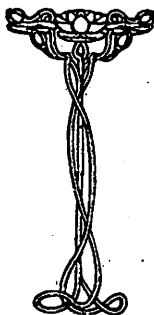

## STANDING RESOLUTIONS

1. A Committee on Auditing and Finance, consisting of three ministerial members, the Chairman being an Elder, shall be elected each year, the duties of which shall be to examine and report on the Treasurer's books and all financial reports, save missionary, and to be a Standing Committee to advise on financial plans.

2. All persons received into membership in the churches of our Conference, excepting those whose life of Christian fidelity has been of sufficient long standing, shall be received at first as associate members only.

3. When it becomes necessary for a church to call a pastor, it shall be the duty of the calling church to make provision for the expense in-

curred by the pastor in removing to the new field of labor. Money raised for this purpose shall NOT be applied on the pastor's salary. When an Elder is elected to the Conference Presidency, expenses incurred in moving to a suitable location shall be paid from the Conference Treasury.

4. The Conference Sunday shall be the closing Sunday of the Conference year, and the outgoing pastor shall be paid his salary for that Sunday by the charge he is leaving.

5. At the opening of the Conference Session the President shall appoint a Nominating Committee of not less than three members, two Elders and one layman, to bring to the Conference a slate of Nominations for Committees, etc., for the Conference Temporary Organization. Delegates' Credentials shall be mailed to the Secretary not later than ten days before convening of Conference.

6. No person shall be received as a member of Allegheny Annual Conference until he shall have properly filled out an application blank, which application together with the recommendations of his references must pass the approval of the President and his Advisory Board. Exceptions to this rule may be made by the President and his Advisory Board, when they deem it best.

7. The pastor of any church in the Conference shall be free to hold at least one revival meeting a year, wherever he sees fit, and it is recommended that his usual salary be paid him while he is absent.

8. Each pastor shall send a monthly report on the blank provided, to the Conference President showing the progress and state of the work under his care.

9. Each church may elect a Nominating Committee whose duty it shall be to nominate candidates for church offices for presentation to the church at the time of annual election of officers. Such nominations shall not exclude other nominations at the time of the business meeting.

10. Churches having business with the Conference Board of Trustees requiring a visit of that body to their church, shall be responsible for the expense attached to such calls, unless released by the Board.

11. Inasmuch as trial sermons are hardly fair to church or candidate, and since the practice of having a trial sermon is contrary to the usual manner of locating preachers, we recommend that no preacher shall accept any such invitation, if given. Exceptions to this rule may be granted by the Conference President upon request of any church.

12. Since considerable expense of transferring automobile title and license attends the moving of a pastor from one state to another, we recommend that where possible the calling church bear this expense.

13. We recommend that all Districts emphasize Sunday School activities, and that Conventions be arranged for in conjunction with the visitation of the Conference Sunday School Secretary, who shall visit one Convention of each District during the year, at Convention expense.

14. We recommend that no one be elected to Elders Orders who does not have an abiding sense of divine call to give himself wholly to the function and ministry of an Elder in the **WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH**. And that no one shall be ordained to this office and work who is not applying himself wholly to this one thing in cares and studies, and clearly determining by God's grace to give himself wholly to this holy ministry, if possible, long before the appointed day of ordination, and mani-



festing such a determination in faithful Christian service to the church or congregation whom he was called to serve during his years of preparation, so that, as much as lieth in himself, he has and will apply himself wholly to the work of the ministry, except in all cases of absolute necessity of such diversions to a legitimate avocation for livelihood which neither jeopardizes the Lord's work or blames the ministry.

15. We recommend that each church equip its parsonage with the necessary heating and cooking equipment, because of the variation of requirements in this equipment for the individual parsonage.

16. We recommend that in election of local Church Advisory Committee each church permit the pastor to nominate the members of this Committee.

17. The Conference Secretary, as Chairman, with the Auditing and Finance Committee shall be a standing Committee on Publication, whose duty shall be to examine all matters pertaining to Conference printing and publication, and let contracts for same.

18. All churches shall have a systematic means of keeping records, as required by Discipline, Paragraph No. 74. The "Ideal Church Record," published by the Bethel Publishing Co., Elkhart, Ind., is a suggested form.

