JOURNAL OF DAILY PROCEEDINGS

Wesleyan Methodist Campground, Buechel, Kentucky, August 5, 1946

The Kentucky Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America convened for the twenty-fourth annual session in the Campground at 7:55 p. m., August 5, 1946. The service was opened with Kenneth L. McGuyer leading the congregational singing. The Rev. Louis Baumgartel prayed. An offering was taken for incidental expenses.

The Rev. Jacob E. Hunter preached the Conference Sermon from Luke 10:2, emphasizing the need of God-called laborers who seek not a place but the will of God.

Roll Call: 20 Elders; 15 Conference Preachers; 30 Delegates.

By motion the time of the conference sessions was set for 8:30 to 12:00 noon and 1:30 p. m. to adjourn by motion.

The President according to Standing Resolution appointed Chairmen of the following committees: Religious Services, J. E. Hunter, and W. B. Dunkum was elected the second member by motion; Statistics, Standley Kendall, and motion prevailed that Brother Kendall choose his own help; Resolutions, Ralph Golding, motion prevailed that each Chairman choose his own help on the committee; Finance, W. G. Stockton, and he chose L. J. Cherryholmes as second member; Conference Reporter, Reland Elam; Courtesies, Joseph Myers; Pastoral Relations, Jacob E. Hunter, Chairman, who chose D. W. Fossit, W. B. Dunkum, Louis Baumgartel, John Brown, B. L. Clark; Character, K. L. McGuyer who chose H. L. Barger. Adjourned by motion.

Second Meeting, Tuesday, 8:30 a.m.

H. L. Barger conducted the devotions and Brother Fossit prayed. By motion D. C. Webb's name was added to the Conference Preachers' Roll.

Roll Call: 22 Elders; 17 Conference Preachers; 31 Delegates.

Minutes read and approved. Other members were added to the committees as follows: C. M. Clark, the third member on Finance; H. L. Barger on Religious Services; John Woodward and John VanCise on Resolutions; Harlan Mays on Pastoral Relations.

Conference President's Report was given and accepted by vote. (See Report No. 1.)

Recessed for committee work until 11:00 a. m.

Esther Davidson was chosen for the Statistical Committee.

Names called, character passed and reports given: Blanche Burres, C. M. Hewitt, Florence Burres, W. B. Dunkum, J. E. Hunter, H. E. Wilson, Esther M. Hunter, Earl Monday, W. G. Stockton.

By motion former action was rescinded for the convening of the afternoon meeting and the time was set at 2:30 p. m.

Adjourned by limitation. Dismissed by Henry Taylor.

Third Meeting, Tuesday, 2:30 p. m.

After the devotional period Rev. J. E. Hunter presented Rev. D. A. Rees representing the Connection who by motion was asked to preside over the conference sessions.

Roll Call: 20 Elders; 14 Conference Preachers; 29 Delegates.

Conference minutes read and approved.

Motion prevailed for the Finance Committee to detain action on pioneer evangelism until later.

Names called, characters passed, reports given: Henry Taylor, J. K. Cole, James Hodges.

Ralph Golding was elected Chairman of the Auditing Committee and by motion was given the privilege of selecting his help on the committee.

Committee on Religious Services announced that Rev. D. A. Rees, would preach in the 7:30 service Tuesday night.

Adjourned by motion.

Fourth Meeting, Wednesday, 8:30 a.m.

Brother Earl Monday conducted the devotions and Brother Clark Ied in prayer.

Roll Call: 22 Elders; 18 Conference Preachers; 38 Delegates.

Minutes read and approved.

The Committee on Courtesies introduced a number who are attending. Conference for the first time.

The following names were called, characters passed and reports given: C. L. Blanchard, R. E. Bolton, Susie Britton, Reland Elam, Ralph Golding, John Woodward, John Arnold, H. L. Barger, A. T. Reynolds.

J. E. Hunter appointed the following tellers for the election of conference officials: K. L. McGuyer, Joseph Myers, A. T. Reynolds, L. J. Cherryholmes. The election resulted as follows: President, J. E. Hunter; Vice-President, D. W. Fossit; Secretary, C. L. Blanchard; Treasurer, Audie Basham.

By motion rising vote of thanks was given K. K. Rothrock for his faithful service as Treasurer.

