

All churches whose regular Sunday school offerings and regular church tithes and offerings average the following per week for the month, shall remit as indicated:

Less than \$50.00 per week shall remit 7% \$50.00 to \$99.99 per week shall remit 8% \$100.00 to \$149.99 per week shall remit 9% \$150.00 to \$199.99 per week shall remit 10% \$200.00 and above remit 11%

These receipts shall be apportioned as follows:

The Judiciary Committee, having received from the president and his Advisory Board a complaint against the character of ELDER JAMES A. ROOK, made full investigation and came to the conclusion that the complaint should be submitted for trial. Elder Rook, personally, was cited to appear

between the dates of May 15 and May 25, 1964, so that the complaint could be proved or disproved. Mr. Rook was informed that the Judiciary Committee would make every effort to secure for him a fair trial. Before May 15, 1964, Mr. Rook, according to the best information secured by the Judiciary Committee, vacated the parsonage and left for parts unknown. (See Discipline, paragraph 265.) Because of the principle stated in paragraph 485 ("the removal of the accused person beyond the jurisdiction of the judicature during the pending trial shall be deemed presumptive proof of guilt, unless satisfactory evidence be presented of inability to be present"), and because Mr. Rook, could not be contacted nor presented himself for trial by or before May 25, it is the judgment of this Committee that the evidence points to an admission of guilt, and this Committee recommends that the Annual Conference deprive Elder James A. Rook of Ministerial Office and Credentials (See paragraph 489).

Resolutions and Laws

I. CHURCHES

A. Houses of Worship:

Our houses of worship should not be open to any evangelist or ministers of any other church to hold a series of meetings or to maintain regular appointments for another congregation; provided, however, that usual denominational courtesies be extended to other ministers in occasional appointments. A waiving of the above by a contract or lease of building must be obtained through the Board of Trustees of the Indiana Conference.

B. Pastoral support:

- 1. All charges should in addition to the regular stipulated salary, assume the responsibility of providing a suitable home in which the pastor may live, a heating plant for that home, and, also, payment of utilities, including fuel, electricity, water, water-conditioning, and sewage, also the pastor's medical, surgical and hospitalization insurance premium "and at least one-half Social Security." The parsonage telephone, except for personal long-distance calls, shall be considered as church incidental expense and paid for by the church.
- 2. All charges and stations to which a pastor shall move shall pay the moving and transportation expenses of said pastor, the same to be done in addition to his salary. When the Conference demands the services of any one, it shall bear the moving expenses, if any expense shall be incurred.
- 3. Each charge should grant their pastor each year two weeks' vacation with pay.

C. Pulpit Supply:

- 1. No charge shall call any one as pastor, or to supply the work by ministers coming from other denominations as long as there are ministers in our Conference qualified and available to take work. The President after he has exercised his prerogative in the reception of ministers coming from other denominations is to immediately refer them to the Committee on Itineracy and Elders' Orders, who shall make a thorough investigation as to the ministry and life of such applicants, who shall report their findings to the President, after which appointments may be made.
- 2. It is recommended that churches giving a vote for recall of their pastor, vote on or between the third and fourth Sundays of May.

D. Annual Business:

The Annual business meeting of the local church, which is referred to in Par. 165 (4) of the Discipline, shall be held during the month of June.

E. Church Council:

1. It is recommended that each church have a church council which shall serve as the coordinating committee for the entire church program. This council may be composed of the pastor, the S. S. Supt., the church treasurer, the president of the WMS, the president of the WY, the first member of the advisory committee, the chairman of the

Board of Stewards, the chairman of the pulpit supply committee and other leaders or committee members as the church may deem advisable.

2. The pastor may call the council together monthly or as many times during the Conference year as deemed advisable. The council may initiate business, make referrals, listen to reports, and serve in an advisory capacity for the entire church program. The Boards of the church shall continue to function as specified by the Discipline and in no way should this council displace any other committee or board nor assume any authority vested in any other committee.

3. When such a council exists, it should be the duty of the council to meet with the conference officials at least one time during the Conference year when the official visits the church to discuss problems and ideas which have to do with the better operation of the local church.

F. Newly Organized Churches:

Conference Budget shall not be assigned a newly organized church until one year from the end of the fiscal year in which they are organized.

II. PASTORAL DUTIES

A. Insurance:

1. It is the duty of the pastors to look after the insurance of our church and parsonage properties. All insurance shall provide for losses caused by fire, lightning, hail and tornado. A failure on the part of the pastor shall be a censurable offense. If the church fails to insure their property upon reasonable effort of the pastor to secure the same, then said failure shall be reported to the President of the Conference who shall then have the property insured. In such cases all insurance monies received from losses by fire, lightning, hail and tornado shall be used in Church Extension work as the Conference Board of Trustees considers best.

B. Statistics:

1. Each pastor and evangelist shall file a complete statistical report with the statistical committee, without fail, by July 10. In reporting statistics, all figures given shall be in even dollars at the nearest dollar, i.e., \$1.01 to \$1.50 shall be reported as \$1.00 and from \$1.51 to \$1.99 shall be reported as \$2.00. This applies to all except budget and benevolence items. All unaccounted for members appearing in the membership list shall be referred to the discontinued list. All members in excess of the number reported shall be reported as received.

2. When a pastor or evangelist shall not have submitted satisfactory reports, including statistics, and, in the case of a pastor, when his church's Superannuated Pension budget is not paid in full, he shall be referred to the Character Committee before his official character be

passed.