19. Local church treasurer's books shall close April 30, thus making the Conference fiscal year from May 1 to April 30. All funds received after that date shall be counted in the following year. Funds will be credited on Sub-Treasurer's books if received by May 10.

## REPORTS

### Report No. 1

#### CONFERENCE PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Dear Brothers and Sisters in the Lord:

To the members of the 101st Annual Session of The Allegheny Conference, greetings in the name of Him who loved us and bought us with His own blood. Today we bring greetings to the Conference with a heart that is filled to overflowing with thanksgiving and praise to Him who loved us and gave Himself for us. Through His providential care and guidance we have been brought safely through another year. We experience unexpressible joy for His blessings, which have been poured out

so richly upon both the work and the workers, as we have labored together in His vineyard, and for the splendid advancements that have been made during the past year. Our people have born up well under the stress and strain of the War, and at no time during the ten months which we have served the Conference have we found our people more courageous, full of faith and vision, or more militant and enthusiastic than they are at the present time. The War has created for all of our churches problems which have made success more difficult than at other times. The effect of the War has been noticeable upon our churches and Sunday Schools but it has not defeated any church, nor any Sunday School in our Conference. Many of our young men and some of our young women have entered the service and some have made the supreme sacrifice that we might have this Annual Conference Session unmolested. Nevertheless, through God's grace we are closing out one of the finest years, I believe, in the history of Allegheny Conference. To God belongs all the glory, and to the good pastors and faithful laymen belongs all the credit.

When the action of General Conference last June took from us our beloved Conference President, Rev. J. R. Swauger, to be Home Missionary Sec'y, we were thrust unexpectedly into a new position; and new responsibilities were forced upon our inexperienced shoulders, which demanded strength and wisdom beyond our capacity. In accepting this tremendous obligation we were made conscious of our great need of Divine help. God has not disappointed us, and neither have our good brethren and laity. We wish to acknowledge the good counsel and co-operation which Rev. J. R. Swauger has given us in the work of the Conference, and we wish also to express our deep appreciation for the loyal support of our brethren in the ministry and our precious laity, who have in so many ways made the load easier and who have encouraged us to go on in this new field of labor. May the Lord richly bless you all!

A fine revival spirit is springing up over the Conference. A deeper spiritual tone prevails in most of our churches. There have been some splendid advances made in the Pioneer Field, which will be reported by our Pioneer Secretary. However, at a time when our civil liberty and religious freedom is being seriously threatened by the enemies of Christ, at a time when the war clouds are hanging low, at a time when the Church has been made sad because of the misery, suffering, death and destruction that hangs over almost the whole wide world, at a time when millions of hungry, perishing, never-dying, immortal souls are facing the cannon, death and the judgment, unprepared to meet God, at a time when morals are at a very low ebb, at a time when spineless compromise and appeasement of men seem to be the rule, we need to pray to God to put iron in our spiritual blood that we will not lower our standards, nor compromise our Christian principles, nor give in to a pretended faith, nor slow up, nor cool off, but go in for old-fashioned, Holy Ghost-wrought, God-sent revivals. Let us as a Conference, get definitely behind the Connectional-wide revival effort, and let us strive to make this Annual Session a time of revival effort in all of our services.

The Annual Stoneboro Camp Meeting, even though rationing of gasoline restricted the attendance, was a time of blessing. A further report of it will be given in the Stoneboro Camp Meeting President's report as required by the Constitution.

We wish also to mention the Annual Day of Prayer and Fasting for

the Ministers and their wives of the Conference, which was held at the Victory Gospel Center. God met with us in an unusual manner. A gracious spirit of prayer came upon those assembled in the first call to prayer for the Day of Invasion. We also were greatly edified by the splendid messages brought by Brothers C. E. Zike and L. W. Barbee and by the messages in song brought by Robert Conley.

One of the outstanding efforts of the year has been the completion of the construction of the Victory Gospel Center, and the placing of this Center into operation under the direction of its Superintendent, Rev. Glenn Lauby, who has done such a splendid piece of work in this field of labor for our soldier boys. A full report will be given by Brother Lauby.

