#### CONFERENCE RESOLUTIONS

- 1. The Resolutions of Conference shall be printed in the Conference Minutes each year.
- 2. All visiting members of our own, or other Churches in harmony with our principles, shall be invited to honorary seats in the Conference.
- 3. The Conference President shall receive twenty dollars per year for postage and stationery; also any needed traveling expense. At any time the President be required to travel the Conference, his duties and pay shall be defined by the Conference.
- 4. The Conference Secretary shall receive twenty-five dollars per year for his labor and incidental expenses.
- 5. The Conference Treasurer shall receive twenty-five dollars per year for his services in caring for the funds.
- 6. In making his report, the Conference Treasurer is authorized to close his books one week before the Conference session. The Treasurer of the Superannuate Ministers' Relief Association also shall close his books one week before the Conference session.
- 7. All monies disbursed by the Conference Treasure during the interim of Conference shall be upon order of the President, except in case of payment to the President, when such order shall be issued by the Vice-President. It is under stood that any payment ordered by the Conference direct may be paid by the Treasurer without an order as directed above.
- 8. No monies shall be loaned by the Conference Treas urer except by order of Conference, or by the consent of the President and his Advisory Board.
- 9. Each elder shall make his engagement as Pastor with the understanding that if he be elected Conference President he shall be released in his pastoral engagement.
- 10. The first Sunday in each month shall be known as Home Mission Sunday, and the Sunday School offerings shall be given to Home Missions, and should be sent to the

#### Conference Treasurer.

- 11. In securing Evangelists for the Camp Meeting, the Camp-meeting Committee is privileged to secure not more than one worker from outside the Denomination.
- 12. The Camp-meeting Committee shall be composed of the Conference President, as Chairman; and three ministers and three laymen, all to be elected by ballot (after the Conference of 1923), the term of office to be three years the time of one minister and one layman expiring each year
- 13. Pastors shall state financial items in their statistical reports in even dollars, except in items affecting the Budget; and as far as possible are requested to report all budget items in even dollars. When such rule is not followed, the Statistical Secretaries are authorized to drop decimals, except as provided above.
- 14. The offerings for Superannuated ministers shall be taken within sixty days after Conference, and forwarded to the Treasurer of the Superannuate Society.
- 15. The Committee on Credentials shall secure from each delegate the necessary credentials as provided by our Discipline, with the Post Office address of the same.
- 16. The closing Sunday of the Conference year shall be the Sunday following the beginning of the Annual Conferference. The Pastor's salary on this closing Sunday shall be paid by the Church of which he is Pastor; and for the first Sunday of the new Conference year it shall be paid by the charge to which he is going.
- 17. Newly elected Conference Officers shall take office after the close of Conference Sunday.
- 18. The Conference President shall include in the Orders of the Day a special period to consider Camp-meeting business.
- 19. A Nominating Committee shall be elected to con sider and nominate all elective officers of the Conference The Committee shall consist of four Elders and four laymen The report of the Nominating Committee shall be read to the Conference the day preceding the election.

- 20. Each church member over fourteen years of age shall be apportioned fifty-two cents per year for Church Extension.
- 21. (New) The delegates' credentials shall be sent to the Committee on Credentials before the opening of the Conference, and the Conference Secretary shall send printed blanks with the statistical, character, etc.

# Report No. 2 ...

The President's Report to Conference-1944-45

To the Members of the One Hundred and Third Session, Champlain Annual Conference, Wesleyan Methodist Connection (Church) of America:

In the good providence of God we are permitted to meet again in our annual assembly. For a time it seemed that we might not be able to hold our conference and camp, but prayer has prevailed and we are here. The year just closed has been a good one for all of us. True, there have been difficult problems and serious obstacles along the way for many of us. Nevertheless the Lord has blessed and prospered the work throughout the Conference. As I have been permitted to observe the different charges, it seems that marked progress has been made on many of them.

During the year it has been my privilege to organize three new churches. They are namely, Cobleskill, Fort Miller and Malone. In some instances those who became members of these new organizations had previously belonged to some other Wesleyan Church, but a good number were additions. A splendid church building has been purchased and work opened at Cohoes. Much credit is due the faithful pastors who by their vision and faithful effort have been instrumental in bringing these new churches into the conference. Nor should we forget the loyal laity throughout the conference who have backed these projects with their means and prayer.

