OBITUARY OF EBER TETER.

Eber, son of Eber and Margaret Teter, was born near Boxley, Hamilton County, Indiana, January 28, 1846, and went home to be with his Lord June 29, 1928, reaching the ripe old age of 82 years, 5 months and 1 day.

His grandparents were God-fearing men and women. These grand-fathers fought in the Revolutionary war for national freedom. His parents were godly, thrifty pioneers. They championed the cause of the slave and their pious home was one of a chain of "under ground rail road stations," that assisted these oppressed ones to the land of freedom. Their voices were raised against this monsterous crime of the nation, and when not allowed to thus express their convictions, they became a part of a group that formed the Wesleyan Methodist Church in this country.

Amid these stirring pioneer scenes, and in this godly home, the subject of this sketch was born. He learned the lessons of thrift and toil. He developed a great capacity for work that characterized his life to the end.

In the early years of life he gave his heart to God, and was truly born again. In later years, under the ministry and teaching of Elders Hiram Ackers and W. H. Kennedy, he was led into the grace and experience of entire sanctification. Ever after this his pen and voice were used in proclaiming the glad tidings of this wonderful heart relations of life, purity and power, received by faith through the atoning death of Jesus Christ.

He united in the early years of life with the Wesleyan Methodist Church, and gave his strong eventful life to God's cause through the church of his love and choice. He loved her as dearly as his own life. No task was too hard, or burden too heavy, or sacrifice too great for him to make in order that God's cause through her might be carried on. He heard God's call to preach and responded "yes" to his Saviour's voice. The Church recognized the divine call, and conferred upon him her authority to follow this sacred calling. In preparation for this new work he attended Wheaton College at Wheaton, Ill., and Adrian College at Adrian, Mich. He entered the ministry when about 21 years of age. He followed his chosen calling, with the exception of a few years of business life. He afterward keenly felt this breach that he had allowed to come into his life's work, and made his humble con-

fession to God, who freely forgave it. After reentering the ministry, faithfulness to this call characterized his life to the end.

He was the theologian of the church. Birth, early environment, the new birth, his experience of entire sanctification, his special training, his keen mind and large heart, all contributed to make him what he was, as a minister of Jesus Christ.

He served a number of churches as pastor. He was called to the Presidency of the Indiana Annual Conference, and traveled that work for years. Under his faithful administration her borders were enlarged, and revivals inaugurated. Many young men and women received their training for the ministry under his faithful preaching and teaching. The membership of the churches was increased under his leadership.

The Church at large recognized his devotion and executive ability and chose him to be President of the General Conference. He continued in this office, with marked ability, as long as strength of body would permit. At the last General Conference, he was elected President Emeritus, in recognition of his faithful service.

Perhaps his greatest service to the church was as Missionary Secretary. Under his administration the work at home and abroad grew and prospered. Conferences were added to the body, new fields were opened in foreign lands. Everywhere in this work the touch of his hand and the wisdom of his judgment and his fatherly love was felt and appreciated. He loved our church schools and gave his best for their success. Central School at Central, S. C., was largely his child, and his wise administration led that institution to be a dominating factor in our Southern work. Many a boy and girl will rise up and call his name blessed because of his fatherly love and care.

When a young man he enlisted in the Federal Army. He did his part and best to preserve the Union. He was always glad that he took part in this heroic struggle for freedom. After peace was declared he was among the first to go in person and preach the gospel of good will and peace to his former foes.

He was married twice. His first wife was Sue Hetherington, and the children of this union were Jennie and Maggie. His second wife was Elizabeth Howard. The children of this union were John, Auvie, Mattie, George and Grace. Of these Jennie, the oldest, and Grace, the youngest, preceded their father to the heavenly home. His was a consecrated, self-sacrificing life. This will be remembered by his wife, children and many grandchildren who survive him. To them, though asleep in death, he still lives. To them he has bequeathed the legacy of a good name, and a holy devotion to his Lord, and a victorious Christian life.

After increasing physical weakness and bodily ailments it was thought best to have him go to the hospital for treatment and care to relieve his suffering. A few hours after a minor operation he went home to be with his Lord.

