DAILY PROCEEDINGS

As previously arranged, the Iowa Conference met for its sixty-fourth annual session immediately following the Annual Conference Camp Meeting on the Campus of the former German Methodist College, at Charles City, Ia., Tuesday, August 14, 1917, at half-past ten o'clock in the forenoon.

Conference was called to order by the President, Rev. W. R. Emerson. After a song the President conducted devotionals, reading from Hebrews 7:23 to 28, and fervently prayed God's blessing upon our deliberations.

In the absence of the Conference Secretary, Sister Gould, the Rev. Ulis Hekel was elected Secretary pro tem for this forenoon meeting.

The Chair appointed Brethren Hiner and Bradley as a Committee on Credentials.

The above Committee presented the credentials of John Yancey as delegate from Charles City.

The Chair designated the first three rows of seats in the front of the Tabernacle as the Bar of Conference.

As a Nominating Committee J. F. Hiner, John Yancey, Frank Betzer and W. N. Walton were named by the Chair.

The Rev. R. W. Pryor, of Minnesota, was introduced to the Conference and invited to an honorary seat in the Conference.

Motion to adjourn. Dismissed by the Rev. Ira E. Bradley.

First Day. Afternoon Meeting.

Scripture reading from Colossians third chapter and prayer by the Rev. J. F. Hiner.

R. Wesley Mack was elected Secretary pro tem.

Roll was called and the minutes of the forenoon meeting read.

The Committee on Credentials named Mrs. Jeanette Johnson as delegate from West Union.

On motion, the Revs. J. F. Hiner and G. E. Ellis were elected to fill vacancies on the Committee of Itinerancy and Orders until the regular election of officers.

The President read a communication from the Rev. A. W. Curry in which he made request for a letter of standing. Request granted.

The Committee on Credentials named Miss Mabel Young as delegate from Charles City and Howardville charge.

A communication from the Little Pine (Minn.) charge was read by the President and referred to the Committee of Itinerancy and Orders.

On motion of F. Betzer, Conference adjourned at 2:30 P. M. for committee work.

Benediction by Prof. H. W. McDowell, of Miltonvale College.

Second Day. Forenoon Meeting.

Opening song service led by the Rev. G. E. Ellis.
Scripture lesson from Isaiah 12, and prayer by the Rev. C. P. Carkuff.

Roll called and minutes read and approved.

The Credentials Committee read the credentials of delegateselect as follows: Miss Delia Howlett, Marengo; D. L. Stone, Dundee; W. N. Walton, Hoover; W. G. Winterink, St. Charles; and Miss Golda McCann, Guthrie Center Circuit.

The Committee on Nominations made report. On motion of D. F. Smith the report was adopted item by item. Items 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9 and 10 were adopted. Report referred back to the Committee for further items.

On motion, the Rev. F. Betzer was elected Treasurer for this session of Conference to act in the absence of the Conference Treasurer.

The Rev. C. S. Weigel was elected Vice-President to fill the vacancy.

On motion, election of Conference officers was made the order of the day on Thursday afternoon following devotionals.

On motion the President was authorized to name a Committee on Special Orders.

The passage of character was taken up and the following names were called and disposed of as follows: Rev. C. M. Howe. Not having work assigned him for the past two years, the President stated that his name was passed to the Unstationed List. Rev. B. F. Logsdon having died during the past year, his name was ordered passed to the Roll of Honored Dead.

The Chair was authorized to name a committee to have charge of memorial services in honor of the late Rev. Logsdon.

The name of Rev. R. C. Moulton was called. A communication from him was read, in which he requested that his name be dropped from the roll. Request granted.

The name of the Rev. A. W. Curry was called and his statistical report read by the Secretary. His character was passed.

Rev. G. J. Cameron's name was called. No communication.

Character passed.

Rev. L. W. Easton's name was called. A splendid communication from him was read, and on motion the Secretary was instructed to write a letter to him expressing appreciation of his fidelity to the cause of Christ and our branch of His Church.

