Tuesday, 9:30 A. M.

OPENING—The Tennessee Annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church convened for its twenty-eighth annual session on the Campground at 9:30 A. M., Tuesday July 16, 1957.

Conference was called to order by the President, Rev. M. L. Arnold. Rev. D. P. Denton conducted devotions. Roll was called with 13 Elders, 3 Conference Preachers, and 19 Delegates responding. Mrs. Juanita Cronnon, Mrs. Orbie Denton, and Mrs. Madalyn Johnson were seated as alternate delegates.

It was voted that the first four rows of seats forward be the Bar of Conference.

REPORT—Rev. Harold K. Sheets, General Representative, was called to the Chair. Minutes were read and approved. M. L. Arnold, Conference President reported. Rev. Arnold's report was adopted with rising vote of thanks. Conference President gave his financial report, which was received and referred to the Auditing Committee. (See Report No. 1).

CONFERENCE OFFICIALS—Chair called for Orders of the Day. Conference Officials and Standing Committees were elected. (See Conference Officials on Page 3).

ADVISORY BOARD—Conference President nominated and Conference elected Charles Haire and George Harris to Advisory Board.

GENERAL ADDRESS—Orders of the Day arrived. Rev. Harold K. Sheets brought the General Address, giving an interesting review of denominational interests and stressing the truths that we are all children of God, a holiness people, a church people, and Wesleyan Methodist.

Conference called to order. Roll called.

REPORTS—Reports of Thomas Hampton and Thomas Arnold were heard.

PARAGRAPH 46 OF DISCIPLINE—Conference voted unanimously to approve the inclusion of the sentence "The wearing of clothing which does not modestly and properly clothe the person" in Paragraph 46 of the Discipline. Voted that local churches shall vote on this amendment at the first quarterly meeting.

PASTORS' MONTHLY REPORTS—Voted to continue monthly reporting system for pastors to Conference President as used for Progress Reporter, and that results be published in Conference Tidings as it may be possible to do.

MISSIONARY BOARD—Report of Missionary Board adopted as read. (See Report No. 5).

CHILD EVANGELISM DIRECTOR—Sunday School Board nominated and Conference elected Miss Grace Winebarger Director of Child Evangelism.

SUNDAY SCHOOL SECRETARY—Sunday School Secretary gave an oral report, which was received by the Conference.

COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS—Committee on Resolutions reported. Voted by two-thirds standing vote to delete from item 28 the following clause: "and that his duties to the new charge begin with Sunday immediately following the close of Conference." (See Resolutions).

MORAL REFORM—Report of Committee on Moral Reform was adopted as read. (See Report No. 6).

REPORTS—Savannah report was read by delegate. Clyde Scott, Honorary Delegate, read report of Hinton Street Mission. Report of Mildred Thomas was heard.

COURTESY—Committee on Courtesy presented Mrs. Harold K. Sheets and Mr. and Mrs. Ellerman.

REPORTS—Reports of Paul Cox, Carl Reed, and L. C. Elbell were heard. General Evangelists D. P. Denton and James Bender reported. Committee on Itineracy and Elders Orders recommended and Conference voted to change time of Ordination Service to 10 A. M. Thursday. Adjourned.

Wednesday, 7:30 P. M.

The Conference Sermon was preached by Rev. A. L. Lowrance. Rev. Lowrance brought a very awakening message on Liberalism. He spoke on the affects and results of liberalism; also, the remedy which is the cleansing of every heart by the blood of Jesus.

Thursday, 8:30 A. M.

Time of devotions was given to song service and season of prayer. Roll called. Minutes read and adopted.

REPORTS—Reports of A. C. Clemens and C. W. McNally were heard.

COMMITTEE ON THANKS—The Committee on Thanks read its report, which was adopted. (See Report No. 7).

COMMITTEE ON RELIGIOUS SERVICES—Committee on Religious Services read its report, which was adopted with rising vote of thanks. (See Report No. 8).

STATISTICS—The Statistician read his report, which was adopted with rising vote of thanks. (See under Statistics).

W. M. S. REPORT—Mrs. C. G. Blackburn read the W. M. S. treasurer's report, which was adopted. (See W. M. S. Minutes).

W. Y. REPORT—Reports of W. Y. Treasurer, Mrs. Earl Baker, and W. Y. President, Rev. Carl Reed were heard and adopted. (See W. Y. Minutes).

CAMP MEETING ASSOCIATION—Partial report of Camp Meeting Association was adopted as read. (See complete minutes of Camp Meeting Association on page 18).

SUNDAY SCHOOL SECRETARY—Sunday School Secretary gave an oral report of his year's work.