Some of our churches have been enabled to erase parsonage and church debts this year. Others have bought parsonages, or otherwise improved their church buildings.

During the year we have earnestly sought to serve our God and our people well, and to be worthy of the confidence reposed in us. We have tried to be faithful, in love, to our Church Standards, to the rich heritage of our Conference, which according to Brother McLeister's History of The Wesleyan Methodist Church has been outstanding for spirituality and for adhering to "the strait and narrow way", and to be a friend and brother, indeed, to both the ministry and the laity. Personally, this has been a year of blessed victory to my own soul. We have it settled more firmly than ever before to stand for the Christian Principles and Standards for which the Allegheny Conference has been noted. Blessed be the name of the Lord!

**Memorial Recommendation:** During the year it has pleased the Lord to remove from our midst one Elder. On Saturday, April 29, 1944, Rev. G. W. Richardson, was summoned home. I recommend that our Committee on Nominations be authorized to nominate a committee on Memoirs to hold a suitable memorial service.

As I bring this report to a close I wish to offer a few suggestions and recommendations for your consideration:

1. That each Church try to start a new church this coming year by using the local preachers and other workers in your church.

2. That we press constantly upon our people the need of being deeply spiritual and aggressively evangelistic and that our people spread the doctrines of our church and especially Scriptural Holiness at every opportunity and in every way possible so that our people shall be thoroughly indoctrinated and the general public know the truth.

3. That we earnestly pray and make every effort possible to expose the errors and subtle lies in the commercial propaganda programs of both the press and radio of the liquor interests. We must realize that we are fighting a foe that has little regard for law and less for the value of human life, when we meet the power of the organized liquor and tobacco traffic. At no time in the history of legalized liquor has their attack been so relentless and subtle in its effect, especially among the youth of our land.

4. That our people make every effort to keep the Christian Sabbath day holy. That our people oppose all Sabbath desecration. That we oppose all unnecessary work on the Sabbath Day and also the "Seventh Day working plan" as it is not in accordance with God's law. By example and word, press the great importance of public worship upon every one. Some one well has said, "Where there is no Christian Sabbath, there is no Christian morality; and without this, free institutions cannot long be sustained." "The law of the Sabbath is the keystone arch of public morals; take it away, and the whole fabric falls." "Let's make sure that the things of life do not crowd out the things of God.

5. That Allegheny Conference have a Ministerial Institute this year. Suggested Committee: Conference President, Secretary of Evangelism, Pioneer Secretary, and the Chairman of each Holiness District.

#### Report No. 4.

#### COMMITTEE ON AUDITING AND FINANCE

Your Committee on Auditing and Finance makes recommendations as follows:

1. Approval of Item IX of the Conference Presidents' Report. We



recommend that the Conference President receive a salary of \$50.00 per week and traveling expenses incurred in the pursuit of the duties of his office to the amount of \$500.00 per year. He to provide adequate liability insurance for his car. We further recommend that when the Conference President is called for special meetings or occasions outside his regular Quarterly Meeting Schedule all offerings shall be for expense incurred and no receipt for budget will be given.

2. Adoption of the Conference Treasurer's Report, as we find his books neatly and correctly kept according to our judgment; and that he be authorized to draw from the treasury the sum of \$75.00 in appreciation of his labors, and a sum equal to all expenses incurred in pursuit of the duties of his office.

3. That each Sub-Treasurer be paid by the Conference Treasurer the sum of \$50.00 (except West Virginia which is to be \$25.00), in appreciation of their labors, plus a sum equal to the expenses incurred in the pursuit of the duties of their office.

4. That the Sunday Schools be urged to continue giving the first Sunday of the month offering to Conference Missions for the use of churches not yet self sustaining, etc., according to the recommendations of the Conference Mission Board.

5. Continuation of sending Sunday School Birthday offerings to the Conference Mission Fund.

6. That the Conference New Aid Plan be published in the Conference Minutes each year and that all pastors urge their churches to the prompt payment of the \$1.00 per member assessment as set forth in the Aid Plan.