The name of Rev. J. T. Platt was called. No communication. His character was passed. Also Revs. W. H. Riley, Bertha Ellis and I. W. Leedy.

The Committee on Credentials reported the names of Miss Lottie Buttermore and Miss Mary Gorman as delegates from South Troy charge.

The Chair appointed Miss Lottie Buttermore and Miss Mabel Young as lay members of the Itinerancy and Orders Committee.

Conference adjourned by motion. Benediction by the Rev. W. E. Reeve.

Second Day. Afternoon.

Devotionals were led by the Rev. I. E. Bradley, who read from the 16th chapter of Matthew and offered prayer.

The roll was called and minutes read, corrected and approved.

The Committee on Credentials reported duly elected delegates as follows: William Williams, Pleasant Hill charge; H. D. Williams, Fair View, W. M. Gipe, Emmanuel.

The chair appointed R. Wesley Mack as a Committee on Courtesies.

The above named committee presented "Grandma" M. J. Smith, widow of the late Rev. G. W. Smith, of the Dakota Conference; also President H. W. McDowell, of the Miltonvale College. Each of the above named made appropriate remarks.

The Chair appointed to the Committee of Special Orders the following: Rev. J. F. Hiner, Rev. George Doty and John Yancey.

The Committee of Itinerancy and Orders made partial report

relative to the case of the Rev. R. W. Pryor. Report adopted. See report.

The Committee on Nominations made further report. Items 11 and 12 were read and adopted. On motion the report as a whole was adopted.

The Committee to search for and report on Standing Rules and Resolutions made report which was adopted. See report.

The Chair read a communication from the Conference Secretary, Mrs. E. C. Gould, who is unable to be present at this session of Conference.

At 2 o'clock the Rev. R. W. Pryor preached from a text found in John 12:24.

At 3:30 o'clock Conference was called by the Chair.

In the absence of the Connectional Agent with books for sale, the Rev. E. R. Dodd was requested to place on sale books from our Publishing House.

The Conference expressed itself by vote as being favorable to holding religious services each afternoon at 2 o'clock.

The Committee on Special Orders made partial report as follows: 1st, That President McDowell's address on Connectional interests be heard at 10:30 Thursday forenoon; 2nd, That the hour of 3:30 Friday afternoon be given to President McDowell to address the Conference on our Educational interests. The above partial report was adopted.

Conference adjourned by vote at 4:45 P. M. Benediction by the Rev. A. Johnson.

Third Day. Thursday Forenoon.

Devotionals were led by the Rev. A. Johnson, who read Mark 4:1-20 and prayed.

The Roll was called.

The minutes were read and approved.

Announcements were made by the President.

The Vice-President being called to the chair, Rev. Emerson made report for the Missionary Board. Moved and supported that the report be adopted.

The Rev. W. E. Reeve being called, gave an interesting report of the new work at Little Pine and other points in Minnesota.

The above report was adopted. See report.

Rev. Emerson then made his official report as Conference President.

It was moved and supported that the report be adopted.

An amendment prevailed referring the financial part of the President's Report to the Auditing Committee.

Pending the adoption of the President's report the Rev. Mrs. Anna K. Folger, General Conference W. H. & F. M. Society Organizer, was presented by the Committee on Courtesies, and introduced to the Conference. She briefly addressed the Conference.

The Credentials Committee made partial report, naming Mrs. Maud Sauer and Mrs. Maggie Schuman as delegates-elect from Hoover charge. The time for the orders of the day having arrived, Professor McDowell delivered an interesting and instructive address on Connectional interests, after which Conference stood adjourned by limitation. Benediction by the Rev. A. Cameron.

Third Day. Afternoon.

The afternoon meeting was opened by Scripture reading from First John and prayer by the Rev. W. E. Reeve.

The roll was called and minutes read and approved.

The Auditing Committee made partial report relative to the financial part of the President's report. A motion to adopt prevailed. A motion to adopt the President's report likewise prevailed.