Ministerial Trustee for three years, J. E. Hunter; Ministerial Trustee for two years, D. W. Fossit; Lay Trustee for three years, Fred H. Bunn; Ministerial Delegate to General Conference, J. E. Hunter; Alternate Ministerial Delegate, D. W. Fossit; Lay Delegate to General Conference, B. L. Clark; Alternate Lay Delegate, K. K. Rothrock.

Motion passed for extending the time for the election of officers before dinner. Motion prevailed to complete election of Boards at 2:30 p. m.

K. K. Rothrock was elected Alternate Lay Delegate to General Conference. Adjourned by limitation.

Fifth Meeting, Wednesday, 2:30 p. m.

Brother Dunkum conducted the devotions.

Roll Call: 20 Elders: 14 Conference Preachers: 31 Delegates.

Conference minutes read and approved.

Committee on Finance reported and the report was adopted. (See Report No. 10.)

Motion prevailed that the rest of the officers be elected by acclamation.

Harrison Davidson, Sr. was elected Sunday School Secretary; W. B. Dunkum, Tithing Secretary; Ralph Golding was added to the Missionary Board. B. L. Clark and D. W. Fossit were elected on the President's Advisory Board; Florence Burres and A. T. Reynolds were elected to the Sunday School Board. Ralph Golding was elected Conference Librarian. J. E. Hunter, Earl Pommerehn, and John Woodward were elected to the Pioneer Evangelism Committee. The Judicial Committee was filled with D. W. Fossit, J. E. Hunter, Kenneth L. McGuyer, Ralph Golding. J. E. Hunter, R. E. Bolton, D. W. Fossit, B. L. Clark, K. K. Rothrock were elected to the Committee on Vacancies. J. E. Hunter was elected for the term of four years on the Itineracy and Elders' Orders Committee, and Harrison Davidson, Sr. was elected for the two years term to fill out the term of J. A. Giles. Earl Pommerehn was elected Educational Secretary. L. J. Cherryholmes was recommended to the Book Committee to fill the unexpired term of J. A. Giles on the Board of Local Managers of Marion College. Leland Hamilton and B. L. Clark were elected as laymen on the Itineracy and Elders' Orders Committee.

Motion prevailed that the Conference President attend the joint session of the Wesleyan-Free Methodist Convention at Winona, Indiana in October and that the Conference pay his expenses.

Ralph Golding was elected as a Committee on Thanks.

Rev. D. W. Fossit was elected to preach the Conference Sermon for 1947, and John Woodward was elected as alternate.

Names called, characters passed and reports given: K. L. McGuyer, D. W. Fossit, Harrison Davidson, Sr., B. L. Seaton, John VanCise.

The Committee on Courtesies presented to the Conference Dr. W. F. McConn of Marion College and Rev. Sterl Phinney, missionary to South America, and Rev. Charles Day of the Ohio Conference and others of our cwn Conference.

Report of the Rev. J. A. Giles, Secretary of Pioneer Evangelism, was heard and accepted with provision that the financial part be referred to the Auditing Committee. (See Report No. 8.) Adjourned by motion.

Sixth Meeting, Thursday, 8:30 a.m.

Wardner Medders led the singing and John VanCise had charge of the devotions.

Roll Call: 22 Elders present; 15 Conference Preachers; 26 Delegates.

Minutes read and approved.

Motion prevailed that G. C. Newman be the third member on the Missionary Board.

Partial report of the Pastoral Relations Committee was read.

The Committee on Religious Services reported that Rev. D. A. Rees would give the Connectional Address at 11:00 a. m. Thursday and that Dr. W. F. McConn would give the Educational Address at 4:00 p. m.

The following names were called, characters passed and reports given: Earl Pommerehn, Joseph Myers, Landers Johnson, L. J. Cherryholmes, Gilbert Denton, C. C. Hayes, Wilma Cherryholmes, Hallie Giltner, Florence Hayes, Kate Hewitt, Ruby Erwin, E. L. Jackson, Marvin Smith, D. C. Webb, Mary Davidson.

Communication from Thomas Lauderbaugh was read by Gilbert Denton and his character passed. D. C. Webb reported for his wife Clara B. Webb and her character was passed. The secretary read a communica-

tion from Hazel Dunkum and her character passed.

Motion prevailed that we recess until Orders of the Day at 11:00 a. m. Special orders of the day arrived and Rev. D. A. Rees gave a splendid address on the purpose, power, perpetuation, and permanence of the Church and related this to the various departments of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, emphasizing the new coördination plan and the necessity of coöperation.

