Standing Rules

1 . 4

1. Visiting Ministers:

All visiting ministers of our denomination and those of other denominations who hold the Bible to be the very Word of God and the final authority in faith and practice are invited to honorary seats in this conference.

2. Date of Conference:

The annual sessions of the conference shall convene on the Chambers Campground at 1:30 p. m. the last Tuesday of June, except that quadrennially it shall convene the second Tuesday after the General Conference convenes. The forenoon meetings shall convene at 8:30 and adjourn at 10:45. The afternoon meetings shall convene at 1:30 and adjourn by vote. The seven rows of seats in the front of the tabernacle, and the platform, shall comprise the bar of the conference.

3. Examinations:

Examinations shall be in the hands of the Committee on Itineracy and Orders not later than two weeks before the opening of the conference session.

4. Loans:

Any and all conference loans shall be subject to the approval of the Conference Board of Trustees.

5. Procedure:

The daily order of business shall be: 1. Hymn, 2. Roll Call, 3. Devotions, 4. Reading of Minutes, 5. Appointment of Committees, 6. Report of Committees, 7. Miscellaneous Business, 8. Passage of Characters.

The roll call and the reading of the Minutes shall be heard only at the first session of each day.

6. Taking of Pastoral Vote:

To obtain uniformity it is recommended that the Pastoral Vote be taken on each charge during the third full week in April, or during the following week if Easter falls during the third week. The Pastoral Vote shall be taken on propared official ballots for this purpose.

7. Pay for Officials:

The Secretary and the Treasurer of the conference shall receive \$75.00 each annually.

8. Statistician:

The conference shall elect a statistician whose term of office shall expire at the close of the next session of the Annual Conference. He shall be the chairman of the Statistical Committee.

9. Closing of Records:

The Conference Treasurer shall close his books on June 10 and all receipts thereafter shall be included in the report for the following year. The Treasurer shall then fill in Item IX on the statistical report blank, affix his signature and mail to each pastor who in turn

shall complete the statistical report and forward it to the Statistician by June 17.

10. Reporting of Statistics:

We authorize the use of the abbreviated report blanks.

11. Reports:

The report of the Woman's Missionary Society and the report of the Wesleyan Youth shall be printed in the conference minutes.

12. Ex-Officio Members:

- (a) The President of the conference and the President of Wesleyan Youth shall be ex-officio members of the Camp Meeting Committee.
- (b) The President of the conference shall be ex-officio chairman and the President of the Woman's Missionary Society shall be an ex-officio member of the Missionary Board.
- (c) The conference President shall be ex-officio chairman and the Secretary of the conference shall be ex-officio member of the Nominating Committee.
- (d) The conference President shall be ex-officio chairman and the Secretary of Evangelism shall be member ex-officio of the Committee of Evangelism.

13. Sale of Properties:

All money coming to the conference from the sale of church and parsonage property shall become a part of the Church Extension Fund.

14. Committee on Location:

The Board of Trustees shall choose three of their own number to constitute a Committee on Building Location. They shall study all proposed building projects and report their findings to the Board of Trustees. The names of the committee shall be printed in the minutes.

15. Editing of Minutes:

The Secretary of the conference is authorized to edit the minutes.

16. Election of Camp Meeting Chairman:

At the time of the election of conference officers the conference shall elect by ballot from among the elders the chairman of the Camp Meeting Committee.

17. Election of Conference Officers:

All conference officers shall be elected by ballot or after nominations by the Nominating Committee or from the floor. (See list of officers.)

18. Conference Policy:

- (a) Each church shall grant its pastor at least two weeks vacation each year, with pay; and the church shall furnish the supply.
- (b) Each church shall grant its pastor the privilege of a two week revival meeting away from his pulpit each year, and the pastor shall pay his supply.
- (c) It is understood that the pastor shall have one day each week

for rest and recreation. Accumulation of days shall not exceed three days.

- (d) Each church shall furnish an adequate heating system (preferably a central heating system); and a kitchen range for the parsonage as soon as possible.
- (e) Each church shall furnish shades or venetian blinds, draw-drapes, curtain rods and fixtures for the parsonage.
- (f) The church shall release the pastor for attendance at Conference and Camp including both Sundays and shall furnish the supply.
- (g) Each church shall encourage and plan for the pastor to attend all Conference gatherings (Ministerial Fellowships, District meetings, work bees, etc.). This is an important part of the Conference work.
- (h) The church shall encourage the pastor to attend the Annual Ministerial Refresher Course at Houghton each year and shall make this possible by providing for the expense for the same or as much of that expense as possible.
- (i) When a church anticipates changing pastors and invites a minister to candidate it shall provide the expense for such a trip.
- (j) When a church changes pastors it shall pay the moving expense of the incoming pastor.

