#### CONFERENCE RESOLUTIONS

- 1. The Resolutions of Conference shall be printed in the Conference Minutes each year.
- 2. All visiting members of our own, or other Churches in harmony with our principles, shall be invited to honorary seats in the Conference.
- 3. The Conference President shall receive twenty dollars per year for postage and stationery; also any needed traveling expense. At any time the President be required to travel the Conference, his duties and pay shall be defined by the Conference.
- 4. The Conference Secretary shall receive twenty-five dollars per year for his labor and incidental expenses.
- 5. The Conference Treasurer shall receive twenty-five dollars per year for his services in caring for the funds.
- 6. In making his report, the Conference Treasurer is authorized to close his books one week before the Conference session. The Treasurer of the Superannuate Ministers' Relief Association also shall close his books one week before the Conference session.
- 7. All monies disbursed by the Conference Treasurer during the interim of Conference shall be upon order of the President, except in case of payment to the President, when such order shall be issued by the Vice-President. It is understood that any payment ordered by the Conference direct may be paid by the Treasurer without an order as directed above.
- 8. No monies shall be loaned by the Conference Treasurer except by order of Conference, or by the consent of the President and his Advisory Board.
- 9. Each elder shall make his engagement as Pastor with the understanding that if he be elected Conference President he shall be released in his pastoral engagement.
- 10. The first Sunday in each month shall be known as Home Mission Sunday, and the Sunday School offerings shall be given to Home Missions, and should be sent to the Conference Treasurer.

- 11. In securing Evangelists for the Camp Meeting, the Camp Meeting Committee is privileged to secure not more than one worker from outside the Denomination. (New resolution.)
- 12. The Camp Meeting Committee shall be composed of the Conference President as Chairman, and three ministers and three laymen, all to be elected by ballot (after the Conference of 1923), the term of office to be three years, the time of one minister and one layman expiring each year.
- 13. Pastors shall state financial items in their statistical reports in even dollars, except in items affecting the Budget, and so far as possible are requested to report all budget items in even dollars. When such rule is not followed, the Statistical Secretaries are authorized to drop decimals, except as provided above.
- 14. The offerings for Superannuated Ministers shall be taken within sixty days after Conference, and forwarded to the Treasurer of the Superannuate Society.
- 15. The Committee on Credentials shall secure from each delegate the necessary credentials as provided by our Discipline, with the Post Office address of the same.
- 16. The closing Sunday of the Conference year shall be the Sunday following the beginning of the Annual Conference. The Pastor's salary on this closing Sunday shall be paid by the Church of which he is Pastor; and for the first Sunday of the new Conference year it shall be paid by the charge to which he is going.
- 17. Newly elected Conference Officers shall take office after the close of Conference Sunday.
- 18. The Conference President shall include in the Orders of the Day a special period to consider Camp Meeting business.
- 19. A Nominating Committee shall be elected to consider and nominate all elective officers of the Conference. The Committee shall consist of four elders and four laymen. The report of the Nominating Committee shall be read to the Conference the day preceding the election. (New resolution as voted, See Wed. A. M.)
- 20. Each church member over fourteen years of age shall be apportioned fifty-two cents per year for Church Extension.

#### RECORD OF DAILY PROCEEDINGS

#### Tuesday Eve.

The first service of the 102nd annual session of the Champlain Annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Connection, or Church, of America was held on July 4th, 1944, on the West Chazy, N. Y. Camp Ground, at 7:30 P. M. Rev. Harold Baker led the song service, and a group of about 35 young people made up the choir on the platform. Following prayer, the Conference President, Rev. Price Stark, spoke words of welcome, exhortation and announcement. Rev. and Mrs. Baker sang a medley of songs on prayer. Rev. A. L. Vess was introduced. He read a scripture lesson from Luke 18, and brought a message on Prayer, and a contrast between the unjust judge and God.

#### Wednesday A. M.

Bible Study: The first Bible Study period was at 7:45. For the 2nd year, Rev. J. R. Pitt was our teacher. He referred us to two Scripture portions—Rom. 1: 14-17 and L. 16: 1-13, and the general theme was stated as "Responsibility." The second lesson was dealt with and applied in a helpful manner.

Conference: In opening the main period of the Conference session, the President read from Romans 12. Bros. Northrup and Dayton offered prayer.

Business: The President called the Conference to order for business. Roll call of ministers.

