STANDING RULES

- I. <u>Conference President</u>. Resolved, 1) That the Conference President be required, authorized and appointed to travel the Conference as President, having general supervision of the spiritual interests and benevolences thereof, holding at least one service at each church during the year under such date as he may announce in advance;
- 2) That he shall raise funds to meet the demands of the Conference work, assisted by the pastors, and he shall receive contributions for Missions, Education and Superannuated Ministers, where there are no pastors;
- 3) That he shall have general supervision of the church property, and shall inquire into the titles of the same to see that no property is loosely held, and shall look after the rental of Conference property, and see that the rent is turned into the treasury, and he shall investigate the possibility and feasibility of the sale of property not in use, and report his findings to the Board of Trustees and to the next annual conference;
 - 4) That he shall be authorized to grant letters to disbanded classes;
- 5) That he shall be required to write non-resident members of Conference asking them, in case they cannot attend, to write the conference a letter of greating and state the condition of their religious experience;
- 6) That he shall devote as much time as possible and as occasion may afford in evangelistic and other meetings in the Conference;
- 7) That he may engage such help from time to time as may be available, and as he may consider properly qualified to assist in holding Evangelistic and Quarterly Meetings, such help to be remunerated from the Conference Missions Fund.
- II. <u>Trustees.</u> 1) <u>Authorization</u>. Resolved, that the duly-elected and qualified Trustees of the Illinois Conference are hereby authorized and directed to sign for the purchase, sale, mortgaging and conveyance of real estate recommended by the annual conference or, during the interim between the sessions of annual conference, by the Missionary Board as the board of managers. (See Paragraph 278, Book of Discipline.) All such action or actions of the Trustees in compliance with the recommendations of the Missionary Board shall be deemed to be legal and binding upon the Illinois Conference, and of as full force and effect as they would have been if such actions on the part of the Trustees had been specially authorized by the annual conference.
- 2) Annual Report. Resolved, that the Trustees present to Conference an annual report of official acts and of assets and liabilities of the Illinois Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, an Illinois corporation.
- III. Missionary Board. 1) Membership. Resolved, that the Illinois Conference Missionary Board be composed of nine members, five of which shall be ministers and four laymen; that in said number the Conference Trustees shall be included as members exofficio, as well as the ex-officio members declared in the Discipline.
- 2) <u>Duties</u>. Resolved, (a) That the Missionary Board is hereby authorized to pay out all monies from the Conference Missions Fund, and during the interim between Conference sessions to act as a Committee on Finance; (b) That the Missionary Board act as the Conference Committee on Church and Parsonage Location.
- IV. Annual Conference. 1) <u>Date</u>. Resolved, that the annual conference begin on the first Thursday after July 27th, at 1:30 p.m., and close the following Saturday night: that Camp Meeting begin on the following Sunday and continue for eight days, including two Sundays.
- 2) Fiscal Year. Resolved, that the Conference Fiscal Year close July 15th; that each local church fiscal year close June 30th.
- 3) Budget Items. Resolved, that all Treasurers shall mark receipts "Budget" or "Not Budget".
- 4) <u>Committee on Statistics</u>. Resolved, that a Standing Committee on Statistics be elected, consisting of a Conference Statistical Secretary, the Conference Treasurer, one other ministerial and one lay member; that two lay members be elected at the opening of annual conference.
- 5) Statistical Report. Resolved, that no remittances postmarked later than July 5th shall apply on the church statistical report; that by July 15th each pastor shall submit to the chairman of the Statistical Committee his budget check sheet with receipts covering same, and his statistical blank completed except for the budget section; that the Statistical Committee fill in on the statistical blanks the budget items, both assigned and raised; that other items which are obviously incorrect be checked with the pastor.
- 6) Audit. Resolved, that a competent auditor shall be appointed each year by the Committee on Finance to audit the books of the Conference.
- 7) Sunday Schools. Resolved, that each additional Sunday School under the pastoral oversight of a Wesleyan Methodist pastor shall be reported on a separate annual statistical report blank, provided each Sunday School has been recognized by the Conference Missionary Board.

8) Board of Superannuate Ministers' Aid. Resolved, that the Board of Superannuate Ministers! Aid be composed of three members, each elected by the conference for a three year term of office, the terms to expire in successive years; that this board be authorized to appoint the Secretary-Treasurer of the Pension Fund.

9) Orders of the Day Committee. Resolved, that the President, Vice President and

Secretary of Conference shall constitute the Orders of the Day Committee.

10) Leave. Resolved, that no member shall leave Conference session without permission of the president; that no ministerial member shall without special permission leave camp after the annual meetings until all responsibilities of the Conference are discharged, including camp clean-up.

11) Conference Officers. Resolved, that the officers be installed during annual Conference at a public service announced in advance; office to take effect at the rise of

Conference.

- 12) Minutes. Resolved, (a) That the Conference President and Secretary constitute a committee to edit and publish the annual conference minutes; (b) That the cost of printing the annual conference minutes be pro-rated among the churches on the basis of membership reported at conference; (c) That the total number of minutes to be printed be ascertained on the basis of family units among the membership and active constituency.
- Camp Meeting. 1) Authorization. Resolved, that there be held an annual Camp Meeting and that it be under the direction of a Camp Meeting Committee elected by the Illinois Conference, and that the Conference President, as chairman, the Conference W. Y. P. S. President, and the Conference W. M. S. President be members ex-officio of said Camp Meeting Committee.

 Committee Duties. Resolved, (a) That camp grounds and buildings be under the care of the Camp Meeting Committee; (b) That the Camp Meeting Committee have charge of the Camp Meeting Fund and appoint a treasurer to receive all monies and make all authorized disbursements from the same; (c) That the Camp Meeting Committee shall have power

to engage workers beyond the present year.

- 2) Camp Meeting Fund. Resolved, (a) That all pledges and cash received during the sessions of Conference and Camp Meeting be placed in the Camp Meeting Fund unless otherwise designated; (b) That the incidental expenses of the annual conference while in session be paid from the Camp Meeting Fund.
- 1) Pastoral Service Report. Resolved, that each pastor of the Ministers. Illinois Conference shall report to his quarterly conference a summary of the statistics compiled upon the pastoral service monthly record blanks adopted by the 1954 Conference (See Report No. 28), and that the year's summary be read at annual conference.
- 2) Pastor's Support During Conference. Resolved, that it be our plan that all pastors remain on their charges for one Sunday after annual conference and that the church's financial obligation to the pastor, whether he be leaving the field or not, be extended through that Sunday.