7. That the Conference portion of the Conference Group Insurance be paid by each church on the basis of membership. Each church shall remit to Conference Sub-Treasurer an amount equal to 20c per member annually.

8. That the present deficit of \$73.00 in the Group Insurance Fund be paid from the Conference Incidental Fund.

9. That each church send a monthly remittance to Sub-Treasurer for the Maintenance of the Gospel Center. Remittance to be equal to 2c per week per enrolled membership of the Sunday School. This money to be raised either from the church or Sunday School or in any way agreed upon by the Pastor and his church or Sunday School.

10. That the Conference Budget be raised undivided, said budget to be equal to 10% of the sum obtained by adding the following three items: Pastor's cash salary, Parsonage rent, and Church incidental expenses. Budget to be remitted to Sub-Treasurer's monthly. Distribution of Budget to be made by Conference Treasurer as follows: Conference expense, 75%; Conference Missions, 10%; Superannuated Minister's Fund, 7%; Incidental Fund, 8%; Distribution apportionment subject to revision by Auditing and Finance Committee, to maintain an equalized distribution.

11. That the Pioneer self-denial envelopes for monthly remittances of 25c be given our continued support.

12. Recognition and hearty support of the following Connectional Budget askings: Foreign Missions, \$2.00 per member; Home Missions, \$1.00 per member. (Please distinguish from Conference Missions). Education, \$1.50 per member; Hephzibah Orphanage, 25c per member.

13. Approval of the report of the Committee on Sale of Conference Minutes, and that the price of Minutes be continued at 30c per copy. Any balance from the sale of minutes to revert to Conference Incidental Fund.

14. Approval of the report of the Committee to receive Conference Entertainment Fund. We recommend that the fee for this purpose remain at 25c per member. (This Fund to be sent to Sub-Treasurer before April 30).

15. The matter of remuneration for Pioneer Secretary be referred to the Conference Mission Board.

16. Approval of the Financial Report of the Conference Trustees.

17. Approval of the Financial Report of the Conference Missions Board.

18. Approval of the Financial Report of the Conference New Aid Fund.

19. That the Conference President be authorized to draw from Incidental Fund for such miscellaneous items as flowers, telegrams, phone calls, etc., without contacting his advisory board.

It was moved and carried to rescind former action of paying Guy Terpe the sum of \$100.00 per month, and on motion it was voted to make Johnstown a loan of \$200.00.

On motion it was voted to pay Rev. G. D. Lauby the sum of \$25.00 per week and house rent, this from the Conference mission fund until such time as the building is completed and paid for and becomes self-supporting from the Gospel Center fund.

Mission Board met in President's office at Stoneboro Camp, August 23, 1943.

On motion it was voted to authorize Rev. H. C. Van Wormer to supervise all purchasing of needed materials, and other matters and questions concerning the Gospel Center.

On motion it was voted to use the pioneer seat ends and lumber to seat the Gospel Center.

It was agreed to let Mrs. Frost connect to the Gospel Center for electric, she to pay the sum of \$1.50 per month.

#### CONFERENCE SUNDAY SCHOOL SECRETARY

To the members of Allegheny Conference assembled, we greet you in the name of Christ:

The work of the Sunday School this past year has shown progress in nearly all the churches; few losses appear. From all reports thus gleaned, it seems that the Akron district has shown a noticeable growth. This district is mentioned because it has been possible to keep in closer contact with these churches. The increased interest shown by the pastors has been a source of encouragement. Our churches cannot grow and become soul-saving centers unless great emphasis is placed upon the training, teaching, and converting of our youth. When the pastor assumes the place of leadership as key man of the Sunday School we can hope to see this accomplished.



Plans for teacher training classes and for visiting the district conventions were hindered due to the attitude of my ration board in giving out supplemental gas for these purposes. However, I was privileged to speak in three conventions. Further contacts were made by writing articles for the messenger, one article for the Wesleyan and cards were sent to the various pastors and superintendents. The blanks for the Connectional assessments were mailed but the annual report blanks were not included because the Connectional Sunday School Secretary failed to supply them.