The bar of Conference was voted to be the first five front center row of seats. It was voted that the time for daily business be as follows: A. M. Open at nine o'clock, and close at 11:30; P. M. Open at 1:30, and close by vote.

It was voted that the Conference Treasurer give his report. It was read, accepted by vote, and referred to the Auditing Committee. See Rep't No. 1. It was voted that the Conference President read his report. Following the reading, his report was accepted by vote. See Rep't No. 2.

The Committee on Passage of character was elected to

be Rev. Gerald Hewitt and Mr. Gordon Stark.

Discussion on the new form of statistical blanks.

A motion that the Conf. Pres. call by phone the absent ministers of the Conference to ascertain the reason for their absence was LOST.

It was voted that the Apportionment Committee include in its report the item of the W. Y. P. S.

It was voted that the Apportionment Committee include the Conference Extension item in its report.

The following Elders were elected to act on the Nominating Committee: Arthur Northrup, Spencer Moon, Chas. Dayton, George Jock.

A partial report of delegates was read, and voted accepted.

The lay members of the **Nominating Committee** were elected as follows: Mrs. Bessie Roy, Mrs. Flora Darrah, Mrs. Rose Forguites, Mr. Frank VanVranken.

It was voted that the Nominating Committee nominate ALL elective officers of the Conference. The motion was carried. It was voted that this become a standing rule. Standing Rule XIX was voted to be rescinded, and substitute the new rule as voted, concerning nomination of all elective officers.

It was voted to rescind Conference Resolution XI. The following was voted as a substitute: In securing Evangelists for the Camp Meeting work the Camp Meeting Committee 's privileged to secure not more than one worker from outside the Denomination.

It was voted that Rev. Stopp be the Committee to see that the statistical reports are correctly added.

The following Auditors were elected:—Rev. Clarence Murray and Rev. Spencer Moon.

The Pastoral Relations Committee was elected as follows—Elders: L. C. Mattoon, Florence Shippee, A. O. Northrup; Laymen: Frank Mattoon, Ruby Quinn, Arthur Hunter.

It was voted to adjourn. Prayer by Bro. Dayton.

#### Wednesday P. M.

Devotional: Rev. Jock read Isaiah 6, and prayer was of-

fered by Bro. Miller.

Business: A partial report of the Committee on Credentials was read and adopted as corrected, with privilege of adding names as they are presented to the Committee.

It was moved that the delegates' credentials be sent to the Committee on Credentials before the opening of Conference, and that the Secretary send printed blanks with the statistical, etc.

Roll call of ministers and delegates. Minutes read and approved.

During the afternoon the following characters were passed:

Calvin Stopp, Duane Chadwick, Chas. Dayton, Howard Chapman, O. M. Finch, Reginald Hewitt, Gerald Hewitt, Geo. Jock, S. H. Miller, Spencer Moon, A. O. Northrup, Helen Stark, Mrs. Diana Miller.

Rev. Pitt and Dr. Stephen Paine (of Houghton College) were introduced to the Conference. Later, Clifton Chapman was introduced.

It was voted that the Secretary send a communication to Bro. Carpenter.

#### ORDER OF THE DAY-Conference Sermon.

Song service and prayer, and a duet by Mr. and Mrs. Baker preceded the Scripture lesson from Ephesians. The sermon was preached by Rev. L. C. Mattoon, the text being Eph. 4: 22-24 and a part of I Tim. 5, 26. The emphasis was upon the necessity of Holiness as an Experience.

It was voted that the Conference set aside an hour for a Patriotic service in honor of the boys in the service of their country, and that Rev. Northrup be Chairman.

It was voted to adjourn. Prayer to close.

#### Wednesday Eve. Service

A large group of young people nearly filled the platorm. Bro. Baker led an inspirational song service, and Sr. Gleason led in prayer. The special was a vocal duet by the Bakers. Rev. Vess. read Acts 18:24-28. His theme was "Appollos, the Model Preacher." It was a profitable message every one who aspires to be a true messenger of God. Rev. Pitt offered prayer, in dismissal.

#### Thursday A. M.

Bible Study: Bro. Pitt referred us to 1 Cor. 3, 16-17 and Ch. 6, 10. He considered the thought of Responsibility in relation to the body as the "temple of the Holy Spirit." Emphasis was put upon the interpretation of the Church as the temple.