3. Delegates' credentials secured from the secretary shall be mailed to the assistant secretary by the pastor, not later than July 10.

C. Quarterly Meetings:

1. All quarterly meetings shall be arranged for by the pastor and his advisory board and shall be held near the close of each fiscal quarter. The pastor shall report quarterly to the President and Vice

President on blanks formulated by the President. This report shall be sent in immediately following the quarterly business meetings.

D. Calling List:

1. Each pastor should prepare a calling list of all the homes connected with the Church and Sunday school; listing the relationship they hold to the church; listing their names and addresses by city, street and number, the same to be kept for his own work while on the pastorate and to be given to his successor on the field.

E. Church Extension & Evangelism:

- 1. Each pastor whose total receipts from his charge exceeds \$4000 per year should seek to start a new work or make his services available for a revival meeting in a new or weaker church to help establish it. A weaker church shall be considered as one whose pastor's receipts are \$2500 or less. The charge which he pastors should grant him such privilege without censure, with full remuneration of salary while in such a meeting. The church to which he goes should defray his traveling expenses and should receive regular offerings during the meetings for the establishing of their cwn work. The Vice Presidents shall serve as coordinators of this plan by recommending and helping to arrange such meetings.
- 2. All pastors should seek the council of the church advisory committee when a revival meeting away from the church is anticipated. No pastor should hold more than two revival meetings away from his charge unless by the consent of the Conference President.

F. Summer Camping Program:

1. All full-time pastors and pastor's wives shall offer their services and be granted time by their churches to help in the Youth and/or Junior Bible Camps unless excused by the President. This would not deduct from vacation, revival time, or salary.

III. CONFERENCE

A. Conference Officials:

- 1. There shall be a President and two Vice Presidents elected, one of these shall be designated as the First Vice President and the other as the Second Vice President. One Vice President's work shall be primarily in the northern area of the Conference and the other in the southern. These areas shall be designated north and south by a line running east from the Illinois State line following the northern boundary of district three and continuing along the southern boundary of districts four, six, and seven to the Ohio State line. The three officials shall determine which Vice President shall work in which area. The Vice Presidents shall assist the President in presiding at the annual conference.
- 2. They shall be given a two weeks' vacation with pay and shall have the privilege of holding one revival meeting yearly, in or out of the Conference, at a time of their own choosing and for which they are to receive the remuneration personally.

B. Officials' Duties:

1. Each church shall be visited at least once a year by a conference official, but some churches, at the discretion of the officials, may

be visited more often. During such visitation the official shall meet with the pastor for the purpose of counsel, studying the local work, and giving and discussing promotion in interest of local and conference work. The conference official shall meet with the church Council or committee for the purpose of presenting plans of promotion in the interest of local and conference work.

2. President—The Conference President shall supervise the entire program of the Conference, being responsible for all matters of a general nature and devoting as much of his time as possible to visitation of the

local churches.

- 3. The Vice Presidents, besides the visitations listed above shall work with the weaker churches in counseling, securing pastors to hold revivals (See Section II, subparagraph E) and make every effort to strengthen the weaker churches. With the counsel of the President, they shall determine where and when to hold revival meetings in a new or weaker church. They shall also determine the length of such meetings and the number of such meetings each Vice President should hold during each quarter. The offerings received during such meetings, unless raised for a local project or for Conference Extension, shall be turned to the Conference Treasurer and placed in the Conference Operating Fund. The Vice Presidents should keep in close contact with those churches in their area receiving Conference support by visiting them at least once a quarter with the aim of making them self-supporting as quickly as possible. They should promote church extension in their visitation and should see that funds are raised for that purpose. And they should work with the Board on Conference Extension and Evangelism in the planning of new works and have as a goal the organizing of at least one new church in each area during the Conference year.
- 4. In view of the great need of our local churches for close guidance in the work of Sunday schools and Wesleyan Youth, we recommend that our Conference Officials do what they can in visiting the churches to promote better organization, greater activity, and more consistent growth in these important fields. To this end we recommend that the three Officials designate one of the Vice Presidents to work especially in the area of Sunday schools and the other to work in the area of Wesleyan Youth. It shall be the duty of the first to meet with the Conference Sunday School Board and of the second with the Wesleyan Youth executive committee, and to counsel and aid them in their work. The contribution of the Vice Presidents shall be made especially in the areas of promotion and visitation. In carrying out this part of their duties, they shall not be limited to the geographical areas to which they are assigned. As they shall deem wise, special periods of time may be blocked off for local Sunday school or youth clinics, district conventions, and rallies, etc. In the matter of conference-wide promotional mailings, it shall be the responsibility of the organization involved to pay the cost of secretarial help and postage. The labors of the two Vice Presidents shall in no way relieve the Conference Sunday School Board or the Wesleyan Youth executive committee of their responsibility for the direction and promotion of their respective spheres of interest.
 - 5. The President shall call a meeting of the ministers and their

wives in the different parts of the conference during the conference year. The purpose of this meeting is to promote the work of the conference. The President shall set forth goals, suggest means of attaining these goals and in general seek to promote a greater interest in the Conference program. All pastors shall be required to attend this meeting except when a legitimate cause may hinder.

6. The President and Vice Presidents shall constitute the executive committee of the WESLEYAN MESSENGER. They shall be responsible for editing and circulating it. The departments which use the columns of the WESLEYAN MESSENGER regularly shall make contributions toward the expense of the same.