We face a great need in our Conference for bigger and better Sunday Schools. The average attendance at Sunday School last year for all our churches was only 58!! We are reaching so very few for Christ. The challenge is before us. If Hitler can cause children to become rank fanatics for the cause of Nazism, if the teaching of communism can cause children to cry out in unison, "Down with Christianity and away with the Bible," surely we ought to be able to incite more enthusiasm for our Sunday Schools when we are claiming to have what this world needs and must have to get to Heaven.

The work put forth in our Daily Vacation Bible School will produce great dividends. A child receives more Bible training in the two weeks of intensified teaching than during a six months period of training in the regular Sabbath School. Let us urge this very important work in our churches.

After Julius Caesar had crossed the Rubicon with his army, he ordered that all the boats be heaped in a great pile and fired. As the flames leaped heavenward, he cried to his men, "Before us lies the territory to be conquered, behind us flows the river, there is nothing for us to do but march forward." Back of us lies years of small activity in our Sunday Schools. Let us heap together all boats that might carry us away from the fight and fire them and then push forward into the unconquered territory of our communities and rescue boys and girls, men and women from the awful slavery of the Devil. With Christ we must conquer.

### Report No. 12.

### CONFERENCE PIONEER SECRETARY

Dear Co-workers in the Lord:

These are tremendously significant days. We are in the grip of a world crisis. Great thinkers and writers tell us, "Today the world is more irreligious, more irresponsible, and pleasure mad than it has been at any time in the Christian era." Montague Morgan says, "The world is in the grip of an economic disorder that has rendered it virtually helpless and there is no solution in sight."

The horrors of this bloody war are beginning to make people feel how the world needs salvation. People ask, half sneeringly, half frantically, "Can the Christian religion meet all our human problems, relieve our human miseries, fulfill our human hopes?" It is the old story over again when John the Baptist, puzzled in his prison, said to Jesus, "Art thou he that should come or look we for another?" The Christian Church is hearing that cry in its ears today, "Art thou he that should come? Can you do this which the world unmistakeably needs done?" It is for us of the Christian church to declare that the Christian faith can do for the world that which it needs.

This would be a dark and discouraging hour if it were not for the sublime faith of the fathers and mothers of the early church. The faith the disciples felt as they waited in that upper room, was more than faith in the purifying blood of the Son of God—they had faith in their own integrity. They knew that through the power of the Holy Spirit they could meet the emergency. By faith, our early church fathers travelled through forests infested with Indians, forged across plains on horseback or in covered wagons in search of a place of freedom in worship for themselves and their posterity. In our day it is different. The church must go in search of men. In some sections of war-work communities, bus-type mobile chapels go from one mushroom town to another. One called the Wayside Chapel, seats twenty-five inside, thirty-five outside, and is equipped with pulpit, portable organ, public address system, and lending library.

In our own conference, for the past two months we have been using the Door-Knob Evangelism method in the east end of Pittsburgh. God has honored our efforts. At least twenty interested families have been contacted. A Bible club with an enrollment of eleven children has been formed. Two children have been baptized and at the rise of this conference, a building will be procured, and regular services will be opened in the new location which centers in a population of at least 70,000 people.

A four weeks tent meeting was conducted at Weston, West Virginia, last summer. The results did not warrant the renting of a building, but a regular cottage service has been conducted each week. Bro. C. V. Earnhart was appointed to care for the work. Plans for another tent meeting are now in the making, after which we hope for an organization. Tent

meetings were also conducted at Clarksburg, and Bridgeport, in the West Virginia district.

A tent meeting was conducted at Howland Springs, five miles from Niles, Ohio, and a lot was purchased and has been paid for during the year. Plans for a church building are under way when a building priority can be obtained. Ill health necessitated the resignation of the pastor, Sr. Sarah Redding from the Niles work, and Bro. Harold Garvin was appointed to fill this vacancy.

A penetration was also made at Salem, Ohio, and a weekly prayer meeting is being conducted with plans for a summer tent meeting. Bro. Harry Straight is in charge of the Salem project.

Prospecting was done at Fairmont, West Virginia, and Hubbard, Royal Oak, and West Barberton, Ohio, prerequisite to penetrations into these communities. During the year, Laurel Hill, Ohio, came under the pioneer supervision, and James Hersman was appointed to the pastorate.