**Devotional:** Elton Seaman led in singing "I'm on the Rock at Last." Bro. S. Moon read Psalm 27, and prayer was offered by C. Chapman and F. Shippee.

Business: Roll call and response. Minutes read and approved. The Committee on Nominations read a partial report. The report of the Sunday School Secretary was read, and accepted by vote, and referred to the Auditing Committee. See Report No. 3.

Characters passed: W. F. Lewis, C. L. Hill, C. C. Murray, Dennis Osgood.

It was voted that each charge of the Conference take an offering for the Schenectady Church, to apply on the indebtedness.

The W. Y. P. S. Treasurer's report was read and adopted by vote, and referred to the Auditing Committee. See Report.

#### ORDER OF THE DAY: Patriotic Service-

The service was directed by Rev. Northrup. He made some fitting remarks, and the assembly sang "The Star Spangled Banner." Prayer by Gerald Hewitt.

Thirteen mothers and three fathers of boys in the service of their country sat on the front seat; each one stood and named her or his boys, and special prayer was offered by someone called upon to do so. The total number represented thus was found to be 30 boys and one girl.

Mrs. Allen, of Bakers Mills, N. Y., was named as "Soldier Mother" of the Conference, having the most sons—4—in the service.

A verse of the "Battle Hymn of the Republic" was sung. Other boys of the Conference not thus represented were prayed for.

The service closed with prayer for peace, by Dr. Stephen Paine, and singing of "Onward Christian Soldiers."

Character passed, J. J. Davison. Voted to adojurn. Prayer, Rev. Northrup.

#### Thursday P. M.

**Devotional:** Rev. Gunsalus was in charge. Scr. Lession, 1 Tim. 4, and prayer following.

#### Report No. 2

The President's Report to Conference — 1943 - 1944

To the members of the One Hundred and Second Session, Champlain Annual Conference, Wesleyan Methodist Connection (or Church) of America.

Beloved Fellow Workers: Greetings in Jesus' dear name. In the good providence of God we are permitted to meet in the one hundred and second annual session of the Champlain Conference. We feel that in many respects the past year has been an outstanding one and for this we most humbly give thanks to God and to the members of the Conference who have so faithfully "stood by" throughout the year. We sincerely hope and pray that this present session of the Conference may be one of the very best ever held. To this end let us all work and pray.

Spiritually, I believe this year exceeds last year. Almost every charge has had a revival effort and some charges more than one. The work of the Holy Spirit has been very manifest throughout the Conference. Men and women, and especially our young people, have been led into definite relationships with the Lord. Some of the conversions have resembled those one reads about in Wesley's and Finney's

times. Praise the Lord! We admit we have not seen the move that we as a Connection and Conference have been praying for, but we feel that it is near. It is my opinion that it will come through the younger people of our Conference.

Financially, all debts are paid to date and a surplus is in the treasury. All figures exceed any thing that the Conference has ever done. ## Friday Morning 11:30

The meeting was called to order by the President, Sister Stark. Sister Gunsalus had charge of devotions. Prayer was offered by Sister Miller. The committee on plan of work reported and it was accepted. The treasurer's report was read and adopted. The meeting was adjourned by limitation of time.

## Friday Afternoon 12:30

Roll call was taken and answered by missionary scripture quotations. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and accepted. The following statistical reports were read: West Plattsburg, Forest Dale.

Mrs. Birch gave us an interesting talk. She related the circumstances under which they returned to the mission field and related incidents showing God's miraculous power on the African field. She stressed the idea of being in God's will and if you are there, He can work out all problems that arise. Her impression was that this war will bring the soldiers back with a world-wide vision. Prayer was requested for the physical health of Brother and Sister Birch.

The motion was made to adjourn.

#### Friday Evening, Public Meeting

The public missionary meeting was held Friday evening with Sister Stark presiding. Brother Baker led the song service, followed by the scripture lesson read by Mrs. Birch. Mr. and Mrs. Birch spoke in the Temne language for the entertainment of the children. He told a parable in Temne and she translated it into English. Brother and Sister Baker rendered a special number in music after which Mrs. Stark introduced Mr. Birch, our foreign missionary secretary. He brought a challenging address.