3) Moving Pastors. Resolved, that each charge make provisions for the moving expense of the incoming paster immediately after the annual conference adjourns.

4) Illness or Death. Resolved, that the Conference President be notified by the local church secretary in case of critical illness or death in a minister's home, and that

he shall send cards at once to the other ministers.

5) Minister's Vacation. Resolved, that the Conference President and all pastors be

given a two-weeks' vacation with pay.

- 6) Ministerial Convention. Resolved, that there be held a Ministerial Convention from the third Tuesday evening to the following Thursday noon of February each year. Resolved further that the place of meeting and the program presented be left in the hands of the Committee on Itineracy and Orders.
- VII. Miscellaneous 1) Conference Paper. Resolved, that the Conference publish a monthly paper called "The Illinois Tidings": that the Conference President shall be designated Editor-in-Chief, and that the heads of the Conference auxiliary organizations be designated contributing editors.

2) Conference Prayer Interests. Resolved, that the information concerning coming revival meetings and other special prayer needs be published in the conference paper.

3) Expense of Conference Officers. Resolved, that all incidental expenses of all Conference Officers, Committees, Official Boards and helpers shall be paid by the Conference Treasurer when approved by the President.

JOURNAL OF DAILY PROCEEDINGS

First Meeting -- 1:30 p.m. Thursday, July 29, 1954.

Opening — The fifth annual session of the Illinois Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America was convened at Epworth Park Camp Grounds, Belvidere, Illinois, at 1:30 p.m., CDT, July 29, 1954, Conference President A. L. Bray presiding. Rev. D. C. Durey led in the opening song service.

Communion Service — Rev. Wm. H. Dyer, Conference Vice President, brought the communion meditation, basing his remarks on Luke 22:14-20 and 1 Corinthians 11:23-26 and showing the reality of the "remembrance" we may have of our Saviour "until He come again". The conference elders assisted in ministering the Lord's Supper to the congregation, and the Spirit of God was present to minister grace to our hearts in the observance of the sacrament. The service was closed as the hymn, "There is a Fountain Filled with Blood", was sung.

Illinois Conference

Conference Sermon -- The president was designated to give the keynote sermon of the conference. His text was Obadiah 17, "-- Upon Mount Zion shall be deliverance, and there shall be holiness; and the house of Jacob shall possess their possessions." application of this verse to all the work we would do for the Lord in Illinois was effectively presented; -- salvation, heart purity, conquest for God, -- this is the Divine order. Therefore, to preach the need for holiness is an imperative in our ministry, and to demonstrate before others the adequacy of God's cleansing in our own lives is essential in order that His power may flow through us. God grant that our hearts may burn with this challenge throughout the coming years! The service was closed with prayer by the speaker.

Opening of Business Session -- President Bray called the meeting to order after a short

recess.

Roll Call -- Thirteen ministerial members were present to answer the first roll call. (See Record of Attendance)

Bar of Conference - The first six pews in the center section of the auditorium were declared bar of conference, and the ministerial members were seated therein.

Report of Committee on Itineracy and Orders - A partial report of conference preachers eligible to vote, and a listing of Course of Study status of all unordained members was presented by the Itineracy and Orders Committee and was approved by conference vote. (S Report No. 1)

<u>Credentials Committee</u> — Rev. R. L. Zuhl and Rev. D. D. Crail were appointed a credentials committee by the Chair. The credentials of eight lay delegates were presented, and were approved by vote. Five of these were present, and were seated in the bar of conference. (See Record of Attendance)

Courtesy Committee -- Rev. Harry Moeller and Rev. R. L. Zuhl were elected Courtesy Committee. They made a partial report and introduced to Conference the following new members:-Mr. Frank Herrin, Oak Lawn; Mr. A. N. Carstensen, Austin; Rev. Kenneth Lister, assistant pastor of Austin; Miss Velma Moore, Princeton; and Mr. Lloyd Wallace, Wyanet. These members gave their greetings and testimonies.

Report of the Orders of the Day Committee -- Copies of the agenda recommended by the Orders of the Day Committee were distributed for study. Report was adopted by vote. (See

Report No. 2)

Conference Postmaster -- Rev. Harry Moeller was voted postmaster for the conference session.

Conference Auditing Committee -- Motion prevailed that the Conference Statistical Committee be designated Auditing Committee for conference reports.

Nominating Committee -- Conference elected the following nominating committee by vote:-Rev. A. L. Bray, Chairman; Rev. W. H. Dyer, Rev. C. E. Clander, Mr. Lloyd Wallace, Mr. S. Hugh Paine, Jr.

Adjournment -- Orders of the Day were called by the Chair, and Conference adjourned for

committee work.

Second Meeting - 7:00 p.m. Thursday, July 29, 1954.

Opening - The president called the meeting to order. Rev. C. E. Olander led in devotions after the assembly sang "Amazing Grace" and "O How I Love Jesus". He read portions of 1 Cor. 15 and particularly emphasized the marvelous grace of God, portrayed in verse 10, as the source of all accomplishment in the work of the Kingdom. After this meditation Brother Clander led in prayer.

Attendance - Fourteen ministerial and seven lay members of conference attended the

second meeting. (See Record of Attendance)

Report of Nominating Committee - The report of the nominating committee was heard, and was amended before adoption by adding an extra member to the Statistical Committee. (See

Report No. 3)

Report of Board of Superannuate Ministers' Aid — Rev. W. H. Dyer presented the report of the Board, which was adopted by vote. (See Report No. 4)

Report of the Treasurer of Superannuate Pension Fund - Report of the pension fund treasurer was read by Rev. W. H. Dyer, and by motion was received and referred to the Auditing Committee. (See Report No. 5)

Fourth Meeting - 1:30 p.m. Friday, July 30, 1954.

Opening - The president called the meeting to order. Mr. Harold Woods, lay delegate from Peoria Church, led in the singing of "In the Garden", and brought a devotional message based on John 16:1-8 emphasizing the comfort available through Christ to the Christian surrounded by an unfriendly world. Sunday School Board,- Rev. W. D. Craker, ex of.; Mr. Geyn Jones, Rev. Harry Moeller. Committee on Vacancies,- Rev. W. H. Dyer, Rev. C. E. Olander, Rev. W. D. Craker, Mr. Lloyd Wallace, Mr. S. Hugh Paine, Jr.

Camp Meeting Committee, - In addition to three ex officio members, Rev. W. H. Dyer, Rev. D. C. Durey, Mr. Lloyd Wallace, Rev. L. G. Anderson. By prevailing motion the committee was limited to seven members.