C. Annual Conference:

- 1. Each Annual Conference shall be held at Fairmount, Ind., beginning on the Tuesday nearest August eighth.
- 2. The first Sunday of the Annual Gathering belongs to the old conference year and the second Sunday of the Annual Gathering belongs to the new conference year. This applies to pastoral appointment.
 - The fiscal year begins July 1st and ends June 30.
- 4. The sitting of the Conference for each day is considered as one meeting.
- 5. In examination of characters the Conference officials shall be called first.
- 6. Effective at the rise of the 1961 Conference the Conference shall pay the hospitalization premiums of the Superannuated ministers and their dependents unless they are properly covered with hospitalization otherwise, and, provided they are eligible to receive Superannuated pension benefits, and, provided they shall have received a Conference appointment at the hands of this Conference for ten years previous to their retirement. (Conference appointments shall be understood to consist of pastors, conference evangelists, only, in full-time work, conference officials, general conference officials, or those employed by the General Board of Administration.) Those Superannuates receiving hospitalization benefits at the present time shall continue to do so.
- 7. The President and Vice Presidents shall be consulted before any love offerings are taken during the annual encampment.
- 8. When the churches which have been placed in the hands of the President decide as to who shall be their pastor before the Minutes are sent to press, the same shall be entered in the Minutes as if ordered by this conference.
- 9. The Emergency Benefit Fund shall be used for the relief of ministers of the Conference or their widows who shall make application to the Conference President for financial assistance in time of emergency. This fund is to be administered by the Conference Board of Trustees.
- 10. In the election of President and Vice Presidents, the first ballot shall be a nominating ballot. The two names receiving the highest number of votes shall be the nominees.
- 11. A citation in the form of a certificate shall be presented to all those who have been appointed by the Conference, and have given twenty-five years of service to The Wesleyan Methodist Church.

D. Secretaries:

1. The Secretary and the Assistant Secretary constitute a committee on communications.

2. The Assistant Secretary is to act as reporter of the Conference

to the Marion daily papers and the church periodicals.

- 3. In accordance with the Discipline, paragraph 377, exact budget assessments will be made for each church and mailed to the respective pastors by the conference secretary within two weeks of the rise of each conference session.
- 4. The Conference Secretary is authorized to purchase a floral offering for the family in the event of death of any of our ministers. The same to apply to elders or conference preachers in the events of the death of minister's husband, wife, son or daughter. The father and mother of the Conference Officials, who are not pastors, shall be included. When requested, the price of the flowers shall be given as a missionary memorial. The memorial to be paid from the Conference Operating Fund.

E. Treasurers:

1. The Treasurers shall submit their reports by July 25th, to the Auditing Committee, who shall audit the same and in their report to this body they shall show they have audited the same.

F. Boards:

1. Board of Conference Extension and Evangelism:

- a. The Conference Board of Extension and Evangelism shall be composed of the Conference President, the two Conference Vice Presidents, the Conference WMS President, and two elders and two laymen nominated by the Nominating Committee and elected by the Conference. The term of the elected members shall be for one year and they shall not serve for more than four consecutive years. It is recommended that no one, other than Conference President and the two Vice Presidents be at the same time a member of the Conference Board of Extension and Evangelism and the Conference Board of Trustees.
- 2. Board of Trustees:
 - a. The Board of Trustees shall authorize all disbursements not otherwise provided for.

G. Salaries:

1. The President shall receive \$100.00, the Vice Presidents \$50.00, Secretary \$100.00, Assistant Secretary \$50.00, Treasurer \$300.00, Assistant Treasurer \$50.00, each member of the Auditing Committee \$25.00, each member of the Statistical Committee \$40.00, the expense of the Committee on Itineracy and Elders' Orders; the same to be paid from the Conference Operating Fund. The Conference Sunday School Secretary shall receive \$100.00 and each member of the Conference Sunday School Board \$50.00, the same to be paid out of the Sunday School Treasury.

H. Minutes:

1. The Conference Minutes are to be distributed with a minimum

of one copy for every four members of the church or fraction thereof and that the same be paid for out of the Conference Operating Fund. Additional copies may be purchased at 75¢ per copy.

IV. COMMITTEES:

A. Itineracy and Elders' Orders:

- 1. The Committee on Elders' Orders is to transfer all persons to the study list who may have been recommended to travel and may not have been given work, providing they are meeting the disciplinary requirements in the course of study.
- 2. When recommendations to travel and to study preparatory to travel are presented to the Conference in session, they shall be recorded by the Secretary and automatically referred to the Committee on Itineracy and Elders' Orders, without having been read to the Conference.

B. Camp Meeting:

- 1. The Camp Meeting Committee shall nominate and the Conference elect the one to preach the opening sermon of the next Conference with his alternate.
- 2. The Conference shall elect five members of the Camp Meeting Committee. Three of which are to be ministerial members, one to be elected each year for a term of three years; two to be lay members, one to be elected each year for a term of two years.

3. The Conference President shall be a member ex officio of the Camp Meeting Committee.

C. Building:

1. No building or major repair involving structural changes on church property shall be undertaken without the approval of the Conference Building Committee.

D. Nominating:

1. A nominating committee shall be elected during the session of Conference, consisting of two ministers and two laymen, the President as chairman. This committee shall meet prior to the next Annual Conference and fill committees with nominees to be approved or disapproved by the conference. This committee shall be nominated and elected from the open floor of conference and shall serve for one year only, except the chairman who retains this position by virtue of his office.

V. OTHER RESOLUTIONS

A. The use of the wedding ring is not in accord with our standards as a Church, therefore we as a Conference disapprove of our ministers performing or taking part in the ring ceremony.

