Journal of Daily Proceedings.

The fifty-second (52nd) annual session of the Kansas Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church assembled in the Auditorium at Miltonvale, Kansas, Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock, August 15, 1922. President A. B. Hotchkiss presiding.

After singing "He Will Make the Darkness Light Before Thee," Brother F. C. Hill offered prayer. Brother Hotchkiss commented upon 1 Peter 3:8. He emphasized the importance of brotherly love and unity and offered fervent prayer.

The roll call was answered by 14 elders and 3 licentiates.

Brother Carry was elected a Committee on Credentials.

On motion Brother Wm. A. Smith was elected as his assistant.

By vote of the Conference, the first three rows of seats were made to constitute the Conference bar.

Moved and supported that we have a Nominating Committee to nominate the various Committees of the Conference.

By vote of the Conference the Nominating Committee was elected as follows: S. F. Wilson, F. C. Hill, J. A. Stansbury.

Conference voted to meet at 8:30 A. M. and adjourn on motion and to convene at 1:30 P. M. and adjourn on motion.

On motion adjourned. Benediction by Brother Presnall.

Tuesday Afternoon.

Devotion led by Rev. P. A. Miller, who read the forty-sixth Psalm. Prayer was offered by Rev. W. C. Elliott.

Roll call and reading and approval of the minutes.

Committee on Credentials rendered a partial report. They reported Sister Mary Brenner of Chapman Creek, and Albert Johnson of Hall elected as Delegates to the Conference. Report accepted and Delegates seated.

Committee on Credentials read a recommendation from the Chapman Creek class. They recommended that Sister Vera Macy be ordained as an Elder of the Church.

On motion the recommendation was referred to the Committee on Itineracy and Orders.

Committee on Orders of the Day rendered a partial report.

They recommended that we give the hour of 3 P. M. Tuesday afternoon to Educational interests. Wednesday 11 A. M. to be given

to Brother Butterfield, our Connectional representative. Wednesday ? P. M. to be given to the election of permanent officers.

Committee on Religious Services rendered a partial report. They stated that Brother F. A. Butterfield will preach Tuesday evening; preaching Wednesday evening by Earl J. Carry; Thursday afternoon, preaching by Rev. E. A. Coates.

Examination of character was taken up. The following pastors were called: E. A. Coates, I. L. DeWitt, Elbert Travis, and Earl J. Carry. Being told that there was nothing against their characters, they each gave a report of their work for the past year and stated their present Christian experience.

Committee on Credentials reported the name of John Poots, Alternate Delegate from the Miltonvale charge.

The report was accepted and the Delegate seated.

Rev. Varney Martin, of the U. B. Church, was introduced to the Conference. On approved motion Brother Martin was given an honorary seat in the Conference.

Orders of the Day. Hour given to Educational interests.

Examination of character resumed. Rev. S. F. Wilson, Conference Evangelist, read a report of his work for the year. He had held all of his quarterly meetings but one. Received \$583.33 in offerings. He also received \$115.90 from the Conference Treasurer to cover his traveling expenses.

On motion adjourned. Benediction by Brother Carkuff.

Wednesday Morning.

Devotions were led by Rev. J. F. Presnall, who read Deut. 8. The Lord especially poured out His Spirit upon us at this time while Brother Presnall exhorted the Conference to take their liberty and be free.

Roll call and reading and approval of the minutes.

On motion the report was adopted and the Delegates seated.

Miller, C. E. Huscher, F. C. Hill, L. S. Currie, E. H. Cook, E. H. Dunbar, F. E. Shivers, Sister Golden Young.

The Conference voted their unanimous appreciation of the work

done by Brother Huscher during the past year as pastor at Kansas City.

The President, Rev. A. B. Hotchkiss, read his annual report.

On motion the report was adopted, the financial part of the report being referred to the Auditting Committee. See report.

Orders of the Day. Hour given to our Connectional representtative, Rev. F. A. Butterfield.

On motion adjourned. Benediction by Rev. J. A. Stansbury.

Wednesday Afternoon.

Devotions were led by Rev. W. L. Carkuff, who read a portion of Hebrews 11 and led in prayer.

Committee on Credentials reported the name of P. M. Martin, of the Gaylord charge, and George Hudson, of Kansas City, duly elected to the Conference. The report was adopted and the Delegates seated.

Committee on Itineracy and Orders rendered a partial report recommending that Vera G. Macy be ordained to Elder's Orders. Report adopted.

Rev. A. J. Heisel, formerly of the Wisconsin Conference, was introduced to the Conference.

Examination of character resumed. Brother H. W. McDowell gave a report of his work for the past year.

Orders of the Day called for. Election of permanent officers.

Ballot for President. No election on the first four ballots. On
the fifth ballot Brother P. A. Miller having received a majority
of all the votes cast was declared elected.

