Standing Rules

- No. 1. The Conference Treasurer is authorized to close his bookstwo weeks before the opening date of Conference, therefore all receipts and monies should be in his hands by that time if credit on the statistical report is desired.
- No. 2. The President, after his fourth round of Quarterly conferences shall mail the delegate's credentials to the Conference secretary who shall be the Committee on Credentials. It shall be his duty to prepare the roll before conference begins.
- No. 3. All persons introduced to the conference shall be given honorary seats with the right to speak on all questions, but not to vote.
- No. 4. The office expense of the President, the secretary, and the treasurer shall be paid by the conference. Also all conference supplies shall be purchased by the conference.
- No. 5. The secretary and treasurer shall be paid twenty-five dollars per year for their services.
 - No. 6. The Conference Treasurer shall be bonded each year.
- No. 7. An abbreviated form of the Pastor's statistical report shall be used for conference reading.
- No. 8. The Annual Conference shall elect a Nominating Committee of five, of which one shall be the Conference President, to meet prior to the next Annual Conference and nominate the working committee for the session.
- No. 9. The Conference President and the Board of Trustees shall constitute a Committee for the Building and Location of Churches and Parsonages.
- No. 10. Each pastor shall be allowed time out from his duties as pastor to hold two revivals each year if he so desires. The church he serves as pastor shall not withhold his salary while he is absent on such authorized revivals. In case any extra expense is involved in filling the pulpit while the pastor is engaged in such said revival such extra expense shall be paid by the church whose pastor is absent holding the revival.
- No. 11. All church records shall close the last day of the month preceding the opening date of Conference.
- No. 12. It is the duty of the pastors to look after the insurance of the church and parsonage property. All insurance shall provide for fire, lightning and tornado. If the church fails to do so upon reasonable ef-

fort by the pastor, the conference president shall be notified and he shall take care of such business. A failure upon the part of the pastor shall be a censurable offense.

- No. 13. This conference asks that each pastor shall keep a file of his calling list and those connected with the church and Sunday School with names and addresses, the same to be kept for his own work and to be turned over to his successor.
- No. 14. Each pastor should seek to organize a new class or give his services in a revival meeting to a new or weaker church to help establish it. The church which he pastors should grant him such privileges without censure with full remunerations of salary while in such meeting. The president must serve as co-ordinator and help arrange such meetings.

Daily Proceedings

Monday Night, July 9, 1956

Opening—The sixty-first annual session of the South Georgia Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America convened at Ashburn, Ga. on the Campgrounds. The Conference President, Rev. W. M. Phillippe, Jr., called the conference to order. The song service was led by Rev. Paul Swauger. Rev. and Mrs. H. L. McCall brought a special number in song.

God's presence was felt in a real way in this first service. Dr. R. C. Mullinax brought a wonderful message from the 13th chapter of I Corinthians.

Tuesday Morning, July 10

Opening—The president called the conference to order. The song service was led by Rev. D. E. Alexander. The devotions were conducted by Rev. W. T. Brinson. Rev. Phillippe asked that Dr. Roy S. Nicholson, our denominational representative, preside, which he did, bringing words of greetings to the conference.

Roll Call—The roll of Elders and Conference Preachers was called and adopted. The secretary, as the committee on credentials, also called the roll of Lay Delegates, which was adopted.

Conference Bar—The conference bar was set to include the first three rows of seats in the middle sections of the tabernacle, also the platform.

Hours of Conference—The hours of conference were set as follows: to meet at 9 a.m. until 12 noon; to meet again at 2 p.m. and to adjourn by motion.

President's Report—The president, Rev. W. M. Phillippe, Jr., gave his report which was adopted. (See Report No. 1.) The names of P. L. Swauger and C. V. Marchbanks were added to the Roll of Elders, and R. N. Cooley and D. E. Alexander were added to the Roll of Conference Preachers.

Nominating Committee—The Nominating Committee gave a report which was adopted. (See Report No. 2.) In the absence of Gordon Harris the vacancy on the Pastoral Relations committee was referred back to the Committee on Nominations.