COMMITTEE ON ITINERACY AND ORDERS—The Committee on Itineracy and Elders Orders gave a partial report, recommending that J. T. DeArmond having met the requirement be elected to Elders Orders and ordained at this conference session. Report was adopted. Recessed to Orders of the Day.

ORDINATION SERVICE—Service was opened by singing. Prayer was offered by Rev. S. D. Herron. The ordination sermon was preached by Harold K. Sheets. He spoke on "The Making of a Minister." Following the sermon, the Conference ordained J. T. DeArmond as Elder in the Wesleyan Methodist Church.

Thursday, 5 P. M.

Conference called to order.

COMMITTEE ON ITINERACY AND ORDERS—The Committee on Itineracy and Elders Orders gave its report, which was adopted. (See Report No. 9).

PASTORAL RELATIONS—The Committee on Pastoral Relations gave its report, which was adopted. (See Report No. 10).

AUDITING COMMITTEE—The Auditing Committee reported that the Conference Tidings Business Manager's books had been audited and found in order. Report adopted. S. D. Herron, Tidings Business Manager, read his report which was adopted.

Voted to issue A. C. Clemens duplicate Elders Orders due to misplacement of credentials.

CONFERENCE TIDINGS—Voted to continue Conference Tidings, giving Business Manager authority to charge churches additional amount if cost of materials increase during the year. Voted that Missionary Board be responsible for arrangements for printing.

Voted that Conference President and Secretary be authorized to correct and prepare minutes for publication.

Upon motion, Conference adjourned sine die. Benediction;

RESOLUTION AND LAWS OF THE TENNESSEE CONFERENCE

We, the Committee on Resolutions, submit the following report: Be it resolved, that these articles shall become the standing rules and law of this Conference:

1. Before a local building committee proceeds with a building plan or program that they be required to have all plans approved by the President and his Advisory Board and the Missionary Board; and further, that no financial obligations be assumed without the consent of the Conference Trustees.

2. That the Board of Conference Trustees be, and they are hereby empowered, to sign all papers necessary for the sale or transfer of Conference, Church or Parsonage property, proving the said sale of transfer is authorized by the President and his Advisory Board and shall not violate the spirit of paragraphs 386, 387 of our Book of Discipline.

3. The Board of Conference Trustees are hereby authorized to execute papers to secure funds for the liquidation of Conference, Church or Parsonage indebtedness, providing that the Churches set forth in writing the amount and the purposes for which the loan is to be used; and that no funds so secured shall be used for any other purpose than that set forth in the notice to the trustees of the Conference.

4. When a deed for Conference, Church or Parsonage property is received and before it is recorded it shall be referred to the President and his Advisory Board who are hereby designated as a Deed Examining Committee whose duty shall be to examine the deed and see that there are such disciplinary clauses included as may be necessary to make the property secure to our Church. Said Committee shall have power to engage such legal advice as may be needed to insure the proper steps regarding the reception or transfer of the property. See paragraphs 388, 389 of present Book of Discipline.

5. We shall proclaim with voice and pen and holy living the gospel of full salvation, recognizing our dependence upon, and need of the indwelling power and presence of the Holy Spirit.

6. We shall continue to interpret the teachings of the Scriptures and the Special Rules of the Discipline in accord with the standards held by the early Methodists and the Wesleyans of the past generations. To this end we reaffirm our stand against the reception of any member as a full member who wears jewelry, including the wedding band or other unnecessary ornaments, and declare ourselves in favor of higher standards of dress, and other world manifestations on the person. Our ministers are asked to refrain from performing wedding ceremonies using the ring, and to be positive in their declarations regarding this entering wedge of worldliness. We further declare our opposition to such things as commercialized ball games, Sabbath desecration, theatres, television, and such like, and shall support our ministers in their endeavors to counteract these menaces. We further urge our ministers to take an active stand in exposing the three "C's" of the world—Communism, Catholicism, and Compromise.

7. We urge all Conference Preachers and Elders to become members of the Women's Missionary Society, and that the pastors attend each meeting and encourage the women, this being one of the strong arms of the Church.

8. Each Church shall make a special effort in behalf, and loyally support the Church Extension Card Plan.

9. EACH PASTOR, OR CHARGE, SHALL HAVE IN THE HANDS OF THE STATISTICAL SECRETARY NOT LESS THAN FIVE DAYS BEFORE THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE, ONE COPY OF HIS STATISTICAL REPORT IN FULL. This report shall be accompanied by a statement from the Conference Treasurer giving the amounts paid on budget under item VIII in the pastor's statistical report, and the pastor's report must check with that of the Conference Treasurer.