Ballot for Vice-President. Brother F. C. Hill was elected Vice-President on the first ballot.

Ballot for Secretary. Brother E. H. Cook was elected on the first ballot.

Motion made and supported that the Secretary cast the ballot of the Conference for F. E. Shivers as Assistant Secretary.

Ballot for Treasurer. Brother C. F. Pomeroy was elected Treasurer on the first ballot.

On approved motion the Secretary cast the ballot of the Conference for Wm. A. Smith as Assistant Treasurer.

Motion made and supported that the President travel the Conference and hold the regular quarterly meetings.

Motion prevailed to have only one Quarterly Conference Evangelist, and that the President employ, if need require, some one to assist him in holding certain quarterly meetings. Ballot for Conference Trustees. One ministerial member to be elected for a term of three years.

No election on the first and second ballot. Brother F. E. Shivers elected on the third ballot as ministerial member on the Board of Trustees for a period of three years.

Ballot for lay member on Board of Trustees for a period of two years. Brother Henry B. Parsons elected on the first ballot.

By vote of the Conference Brother Fred Drake was elected to succeed himself on the Committee of Itineracy and Orders for a period of four years.

Ballot for second Ministerial Delegate. Brother P. A. Miller was elected on the second ballot.

Ballot for Lay Delegates to the General Conference. Brother C. H. Sheldon was elected on the third ballot.

Brother Miller, the newly elected President, made a few appropriate remarks to the Conference.

Motion prevailed to elect a Committee to memorialize the General Conference on such questions as we may see fit to present.

Committee elected as follows: J. A. Stansbury, A. B. Hotch-kiss, F. C. Hill.

On motion adjourned. Benediction by Brother Heisel.

Thursday Morning.

Devotions were led by Wm. McConn, who read for Scripture lesson Isaiah 55 and led in prayer.

Roll call and reading and approval of the minutes.

Rev. F. E. Shivers, Chairman of District No. 3, gave a report of Holiness Conventions held on his district. On motion the report was adopted. See report.

Committee on Sunday Schools reported. On motion the report was adopted. See report.

On approved motion Brother Albert Johnson was elected as a member of the Committee on Apportionment to fill the place made vacant by Sister Largent's absence.

Rev. E. A. Coates, Chairman of Holiness Conventions on District No. 2, gave a verbal report. He reported only one Convention held during the year. Report adopted.

Brother E. J. Carry reported for District No. 4. They were disappointed in being unable to arrange for any conventions during the year.

Brother Presnall gives a report for District No. 1. He reports two good Conventions held during the year. Report adopted.

The Conference voted to continue to have Holiness Conventions

during the coming Conference year.

Moved and supported that the matter of Holiness Conventions and Camp Meetings be under the direction of the Conference Missionary Board.

Motion made and sustained that Brother Miller appoint a Committee to draft resolutions giving instructions to the Missionary Loard with reference to holding Holiness Conventions and Camp Meetings in the Conference.

Brother Hill appointed Brother Heisel, Brother DeWitt, Brother

Coates and Brother Hill to fill the Committee.

Bishop Kephart, of the U. B. Church, through Brother McConn, sent his Christian greetings to the Conference.

The Conference voted to return our greetings to Bishop Kephart through Brother McConn.

Unfinished business was taken up.

Ballot for another Lay Delegate to the General Conference. Sister Raymond E. Young was elected on the second ballot.

Ballot for Alternate Ministerial Delegate to the General Conference for Brother F. C. Hill. Rev. E. A. Coates was elected on the second ballot.

Ballot for Alternate Ministerial Delegate for Brother Miller. Brother E. H. Cook was elected on the first ballot.

Ballot for Alternate Lay Delegate for Brother Sheldon. Brother Albert Johnson was elected Alternate Lay Delegate to the General Conference for Brother Sheldon.

Ballot for Alternate Lay Delegate for Sister Young. Sister Γ . C. Hill was elected on the first ballot Alternate Lay Delegate to the General Conference for Sister Young.

Motion was made and supported that the matter of uniting the Oklahoma and Kansas Conferences be referred to the Committee that was elected to memorialize the General Conference.

On motion adjourned. Benediction by Brother McConn.

Thursday Afternoon.

Devotions were led by Brother Heisel, who read Psalm 103 and offered prayer.

Roll call and reading and approval of the Minutes.

The Secretary read greetings from Brother H. H. Williams. Brother Williams also gave an account of his work as Evangelist during the past year. He had held in all fifteen meetings and received in total offerings \$1,035.20. His total expenses were \$135.20. Net income, \$900.00.

The Secretary read a letter to the Conference from Brother and Sister Thomas.

The Conference voted to instruct the Secretary to write Brother Williams and Brother and Sister Thomas a letter of greeting.

The Conference learning of the serious illness of our dear Brother Ford was called to earnest prayer in his behalf, and a motion prevailed to send him a letter of Christian greeting and sympathy.