Prospecting was also done at New Bethlehem, Pennsylvania. New Bethlehem gives promise as a future project.

Rev. Claude Eschelman and Bro. Harry Straight opened a work at Robertsville, Ohio.

Two churches have been organized during the year, one of fifteen charter members at Hillville, under the leadership of Rev. Vernon Kerr, and one at Carrollton, Ohio. Here we organized with thirteen full and six associate members, under the leadership of the Rev. Mrs. Florence B. Dray.

Daily Vacation Bible Schools were held at Stewart Run, and Blue Eye Mission last summer.

Beloved Co-workers, before us stretch vast fields for Pioneer evangelism. Let us follow the old paths blazed by the blood and tears of the Church Fathers to an old-fashioned revival.

Authorized a loan of \$175.00 from the Church Aid Fund, by the Johnstown Church.

Authorized a loan of \$500.00 from the Church Aid Fund, by the Rochester Church.

Elected the Secretary of the Conference Board of Trustees to the Office of Treasurer to hold and dispense the Aid Funds of the Conference. Authorization of the payment of \$20.00 to the Secretary and Treasurer of the Board of Trustees in appreciation for his labors and the expenses involved by his office.

Instructed the Secretary to dispose of the 31/3 shares of Idaho Farms Stock, donated to the Gospel Center by Mrs. Myrtle Crosby, to the best advantage.

Authorized the Wilgus Church to purchase the original parsonage property at Gipsy and took action to assist, financially, in clearing same of all moral obligations.

10. February 26, 1944, by correspondence approved underwriting a loan made by the Indiana Church of \$500.00 to the West Virginia Camp Meeting Association.

11. March 7, 1944, by correspondence, approved a loan from the Minister's Aid Fund, to Rev. Frederick Satterfield.

12. March 27, 1944, by correspondence, approved a loan, from the Church Aid Fund, to the Carrollton Tabernacle, of \$200.00.

13. At Canton, Ohio on April 24, 1944. Authorized the Canton Second Church to purchase the Glenn Lauby property for \$5,000.00 for a parsonage for above church.

Authorized a loan of \$1,000.00 from Conference Budget, to Canton Second Church.

Authorized Canton Second Church to negotiate a loan, not to exceed \$3,500.00 to assist in the purchase of the above mentioned property.

14. At the Stoneboro Camp Grounds on April 25, 1944.

Authorized the Allegheny Annual Conference to underwrite the necessary loans to make possible the purchase of the Glenn Lauby property by Canton Second Church.

15. At Franklin, Pennsylvania, on April 26, 1944. Authorized the Franklin Church to purchase the property at 1420 Chestnut Street, for a parsonage for the sum of \$4,000.00.

Authorized the loan of \$500.00 to the Franklin Church from the Conference General Fund.

16. By telephone and personal contact, authorized a loan to Rev. Frank Miller, from the Minister's Aid Fund.

#### Report No. 16.

#### STONEBORO CAMP MEETING ASSOCIATION PRESIDENT

To the members of the Allegheny Conference. Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

Greetings in the name of Him whom we love and serve! It is with grateful heart that we bring to you a report of the work of The Stoneboro Camp Meeting Association.

Our last Annual Encampment, held August 17-26, 1943, was not so largely attended as formerly on account of the Rationing of gasoline and the restrictions placed upon driving. Yet the attendance was excellent, and, I believe, more people attended the early morning and other prayer meetings than at any time previous. God was not rationed and there was no lack of glory and blessing from Him.

#### Report No. 21.

#### THE NEW AID PLAN (Reprint from 1940 Minutes)

I. An Aid Fund shall be established in Allegheny Conference for the purpose of giving material aid to churches and ministers who may have a pressing need.

II. The Fund shall be established and maintained by:

1. Such gifts as interested persons shall see fit to give.
2. An annual assessment on every church of the Conference of a

sum equal to one dollar per member, payable, if possible, before the end of the first quarter of each Conference year.