10. The Conference Treasurer's books shall close on June 30 of each year and no credit shall be given on the Budget for that fiscal year for money received after this date.

11. The President's Secretary's and Treasurer's correspondence expenses shall be paid from the Conference Fund by the Conference Treasurer.

12. Minutes of this Conference shall be published through arrangements made by the Missionary Board and delivered to the pastors in numbers equal to 50% of their Church membership.

13. Preachers and Delegates shall remain throughout the entire Conference session unless providentially hindered or excused by the Conference.

14. All Elders received from other denominations shall be required to pass examination on our Book of Discipline, and must have passed a course of study which is equivalent to our course for ordination, and harmonize with our theological views. They shall give special attention to the requirements found in paragraphs 171 of our Book of Discipline.

15. Copies of these resolutions, together with the apportionments and the addresses of the President, Secretary and Treasurer, shall be in the hands of each pastor within two weeks of the close of the Annual Conference. The Conference Secretary be authorized to carry out this resolution.

16. Pastors shall mail all Delegates' credentials to the Conference Secretary not less than five (5) days before convening of Conference.

17. The Conference Budget shall be raised and remitted monthly to the Conference Treasurer.

18. All monies which are reported through the Conference Treasurer shall be set to him either as cash or receipts and he shall give Conference Treasurer's receipt for each item, and no money shall be listed paid out by the Treasurer except by check, on order of the President, and he shall be required to present cancelled checks and vouchers for each bill paid.

19. Those wishing to take examinations in the Course of Study for credit during any year, shall write for questions before May 31 of that year, and shall have the answers in the hands of the proper instructor before June 30 for credit for that year. The Committee on Itineracy and Orders shall not be expected to send out questions or accept papers after these dates.

20. It shall be a standing rule that the Secretary shall be remunerated the sum of \$50.00 for each session of Conference. We recommend that the Conference Treasurer be given \$25.00 per year for services.

21. We recommend that when the Conference President labors as an evangelist in any of our Churches, he be paid as other evangelists are paid.

22. Each unorganized work which is being run under the direction of the Conference and served by a member of this body, shall be allowed to elect an honorary delegate who shall be permitted to sit with the Conference and speak on matters of business, but not allowed to vote.

23. The Conference President shall be required to hold **Quarterly Business Meetings** at all unorganized works that are under the Conference Missionary Board or with the Conference, and the pastors of these works shall receive an offering quarterly to be sent to the Conference Treasurer and used toward the President's salary. Treasurers of these unorganized works shall be members of some Wesleyan Methodist Church unless otherwise approved by the Conference Missionary Board.

24. In order to help maintain the spirit of brotherhood among our members and ministers, we ask that designations of titles, degrees and authority be omitted both in our public meetings and in the printed minutes, except in the first public introduction of each individual.

25. The Committee on Itinerary and Elders' Orders will be responsible for the time, place, and program of the Ministerial Convention each year.

26. The Conference President and his Advisory Board is a constituted committee on Special Orders.

27. As television is a satanic miracle to wreck the Christian Faith, our ministers are asked to take a stand against it, preach against it, and condemn it, and that no minister or delegate be elected to office who has a television set or who is in favor of it. And, we recommend the local churches hold the same standard.

28. That outgoing pastor's responsibility continue through the Sunday following Annual Conference. Also, that a church allow its pastor at least two meetings away from the church and that he be given at least one week's vacation with pay; that last provision to include the Conference President.

29. That no budget credit be given until payment is itemized, or otherwise specified.

30. Before any of these resolutions and laws of the Tennessee Conference can be changed or repealed, it shall require a two-thirds standing vote of the Conference body.

Report of the President to the Twenty-eighth Annual Conference of the Tennessee Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America.

Brethren in Christ, Greetings:

We want to take care not to sound pessimistic in this report, yet we do want to be factual. In many respects this has not been a good year on our conference. Our look at the past may tend to be discouraging, but we are not living in the past. The future is before us, God still lives and the Gospel is the same. Let us determine to go out from this conference session with such a baptism of love and power that we will be insulated against doubt, discouragement and defeat, and equipped to wage an offensive war on the entrenched evils of our day.

Our Official Acts:

July 20, 1956, appointed O. H. Crabb pastor at Corinth.

July 20, 1956, appointed C. D. Reynolds pastor at Freedom Hill-Rockdale.

August 15, 1956, appointed C. W. McNally pastor Shadeland Mission.

August 29, 1956, appointed Paul Cox pastor at Mascot.

September 15, 1956, appointed David E. Denton to Conference Evangelism.

October 6, 1956, received a group of 11 members, which had been organized at Savannah, Tennessee by D. P. Denton, and declared them a Wesleyan Methodist Church. They desire to be called the Savannah Wesleyan Methodist Church.

