions of this Conference shall be printed in the Minutes of the Conference each year.

2. All visiting members of our own, or other Churches in harmony with our principles, shall be invited to honorary seats in the Conference.

3. The Conference Secretary shall receive fifty dollars (\$50) per year for his labor and incidental expenses.

4. The Conference Treasurer shall receive fifty dollars (\$50) per year for his services in caring for the funds.

5. In making his report, the Conference Treasurer is authorized to close his books one week before Conference session.

The Treasurer of the Superannuate Ministers' Relief Association also shall close his books one week before the Conference Session.

6. All monies disbursed by the Conference Treasurer during the interim of Conference shall be upon order of the President, except in case of payment to the President, when such order shall be issued by the Vice President. It is understood that any payment ordered by the Conference direct may be paid by the Treasurer without an order as directed above.

7. No monies shall be loaned by the Conference Treasurer except by order of the Conference, or by the consent of the President and his Advisory Board.

8. Each Elder shall make his engagement as Pastor with the understanding that if he be elected Conference President he shall be released from his engagement as Pastor within the period of three months following his election.

9. The first Sunday of each month shall be known as Missions Sunday, the Sunday School offerings to go alternately to Home Missions and Conference Missions, in that order, and be sent to the Conference Treasurer. (The Committee on Finances defines "Conference Missions" as the establishing of new and (or) subsidizing of the needy fields of the Conference.)

10. In securing Evangelists for the Camp Meeting the Camp-Meeting Committee is privileged to secure not more than one worker outside the Denomination.

11. The Camp-Meeting Committee shall be composed of the Conference President, as Chairman, and three ministers and three laymen, all

to be elected by ballot, the term of each office to be three years, the time of one minister and one layman expiring each year; also the President of the Missionary Society and the President of the Y.P.S. shall be members of this Committee.

12. Pastors shall state financial items in their statistical reports in even dollars, except in items affecting the Budget; and as far as possible are requested to report all Budget items in even dollars. When such rule is not followed, the Statistical Secretaries are authorized to drop decimals, except as provided above.

13. The Committee on Credentials shall secure from each delegate the necessary credentials as provided by our Discipline, with Post Office address of the same.

14. The closing Sunday of the Conference year shall be the Sunday following the beginning of the Annual Conference. The Pastor's salary for this closing Sunday shall be paid by the Church of which he is Pastor; and for the Sunday of the new Conference year it shall be paid by the Charge to which he is going.

15. Newly elected Conference Officers take office after the close of the Conference Sunday.

16. The Conference shall include in the Orders of the Day a special period to consider Camp-Meeting business.

17. A Nominating Committee shall be elected to consider and nominate all elective Officers of the Conference. The Committee shall consist of four Elders and four laymen. The report of the Nominating Committee shall be read to the Conference the day preceding the election.

18. The delegate's credentials shall be sent to the Committee on Credentials BEFORE THE OPENING DAY OF CONFERENCE, and the Conference Treasurer shall send printed blanks with the Statistical, Character, etc.

19. The Conference recommends that each Charge grant its Pastor two weeks vacation, and also grant him permission to hold a two weeks meeting (over two Sundays) away from his local Charge—both vacation and meeting to be without loss of pay, and exclusive of Annual Conference and Camp meeting.

20. The first Sunday in May shall be PASTORAL VOTE SUNDAY.

21. CHURCH EXTENSION. (1) The Conference President shall act as Pioneer Secretary. (This does not create the office of Pioneer Secretary.) The Conference Board on Church and Parsonage Building and

Location shall be the Church Extension Committee.

(2) There shall be at least one Church Extension service on each Charge in the Conference this year, at which time all of the Church Extension activities within the Conference shall be presented. This service shall be under the supervision of the Conference President, or one whom he may appoint.

Any person traveling the Conference in the interest of Church Extension must be appointed and under the direction of the Conference President. Those thus appointed to travel the Conference in the interest of Church Extension shall receive not to exceed five cents per mile.

(3) All offerings taken for Church Extension shall be forwarded to the Conference Treasurer, and credited to CONFERENCE MISSIONS. The Conference Treasurer, upon recommendation of the Conference President and the Committee on Church Extension, shall disburse these funds. Any designated funds can be disbursed by notice received in writing from the Conference President.

(4) Whereas the W.Y.P.S. is an organization that is aggressively supporting the Conference Pioneer projects, we recommend that as far as possible all monies for Pioneer work be passed through the local W.Y.P.S. Treasurer to the Treasurer of the Champlain Conference.