Statistical Committee,- In addition to ex officio members, Rev. R. L. Zuhl. It was the action of Conference that the Standing Rule be amended to add one layman to the Statistical Committee. Mr. S. Hugh Paine, Jr., was appointed by vote to fill the committee. A motion to amend the standing rule on statistical procedure was referred by vote to the Standing Rules Committee for study and recommendation.

Adjournment - Conference adjourned by vote. Rev. J. E. Winterberg offered prayer in closing.

Fifth Meeting - 7:00 p.m. Friday, July 30, 1954.

Opening - Rev. D. C. Durey led Conference in singing "Blessed Assurance" as the meeting opened. Rev. Pearl Poe led the devotions, speaking from Colossians 1:8-12 on the Spirit-Filled Life. He portrayed the glorious privilege of being filled with the knowledge of God's will in all wisdom and spiritual understanding, of being worthy of the Lord unto all pleasing, and of being fruitful in every good work. Rev. C. C. McCarty offered prayer. Attendance - Twenty ministerial and eleven lay members were in attendance at the fifth

meeting. (See Record of Attendance)

Report of the Auditing Committee - A partial report of the committee concerning the

Camp Meeting Fund Report was heard and adopted by vote. (See Report No. 12)

Report of the Passage of Character Committee — The ministerial character of all ministers of the conference was declared passed by the committee, and report was received by vote of Conference. (See Report No. 24)

Report of the Courtesy Committee - The committee presented Rev. F. A. Davis, elder belonging to the Oak Park Church who served two years under the Oriental Missionary Society in Japan and has recently completed his B.D. degree at Asbury Theological Seminary. Brother Davis spoke of the joy of serving the Lord in his recent assignment, and expressed real pleasure at the renewal of fellowship with home base.

Greetings from the General Home Missions Secretary - Dr. J. R. Swauger, General Home Missionary Secretary, conveyed greetings to the conference in a letter which was read by the conference secretary, who was instructed to send the greetings of the conference to Brother Swauger, together with our thanks for his understanding counsel and loyal assistance during the past year.

Report of Finance Committee — The secretary of the Conference Missionary Board, Rev. S.

F. Pillsbury, read the report of the Finance Committee. After a period of discussion and explanation, the report was adopted by action of Conference. (See Report No. 25)

Report of the Sunday School Committee - Rev. W. D. Craker brought the report of the committee before Conference, which adopted it by prevailing motion. (See Report No. 26) Reports of Pastors - The pastors of the Oak Park, Peoria, Rockford, Austin (Chicago) and Creve Coeur churches read their abbreviated statistical reports before Conference and gave encouraging testimonies. Lay delegates of all these churches reported fulfillment of financial commitments for support of their pastors during the past year. A spirit of praise, rejoicing and encouragement prevailed during the hearing of these reports, in spite of any difficulties encountered.

Adjournment - Conference was adjourned for committee work by limitation of time. Rev. W. D. Craker dismissed the meeting with prayer.

Sixth Meeting - 8:00 a.m. Saturday, July 31, 1954.

Opening - The meeting was called to order by the president. Rev. Francis Davis led in singing "Make Me a Blessing", and brought a short message based on Proverbs 3:28 and Luke 10:25-31. He gave a missionary emphasis to the story of the Good Samaritan and connected this with the Old Testament injunction, "Say not unto thy neighbor -- tomorrow I will give, when thou hast it by thee". The Church of Jesus Christ cannot lightly put off till tomorrow the missionary responsibilities of today. Brother Davis led the conference in prayer. Roll Call and Minutes - Nineteen ministerial and eleven lay members answered the third roll call. (See Record of Attendance) The minutes of the third, fourth and fifth meetings

were read and were approved, with the inclusion of corrected items, by motion and vote.

Report of Moral Reform Committee -- Rev. S. F. Pillsbury read the committee's report, which was adopted by vote. Motion to submit the report for publication in the Wesleyan Methodist was carried. A period of discussion followed, and a motion to reconsider the report and refer it back to committee prevailed.

Report of Thanks Committee - Rev. R. L. Zuhl read the Thanks Committee report, which passed by action of Conference. (See Report No. 27)

Reports of Pastors -- Pastors of the churches at Hoopeston, Hoyne Avenue (Chicago), Maywood, Oak Lawn, Princeton, Roseland (Chicago), Sheffield and Wyanet reported a summary of church statistics and spoke of the general condition of the work. A good spirit of personal victory and of zeal for progress in Kingdom work was manifest in these reports, and also in the testimonies given by the delegates. Rev. Kenneth Lister and Rev. Pearl Poe

gave good reports of their labors during the year.

<u>Monthly Record of Pastoral Service.</u>— The vice president was called to the Chair and Rev.

Bray presented for consideration of Conference a blank for recording of pastoral statistics. After a period of discussion a motion prevailed to adopt the blank for use by the ministers during the coming year. It was moved and carried that the president and his advisory board be directed to make a further study of ministerial statistical blanks and report to next

Adjournment - Conference was declared adjourned by limitation of time. Brother Herbert Apel offered prayer in closing.

Seventh Meeting - 1:30 p.m. Saturday, July 31, 1954.

Opening - The meeting was opened by the president. Rev. W. D. Craker led in devotions, reading Psalm 85 and commenting on it briefly. He led the assembly in prayer before resumption of business.

Attendance - Twenty one ministerial and twelve lay members of Conference attended the final meeting. (See Record of Attendance)

Report of Courtesy Committee -- Rev. and Mrs. Ralph B. Patterson of Hoyne Avenue Church were present in the meeting. The committee introduced Brother and Sister Patterson, and they gave their testimonies.

Report of Tithing Secretary -- Rev. C. C. McCarty brought a report of his labors as tithing secretary, and offered his services to the pastors in promotion of the scriptural

method of giving. Report was approved by vote. (See Report No. 29)

Recess - Motion prevailed that Conference recess for committee work, subject to the call of the Chair. Rev. Pearl Poe offered a prayer in dismissal.

Resumption of Business - The president called the meeting to order at 4:30 p.m.

Report of the Credentials Committee -- Credentials of Mr. Frank A. Hames of Cak Park

Church were presented and passed by vote.

Report of Courtesy Committee — The committee presented Brother Hames for recognition by Conference, and he brought words of greeting and testimony.