Brother L. S. Cooper kindly requested that he be placed on the Superannuated list.

The Conference voted to grant Brother Cooper's request and placed him on the Superannuated list.

The Committee on Moral Reform reported.

Motion made to adopt the report and that the same be published in the Wesleyan Methodist and all other publications possible. See report.

On approved motion the President was empowered to appoint the Chairman of the following Committees: Sabbath School, Periodicals, and Moral Reform.

The Chair appointed A. J. Heisel Chairman of Periodicals,

Earl J. Carry Chairman of Moral Reform, and Wm. A. Smith Chairman of Sabbath Schools.

Examination of character resumed. The following pastors gave a report of their work and related their Christian experiences: Alfred Drake, T. F. Child, W. L. Carkuff.

Committee on Orders of the Day rendered a partial report. Friday, 2:30 to 3 P. M., to be given to Brother Will McConn; Friday, 3 P. M., Memorial Services; Friday, 8 P. M., to be given to the W. H. & F. M. Society.

The report was adopted.

On approved motion Brother Cook was made Conference Sunday School Secretary.

The Conference elected Brother E. H. Dunbar as Conference Tithing Secretary.

Rev. P. A. Miller rendered a verbal report as Conference Tithing Secretary. He referred to the blessings that follow those who faithfully tithe their income. Report adopted.

Orders of the Day. Preaching by Rev. E. A. Coates.

Motion was made and supported that we have a Ministerial Association in connection with the Institute.

On approved motion Brother L. S. Cooper was elected as Chairman of the Ministerial Association.

The Conference voted to have children's meeting each day, and that arrangements for the same be left with the Committee on Religious services.

Motion made and supported that we begin our Conference session next year Tuesday, August 14, 1923, and close Sunday, August 19, 1923, and that we begin our Conference Camp Meeting, Sunday, August 19th, and close on Sunday August 26, 1923.

Motion prevailed to give the W. H. & F. M. Society, for their Missionary service, an earlier day in the Conference than formerly, or give them an afternoon service, in order that the revival services of the Conference may not be interrupted.

The Secretary read a letter to the Conference from Rev. G. L. Gurtler.

By vote of the Conference the Secretary was instructed to write a letter of greeting to Brother Gurtler.

On motion adjourned. Benediction by W. C. Elliott.

Friday Morning.

Devotions led by Brother William Smith, who read 1 Peter 1, and Brother L. S. Cooper offered prayer.

Committee on Credentials reported Mrs. Julia Adams, of Easton, and Chris. Lister, of the Keene charge, as Delegates elected to the Annual Conference.

Report adopted and delegates seated.

Committee on Credentials read a recommendation from the Keene charge. They recommend that Chris. Lister take the course of study preparatory to taking work in the Conference.

Report referred to the Committee on Itineracy and Orders.

On approved motion the resolution with reference to the car fare of the pastors of the Conference being pooled was referred to the Finance Committee.

Committee on apportionment rendered their report. On motion the report was adopted. See report.

Committee on Periodicals reported. Report adopted. See report.

Motion made and supported that we drop from our Minutes the
Resolution concerning the Tidings of Joy Mission, since we have no
Mission at Kansas City at the present time.

First reading of the report on Pastoral Relations was made.

Motion made and sustained that the Missionary Board be empowered to appoint the Chairmen for Holiness Conventions on the various districts.

Conference Treasurer read his annual report to the Conference.

On motion the report was referred to the Auditing Committee.

See report.

Rev. Tunneel, District Superintendent of the Nazarene Church, and Rev. Mastin, of the Evangelical Church, were introduced to the Conference.

On approved motion the brethren were invited to honorary seats within the bar of the Conference.

COMMITTEE TO MEMORIALIZE THE GENERAL CONFERENCE.

I.

Whereas, the forces of evil are making a systematic attempt to break down the old moral standards which have been our national guide for so many years, and,

Whereas, the majority of religious organizations have permanent bodies authorized to speak upon all moral questions, and to co-operate with similar bodies in other denominations,

Therefore, be it resolved, That we memorialize the General Conference to be assembled at Fairmount, Ind., in June, 1923, to establish a permanent Commission on Temperance and Public morals, which shall be empowered to speak for the Wesleyan Methodist Connection on all questions of public morals, and whose duty it shall be to keep the Church informed of the progress being made in all lines of moral reform.

II.

Inasmuch as the Tobacco Trust is putting forth every effort to corrupt our nation, politically, morally and socially, and,

Inasmuch as the use of tobacco is a very great evil, harmful to the user, detrimental to the one forced to be associated with such a user, and an evil factor in the determining forces for future moral integrity,

Therefore, be it resolved, That we do memorialize the General Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Connection of America, that they do insert in the Wesleyan Methodist Discipline a clause making the use of tobacco a test of membership in the Wesleyan Methodist Church.