Orders of the Day.—The president, Rev. Phillippe, gave a partial report of the Orders of the Day, recommending that the Educational Address be given at 3 o'clock by Brother Mullinax, and that Brother Towner of the Hephzibah Home be given time to speak at the beginning of the night service. This was adopted.

Committee on Courtesy—The Committee on Courtesy introduced the following who gave their testimonies: Dr. and Mrs. R. C. Mullinax, Rev. and Mrs. Noel, Rev. and Mrs. Carnwright, Rev. and Mrs. McConnell,

Brother Fletch and Brother Moore.

Communications—Letters from H. R. Gunby, W. W. Wigglesworth, were read by the secretary who was instructed to answer them.

Recess-Recessed for committee work:

Reconvened-Brother Nicholson called the conference to order.

Orders of the Day—The committee on Orders of the Day and public worship gave a partial report, recommending that the Educational Address be given at 2 o'clock instead of three, and that the election of officers and standing committees be held immediately afterwards, and that Brother Nicholson preach in the night service, along with the Hephzibah Children's Home by Brother and Sister Towner. This additional partial report was adopted.

Committee on Itineracy and Elders Orders—The report of this committee was given and adopted. (See Report No. 3.)

A statement was made that Frank H. Harris, Jr. had left the denomination and was no longer an elder in our conference.

Recommendations—A list of three recommendations were read by Rev. Phillippe which were adopted to be standing rules of the conference. (See Report No. 4.)

Adjournment—Adjourned by limitation of time.

Tuesday Afternoon, July 10, 1956

Opening—The song service was led by Brother W. L. Snellgrove. A season of prayer was observed. Rev. R. C. Mullinax of Central College brought the Educational address.

The Chairman called the conference to order.

Auditing Committee—A partial report of the auditing committee was given and adopted. (See Report No. 5.)

Roll Call and Minutes—The roll was called, and Mrs. Nathan Poppell was seated as alternate delegate from the Wayne Charge. The minutes were read and approved.

Secretary of Child Evangelism—The Sunday School Board nominated Mrs. G. C. Gilliard as Secretary of Child Evangelism, and she was elected.

Conference Treasurer—The report of the conference treasurer was given and accepted. (See Report No. 6.)

Offering for President—The financial deficit in the president's report was called to the attention of the conference and a love offering of \$55.50 was taken for Brother Phillippe.

A statement was made that J. A. Cowart had withdrawn from the Church, and his name was dropped from the roll.

Sister G. H. Doty and F. H. Harris gave their reports as superannuates. Brother Nicholson spoke words of appreciation and encouragement to our superannuated ministers who have blazed the way of the church down through the years.

Adjournment-Adjourned for Orders of the Day.

Wednesday Afternoon

Opening—Brother Nicholson called the conference to order. The Orders of the Day were deferred to hear the first reading of the Pastoral Relations Committee.

Pastoral Relations Committee—The report of this committee was given.

Memorial Service—A Memorial service was conducted by Rev. F. H. Harris.

Roll Call and Minutes—The roll was called. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

Thanks—The committee on Thanks gave a report which was adopted. (See Report No. 13.)

Apportionment—The report on apportionment was given and adopted. (See Report No. 14.)

Secrecy—The Committee on Secrecy recommended that the report on Secrecy of last conference written by W. H. Morris, and Mrs. Nathan Poppell, be adopted for this year. This was adopted. (See Report No. 15.)

Auditing—The Auditing Committee gave an additional report which was adopted. (See Report No. 15.)

Report No. 1

CONFERENCE PRESIDENT'S REPORT

To the members of this Sixty-first Annual Session of the South Geor-

Dear Brethren and Co-laborers in the work of God. It is meet that we should come together on this great annual occasion with gratitude, thanksgiving and praise to God for what he has done for us this year. We have met with some unexpected attacks from the enemy, but thanks be to God who gave us the victory. I feel like that we are in the heat of the battle in this war against sin. Let's not fail.