Report of the Standing Rules Committee - Report of the committee was read by the conference secretary and the recommendations were adopted in seriatim. The report was adopted as a whole by prevailing motion. (See Report No. 30)

Recommendation -- President Bray brought a recommendation of the President's Advisory

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Board that Rev. Pearl Poe, received last year as a probationary elder of the Illinois Conference, be admitted to full status. Motion passed by unanimous vote.

Motion to adopt this report prevailed. (See Report No. 8)

report, was approved by vote of the elders and lay members of Conference.

Election of Board of Superannuate Ministers' Aid — In accordance with a new provision of the Standing Rules, members of the Board of Superannuate Ministers' Aid were elected for terms expiring in successive years. By acclamation, Rev. W. H. Dyer was appointed for three years, Rev. W. D. Craker for two years, and Rev. C. E. Olander for one year.

Final Report of the Moral Reform Committee - Rev. S. F. Pillsbury reported the wording of suggested revisions to the report of the Moral Reform Committee. These were passed by

vote, and the report was adopted. (See Report No. 31)

Miscellaneous Business — A motion prevailed that Conference recommend to Dr. Swauger that a postmark deadline be declared for mailing of monthly reports to "Our Progress

Reporter". Motion prevailed that the president, vice president and secretary be directed to send a

memorial to General Conference on revision of Paragraph 72 of the Book of Discipline. Orders of the Day — By motion and vote the Orders of the Day were changed to schedule the Installation of Pastors for the evening service.

Recess - The meeting was recessed, to be reconvened before the scheduled evening service.

Resumption of Business - Meeting was resumed after the supper hour.

Report of Courtesy Committee - Rev. Ron E. Mullen, W. Y. P. S. president, Rev. Ray Powers. song evangelist of the Illinois encampment, and Mr. Howard Moggle, field representative of Marion College, were introduced by the committee, and brought words of greeting and testimony.

Unfinished Business -- Motion prevailed that all unfinished business be left in the hands

of the Missionary Board.

Conference Sermon in 1955 - The Camp Meeting Committee was delegated by action of Conference to assign the Conference Sermon in 1955.

Place of 1955 Conference - Motion prevailed that the place of next conference be left in

the hands of the Camp Meeting Committee.

Report of the Pastoral Relations Committee - The committee report was read by the conference president, and was adopted by vote. (See Report No. 32)

Reading of Minutes - It was moved and supported that the minutes of the sixth and seventh meetings be considered as read for approval, and that the conference president and

secretary be appointed to edit them for publication. Motion carried.

Offering for Conference President — At the suggestion of Mr. John Kodl, Hoyne Avenue delegate, an offering was taken and presented to our president. In response to this spontaneous overture, Brother Bray expressed his gratitude and took the occasion to say "Thanks" also for the prayers and gifts and love offerings of all those who remembered him while he was in the hospital last Spring.

Adjournment — The business session of Conference was adjourned by declaration of the Chair. Rev. Howard Noggle of Marion College led in the prayer of benediction.

Installation Service and Denominational Address. 7:30 p.m. Saturday, July 31, 1954.

Opening - Brother Ray Powers led the congregation in singing "My Hope is Built on Nothing Less" and "The Comforter Has Come". Rev. W. H. Dyer, conference vice president, offered

prayer.

Installation of Officers -- The officers-elect of the Illinois Conference and of the Woman's Missionary Society were presented on the rostrum and Dr. O. G. Wilson officiated in their installation. He laid upon them a charge to diligently serve the Lord in their offices and to stir up the gift in them (2Tim. 1:6), doing exploits in the energy of the Spirit (2Cor. 2:14). A prayer of dedication followed. The response and pledge was given by Rev. A. L. Bray, conference president.

Installation of Ministers - The conference ministerial members knelt at the altar as Rev. A. L. Bray installed them in their assigned work. Brother May Powers led in the singing, and the opening prayer was by Mr. J. J. Blaine, Sunday School superintendent of the Oak Lawn Church. A feature of the opening exercises that will long be remembered was the demonstration by Rev. Francis Davis and Mr. John Masuda, Japanese-Christian student now at Houghton College, of how a missionary and inter-

preter work together to proclaim the gospel on the mission field.

There was a total attendance of 159 in the Sunday School classes. The offerings from this service and the one held a week later amounted to approximately \$50, and were used to pay off a debt on the automatic mimeograph machine purchased by the Sunday School Board for

the Conference office.

Conference Ordination Service 1:30 p.m. Monday, August 2, 1954.

Report No. 6.

Missionary Board

We, the members of your Illinois Conference Missionary Board report as follows:
As the Board of Managers of the Conference in the interim of conference sessions
(Discipline, Paragraph, 278), we held six meetings this past year on August 4, October 10
and November 21, 1953 and February 6, March 18 and May 1, 1954. At these meetings the
work of the Conference and the needs of the pioneer churches and the promotion of the extension of the Savior's Kingdom were considered.

Out of the full record of the decisions made and the churches aided we report the following:

Haw church — Shortly after being set aside by the 1953 Conference for full-time promotion of the extension work of the conference our chairman found that Austin Tabernacle, a fine holiness church about 52 years old, was without a pastor. After repeated trips to Chicago to meet with various official groups of that church body, he secured their consent to unite with our conference and denomination. They conditioned their agreement, however, upon his coming to serve as pastor. We granted this condition and on October 18, 1953, Austin Tabernacle members voted unanimously to become Wesleyan Methodists. On November 8, they were organized as Austin Wesleyan Methodist Church, with 44 full members and 13 associate. By the year and the membership had grown to 60 full and 20 associate members, with good prospects for future growth. These good folk are fitting in well with the conference and denominational program. They are our largest church in the conference and are paying the largest budget of the conference.

New parsonages — AUSTIN (Chicago). Since our chairman had to commute twice a week from the newly-purchased conference parsonage in Princeton to Chicago to serve the Austin church, one of the fine laymen of that church, Mr. A. N. Carstensen, gave his seven-room home to the church for a parsonage. (The regular church parsonage was and is being used by the

assistant pastor.)

Illinois Conference

MAYWUUD -- We have signed a purchase agreement to acquire a lovely home next door (south) to the new Maywood church. The owner is carrying a contract on the place which has made financing easier. This new church is making good gains and has marvelously reconditioned their property and raised funds for debt reduction too. Pastor David Crail and his people rejoice over the victories won this year!

CONFIRENCE PARSCHAGE -- The conference parsonage has been sold and the loan funds re-invested in the Rockford church.