We wish we might say that every pastor is receiving an adequate salary. Some churches have seen fit to increase the salary paid their pastors. Much of the church property has been repaired and some valuable additions have been made. Three new buildings have been purchased and a substantial amount paid on each of these. Almost every charge has raised its budget in full. Our Young Peoples' Society has outdone itself in assisting in our extension program. They have helped Cobleskill to the extent of \$100.00, Malone to the extent of \$100.00, and Cohoes, \$50.00

It has seemed wise, if not almost imperative, for your President to make several special appeals for help of one kind or another during the year. The response has been whole-hearted and we feel that the assistance rendered has meant much to those concerned.

The old church at Macomb has been torn down, and in a better location a new building is being constructed. The contributions made by the pastors of the conference, either in labor or material, have meant much in this effort, for they have done much to encourage the faithful pastor and his people.

In closing, we would humbly give God thanks for all His help during the year.

### Report of the Conference Sunday School Secretary

This Conference has been one of advancement under the blessing of God. We have four new Sunday Schools, and have kept all the others. Our enrollment in the main school exceeds 1500, I believe the highest in many years, and we trust that we may so have the Spirit of Christ that He shall see we can stand such a blessing without being heady or high-minded.

On Rally Day last year, the reports (100 per cent) said we had 1684 present on that Sunday. Our average is over 1100 per Sunday. In addition we have the Home Department which makes our total enrollment over 1800.

The Thanksgiving (total) offering, again with 100 per cent of the Sunday Schools co-operating, was \$432.19. (It had been suggested as a goal that we raise an amount equal to 35c per church member. Counting active and associate members that would have been \$345.45, so wasn't that fine!)

"There is still MUCH to be possessed." All of New England with only two Wesleyan Methodist Sunday Schools; in addition the cities of eastern and northern New York State. Millions of people who do not know of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, and many of them who do not know of, or experience, salvation through Jesus the Christ. What a challenge!

Beside the above, in our Sunday Schools ONLY 2 report a Daily Vacation Bible School, ONLY 3 report teacher training classes, 10 have no Home Department, 7 have no cradle roll department (according to my records).

There is good co-operation for reports, Special Days, Thanksgiving offering and otherwise. Thank you all who have a part in this! But let's determine under God to "press (forward) toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus."

#### W. C. P. S. REPORTS

The Young People's Conference for 1945 was called to order July 7, 1945 by Rev. Edwin Seaman, President. Rebecca Chapman led the group in singing "Showers of Blessing." Mr. Seaman gave the opening speech, which was followed by prayer.

The bar of conference was voted to be the first three rows.

The secretary's minutes were read and approved. After a brief discussion on the problem of purchasing a service flag and honor roll for the servicemen from the Champlain Conference Young People's Society, it was decided to elect a committee to take care of these items. The committee is to consist of 3 members—One chairman, one member from the Northern and one from the Southern district. Harold Chapman was elected as chairman. The remaining two members chosen were Shirley Gunsalus and Mrs. Randall.

The motion was passed to include the names of those who were closest to the Church, Sunday School and Young People's Society. The committee was given power to decide the amount of money, the measurements of the flag and any other problems that might arise. The honor roll is to include the names and home addresses.

Rev. Edwin Seaman gave his presidential report (see low). This was accepted.

The Treasurer's report was also read and accepted.

The motion was passed to continue the extension work as of last year. After a brief discussion as to what to do with the money in the treasury, the motion was passed to authorize our President to work with the Conference President and his advisory board regarding these funds. The extension assessment is one dollar per member, both associate and active.

The date for the annual convention has been set as August 28, 29 and 30. Unless further invitations are given to the executive committee, the convention will be held on the West Chazy Camp Grounds. Rev. H. K. Sheets, of Marion, Indiana, is to be the speaker. At this convention one of

the outstanding events will be the giving away of a plaque to the winning society for this year (based on statistical reports).

The motion was made to elect a reporter with the officers to handle any news items for the Young People's Society throughout the year. These reports are to be sent to the 'Wesleyan,' the 'Wesleyan Youth' and the 'Challenger'. This motion was accepted.