Soul Passion

I feel the great need of this conference is a greater passion for souls. I know we need more churches, bigger churches, better Sunday schools, more members and more preachers; but I am afraid that we many times work at the job backwards. If we would spend more time and effort for the salvation of souls and seek earnestly for a great old fashion revival of regeneration and sanctification then these other things will be taken care of.

John Wesley said he did not fear that there would ever be a time when there would not be a people called methodist, but he did fear there would be a time when the methodist would have a desire for great institutions and initiate great programs that would require the help of the rich, and that they would tone down their message so it would not offend them, and the movement would become decadent.

Brethren, take heed to this statement of John Wesley and do not let it happen to us. The Wesleyan Methodist Church has been the only denomination that has held up its original doctrine over such a long period of time. Our fathers have fasted and prayed and fought hard and feared to compromise in their message. May we do the same and continue to advance and take in new territory for God.

I propose that these words, "A PASSION FOR SOULS," be the cry of every heart and be a slogan for a crusade to defeat the devil. I would have us think of all we have as a trust to be exercised, rather than as a heritage to be enjoyed. I would have us think of our responsibilities, more than our privileges. I would account ourselves as having just now received the tools for service, rather than to think of anything past or present as a finished feat. We are right now like the farmer in the spring of the year with the fields prepared and ready to sow the seed.

There are many ways of doing good in the world. There is the shallow method of Jeremiah's time who sought to heal the afflictions of the people slightly, by saying, "Peace, peace, when there was no peace." Others call for best wishes and co-operation. But ours is a spiritual approach to the ills of individuals and society, and we shall not be true to our calling if we give our time and strength to methods that are less fundamental. Even though we are dogmatic as to doctrine, our effectiveness is in our life, rather than in our aptitude in pointing out the way of life. We preach holiness, but we must also live holy. We champion the cause of old time religion, but we must exemplify this kind of religion and promote it by the same means that our fathers used.

John Knox was a great preacher. But Queen Mary admitted that it was his prayers she feared. John Fletcher was a saint, but he refused to go to the pulpit until he was assured that Christ would be there with him.

The business of running a holiness church is not simple like some would make it seem. Now and then one stands up to enumerate the symptoms of disease and decay, and to tell us that we must be careful and don't do thus and so or else the church will drift backwards. But these symptoms are no more than a skin rash as compared with a cancer in the liver, which is our real disease, and a deep seated disease that would not be cured if the symptoms were eliminated. Men and movements backslide in heart before they deteriorate very far in practice. Just as the tree may look good and with beautiful foliage but has no fruit because of disease or the lack of something.

Some of our churches are no bigger today than they were twenty years ago, yea some are even smaller and some have even closed their doors. Some have a very poor showing in terms of souls saved and members gained. And yet, there is not much to criticize about our church government and its history or the doctrine we preach and what the church stands for. The fault is deeper-there is not enough heartbreak over the lost, not enough soul burden, not enough groaning and weeping and fasting and crying. Moreover, and as a consequence, there is not enough deep and genuine conviction for sin among the unsaved of our families and friends. Hypocrites are too comfortable in our presence, and in our services. Bickering and backbiting go with too little condemnation. Sour holiness, bitter devotion to persons and causes, lightness in the homes and in the churches, worldliness, love of ease and occupation, with silly social conventionalities among the women, covetousness and love for money among the men, content with the mediocre, delight in nice clothes and comfortable homes, measuring men by their salaries they receive, weighing people by the position they hold-all these things get by with too little reproof because the light is not bright enough to discover their devilish origin.

Newton said he had observed that when men are getting religion they have a tendency to be hard on themselves and easy on the other man.

But when they are losing religion or already backslidden, they have a tendency to be easy on themselves and hard on the other man. Nine tenths of the bickering and fault finding, jealousy, and suspicion, and criticism among our laymen and preachers would disappear if we had a greater passion for souls. Brethren we are not so menaced by a high geared organized machine of works as we are paralyzed by stagnation. One has said it is easier to reverse a man who is going in the wrong direction than to start one who has stopped.