New church buildings -- RCCKFORD has been moving steadily ahead since last fall in the erection of a fine 37 by 74 foot buff brick church building. Pastor William H. Dyer, has worked long and hard, along with his lay people, to bring this new plant into reality. It is expected that it will be completed sometime this fall.

PRINCETON: Pastor Durey and his people have been working hard all year on the new addition to their church. When our chairman moved to Chicago and was unable to aid in the carpenter work of the building, Rev. Thomas J. Murray, who graduated this spring from Marion College, came and offered his services to us to help promote the pioneer building programs of the conference. Since his offer was so timely he was appointed Minister of Church Extension and assigned to the Princeton work. The Conference W. Y. P. S. pays \$25.00 a month on his support: the Missionary Board members, \$25.00; other pledges are coming in and the balance is taken from the Conference Missions Fund, so that his support totals \$200.00 a month. Through a loan secured by his home church (Oak Park) and pastor (Rev. Carl Olander) he was able to get a lovely aluminum house trailer. The building program is rapidly moving on to conclusion and the growing attendance will need all the space created.

Continued effort -- HOYNE AVENUE (Chicago) has continued to receive \$25.00 a month aid on debt payments. This has been a good year in membership growth and financial support. Pastor Moeller states that this church will not need this assistance for the new year.

HOCPESTON has received \$25.00 a month aid on parsonage payments but Pastor Anderson states that the growth of the work and interest makes it unnecessary for the coming year. They have redecorated the church and parsonage and have purchased a fine Sunday School bus with new paint and lettering. We praise God that this older church is getting revived. Pastor Anderson has faced some discouraging problems, but God has brought victory. SHEFFIELD continues to be a slow field. The McCarty's have plodded ahead with a

SHEFFIELD continues to be a slow field. The McCarty's have plodded ahead with a persistance which few pastors possess. They feel that prospects are more encouraging. They see the need of the field and hope to purchase the former Danish Lutheran church building which we are using and then to build a parsonage as a testimony to the community that we are there permanently. We have paid \$25.00 a month parsonage rent this past year.

CREVE COEUR received \$45.00 a month aid on pastor's salary this past year for three quarters. Things are encouraging there and Pastor and Mrs. Blaine have taken this work by the job and intend to build a strong church.

<u>Prospects</u> — A request has come for the establishing of a new Wesleyan Methodist church in Knoxville, Illinois, with the assurance of a good nucleus to start with and financial support too. Pray much that this may ripen into a new church this year should our Lord delay His coming. We may need to use Brother Murray there to erect a church building.

There are other important contacts which we trust will bear fruit during the days to come, but the evidences of God's purposes are still not clear enough to make announcement as yet. We must pray these doors open!

Report No. 7.

Editor of Conference Paper.

As Editor of your Conference paper, The Illinois Tidings, I submit the following report: There have been nine issues of our two to four page mimeographed monthly bulletin containing promotional information and news of the Illinois Conference. There was no October 1953 issue because of the pressure of duties involved in the Princeton building program and the opening of the new Austin (Chicago) church coming at the same time. There were no February or March issues because the editor was seriously ill and in the hospital part of the time. The nine issues published total 2627 copies. Of this number 1100 copies were published by Rev. Robert L. Zuhl, pastor at Oak Lawn, from copy furnished by the editor. The remaining 1627 copies were both edited, mimeographed and mailed from the editor's office, with help from Rev. R. L. Zuhl on two issues.

The mimeographing of "The Tidings" has been a tedious task this year since we had to use an old worn-out machine. However, a few weeks ago, the editor was able to purchase a fine second-hand electrically operated A. B. Dick Model 92 mimeograph which cost originally \$1200.00 but which was purchased for \$175.00! The Conference Sunday School Board has purchased this machine for the conference office on condition that their promotional material will be put out on it also. Hearty thanks to these brethren for their foresight and interest in the conference affairs.

I am not adding a financial statement this year because the Conference Paper is carried as an item of the Conference Treasurer's report and the expenditures are all for publication materials and postage--rather dull items. Vouchers are filed for each item of expense. The balance of \$59.75 in the Conference Treasurer's report is misleading however, because \$60.55 expense was not submitted until after the Conference Treasurer's books were closed for the year. This item would have slightly overdrawn the "Tidings" funds available. If we had published 12 issues instead of 9 we would have been much further overdrawn. This is because our publications budget is based upon membership, but our mailing list upon constituency also. In addition, denominational officials and leaders receive our Conference news via the Tidings. However, it is probably better to subsidize our annual deficit out of the Conference Missions Fund because of the promotional use the paper is put to, rather than raise the budget.

Report No. 8.

Camp Meeting Committee.

Camp Arrangements -- We, your Camp Meeting Committee, do submit the following report: We have held two meetings this past conference year. The first meeting was held on August 4, 1953, to organize the committee and to examine and approve all camp expenditures. We were able to pay all outstanding bills with the money available but had not replaced our balance on hand before camp.

It is our custom to hold our main meeting during the annual ministerial convention in February, but due to the illness of the chairman, the meeting was not held until May 22, 1954. Although many items were uncared for at that date the Lord graciously answered prayer and all arrangements were made for the camp of 1954 with plans laid for future camp meetings.

On August 29, 1953, the chairman went to Peoria, Illinois, at the invitation of the Free Methodist Illinois Conference Superintendent, Rev. W. W. McCormick, to meet with their Conference Board of Trustees concerning the use of their camp grounds, Epworth Park, in 1954 and future years. However, the meeting was cancelled and your chairman placed a letter in the hands of Rev. Mr. McCormick requesting use of the grounds. In March 1954, oral permission was granted to use the grounds under the same conditions and cost es in 1953.

Due to the fact that the Iowa Conference and Illinois Conference dates coincide this year we have lost our excellent cook, Miss Esther Lien, to Iowa, from which we secured her when we first started our camp meetings. In her place we have secured Mrs. Verna Martin, the Free Methodist camp cook, who is reported to be a fine worker. Our camp evangelist is Dr. O. G. Wilson, Syracuse, N. Y., Editor of The Weeleyan Methodist. Our camp song evangelist is Rev. Raymond Powers of Copper Hill, Virginia. Mrs. Wendel Craker and Mrs. Merrill Perkins are the children's workers. The youth program is under the direction of Rev. Ron Mullen, Illinois Conference W. Y. P. S. President.

The Orders of the Day Committee, at conference direction, appointed the speakers for the afternoon camp services. The evangelist will speak mornings and evenings. Our own ministers will speak in the afternoon services. (See Report No. 2.)

