## JOURNAL OF DAILY PROCEEDINGS

The sixty-ninth annual session of the Kansas Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church assembled in the auditorium at Miltonvale, Kansas, at 2:00 p. m., Tuesday, August 8, 1939, with the President, Rev. F. C. Hill, in the Chair.

The devotions were led by E. A. Coates, with Brother Wendell Campbell conducting the opening song service. Prayer was offered by R. E. Britton, O. G. Wilson and W. A. Smith. The Spirit of the Lord was sweetly present.

It was a sacred moment as the Conference stood for a moment with bowed head in respect to the efficient work rendered the past ten years.

1940 Conference—A motion was made that the second Tuesday in August be set as the date for our 1940 Conference.

A motion to amend by striking out the word "second" and insert that of "first" was lost.

On motion the question was laid on the table until the afternoon session.

Letter of Standing—At his request a letter of standing was given to our Brother A. H. Clark who is uniting with another body to go as a Missionary to Latin America under their Board.

Adjourned by limitation of time. Benediction by Professor O. G. Wilson.

#### Wednesday Afternoon

Order of the Day—The Sunday-school interests were presented under the charge of the Sunday-school Secretary, Brother Lowell Gilger. Brother Rufus Reisdorph, our Connectional Sunday-school Secretary, was present to give a stirring address on the Sunday-school work. He pointed out the need of the Sunday school from the standpoint of citizenship and the Church. From some startling statistics he pointed out what the Sunday

school has done in the past, what it is doing at the present, and the contributions it is making for the future.

#### MORAL REFORM

LOWELL GILGER, Secretary.

We, your Committee on Moral Reform, submit the following report. The term Moral, according to Webster means the dealing with, or concerned with establishing and diseminating principles of right and wrong in conduct or behavior. Reform means to induce or cause to abandon an evil manner of living and follow a good one, or conform to a standard of what is good and right. It necessarily follows then that our task as a Church is the establishing of such principles of right conduct, as standards of Christian behavior, that our people will be induced to conform to them. Otherwise we have a needless expenditure of time, energy, and effort; and we fight as "One that beateth the air." For this standard fixed by the Church we refer you to the Wesleyan Methodist Discipline, Section V, Paragraphs 52; 53; 55; 56. For additional standards of sufficient elasticity to allow of individual choices and personal tastes, we refer you to the Miltonvale College Catalogue of 1939, which reads in sense, "We believe that many of the present styles which expose much of the female body to the public gaze are not conducive to the moral and spiritual development of either sex, therefore we insist that our girls must be modestly attired. For appearance upon the platform girl's dresses must not have extreme low necks, and must be of sufficient length that the knees of the wearer will be completely covered when in a sitting posture." This we heartily endorse.

We believe that the Church should take an uncompromising stand and place an irrevocable ban on the dance, the modern movie, mixed bathing in public pools, in short we definitely oppose all manner of conduct, habits, dress, eating and drinking, that does not come within the sensible scriptural scope of Christian decency and temperance.

In view of the tendency toward moarl decay and spiritual collapse, we plead with God and the Church for a rekindling of revival fires, a new demonstration of Holy Ghost power through an active and operative faith, that attacks sin to the terror of the devil, that exalts Jesus Christ and proclaims the beauty of holiness to the glory of God, and sends a wave of Pentecostal evangelism across our entire spiritual front to reclaim the the backslider, rescue the perishing, and sanctify the Church, that our beloved Zion may be preserved as a God-blessed barrier to the modern march of Satan.

We raise our voice against the many popular magazines, Wild West periodicals, and such books as are vile, vicious, and obscene. Whenever any of these upon the printed page bear information that is a direct reprisal, or counter to the standards and requirements of the Church, we urge our people not only to refuse subscription, but to "clean house" of any that may have slipped in before an awakened conscience prevented. We offer as the best solution to this problem the taking of our own Church periodicals for the reading table also other legitimate means of information, and the stocking of our libraries with those books conducive to holy living that will forever free our homes from the foul filth of worldly literature.

From the pulpit and pew, through the ministry and the laity we pray for a common spirit of fellowship, unity, and coöperation that will forever free us from the accusing glances and suspicious jealousies of another's work or position; that we may practice more and more that spirit of Christian tolerance and grace of longsuffering toward the weak and faulty, that in the "true spirit of meekness, we may restore such an one." May it ever be our common objective that in the beauty of holiness we may be able by precept and example to provoke one another to good works, that without striving we shall experience "How good and how pleasant it is for brethren to dwell together in unity."

#### AUDITING

We, your Auditing Committee, have examined the books of the Treasurer of the Missionary Board, of the Treasurer of the Camp Meeting and Campground Committee, the reports of the Conference President, the Treasurer of the Conference Board of Trustees, the Sunday-school Secretary and the Tithing Secretary, also the books of the Treasurer of the Superannuate Board.

#### STATISTICAL GLEANINGS

The Committee on Statistics presents the following items of interest: The total membership of the Conference is 1434, which is a loss of 17 from last year.

The total number in Sunday school shows a gain of 219, and the average attendance shows a gain of 110. The number joining the church from the Sunday school is 118.