19. Apportionment of Budget:

- (a) The Budget Apportionment Committee shall apportion budget to all members-in-full, regardless of age.
- (b) The Onondaga Reservation charge shall be assigned only the denominational budget.
- (c) A newly organized church shall be exempt from Conference budget the first year following its organization and only one-half the conference budget assigned the second conference year following its organization, after which it may be assigned all items of budget in full as usual.

20. Course of Study:

Persons recommended to study or to travel under the direction of the conference shall appear personally before the Committee on Itineracy and Orders before they are accepted and annually thereafter or communicate with the committee so long as they are continued. If they fail to do this for two successive years, they shall be returned to their quarterly conference.

21. Ministerial Institute:

The President of the conference shall be ex-officio chairman of the committee to plan the Ministerial Institute. The three district chairmen shall complete the committee. This committee shall arrange for the Institute following the next annual session of the conference.

22. Delegates' Credentials:

It shall be the duty of the pastor not later than one week before the

next annual session of the conference to forward to the Secretary of the conference, who is a Committee on Credentials, the credentials of the delegate(s) and the alternate delegate(s) from his charge.

23. Audits:

The books of the Treasurer of the conference and of other custodians of conference funds shall be audited by an accountant or recognized bookeeper approved by the President and his Advisory Board. This shall be done prior to the convening of the annual session of the Conference, and a certified copy shall be furnished the President.

24. Defining Pioneer Work:

In the interim between conference sessions the Missionary Board is authorized to interpret what shall be considered a pioneer or extension work. In the event of the purchase of property, the Missionary Board may make recommendations to the Board of Trustees.

25. Offerings for Extension Work:

The third Sunday of the second month of each quarter is recommended as the time for taking the Sunday school offering for extension work.

26. Bible Study Quarter:

During the first quarter of each calendar year, which is designated as Bible Study Quarter, each church shall conduct a Bible study program. Plans for this work shall be offered each year by the President and the Bible Study Committee.

27. Committee on Orders of the Day:

The President and his Advisory Board shall constitute a committee on Orders of the Day. They shall plan the daily schedule of the conference and shall prepare a printed agenda. The following shall be the order of the evening services: Tuesday, a Sunday school rally; Wednesday. Church Extension; Thursday, Missions; Friday, the Ordination Service.

28. Church Membership Classes:

Each church is requested to present annually a series of studies in church membership to be known as "Preparation for Church Membership." All prospective new members are to be requested to attend these classes. Classes are to be open also to persons interested in learning more concerning membership.

29. Houghton Academy Sunday:

The Conference shall promote the offering for Houghton academy on Academy Sunday, the second Sunday in September. This shall be in addition to raising the educational budget in full. (Note: Houghton Academy receives 20 per cent of the total educational budget.)

30. Financial Appeals by Non-Wesleyan Charities:

Outside speakers who are not Wesleyans, other than the usual guests such as Gideons, Amercian Bible Society representatives, etc., and financial appeals other than the regular approved appeals, including personal appeals, shall require the approval of the conference President and his Advisory Board.

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE PRESIDENT

To the members of the Rochester Conference assembled on the Campgrounds at Chambers for the 117 th Annual Session:

Greetings in the name of our Lord and Saviour! Through the good providence of God we are again privileged to gather for another Annual Session of the Rochester Conference and how we should thank God for this privilege. It has been stated many times by leaders in various walks of life that we are indeed living in a complex age — an age fraught by confusion and frustration, perplexing problems, mounting pressures, with the international situation apparently worsening in