Conference proceeded to the election of Conference officers. The Chair appointed Rev. Ulis Hekel and John Yancey as tellers.

Upon the first ballot Rev. W. R. Emerson was elected President.

For Vice-President—Rev. F. Betzer.

For Secretary-Rev. R. Wesley Mack.

For Treasurer-Rev. Ulis Hekel.

For Conference Trustee for a term of five years—Rev. C. S. Weigel.

The following were elected to the Committee of Itinerancy and Orders: Rev. F. Betzer, for two years, to fill vacancy occasioned by the removal of Rev. Gould from the Conference; Rev. J. F. Hiner, for three years, and Rev. A. Johnson for four years.

A motion prevailed to elect the remainder of the officers by acclamation, and the following were elected to the respective offices:

Tithing Secretary-Miss Ida Gorman.

Advisory Board-Rev. R. Wesley Mack and W. M. Gipe.

Judiciary Committee-Revs. J. F. Hiner, R. W. Mack, W. R. Emerson and F. Betzer.

Committee on Presidency—Rev. F. J. Wilson, Rev. U. Hekel, Rev. C. S. Weigel, G. W. Winterink and W. N. Walton.

Sunday School Board—Rev. G. E. Ellis, Mrs. Jennie Emerson and Miss Mabel Young.

Student Committee-Revs. I. E. Bradley, F. J. Wilson and W. R. Emerson.

A motion prevailed that there be but three members on the Camp Meeting Committee—two elders and one layman.

Camp Meeting Committee—Rev. C. S. Weigel, Rev. U. Hekel and H. D. Williams.

At the conclusion of the above election a motion to adjourn prevailed. The Rev. D. F. Smith pronounced the benediction.

Fourth Day. Forenoon.

Roll called and minutes read and approved.

The Rev. George Doty lead in the devotionals by reading the 18th Psalm and offering prayer.

The Credentials Committee made partial report, naming Mrs. Carrie Ernst as delegate from Albaton charge.

The Rev. E. S. Davidson, a converted Jew of West Falls, N. Y., was introduced to the Conference and stated that he would be pleased to address the Conference in the interest of his people, the Jews, at a later date.

The Special Orders Committee announced Saturday afternoon at 1 o'clock as the time for Memorial services.

Moved and supported that the Rev. F. Betzer act as Conference Reporter. Moved and supported to amend the motion by substituting the name of Miss Mabel Young. Amendment prevailed. A motion to adopt the motion prevailed.

The Committee on Moral Reforms tendered its report, which was unanimously adopted. See report.

Communications and recommendations were read by the Con-

ference Secretary and referred to the proper committees as per previous arrangement.

A motion prevailed that the Statistical Committee report on the completeness of statistical reports and report to the Conference body to take the place of public reading of said reports.

The Rev. Emerson made a very interesting verbal report as delegate to the Iowa State Christian Association meeting held at Sheldon, Iowa, October 16, 17 and 18, 1916.

In the passage of character the following named were called and characters declared passed. Revs. G. S. Fry, F. A. Butterfield, W. H. Riley, G. E. Ellis, G. C. Houck, George Doty, Ina Doty, and Missionaries, Miss May Lord, Miss Miriam Day, Miss Delia Howlett, Dr. Alice Thomas and Dr. Ruby Paine.

The Statistical Committee made partial report relative to pastors' reports. The partial report was adopted.

The name of the Rev. George Smith was called in the passage of character, and on motion his character was passed. Also the following named: Rev. W. E. Reeve, Rev. A. M. Stevens and Rev. D. W. Scott.

Conference adjourned by limitation. Benediction by the Rev. E. S. Davidson.

Fourth Day. Afternoon.

Devotionals were conducted by Rev. Davidson, a Christian Jew, who read and commented upon Romans 11 and offered prayer.

Roll call and minutes read, corrected and approved.

Recommendations of Revs. Aaron Cameron and Henry Weigel were read and passed to the Itinerancy and Orders Committee.