Adjourned by limitation. Dismissed by Brother Hunter. Adjourned by motion.

Seventh Meeting, Thursday, 2:30 p. m.

H. L. Barger led in prayer.

Roll Call: 17 Elders; 9 Conference Preachers; 23 Delegates.

Report of the Committee on Resolutions was made. Standing Resolutions were adopted, and the partial report on resolutions was accepted.

The Committee on Thanks reported and report was adopted. (See Report No. 6.)

Names called, characters passed, and reports given: Harrison Davidson, Jr., Christine Fowler, Standley Kendall, Louis Baumgartel.

Harrison Davidson, Sr. reported the activities of his son Harrison

Davidson, Jr. as Chaplain in the navy.

Dr. McConn reported on the Marion College Area Ministerial Convention, suggestion that a member of the Program Committee be elected to take the place of Brother Giles. By motion Brother Fossit was elected on this committee. Brother Hunter and H. L. Barger were elected on the Committee on Transportation.

Memorial to the General Conference was read and adopted. (See Report Supplement following Resolutions.)

The Auditing Committee reported that the Treasurer's books were correct. (See Report No. 5.)

Motion was carried that the publishing of the Conference Minutes be left in the hands of the Secretary, but that they be published at the Wesleyan Publishing House.

The Committee on Courtesies introduced two ladies from our Conference and Brother Asa Ault and Rev. Herbert Logsdon of the Indiana Conference.

Special orders of the day arrived and Dr. McConn gave an inspiring Educational Address on "If Youth Should Fail," bringing the work that Marion College is doing to help youth.

Adjourned by motion.

Eighth Meeting, Friday, 8:30 a.m.

Henry Taylor conducted the devotions.

Roll Call with quorum present.

The minutes were read and approved.

The complete report of the Committee on Resolutions was heard and adopted. (See Report No. 2.)

The report of the Committee on Statistics was heard and adopted. (See Report No. 11.)

The report of the Committee on Itineracy and Elders' Orders was given and adopted with provision that those recommended to Elders' Orders be voted on separately according to disciplinary requirements. (See Report No. 4.) Earl Pommerehn and James Hodges were properly clected to Elders' Orders by vote of the elders and lay Delegates.

The Treasurer's Report was read and adopted. (See Report No. 9.) Reading of the Pastoral Relations Committee was given and adopted. (See Report No. 3.)

The first Tuesday through Friday in April was designated by Conference vote as the time for the Ministerial Institute. The matter of the place of the Institute was left in the hands of the Conference President and the Secretary.

Special orders of the Day set 11:00 a. m. for a memorial meeting to honor those who have passed on this year. This meeting was conducted with profit.

The minutes of this session were approved as read.

Adjourned by motion (to the call of the Chair).

Ninth Meeting, Saturday, 1:00 p. m.

Prayer by K. L. McGuyer.

Roll Call with quorum present for business.

The Itineracy and Elders' Orders Committee gave a supplementary

report presenting the name of L. J. Cherryholmes who today completed his studies for ordination.

By motion L. J. Cherryholmes was duly elected to Elders' Orders.

The Pastoral Relations Committee recommended L. J. Cherryholmes to general evangelism and the report was adopted.

Adjourned by motion to the call of the chair.

STANDING RESOLUTIONS

- 1. Pastors shall report on Conference floor only number of Wesleyan Methodists, Wesleyan Missionaries, and Wesleyan Youth; Membership last year and present year; Average Sunday School Attendance, and Items VIII and X complete.
- 2. The Conference President shall in his quarterly meetings see that adequate insurance is carried by each church on its property.
- 3. The Conference President shall appoint, and notify 30 days before Conference convenes, each Chairman of the Conference Temporary Organization; and the Chairman of each Committee shall have the privilege of nominating his committee members.
- 4. The Conference fiscal year shall close July 22, when each pastor shall mail his statistical report, with receipts, to the Treasurer.
- 5. The Conference shall convene the first Monday night of August each year.
- 6. The Conference Trustees shall serve as the Committee on Church and Parsonage Location.
 - 7. No divorced person shall be ordained in the Kentucky Conference.