III.

Whereas, Miley's Theology is not orthodox on the doctrine of Holiness, and inasmuch as we consider this one of the fundamental doctrines of the Bible.

Therefore, be it resolved, That we memorialize the General Conference to remove Miley's Theology from the theological course of study, and that some other text book which is in harmony with Weslevan Methodism be substituted.

COMMITTEE ON BOOKS AND PERIODICALS.

While the Gospel is the power of God unto salvation, there are at least three ways by which the Gospel of Christ is brought to a lost world.

In the first place, it is proclaimed with a tongue of fire. Conviction comes by hearing the gospel preached in the Spirit. "Faith comes by hearing and hearing by the word of God."

But Peter mentions another way that men are to be won without hearing the word. In case a woman has a husband who does not attend churh, and hear the gospel, he is to be won without the word, through the gospel being lived and manifested in the life of his wife. Paul says, "By manifestation of the truth commending ourselves to every man's conscience in the sight of God." That is, our lives can

be such a manifestation of the gospel, such a manifestation of love, and peace and joy and holiness, that it will appeal to every man's conscience. Men who do not go to church and hear the gospel of holiness and love, may see a manifestation of it in the lives of God's people, and this is powerfully convicting.

The third way by which the gospel is to become a power of God unto salvation is through the written page. Thousands have been won by messages written by godly men and women. How deeply we are indebted to Paul for his inspired messages. What eternal good has come from Bunyan's Pilgrim's Progress.

This is an age of multiplied publications, both secular and religious. Nations are cursed with impure, unreliable and trashy literature. Children will read, and when a child becomes accustomed to reading literature in the form of a novel, his mind becomes poisoned, and the desire for the best reading is gone.

So it greatly behooves us as parents, pastors, and the church to keep before our children and young people such literature as will be uplifting to soul and mind.

We recommend the foremost place be given to a prayerful and habitual reading of the Bible. We most highly commend the habitual reading of our own publications, The Wesleyan Methodist, and Wesleyan Missionary.

It is our conviction that a Wesleyan Sunday School should use Wesleyan literature regardless of a possible variation in the cost, from that which is primarily "made to sell."

MORAL REFORM.

Therefore, the Church must sound a positive note on the questions of public morals. The greatest problem is the disposition of certain individuals to debauch their fellow men for financial gain. This is most clearly seen in the work of the organized liquor traffic, as it has sought to dominate the life of America for the last hundred years; the commercialization of the Sabbath for sport and business; the formation of the American Tobacco Trust, and its organized attempt to fasten the cigarette habit on the youth of the nation, and the disposition of the moving picture industry to burlesque and cheapen the sacred things of life and to defy every law passed for the regulation of their production.

We recommend that the Kansas Conference affirm its unaltered opposition to the attempt now being made for the election of a "beer and wine" congress, and urge the support of only Congressional candidates as pledge their support of the Volstead law; that we believe

the development of stalwart moral and Christian character cannot be furthered by attendance at the dance, the "sex appeal movie," or any other form of entertainment whose inbuence on public morals can in any way be questioned.

We regret the seeming nation-wide tendency toward jazz music, that has crept even into the holiness movement, and we recommend that our people discontinue the use of all religious music which calls to memory the jazz band, and the medicine show.

We know of no standard of morals equal to that delivered from Mt. Sinai, and it is our belief that the adoption of a world code of morals, based upon the teachings of Jesus Christ, will solve every world problem which confronts the race today.

No. 5.—Resolved, That all subscription lists and money raised at Conference for all purposes be put through the hands of the Conference Treasurer or the Treasurer of the Woman's Home and Foreign Missionary Society, and that all subscription lists be kept by these Treasurers and that notice of indebtedness be given all subcribers by means of a list sent to their pastors early in the year.

No. 6.—Sancity of God's House. Resolved, That such work as making quilts and disposing of the same be performed in the homes of the people and not in the houses erected for public worship.

No. 7.—Soliciting Votes. Resolved, That any person soliciting votes for any office shall be deemed unqualified for said office.

No. 8.—Pastor's Moving Expenses. Be it resolved by this Conference, That the class hiring a minister shall within ten days after his arrival pay to him his moving expenses. This not to be applied on his salary.

No. 9.—Support of Conference Evangelist. Resolved, That in case the Conference Evangelist arrives on any circuit to hold the Quarterly Meeting, and services cannot be held on account of storm or other cause, provisions shall be made by the Church to recompense the Conference Evangelist.

No. 10.—Statistical Report. Resolved, That the Conference require each Pastor and Evangelist to submit their statistical report upon the first roll call at the opening of the Conference session. If it is not possible for him to be present at the opening session of the Conference, he shall mail his report to the Conference Secretary so that it may be submitted at that time.