A motion prevailed that the Itinerancy and Orders Committee be authorized and instructed to prepare a list of questions for the use of pastors and churches requesting them for use in the preliminary examination of licentiates in harmony with paragraph 259 of the Discipline.

The time having arrived for the order of the day, Prof. H. W. McDowell delivered a very interesting and instructive address, after reading from 2nd Timothy 4th chapter. Text, "Make full proof of thy ministry." Remarks by the Conference President and prayer by the Rev. E. R. Dodd, President of the Wisconsin Conference.

President McDowell then addressed the Conference in the interest of our denominational schools.

Regular Conference business was then taken up.

On motion of F. Betzer, under suspension of the rule relating to the seating of officers, the Treasurer-elect was instructed to assume at once the responsibilities of his office.

On motion the books of the Treasurer, Rev. F. J. Wilson, were referred to the Auditing Committee.

Motion to adjourn prevailed. Benediction by Rev. R. W. Pryor.

Fifth Day. Forenoon.

The Rev. G. C. Houck read the 37th Psalm and offered prayer. Roll was called and the minutes read and approved.

The Committee of Itinerancy and Orders made partial report, which was adopted.

The Committee on Disbursement of Superannuated Ministers' Funds tendered its report. Report adopted. See report.

The Committee on Sunday Schools likewise made report, which report was adopted.

The passage of character was again taken up and the following names were called and characters declared passed: Revs. W. R. Emerson, R. Wesley Mack, F. Betzer, A. Johnson, G. C. Houck, I. E. Bradley, J. F. Hiner, D. F. Smith and C. S. Weigel.

Upon request the chair made the following ruling regarding receipts presented to the Treasurer: "That the Treasurer is responsible for recording only receipts sent to him."

The name of the Rev. B. J. Hoover was called and his character passed by vote, he being absent.

The name of the Rev. W. E. Reeve was also called and passed. On motion the matter of locating the place of meeting of the next Conference and Camp Meeting was left with the Camp Meeting Committee and the Conference President.

It was also voted to hold the Camp Meeting and Conference next year in the same order as held this year, viz., the Camp Meeting first.

On motion the Secretary was authorized to have the Minutes published by our Publishing House at Syracuse, N. Y., and to draw upon the Conference Treasurer to cover necessary expense.

The following motion prevailed: Moved that the Camp Meeting

Committee be instructed to provide a banner of a permanent character, to be used annually, at the Conference and Camp Meeting, and also such other advertising matter as they deem advisable, the expense of same to be paid from the Camp Meeting Fund.

Conference adjourned by motion. Benediction by R. W. Mack.

Fifth Day. Afternoon.

Memorial services were conducted in memory of the late Rev. B. F. Logsdon, an elder of this Conference. Appropriate music was rendered and Scriptures read and prayer offered. Remarks relative to his life and labors were made by Revs. Johnson, Emerson and Mack.

The Conference President was instructed to write a letter of sympathy to the bereaved family and to express to them our appreciation of his services rendered in our Conference.

Following the above memorial services, the roll was called and

the minutes read, corrected and approved.

On motion Conference adjourned to the call of the Chair.

At 6:15 o'clock Conference was called to order by the Chair.

'A part of the Treasurer's report, kept at this session by the Rev. F. Betzer, in the absence of the regular Treasurer, the Rev. F. J. Wilson, was read and referred to the Auditing Committee.

The portion kept by the Rev. Ulis Hekel was likewise read

and referred to the Auditing Committee.

The Treasurer's report by Rev. F. J. Wilson was read by Rev. F. Betzer.

A summary of all the above named partial Treasurers' reports

was read by Treasurer Hekel. See report.

The Auditing Committee made report, which was adopted. See report.

On motion the Treasurer's report was adopted.

In the passage of character the names of the Revs. F. J. Wilson and Ulis Hekel were called and their characters declared passed.

The Committee on Itinerancy and Orders made completed report, which was adopted.