spite of the efforts of diplomats moving from area to area throughout the world in an effort to bring about a better understanding. However, how thankful we should be that differences between nations are still being negotiated around the peace table rather than being settled by gigantic military forces on the field of battle. While confronted with the alarming international situation we are also compelled to acknowledge the unreasonable emphasis being placed on the materialistic phase of life and it has been well stated that we are a people drugged by world pleasure and plenty until there is a spirit of lethargy and apathy which seems difficult to penetrate or arouse. Dr. Billy Graham's recent statement "God may be allowing us to view the conclusion of the age," or the statement by Dr. Frank Laubach, recently in Atlanta, "Christianity is practically dead in three-fourths of the world" should serve to awaken Christian forces everywhere to the great challenge. Could we, somehow, be so awakened and alerted that we could develop in our midst the crusading spirit which motivates the leaders of communism, we feel certain God would honor such an effort and that there is still time for Divine intervention to turn the tide which is now moving across the world. Let us here in this conference re-dedicate ourselves anew — both ministry and laymen — to greater efforts for the Master and His Cause; dare we ask Him to give us a crusading spirit throughout our Conference this coming year for souls and the growth of the Church. Let us be much in prayer for no longer is the phrase "The time is short" simply a phrase but a frightening reality. A wise Chinese Christian recently said, "The only solution for the world crisis is the submission of the whole world to Christ. This submission is not achieved merely by a change of sentiment but by an active and fervent membership in His Kingdom —the Church." As we come together for this Annual Session of the Rochester Conference we recognize it as a time of accounting — an accounting of the total work of the church — both Lay and Ministerial which causes us to focus our attention on the importance of the ministry of the whole church. Archibald recently stated that the work of converting the world, according to the New Testament methods, is to be done not simply by the clergy but by the whole membership. To this end let us in this Conference Session, Laymen and Ministers together, dedicate ourselves to this great and all-important task.

This has been a good year throughout the Conference and it is our opinion the reports will show marked progress. We are especially glad for encouraging reports of good and effective revivals in several of the churches for which we praise Him. Again, we note the program of church expansion continues in an effort to meet the growing needs and provide adequate facilities for all phases of church activities. It was our privilege to participate in these services of progress. There were two ground-breaking services; one at Avon for their splendid new modern church, and at Spencerport recently for their new parsonage. The opening service which filled the church to capacity at Avon was indeed a real high-light in the progress of expansion. The new church furni-

ture in the Baldwinsville church adds to the facilities as well as to the worship atmosphere of the church. The rededication service at Endicott marked the conclusion of a fine program of remodeling and redecorating which adds much to the facilities and attractiveness of the church. The splendid new parsonage at Willett gives a very fine arrangement and is a great asset. The fine new parsonage at Blachley is nearing completion. Plans are completed for and construction of the new church at Buena Vista and construction is under way, while the fine addition at Berrytown is well along and will soon be completed; plans are being arranged to complete the much needed addition on the Boylston Church while Pine Meadows is already enjoying the use of their new Sunday School rooms.

In some ways this has been a rather rugged year for you will recall that at the close of the last Annual Session of Conference there were four churches without pastors (including West Jasper where Brother Rider remained until the early part of September when he left to attend Seminary); also that soon following Conference Rev. Willard Steele resigned at Canandaigua to accept a church in another Conference; and that Rev. Bernard Gillette, Supply Pastor at Taylor, resigned in the early part of September to accept the pastorate of an independent church. We have diligently endeavored by letter, telephone and in person to work closely with the churches in an effort to provide satisfactory Supply Pastors and speakers; we have also made special effort to keep in close touch with them by way of personal visitation to business and committee meetings as well as taking several Sunday services. We express our sincere appreciation to all who have helped in supplying these churches especially would we mention Roger Rounds who served for a time as Supply Pastor at Endicott and for several months at Canandaigua; Arland Rees who has served several months in the Sunday Services at West Jasper as well as Canandaigua and other places: Dr. Frank Wright, Rev. Wallace Taylor and others; we would also like to express our thanks to Paul Lawrence who for the last several weeks before Conference did a great deal of pastorial calling in the West Jasper area. We feel it would be appropriate to express thanks to Professor and Mrs. Gary Swimley for their faithful work as members of the West Jasper Church. Brother Swimley is taking the evening service through the year.

We have endeavored to visit all the churches either on a Sunday or at a business meeting and with two exceptions this has been realized. We have participated in four funerals and arranged for official representation at another.

We are glad to report we believe our pioneer fields are progressing in a very encouraging manner; in our opinion this has been the best year in each field and the future is very promising. Let us continue to remember in earnest prayer these fields and the pastors who are laboring diligently and sacrificially to establish these new churches. The reports of progress from many of our churches which have been established for some time is a source of real encouragement. There are some areas which

are a real concern to us and we ask your earnest prayer that God will give wisdom and guidance in these places.

Recently we completed the purchase of lots at Fyler where it is anticipated a new chapel-parsonage will be constructed immediately following Conference and Camp. We have been able to secure an experienced pastor for this work in the person of Rev. Thomas Bogoshain who comes to us from the Champlain Conference. We anticipate good work in this community where, in the opinion of the Board there is real potential for a good self-supporting church. We have made a thorough study, together with the Building Committee and the pastors of Blatchley and Endicott, of available lots in the Binghamton area—located in a thousand acre plot which is rapidly being developed. There is no question about the location or the potential but only a little matter of money. We trust God will help us to work out some means by which these lots can be purchased while they are still available.