VI. BURIAL ASSOCIATION

- A. Each local church should elect a Local Secretary for the Burial Association, whose duty it would be to promote the interests of the Association and to seek to obtain new members for the same. And if the church so elects, collect the dues of members and forward them to the General Secretary.
- B. We earnestly request that the pastor present, or have presented, the work of the Burial Association at least once during the conference year, and seek to obtain new members for the same.

- 4. In order to receive credit at the annual session of the Conference, a person must have passed his examination before July 15. All grades, transcripts, and reports are to be sent to the Committee by that date.
- 5. A recommendation of a Local Preacher to travel under Conference Direction is valid for one year. If work is not assigned at the Annual Conference session, the person is left in the hands of the President for appointment. If no appointment is made, there must be a renewal of this recommendation before the next Annual Session.
- 6. The Committee asks that all recommendations to study or travel or for special workers be in the hands of the Conference Secretary not later than Tuesday of each Session of Conference.

Report No. 7

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON MINISTERIAL REPLACEMENT NEEDS

A study of the Minutes of the Indiana Conference from 1953 to 1963 reveals that at the close of this decade 125 men who had served the conference as pastors sometime during this period were no longer doing so. A breakdown of this total reveals the following:

In addition to this, a large group of men who had not pastored here transferred to other conferences (8 elders, 10 conference preachers, and 9 local preachers enrolled in the course of study), or took letters of standing (4 elders), or transferred to other denominations (at least 3 local preachers).

This number rather shocked us. The only two conferences in our denomination comparable to Indiana in size are North Carolina and Allegheny. We attempted a quick, rather superficial study of their Minutes to see whether our situation was unusual. North Carolina's experience was complicated by its having given birth to the Virginia Conference during the decade. As a

result only its record for the first five years was used. From 1953-58 during which North Carolina had a few more pastors than Indiana, its replacement need totalled 50, or an average of 10 per year. From 1953 to 1963, Allegheny, with slightly fewer pastors than Indiana, had a total replacement need of 62 or 6.2 per year. This was in spite of a stepped up dropout rate in the last 2 or 3 years of the decade. By comparison, Indiana's replacement needs averaged 12.5 per year. The difference between Allegheny and Indiana was marked; between North Carolina and Indiana it was less significant. The difference showed up much more strikingly in the reasons for the losses. While these could not be determined as accurately for the other two conferences as for Indiana, the heavy losses of Indiana to "other labors" and "to other conferences" were far greater than for the other two conference—apparently considerably more than both of them put together.

Our instructions from the conference were to survey those who had left the pastoral ministry of our conference in an effort to analyze the reasons. In preparing our mailing list, we eliminated from consideration the deceased, the superannuated, most of those serving at other labors on a denominational or conference level, and a few others whose particular situation held no promise of contributing to our study. We added those other elders and conference preachers who did not pastor here during the decade but who transferred to pastorates in other conferences. This brought the list to 90 individuals. Following is a copy of the questionnaire which was sent, and a summary of the 52 responses which we received. (Not all who responded filled out the questionnaire itself, and of those who did, not all responded to every question.)

Summarizing the response to the last 13 statements by totalling the number of responses which marked each one as contributing in some manner to the decision to change employment, we find the following:

The survey as a whole gives us a rough sketch of the typical Indiana "dropout." The chance is 50-50 he is still in the ministry. He is either a young man or just reaching his prime years of service. He is a product of one of our Indiana churches, having been a member for longer than 10 years. He has considerable formal training for the ministry. He has served an Indiana pastorate for about 5 years. The chance is 50-50 that he believes the conference was sincerely interested in his ministry, and better than 50-50 that he felt there was a real challenge in Indiana. He had a definite call to preach, and had very good relationships with the pastorates he served. His reason for leaving almost certainly revolved around one of the top four listed above: greater opportunity elsewhere, his own health or that of some member of his family, inadequate salaries, or lack of support from conference leaders.

OBSERVATIONS

1. We must be careful in studying our problem not to limit ourselves to the symptoms and forget the root cause of the disease. A Conference-wide revival would be the best possible solution to this entire matter. The Holy Spirit, resting upon the church and presiding over it, will help it to multiply, providing more men for the ministry and more money to support them. Spirit-inspired revival will cause more men to answer God's call, more ministers to devote themselves sacrificially to their all-important task. Spirit-inspired revival will enhance the opportunities in our conference and make it a more inviting field of service. Spirit-inspired revival will decrease the tensions that break our ministers' health, that frustrate their efforts, and that cause misunderstandings between them and conference leaders. Spirit-inspired revival will put more love in the hearts of pastors and people, changing

their relationship from that of employee-employer to that of a shepherd and his sheep. Spirit-inspired revival will move a church to stronger support of its pastor, both spiritually and financially. For such a revival we must pray and believe.