When I read our statistics for the past several years I wonder if that is our best. In the years 1954 and 55 it took 400 members two years to gain 14 new members. Which means it took 29 members 2 years to win one soul to the church. This year of 1956 we only gained about 18 members with 412, which means that it took 29 members one year to gain a new member. And yet, unless a new vision comes to us here, before this conference is over, we will say we had a fine year, and were a subject of much blessings last year. But brethren, how can it be that we had such a good year and the net results, which is the main thing by which we measure success, be no greater than that. I am worried over the fact that we are not worried more than we are. It is our complacency that acitates me. If our hearts were reall broken, if we were really taking the matter to heart, if our eyes were fountains of tears, then I could believe that some of these barren churches would bring forth children.

No one can say that the cause of our failure was radicalism, or over worked. I am afraid that it was doing nothing. None of us have done well enough to feel truly happy or qualify us to criticize the rest. Let each one study his own report. The best could have done better. With some a slump has become a habit, if not a character, and still they are not stirred.

Is there no one that can wake us up? Is there no way to start a fire in our bones that will cause enough heat to make the water of our concern boil and become powerful steam?

Brethren it can be done. The days of revival are not over. I am afraid of that cautious leadership that is so afraid it will make mistakes that it makes the greatest of all mistakes—not undertaking anything at all worth while. I am not criticizing the way we do things but rather the way we don't do things. And I know you know I appreciate all that all of you are doing and trying to do. But my heart is stirred for a passion for souls.

Brethren, I was born in the fire and I cannot endure the smoke. I am a child of the bright daylight, and mist and fog and depressing gloom are not to my liking. The revival I seek is not the product of the labors of some personality plus evangelist. I want the kind of revival that comes in spite of the singing and the preaching and the human attractions. I want a revival like summer showers, that will purify the atmosphere of

our churches. Something that will reform and regenerate drunkards and save respectable worldlings. Something that will bring in the youth and children. Something that will be so attractive that it will break over into the circles of the pleasure loving. Something that will set people on their back tracks to make restitution for wrong doings. Something that will bring God to bear upon our domestic problems and save people from the divorce courts. Something that will solve our race problems. We as true children of God can not go along with integration. It is unchristian to mix the races. God forbids the intermarriage of races and this is what integration stands for. We believe that this is a movement of communism. Only a pentecostal revival will settle this question. We need a revival that will inject old-time honesty, veracity, purity and out worldly mindedness in our preachers and laymen. Something that will make this namby-pamby, compromising sort of holiness as obsolete as Phariseeism was on the day of pentecost.

As a standard for our conference another year may we have a ten per cent gain in membership and organize two new churches. Every church strive for at least two revivals during the year. Defeatism in soul saving will put us on the way out and down.

Brethren I propose that we get out of our little nest and get down before God in sackcloth and ashes and pray until we pray. So that then we will preach with unction.

In the heat of a battle in the civil war a general called a commander to him and said, "Go out there and take that fortified hill." The commander said, "Sir I will try." But the general answered, "I did not tell you to try, I said take it." The commander answered, "I'll do it or die." Then the general said, "I did not say die, but take it." Then the commander turned his horse and started saying back over his shoulder, "I'll take it, general." And he did. Trying is not enough. Dying is not enough. We must take the hill. We must take it. A passion for Souls. The great commander in chief of the throne in the skies from Mt. Calvary has given the orders to win souls. Our answer is, "We will do it blessed Lord, we will do it."

Improvements of Property

All the charges have made improvements on their property except Ashburn, they have the paint to paint but it has not been put on. Two churches have been remodeled, the Mt. Pleasant church built four new Sunday school rooms and remodeled the auditorium. The Savannah church has sheet rocked the inside, put double doors at entrance, new side walks and shrubbery.

The Waycross church put in a new gas heating system in the church. Tifton and Cordele put new gas heating both in church and parsonage. Hortense painted the inside of their church.

Jesup sealed the inside of the church and built concrete porch and steps.

Coffee has \$1,000.00 on hand to build new Sunday school rooms. Brunswick has \$1,000.00 on hand for a new addition to their church. Crossroads made minor repairs to windows, doors and steps.

There have been three new parsonages built: Laurens, Wayne, and Brunswick.

Also two new churches built: Sterling and Perry.