The Christian Life Book Shop, which is owned and operated by the Conference, has made real growth this past year but has also brought about some problems in the realm of personel. Rev. Foot, because of ill-health, found it necessary to leave the business the 22 nd day of December and the management of the Book Shop became our responsibility and with the help of Mrs. Rees we endeavored to serve in this capacity for approximately four months when, through definite answers to prayer we were able to secure a fine experienced Christian business man who owns his own home in Liverpool, a suburb of Syracuse. He has now taken over this responsibility and we feel he is efficient and doing very well and will make us a very good manager. We would like to take this opportunity to express our sincere thanks and appreciation to Brother and Sister Foot for their work during the time they were with us - Brother Foot is a real salesman and did much to increase our gross business and made many valuable contacts for the business. The cooperation and patronage of our pastors and churches is indeed much appreciated. We will speak more of the progress of the business at a

You will be interested to know the churches subject to conference approval are nearly all provided for this coming year with two possible exceptions. This information will be given in detail through the Pastoral Relations Report.

As we come to the close of another Conference year we would like to express our appreciation and thanks to Brother Bence, our Vice-President, for his counsel and warm cooperation in the various phases of the Conference work; to the Advisory Board, Board of Trustees and Building Committee for their counsel and fine cooperation; to the pastors and local churches who have manifested a fine spirit of team-work which has made our progress, as a Conference, possible. We would express our thanks and appreciation to Mrs. Rees who has served loyally both in the office and at the Christian Life Book Shop and has shared so faithfully in the burdens of prayer; our appreciation to our good neighbors, Brother and Sister Conley who have cooperated so loyally

as co-workers and friends. We would, above all, pause to express our thanks and deep gratitude to God for answers to prayer and for His help and guidance throughout the year. Let us go into the new year with an increased active faith in believing God for the unusual and move ahead steadily as a team with an ever increasing effort to advance the cause of the Master.

We have conducted more than 35 quarterly and special business meetings; had 57 personal and business conferences; preached more than 75 times; attended several prayer meetings; mailed out circular letters; met with several Policy Committees and several Pulpit Supply Committees in regular work and in an effort to secure pastors for the coming year wherever changes were being made and pastors to be secured, have also worked with the pastors in making arrangements for contacts with churches in relationship to calls.

Worked with Building Committee at Avon and Buena Vista in their plans for new churches and with the Building Committee at Blatchley in plans for a new parsonage.

We have called 5 meetings of the Conference Board of Trustees and

several meetings of the Conference Advisory Board and endeavored to work closely with these and other Boards and Committees of the Conference.

June 21st We met Rev. Thomas Bogoshain in Syracuse and made a trip with him through the Fyler and Manlius Center area looking forward to his coming with us to work in this area; arranged for him to meet with several of the group. Brother Bogoshain feels it is the Lord's will for him to accept this challenge and will plan to move into the area the week of July 10th. Plans are being presented to the Board of Trustees to begin immediately the construction of a chapel-parsonage as a place of worship and for the pastor and family to live.

We have endeavored to work closely with our Pioneer Churches in meetings with the churches, committee meetings and cooperation with the pastors.

- 3. That the Conference President be authorized to provide "Application Blanks" to be filled out by those who plan to take work within the bounds of the Conference. These blanks to become effective upon approval of the Advisory Board.
- 4. That the Conference adopt the following type of ballot in extending a call to the pastor. This ballot will provide an opportunity to vote for either a two or a one year call and will make unnecessary another vote should the pastor not receive a two-thirds vote on a two year call.

Since your Conference Pension Plan Treasurer is only a clearinghouse we do not have specific financial report to render.

We appreciate the patience of each of the members of the Pension Plan who sent in assessments while the writer was ill last fall and waited for their receipts longer than usual.

It is our opinion that there has been improvement in the handling of Pension Plan details at our Headquarters in Marion, Indiana and that we can look for further improvements as more efficient business methods now in progress are adopted.

In this connection the writer feels that there should be adopted by the next General Conference a method of handling assessments which would eliminate the work of the Conference Pension Plan Treasurer. We feel that this has now served its purpose in assisting the Pension Plan to become self-sufficient and that the disadvantages now outweigh the advantages in that the receipt of assessments at Headquarters is delayed, due to third party handling, and the lack of complete records by the Conference Pension Plan Treasurer makes it impossible for them to do more than give advice in the case of problems which arise.

If the Conference concurs your Pension Plan Committee would like to recommend the preparation of a memorial to the next General Conference along the lines outlined above. Meanwhile we will continue to serve you, if that is your desire, to the very best of our ability.