- 2. But while we are praying for such a revival, we must also be doing all we can to remedy the situation. As we pray for God's help in this matter, He will give us guidance, and we believe He is already doing so. The typical "dropout" described above is not to be lightly cast aside. He is a desirable candidate for the pulpits of any conference. If we can encourage him to fulfill his divine call, we must do so. If we can challenge him to invest himself fully in the work of our conference, we will help build our Zion by doing so.
- 3. It is to be expected that in a large conference such as ours, there will be men who attempt to enter the ministry who are not called to the ministry nor suited for it. Others who are called, equipped, and trained, will be forced to leave the active ranks for a variety of causes. Many of these men are as sincere, as devoted to the Lord, as zealous for His cause as any among us. We must not fasten a reproach upon them, nor consider them deserters from the cause. We must pray for them, help them to take their place among us as best they can, and leave their call and response to them and the Lord. As Jesus replied to Peter's queries about John, "What is that to thee? Follow thou me" (John 21:22).
- 4. We view with alarm the fact that the dropout is predominantly a man well trained for the ministry. While only slightly over one-half of our present pastors have ever been students at Marion College, three-fourths of the dropouts have been students at M.C., one-half have graduated there, and one-fourth have done graduate work. The dropouts include twice as many seminary graduates as are now serving in our conference. It is no accident that the same decade that has seen such an exodus of well trained men has also seen a decline in the proportion of Marion graduates among our pastors—from 41% in 1953 to 34% in 1963. This is taking place in the face of a rising level of education among the masses and the call for a better trained ministry by our general leaders. It carries with it the dangerous possibility that our pastors will become increasingly disinterested in our college where Wesleyan pastors are prepared by Wesleyan teachers.
- 5. There are certain cautions which must be exercised in evaluating our survey. Men who feel strongly enough about conditions to leave and also to reply to a questionnaire will quite naturally give an exaggerated view of the factors involved. Their view is a much needed one. But it must be tempered a bit. As a specific example, the rather adverse reaction to conference policies which ranked fourth among the causes for dropouts should not be interpreted as proving the incompetence of our conference officials, either past or present. There are bound to be instances in which pastors make mistakes, instances in which conference leaders cannot support them. Some such instances are reflected in the survey. On the other hand, there are policies which have developed across the years which may need to be restudied. These do not reflect personally on our leaders but they can make it difficult for them to meet each situation with the freedom of action needed.
 - 6. One question we must face unflinchingly. Is the Indiana Conference

the field of opportunity it ought to be? More men marked the "greater opportunity . . . elsewhere" statement as a factor in their decision than marked any other factor. At first this may seem strange. Indiana is the largest conference in our church. It raises the most money. It is the hub of denominational life. But a closer examination of the statistics reported to the 1963 General Conference reveals in cold facts why Indiana is not more attractive to its young ministers. It is the largest conference, but it has been on a membership plateau of 4000 plus for 50 years. Its local churches rank 5th in the denomination in average membership (and the average local church in Indiana is growing smaller) and 4th in average attendance per Sunday school. But the financial picture is even worse. Indiana ranks 9th in average total disbursements for each local church, 9th in the average value of its church and parsonage buildings, 8th in the average total support of its pastors, and 13th in the average cash salary of its pastors. Its growth rate is slow, its per capita giving lower than many other conferences. For all of its glorious history, Indiana must confess that many of its smaller sister conferences can offer its ministerial candidates more modern buildings, larger congregations, better salaries, and what the survey shows is even more important, the likelihood of more fruitful service. How can this situation be changed? The full answer lies outside the sphere of this report. The revival mentioned above is fundamental. There must be growth on the local level. But there are also some matters in which the conference can take action.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. We recommend that our conference officials prepare a brochure pointing out the real challenges of the Indiana Conference for distribution at Youth Camp, among theological students at Marion College, and at Asbury Theological Seminary. This brochure should capitalize on the conference's success in winning more Wesleyans per square mile than any other area in the United States. It should share some of the success stories of our conference: rural churches that have become dynamic congregations, the Marion story with Wesleyan Methodism standing near the top in denominational strength in an industrial community, city churches that have shown real growth, and pioneer works that have rapidly developed into strong churches. It should point out the large areas which still need Wesleyan churches, including the metropolitan complex of the Calumet area, the suburbs of South Bend, Fort Wayne, and Indianapolis, and the unoccupied county seats. It should show what is being done in the conference extension and set some goals which will involve the prospective minister. We further recommend that the conference officials be authorized to employ competent technical assistance in the preparation of the brochure.

2. We recommend that our conference commit itself to the ideal of a full-time ministry receiving full-time support and that we take the following

steps toward that ideal:

A. As soon as possible this year, each pastor and local board of stewards will meet with one of the conference officials for the purpose of agreeing together on what will constitute a full-time salary in their particular situation. Local factors, such as the cost of living, the average income of the congregation, the size of the pastor's family, etc., will all be taken into consideration. Once agreed upon, the church will be com-

mitted to work toward this goal as rapidly as possible. Once the church reaches its goal, the pastor will be committed to devote himself full time to the work of the church. This agreement will need to be reviewed periodically when any two of the three parties involved shall so request.

- 3. We recommend that our conference president contact the other conference presidents of our area, the president of Marion College, and the chairman of the department of ministerial training at Marion College in an effort to bring about definite encouragement of Marion College graduates to serve in the conferences of our area. We do not expect Marion College to favor us over our sister conferences. We do ask for equal treatment for all concerned, and for the opportunity to present the brochure on the Indiana challenge to all theological students.
- 4. We recommend that the conference go on record as asking its officials to exercise a stronger and more direct leadership than has been the policy of the past few decades. In 1887, when Indiana first elected a fulltime president, it designated him as the superintendent of the conference. It directed him to travel over and superintend the conference, looking after the church property, raising funds for church buildings, appointing pastors where needed, suspending pastors if they were guilty of wrong conduct, suspending churches from a voice in their circuits if they did not properly support their pastors, exercising all the powers of the conference between its sessions, and directed him in his general travels to give "to pastors and churches any instructions he may see they need." The present Discipline, paragraphs 230, 232, 235 supports such a concept of strong authority. In fact, his decisions on questions arising in the administration of the laws of the church are final, subject only to appeal to the Conference itself or to the Board of General Superintendents. We invite our officials to put into effect this policy of strong leadership, counseling pastors, and churches in every area which needs attention-whether asked or not, asserting the Conference's authority over the local church (Discipline, paragraph 223), taking an active part in enlisting the qualified pastors we need and in securing the employment of the right man by the right church.