October 10, 1956, appointed A. L. Kight pastor at Temple.

October 13, 1956, granted a letter of standing to R. E. Rice, Elder.

December 11, 1956, appointed H. A. Harvey pastor at Clinton, due to E. B. Carnes having withdrawn.

February 15, 1957, appointed Mildred Thomas pastor at Erwin to supply. This was because of the withdrawal of R. E. Rice.

March 2, 1957, appointed Carl Reed pastor at Crossville.

Other Activities:

We supplied Crossville until March. We have served as Editor of the Tidings. Assisted in Youth Camp. Attended part of the Interdenominational Convention at Chattanooga; the Harvest Day activities at Central College in connection with a meeting of the Committee on Home for the Aged. We helped edit and publish the Conference Minutes; took part in Conference Ministerial Convention at Rockwood; attended Southern Area Convention at Central, South Carolina, and traveled with a Missionary group and a Youth group in Conference Rallies. We spent one week-end with Rev. J. A. Cassidy in his work in the West Tennessee Mission.

We conducted 47 quarterly conferences; held six week-end meetings, one youth week revival, and approximately 20 meetings with various committees.

We preached approximately 140 times and travelled approximately 22,000 miles in carrying on the work of the Conference and Camp.

REPORT V

REPORT OF MISSIONARY BOARD

The Missionary Board of the Conference transacted the following business during the Conference year:

July 12, 1956:

1. Authorized the payment of the moving expense of Rev. Luther Elbell to the Byrds Chapel Church. M. L. Arnold and S. D. Herron were designated as a committee to negotiate on future moving bills of preachers coming to small churches of the Conference.

2. Authorized the finishing of the Conference parsonage out of the Conference Parsonage Fund, or the Conference Fund.

3. Authorized the underwriting of a pioneer revival at Savannah, Tennessee to the extent of \$250.00. Also, the extending of aid as possible on rent and building if the meeting justified the continuing of the services and erection of a church.

4. Voted to extend to the Temple Church any aid and financial assistance possible in the relocating of the Church.

5. Voted to establish a monthly conference paper at a rate to be determined by the editor and business manager. Rev. M. L. Arnold was designated Editor; Rev. S. D. Herron, Business Manager; and the Conference W. M. S. President, W. Y. President, and Sunday School Secretary were designated contributing editors. The name of the paper was left to be selected by the Editor and Business Manager.

6. Voted to authorize the Conference Treasurer to meet the expenses of the Conference Committees incurred in carrying on Conference business.

September 5, 1956:

At the request of the President of the Alabama Conference it was voted to grant the Alabama Conference permission to organize a church in Jackson, Mississippi and/or any other work in that city, which is in territory assigned to the Tennessee Conference. This agreement was limited to the city of Jackson, Mississippi. Any other work in the territory is to be subject to new agreement. It was further stated that if any work in Jackson should express a desire to unite with the Tennessee Conference, the Alabama Conference shall relinquish any claim and the Tennessee Conference shall reimburse the Alabama Conference for any investment made in said work.

April 6, 1957:

The Conference President, Vice-President, and pastor of the Chattanooga First Church were designated a committee with power to act in consulting, advising and planning the further steps in the Temple Church. Voted to request Rev. Grady Harwell and the Savannah Church to try to get by on a smaller loan as the board did not feel clear to sanction the loan of \$5,000. Approval of the enlargement of the Chattanooga First Church building was expressed. An executive committee consisting of Rev. M. L. Arnold, Rev. S. D. Herron and Rev. Charles Haire was elected and authorized to arrange for the setting of expense assessments for Conference and the securing of workers. It was voted to send a letter to the president of Central College requesting explanation of a certain resolution passed by the local Board of Trustees of the school.

It was voted that the executive committee be designated a committee to make inquiry concerning certain practices of the General Missions Program.

It was voted to send a letter to the Executive Committee of the General Board of Administration expressing our desire that the representative to our Conference conform to our standards as expressed in Resolution No. 27 and that if he is not in accord with it, he not be expected to preside over the Conference.

July 15, 1957:

Voted to pay note due on lot owned by the Oak Ridge Church provided that it be properly deeded.

Authorized the renewal of the lease of the Elizabeththton Church building to the Tennessee District of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.

Voted to pay \$25.00 on interest due to General Home Missions Department on a loan to the Erwin church.

Voted to request the Committee on Itineracy and Elders Orders to draw up a statement of requirements to be met by preachers in order (1) to be received into the Conference, (2) to be ordained an Elder, (3) to receive appointment at the hands of the Conference.