- 2. Pioneer presentation Sunday Rally Sunday, Sept 24

- 3. It is recommended that where advisable the monthly envelope system be used as a follow-up program.

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL SECRETARY

Your Sunday School Secretary has been in contact with the schools of the Conference this year through correspondence and the pages of "The Conference News." Met once with the Conference Sunday School board. Secured Rev. D. Kenneth Reisinger as speaker at the 1961 Conference Sunday School Rally. He will conduct a workshop and give an address of challenge.

Nineteen (19) schools showed an increase in average attendance over the previous year. Nine (9) of these were in the increase column the previous year. The total average attendance for the Conference increased over the previous year by 70. The average size school is 82, an increase of 11 in five years.

AWARDS

The three Conference Cups are awarded as follows: group 100 and up, to Rochester with 13% increase; group 60-99, to Baldwinsville with a 38% increase: group up to 59, to Millview with 44% increase.

The pastor or a key layman of these schools will each receive transportation in one car to the National Sunday School Convention, October 11-13, in Detroit, Michigan. In addition to transportation as specified, each representative of cup-winning schools will receive from the Conference fund \$10.00 toward other Convention expenses.

The 10% Ribbon of Merit is awarded to the following nine schools: Baldwinsville (38%), Boylston (14%), Horseheads (24%) Millview (44%), Odessa (26%), Onondaga (28%), Rochester (13%), Spencerport (20%), Buena Vista (14%).

THE AWARD STANDARD

The Sunday School Board recommends the following awards and standard for the coming year:

- 1. Each school in the Rochester Conference achieving a 10% gain in average attendance for the year will receive a Ribbon of Merit.
- 2. Schools competing for the Conference cups shall be divided into three groups: up through 59, 60 through 99, 100 and up. The grouping of schools will be established according to the average attendance at the end of the last conference year. A cup will be awarded to the school in each group achieving the greatest percentage gain.
- 3. The Pastor or a key-layman of each cupwinning Sunday School may travel without charge in one car at the expense of the Conference Sunday School fund to the National Sunday School Convention or a comparable one selected by the Sunday School Board. In addition, each winner who takes advantage of this will be given \$10.00 from the same

fund for other convention expenses.

- 4. The Denominational Perfect Attendance Award System is recommended to the Schools of our Conference.
- 5. Each School shall have the privilege of omitting from its record of average attendance any four (4) Sundays of the year. To be counted present, scholars must be in attendance at least half of the Sunday school session. Persons known to be in attendance at the Sunday morning service of our annual camp meeting, may be considered present at their local Sunday school for that Sunday or Sundays.

PASTORAL RELATIONS COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATIONS

That a full time president be employed by the Conference, whose duties shall be in accordance with those set forth in the Discipline paragraphs 147-150.

1. We recommend that the pioneer and newer churches shall be under the special care of the Conference President and his Advisory Board, until such time that they shall have assumed the entire respensibility for their indebtedness, and with other Pioneer churches by mutual agreement of Church and Conference President. The Conference President shall be a member ex-officio of the boards of these churches and shall be informed of the meetings of these boards with the agenda for same. He shall be sent a copy of the minutes of these meetings. The Conference President shall visit these churches as often as necessary to counsel and encourage the pastor and people.

- 2. He shall be required to study and survey possible fields for new work and report annually to the Board of Church Extension and Evangelism. This board shall have the power to authorize further investigation and institute a definite plan of action.
- 3. The Conference President shall superintend the more established churches and shall endeavor to visit them once a year, preferably at a Sunday service. Each pastor shall adjust to the convenience of the President of the Conference so that his visit may be made with the minimum of time and travel.
- 4. He shall present the needs of the conference and church pioneer work on every proper occasion.
- 5. He shall enforce the provision of the Discipline, and uphold the standards of the church as need may require.
- 6. He shall seek to co-ordinate the evangelizing efforts of the various churches of the conference by suggesting to pastors a suited arrangement of meetings, and by counseling with reference to evangelists.
- 7. His Conference evangelistic dates shall be established by the President and his Advisory Board.
- 8. The Conference President is to be permitted to take two meetings per year outside the bounds of the conference.
 - 9. He shall be a member ex-officio of the Finance Committee.

WE FURTHER RECOMMEND

- 1. That the following appropriations be made: Mrs. A. J. Shea from the Conference Fund, \$100.00. Mrs. Exa Rathbun from the Conference Fund, \$50.00.
- 2. That an appropriation be made for the Onondaga Reservation to the amount of \$500.00, to be taken from the Conference Fund.

REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE

We recommend that the Woman's Missionary Society and the Wesleyan Youth be asked to pay for the printing of the number of pages in their portion of the Conference Minutes.

We recommend that where the pastor is a member of the Social Security Plan that the church give the pastor a bonus sufficient to cover his social security payment.

We recommend that for the conference year 1961-1962 the expenditures for the Conference Administrative work be approximately \$5500 as follows:

- A. The salary of the President shall be at rate of \$75.00 per week.
- B. The Conference President shall be allowed expense at the rate of seven cents per mile and miscellaneous expenses.
- C. The Conference President is to assume the expenses of the parsonage utilities.
- D. We recommend the Conference Treasurer be authorized to give the Conference President a bonus sufficient to cover his social security assessment plus the fifteen dollar minimum for Mutual Aid.
- E. That the Conference President receive \$300 for secretarial work. In order to finance the above program we recommend that the following be adopted:
- 1. The Conference Budget shall be \$7.60 per member of which 25 cents will go for Chambers Camp expenses and 50 cents for Mutual Aid.
- 2. When the Conference President shall hold revival meetings within the bounds of the Conference \$50 per week shall apply on budget. Any balance above this amount shall be a love offering to the President.
- 3. We recommend that the Conference President receive 1 month vacation due to his unusual labors during the past year in the Conference Book Store.

The Budget Apportionment is assigned on a per capita basis and is divided at the rate of \$19.20 per full member of the church, and is divided as follows:

General Conference Claims \$11.60 (World Missions \$2.00, Australia \$.25. Brainerd School \$.25. Church extension and evagelism \$1.50, Pension Plan \$2.00. Church Administrative fund \$1.00. General Conference expense \$.50, Board Meeting Expense \$.25, Orphanage \$.35 Education \$3.50);

Rochester Conference Claims \$7.60 (Conference Sunday School \$.05 based on total number in main school).

General Sunday School \$.20 based on total number in main school.

STANDING RULES

- 1. Our first session of Conference shall convene at 9:30 Wednesday morning, the last Wednesday of June, except that quadrennially it shall convene the second Wednesday after General Conference convenes. The forenoon session shall be 9:30 to 11:30 A. M. Afternoon session 1:30 to 4:00 P. M.
 - 2. The first five seats shall comprise the bar of Conference.
 - 3, The Conference Officials shall receive the following salaries: President — \$15.00

Vice President — \$5.00

Secretary — \$10.00

Treasurer — \$35.00

Y.M.W.B. Superintendent — \$15.00

They shall receive their board and room during Conference.

- 4. Members of the Executive Committee shall receive traveling expenses equal to that voted by the Conference for Conference Officials.
- 5. There shall be elected a Conference Statistician whose term of office shall not expire until the close of the Conference session following

her election. She shall be the chairman of the Statistical Committee and shall be authorized to choose the members of said committee. She shall be seated within the bar of Conference and shall be given board and room during Conference. The local treasurers shall send both of their statistical reports to the Conference treasurer by June 5th. The local Y.M.W.B. Superintendents shall send their reports to the Conference Y. M. W. B. Superintendents by June 5th.

- 6. Each local society of the Conference shall close its financial and other records for the year, May 31st.
- 7. To receive credit all cash and vouchers must be sent to the Conference Treasurer and Y. M. W. B. Superintendent by June 5th. Any money sent after that date shall be applied on the next year.
- 8. It shall be the duty of the local president to forward to the Conference Secretary, who is a Committee on Credentials, not later than one week before the Annual Conference convenes the Credentials of the delegate from her society.
- 9. The matron of the Dormitories shall be elected by the Executive Committee. Her salary shall be \$35.00 per year. Her board and room is to be paid during Conference and Camp. She may choose her own assistant whom the Conference will pay \$5.00.
- 10. The Y. M. W. B. Superintendent and the Conference Treasurer shall have their books audited by a competent bookkeeper before coming to Conference and the auditor send the report to the President.

- 13. All missionaries, General Officers, former Conference Officers, and local Y. M. W. B. Superintendents shall be seated within the Bar of Conference and given the right to speak.
- 14. The Conference shall elect 3 members for a committee on committees which shall meet before conference to nominate committees for the organization of conference. The President and Secretary shall be members Ex-officio.
- 15. The Executive Committee shall act as Orders of The Day Committee. The Secretary shall act as Committee on Credentials.
- 16. The offerings taken at Spring Conventions and Conference Public Meeting shall be divided as follows: one-third World Missions, one-third Conference Pioneer, and one-third approved project.