We further recommend that the local Church Extension program be sponsored by the local W.Y.P.S., as far as possible.

22. During the year each Sunday School shall take an offering for the maintenance of the Conference President's home.

23. The Conference President shall be ex-officio member of the Board on Church and Parsonage Building and Location; the term of the other members shall be two years each, the term of two members expiring each year.

24. No new business shall be introduced to the Conference Body after Friday noon, without a two thirds vote of the Body.

25. Our Conference shall meet for its Annual Session the first Tuesday after the last Monday in June, except the years of the General Conference. On such years our Conference shall begin the second Tuesday following the General Conference.

26. Each Church member over 14 years of age shall be apportioned fifty-two cents per year for CONFERENCE MISSIONS.

27. (NEW) STATISTICAL REPORT

May 25th shall be considered the close of the Conference year for Statistical purposes. By June second the Pastor shall send to the Conference Treasurer all monies and receipts, with both copies of his report

made out (except the Budget items, which the Treasurer will fill in and sign.)

The Conference Treasurer, in turn, shall pass the reports to the Auditor of Statistical report by June 9th. The Auditor shall correct the reports, and shall pass one copy to the Statistician, and one copy back to the Pastor by June 16th.

He also shall send to the Apportionment Committee the membership of the Churches, Sunday Schools and W.Y.P.S. The Statistician and Auditor shall give Pastors opportunity to explain apparent errors until the time the Conference convenes.

Campground Rules

General Rules

Ever bear in mind that these grounds and buildings are church property, and respect them as such.

The religious services are for your benefit—take advantage of them.

Only young people who come at the recommendation of their pastor will be permitted the benefits of the Young People's Financial Plan.

Each young person is required to attend the regular Young People's Meeting; also—the evening service, and one other service during the day.

I. Care of Grounds

1. Place waste paper and garbage only in containers provided. Do not throw it on the grounds.

2. Waste paper and other refuse may be burned only in drums provided for this purpose.

3. Empty waste water in appointed place—at back of the grounds. Do not throw it out the window or on the grounds.

4. Do your part toward keeping the grounds around your cottage or dormitory neat and looking clean.

II. Personal Conduct

1. The use of tobacco, profanity, obscene literature, card playing and gambling are prohibited on the Campgrounds.

2. Wearing apparel must be modest at all times. The wearing of slacks, shorts, gym clothes or bathing suits is prohibited on the grounds.

Men are requested to wear shirts, and ladies to wear hose.

III. Dormitory and Cottage Rules

1. Campers are requested to be in their rooms for the night at 10:30 unless engaged in the tabernacle.

2. The rights of your neighbors must be respected; therefore, quiet must prevail in all rooms and dormitories.

3. Remember that there are others who will occupy these rooms after you; therefore, keep them clean, and leave them in good condition.

4. Because of fire hazards, there must be no cooking of food in the dormitories.

Two invitations were received for the spring Conventions. They were from Corinth and West Chazy.

1. Sponsorship of The Mile of Dimes Project to furnish Missionary Hospital equipment and a Rotation of cars for the foreign field.

She also requested that we continue to encourage our women to save coupons.

Mrs. Ruth Saunders conducted a question Box period.

We voted to adjourn.

Special Meeting

Executive Committee Meetings

The first Executive Committee meeting was held at the Northrup Cottage on July 3, 1953.

It was voted that we give Mrs. Josephine Hewitt \$25.00 for her services as matron of Dormitories.

We also recommended that the Pioneer fund be turned over to the Conference Church Extension Committee to be used as they see fit, preferably in Catskill for a portable Tabernacle. District Conventions were discussed and we agreed to try and secure the Landrey's for the speakers. The time of such Convention was to be left to the decision of the President.

The Executive Committee met for a brief business session at the District Convention at Hague, February 26, 1954.

At that time it was voted to give the Earls \$75.00 from the General Fund of the Conference Treasury. The District Conventions were discussed.

A third Executive Committee Meeting was held at Watervliet on May 14, 1954. We discussed the car accident of Gracia Fero and her need for another car. It was decided to let the matter rest until Conference time. We voted to give the Landrys \$50.00 plus their transportation, and to give Dr. Birch \$10.00 as a love offering.

The Executive Committee met in the Small Tabernacle on July 1, 1954. Mrs. Ruth Hill led in prayer. We voted to continue the support of Mrs. Nora Witthuhn for another year.

The wisdom of continuing District Conventions was discussed. We voted to hold them for another year.

Mrs. Stevenson was requested to contact Dr. Birch as to our policy regarding payment for Missionary speakers who visit our Conference session.