The end was blessed and victorious. To one who was associated with him for years in church, conference and Connectional work, he told out his faith and love for Jesus Christ the day before his home going to Glory. A fellow sufferer in the hospital told how our brother had faithfully preached the gospel to them the evening before. To the one in sweet fellowship with him he further said, "The scriptures that are supporting me now are the 23rd Psalm, the 14th of John and 2 Cor. 5:17-21." As he quoted these scriptures, his face was aglow with indwelling deity. Then he quoted that grand hymn of the church, "How firm a foundation, ye saints of the Lord, is laid for your faith in His excellent word." The meeting, the greeting and fellowship with this former co-worker will be one of sweetest memories of his life. The sainted, victorious "good by" will be for but a little while, then fellowship will be renewed again in Glory.

The funeral service was held in the Christian Church. The sermon was preached by Elder T. P. Baker. Text, Phil. 1:21. A glowing description of Brother Teter's life and faithfulness was made by Rev. J. S. Willett, of Syracuse, N. Y., the Connectional Agent of the Church. Elders Francis Eddy and W. L. Thompson also assisted in the service. Between forty and fifty preachers were present to honor his memory. His body was laid carefully away until the commanding "come" of our descending Lord shall awaken the sleeping dust of every saint of God, and they shall come forth, clothed with immortality and incorruption.

The Conference Treasurer then gave his report. The report was adopted upon motion. See Report No. 11.

Upon motion the Assistant to the Treasurer is to receive \$10.00 for her work.

A motion prevailed that all loans made by the Conference Board of Trustees or the Treasurer from the Conference funds, shall secure bankable notes or security.

Upon motion the expense incurred in caring for the funds of the Insurance Board by its Secretary-Treasurer shall be supplied from the Conference funds.

A motion prevailed that J. E. Smiley be elected Conference Treasurer.

Upon motion the Camp Meeting Board was requested to retain Sister VanBlaricom as Superintendent of the Grounds.

Moved and supported that the next session of Conference convene at Fairmount, Ind., Tuesday, 8:30 A. M., August 13, 1929.

The Sunday School Secretary then read the plan for work of the Board during the year, and also nominations of District Superintendents. Upon motion the report was adopted. See Report No. 12.

A motion prevailed that the members of the Board receive remuneration for their labor, and that \$50.00 be the amount the Sunday School Secretary shall receive, and also his expenses.

A motion was passed that the President be permitted to answer the call to hold the Alabama Conference Camp Meeting during the month of July, if he so chooses, provided he shall satisfactorily provide for his work in the Conference.

Rev. Robb French, of the Alabama Conference, our Camp Meeting Evangelist, was introduced to the Conference.

A motion to adjourn was made and seconded. The minutes were read and approved. The Conference then adjourned. Benediction by the President.

RESOLUTIONS AND LAWS OF INDIANA CONFERENCE.

- 1. It is contrary to the spirit of the Discipline and our principles for our preachers to assist in any service with oath-bound societies.
- 2. That any candidate for Elder's Orders or traveling under the direction of the Conference, who fails to attend the Institutes and the examinations of the Committee, without sufficient cause, shall be deemed unworthy of the trust and care of souls, and refused a place among us as a minister of the Gospel, and when they shall fail to attend the Institute for two successive years they shall be dropped from the roll.
- 3. That it is the sense of this Conference that our houses of worship should not be open to any evangelist or minister of any other church to hold a series of meetings or to maintain a regular appointment for another congregation; provided, however, that usual denominational courtesies be extended to other ministers in occasional appointments.
- 4. Any waiving of the above resolution by a contract or lease of building must be obtained through the Board of Trustees of the Indiana Conference.
- 5. Whereas, The Discipline requires that the Stewards must meet the Pastors and agree with them as to the amount necessary for their support, be it resolved: That the circuits may at the same time enter into an agreement in writing with the Pastor as to the service he is to render to the church. In case the Pastor shall fail to render such services, unless providentially hindered or released by the circuit, said failure shall be considered a sufficient cause to make an adjustment of the amount originally agreed upon. Otherwise the contract shall be binding upon both parties the same as any other financial obligation entered into by contracting parties.
- 6. Each pastor shall file a duplicate statistical report with the Committee before the close of the second day of Conference, said report to be kept on file one year, and hereafter these reports shall not be read in open Conference.
- 7. The membership, so far as possible, shall pay all their contributions for the Conference and Connectional interests to the pastors, who shall receipt them for the same and see that it is paid to the proper authorities. Where money is paid direct to the Conference

Treasurer by the membership, he shall send a duplicate receipt to the pastor of the charge where such persons are members.