In the May 22nd meeting, your Committee planned the daily schedule and program for the 1954 camp, with a three-fold program for adults, youth and children. (See the July 1954 issue of The Illinois Tidings.)

During the month of July, 1954, your chairman visited the camp grounds, Epworth Park, three times to arrange for renting cottages and to counsel with the Free Methodist brethren for future use of the grounds. Thirty-four survey letters and information forms were sent to cottage owners and quite a number agreed to let us rent their cottages. In response to our query our Free Methodist brethren declined to let us build cottages on their grounds, but they did offer to let us continue to rent their grounds for the next 5 years. They set the annual rental at \$500.00, which sum includes the buildings owned by their Conference Missionary ladies (Redfield Chapel and Children's Chapel), the Robert Raikes building (owned by their Sunday School Board) for which we have payed extra rent heretofore.

Conference President.

Greetings to the members of the Illinois Conference! Following are some interesting items concerning the development and state of our Conference and also an accounting of my stewardship as your servant in the Lord.

State of the Conference — This Conference session marks the end of five years since we completed our organization in Charles City, Iowa, in 1949. It was hard to bid farewell to those beloved brethren and to start out in this new venture of faith. There were those who seriously doubted the wisdom of organizing a separate mission conference, but to the GLORY OF GOD we can look back over these years and say it has paid to step out by faith. New churches have been raised up and their properties are being paid for. Our church membership and Sunday School attendance have doubled. Hundreds of people (almost 700) are on our Sunday School roll whom we didn't even know in those days. And many eternity-bound souls have been saved and sanctified and brought into the fellowship of the church just because we dared to launch out on the promises of God. Truly we can here raise our "Ebenezer" and exult, "Hitherto the Lord hath helped us."

Personal Service -- A few months before the 1953 Conference there came a growing sease of an impending change in God's purposes for my service to Him and the Conference. To that end I resigned the beloved Chicagoland (Oak Park) pastorate and asked you to set the work of the Conference President as full-time service. The main reason I offered in defense of this position was that God had a new door of opportunity just about ready to swing open. I stated that I believed it might be some independent work which might be brought into our fellowship. As we stand now on the vantage point of a year of the fulfillment of God's good purposes, we see the glorious panarama of His workings in our lives. You all know the story of how God brought Austin Tabernacle into our fellowship and how I came to minister to them. This dual responsibility would be an impossibility physically and mentally if it were not for the gracious help you have extended me in providing the finances whereby I am able to have adequate help in the office and in the pastoral ministry as well. Brother and Sister Kenneth Lister are Wesleyans from the Canden, N. J., church, and are a big boost to our efforts to develop the Chicago-Austin work.

Because of pressures of the building program in Princeton last fall and the task of bringing Chicago-Austin into our fellowship, followed by my illness and chest surgery last winter, I have been unable to get as much accomplished this year as I did in the provious year. However, in Conference service, I travelled 11,371 miles, contacted the pastors 86 times, made 209 other calls in Conference interest (plus 245 pastoral calls in Austin), sent out 307 pieces of correspondence, held 27 Quarterly Meetings, held 71 other services, sold 7 Disciplines, made 21 visits to pioneer fields, organized one church, held 6 meetings of the Missionary Board and Board of Trustees in joint session and two meetings of the Trustees separately, held 2 Camp Committee meetings, attended 3 sessions of the Conference W. Y. P. S. Executive Council, held 3 conferences with the Conference W. Y. P. S. President over the youth work, served as secretary of the Evangelical Ministers Association of Greater Chicago, served on the Board of the Chicago Bible Society, edited the conference paper (2627 copies were published) and ministered to the Chicago-Austin church. Although I was brought low with illness God has graciously granted me strength for His service far beyond my expectations. Praise His name! You brethren have borne patiently with my shortcomings and together we have seen God's hand at work in our midst, building His glorious kingdom.

 - 4) September 12, 1953. Installed Rev. R. L. Zuhl as pastor of the Oak Lawn church.
- 5) October 12, 1953. Took title to the Conference parsonage at 419 N. First St., Princeton, Illinois.
- 6) October 21, 1953. Sent letter of recommendation for Rev. Glenn Dyer to Rev. R. C. Hawkins, Superintendent of the Michigan Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church. Later, July 21, 1954, sent his letter of transfer to Rev. W. E. Hall. Superintendent of Illinois Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church.
 - 7) November 8, 1953. Organized Chicago-Austin Wesleyan Methodist Church with the

consent of the Missionary Board and the Advisory Board.

8) February 8, 1954. Incorporated Austin Wesleyan Methodist Church.

9) March 1, 1954. Authorized Rev. Harry Moeller to call pastors (at conference expense) regarding chairs available at Moodys.

10) March 9, 1954. Prepared paper for delivery at the President's Conference in Marion, Indiana. (Because of illness, paper was read by Rev. Wm. H. Dyer).

11) March 26, 1954. Filed annual Illinois Conference corporation report with the Secretary of State, Springfield, Illinois.

12) May 21, 1954. Secured cancellation through full payment of the \$3000.00 note held by Basil Boyd, Stoneboro, Pa., on behalf of the Maywood church. Said obligation was met by a denominational Card Call.

16) May 21, 1954. Signed conditional sale contract for Maywood parsonage to be purchased for \$11,000 on contract with owner. \$1500.00 down and the balance of \$9500 at 53%.

17) June 6, 1954. Paid off the \$1200.00 note held by General W. M. S. for funds borrowed by the Oak Lawn church. (\$800 balance owed by Peoria to be continued until 1955.) 18) June 8, 1954. Appointed Kenneth Lister assistant paster of Austin (Chicago) church at the request of the church.

19) June 24, 1954. Secured cancellation by full payment of a note held by the Chio Conference W. M. S. for \$600.00, covering loan for Conference Parsonage.

20) July 6, 1954. Wrote all the officers and chairmen of standing committees of the Illinois Conference telling them when their reports were due during Conference sessions and asking for a written report.

21) July 7, 1954. Invited Rev. Paul L. Kindschi, Executive Secretary of the National Holiness Assin., to visit our annual Conference.

22) July 23, 1954. Wrote all absent members of the Conference (on our Roll) asking them to report to Conference (see our Standing Rules) and to report statistics as the Discipline requires. (Para. 166,2-b)

I am glad for the opportunity to report to the Illinois Annual Conference concerning my activities as your duly elected representative to the Board of Managers of Marion College. It has been my privilege to be present at all of the called meetings of the Board this past year.