STANDARD OF EFFICIENCY 1960 - 1961

We recommend:

1. That the Efficiency Standard be read in the society the first

meeting after Conference (5% Credit) and that arrangements be made for one missionary prayer meeting each month. (5%)

- 2. That a minimum of ten meetings be held during the year at which time prayer requests are presented and remembered and business transacted (5%) and at least one public meeting. (5%)
- 3. That a Women's World Fellowship Secretary be appointed by the Executive Board, who shall promote the program of the General WMS (5%): that a prayer Partner Circle be formed under the direction of the WWF Secretary, and report sent to the Conference WWF Secretary within sixty days after Conference. (5%)
- 4. That a Solicitor be elected for the Wesleyan Missionary gaining not less than two subscriptions a year and that she use the Conference Church Key Combination on all Subscriptions. (5%) That the President, Secretary, Treasurer and the equivalent of 75% of the active membership be subscribers to the Wesleyan Missionary. (5%)
- 5. That a mission study secretary be elected and she report to the Conference Mission Study Secretary by January 15. (15%) That 10% of active members read at least four of the recommended books. (5%)
- 6. That a delegate be elected to the annual conference Woman's Missionary Society and that she pledge as instructed by local society regarding the amount to be pledged by that society at the annual conference session (5%) and that the Y. M. W. B. Superintendent be seated in the annual session, be granted the privilege of speaking and provision be made by her society for such representation. (5%)
- 7. That the \$1.00 membership dues be sent to the Conference Treasurer and be forwarded to the General Conference Treasurer for the General Fund.
- 8. That we secure every woman in the church as a member of the society, or achieve a ten per cent gain in total membership.
- 9. That each local society pay annually into the Conference Working Fund the amount assessed by the Conference Executive Board.
- 10. That the newly elected local President or Vice President attend the Conference session and provision be made by her society for such representation. (Ten per cent credit for each of the above items, except those specified, and all societies making a grade of eighty per cent shall be placed on the Honor Roll.

Y. M. W. B. EFFICIENCY STANDARD

- 1. Twelve band services in which prayer, God's Word and personal services were stressed. (10%)
 - *2. One public service during the year. (5%)
 - 3. Band funds remitted quarterly Sept. 5 Dec. 5, Mar. 5, June 5, (10%)
- 4. Use of mite boxes, envelopes, membership cards, or some other systematic method for gathering in dues and offerings (10%)
 - 5. Band Superintendent be a reader of the Wesleyan Missionary (5%)

- 6. Increase in membership (10%)
- 7. Increase in funds raised (Credit 10%)
- 8. Offering for Church Extension (10%)
- 9. Offering for Education (10%)
- 10. Two cents per member sent to Conference YMWB Superintendents as desk fund (10%)
 - 11. Annual Report sent in on time June 5 (10%)
 - * This service to be in addition to the twelve meetings each year.

RULES FOR ROOMERS

- 1. Write to Dormitory Matron for room reservations.
- 2. To hold a room from year to year one dollar deposit must be made with the matron. If the roomholder does not desire to use the room for any certain year, by notifying the matron two weeks before conference, the room may still be held the following year.
 - 3. A room holder may not sublet a room.

PLAN OF WORK — 1961-1962

For each Woman's Missionary Society we recommend:

- 1. The election of consecrated officers with a vision to carry on all phases of the missionary work.
- 2. Emphasis on the field support of our conference missionaries, Rev. and Mrs. Robert Crosby through World Mission Offerings and cooperation with The World Missionary Department in support of its entire program, including "Penny a Meal".
- 3. The use of the "Guide", world maps, pictures posters and audiovisual aids from Wesley Film Service.
 - 4. That we keep monthly Fast and Prayer Day.
- 5. That at least half and preferably all the April Self-Denial be designated for Conference Pioneer.
- 6. That the White Christmas Offering be designated for the Pastor on the Onondaga Indian Reservation.
- 7. The election of a Mission Study Secretary whose duties shall be: to promote the Mission Study and Reading course; to send the annual report to the Conference Mission Study Secretary by the 15th of January: and to form a Missionary library, which shall consist of at least the books in the Reading course.
- 8. That all monies be sent through the W. M. S. Conference Treasuere: Vouchers permitted for local church work, Community Missions and other objects when necessary. All remittance must be sent by Sept. 5, Dec. 5, Mar. 5, and June 5.
- 9. The observance of Educational Harvest Day with a program and offering (budget); the promotion of Honorary Enrollment; and a contribution to Houghton Library Fund.
 - 10. Payments of \$.60 per active member constitute a W.M.S. Working