- 8. All charges with a membership of twenty-five or more shall in addition to the regular stipulated salary, assume the responsibility of providing a suitable home in which the pastor may live.
- 9. We recommend that all charges and stations to which the pastor moves pay the moving and transportation expenses of said pastor, the same to be done in addition to his salary; provided this shall not interfere with the previous arrangements between pastors and charges.
- 10. All unaccounted for members appearing in the statistics in the membership list shall be transferred to the discontinued list. The roll of all the classes upon the charges shall be put in the hands of the Pastors and they shall have charge of the same and make all entries therein.
- 11. The Committee on Elder's Orders is hereby empowered to transfer all persons to the study list who may have been recommended to travel and may not have been given work.
- 12. It shall be a standing rule of this Conference until revoked by vote that the President shall receive \$35.00, the Secretary \$50.00, the Assistant Secretary, \$25.00, and each member of the Statistical Committee, \$15.00, and each member of the Auditing Committee, \$10.00, the same to be apportioned pro rata among the various funds of the Conference.
- 13. The official character of no Pastor shall be passed until he shall have submitted a satisfactory report, including statistics.
- 14. It shall be a standing rule until revoked by this body that the President shall nominate his Advisory Board and the Conference shall elect his nominations.
- 15. It shall be a standing rule of this Conference that in the examination of character the Conference officials shall be called first.
- 16. In the membership report all members who are found on the circuits in excess of the number reported shall be reported received.
- 17. Be it resolved, That where the Conference demands the services of anyone, that it shall bear the moving expenses, if any expense shall thus be incurred.
- 18. The Camp Meeting Committee shall be elected as follows: One for three years, or for two years and one for one year, and that the person elected for three years be chairman of the Committee, and that thereafter each member be elected for a term of three years.

- 19. Be it resolved, That it shall be the duty of the pastors to look after the insurance of our church and parsonage properties. All insurance shall provide for losses caused by fire and lightning, hail and tornado. A failure on the part of the pastor shall be a censurable offense. If the church fails to insure their property upon reasonable effort of the pastor to secure the same, then said failure shall be reported to the President of the Conference, who shall then have the property insured. In such case, all insurance monies received from losses by fire, lightning, hail and tornado shall be used in Church Extension work as the Conference Board Trustees deems best.
- 20. Whereas, We have a scholastic standard for our preachers, and whereas those saved, sanctified and called among our own numbers are compelled to meet these requirements before ordination: Be it resolved, That the Committee on Itineracy and Elder's Orders shall require all those desiring to unite with us from any other denomination or Annual Conference to present credits equivalent to our Conference Course of Study, regardless of their standing in the body of which they have been a member, and if they cannot do this they shall be required to meet the same conditions as our local preachers before ordination.

Executive Rulings.

1. The action of the Conference in adopting the recommendations of the President by which the District Committees were authorized, likewise adopted the purposes and duties of said committees as set forth in the recommendation: i. e., that they should be in advisory relation to the Missionary Board and should work in harmony and co-operate with the Missionary Board of the Conference.

To make clear and avoid confusion, the following rules shall be adhered to:

FINANCE AND APPROPRIATION COMMITTEE REPORT.

No. 4.

Your Committee on Finance and Appropriation submit the following report:

Believing that the pastoral office is of divine origin, and that upon the success of those engaged in this, hinges the maintenance and progress of our general work, we urge our charges to a faithful support of their Pastor, morally and financially.

We would also urge upon our Pastors, that when a living salary is provided, they should feel their obligation to give their full time to the interests of the Church, and "feed the flock of God which is among you, taking the oversight thereof, being ensamples to the flock."