Marion College has experienced a good year in the spiritual and material phases of her efforts. God has blessed in the revival meetings and in the missionary conference this past year. Financially, the school has closed another year in good condition and shows a slight margin of profit. This is very remarkable in view of the fact that many small schools are consistently running in the red financially.

This year has seen the addition of a Home Economics Department at Marion College. The school has purchased land and a building for this purpose. Several new lots have been added to the campus area of Marion College to make room for future expansion. Marion has made formal application for entrance to the North Central Association of Colleges and Universities. The planning for Williams Hall for men still moves slowly, but progress is being made. The location of the new dormitory constitutes the immediate problem preventing more rapid progress. New equipment for the school has aided in the job of maintainance of the buildings and grounds.

God has enabled the school to have a good year, but our continued support is needed if this condition is to continue. I solicit your earnest prayers for the interests of Marion College in the days ahead.

Conference Trustees.

The Conference Board of Trustees took the following official actions during the fiscal year 1953-1954:

1. (August 11, 1953) Resolved to purchase from Maude Dobson for the sum of \$8,250 the house and property at 419 N. First St., Princeton, Illinois, as a conference parsonage. Resolved to borrow \$5500 from the Eureka Savings and Loan Assin. of LaSalle, Illinois, to help finance purchase on said property (This action was consummated by taking title October 12, 1953), and to secure the loan by giving a mortgage.

2. (September 28, 1953) Resolved to borrow \$7,000 from the Rockford Kortgage Company of Rockford, Illinois, for construction of the new church building, and to secure said loan by giving a mortgage on the Rockford parsonage. (This loan was not obtained.)

- 3. (October 10, 1953) Resolved to borrow from the Hoopeston Savings and Loan Ass'n. a sum of money (approximately \$1,500.00) sufficient to consolidate the two-fold indebtedness on the parsonage, and to secure said loan by giving a mortgage on the property. (This loan was not obtained.)
- 4. (February 6, 1954) Resolved to sell the conference parsonage property at Princeton to Clarence A. McMally, Princeton, Illinois, for the sum of \$8500, and to pay off the conference indebtedness on said house with the proceeds of the sale. (This action was consummated by conveying title March 3, 1954.
- 5. (April 17, 1954) In order to obtain from the FRA a loan of \$10,000 for construction of the Rockford church building, secured by mortgage on the parsonage, it was necessary that title be held by an individual. Resolved to sell the Rockford parsonage property to William and June Tice for \$16,000. (Title was given and, by agreement, after the loan mortgage was recorded title and proceeds of the loan were to be surrendered back to the Conference Trustees subject to the mortgage, which thus is personally guaranteed by Brother and Sister Tice.)
- 6. (May 1, 1954) Resolved to purchase from Carrie Bariden for the sum of \$11,000 the house and property at 1105 S. Sixth Ave., Maywood, Illinois, as a parsonage for the Maywood church; terms of sale to be \$1500 initial payment, \$9500 on installment contract for deed (54 15 years). Resolved to borrow initial payment of \$1500 from Mr. Basil Boyd, Stoneboro, Pa., for five years at 45 interest, and secure this loan by promissory note.
- 7. Resolved to borrow \$2000 for 2 years at 4% interest from Mr. Basil Boyd as additional financing in the Bockford Church building program, said loan to be secured by promissory note and to be paid by the proceeds of an anticipated Card Call on the new church building. (All these actions were consummated May 21, 1954.)

Standing Rules Committee.

We recommend the following alterations and additions to the Standing Rules of the Illinois Conference:-

- A. Article IV, Section 4). Add one lay member and make section read:

 "4) Committee on Statistics. Resolved, that a Standing Committee on Statistics be elected, consisting of a Conference Statistical Secretary, the Conference Treasurer, one other ministerial and one lay member; that two lay members be elected at the opening of annual conference."
 - B. Article IV, Section 5). Change the section to read:
- "5) Statistical Report. Resolved, that no remittances postmarked later than July 5th shall apply on the church statistical report; that by July 15th each pastor shall submit to the chairman of the Statistical Committee his budget check sheet with receipts covering same, and his statistical blank completed except for the budget section; that the Statistical Committee fill in on the statistical blanks the budget items, both assigned and raised; that other items which are obviously incorrect be checked with the pastor."
 - C. Article IV, Section 8). Organize the committee as follows:
- "8) Board of Superannuate Ministers' Aid. Resolved, that the Board of Superannuate Ministers' Aid be composed of three members, each elected by the conference for a three year term of office, the terms to expire in successive years; that this board be authorized to appoint the Secretary-Treasurer of the Pension Fund.
 - E. Article VI, Section 1). Because of conference action revise the section to read:

- "1). Pastoral Service Report. Resolved, that each pastor of the Illinois Conference shall report to his quarterly conference a summary of the statistics compiled upon the pastoral service monthly record blanks adopted by the 1954 Conference (See Report No. 28), and that the year's summary be read at annual conference."
- D. Article V, Section 1). Designate the conference president as chairman of the Camp Meeting Committee making the section read:
- "I) <u>Authorization</u>. Resolved, that there be held an annual Camp Meeting and that it be under the direction of a Camp Meeting Committee elected by the Illinois Conference, and that the Conference President, as chairman, the Conference W. Y. P. S. President, and the Conference W. M. S. President be members ex-officio of said Camp Meeting Committee.
- I. Article VI, Section 4). Change the responsibility carried in this section by making it read:

- "2) <u>Conference Prayer Interests</u>. Resolved, that the information concerning coming revival meetings and other special prayer needs be published in the conference paper."

Report No. 31.

Moral Reform Committee.

Today the key factor in this conflict against Satan is the Christian Church, the body of Christ. Satan is determined to destroy the body of Christ. His supreme bid for the worship of the world, his supreme instrument for the destruction of the Church, and his supreme challenge to God and Christ is ANTI-CHRISTIAN influences such as: communism, neo-orthodoxy, cultism, levity, irreverence, and indifference. We are inextricably bound up in the purposes of God in this present crisis. We do not know to what degree we can alter and change the course of events; but of this one thing we are sure, that we, and other Christians like us, hold a vitally strategic position. How we and other Christians react to Satan's challenge to Christ's rulership will determine, notwithstanding the sovereignty of God, some of the most important issues of this conflict. The Church of Jesus Christ needs to stand firmly and clearly for God's moral law and its application in its daily walk. It is of utmost urgency that we emphasize to the fullest extent of our ability the Bible teachings of "regeneration", "sanctification", and "separation". The imminent return of our Lord is the great Biblical argument for a pure, unselfish, devoted, unworldly, active life of service. We must earnestly contend for the feath.