III. The Aid Fund shall be divided into two divisions, namely:

1. For Churches, 60 per cent.
2. For Pastors, 40 per cent.

IV. Disbursements from the Aid Fund shall be under the direction of the Conference Board of Trustees, who shall be governed by the following rules:

1. Aid to churches:

(A) Loans may be made to any church of the Conference to assist in buying a property, building a church, paying a pressing debt, buying or building a parsonage, meeting an emergency obligation, or paying a needy pastor in time of emergency.

(B) All loans shall become due and payable at the end of each Conference year, provided that the privilege or renewal for one year may be granted at the direction of the Board of Trustees, to churches making a written application for such renewal. Any church not paying their indebtedness when due, and failing to make application for lawful renewal for the loan shall immediately forfeit a sum equal to five per cent of its indebtedness to the Conference, which amount shall be remitted to the Conference Treasurer within thirty days. This payment shall not be deducted from the original amount loaned.

(C) In considering a request from any church for a loan, the Board of Trustees shall note the record of that church as to its loyalty to the Conference by the payment of its Conference obligations and its co-operation with the Conference efforts.

(D) No gift outright shall be made to any church. Only the vote of the Annual Conference can cancel any loan made from the Aid Fund. Such a vote shall be taken only upon the recommendation of the Board of Trustees.

2. Aid to Pastors:

(A) Loans may be made to any pastor of the Conference serving under Conference appointment and holding Authorization papers, or to any evangelist who is an Elder of the Conference, for the purpose of helping him in time of emergency or extreme need, to meet pressing obligations or procure necessities, deprivation of which would expose him or his household to unwarranted hardship and suffering or handicap him in his service as a pastor.

(B) All loans shall become due and payable at the end of each Conference year, provided that the privilege of an annual renewal may be granted at the discretion of the Board of Trustees to pastors making written application for such renewal. A pastor failing to make proper application for renewal shall be penalized by the forfeiture of a sum equivalent to five per cent of his loan which five per cent shall be paid within thirty days of the adjournment of the Annual Conference. This sum shall not be deducted from the original amount loaned.

(C) In considering the application of a pastor for a loan, the Board of Trustees shall take note of the pastor's record as it relates to his promptness and carefulness in meeting his financial obligations,

his habits of thrift, his cooperation in seeing that his church meets its Conference obligation, his loyalty to the Conference and its standards, and his period of service in the Conference.

(D) No gifts outright shall be made to any pastor. Only the vote of the Annual Conference shall cancel any loan made from the Aid Fund to any individual. Such vote shall be taken only upon recommendation of the Board of Trustees.

### COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

#### Be It Resolved:

1. That we, the members of the Woman's Home and Foreign Missionary Society, shall not be diverted from our sacred task of arousing and directing missionary spirit by habitually attending missionary activities, and with clean hands and pure hearts, devise lawful means to interest them in missionary work at home and abroad.

2. That we give ourselves to prayer in our monthly day-meetings in a much greater way than in the past; realizing that out of an awakening within the society will come a deeper interest in the church, and community. Proverbs 29: 18.

3. That we, individually, give ourselves to a more persistent and faithful STUDY of the Wesleyan Missionary, thus keeping ourselves informed of our Missionary activities and needs, and use the Wesleyan Missionary in the monthly programs.

4. That with minds informed with the progress and needs of each branch of our missionary work, and hearts of one accord with passion for the lost of earth, we cease not to pray daily for the missionary enterprise in the Home and Foreign Fields.

5. That we shall adhere to Scriptural methods of raising funds for missions, and out of sacrificial hearts and lives, give heartily as unto the Lord and His holy cause, for the Lord loveth a cheerful giver.

6. That we, our people, young and old, uphold by precept and example, modesty of dress, by which we mean wearing long hose on children, avoiding short sleeves, low necked dresses, short skirts, and nude shades of hosiery, the wearing of jewelry, which draw attention to our bodies and so tend to destroy purity and deep spirituality; also that we adhere to Deuteronomy 22:5 and I Timothy 2: 9-10.

7. That we persistently adhere to Christian standards that create an atmosphere in the home and in the church so conducive to spirituality in these perilous times of departing from the faith of our fathers, that the world may know we belong to the King of Kings, and look for His return for his holy bride.