Since the Budget System of finance has proved so successful, we recommend that every Church adopt this system, and that our Pastors and Conference President lend all possible co-operation for the general adoption of this system.

We heartily commend the Store-House Tithing Plan, and believe that if all should tithe their income it would be easy to give every phase of our work a healthful support.

We earnestly urge that the plan of devoting the offering of our Sunday Schools on the first Sunday of each month to Home Missions be continued, that every Pastor seek to promote this good plan and that the offerings be sent to our Conference Treasurer at least quarterly.

The College Building Fund is both a moral and legal obligation of the Indiana Conference. Unless the interest on this fund is paid, the debt will increase, and may imperil our assets. In order to meet this interest we have made an apportionment under the head of "Conference Work and Church Extension," which will provide for this in addition to meeting the requirements for salary and expenses of our Conference President.

Whereas, the present day competition is so great as to require supreme attention to our local church work, and our most helpful method of enlarging and building up local churches is by aggressive evangelism, and, Whereas, the present form of quarterly meeting evangelism, though helpful in the past, does not meet present day requirements, therefore be it Resolved, That our Conference President shall hold one quarterly meeting on each charge during the year, and give the rest of his time to Conference Missionary work, engaging other help as need shall require. The Conference Missionary Board shall co-operate with the President in united effort to advance our borders, and strengthen the new and weaker churches, as far as funds shall be provided.

In co-operation with this program, each Pastor shall arrange for his remaining quarterly meetings, calling to his assistance such other pastors or evangelists as he and his charge shall be pleased to arrange for.

Your committee further recommends that in the event that it may be inconvenient for the President to hold a quarterly meeting upon some charge or charges, owing to the interests of his other work, he shall be authorized to send the Vice-President to officiate in his place.

We recommend that the Conference President's salary be \$1,600 and his expenses incident to his carrying forward the work assigned to him.

We recommend that the pastors send their apportionment for Church Extension and Conference Work at least quarterly to the Conference Treasurer.

Conference Districts.

We recommend that all the churches south of Elwood, and a line running east and west therefrom be included in and constitute the Southern District. That all the churches north of this line including the churches of Marion, constitute the Central District. That all the churches north of Marion constitute the Northern District.

Group Insurance.

We recommend that all ministers take advantage of the splendid opportunity of group insurance now offered us, and that we do away with all previous plans of assessment, in the event of death entering our ranks.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS.

No. 9.

We, your Committee on Resolutions, submit the following report:

- 1. We realize that we are living in a perilous age, when sin is rampant on every hand, and the very foundation of the Christian Church is being shaken, therefore we urge that our people cling tenaciously to the faith once delivered to the saints, shunning the very appearance of evil and keeping ourselves unspotted from the world.
- 2. Whereas, the fashions of the day are contributing to immorality, we recommend that our women dress, not with short skirts, low neck, sleeveless dresses, jewelry, and bobbed hair, but as becometh women of true holiness.
- 3. Whereas, the Word of God says the servant of the Lord must not strive, but be gentle unto all men, apt to teach, patient, we recommend that the Golden Rule be closely adhered to in all our relationship with each other, both among the ministry and laity.
- 4. Whereas, the Supreme Court has stated—That there is no inherent right in a citizen to sell intoxicating liquors; That prohibition takes away no personal rights and no property rights of the citizen; That the legislature cannot barter away the public health and the public morals; That prohibition itself is a fundamental principle of government. And that the Eighteenth Amendment is no more an experiment, we urge our people to do all they can by voice and ballot to prevent a wet man from being seated in the Presidential chair.
- 5. As the spirit of Sabbath desecration is on the increase, we insist that our people refrain from all unnecessary labor, picnics, reunions, visiting and joy riding on the Lord's Day.

6. Whereas, the trend of the day in many of the high schools, colleges and universities, is to lead our young people away from the teaching of the Word of God and filling their minds with higher criticism and the theory of evolution, which is contributing much to the crime wave among the youth of our land, we recommend that our people support our own schools by sending students and contributing of their means and prayers to the utmost of their ability.