The total contributions show an increase of \$2330.25, making an average contribution of approximately \$40.00 per member, which is an increase of \$3.20 per member. The pastor's receipts show an increase of \$2662.21 over last year.

Several churches being revalued, and two not reporting, make a decrease in the total for that item, the present valuation being \$91,112.50. The valuation of parsonage shows an increase of \$6150.00, the indebtedness increasing \$5186.21.

A loss of four subscriptions to the Wesleyan Methodist is reported, but a gain of 63 Wesleyan Missionaries.

The following charges raised every item of the budget: Abilene, Belleville, Chapman Creek, Concordia, Eskridge, Gaylord, Hopewell, Kansas City, Kansas; Lawrence, Topeka, First; Quinton Heights, Wesley Center.

Formoso and Hardy have both been active during the year. Reports from these works have not yet reached the hands of the Committee, hence, their records do not appear. Nevertheless, their labors and contributions have been appreciated.

#### RESOLUTIONS

- 1. Evangelistic Help. Resolved, That the Camp Meeting and Campground Committee be authorized, if they see fit to do so, to engage Evangelistic help for the Camp Meeting two years in advance.
- 2. Election of Conference Officers. Resolved, That the election of Conference Officers be held on the second day of Conference at 9:00 a. m.
- 3. Subscription Lists. Resolved, That all subscription lists and monies raised at Conference for all purposes be put through the hands of the Conference Treasurer or the Treasurer of the W. H. & F. M. Society, and that all subscription lists be kept by these Treasurers, and that notice of indebtedness be given all subscribers by means of a list sent to their pastors early in the year.
- 4. Sanctity of God's House. Resolved, That such work as making quilts and disposing of the same be performed in the homes of the people and not in the houses erected for public worship.
- 5. Pastor's Moving Expenses. Resolved, That the class hiring a minister shall within ten days after his arrival pay to him his moving expenses, this not to be applied on his salary.
- 6. Reporting All Offerings to Pastors. Resolved, That all monies be reported to the Pastors for entry on their Statistical Report in order to give due credit both to the Charge and to the Conference.
- 7. Subscription Lists Record. Resolved, That the Secretary supply the Conference President with a list of all supscriptions taken at Conference. That he also provide each pastor with a list of those from his charge.
- 8. Unleavened Bread. Resolved, That it be the sense of this Conference that all our churches use unleavened bread in the administration of the Lord's Supper. We suggest the following recipe: 1/3 cup flour, 1 teaspoon butter (heaping), moisten with milk enough to roll. Mark in 1/2 inch squares and bake as pie dough. The above will serve 50 persons.
- 9. Pastor Nominates Steward. Resolved, That it be the sense of this Conference that the pastor be granted the privilege of nominating one member to the Board of Stewards from each church on his charge.
- 10. To Hold Quarterly Meetings. Resolved, That the Conference President shall travel the Conference and care for one-half of the Quarterly Meetings.
- 11. Inspection of Church Property. Resolved, That it is the sense of the Annual Conference that the Conference President should "inquire at each Quarterly Conference whether the local church property is properly repaired and insured.
- 12. Nominating Committee. Resolved, That we elect a Committee of five Elders, including the President as Chairman ex-officio, and three

Delegates-elect from three churches designated by the Conference to: First, examine the credentials of all Delegates to the Conference. Second, nominate all sessional committees and be prepared to report as the first item of business.

- 13. Night Services Evangelistic. Resolved, That it is the sense of this body that all its night services be conducted along strictly evangelistic lines.
- 14. Theological Institute. Resolved, That the traveling expenses of instructors to and from the Institute be paid from the Conference Fund, and also such books as may be needed for Institute work.
- 15. Superannuate Service. Resolved, That one public service in each Annual Conference Session be set aside in honor of the Superannuate Ministers and for the purpose of creating interest in the Superannuate Fund, and that it be the duty of the Second Vice-President to arrange for such service.
- 16. Superannuate Constitution. Resolved, That the Constitution of the Kansas Superannuate Association be printed in the Conference Minutes once in five years, and that a note be carried regularly in the Resolutions stating the year of last publication. (Published in 1938 Minutes, amended in 1939.)
- 17. 1 Per Cent Assessment. Resolved, That we require all active ministers to pay 1 per cent of their cash salary to the Superannuate Fund, this not to be applied on the Budget.
- 18. Conference Loans. Resolved, That the Conference Treasurer shall issue no loans from any Conference monies except by sanction of the Conference Board of Trustees.
- 19. Additional Delegates. Resolved, That when more than one Delegate from any one church presents credentials to this body, there shall appear in the credentials the name of the Elder that entitles the church to the additional Delegate.
- 20. Fiscal Year. Resolved, That the fiscal year of the local church close one week before Conference and that the statistical report be made on the basis of money received up to that time.
- 21. Pastor Paid Through Conference. Resolved, That the church's financial obligation to the pastor, whether he be leaving the field or not, be extended throughout the Conference and Camp Meeting period.