It was suggested that there should be more rallies for the various churches. By common consent the matter was left in the hands of executive committee.

Rev. Elton Seaman told of a project in Cooks Corners to raise money. Eight or ten young people agreed to give only a dime ertra each week. Already over thirty dollars has been raised which will be used for mission work. They also have employed a plan to write to servicemen.

The statistical reports were read, after which tellers were appointed to take care of the election of officers. The officers are as follows:

#### STANDING RULES

- 1. The Standing Rules of the Conference Missionary Society shall be printed in the Conference Minutes each year.
- 2. The Conference Treasurer is authorized to close her books one week before the Conference session begins.
- 3. One of the two statistical blanks sent to each society, after being carefully filled in, is to be given to the statistical committee at the beginning of conference; the other is to be retained by the delegate and read to the local society at the first meeting of the new year. Receipts and disbursements must be made to balance before being placed in the

hands of the statistical committee; also giving rating according to efficiency standard.

- 4. All money raised by the society shall be used for missionary work, and no money paid out without a vote of the society.
- 5. The Conference President shall receive annually \$5.00, the Treasurer \$10.00 and the Secretary \$2.00, to defray expense of postage and writing material.
- 6. The voting body shall be composed of conference officers, Y. M. W. B. superintendents, presidents of local societies, and one delegate from each local society, lady pastors and pastor's wives.
- 7. Each local society shall continue sending \$6.00 to Southern Mountain Work, and \$5.00 or more to Hephzibah Orphanage. This must be sent through the Conference Treasurer and applies on the budget.
- 8. It is required that twenty-five cents per member of the local society dues be forwarded through the Conference Society Treasurer of the General Conference for the general fund. Also that twenty-five cents be retained in the conference treasury and the remaining fifty cents be used directly for missionary work and be applied on local church budget.

The local societies shall disburse all conference and general conference funds through the Conference Treasurer, who shall in turn remit all general conference funds to the general conference treasurer.

- 9. Each society is to make provision for a missionary to travel the conference as early in the year as possible, allowing ample time for each charge.
- 10. The plan of work should be read quarterly to our local societies to keep us enthused in our work.

#### Report No. 2

#### PLAN OF WORK

We Recommend that each local W. H. & F. M. Society-

- 1. Have regular monthly meetings at which we urge the use of Study Book, missionary program, prayer, offering and necessary business. Arrange with the pastor for one public, well-advertised meeting, in which the whole church may learn of all our missionary fields, workers and needs.
  - 2. Observe special days. (See Standard of Efficiency.)
- 3. Endeavor to secure every woman of the congregation as a member of the Society.
- 4. That we try to enlist the men as honorary members, giving them charge of at least one meeting a year.
- 5. Officers to be subscribers to and readers of the "Wesleyan Missionary' and 'Wesleyan Methodist,' also 50 per cent of the members to be subscribers to the magazine.
- 6. Continue contributions of clothing and supplies to Home Missions as listed in the "Wesleyan Missionary," cheerfully accepting the estimated value set by the workers. Contribute to needs of the foreign fields, as bandages, also

Sunday School charts and cards for Africa and scripture calendar pictures for India.

- 7. Continue sending canned goods and other supplies to Camp. Needed items are towels, wash cloths, pie tins, cake pans, large granite baking dishes, pitchers for the rooms, heavy pads for cots, bedspreads, small rugs, Electric lamps, towel racks, soap, mirrors and dressers.
- 8. Send ten cents per member for cleaning of camp rooms to the treasurer, Mrs. Myrtle Larabee, Mooers, N. Y. not later than May 1.
- 9. At the last meeting of the year before Conference, elect officers for the coming year, including solicitor for the magazine and a delegate, other than the church delegate, if possible, whose board and room is provided for Conference week, approximately \$6.00; also, instructing the delegate the amount to pledge at Conference for Missions. Also, that each Band shall instruct their delegate the amount to pledge at Conference, this amount to be paid through the Conference Superintendent.
- 10. That each delegate report to her society at the first meeting after Conference, the proceedings of the Conference Society and spread the information gained concerning the work.