Fund from which the Treasurer may pay necessary expense (non-budget)

- 11. That \$5.00 be given for the Camp Building Fund; \$3.00 or more for Medical Fund; promotion of the Mile of Dimes to be used for Mission equipment; and The Card Call Plan. (non-budget)
- 12. An annual offering to support The American Bible Society. Send to Conference W.M.S. Treasurer.
- 13. A contribution of \$5.00 for the Hephzibah Orphanage; \$5.00 for Australia; and liberal contribution to the support of Church Extension and Evangelism. (budget)
- 14. That stress be placed on personal evangelism with special emphasis on the Jew. March designated as "Focus" month.
- 15. The choosing from this list of projects: New items will be credited according to cost; no cash value for used items. Boxes of GOOD clothing for Hephzibah, Onondaga and N.A.E. Relief, quilts for camp and needy families, cancer dressings, clothing for child at Hephzibah, canned goods at Camp—large jars of fruit —.45 per guart; jams and jellies—.40 per pint; vegetables —.35 per quart; dill pickles—.25; other pickles .45. Camp needs are: pillow cases and double sheets (colored). single 63" quilts, single blankets, army blankets, medium size plastic waste baskets, large bath towels, large dishpans, syrup pitchers, paring knives, lorl ½ qt. sauce pans, sauce dishes, heavy duty dippers, 12 sets of stainless steel or glass top salt shakers (large), chore girls, dust mops, cook's white aprons.

Africa and Haiti can use baby layettes (essential parts) receiving blankets, bright dress material, embroidery work, S. S. charts, cards, flannelgraph and S. S. papers; crutches, eye glasses and frames, dentures, and medicine bottles.

16. That each society inaugurate a program of community service, under the supervision of the Work Director and two other people in counsel with the president. (Needs arising from unemployment, illness, or emergencies.)

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE W.M.S. PRESIDENT

Greetings to the members of the Rochester Annual Conference and to the members of the Woman's Missionary Society. The Scripture reminds us that"...there is a time to every purpose under the heaven.." Ecc. 3:1. And the we 'are to redeem the time" TIME, yes it is time for us to meet for business of our Annual Conference. It is time to take inventory of the year's work. It is time to cast aside the faults and failures of the past and to look toward the future with prayerful planning. Time for us is our earthly life. From September 11 — October 14, Dr. Prinsell, missionary to Africa, and Miss Carter, missionary to Jamacia, did deputational work throughout our conference. Several Missionary Conventions were held at this time also.

The new church in Endicott reorganized their Missionary Society into a Wesleyan Woman's Society in December. They have 12 active members, 6 subscriptions to the Wesleyan Missionary, and have raised \$76.00 for missions during the half year. This is a wonderful beginning. We welcome them to our Conference Family.

Gains were made by the following societies: in funds — Avon, Westfield, Chambers, Canandaigua, Haskinsville, Morris, Berrytown, Millview, Wellsboro, Rome and Corning. In Membership — Avon, Berrytown, Millview, Buena Vista, and Corning. In Magazine Subscriptions — Avon Canisteo, Baldwinsville, Millview, and Wellsboro. No doubt others had gains, but they were not reported.

In December, we sponsored the "White Gift" for the Turvereys at the Reservation. A total of \$978.21 was raised. \$111.59 was also raised for the project of the General W. M. S. Haiti.

In April, we received \$1,130.40 for Conference Pioneer through the "Self Denial" offering. \$91.05 was also received for the General W.M.S. project. The field support of both Robert and Norva Crosby has been paid from the funds sent in for General World Missions.

The Spring Conventions were held at Spencerport, Shady Grove, Baldwinsville, and Sandy Creek. These were all well attended. The total offering was \$26.89. We wish to thank the District Chairman and all others that helped. The theme followed in each convention was "I Must Work While It Is Day". We appreciate the Heart-burdening messages of both Miss Sheridan and John Edling.

Our speakers for Conference Missionary Night are Rev. Sedu Mans, pastor of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, Sierra Leone, West Africa; and Rev. Price Stark, former missionary to that field.

The total giving for the year is 19,838.19. Total Membership 894 and the number of magazines is 663.

I have counted it all joy to have served the Lord as your Conference Women's Missionary President for another year. May I express my heartfelt thanks to Mrs. Nora Woodhead, Vice President, for taking over for me during the winter months while I was undergoing and recovering from major surgery. Today I can say that 'the Lord is MY strength and My salvation." My earnest prayer is "Lord, help me not to waste this day, lest it should be my last."