The Committee on Apportionment of the Budget made report, which was adopted.

Committee on Building Funds made report, which was adopted.

The Committee on Thanks also reported and said report was adopted.

The Committee on Resolutions made report, which was adopted and by vote ordered published in the Wesleyan Methodist, and Revs. Betzer and Ellis were appointed a committee to send a telegram to the United States President in harmony with the provisions of the above named resolutions.

The Committee on Statistics also reported. Report adopted. A motion prevailed rescinding the Standing Rule adopted in 1911 relating to the authorization of the Conference Treasurer to loan funds.

On motion it was ordered to pay to the ex-Treasurer, Rev. F. J. Wilson, and the present Conference Secretary each \$10 from the Conference Fund.

The Committee on Pastoral Relations made report, which report was adopted.

The Committee on Postoffice Addresses made report.

On motion the Chairman of the Camp Meeting Committee was instructed to prepare for publication an account of the Camp Meeting and forward to the Secretary to be embodied in the published Minutes.

On motion the Conference President was authorized to take subscriptions at the Sabbath morning services for the Church Extension Fund.

The Conference Treasurer was instructed to pay to the Secretary and the Statistical Committee a sum sufficient to cover expense of necessary stationery, etc.

The minutes were read and approved.

On motion Conference adjourned sine die at 7:30 P. M.

The President led in prayer and all joined in singing the Doxology, and the benediction was pronounced by the Conference-Secretary.

All of the Sabbath services were signally owned of the Lord, and His presence was very manifest. A goodly number received definite help during the series of meetings of the Camp Meeting and Conference.

STANDING RULES AND RESOLUTIONS

By an act of Conference, the Conference Secretary was instructed to include in the published Minutes all Standing Rules and Resolutions of this Conference.

On page 3 of Vol. 3 of the Conference Records the following is found:

"On motion of Rev. S. A. Gilley, all resolutions of this Conference in annual session so far as adopted at previous meetings are hereby repealed."

Page 138, Vol. 3: "Ordered that, until further notice, Annual Conference shall convene on Tuesday, not Wednesday as heretoiore."

Page 272, Vol. 3: "Resolved, (1) That the President of the Conference be constituted permanent chairman of the Committee of Religious Services; (2) That the pastor and first delegate from the charge at which the next Conference is to be held be constituted the remaining members of the committee for the session."

Page 274, Vol. 3: "Resolved, That all Sunday Schools under the pastoral oversight of Wesleyan Methodist pastors may be included in the statistical report of the pastor having said school in charge."

Adopted 1906: "Resolved, (1) That the fixing of the time of the sessions of the Conference be hereafter left with the Conference President and Connectional officers; and that they be requested to fix the time before the first of September if possible; (2) That the time of opening and closing the meetings of the sessions be fixed as follows: Forenoon meetings open at 9:30 and close at 11:30; afternoon meetings at 1:00 and close at the discretion of the body; (3) That the bar of the Conference be fixed and announced by the Conference President; (4) That all visiting brethren and sisters in harmony with our doctrines and principles are invited to honorary seats."

Adopted 1906: "Resolved, That the Conference tents be in charge of the Conference President, who shall see that they have proper care and storage. He may rent the same when not in use to outside parties as opportunity affords, and his judgment directs, or on such terms as he and the desiring parties may agree upon."

Adopted 1911: "Resolved, That all papers and documents be referred to their respective committees."

Adopted 1911: "The Missionary Board is hereby authorized to pay out all moneys to be paid from the Conference Fund."

Adopted 1912: "Resolved, That all reports of committees be made in writing, complete and ready for the printer and handed to the Secretary at the earliest possible date after such report is made."