8. That, as far as possible, we refuse to patronize grocery stores, restaurants, or other places selling liquor, since we deeply abhor drinking and smoking.

9. That we, as members of the Society, join the mothers, who are sacrificing their sons for our country, in prayer for their salvation and protection.

10. That these resolutions be read in each Society frequently enough

that all members be informed of their proposed attainments and requirement.

### COMMITTEE ON PROGRAM AND PLAN OF WORK

We recommend:

1. That at the first meeting after Conference each local society hold an installation service which includes the outline of the work and consecration to their office. Suggested helps. Section 13 and 30 of the Discipline.
2. That the program and plan of work be read and discussed as soon as the Minutes are received. This includes the Standard of Efficiency as drawn up by General Conference for local Societies. We also urge that the President of each society refer to these as a reminder during the year.
3. That each society endeavor to hold a public meeting monthly, praying especially for the requests found in the Wesleyan Missionary. We suggest that a spirit of evangelism be carried on in our local communities by the members of societies, each one feeling a personal responsibility to bring at least one soul to Christ during the year.
4. That each society elect one or more corresponding secretaries to keep in touch with our Home and Foreign mission field, thereby bringing first hand knowledge to our women.
5. That each society have an aggressive solicitor for the Wesleyan Missionary. Where it is difficult to get subscriptions we urge the use of the club plan.
6. That the President of each society remind those attending Stoneboro Camp Meeting of the daily Missionary Prayer Meeting from 4:15 to 5:00 o'clock, urging them to be faithful in this work of intercession.
7. (a) That each society put forth a special effort to send their President and a delegate to the annual Conference, assuming their expense for transportation.  
(b) That delegate's credentials be sent to Mrs. Eunice Comadoll, 1204 Coventry Street, Akron 1, Ohio, at least two weeks before Conference.  
(c) That each society send at least one dozen quarts of fruit or vegetables to Conference. Fruit to be credited at twenty cents per quart and vegetables at fifteen cents per quart.  
(d) That fifteen cents per member be raised for Delegate's entertainment and sent to the Sub-Treasurer before books close April 30.  
(e) That each society instruct their delegate how much to pledge at the public meeting. Unless otherwise specified, these pledges are divided one-fourth for Home and three-fourth for Foreign Missions.  
(f) That each society send its statistical report either by the delegate, or the President, or by mail, to be in the hands of the Statistical Committee the first day of the Conference session.
8. That we urge the use of the Study Book and the excellent programs in the Wesleyan Missionary. We believe the use of the book review method is most successful.
9. That each local society raise a General Conference budget of not

less than six dollars for Mountain Missions, and five dollars for Hephzibah Orphanage. Let all dues and budget obligations be sent through the local church treasurer to the representative district Sub-Treasurer.

10. That we send programs and supplies to our Mountain Missions, Hephzibah Orphanage, and the Indian Mission, also bandages, when required. (Note: Bandages should be cut from 2 to 4 inches wide and tightly rolled. These may be valued at fifty cents per pound. The amount to be credited on the statistical report, but not applied on budget.)

11. That we endeavor to raise one-fourth of the Church Educational Budget, including L. S. U. pledges.

12. That we stress the needs of Home Missions, raising as much as possible for this. Two hundred dollars of the total Conference receipts to be used for Zion's Hill Mission and One hundred dollars for Blue Ridge Mountains.

13. That the Red Letter Days as given in the Standard of Efficiency be observed when possible. That Easter and Self-Denial offerings be used for Home Missions.

14. (a) We suggest that where suitable, each society have a Mercy and Help Committee, whose duty shall be to visit the sick and needy and give aid where necessary, and send flowers or greeting cards to shut-ins.

(bb) That our Holiness Conventions, where possible, observe a Missionary service.

(c) That each society have a live Program Committee, varying once a month, thereby each member being made to feel a greater interest in Missionary work. We suggest the President act as Chairman of said Committee.

(d) We urge that dollar dues be paid by all members.

15. That since the retiring President is Acting President during the Conference session, we suggest that the society send her to the Conference, and elect the new president as delegate, where possible.

16. We further suggest that where possible, a Missionary be secured to hold special services some time during the year.