REPORTS

Report No. 1

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

During the previous conference year there has been a steady growth but not without its conflicts, battles and established victories, for which we are grateful unto God. With sickness, death and sorrow there has been much otherwise to encourage and upbuild the cause that lies close to our hearts. We have seen gains both temporal and spiritual.

During the conference year we have made two quarterly meeting rounds. We also made a visit with our Home Missionary Secretary, Rev. J. R. Swauger to the outstations in the mountains of Kentucky.

We organized two new classes—one at Mt. Tabor, Ky. with Rev. Pommerehn in charge; the other near Corydon, Indiana, with Rev. Kenneth L. McGuyer in charge. We also traveled in behalf of pioneer evangelism in southern Illinois, southern Indiana and eastern Kentucky. We held one pioneer meeting in Jeffersonville, Ky.; we expect to have a new class organized there within the near future. We purchased property at Holton, Indiana for a church parsonage, and property in Covington, Ky., located on 121 E. 15th St. for church purposes. This property in Covington, Ky. on 121 E. 15th St. was sold August 10, 1946.

Transfers were granted to the following: Rev. Harry Kastle to the Ohio Conference; Rev. John A. Giles to the South Carolina Conference; Rev. H. L. McCall to the South Carolina Conference; Rev. O. M. Pfautz to the Allegheny Conference.

Appointed Rev. H. E. Wilson as pastor of White Hall, Indiana in the month of October, 1945.

Report No. 2

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

Be it resolved, that:

1. Pastors read with instructions the General and Special rules of the Discipline to their congregations.

2. Each pastor shall send \$1.00 or one designated book of the Course

of Study, to the Conference Librarian.

3. A pastor (or church) shall use only Wesleyan ministers for Evangelistic meetings, unless special consent be granted by the Conference President.

- 4. Every pastor and evangelist shall buy and read at least five, soundly-spiritual books a year and report the same on the conference floor while reading statistical report.
- 5. Every pastor and evangelist shall attend Annual Conference and Camp Meeting if they expect to retain their relationship with us, unless providentially hindered.
- 6. Every preacher receiving a book from the Conference Library may hold it for only one month. There will be a flat rate of twenty-five cents for the month and five cents for every day over the month.
- 7. Let us vigorously protest against liquor by every means possible to the Christian, including a refusal to patronize merchants who handle the same. We shall likewise oppose the wholesale prostitution existing in Army and National life by exalting a virtuous life and instructing young people and parents.
- 8. In this age where immodesty and worldliness is so subtily creeping into the Holiness Movement, let every minister of ours earnestly contend for, and faithfully preach the entire Word of God without fear or favor of man, let us refuse to compromise with the ungodly element which is robbing the Church of her glory, and preachers of the divine anointing.
- 9. Let no minister return to visit members of previous charge, or correspond regularly with them after leaving that field to begin labors elsewhere unless necessity demands, and then let him first contact the present pastor.

REPORT OF THE SECRETARY OF PIONEER EVANGELISM

To the Kentucky Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, convening August 5-8, 1946, on the Campground, Buechel, Ky.

Greetings in Jesus' precious name. It is our sincere prayer that you may have His guidance and blessing upon every deliberation.

Here is our little report of work as Secretary of Pioneer Evangelism for the brief period of the conference year.

Toured and spoke in behalf of Pioneer work in the following churches: Ninth Street, Highland Park, Clear Fork, Leavenworth, Simpson's Chapel, and West Frankfort, Illinois. We raised in cash and pledges \$427.50 on that tour; all this was to be above the budget.

Made investigation of prospects for work at the following: Corbin, Kentucky; Corydon, Indiana; Sullivan, Indiana; Jeffersonville, Indiana; and several towns in West Illinois.

Under the advisement of the Pioneer Board and sanction of our Conference President I held 5 meetings in the Kentucky Conference at new or weak places, namely: Mt. Tabor, Ky.; Madison, Indiana; Bloomfield, Indiana; Milton, Ky. and New Albany, Indiana. God gave us over 100 souls at our altars, and several got real victory. Three different ones were sanctified on their feet. There were times when we could have no preaching but souls found God.

It was my honest endeavor to be true to lost souls, old-fashioned Wesleyan Methodist standards and stand by our Denominational program.

We were able to secure subscriptions for the periodicals of the Church as follows: Wesleyan Methodists, 22; Wesleyan Missionarys, 8; Wesleyan Youths, 30.