Adopted 1912: "Resolved, (1) That the Conference President be required, authorized and appointed to travel the Conference as President, having general supervision of the spiritual interests and benevolences thereof, holding at least one service at each of the churches during the year under such dates as he may announce in advance; (2) he shall raise funds to meet the demands of the Conference work, and receive contributions for missions, education, superannuated ministers where there are no pastors and assist the pastors in raising the same where desired; (3) he shall have general supervision of the church property within the bounds of the Conference, and shall inquire into the titles of the same to see that no property is loosely held, and shall look after the rental of Conference property, and see that the rent is placed in the Conference Treasury: and shall investigate the possibility and the feasibility of the sale of Conference property not in use, and report his findings at the next session of the Conference; (4) he shall devote as much time as possible and as occasion may afford in quarterly and other meetings; (5) he shall be paid from the Conference Fund the sum of seven hundred dollars (\$700.00) and traveling expenses per year for his services, the same to be paid quarterly."

Adopted 1913: "Resolved, That the Committee on Itinerancy and Orders be ordered to furnish a list of the Conference preachers and licentiates entitled to vote at each Annual Conference, as provided by the Discipline."

Adopted 1913: "Resolved, That an elder on the stationed list holding church and Conference membership in this Conference and residing without its bounds, the local church to which he belongs is entitled to a delegate for said elder."

Adopted 1912: "Resolved, That Conference officers be not seated until the close of the Conference session at which they are elected."

Adopted 1913: "Resolved, That the Committee of Itinerancy and Orders be ordered to furnish a list of Conference Preachers and Licentiates entitled to vote at each Annual Conference, as provided by the Discipline."

Adopted 1914: "Resolved, That the President be authorized to grant letters to members of disbanded classes."

REPORT OF THE CAMP MEETING COMMITTEE.

The camp meeting of the Iowa Conference is now a matter of history, having been held on the College Campus in Charles City, Iowa, August 19 to 26, 1917.

We thank our Heavenly Father for His presence in saving and sanctifying power. A goodly number sought and received the forgiveness of their sins, while others pressed forward into the blessed experience of entire sanctification, and their clear-cut testimonies were proof that the blood has never lost its power.

Rev. W. L. Thompson, of New Castle, Indiana, was the Evangelist in charge. He brought the messages with no uncertain sound. Brother Thompson is a man approved unto God, a workman that needed not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth, and the truth was brought home to hearts in a searching manner, yet in a loving and tender spirit.

Rev. G. Edwin Ellis, our singing evangelist of University Park, Iowa, had charge of the singing. Brother Ellis is well and favorably known among us, and many were the blessings showered upon us as he sang the glorious old Gospel in song.

The location and conveniences of the camp were delightful. Ample room for the tents was found beneath the evergreen trees. The white tents underneath the beautiful green of the trees, together with the spiritual atmosphere pervading the place, caused one to think of the "Pearly White City, that's soon coming down."

On calling for financial help for the expenses of the meeting, the people responded with the generous subscription of about two hundred and fifty dollars, which covered all expenses.

Now let us bow our heads and ask God's blessing upon the people of St. Charles and Charles City and Howardville, that the

seed sown among them in this campaign may continue to spring forth and bear fruit until Jesus comes, and that many of their number may with us be gathered unto the Lord at His glorious appearing. (Signed)

SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON STANDING RULES.

Report of Committee appointed to search Minutes for standing Rules and Resolutions that fail to appear in the printed Minutes.

1912. "Resolved, That Conference officers be not seated until the close of the Conference session at which they are elected.

REPORT OF MISSIONARY BOARD.

The prophet foretells the great mission of Jesus Christ in the words: "The Spirit of the Lord God is upon me; because the Lord hath anointed me to preach good tidings unto the meek; he hath sent me to bind up the broken-hearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives, and the opening of the prison to them that are bound; to proclaim the acceptable year of the Lord, and the day of vengeance of our God; . . . and they shall build the old wastes; they shall raise up the former desolations, and they shall repair the waste cities, the desolations of many generations."

The acceptable year of the Lord must still be proclaimed. There are waste places to be builded, there is yet much land to be possessed. The fields are white to the harvest in the homelands, and need reapers.