B. Conference Budget:

The Conference Budget shall be sent to the Conference Treasurer as undivided Budget at the end of each month, and shall be figured on the following percentages:

All churches whose regular Sunday school offerings and regular church tithes and offerings average the following per week for the month, shall remit as indicated:

Less than \$50.00 per week shall remit 7% \$50.00 to \$99.99 per week shall remit 8% \$100.00 to \$149.99 per week shall remit 9% \$150.00 to \$199.99 per week shall remit 10% \$200.00 and above remit 11%

These receipts shall be apportioned as follows:

64% for the Conference Operating Fund

20% for Conference Extension

8% for Camp Meeting

21/2% for Camp Wiring Project

31/2% for Conference Youth Work

2% for Conference Sunday School Work

C. Budget to Conference Treasurer:

All church budget excepting that raised by the W.M.S. and the Y.M.W.B., and the Wesleyan Youth shall be sent to the Conference Treasurer.

D. Adjustment of Funds:

All adjusting of funds and renaming of funds shall be under the direction of the Board of Trustees, and if in the conference year there shall occur a deficit, the Board of Trustees shall be authorized to raise the Conference Budget 1% for the balance of the year.

Item II. REMUNERATION OF OFFICIALS:

The salary of the president shall be \$450.00 per month plus hospitalization insurance, one-half Social Security, and utilities (including fuel, electricity, water conditioning, and sewage), and that of the vice presidents shall be \$400.00 per month plus hospitalization insurance, one-half Social Security, and utilities; the same is to be paid by the Conference Treasurer monthly, with expenses incidental to their work. Travel expense shall be paid at the rate of seven cents per mile. The three shall employ secretarial help as needed. These items shall be paid from the Conference Operating Fund.

Item III. CHANGES AND ADDITIONS TO RESOLUTIONS AND LAWS:

We recommend the following amendments to the Resolutions and Laws of the Indiana Conference:

Under Item II add a new paragraph F, page 40-

F. Summer Camping Program.

 All full-time pastors and pastors' wives shall offer their services and be granted time by their churches to help in the Youth and/or Junior Bible Camps unless excused by the President. This would not deduct from vacation, revival time, or salary.

Under Item III, page 40-Conference-

Paragraph B. Official Duties—delete Subparagraph 1 and replace with:

1. Each church shall be visited at least once each year by a conference official, but some churches, at the discretion of the officials, may be visited more often. During such visitation the official shall meet with the pastor for purpose of counsel, studying the local work and giving and discussing promotion in interest of local and conference work. The conference official shall meet with the Church Council or committee for purpose of presenting plans of promotion in the interest of the local and conference work.

Paragraph G, (page 43) Salaries, subparagraph 1— Delete: Pension Plan Treasurer—\$100.00 and expenses.

Item IV.

We recommend that consideration be given by the conference officials to the preparation of a mimeographed packet containing agenda, reports, and other pertinent information. This would be distributed to pastors and delegates at the opening of conference.

Report No. 14 REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD

Praises be to our God for His blessings on the Indiana Conference Sunday school program of the year just passed!

CONVENTION

The Conference-wide Sunday school convention held last September 21 at Marion Hillside Church was a time of inspiration and instruction. Some six hundred persons crowded the sanctuary in the general sessions and overflowed rooms in workshop meetings. Denominational and interdenominational leaders challenged hearts with the Sunday school message.

CONTEST

The Sunday school contest of last spring saw a number of churches posting significant gains as a direct result of their participation in the three areas of the contest: (1) Attendance in Sunday school. (2) Staying for Worship. (3) Visitation. Awards and recognition were given to winners and runners-up in each group. It is felt that the scoring system for the contest can be improved, and this is planned for the contest next spring.

JUNIOR BIBLE CAMP

The Junior Bible Camp was successfully divided this year. The combined registration of the two Junior Bible Camps was five hundred and two, for an increase of forty-eight over last year's camp. Perhaps as many as two hundred of these children knelt at the altar seeking God's help in their young lives.

We believe that the camping program is a feeder for the church, and therefore deserves the help of every minister, minister's wife, and layman who could be free to come to the campground. Your Board sought long and earnestly for enough help to run the encampments. We just made it.

If there should be any lessening of assistance, we will be in serious difficulty. More help is earnestly asked. Especially, more help from the men is needed.

GAINS

Twenty-three churches scored at least a ten percent gain in Sunday school average attendance for the Conference year. The total of the average attendances of the Conference this year was 10,116.

Looking ahead into our Sunday school program for the Conference year, your attention and prayers are asked for the following:

Conference-wide Sunday school convention, Saturday, September 19, at College Church.

Rally Day, October 4.