- 1) Be it resolved that we, by example, re-emphasize the absolute necessity of intercessory prayer and personal Bible study (Joshua 1:8-9) because we believe the greatest thing that can be done for local and world-wide revival is to bring prayer to a focus upon individual needs and to study to show ourselves approved and make certain our way.
- 2) Be it resolved that our churches seek to strengthen our influence in our communities; that we use advertising to propagate the Gospel of Christ; that we show a co-operative spirit in any community endeavor which lies within the bounds of our conscientious beliefs.
- 3) Be it resolved that we stand firmly opposed to our government's proposed program of Universal Military Training, with its resulting corruption of young minds, emphasis on force and power, and denial of God's ability to protect a godly nation. We do, however, desire to emphasize our belief that all peoples should arise to the defense of their nation in its time of threat or emergency from an outside source.
- 4) We as Christians resolve that parents and all those in responsible positions use every influence to wisely guide our youth with respect to their use of radio and television. There is value to be found in the use of these mediums, but there is also much that is evil in them. If we do not guard our homes and keep them pure and wholesome, we will have lost to Satan the very stronghold and foundation of our society.
- 5) In order that a stronger bulwark may be established, we further resolve that our ministers shall emphasize the importance of an established family altar in each of our homes.

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6) Be it resolved that we seek by every means to draw closer to God and to strive for Christ's image upon our characters and personalities; that denying all ungodliness and worldly lusts, which would hinder our spiritual progress we live soberly, righteously, and godly in this present world in order that we might possess the presence of Christ that all might see and be convinced of His Glory.

7) Be it resolved that we urge conformity to our discipline as regarding dress and the expenditures of that which God grants us (I Cor. 3:16-17), that we may use it as good stewards of His. Further, that we not entangle ourselves with those organizations which would have a tendency to suppress or weaken our public testimony; that we reaffirm our convictions as to the use of narcotics, tobacco, and alcoholic beverages; that we go on record as opposing the presence of those gambling devices, whether for amusement or otherwise, within public places in our community.

8) Be it resolved that we re-emphasize the urgency of separation of Church and State.
9) We wish to command our nation's President and Vice President for their Christian

9) We wish to commend our nation's President and Vice President for their Christian examples, which they have shown from time to time, and their expressed beliefs that the hope of our Nation lies in a return to Christian principles.

It is the recommendation of the Moral Reform Committee that this report be read by each pastor in a public service in his church, at least once, during this conference year.

- (Ten percent credit shall be given for each of the above items, and all societies making a grade of eighty percent shall be placed on the Honor Roll).

Summary of Labors — Miles travelled, 780; letters mailed, 18; plus seven issues of Youth Notes; four executive council meetings held; strove to organize three new societies during the year (see 1953 report # 3, "Plan of Work") two of which were organized and the other not, due to local conditions which would have made organization inopportune at the time; attended Marion Area youth presidents' meeting in October and served as Area secretary for the same; visited eleven pastors; held Fall Rally at which about 100 youth were present and which had a breakfast registration of 75; a Spring convention was not held this year as called for in the plan of work due to a report that there was a feeling in the conference that this day should be used as a general conference gathering; a "Youth Week" tour was conducted through the conference to six different churches; at one of these each conference church was represented; the conference executive council members were all represented on the team (except for Rev. A. L. Bray) as well as Joe Pierce — a converted gangster now active in HI-C work and a member of the Austin church — and the Maywood WTPS Male Quartet. Gain in active membership, 9 (two societies temporarily discontinued their organization, which balanced against an overall gain of 25 members, leaving us with only a gain of 9. Their plan is to immediately reorganize.); gain in Meslevan Youth subscriptions, 48; gain in total finances, \$86.33.

At last years election there were two ballotings; on the first there were four opposing votes to me as precident, and when I asked for another balloting, to clarify the issue, there were ten votes for Rev. Zuhl and seven for me. In the light of this and the fact that I felt that God had other plans for me, it seemed wise to go along with the result of the second ballot. But upon the strong recommendation of the conference president's advisory board, I did continue another year. Because of the fact that I feel our Lord has plans for me this year which would be incompatable with serving again, I believe it is His will for me to resign. In the last three years we have made some good gains together, and I trust that the souls saved and called into HIS service will be felt to be sufficient reward for the sacrifices made by each paster and WYPS leader and youth who prayed and worked.

May the blessing and hand of our faithful Lord continue to rest upon you. I believe that there are greater days of service shead in the harvest fields of our Master.

Report No. 4.

Plan of Work Committee.

The W. Y. P. S. Plan of Work Committee presents the following instructions, recommending:

- That two new societies be organized during the year.
 That we emphasize Wesleyan Youth subscriptions with the Conference Secretary as the solicitor.
 - 3. That a complete membership list be maintained by the secretary.
- That General and Conference dues be the personal responsibility of local members, to be paid quarterly to Rev. James Blaine, 351 Robert Street, Creve Coeur, Illinois.
- 5. That Austin W. Y. P. S. be responsible for the publication of Youth Notes and the W. Y. P. S. Conference President be its editor with each local president acting as reporters.
- 6. That the Chicagoland district chairman call a meeting of the societies and elect two
- other members to the district executive committee, in accordance with the Discipline. 7. That we hold two conference-wide rallies during the year, one in the spring and one
- in the fall. 8. That the president plan to visit each church during Youth Week, and at other opportunities with a gospel team.
- 9. That the Conference W. Y. P. S. vice president prepare a roster of youth equipment
- and care for the same during the year. That one Sunday a month be set aside for missions (preferably the first Sunday of the
- month) and the offering be sent to the treasurer, Rev. James Blaine. 11. That a public educational service be held once a year and the offering be sent to the W. Y. P. S. conference treasurer and designated for Marion College.
- 12. That one night a month be devoted to Bible study.
- 13. That one Sunday night a quarter be devoted to the study of the history of our Wesleven Methodist Church.
 - 14. That the elogan, "Forward in the Fight of Faith", be adopted for the coming year.
- That we take an active interest in the promotion of evangelism and pioneering in 15. Illinois, under the direction of the Missionary Board, using conference dues to promote conference missions. For this purpose we pledge \$25.00 a month toward the support of Thomas Murray, the Conference Builder, as long as the need exists and funds are available.
- 16. That an emphasis in each society be placed on personal and community evangelism, including tract distribution, hospital, jail and home visitation.
- 17. That this Plan of Work be read by each president in a Sunday night service.