Dear Sisters of the Kansas Conference W. H. & F. M. Societies:

# PLAN OF WORK

We, the Committee on Plan of Work, hereby recommend the following:

#### Division I. Local Work

- 1. That this Plan of Work be reviewed quarterly in each Local Society.
  - 2. That we observe the "Red Letter Days":
    - A. Harvest Home Day for Educational Work.
- B. Easter-Programs and offerings for Home Missions Connectionally supported.
- C. The World Day of Prayer—We recommend that the District Organizers make definite plans for the observance either by District or Local Societies.
- D. May Day—to be known as gift day, gifts of clothing, money, or other articles such as can be sent out with outgoing missionaries or used on the home fields.

Before sending donations please secure information concerning proper addresses. (See Magazine Directory.)

- E. Wesleyan Missionary Day—public presentation of the Missionary Magazine in effort to secure subscriptions. The duty of the Local Solicitor for the Magazine shall be to secure renewals and fill the quota for her society. The same to be a permanent officer. We encourage the reading of Missionary books, and distribution of tracts, and a record be kept by the Magazine Solicitor of Mission books used.
- 3. That October 13 be observed as Harvest Home Day. We urge each society to send cash or make donations to the Dormitory and report same to Harvest Home Committee to receive credit on the Educational Budget.
- 4. That all local dues be sent to our Treasurer, Mrs. Bertha Wilson, 647 Watson Ave., Topeka, Kansas. One half of the same to be used for Missionary work and be applied on church budget. Please designate specifically where this credit is desired. (See Treasurer book Item "C" under Number 4.) That honorary membership dues be applied on Missionary Budget.

- 5. We recommend the use of a monthly envelope system for the collection of dues, the Treasurer to keep record of the amounts paid in.
- 6. That each Society contribute 10 cents per active member to pay General Conference Delegates expenses.
- 7. That each Society contribute at least \$6.00 for Home Missions Connectionally supported.
- 8. We urge each Society to contribute at least \$5.00 to the Hepzibah Orphanage, except in cases where church budget is less than \$5.00. Such contributions to be applied on church budget.
- 9. That each Local President appoint a committee whose duty shall be to visit the sick and to work in harmony with the pastor in rendering assistance that will help in reaching souls and building up the kingdom of God.

We recommend that formation of Prayer Circles, where possible, or prayer chains to encourage faith and united prayer.

- 10. That the President of each Local Society be made responsible to arrange with the pastor for one evening of the third week of each month to pray especially for Mission work, the same to be preceded by a day of fasting. We also recommend that an offering be taken at each of these services as follows:
  - A. September, October and November for Education.
  - B. December-Orphanage.
  - C. January-South America.
  - D. February-Kansas Conference Missions.
  - E. March-Miss Bessie Long.
  - F. April-Home Missions.
  - G. May-Bethshan Home.
  - H. June-New Building Fund.
  - I. July-Medical Missions.
- 11. In harmony with the recommendation of the General Society we urge that our ladies observe Friday of each week as a day of fasting and prayer for a Connection-wide revival, until it comes.
- 12. We urge the use of the Programs printed in the Wesleyan Missionary, also the Study Book, "Life of C. T. Studd."
- 13. That all money be disbursed through our Local and Conference Treasurers. That all money or receipts applying on Budget be sent from the Local W. H. & F. M. S. Treasurer to the Conference Treasurer quarterly.

This money should be in the hands of the Conference Treasurer at least one week before Conference.

- 14. That the annual report be prepared by the President, Secretary and Treasurer of the Local Society, one copy to be sent to Committee on Statistics, Mrs. Ruby Anderson, 410 Monroe St., Topeka, Kansas, two weeks before Conference, the duplicate copy to be brought to Conference by the Delegate. The names of the newly elected President and Secretary should appear on the back of the Report Blank.
- 15. That each Society grade themselves by the Efficiency Standard, which is to be read at the last business meeting. A grade of 10 per cent will be given on each of any ten points chosen. Societies making a grade of 90 per cent will receive honorable mention and those making a grade of 100 per cent will be placed on the Honor Roll.
- 16. We urge the reading of the report on Moral Reform at four public meetings during the year.
- 17. That each Society have a Committee of two to see to the gathering of food stuffs for the Conference dining hall. The minimum for each Society shall be: 10 quarts of fruit spread, or fruit, 5 quarts of pickles, relish or catsup, 10 pounds of noodles, one half dozen tea towels, one apron, 10 quarts of vegetables, and 25 cents to purchase teaspoons, or fill quota with cash.

Donations left over to be turned over to the Dormitory.

The Conference Society to receive credit. This will apply on Education Budget.

- 18. That the President of each Local Society appoint a Committee to coöperate with the Temperance Superintendent of the Sunday school in observance of Temperance Sunday and distribution of Temperance literature.
- 19. November-Mens and Missions month. Program to be sponsored by the men.
- 20. That our Conference goal for the coming year be 600 members, 400 magazines, and \$6,000.00 apportionment. We urge that each society make a gain in each of the above mentioned.

# Division II. Conference Work

- 21. That the W. H. & F. M. S. Conference begins Tuesday Aug. 13th at 3 p. m.
  - 22. That the President and District Organizer arrange the time and

23. That each District be supervised by the District Organizer under the direction of the Conference President.