That we try to reach out in our missionary and evangelistic effort, by observing one monthly meeting perhaps in the month of September as guest day, in cooperation with your first membership drive, at which time each member invites a guest; some woman who might become interested in the society.
- 3. Whereas, there is a large number of our ladies who do not attend our missionary meetings because of time conflicts, we advise the use of the circle plan. See page 6 of the WMS Handbook.
- 4. That an offering be received for the Servicemen's Department in the month of May. (See pastor for information.)
- The delegate be instructed concerning the College Project Pledge and the World Missions Pledge.
- 6. Each society cooperate with their District Chairman in the care and furnishing of the dormitory rooms.
- 7. We also recommend that we have Tuesday 6 a.m. prayer fellowship with Ministers' wives.
- 8. That each society promote the Community Missions Program under the supervision of the local Vice President. (Materials will be sent to each president from Mrs. Elizabeth McIntyre, Director of Community Missions.)
- That each society promote the project of Christian Outreach, under the direction of the Work Director. (Note: Item III—Service in Plan of Work.)
- We further recommend that the following give a brief report at each monthly WMS meeting: Treasurer, YMWB Superintendent, Magazine Solicitor, WWF Secretary, Reading Course Secretary, and Membership Chairman.
- 11. That each society use the Plan of Work constantly as a guide. Stipulation for attaining the recognition of achievement award:

Resolved: That a society eligible for the award for membership, magazine subscriptions or finance show a consistent gain for the past 3 years in any of these areas.

The report is to represent work done in the current year.

Standing Rules

I. AREA

A. The Area President is to receive entertainment and traveling expenses while traveling our conference, the same to be paid by the group asking his services.

II. CONFERENCE

- A. The first session of the Wesleyan Youth Conference shall meet at the site of the annual conference; the first session shall convene at the call of the chair and sessions shall continue daily until all business is transacted.
- B. The PRESIDENT shall appoint the chairman of each committee, and the Executive Council shall nominate the rest of the committee; their report to be read and voted upon in the first session of the annual conference.
- C. There shall be elected an ASSISTANT SECRETARY whose duty shall be to assist the secretary and to compile the statistics. The secretary shall be given the privilege of making the nomination.
- D. The WÉSLEYAN YOUTH TREASURER shall pay from Conference Expense Fund each year the sum of fifty dollars toward the expense of printing the Minutes. The Wesleyan Youth Secretary shall cooperate with the conference secretaries in determining the number of pages used.
- E. The WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE for the coming year shall be nominated by the Executive Council prior to the first session of the youth conference; and shall be elected during the conference and shall meet at least 60 days before the next youth conference.
- F. Copies of the REPORT OF WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE shall be mailed within three weeks after the close of the main conference, one copy to each district chairman, pastor and local president. These reports shall be carefully presented to each local by its president as soon after conference as possible.
- G. There shall be a WESLEYAN YOUTH CAMP COMMITTEE of seven members. The Executive Council shall be members ex officio; the president of Wesleyan Youth shall be chairman of said committee; the other three members to be elected for a term of three years. One shall be elected annually or until his successor is elected so that the term of all will not expire at the same time. The Wesleyan Youth Camp Committee shall elect one of its members as treasurer of the Youth Camp.
- H. The WESLEYAN YOUTH CAMP COMMITTEE shall be seated as members of the conference.
- I. There shall be a Youth Camp of one week duration and the date of the camp shall be set by the Wesleyan Youth Camp Committee.
- J. The Youth Camp recreational equipment is to be accessible during the conference and camp meeting, and the Youth Camp Committee is to be responsible for such.
- K. The Executive Council of the Wesleyan Youth shall have complete charge of helping the new works.
- L. Members of the EXECUTIVE COUNCIL shall not hold the office of District Chairman.

III. DISTRICT

- A. That the Executive Council call a meeting of all District Chairmen semi-annually.
- B. Each district shall elect an ADULT COUNSELOR to counsel and assist in the plans of the district. This advisor may be beyond age of membership in Wesleyan Youth.

IV. LOCAL

- A. All organized locals keep permanent records of MEMBERSHIP AND FINANCES. This list of members shall be revised at the close of each conference year.
- B. All churches shall send their DELEGATES' CREDENTIALS AND STATISTICAL REPORTS to the secretary at least 30 days before conference convenes.
- C. The president shall submit a written report of the spiritual and financial status of the local to each regular quarterly business meeting of the church.
- D. The LOCAL PRESIDENT shall consult with the pastor when making out his annual WESLEYAN YOUTH REPORT, to avoid inconsistencies in the same.
- E. The EXECUTIVE COUNCIL of each local Wesleyan Youth should consult with the pastor and his board of stewards before planning its financial program for the year.
- F. The General Wesleyan Youth EFFICIENCY STANDARD is to be adopted and promoted and each local rating is to be reported in the annual statistical reports.
- G. That all monies raised for budget and special projects be sent to the Conference Youth Treasurer within 5 days after the close of the conference fiscal year.

Report No. 3

REPORT OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

I. RALLIES

A. We recommend that the district chairman be a member of The Wesleyan Methodist Church.

B. That the district chairman be responsible for the rallies and that written notices of said rallies be sent to the local church pastor, and youth president, and to the conference youth president at least two Sundays in advance in order to promote closer cooperation between the district chairman and the president and the pastors. Rallies should be held at least quarterly.

C. That the rallies be Christ-centered, providing an occasion for the propagation of Christianity, and for fellowship among the locals.

- D. That the district chairman call a meeting of the local presidents, pastors, district officers, and the district adult counselor within 30 days after the rise of the conference for the purpose of planning district rallies for the year. A notice of this should be sent to the Conference Youth President. If the district chairman fails to call said meeting this responsibility will be assumed by the Conference Youth President.
- E. That a special youth rally be held in each district during the months of May or June for the purpose of promoting the Indiana Wesleyan Youth Camp.

F. That the following point system for district banner be adopted:

Local president or vice president at rally, 5 points.
 (Both present, a bonus of 2 points), (All local officers including president, vice president, secretary, and treasurer, a bonus of 3 points). Total possible—10 points.