His text was taken from Genesis 3: 15 which was God's declaration of war. He spoke of the war God declared in Heaven, then in earth; how Satan led the attack in the death of Abel, in Abraham's seed from Hagar, again when Saul hurled his spear at David, and also the time when Herod condemned Jesus. Satan thought he had triumphed at the crucifixion, but he lost in the resurrection. God gave us the warfare at the time of the resurrection; but He promised us a comforter to help carry on the warfare against Satan.

Are YOU helping this war to advance or are YOU a hindrance? Brother Birch quoted from the book, "Dawn in Dark Europe," "There are more people who have never heard of Christ than there were people in the known world at the time of Christ and His disciples." This should help us to realize that we are losing the war against Satan. We Must advance if we are to win in the task God has given us.

The speaker challenged us to give more funds and to dedicate our lives for the salvation of souls. This message

kindled anew the spirit of missions within our hearts and gave us a greater vision of the needs of the mission field.

The service closed with a congregational hymn.

#### Saturday Afternoon, 12:30

Sister Hill opened the meeting with the song, "My Hope is Built on Nothing Else," after which Mrs. Merrifield read the ninety-seventh Psalm. The minutes of the former meetings were approved. The following statistical reports were read: Cadyville, Brookdale, Chittenden and West Chazy.

The Committee on Resolutions read their report and it was adopted. The statistical report was read and accepted.

The work committee to clean the cottages was elected: Cadyville, Mrs. Emma Scribner, chairman; Mooers: Mrs. Mildred Fero; West Plattsburg, Mrs. Fannie Wright; West Chazy: Mrs. Gladys Paine.

The reoprt of the committee on the plan of work was reread and discussed. The motion was made and seconded that the bill for printing of pledge evelopes be paid from the treasury. The motion was made that we give Mr. and Mrs. Birch \$50 to reimburse Mrs. Birch's expenses and the remainder to be a love offering.

The motion was made and seconded that we change standing rule No. 5 to read \$10. instead of \$3. for the treasurer. The report of the YMWB Superintendent was accepted The secretary's minutes were approved, and the meeting was adjourned.

#### STANDING RULES

- 1. The standing rules of the conference Missionary Society shall be printed in the conference minutes each year.
- 2. The conference treasurer is authorized to close her books one week before the conference session begins.
- 3. One of the two statistical blanks sent to each society, after being carefully filled in, is to be given to the statistical committee at the beginning of conference; the other is to be retained by the delegate and read to the local society at the first meeting of the new year. Receipts and disbursements

must be made to balance before being placed in the hands of the statistical committee; also giving rating according to efficiency standard.

- 4. All money raised by the society shall be used for missionary work, and no money paid out without a vote of the society.
- 5. The conference shall receive annually \$5., the treasurer \$10., and the secretary \$2. to defray the expense of postage and writing material.
- 6. The voting boby shall be composed of conference officers, YMWB superintendents, presidents, and one delegate from each local society, lady pastors, and pastors' wives.
- 7. Each local society shall continue sending \$6. to Southern Mountain work, and \$5. or more to Hepzibah orphanage. This must be sent through the Conference Treasurer and applies on budget.
- 8. Each society shall send \$1. per member as dues to Conference Treasurer. Only half of this may count on burget and we may specify how we want this half credited—to Home or Foreign Missions.
- 9. Each society is to make provision for a missionary to travel the conference as early in the year as possible, allowing ample time for each charge.
- 10. The plan of work should be read quarterly to our local societies to keep us enthused in our work.

an Missionary" and "Wesleyan Methodist," also 50 per cent of members be subscribers to the magazine.

- 5. Continue contributions of clothing and supplies to Home Missions as listed in the "Wesleyan Missionary," cheerfully accepting the estimated value set by workers. Contribute to needs of foreign fields, as bandages, also Sunday School charts and cards for Africa, and scripture calendar pictures for India.
- 6. Continue sending canned goods and other supplies to camp. Needed items are towels, wash cloths, cereal and sauce dishes, wooden doughnut cutter, large heavy pitchers for tea, large trays, large iron frying pans and extra large kettles or canners, water pitchers for rooms, heavy pads for cots, bedspreads, small rugs, towel racks, soap, and mirrors, and dressers.
- 7. Send ten cents per member for cleaning of camp rooms to the treasurer, Mrs. Myrtle Larabee, Mooers, N. Y., not later than May 1.
- 8. At last meeting elect officers for coming year, including solicitor for the magazine and a delegate other than the church delegate, if possible, whose board and room is provided for conference week.