The problem of Gracia Fero's car was again discussed. No action was taken. We voted to adjourn.

The Service was opened by singing "Rescue the Perishing" led by our Song Leader, Kenneth Masterman. Mrs. Vina Hewitt led in prayer. "More Like the Master" was sung by a choir made up of "Preacher's Partners."

And now for Conference Activities:

Report No. 6

PLAN OF WORK

For each local W.M.S. we recommend:

1. The election of consecrated officers of vision to carry on a work which is ever new and challenging.
2. The use of program calendars and other prepared helps.
3. The efficiency standard, plan of work and standing rules be read twice a year, once during the first quarter and once during the last quarter of the Conference year.
4. That a day of fasting and prayer be observed monthly, and that an active prayer partner group be formed. (Report on this group to be submitted within 60 days after Conference.)
5. That arrangements be made with the Pastor for one missionary prayer meeting each month.
6. The election of a Mission Study Secretary, who will keep a record of all reading done in the prescribed reading course, reporting statistics to the Conference Mission Study Secretary by the 15th of January.
7. That each society respond to the Card Call plan by subscribing as a group in addition to those already receiving the Card Call.
8. That the men of the Church be encouraged to promote missionary work in their own Wesleyan Men's Fellowship. In the event that there is no such group they should be urged to join the W.M.S. as honorary members. Also, all effort should be made to foster interest in public missionary meetings.
9. The continuation of supporting worthwhile projects, such as sending goods, usable clothing, notions, pictures and medical supplies to our home missionaries, forwarding Sunday School Charts and flannelgraph material to our foreign fields, and the preparation of exhibits to be displayed at Conference and sent to home and foreign missionary stations. These exhibits shall be packed for mailing at the close of Conference, the postage being paid from the Conference Treasury. (It is considerate to contact the missionaries as to urgent needs).

10. The sending of necessary supplies to the Campground as listed below: Stainless steel silverware (no table spoons), chef's aprons, large pot holders (10 in by 10 in.), dish towels, throw rugs, bedding, (pillows, sheets, all sizes), money for restaurant glasses, money for plastic goods and linoleum for worker's cottages, dresser scarfs.

11. That the financial obligation of each member be stated clearly as follows:

- a. Dues of \$1.00 to be sent directly to the Conference Treasurer.
- b. Pioneer project, amounting to the equivalent of 10¢ per member per month or \$1.20 annually to be sent to the Conference W.M.S. Treasurer.
- c. An annual amount equal to 25¢ per member to be used as general administrative, also to be sent to the Conference W.M.S. Treasurer.

12. That special attention be given to the penny-a-meal fund which provides for the support of our missionary, Mrs. Witthuhn—that prayer and love be mingled with generous giving.

13. Money disbursed receiving no budget credit be listed as follows:

- a. Gen. Administrative fund.
- b. Penny A Day funds
- c. Card Call
- d. Pioneer fund

14. Since our witness for Christ is to begin in Jerusalem, let us seek to win souls in our home communities by personal work, calling on new families, inviting others to our meetings, and thoughtful service to others.

15. That special interest, prayer and financial help be given to meet the urgent need of evangelism of the Jews.

Standing Rules

1. The Standing Rules of the Conference Missionary Society shall be printed in the Conference minutes each year.

2. The local treasurer is to send a statistical blank to the statistician two weeks before Conference convenes. Send the delegates credentials to the Conference Missionary Secretary two weeks before Conference. Receipts and disbursements must be made to balance before being sent, also rating according to efficiency standard. Take one blank home after Conference to read to the local society.

3. The voting body shall be composed of Conference officers, Y.M. W.B. Superintendent, Presidents of local societies, lady pastors, pastor's wives, and one delegate from each society.

4. The plan of work shall be read quarterly to our local societies to keep us enthused in our work.

5. We recommend that the Treasurer of the Conference Society be elected as a Committee of Remembrance with the authority to send flowers or other suitable tribute to those of our number who shall be called to their eternal reward. We further recommend that this shall include pastor's wives and officers of our Conference Missionary Society.

6. That at a meeting before Conference, when officers for the coming year are elected, a delegate (other than the Church delegate, if possible) be elected, whose room and board for the Conference week shall be provided by the local society. She shall be instructed as to the amount of the pledge for missions and her report shall be given at the first meeting after Conference.

7. That the dues of \$1.00 per member shall be sent directly to the Conference Treasurer, 50¢ of which shall be divided by her and applied on the budget, half home and half foreign unless otherwise specified, and that all monies and vouchers be sent to the Conference Treasurer at least quarterly.