We preached 100 times besides some special-occasion messages. Approximately 100 souls sought God either for pardon, reclamation, or entire sanctification.

Mr. K. K. Rothrock, Treasurer, paid us \$583.34 salary, but we returned to him \$319.33, besides \$14.00 collected from Leavenworth, Indiana which actually made it cost the Conference \$250.01 for our services.

For the 5 revival meetings within the Conference we got \$422.50 and gave back to pastors and churches and my travel expenses for period \$82.10, making net offerings in revivals \$340.40.

My net salary and offerings were \$590.41.

We would like to say that we have nothing but a heart of love and a prayer for the success of good old Kentucky Conference.

Report No. 10

REPORT OF FINANCE COMMITTEE

- 1. We recommend that all churches paying less than \$900.00 salary, endeavor to raise the salary to that amount.
- 2. We recommend that this Conference pay Connectional Budget Assessments. (See budget apportionment.)
- 3. We recommend that each member pay \$1.50 to the Conference Work Fund. This money shall be disbursed by the Conference Treasurer with the approval of the Conference President and his Advisory Board.
- 4. We strongly recommend the Storehouse Plan of Tithing as the general financial plan of the Cnurch. Each pastor shall encourage the adoption of this plan by his church (See Malachi 3:8-10).
- 5. We recommend that the Conference Treasurer and the Conference Secretary each be paid \$50.00 a year.
- 6. We recommend and endorse the Church Extension Card Plan. Let all pastors present the same to their churches as soon as possible after returning from Conference.
- 7. All churches shall pay the current or outgoing pastor his salary in advance, or send it when due, for the Conference and Camp Meeting Sundays.
- 8. We recommend that the Conference President be paid a salary of \$2000.00 per year, plus traveling expenses to be figured at 4¢ per mile in connection with conference work. This shall be raised by the \$1.00 a year per member, and by the tithe of the preacher's cash salary. These funds are to be sent by the church treasurer to the Conference Treasurer monthly. All accruing funds above the foregoing designation shall revert to the following funds: one half to Conference Work Fund It is understood that weaker churches be allowed to appeal to this fund for aid.); one fourth to Pioneer Evangelism Fund; one fourth to Superannuated Ministers' Fund.
- 9. We recommend that 25¢ per member be paid for the support of superannuated ministers, their widows and orphans.
- 10. We recommend that any church not having a parsonage for the use of the pastor, either pay the rent for, or buy, or build, a parsonage.
- 11. We recommend that each active member of the Local W. Y. P. Society pay 50¢ annually on the Connectional W. Y. P. S. Budget. (It is understood that this amount be raised by the local society.) We further recommend that no church budget be considered paid in full until this item is paid.
 - 12. Each pastor's moving bill shall be paid by the new church.
- 13. Let all churches feel their obligation to give monthly donations to their pastor.
- 14. We recommend, in accordance with the action of the Book Committee that all newly-organized churches and organized missions be exempt

from Connectional Budget the first two years; furthermore that they be exempt from the Conference Budget the first year and take free-will offerings for Conference Budget the second year.

15. We recommend that all General Evangelists, Conference Evangelists, and local preachers pay their tithe from cash salary into the church where they hold their membership, and that they report the amount of tithe paid to the local church in their annual report.

16. We recommend that 50¢ per member be raised throughout the Conference for Conference Entertainment for the preachers and their families, and delegates; and that this amount be sent to the Conference Treasurer.

17. We recommend that each pastor raise the amount of \$1.00 per member for the purpose of erecting a new building at Marion College. This money shall be sent to the Conference Treasurer and specified, but shall not count on Educational Budget.

18. We recommend that 15¢ per member per month be raised for Pioneer Evangelism. This shall be brought into the church the first Sunday of the month. Then additionally, the Sunday Sunday offering of the firt Sunday of the month shall accrue to Pioneer Evangelism. These funds shall be sent to the Conference Treasurer monthly. As there is no full-time man in the field of Pioneer Evangelism, we recommend that this conference body elect a committee of three members who shall have the authority to disburse this money by a majority vote. We further recommend that this committee concentrate this money on the new pioneer works, namely, Jeffersonville, Paoli and the new work at Corydon. Also if opportunity presents itself that new works be started under the supervision of this committee.