We have been seeking to build up the fields which are not self-supporting and to push out into the new. The Church Extension Fund is still young and not of large proportions, but it has been growing during the year. Reeve has been actively engaged in the new field opened in Minnesota, and his labors have been blessed of the Lord. DAILY PROCEEDINGS

First Meeting, August 15, 1917.

The Woman's Home and Foreign Missionary Society of the Iowa Conference was called to order by the Vice-President, Sister Jennie Emerson.

Meetings were held in Conference tabernacle.

Opening song, "Jesus Paid It All."

Devotionals were conducted by Sister Delia Howlett, who read as a Scripture lesson the 2nd Psalm. She made some remarks on prayer for our mission work and offered prayer.

Moved and seconded that the ladies present of all local societies be given honorary seats and be given all rights and privileges, with the exception of voting.

The chair appointed Sister Delia Howlett as Treasurer pro tem. Moved and supported that we have our public program Saturday at 8:00 o'clock P. M.

The Acting President appointed Sisters Lottie Buttermore and Lizzie Betzer as a Program Committee to arrange for the public meeting.

The time for election of officers was set, being Friday afternoon immediately after our religious services.

The chair appointed Sisters Haymond and Weigel as a Statistical Committee, also Sisters Lizzie Lortscher and Jeanette Johnson as Auditing Committee.

Rev. Anna K. Folger, General Conference Organizer, was introduced and made some remarks.

Second Meeting, August 16, 1917.

The Committee on Credentials made a partial report, presenting the names of Sister Clara Day and Sister Ida Hunn.

The report was adopted.

Orders of the day were taken up.

The chair appointed Sisters Jeanette Johnson and Mabel Mack as tellers.

The election of officers for the ensuing year resulted as follows: President—Mrs. Clara Wilson, first ballot.

Vice-President-Mrs. Jennie Emerson, first ballot.

Secretary-Miss Lottie Buttermore, first ballot.

Treasurer—Mrs. Lucy Kirkpatrick, first ballot. Organizer—Miss Delia Howlett, first ballot.

Y. M. W. B. Superintendent—Mrs. Ollie Haymond, first ballot. Communications were read from our President, Sister Clara Wilson, Sister Bertha Williams, and Mrs. A. E. Belk, President of the W. H. & F. M. Society of the North Carolina Conference.

Reports were read from the Albaton and St. Charles Societies. These reports were referred to the Statistical Committee.

A motion was carried that the Secretary be instructed to send a communication to our worthy President, Sister Clara Wilson, conveying our regrets of her absence at this session of Conference; also our appreciation of her faithful labors in the past.

It was moved and supported that we pay for space occupied in the Annual Conference Minutes, the amount to be paid from the Conference Treasury.

A motion prevailed that we adjourn to the call of the chair. Closing prayer by Sister Dodd.

Fifth Meeting, August 18, 1917.

The meeting was opened by prayer by Sister Mack.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The Auditing Committee made report. The report was adopted.

A motion was made and seconded that we adopt the Treasurer's

report.

It was moved and supported that we retain the amount of \$10.00 in the Conference Treasury, and that the remaining sum in the Treasury be equally divided, giving one-third for the Kunso building in Africa, one-third for work in India, and one-third for our mountain work.

It was moved and supported that we appropriate one-half the money sent for foreign work for the Kunso house, the other half for India.

It was moved and seconded that the Secretary be instructed to send letters of greeting from our Conference Society to Sisters Miriam Day, May Lord and Dr. Alice Thomas, in Africa.

The minutes of the present meeting were read and approved. Encouraging remarks were made by the Vice-President. The Conference Society adjourned sine die. Closing prayer by Sister Folger.

Saturday, 8:00 P. M.

Opening song, "We're Marching to Zion."

Special song by Ladies' Quartette, "Where Are the Reapers?" Scripture found in Psalm 96 was read by Mrs. Ina Doty, followed by prayer by Rev. J. F. Hiner.

Miss Delia Howlett then gave an interesting talk on our missionary work in Africa.