2. Pastor present, 10 points, or adult counselor, 5 points.

3. Each 2% of active members present, excluding those in the armed forces and college, 1 point.

4. Each associate member present, 1 point.

5. Each person who is not an active member, 1 point.

6. Each mile traveled from the local to the rally site, 1 point.

G. That a loving cup be passed to the local and the award be based on the percentage of subscribers to The Wesleyan Youth as to the number of active members plus the number of subscriptions to The Wesleyan Youth.

H. That the conference print and distribute to the locals, suitable

blanks to implement the point system.

I. That a state-wide youth rally be held on the Fairmount Campground on Friday night of youth camp week, with the conference banner and loving cup being awarded on the same basis as that of the district rallies. That the executive council and the youth camp com-

mittee share the responsibility of this rally.

J. That a plaque be presented to the outstanding local in the conference each year, reading: "First in Excellence, Indiana Wesleyan Youth, year (1965)." This plaque to be presented at the State Youth Rally, and upon presentation to the local, becomes permanent property of that local. Choice of the local will be made by the Executive Committee on the following basis:

1. Budget for the past 2 years must be paid in full.

2. Standing in District Rallies for the immediate year in both banner and loving cup.

3. Participation on local, district, and conference projects.

4. Support to missions by monthly mission offerings.

Participation and achievement in youth week.

6. Diligence in reporting.

7. Youth Camp attendance and behavior.

II. LOCALS

A. The local president shall be responsible to see that each proposed member fully understands the membership pledge and that each active and associate member sign a membership card. No one shall be reported as a member until the pledge card is signed.

That the local president, adult youth counselor, and sales manager shall be responsible for promotions of subscriptions to the Wesleyan

Youth.

C. That the local president shall be responsible for promoting projects suggested in Section III, Projects, paragraph B.

III. PROJECTS

A. For conference project we recommend the following:

- 1. That the executive council effect a leaders' conference for local youth officers, district chairmen, and the Executive Council.
- 2. That there be close cooperation between the Wesleyan Youth and annual conference church extension program.
- That the Executive Council be responsible to promote the Bible Quiz program and to provide the information to the local presidents of such.

- That there be a contest designed to encourage Christian talent among Wesleyan Youth and that it be called "Operation 'YT"" (Operation Youth Talent).
 - a. That the said project include:
 - 1. Vocal (either solo or group)
 - 2. Instrumental (either solo or group)
 - 3. Reading
 - 4. Piano or organ
 - b. The following rules shall apply:
 - 1. Teens (13-19) only shall be eligible.
 - All contestants shall be a member of an Indiana Wesleyan Youth local.
 - No contestant shall enter more than two divisions and only once in each division.
 - 4. All entries shall be strictly Christian in nature.
 - 5. Entries may be changed between district and state competition, but personnel and instruments shall remain the same.
 - Each contestant shall be introduced by a master of ceremonies, but each contestant shall introduce his own entry publicly.
 - c. Judges
 - 1. There shall be not less than 3 judges nor more than 5.
 - 2. Judges shall not be qualified from a participating church.
 - Judges shall not compare choice until each division is completed.
 - d. Contests
 - 1. The district contest shall be conducted during the youth camp promotional rally.
 - 2. The state contest shall be conducted during youth camp.
 - First and second place winners in each division at the district level shall be eligible for state competition.
 - e. Awards
 - District awards shall be certificates provided by the conference, designating the winners as 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place winners.
 - Appropriate state awards shall be selected by the Executive Committee.
 - f. The Executive Council shall be responsible to promote "Operation "YT" and to provide the information to the local president.
- B. For locals we recommend the following:
 - That the local plan and promote the interests of the Bible Quiz and "Operation 'YT" in organizing and preparing the local.
 - That it plan visitation programs and special meetings with members of the local such as jail services, shut-in visitations, distributing tracts, and radio programs.
 - 3. That it plan, with the pastor, for a project within the local church.
- IV. FOR FINANCE WE RECOMMEND THE FOLLOWING:
 - That the salary of the conference officers be as follows:
 - 1. President-\$150.00
 - 2. Vice President-\$100.00

- 3. Secretary-\$100.00
- 4. Ass't Secretary-\$15.00
- 5. Treasurer-\$100.00
- Said salary to be paid in equal payments on December 5 and June 1.
- B. That the desk and traveling expenses of the president, vice president, secretary, and treasurer be paid from the Youth Conference Budget; and traveling expenses of the Youth Camp Committee be paid from the Youth Camp treasury, and that said expenses be paid quarterly. That traveling expenses be figured on the basis of 7¢ per mile.
- C. That the budget for the following year be as follows:
 - 1. General Dues, \$2.00 per active member of the local.
 - One-fifth of the conference budget to be designated for the Youth Camp and the rest used at the discretion of the Executive Council.
 - 3. That there be a Youth Conference working fund assessment of 50¢ per active member.
 - 4. On the basis of the above apportionment, exact assessments for each item shall be made for each local and mailed to the pastors and local presidents by the conference secretary within three weeks of the rise of the main conference session.
 - The above funds be sent in quarterly on remittance blanks furnished by the conference.
- D. That the Executive Council shall have power to appropriate money from the conference budget for general promotion of the youth work.
- E. That all monies raised by the local for missions be forwarded to the Wesleyan Youth Treasurer for departmental credit, and that said money be raised by monthly missionary offerings and be sent in quarterly with the Wesleyan Youth Budget.