19. We recommend that each member be assessed one dollar a year, this money to be placed in a fund which shall be known as the Camp Meeting Fund; the money to be used to help pay the expense of the camp meeting.

Reports

COMMITTEE ON PLAN OF WORK

I. Home Work

- 1. We recommend that each local society pay to the Conference Treasurer at least one dollar annually for each of the following Home Works: Blue Ridge Mountain Workers, Onondaga Indian Reservation, Zion's Hill Mission, Wheelrim Mission, Hope Mission, and Mexican Mission, California.
- 2. We recommend that each local society pay to the Conference Treasurer at least five dollars for the support of Hephzibah Orphanage, this may be applied on budget.

3. That contributions of clothing and supplies be made to our mis-

sion stations.

4. The use of the Card Call Plan in every society.

5. The observance of Educational Day with program, and contributions of cash and supplies to apply on Educational Budget.

II. Foreign Work

We recommend:

1. We continue our full support to our Foreign Mission Program.

2. That we faithfully pray for our church in Japan.

3. Send Sunday School Charts in their original rolls to Brother Birch for our missions in India and Africa, also Sunday-school Cards.

III. Medical Work

We recommend:

1. Bandages be made an inch and a half, and two inches wide in rolls no more than two inches in diameter. These can be used in our home mission stations or may be sent to Brother Birch for our foreign work. Value of them, fifty cents a pound, not to apply on budget.

2. That we continue our Medical Work for foreign fields as hereto-

fore.

IV. Literature

We recommend:

1. Every member of our Missionary Society SHOULD be a reader of our Missionary Magazine.

2. That we use the Study Book, this to be secured from the Publish-

ing House.

3. That Posters be frequently prepared for use in the local societies and brought to Annual Conference for display.

V. Standard of Efficiency

We recommend:

- 1. One Missionary prayer service each month. (10%)
- 2. A minimum of ten meetings with special prayer and business transacted. (10%)
 - 3. The observance of the following Red Letter Days:
 - a. Harvest Day for Education. (2%)
- b. Easter—programs, gifts, and offering for Home Missions. (2%)
 - c. World Day of Prayer. (2%)
- d. May Day—Bandages and other suitable gifts for outgoing missionaries, or for use in the home field. (2%)
- e. Wesleyan Missionary Day. Special day to take subscriptions. (2%)
 - 4. One Public Meeting. (10%)
 - 5. Correspondence with Missionaries. (10%)
- 6. That the President, Secretary, and Treasurer and 50% of the membership be subscribers to the Wesleyan Missionary. (10%)
- 7. That a solicitor be elected for the Wesleyan Missionary, gaining not less than two new subscribers a year. (10%)
- 8. That a delegate be elected to the Annual Conference of the W. H. & F. M. S. (10%)
 - 9. That Report Blanks be properly filled out on time. (10%)
- 10. That delegate be instructed by local society regarding the amount to be pledged by that society at the annual conference session. (10%)
 - 11. That officers be elected at last meeting of conference year. (10%)
- 12. That all money received as dues be sent to Conference Treasurer, designating where 50% of same shall be applied on Missions. (10%)
- 13. That each society elect a Y. M. W. B. Superintendent and promote a fully organized band. (10%)

 - 4. Used Thank Offering boxes or envelopes. (5%)
 - 5. Learned facts about five great missionaries. (10%)
- 6. Learned names and a few facts about our active missionaries, learned the name of station at which each is located. (10%)
 - 7. Sent in an offering for Home Missions. (10%)
 - 8. Sent in an offering for Education. (10%)
- 9. The Superintendent and President of the Band readers of the Missionary. (10%)
- 10. The value of prayer, God's Work, and personal service stressed. (10%)
 - 11. Can report increase in membership, and in funds raised. (10%)
 - 12. Sent in the annual report by December 31. (10%)

The above Plan of Work adopted by the Conference for use in each local society.

Additional recommendations by our Conference Plan of Work Committee:

- 1. That each local society furnish complete one room in the dormitory.
- 2. That each society endeavor to support our foreign work in a definite way beyond that assigned in the budget.
- 3. That our Conference be devided into the following districts with chairmen of each appointed by the Conference Missionary President. These chairmen, with the president to work up group missionary programs to promote a greater spirit of fellowship, and create a broader interest in Missions. We urge the Y. M. W. B. leaders to coöperate in adding to the interest of the Y. M. W. B. in these programs.
